MONTEVIDEO.

BANK OF THE REPUBLIC.
The Board of this Bank has recently published the Report and General Balance for the year ended 31st December, 1903. We make the following extracts:—
Cash movement; Head-office, \$155,194,028; Branches (these number twenty-one) \$85,053,895; Total, \$240,247,923.
Discounts; Head-office, 2768 for \$3,414,083; Branches, 16,557 for \$8,520,964; Total, 19,315 for \$11,935,047.
Current Accounts; Head-office, 1041 with a movement of \$85,301,023; Branches, 2319 with \$45,404,636; Total, 3360 with \$130,705,659.
Profit and Loss:—After carefully sifting the accounts and deducting discounts and working expenses, there remains a net profit of \$380,444, against \$366,099 in 1902, representing 7.88 % on the paid-up capital. From this there have been deducted \$20,000 for the Provision Fund (which responds to unforeseen losses and possible fluctuations in the bonds of Public Debt held as guarantee of the Judicial Deposits), \$36,044 to the Reserve Fund, and \$36,044 towards paying off the bonus shares 1st Series. The balance, or \$288,355, accrues to the State as sole shareholder, and will be transferred to the Government account as soon as the accounts have been audited and approved. This balance exceeds by \$11,475 that of 1902, and represents 5.53 % on the paid-up capital.
National Mont de Píed. This section of the Bank's business has given a net profit of \$27,275, an increase of \$3528 in 1902, half of which accrues to the general profits of the Bank, and half towards constituting a proper capital for the Mont de Píed. During the year 5585 pawnbroking loans were issued for \$119,643, and 5058 were redeemed for \$104,302. Discounts and advances on salaries numbered 72,784 to the amount of \$1,740,095. In minor loans and discounts to tradesmen, etc., there were 1910 operations for \$223,043. Advances on current account to various public offices reached \$528,371.
The Balance sheet accompanying the above Report is identical with that dated December 31, of which we made an abstract in our issue of February 18, so there is no necessity to reproduce it now.

THE POLITICAL TROUBLES.
There is not a single word of war news available, and in fact from the condition of our contemporaries, of yesterday one would hardly know that any military operations at all were on foot in the Republic. The silence even extends to the official organs, which fail to spare a short paragraph to give us the custom-

ary assurance that the revolution is almost over or that a decisive battle is imminent. There is ample information concerning the war in the Far East and the visit of Mr. Loubet to Rome, but of events in Uruguay we are kept in blank ignorance.
The citations for the recently created battalions of Departmental Guard continue to appear. Those concerned are reminded that they are only allowed the very short period of two days in which to present themselves.
Telegraphic communication on the Oriental line is announced as interrupted to Treinta y Tres, Melo, Artigas, and Vergara, and on the northern section of the National line beyond San Máximo. There is no change in the conditions on the other lines.

Parliament
The Legislative Committee of the Representatives has reported on Dr. Figari's Bill of Bail, recommending its adoption in a modified form, as follows:—In case of an acquittal, liberty shall follow immediately on issue of the sentence (i.e., dispensing with certain present delays). When the Fiscal (Public Prosecutor) has applied for a correctional penalty, and there is appeal against an acquittal, the accused may be released on bail; but when the Fiscal has applied for a penalty of imprisonment, the accused may only be released on bail after an unanimous verdict in favor of his innocence.
With regard to the vexed question of Sunday Rest, the same Committee has merely reendorsed its former Report, which was unfavorable to the innovation, considering it unsuited to the customs of the country and contrary to the freedom of labor. It is to be hoped that, when the question comes before the Chambers for discussion shortly, some of the legislators will be found to take a more enlightened view than this, though the moment is not propitious for the discussion of such a matter.

THE HIGH COURT OF JUSTICE.

