NEWS OF THE DAY.

THE POLITICAL TROUBLES.

Yesterday news again became scarce. As regards military matters, the *Dia* has nothing to say. The *Diario Nuevo* gives a general contradiction to the rumors that were current of combats in Minas and Maldonado, but adds that important news may be expected any moment, an assertion that we seem to have heard before.

Nevertheless there has been some fighting, for yesterday a sanitary expedition left for Montes Estación (on the Minas or Eastern line) to succor some wounded. So far, no particulars whatever have transpired of the combat, but the expedition was a numerous one.

The *Dia* repeats quite an amusing account of Saravia's visit to Minas, according to which he and his soldiers—were should say «bordes»—had quite a triumphal entry into the town, the misguided people throwing flowers on them as they passed through the streets and the families flouting the nationalist colors. In the Prefecture offices they committed some terrible outrages, mutilating and destroying the portraits of Rivera, Flores and H. E. President Batlle. Men who could descend to this must naturally be capable of any enormity. It is not yet stated what punishment will be visited on Minas for its sins—possibly the visit of Saravia is considered punishment enough.

On Friday, the President of the Republic and the Minister of Government, accompanied by a military escort, visited the bivouac of the police battalions at Punta Carretas.

There seemed to be an unusual amount of military movement in the city yesterday, but we are quite unable to state its object.

Rumors have appeared, but lack confirmation, of the resignation of Sr. Muñoz as Uruguayan Minister in Argentina, on account of the incident which led to the recent interpellation in the Chamber.

The *Diario Nuevo*, though it has ceased to «bullrag» the Argentine Minister, is again very angry because three more unfortunate have found asylum in the Argentine Legation, which it accuses of a «want of discretion.» The present theory of the *Diario Nuevo* seems to be that only persons of high position and standing have a right to diplomatic asylum, and that for the «common» or inferior people there must be no place of refuge or hope of escape. It omits to state precisely where it draws the line. For our part, we think that the more openings there for escape from the afflictions of civil war, the better.

Yesterday's *Tiempo* makes a vigorous and very necessary protest against the monstrous suggestion of the *Diario Nuevo* that, on the approaching renewal of the Board of the Bank of the Republic, men should be chosen who, in addition to any other qualifications, are conspicuously addicted to the «situation» or in other words, extreme «colorados.» If this suggestion be followed, the Bank, which has hitherto been kept happily free from the taint of partisan politics, will be the first sufferer. This is not the first time that the *Diario Nuevo* has made destructive suggestions with regard to the Bank of the Republic, which it would possibly like to see follow the course of the National Bank, of disastrous memory. In the midst of the general demoralization, let this institution at least be respected.

A Veteran Monarch.

The King of Denmark celebrated his eighty-sixth birthday last month, surrounded by a large family circle, among whom were King Edward and Queen Alexandra, and his Majesty bears the weight of his years remarkably well.

«I have met his Majesty on many occasions», writes Mr. Stuart Cumberland, «and he has always been the same—kindly, courteous, and considerate.

«When, some years back, the King and Queen celebrated their golden wedding, the occasion was marked by the most remarkable festivities. Many reigning monarchs and their queens, and representatives of princely blood journeyed to Copenhagen and took part in the public celebrations. Afterwards, those Royal folk more closely allied to them by blood or marriage, including our King and Queen, the Czar Alexander III. and the Czarina, the Crown Prince of Greece, and the Duke of Cumberland, remained on for some time at Bernstorff. They were an exceedingly happy family, and lived a life as simple as that appertaining to an English country house.

«His Majesty is a man of many charms. He has much of the old-world courtesy of the Kaiser Wilhelm I., and, like him, is a veritable Father of his People. The people honour him, respect him—love him. He goes freely amongst them, as one of themselves. He rules with a light, paternal hand, and the welfare of his people is his first thought. Denmark is too small a country to count for much in the arena of European politics; but King Christian has in his time been an important factor in connexion with European politics.

«Every ruler, every statesman trusts him, and values his shrewd common sense. He is the best-ideal arbitrator of high politics: just, patient, and firm. Then he has much knowledge, a perfect grasp of events, and great personal experience. He is a Hague Tribunal in himself; and nations with differences could always have safely submitted such differences to him for decision. And the decisions arrived at by him would have been free from bias and strictly according to merits.

