THE POLITICAL TROUBLES.

Attention continues fixed in the direction of Salto. No news of the expected encounter has yet transpired, but both in official and non-official circles it is believed that a battle is imminent which may prove the most important yet fought. The *Diez* announces the arrival at the Midland station, at Salto, of the convoys carrying the troops of Col. Galarza's southern army, which passed by Montevideo at the beginning of the week. They are said to have had an enthusiastic reception from the residents. It is understood that Col. Galarza is now in a position to cut off any attempt of the rebel army to move southwards.

With regard to the attempt on the President, Trápani has made some further revelations as to his previous life, but it cannot be said that they throw much light on the matter, even supposing them to be reliable. He now pretends that he had yet another plan for shooting the President by a noiseless gun with compressed gas on the principle of a gas motor! This, like some of his other revelations, can hardly be taken seriously. Trápani, Roggia, Calderone and Cervetti are now all lodged in the Correctional Prison. As we understand, the work of the investigating authorities is now almost concluded. Unless something important has been reserved from public knowledge, it cannot be said that it has produced any very startling results, and the most satisfactory part of it is that it has shown the attempt to be the work of three or four crazy or benighted individuals, and to have no political relation whatever, and least of all with the nationalist party. The unjust attempt to throw the odium on the nationalists cannot be sustained for a moment.

The anniversary of National Independence on Thursday passed off practically without official notice—which was best under the circumstances. A few made an attempt to present their respects to the President, but he refused to receive any visitors. Both the *Siglo* and the *Tiempo* devoted articles to comments on the melancholy and disastrous situation under which the anniversary occurred. The former concludes its article as follows:—

"Will the moment arrive when, convinced of the mutual faults that have dragged us into war, we will terminate the struggle by an embrace of reconciliation, and confide for the realization of our ideals to time, to patient effort and to the progressive development of culture? We do not think it impossible. All the partisan grievances, and even all the rights of legality signify nothing, when the future and the very life of the nation are at stake. Two brothers cannot continue crossing their blades when their own mother is the first victim to be immolated by their duel.... The indefinite prolon-

gation of the civil war means the total annihilation of the nation. In these hours of supreme anguish, in which its destinies are at stake, the country claims from the patriotism of all its sons the initiation of a conciliatory policy, which, inspired in the democratic spirit of our institutions, will implant peace and establish the regular coparticipation of the parties. If love for the country does not at last prevail over passion, then there will have sounded the death-knell for the land of the Uruguayans, endowed with all the gifts of Heaven for happiness, and annihilated by the arms of its own sons!"

The *Triunfo* had a very well conceived cartoon. The figure of the Republic, dressed in funeral garments, and holding the national flag swathed with hands of crape, is seen weeping over a scene of desolation closely strewn with crosses that betoken graves.

VICTORIA HALL.

FIREFLY CLUB SUBSCRIPTION CINDERELLA.

The peculiar organising talent and energy of the Fireflies was once more manifested by the excellent and very successful arrangements for the Subscription Cinderella they gave in the Victoria Hall on Wednesday evening. Special praise must, in the first place, be awarded to the decorations, which were both effective and original, provoking general admiration. On the floor the club colors of green red were skillfully carried out by cunning arrangements of plants and leafy combinations touched up with crimson knots and ribands, while festooned flags and more plants and garlands made bright the balcony, staircase and vestibule, the whole effect being remarkably pretty. This, we understand, was the work of the Misses Robinson, Brooks, Drever, Morton and Calcraft. Another good point was the excellent orchestra of Sr. Infanzos, than which none better could be desired for dancing purposes. 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Telegraphy.

Wireless and by Cable.

Presiding at a meeting of the Eastern Telegraph Company, held at River Plate House, Sir J. Wolfe Barry said that the directors intended to make use of wireless telegraphy. The shareholders would no doubt have seen that the De Forest system of wireless telegraphy had been successful in carrying war correspondents' messages from ship to shore during the present Russo Japanese war.

While holding the view that wireless telegraphy would not compete with long-distance submarine telegraphy, the directors were of opinion that there were places where wireless telegraphy could be usefully employed.

A case in point was the Azores, where the cables of some of the associated companies touched. It was desired by Portugal that some of the outlying islands should be placed in telegraphic communication. Owing to the nature of the bottom and the landing place of these islands it was not considered a suitable place to make the connection by cable, neither would the traffic warrant an expenditure on this account. They therefore intended to connect the points by a system of wireless telegraphy.

The War in the Far East.