Referring to the approaching discussion of the Bill creating the High Court of Justice, yesterday's *Tiempo* has an article from which we condense the following remarks, adding that we entirely share the opinions of our contemporary:—
After having postponed for three-quarters of a century (says the *Tiempo*) the definite organization of the Judicial Power, awaiting a normal epoch which would allow it to be established correctly and with all the necessary prestige, devoid of influences and favoritisms, it seems to us most imprudent to implant it in the present time of commotion, unrest, profound moral perturbation and inflamed passions. Nevertheless, contrary to all expectation and logic, the Committee of Legislation has despatched the matter and it is already on the card for discussion, while it is asserted that, in high circles, there is every intention of hastening its sanction, and even the names are given of the persons likely to compose the future Tribunal. We have always been partisans of the establishment of the High Court, for many reasons, but we cannot be so in the present exceptional circumstances when there prevail precisely those influences contrary to justice which in former period justified its postponement. The High Court would thus come into existence subtracted from the necessary control of public opinion, at present unable to manifest itself in the press, there being no liberty of discussion. In the organization of this high body there enter questions of political character which may not be urged just now, so that the judicial institution of the Republic, desired for many years, yet postponed for reasons of less weight than exist to-day, would come to life under the worst conditions and the worst auspices. Although we are cured of fright, we cannot believe that among the surprises of these times, so fertile in deceptions, we shall have to note the High Court created in the midst of this storm of passion. If certain things are not respected, if the country is to be regarded as a cipher, if its highest interests are to be disposed of without public opinion being heard, in disregard of all the tutelary forms that afford guarantee against errors and excesses, then it may be said that there is no limit at all, and that all may be done merely by possession of the power. These things would reveal deep evils, which it is our duty to conjure with patriotism and high-mindedness, saving from this shipwreck the respect due to the fundamental principles of our system of government, which gives the people intervention in their own affairs. After all (concludes our contemporary), what's the hurry? Is it not possible to postpone the matter for calmer days, when it can be discussed soberly and freely, and the Court constituted free from the present political passions and interests? We desire this postponement for the good of the country and the situation.

Whilst endorsing the above remarks of our contemporary, we very decidedly think that so important and national a question should not be broached by the present maimed and imperfect Chambers, in which one of the principal parties of the Republic is excluded from representation—and, as it happens, the party containing men of the highest legal authority. Neither is the constitution of the new Court conceivable in the absence of some of the most eminent and respected jurists, such as Dr. E. Vasquez Acevedo and Rodriguez Larreta. As to the names which have been put forward as likely to constitute the Court—we prefer not to repeat them—we can only say that, if they are at all correct, the Court would be created devoid of prestige and public confidence, merely as a partisan instrument, and it would be much better for it not to be created at all than to be created under such unfavorable conditions. Judicial reform is a very urgent need of the Republic, but by this means it is more likely to be frustrated for an indefinite period than to be attained in the conditions which the country desires and needs.

BRITISH BANK OF SOUTH AMERICA.

The forty-first ordinary general meeting of the British Bank of South America, Limited, was held on Thursday, March 24, at 2a, Moorgate-street, E. C.—In moving the adoption of the Report the Chairman (Mr. Charles Carrington) said that the report before them was the more satisfactory because the better result is not due to any extraordinary business but may be accounted for, partly by the saving of expenses in connection with the closing of the Pará Branch and to other economies, partly by our having been fortunate in escaping serious losses through failures and bad debts, and partly by some improvement in business. Our present Balance Sheet and Profit and Loss Account compare in all respects favorably with the Balance Sheet and Profit and Loss Account of last year. The available balance, including £7,425 brought forward from last year's accounts, after fully providing for all Bad and Doubtful Debts, is £60,798, whereas last year it was only £37,425, including the balance of £6,318 brought forward. You will doubtless have noticed that there is a considerable increase in Current and Deposit Accounts—namely, from £2,168,421 to £2,500,821, being an increase of £332,400. This is satisfactory as Banking profits are so largely dependent upon deposits. You will have noticed also that Bills Payable, which last year were £2,043,794, are now £2,381,429, an increase of £337,635. This, I think is also satisfactory, as it indicates a larger business with, I should hope, corresponding profit, for, so far as they represent Exchange business, the restrictions we have placed upon our Managers forbid business of that nature for the sake of business only, without due regard to profit. We are obliged however to be content with small profits in exchange business because, as I mentioned at our meeting last year, and as some of you are probably aware, competition and other causes make it very difficult to work it to any advantage. On the other side of the account against Liabilities of £2,381,429 of Bills Payable, you will see that we hold £2,644,382 of Bills Receivable.