«The King is an admirable linguist, and his English is altogether good. Well I remember, when at Bernstorff, his Majesty asking me in what language I preferred to speak in the course of my demonstration there. Naturally I replied «English.» «Very well», he said, «we will all speak English.» Once or twice, when the Czar, who thought in Russian and loved to speak in French, burst into the Gallic tongue, his Majesty playfully reminded him that English only was to be spoken. By the bye, at Copenhagen, and indeed at all European Courts, the Czar is never referred to as the Czar, but as the Emperor.

«It is not only in his own country that King Christian affects a simple homely style. He is always simplicity itself wherever he may be. His favourite watering-place on the Continent is Wiesbaden. There he has gone year after year to take the waters. There he takes his walks in the gardens or listens to the band, accompanied by one member of his entourage only. He dresses simply, plainly, and mixes freely with the visitors. He is never mobbed, not even by the rudest travelling Americans. Every one respects his quiet dignity and his desire to be left alone to take his pleasures in his own simple way. He is a singularly lovable man; and may his days be long in the land where he is so greatly beloved!

About Rockefeller.

The announcement of the vast scheme of organized charity projected by Mr. John D. Rockefeller is not inconsistent with some of his previous utterances. «The pursuit of riches», he is reported to have declared at a Bible Class Meeting in New York not long since, «is not a wrong thing. On the contrary, gold is one of the mightiest agents for the doing of good, and its possessors should regard it as a sacred trust which they hold for the good of their fellows.»

«I believe it is a religious duty to get all the money you can» is another of Mr. Rockefeller's doctrines; and

certainly it must be agreed that he has practised what he preaches. He himself gets very little out of the world; the simplest of meals, necessitated by his poor digestion; the simplest of pleasures, an occasional game of golf, upon which he will bet one dollar, never more; that is all.

Mr. Rockefeller plays golf, by the way, after a manner of his own—if at least the statement may be believed that he utilises a bicycle to save time between the strokes rather than walk from point to point. In this same connexion, it was once calculated by the *New York Journal* that the amount coming to Mr. Rockefeller during a single round of the links totalled up on an average to some 11,000 dollars—his computing his wealth at only 500,000,000 dollars, and his income therefrom at a mere 5 per cent.

But another statistician put the case even more strikingly, perhaps, when he figured it out that Mr. Rockefeller could pay President Roosevelt his salary of £10,000 a year every day for his lifetime, and yet retain over £300,000 a year out of his total annual income of £4,000,000; and this without encroaching upon his capital at all. Mr. Rockefeller admits that he does not know himself to within five or six millions how much he is actually worth.

The War in the Far East.

We quote the following telegrams from our Buenos Aires contemporaries:—

St. Petersburg, 19th.—Official.—The telegrams received yesterday by the Russian Government give accounts of the movements of the Japanese army in Manchuria. The Japanese, according to these reports, have evacuated Kaohsiangpou to the North of Feng-Huang-Cheng and have retreated to Selinchan. Those who were occupying Taku-Shan, in Liao-Tung, have evacuated it and retreated to Feng-Huang-Cheng, the Japanese head quarters. The Japanese army which was marching to Lidoyang has evacuated Selinchan and is also retreating to Feng-Huang-Cheng, where there are being constructed large field fortifications which extend along a vast line.

Berlin, 18th.—The Government has received official advices of a very serious nature from the seat of war. General Kuropatkin is besieged in Mukden by two Japanese armies. His situation is critical, the enemy having cut off his retreat to Kharbin. In military circles they talk of another Sedan affair.

St. Petersburg, 18th.—The official papers state that General Kuropatkin will not abandon Mukden, the Holy City, because its possession by the Japanese would be a triumph the moral effect of which upon the native people would be serious. There is immense excitement in the War Office and important news is momentarily expected.

London, 18th.—The «Daily Mail» has published a special edition with a telegram from Seoul, stating that the Japanese army is at Mukden. An attack is imminent. Kuropatkin's plan of retreat has failed.

Maritime Casualties.

Three Steamers in Danger.

During the fog of Friday morning three large steamers grounded on the «English Banks», of sinister fame.