We quote the following telegrams from our Buenos Aires contemporaries:—

London, Aug. 23.—Telegrams from Tokio announce an important change in the military operations in the vicinity of Liao-Yang. General Kuroki's army has advanced in such a manner that General Kuroki must either retreat on Mukden or have his line of communications with Russia completely cut off. On recognizing this General Kuroki at once gave the order for all the Russian forces, which are occupying positions to the south of Liao-Yang, to abandon their positions and march to Mukden. The retreat will be extremely difficult and dangerous, as the Japanese have

been closing round during the last few days with the intention of cutting off the retreat on Mukden.

Several Japanese columns are attacking the right and left flanks of General Kuroki's army, whose main force is marching by the side of the railway track which leads from Liao-Yang to Mukden. The artillery and munitions have already been withdrawn from the town and only a small detachment of soldiers is left there. The retreat has caused a demoralising effect amongst the Russian troops, whilst the officers and commanders do not hide their pessimistic feelings. There have been several fights between the Japanese advance guard and the Russian rearward but of slight importance, since the Russians, on being attacked, at once abandoned their positions, fighting as they retreated. In European military circles it is generally believed that General Kuroki will not be able to face the 250,000 Japanese who are closing in on him, and further, that the retreat will have to extend to Kurlin, as it is not believed possible for the Russians to hold Mukden.

St. Petersburg, 23rd.—The government has issued a decree naming 2039 cadets of the military schools officers of the army.

Tokio, Aug. 24.—An official announcement has been made that yesterday the Russian ironclad *Sebastopol* left the inner harbour of Port Arthur and took up a position outside from which it began to bombard the Japanese positions nearest to the coast, but in making a manoeuvre the ship struck against a floating mine, which exploded and caused serious injury to the *Sebastopol*; the ship heeled over to starboard and her fore part was submerged. Several vessels went out immediately to her assistance and succeeded with much difficulty in towing her into port. The *Sebastopol* is a ship of 10,960 tons displacement. She was launched in 1899 and cost more than £1,000,000.

London, Aug. 24.—A telegram from Tokio communicates that the army under Marshal Oyama which is besieging Port Arthur has received a reinforcement of 20,000 men, detached from General Oku's force. A telegram from Chifu to the *Daily Telegraph* states that the bombardment continued all day yesterday, that 800 shells are thrown into the fortress every 24 hours, and that the Japanese have captured some more important positions. The Russian ships reply to the fire of the besiegers.

Chifu, Aug. 24.—Some Chinese who have just arrived from Port Arthur say that four large Russian warships there are "hors de combat," and that the Japanese have destroyed two forts at Chiao-Chau and have captured Ichuan and a fort in the Southwest.

Golf.

Thursday was a busy day on the links at Punta Carretas.

The final match for the President's Cup was played off between Messrs. Duncan Scott and R. L. Routh. It was expected that there would be a hard fight between them, and such was the case, as at the end of the second round Routh was leading by three holes, but in the third or final round Scott took the first three holes in succession and finally won by 2 up and 1 to play.

—WEATHER.—After some rain on Wednesday night, the wind suddenly shifted, to the south, bringing fine, cold, dry and bracing weather, though not entirely settled.

—METHODIST CHURCH.—The Rev. Dr. Drees, who for the five years has been Superintendent of the Methodist Mission in Puerto Rico, is expected, with Mrs. Drees, by the P. S. N. Co's "Orissa" (due this evening) and should preach at 11 a. m. tomorrow (Sunday) at the Methodist Church in this city. They are returning to take up work again in the Argentine Republic, much to the satisfaction of this numerous friends on both sides of the River Plate.

—FOOTBALL.—The following was the result of the two Cusener matches played at Paso Molino on Thursday:—Cambridge F. C. beat Albion 3rd XI by 4—1; Albion 2nd XI drew with M. V. A. C. for 1—1. Tomorrow the important final of last year's League Competition will be played off on the Albion ground at Paso Molino, between the Club Nacional and C. U. R. C. C., to commence at 3 p. m. A large attendance is expected.

—THEATRES.—The Grand Opera season at the Solis is over, and Novelli has finished his very successful visit at the Politeama, though he may return before going back to Europe. For the moment, then, there is nothing more interesting than the scratch Zarzuela Company at the Sao Felipe, nor is anything fresh immediately announced.

—ENGLISH CLUB.—The annual auction of illustrated papers, magazines, etc., will be held in the Club rooms on Saturday evening next, September 3.