But, Gentlemen, you will naturally want to know whether the improvement shown this year is likely to be maintained. It is impossible to forecast the future, but I may say this much, that I am decidedly hopeful, for although, notwithstanding the somewhat improved condition of Brazil, we cannot expect much improvement in the banking business there, the reduction we have made in expenses by the closing of two Branches that were unprofitable, and the economies we have carried out in other Branches, should enable us to show a better result there, whilst the prosperity of the Argentine Republic caused by a succession of large crops, has already shown itself in our own business by a considerable increase of deposits; and this prosperity will, doubtless, be more apparent later, in all departments of trade—the only drawback is the low value of money, which detracts from the profit we should otherwise derive from the employment of our funds. On the other hand, there is, just now, as you are aware, a Revolution in Uruguay, being a struggle for power between the Blancos and Colorados, and it is impossible to say how long it may continue. In the meantime great caution is being exercised by our Manager at Montevideo. On the whole, I am inclined to take a favorable view of the future, and entertain good hopes that we shall not have a recurrence of the last two bad years. Reverting to Brazil, there is one thing that deserves notice, and that is the extraordinary steadiness of exchange about 12d. the milreis during the whole of last year and up to the present time. This must be looked upon as a favorable feature in connection with Brazilian finance, and I think it is due not only to the stoppage of exchange speculation which has been almost entirely done, but is likewise due to the judicious handling of the Exchange Market by the Banco da Republica

backed by the Government. Turning to the Profit and Loss Account; you will probably have noticed two items that have not appeared before to the debit of that Account; namely, Income Tax £3,162 2s. 9d., and Government Taxes in Brazil and the River Plate £4,080 6s. 9d. These Taxes in all former Reports were not included in General Charges, but were deducted from the Gross Profits, which have been reduced thereby. We have thought that this was a mistake and somewhat misleading; at the same time we did not think it right that these taxes, over which the management could have no control, should be included in General Charges; we have therefore shown them separately instead of deducting them from the Gross Profits, which, otherwise, in our Profit and Loss Account would have appeared so much less—say £149,693 4s. 1d., instead of £156,885, 13s. 7d. I think you will agree with us that the way in which we have now stated these accounts is very much better in every respect. With regard to General Charges, you may remember that in the Report of last year they were less than in the previous year by about £5,000, and now, compared with those of last year, they are less by £4,797, being £96,319 against £101,117. This is due to the closing of the Branch at Pará, and the consequent saving of the expenses of that Branch. You will have seen in the Report that the Branch at Santos was also closed at the end of August, but the saving of expenses in connection with that Branch and other economies carried out in other Branches will only be seen in next year's Accounts. With regard to the closing of the Branch at Santos, I would say a few words. Owing to changes that have taken place in the business relations between that place and Rio de Janeiro, the profit from the business that presented itself to our branch was far from sufficient to cover its expenses, and, moreover, it appeared to us that the usefulness of that Branch to our other Branches would in no way be impaired by appointing Correspondents to attend to what business we had there. We therefore determined to close the Branch, and have no cause to regret, but, on the contrary, to congratulate both you and ourselves in having done so, as we not only save the heavy expenses of a Branch, but find that what business we have at Santos is admirably carried out by our Correspondents Messrs. F. S. Hampshire & Co., as it is likewise at Pará by our Correspondents, Messrs. Conk, Schraeder & Co. The same paragraph in the Report that mentions the closing of the Santos Branch, refers also to the opening in Buenos Aires of a small Sub-Branch at Barracas al Sud. We have, therefore, now in that City, three Sub-Branches, one at Plaza Once de Setiembre, one at Plaza Constitución, and the one recently opened. These sub branches are all under the control of our Manager at Buenos Aires and, so far, we have reason to be satisfied with their working. Our Reserve Fund of £225,000 remains as before and, although at the time of making up the accounts, £9,793 was required to make good the depreciation in the sterling value of the Capital employed in Brazil, the subsequent rise in the exchange to 12 1/16 reduces that amount to £5,550—that leaving an available Reserve Fund of £319,450.