The first of these was the Spanish str. «Miguel Larraaga», which got out of danger unaided in the course of the day and pursued her voyage to the Buenos Aires.

The second was the English str. «Lynton», 2073 tons register, of the Liver Shipping Co. of Liverpool, from Antwerp to Rosario with general cargo. This had to call in the aid of Lussich's salvage fleet, all of which were promptly on the spot. After some 1100 tons of cargo (cement and rails) had been taken out of her, she was successfully got off yesterday morning, and came away on her own machines, tugging two lighters with the cargo. We believe that she also proceeded to Buenos Aires yesterday.

The third and most serious case is that of the English str. «Fifeshire», a splendid steel vessel, with frigorific fittings, of 5672 tons gross register, 420 feet long by 54.7 by 28.5. She belongs to the Elderslie SS. Co. of Glasgow, where she was built in 1898, and was on her way from Newcastle with coal. This is one of the largest steamers that has come to the Plate. Her position is considered a critical one, and her great size adds to the difficulty. Lussich's salvage elements are hard at work on her, and though success is not yet reported, it is hoped to get her off safely, with the change of wind and rise of tide which may come any moment, water at present being unusually low.

SUNDRIES.

—WHITSUN DAY.—The origin of this name, applied in the Anglican Church to the seventh Sunday or fiftieth day after Easter (so corresponding with Pentecost) is disputed. A popular derivation is from White Sunday, so called from the white robes worn in the primitive church, by the newly baptised, from Easter to Pentecost. The earliest known form of the word is *hwita Sunnen day*, which is found in an old English Chronicle of the year 1067. Another etymology is Wit or Wisdom Sunday, because on that day the Holy Ghost brought wit and wisdom to the disciples. A third derivation is from the Anglo-Saxon *wied*, sacred—Wied or Sacred Sunday, because of the descending of the Holy Ghost. Though generally written Whitsun Day, the more correct form is Whit Sunday, Whit being a qualifying aggregate, as also in Whit Monday, Whit Tuesday.

—WEATHER.—The threatened rain came to little, and yesterday was relatively fine, but damp and oppressive. The outlook for to-day is quite uncertain. With a high temperature, low barometer, north wind and damp atmosphere it is obviously working up for the storm that annually falls on the holiday May 25, or close to it, and which generally brings cold weather with it. This is an annual event that rarely fails and is generally very punctual, so it should be born in mind by those who arrange outdoor fixtures for that date. The storm warning is already hoisted in the port.

—FOOTBALL.—This afternoon, at Paso Molino, the Albion 2nd and 3rd XI's will play the Foreign and Independencia Clubs, respectively. Mr. W. D. McCubbin has been named Football Captain of the Albion Club, in place of Mr. C. B. Poole, resigned.—At the Parque Central there will be a match between the Deutsche F. K. M. and H. M. S. «Brilliant».

—CASINO.—A great hit has been made by Menotti, who gives a sensational cycling performance on an invisible wire stretched across the Hall. An amusing turn is that of Taté, a grotesque dwarf. Another new comer is Lucie France, French singer. There will be the usual afternoon performance to-day.

—SAN FELIPE THEATRE.—The Spanish Company will make their appearance this evening in the Comedy «Al Campo», by the Uruguayan author Nicolas Granada. «A Trip to the Moon» will be shown on the biograph. Popular prices.

—DEATH.—The death has taken place, after a rapid illness, of Dr. Pedro Mascaro, for over twenty years Director of the National Library and Keeper of Archives. Conjecture is already rife as to his successor in the post.

—WEDDINGS.—The marriage will take place on Saturday next of Mr. Hector S. MacLean, of the well-known Anglo native family, and Miss Estefania Yeregul.—The marriage will take place on June 11 of Mr. Louis Supervielle, manager of the French Bank, and Miss Amalia Saavedra.

—SALVATION ARMY.—We hear that the new «Home» opened recently by the Salvation Army for the benefit of our jolly sailor boys is a success. The need of a place of the sort where Jack could feel at home in a strange land, and not be obliged to frequent questionable places has been felt for a long time past, and we are

—SOCIAL.—A society event of to-day, weather permitting, will be the fête at Villa Dolores for the benefit of the Red Cross Society.