—FIREFLY CLUB.—We learn that this pushing and versatile institution has added to its attractions by having secured the lease of some admirable golf links, close to the Club grounds at Maroñas.

—WRACK.—The "Serapis," which arrived from the West Coast on Thursday evening, brought the first news of the loss of the British steamer "Tymeric," in the Straits of Magellan, having gone on the rocks of Carlos III Island, about 100 miles from Sandy Point, in a dense fog. The "Tymeric" was coming from the West Coast with a valuable cargo, mostly minerals. It is expected that this will be mostly salvaged, but the vessel herself will probably be a total loss. Salvage assistance was promptly sent from Sandy Point. There were no personal casualties.

—CASINO.—The debut will take place this evening of Martens, sharp-shooter and Sidi, strong man. Views of Mr. Loubet's visit to England are being shown on the Biograph.

—BODIES FOUND.—On Thursday, in the outer roads, two bodies were found which have been identified as being those of two of the eleven fishermen who were wrecked in the fishing smack No. 1089 in the storm of the 10th instant. Both bodies were in good preservation, and it is believed that they had only just come to the surface. After having been identified by their families, they were given decent burial. A subscription has been opened under the auspices of the "Union Industrial Uruguayana" to succor the widows and orphans left in distress by this sad catastrophe.

—CRIME.—On Thursday evening, in the Legrad saladero at the Cerro, a shooting affray occurred in which four of the workmen took part, two of them, named Negron and Denhalde, receiving serious injuries, and a third named Barrios being wounded in the hand. Accounts are very conflicting as to how the affray began, but it would seem that jealousy over the wife of one of them was at the bottom of it. Later on there was a stabbing affair in the same neighbourhood, resulting in a man named Santiago Tec being seriously wounded.

—SUICIDE.—Yesterday morning a man named Juan Casteros, living at Piedad 77, attempted suicide by stabbing himself in the region of the heart—a mode that has quite gone out of fashion. He was taken to the Hospital in a dangerous condition.

—WEDDING.—From the B. A. Standard.—San Nicolás Church was the scene of a very pretty wedding last evening when Mr. Richard Eastman and Miss Leonor MacLean, daughter of Mr. Alexander MacLean, were married. The church, of which

the principal altar was brilliantly illuminated, was filled by a large number of relatives and friends. At ten minutes after nine the bride entered, escorted by the father, and looked most charming attired in a beautiful dress of white broadcloth silk, trimmed with fine lace. She wore a long veil of delicate white texture, which was gracefully gathered into a crown of orange blossoms, and carried a large bouquet of mixed flowers. Mrs. Eastman, mother of the bridegroom, and Mr. Hector MacLean, brother of the bride, acted as sponsors. Bishop Terrero performed the marriage ceremony, which was most impressive. After the newly-married couple had received the congratulations of their numerous relations, they adjourned to the residence of Mr. Alexander MacLean where a reception took place. Among the numerous presents figured many of much value and of great artistic taste.

—MARTIME DISASTER.—Telegrams from St. John's, Newfoundland, say that the British gunboat *Columbine* has gone ashore on the rocks near that port. Her situation is extremely dangerous and the vessel is locked upon as a total loss. The *Columbine* was a gunboat of 270 tons, and 200 horsepower, tender to the *Adriadne*, flagship of the North American and West Indies squadron. She was formerly named *Hiarta*. Her commander was Lieutenant Commander Arthur G. K. Hill.

LONDON NOTES

WEDNESDAY, JULY 27.

In the House of Commons Mr. Lyttelton said it would not be possible for him to give details of the constitution of the Transvaal Legislative Council before the end of the present Session, nor could he undertake to delay action on the matter until Parliament had had an opportunity of discussing the proposals. The report stage of the Licensing Bill was taken.

Mr. Chamberlain, at Rochester yesterday, spoke of himself as a commercial traveller in the technical sense. Commercial union of the Empire was the first step towards political union and organization for common defence. The opportunity lost now would never recur.

An attempt was made by Mr. Wyndham at yesterday's sitting of the House of Commons Committee on Trade to save the Labourers (Ireland) Bill. He expressed his willingness to withdraw Clause 13, and to make several other concessions. Mr. John Redmond refused, however, to accept a compromise.

A Belfast Correspondent states that Mr. Arnold-Forster, on account of ill-health, will resign at the next General Election, and will seek a period of absolute repose.

Lord Welby announced at yesterday's meeting of the London County Council that as far as the Finance Committee could judge it would not be necessary to recommend any alteration in the amount of rate for the second six months of the current financial year. In the rate 81/8d. would be included in respect to education.