I think, gentlemen, I need say no more on the Accounts, but you will not have failed to notice the mention made in the Report of the retirement from the Board—owing to advancing years—of our most esteemed colleague, Mr. Richard Hatt Noble. When the Bank was started in 1864, Mr. Noble was one of the Committee of the Agency at Oporto, and he has occupied a seat on the Board here since 1877. He has always taken a great interest in the Bank, and his judgment has frequently been of great value to us, besides which, he and his family have always been very large shareholders. We feel very reluctant that Mr. Noble should sever his connection with us altogether and, having ascertained that it would be agreeable to him to rejoin us—but as an Honorary Director, I feel sure that it will be your pleasure to pass the Resolution which later I will move. The vacancy on the Board caused by Mr. Noble's retirement we have been fortunate in filling by the appointment of Mr. Francis Mackenzie Ogilvy. I believe that many of you are acquainted with Mr. Ogilvy. More than twenty years ago he was our Secretary and Sub-Manager. He left us, to our great regret, to fill a very important position in the well known Firm of Messrs. Brown, Shipley and Co., with whom he remained until his retirement at the end of last year. Mr. Ogilvy has been one of our Auditors since 1890, and is therefore, not unacquainted with the Bank's business, whilst his long and varied Commercial and Banking experience during his connection with one of the first Houses in London cannot fail to be of great value to us. Well, Gentlemen, we have a disposable Balance for the year of £60,798. Out of this we paid in September a dividend on account of 3 per cent. amounting to £15,000, and we now recommend the payment of a dividend of five per cent., or 10s. per share, making eight per cent. for the year free of Income Tax. This will

absorb £25,000, and leave £20,798 to be carried forward. I believe some remarks have been made respecting the carrying forward of so large an amount, and it is possible that some may think that it means a provision for certain losses that we see ahead, but I can assure you this is not the case. We have no knowledge of any such impending losses. We have of late years, it is true, carried forward very much smaller sums, but from 1892 to 1896 the amounts carried forward ranged from £17,269 to £21,708, so that our present carry-forward, when compared with those years, is by no means excessive, indeed, I shall be pleased if it is always in our power to carry forward some such amount, as—apart from unforeseen extraordinary losses—it more or less secures the payment of at least the ordinary dividend for the next year. Gentlemen, I now move *"That the Report and Statement of Accounts which have been read to the meeting and previously circulated among the Shareholders in the United Kingdom be adopted."*

The Resolution was put and carried unanimously.

The Chairman: The next Resolution which I have the pleasure of moving is: *"That in addition to the payment of the Dividend on account of 6s. per Share in September last, a Dividend of 10s. per Share, free of Income Tax, payable on 25th March, instant, be now declared, making a total distribution of 8 per cent. free of Income Tax for the year ended 31st December, 1903."*

The Resolution was put and passed unanimously.

SUNDRIES.

WEATHER.—As before, only more so. Rain clouds are beginning to reappear and the damp increases.

SOMETHING TO LOOK FORWARD TO.—We are able to state on the best authority that the Saxe and Nelson English Opera Company, after their season in Buenos Aires, will pay a short visit to Montevideo, giving some eight or ten performances in the Cibils Theatre. We cannot yet state the date, but it will probably be towards the end of June. — Our Buenos Aires contemporaries speak in the most enthusiastic terms of the debut of the Company there, bestowing warm praise on principals, chorists, dresses and scenery, and agreeing that the combination is much superior to that of any English Company yet seen in this part of the world. This makes us the more anxious to see the Company here.

RAILWAY.—The Executive has signed and promulgated the Law authorising the extension of the Sane railway to Trinidad (capital of Flores) provided no difficulty arises in crossing the Western Extension line at Arroyo Grande station.

SIMILAR REGULATION WANTED HERE.—At a recent sitting of the Town Council of Bilbao (says an exchange) a regulation was passed forbidding the ringing of church bells under a penalty of twenty five pesetas for every offence. Their reasons, as given in the wording of the edict, are not only detrimental to the sick and annoying to the healthy, but quite unnecessary in an up to date modern town where clocks are universal. — The Municipality which would do as much for Montevideo would be deserving of gold medals and a public monument.

NOVELTY IN TOWELS.—Asbestos towels are among the latest novelties. They do not require soap and water to cleanse them. When soiled it is said that they may be thrown in the fire, and in a few minutes are ready to be drawn out fresh and clean.

A MARRIED GERMAN.—Marriage is the frequent occurrence with a man in Creighten, Germany. He has had eleven brides to the altar. His first three wives died young, the next two were drowned, one committed suicide, three died in succession, the tenth was gored to death by a bull, and he has recently married the eleventh, who had a leg cut off by a railway train last year, so that the wedding had to be postponed till now.

