THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

Disarmament proceeds steadily, but without any definite news as to when it will terminate, the point which seems to be awaited by the Government to declare a normal situation restored. The *Dia* reports the delivery to Col. Galarza of the rebel's artillery, consisting of three field guns and three repeating guns, but beyond this there seems to be no report from Galarza. The disarmament is also proceeding of the body of rebels arrived at Nico Perez. It would seem that their appearance there caused some alarm until it was explained that they had merely come to be disarmed, finding it impossible to go north on account of the swollen rivers. Various rebel officers have also arrived at Nico Perez, intending to follow on to Montevideo.

It is officially announced that the Message referring to the amnesty and the derogation of the interdictions is ready, and will be presented to the Chambers as soon as the disarmament is concluded.

The national delegates to form part of the mixed committee for the distribution of funds has arrived at Nico Perez, and consists of Sres. Cabrera, Zepita, Juan J. Muñoz and F. Sosa (the last-named treasurer of the rebel army). They there await the arrival of the Government delegates but, according to yesterday's *Dia* these are not yet definitely chosen and will not start until to-day. The delay of the Government in carrying on this clause of the peace compact has caused much comment. Meanwhile, as we have already stated, many of the nationalists are disbanding without waiting for the Government decree, not a few of them already finding employment in the sheep-shearing which has now begun.

Preparations continue apace for the official peace festivities of tomorrow evening and Sunday. A most pompous programme has been published of the fireworks to be exhibited on the second day. Of private initiative we do not hear much; the first enthusiasm has greatly evaporated, and it is probable that the large majority of the conservative, moderate, commercial and industrial classes, that is to say the «popular» as distinguished from the «political» elements, will be spectators rather than participants in the celebrations. The peace, though received with satisfaction, unmistakably lacks the popularity of that of 1897, when there was reconciliation and fraternity as well as peace. There was some talk of the Chambers declaring public holidays to day and tomorrow, but it has met with general disapproval, and is not likely to be carried out. Yesterday's *Tempero* makes note of the coldness with which the final act of pacification has been received. The fact is that there is weariness; the pacification has been discounted, and people are preoccupied with pressing matters which engage all their attention; they desire to be quit as soon as possible of this precarious situation and to be able to attend peace more to their own affairs. The best festival would be to dismount the machinery of war which still presses heavily on the shoulders of the country. Everything urges this, time lost has to be recovered, and working days must not be wasted.

It is stated, though not yet authoritatively, that the National Guard will be declared dissolved at the end of the current month, excepting four or five Battalions which will be retained for guard duty on public buildings until the end of the year. The exception is a large one—nearly half.

Neither of the Chambers sat on Wednesday.

In the last few days there has been freely circulated some cowardly and anonymous pasquins or lampoons, one in the form of a funeral card and the other imitating the advertisement of a sale by auction (possibly also others which we have not seen) conceived in a tone of brutal insult to the nationalist party, and also to foreign residents, to the Argentines and their press, and in short to everyone who does not worship at the «colorado» altar. Anything in worse taste or more likely to create and perpetuate ill feeling could not be imagined, and they show that, although nominal peace may have been attained, in certain quarters there is a very little idea of conciliation. We have heard it said, but cannot state it as a fact, that these anonymous pasquins issue from the printing office of a certain unpopular paper which has distinguished itself by its blood-thirsty and intolerant tone. Be that as it may, it seems to us that the police, who have committed such indefensible abuses in the persecution of persons engaged in the perfectly legitimate act of circulating or selling Buenos Aires papers, might much better occupy themselves with looking after the authors of these pasquins, the mischievous object of which is only too apparent. While such miserable exhibitions of partisan hatred find currency, the outlook for the future is the reverse of hopeful, and «peace» little more than a hollow mockery.

A sinister rumor is afloat that one of the first acts of the Government will be to ask the Chambers to sanction the creation of two new cavalry regiments! We prefer to believe that it is untrue, for such an act would signify that peace is to be on the precarious and disastrous basis of military strength, rather than on the stable and fertile base of the Constitution and of republican government.