—PARLIAMENT.—The British Parliament has risen for the usual Whitnights recess until the end of the month.

—PRINCELY MARRIAGE.—From Berlin is announced the approaching marriage of the Grand Duke Cyril to the Princess Victoria of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha. The latter is the divorced wife of the Grand Duke Ernest Louis of Hesse.

—THE LOST JAPANESE VESSELS.—The *Yushino* was a vessel of 4180 tons displacement, built at Elswick, in 1892. Her speed was 23 knots, and she carried 300 men and four 6-inch eight 4.7-inch and twenty-three 3 pounder guns.—The *Hatake* was built at Elswick, in 1899 and was of 15,000 tons displacement. Her speed was 18 knots, and she carried 741 men. She had four 12-inch, fourteen 6 inch quick fire, twenty 12 pounder, eight 3 pounder, four 2 1/2 pounder guns and five torpedo tubes.

—SIR E. MONSON.—Sir Edmund Monson will retire from the diplomatic service towards the end of the year, thus vacating the Embassy in Paris. Sir Frank Lascelles, at present in Berlin, is likely to succeed him. We suppose Sir Edmund—who married an English lady born in Montevideo—will now be made a peer.

—HOME POLITICS.—A London telegram has appeared stating as follows:—«The House of Commons has thrown out by 308 votes to 251 a motion made by Mr. Black, approving the anti-protectionist utterances of the Government. The Government opposed the resolution.» (This is obviously one of the frequent bangles of the telegrams when dealing with English political matters. It is not usual for the Government to oppose motions approving its declarations.)

ETIQUETTE—ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO.

Looking over some old books to-day, I came across one entitled «A System of Etiquette», by the Rev. Dr. John Trusler (author of «The Principles of Politeness», «Honours of the Table», &c.), printed at Bath, 1804. It is interesting to note some of the social customs among our forbears of just one hundred years ago, and the oldest of the King's subjects now living may, very likely, be able to remember some of the observances set out by Dr. Trusler—our social mentor of the year 1804.

Referring to a dinner party, Dr. Trusler informs a young gentleman:—«On your entering the room where the company is, address yourself first to the lady of the house, &c., &c. No saluting of ladies, now, by kissing them, as was the custom some years back». And, as regards going to the dining-room:—«It is necessary, prior to dinner, to look round and consider the several degrees of rank of the company present, that there may be no confusion in walking into the room where the table is served.... The ladies, of course, will go first; and without the trouble of marshalling them, every woman of fashion knows her own rank, and will walk out first, second, or third, according to that rank.... G-nlemen proceed (to the dining-room) in the same manner.

This separation of the sexes seems to have been preserved at the dinner table also, for Dr. Trusler goes on:—«Seats at table are taken generally in the like manner, the ladies at the upper end of the table, the gentlemen at the lower; but the master or mistress of the house will sometimes direct it otherwise, and seat the ladies and gentlemen alternately, that is, one gentleman and one lady, and so on, for convenience. When the men and women are mixed, it is a mark of good manners to carve and help the ladies to any dish that may be near you.»

According to this authority, the modern usage of alternating the sexes at dinner began about one hundred years ago—although the separation plan was then more frequently observed. Was this separation of men and women at the dinner table a precaution due to the fact that men drank too much wine before, as well as after the ladies had retired?

I was talking lately to an old lady of good social position whose father was wealthy, and she told me that as a young woman (say in the reign of William IV.) she well remembers that it was a common thing for gentlemen after dinner to be quite unable to go into the drawing-room.

Dr. Trusler warns his young gentleman:—«Wiping a plate with your napkin is rude, the whole service of the table among the opulent is naturally clean; if a plate accidentally be otherwise, call a servant for another.»

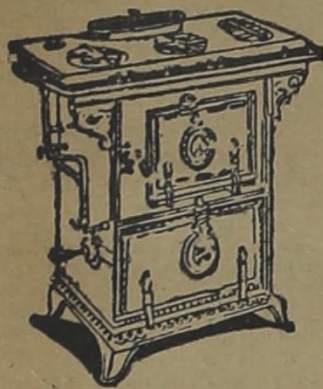
Again:—«Drinking of healths during dinner or supper among the first class of people is entirely exploded; but if the master of the house sets the example, you may follow it.»