SKIPPING AS AN EXERCISE.—A certain Dr. Bond, of Gloucester, has just published a pamphlet advocating the employment of skipping as an "economical form of home gymnastics," and also an improvement upon the common skipping rope of to-day. He has given the name of "Girbols," and which is intended to facilitate skipping by adults. There can be no doubt of the efficacy of skipping as a form of exercise which calls a large number of muscles into activity; and Dr. Bond claims for it a special value as a means of correcting the weakness of the heart which is apt to occur in persons of sedentary life. He describes it as "an unequalled resource for those who wish, at no appreciable expense and with little expenditure of time, except at odd moments that are at the command of every one, to supply the lack of outdoor exercise which their occupation during working hours imposes by exercise of a kind that is calculated to do for them all that any kind of home gymnastics can offer."

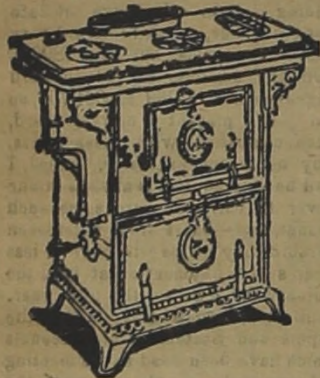

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, MARCH 28.

The demonstration in Hyde Park on Saturday against the proposed introduction of Chinese slavery into South Africa assumed enormous proportions. Contingents arrived from every part of the metropolis, and there were representatives present from places as distant as Yorkshire. Speakers at the fourteen platforms included such men as Dr. Clifford, Rev. F. B. Meyer, Mr. Burns, M.P., Mr. Crooks, M.P., and other members of Parliament and Labour leaders. The resolution submitted was carried without a dissent.

Mr. Andrew Carnegie, in an interview at Plymouth on his arrival from New York, expressed the opinion that the South African war was the greatest blunder in English history after that which lost this country North America. His view was that our troubles in South Africa were only beginning.

Lord Curzon of Kedleston, Viceroy of India, has been appointed Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, in the room of the late Marquis of Salisbury.

Presiding over a conference on the Co-operative Movement and Garden Cities held at Exeter Hall on Saturday, the Bishop of Rochester expressed his firm belief in the Garden City scheme. A paper on the subject was also read by Mr. Arthur Webb.

Captain de Keyser on Saturday won his action against Captain Burrows and Messrs. Everett and Co., for alleged libel in connection with occurrences on the Congo. The jury gave plaintiff £500 damages, and Mr. Justice Ridley granted a perpetual injunction against the defendants. Two subsidiary cases were arranged on terms.

The University Boat Race was rowed over the usual course on Saturday, and, as anticipated, Cambridge gained her third consecutive victory. Oxford were leading until well past Hammersmith Bridge, but were afterwards completely overhauled, and in the end the Light Blues won by four and a half lengths.

The Association football programme of Saturday included an international match, several important League games, and a meeting between the rival amateurs, Corinthians and Queens' Park. Under the Rugby code there was the usual list of club games and a full complement of Northern Union League matches.

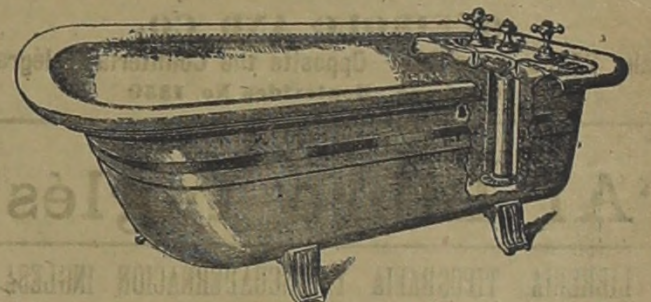

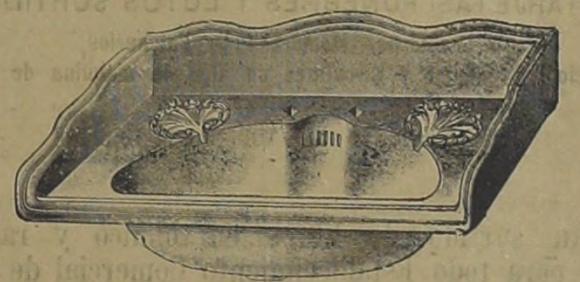