Though the war is supposed to be over, more «peace materials» arrived on Tuesday, the «*Sevilla*» bringing 260 boxes of cartridges from Hamburg. This flow of «peace material» has now lasted for some sixteen or eighteen months, but it has been remarkably inefficient either to preserve or restore peace. As we said on a previous occasion, probably the material is of the wrong description. Peace is not to be found in boxes of cartridges.

FUTURE OF IRELAND.

CAPT. SHAWE-TAYLOR ON THE LANDLORDS' POSITION.
London, Sept. 13.

In Ireland the old order is changing, giving place to new. The reports lately published as to the formation of an «Irish Reform Association» show that the passing of the Land Act is beginning to have its effect, and that Irishmen who in the past have held strongly to Unionism are joining in a demand for some form of Home Rule under the name of self-government. Almost every day, indeed, brings fresh evidence of the growing tendency towards change. Already some Unionists on this side profess alarm. Is a new wedge to be driven into Unionism causing a split as distinct as that which has followed the cry for Protection? Readers would do well to keep their eyes on this new Irish movement. It may, on almost any day, assume a portentous aspect, since it is inconceivable that the Government can remain silent regarding it. As throwing a side-light upon the whole problem, we give to-day a report of an interview with Captain Shawe-Taylor, who, it will be remembered, did so much towards bringing parties together to secure the passing of the Land Act.

Captain Shawe-Taylor said: «The passing of the Irish Land Act and the prospects of the early establishment of a peasant proprietorship instead of the present dual ownership have effected a revolutionary change in Ireland.

«Irish landowners, already debarred from Parliamentary careers, as well as from the County and Rural Councils, will, when they have parted with their tenants, have still less interest than ever in their country and its concerns. Their homes and domestic life will now be their only sources of interest and occupation.

«Without doubt, progressive, able, and active men will rebel against such social and political ostracism, and in large numbers leave the country.

«To Ireland their loss will, I believe, be incalculable. In addition to their taking with them some £112,000,000 of Irish capital, so sorely needed for the development of Irish resources, they include among their numbers men of education, position, refinement, and ability, and, as such, constitute an important national and financial asset.

«The problem of the Irish landowners' position is one, then, that affects not only their own particular class, but is also bound up inseparably with the commercial, professional, and labour interests of the country.

«The Irish Reform Association» affords an opportunity to such men, and it is from Irish landowners that the Association will probably receive a full measure of support.

«It is possible that in the near future Nationalists may, without sacrifice of principle, allow members of the new Association the opportunity of entering the public life of their country by serving in Parliament, and in the County and Rural Councils.

«Under such circumstances, without doubt, landowners would have the strongest inducements to remain in their own country, while Ireland would, I believe, be an undoubted gainer in prestige, power, and material prosperity.

«Extremists, no doubt, on both sides may view with suspicion such a moderate and progressive association. If the Nationalist extremists demand an Irish Republic with its own separate Army and Navy, independent and freed from England, the Unionist extremists are equally strong in his views that the Irish are incapable of honestly utilising any measure of self-government, that Irish priests and people will leave no stone unturned to exterminate all Protestants, and that it is only out of Ireland that Irishmen can ever hope to attain to success.

«Similarly, while every country in Europe and every State in America is realising more and more the national importance of education and its influence in the uplifting of a country—as witness Japan—Irish extremists hinder educational reform.

«A separate State-aided Roman Catholic University will alone satisfy one party, while the other party, equally extreme, is content that three-fourths of their fellow countrymen should remain without higher educational facilities; declaring that it is impossible for the wit of man to devise any scheme that would not ultimately place the absolute control of such higher education in the hands of the Irish Hierarchy.

«The position of the Irish labourer, too, could be immeasurably improved by the application of common sense, mutual toleration, and united action to this particular problem. The association has therefore a wide field of action, and will also, I believe, be broad enough to include within its organization all Irishmen who desire, by reasonable and legitimate reform, to bring peace, contentment, progress, and prosperity to Ireland and her people.»

Another New Royal Mail Steamer.

Launch of the «*Polaris*».