By the way, the dinner hour in 1804 seems to have been five o'clock, if one may judge from the specimen invitation forms given in this little book.

Referring to dress, &c., our author writes:—"We should in general be so clean as to have no offensive smell about us, not only in our person, but in our clothes. . . . It is much better to be extremely cleanly in your person and dress. . . . For perfumes are too often used to cover natural disagreeable odours."

Here is a bit of good advice which applies to 1904 as well as to 1804:—"When once dressed, think no more of it; shew no fear of discomposing your dress, but let all your motions be as easy and unembarrassed as if you was at home in your deshabille. In this connection I remember reading somewhere—I forget where—a similar hint more forcibly put. It was to the effect that one should dress with much care, neatness, and good taste, and—once dressed—move and act as if naked."

There is a good deal said about duelling and about acts that are or are not cowardly. For instance: "Let no man suppose that not resisting a robber on the highway is a mark of cowardice; what man in his senses would stand a pistol shot for a few guineas, or risk his life in a cause where his honor is not at stake?" These words remind us that in the year 1804 highway robbery was an everyday affair that had to be taken as one of the ordinary risks of any journey.

Dr. Trusler gives some sensible advice to the young gentlemen he addresses. Speaking about *mauvaise honte*, he writes:—"Every young gentleman, when arrived at manhood, if he is a gentleman by birth, by fortune, by profession, or education, if he has done nothing to degrade himself, is fit company for a prince, and this *mauvaise honte* arises from his not having a consciousness of it. (That is, not having a consciousness of his own fitness.)"

At the end of the books are many maxims, called by Dr. Trusler "Concise Lessons." Among these are the following:—

"Spell your words correctly. Never be in a hurry. Make no use in company feel his inferiority. Offer not another your handkerchief. Avoid all odd tricks and habits. Avoid being thought a punster. Use no hackneyed expressions. Look people in the face when speaking. Few jokes will bear repeating. Suppose not yourself laughed at. Be not witty at another's expense. Never see an affront if you can help it. Modulate your voice, and acquire a good utterance. Attend to the women. Promise cautiously, and keep your word invariably. . . . But," says our worthy mentor, "let me refer you to a tract of mine, called 'The Way to be Rich and Respectable,' a book which, from its great utility, has gone through six editions. It will afford many useful hints—price 4s."

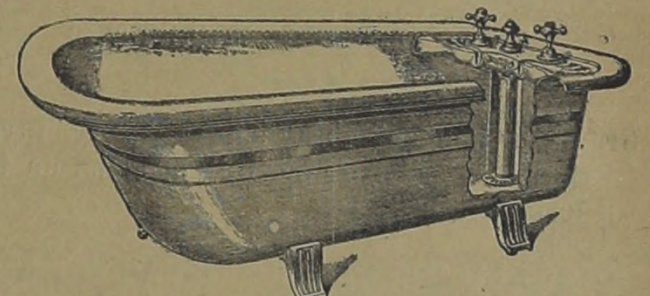

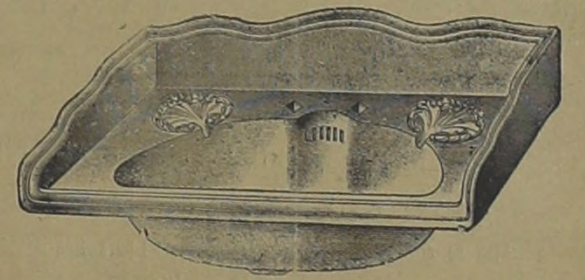

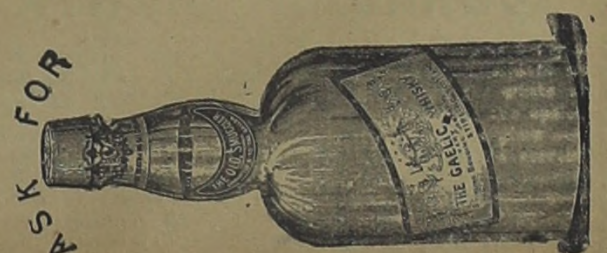