Anthrax, set up by the inhalation of wool dust, was the cause of a death inquired into by the Liverpool Coroner yesterday.

Yesterday the Pastoral Session of the Wesleyan Conference was commenced at Sheffield. The Rev. C. H. Kelly was elected President for next year.

Some striking speeches were made yesterday at Glasgow at the Congress of the Sanitary Institute. Consumption, smallpox, plumbism, the smoke nuisance, and the mentally and physically unfit were among the subjects discussed.

From the annual report of the Metropolitan Asylums Board, issued yesterday, it appears that 21,123,130 was last year expended upon the treatment of imbeciles, the infectious sick, and the incidental establishment charges.

Judgment was given in the King's Bench Division yesterday in the case in which a large number of colliery owners in South Wales claimed damages from the South Wales Miners' Federation for stopping the collieries on certain days. The damages against the Federation were assessed at £57,562. A stay of execution was granted pending an appeal to the House of Lords.

Amusing evidence as to the mental status of a litigant was given in the King's Bench Division yesterday. The plaintiff in the case, Mr. C. Samuels, a money-lender, recovered £1,000 from the defendant, the balance of a promissory note for £1,200. The defence was that the bargain was harsh and unconscionable.

Two of the Nelson relics stolen from Greenwich Museum have been

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recovered. A man named Carter, who is charged with receiving the other articles, was put back at the Central Criminal Court yesterday in the hope that he would give information to the police as to their whereabouts. He declared positively that they were not at Melbourne.

The second day's play in the National Chess Tournament in London yesterday was remarkable for the fact that the Teichman and Gauseberg resigned to amateur players.

Better progress was made with the five first-class cricket matches yesterday than on the opening day. At the Oval the conditions were wholly in favour of Somerset, and Surrey, after following on, left off in a hopeless position. Gloucestershire, too, followed on to Lancashire, at Liverpool; but at Derby, Sussex ran up a big score. A fairly even finish is in prospect between Essex and Warwickshire, at Leyton, the visitors holding a slight advantage. Notes fell short of Yorkshire's total on the first innings.

THURSDAY, JULY 28.

At Oswestry, Mr. A. H. Bright, the Liberal candidate, has been returned by a majority of 385, and another striking result has been added to the long list of Liberal victories at the poll. The result is the more remarkable as the constituency is on the fringe of the Birmingham zone.

The Princess of Wales left Marlborough House yesterday for the Continent.

Questions relating to the seizure of British steamers in the Red Sea and the progress of the Tibet Mission were discussed in the House of Commons yesterday. The report stage of the Licensing Bill was concluded.

Presiding over the half yearly meeting of the London, Brighton, and South Coast Railway, yesterday, Lord Cottesloe said the work of the widening of the line at Victoria, including the new bridge over the Thames, was proceeding satisfactorily and would be pushed forward as rapidly as possible. A meeting of the Great Eastern Railway was also held yesterday.

About 1,200 Liberals, including many ladies, attended a reception given last night by Earl and Countess Carrington at the National Liberal Club. Sir H. Campbell-Bannerman and Sir William Harcourt were present, and congratulated the Liberal Party on the accumulating victories at the by-elections.

Considerable damage was caused by a spout which was experienced near Danfries yesterday. A water-spout was also observed at Brightlinges, and a cloudburst occurred at Broadstairs. There was thunder in various parts of the country.

In connection with the Conference of the British Medical Association yesterday, at Oxford, an address was given in the Sheldonian Theatre by Sir W. Church. Referring to the question of national degeneration, he said there existed no standards by which the present physical condition of the people could be compared with their condition in the past.

At the annual Conference of Bible Christians, which commenced yesterday at St. Austell, the Rev. W. R. Baulkwill was elected President.

Infant mortality occupied an important place in the discussions of the delegates at the Sanitary Congress at Glasgow yesterday. Deliberate neglect of children, and social conditions as they affect physique were also subjects considered.

After a consultation between counsel and judge, the action brought by Mr. Joshua Jones against several London solicitors for slander of title was yesterday settled by agreement on terms which were not stated in Court.

Rain prevented any play in the cricket matches Derbyshire v. Sussex and Yorkshire v. Nottingham yesterday, and both were left drawn; but Somersetshire and Lancashire gained victories, each with an innings to spare, over Surrey and Gloucestershire respectively. Essex were easily defeated by Warwickshire. The annual game between Rugby and Marlborough schools was commenced at Lord's.