Messrs. Harland and Wolff, Ltd., of Belfast, launched from their yard on September 10, a handsomely-modelled steel screw steamer, named «*Polaris*», built to the order of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company of London, and as the vessel left the ways, she was gracefully christened by Mrs. Wood, wife of Mr. J. A. Wood, of Sidcup, Kent, the chairman of the River Plate Fresh Meat Company. The vessel is 338 ft. 6 in. in length by 43 ft. beam, with a dead weight capacity of about 6,000 tons, and has been specially designed to meet the requirements of the owners for the River Plate trade. The cargo space has been divided into four spacious holds by steel bulkheads, which extend to the upper deck; two of these holds and three 'tween decks have been insulated, and an efficient system of refrigerating machinery has been fitted for the preservation of perishable goods. Each hold has a large cargo hatch, which is efficiently equipped with the necessary steam winches and derricks for the rapid loading and discharging of cargo. The captain and officers will occupy apartments in a steel deck house at the forward end of the bridge deck, and accommodation for the engineers will be provided in a deck house built round the engine casing. Berths for the crew will be fitted up under the forecastle deck. The vessel will be fitted with a set of triple-expansion engines, which are also being constructed by Messrs. Harland and Wolff, Ltd., of the most improved type, also all the necessary auxiliaries, steam being supplied from three steel cylindrical multi-tubular boilers working under natural draught. She will also be fitted with a complete installation of electric light. The vessel and machinery are being constructed under the special supervision of Lloyd's surveyors, to qualify for the highest class, and to obtain Board of Trade, Suez Canal, French, and Italian certificates. — *S. A. Journal.*

The War in the Far East.

We quote the following telegrams from our Buenos Aires contemporaries:—

London, 11th.—Despatches received via Cebu bring news of the various actions recently fought round Port Arthur. The most important engagements were fought on the 4th, 5th, 6th and 9th inst. The Russian garrison succeeded in successfully repelling all the attacks made by the Japanese, inflicting upon them considerable losses. The traffic in contraband provisions and ammunition continues. Many junks are successfully running the blockade and entering Port Arthur, sailing during the night and hiding by day in the creeks along the coast. General Stoessel is in continuous communication with the consul in Cebu and receives daily information of the progress of the operations in the north. The garrison is aware that General Kropotkin is taking the offensive and this movement is considered as a signal that it will not be long before the siege is raised.

St. Petersburg, 11th.—Very satisfactory news has been received from Port Arthur. The garrison, under the command of General Stoessel, attacked the Japanese positions, and on October 6th, after severe fighting in which all arms took part, the Russians re-occupied the Bay of Takie. On Sunday afternoon they recovered the Iseba hills.

Tokio, 11th.—It is said that the Russian army has crossed the River Hun and is now making a vigorous attack upon the Japanese positions. The fight is now general. It is believed that the Russian advance has been detained. The losses on both sides were considerable, it is said.

St. Petersburg, 11th.—Makden telegrams say that on Sunday there was a fight in which the Russian centre and right were engaged. It was principally an artillery duel. The Japanese were everywhere repulsed and are retreating all along the line.

St. Petersburg, 11th.—Confirmation is given to the report that the Russians have occupied Sahpou. They lost less than a hundred men. The Japanese retired in good order and carried off all their killed and wounded.

Tokio, 11th.—It is announced that in the destruction of the Japanese gunboat *Hei Yen* by a submarine mine at Pigeon Bay, near Port Arthur, over 300 men were lost, that is to say, all on board at the time.

SUNDRIES.

—**WEATHER.**—Yesterday was almost wintry in aspect and temperature, a mild squall blowing, and a rain falling in the afternoon.

—**MAILS.**—The R. M. S. «*Magdalena*» bringing London dates to Sept. 22 or 23, is expected this morning, sailing homeward bound on Sunday the 23rd inst.

—**COMMEMORATIVE STAMPS.**—In celebration of peace, tomorrow and Sunday the Post Office will put in circulation a special commemorative issue of postage stamps of the value of 1, 2 and 5 cents, surcharged «*Paz—1904*». These will only be available for postal purposes on the two days named. As they will rank amongst issues that are now called «*superfluous*» that is to say stamps not issued to fill any genuine postal necessity, they will be disregarded by serious stamp collectors and dealers, and therefore offer no field for speculation.

—**REPRESSING ANGES.**—On Wednesday evening a certain well-dressed but ill-bred young man, said to be of good family, under pretence of celebrating peace, threw a firework bomb or petard at the feet of an elderly lady in the street, causing her no little alarm. Fortunately (we might almost say, for a wonder) there were some police at hand, and the ill-advised youth was marched off to the station, where in spite of progress and protests, he was made to suffer durance vile for twenty-four hours. This action on the part of the police has received general praise, and it is to be hoped that they will follow it up during the approaching celebrations, putting a stop to what is really a serious abuse. These «*thumps*» though small, are really offensive and dangerous and the police would do well

to turn their attention to the shops, where they are exposed for sale.

—**CONCERT.**—The musical event of this evening will be the appearance at the Cible Theatre of the brilliant young Hungarian violinist Herr Fildes. We are unable to give the programme of his concert, as up to the time of writing it had not reached us but it will doubtless be interesting and worthy. Herr Fildes, though a young man, has achieved European fame, and is said to have won if any living superior on his special instrument. The booking for the Concert has already been large.

—**EXAMINING CHAPLAIN.**—From the *River Plate Anglican*:—We have been requested to state officially that the Lord Bishop has appointed the Rev. H. A. Allpass, B.A., his Examining Chaplain. Mr. Allpass is a Graduate of London University and for many years was Headmaster of Monmouth Grammar School, Walthamstow, England. He was Assistant Curate of St. John's in the same place from 1887 to 1894. He came to this Diocese about eighteen months ago as Chaplain of Holy Trinity Church, Montevideo.

—**ALL ENGLISH.**—From the *Westminster Budget*:—There are many to rejoice over the birth of a son to the «*zar*», but no one is more jubilant than the old English nurse of the Czarina, who lives at the Russian Court, and is in her way quite a personage, «*Miss Orbach*». The late Princess Alice of Hesse, before the birth of her first child, wrote to Queen Victoria and begged of her to procure her an English nurse. The Queen sent the homely and respectable Orchardson, who in time became the chosen confidante of Princess Alice, and was always addressed by her as «*Orchie*». The Czarina, in the kindness of her heart, when she married refused to leave her old nurse behind her at Darmstadt, and insisted on her accompanying her to St. Petersburg. English nurses are in great request in all Royal nurseries. The Kaiser's boys have been brought up by English nurses and governesses, and the Kaiser himself and his brother Henry owe their fluency in our language and their love of cold tubbing to their nurse «*Hobbes*», to whom the Emperor and Empress were much attached, and who frequently reminded their sons in after-life how great was their debt of gratitude to her for all the good things she had taught. The Dutch Queen studied under an English governess; so did the King of Spain; whilst the King of Italy's pretty little girls, as also the Czar's quartette of daughters, have English nurses and governesses.

—**BIG HEADS.**—Dr. Hollander, speaking recently at a meeting of the British Phenological Society (incorporated) on the size of the head in relation to cleverness, said the size of the brain was not in itself a measure of intellect; for it it were so certain animals would be more intellectual than men. The human brain differed from the animal brain in the development of the frontal lobes, or the portion of the brain in front of the ears. Taking a plane through the ears, that portion of the brain in front of it would represent the mental faculties, and the portion behind would represent the animal faculties. To judge a man's intellectual power, therefore, one must regard the fore part of the head as compared with the back, to see how much of the brain lay in front of the ears.

—**THE MAGIC KETTLE.**—Among the latest attractions at the Palace Theatre in London, the Magic Kettle is specially worthy of note. It seems ridiculous to assert that ice is hot, but when one is presented with the fact that a kettle boils when placed on a block of ice and that when a lump of ice is thrown into the kettle it boils more furiously than ever, what other conclusion is there to be drawn? The effect of pouring some of the contents of the kettle over grapes is to make them hard and cold as ballstones. The demonstrator pours mercury from a test-tube into a card board box, pours the magic fluid over it, and the cardboard has to be torn from the solid lump of mercury. The demonstrator then drives a nail into a block of wood, using the block of mercury as a hammer. The demonstrator challenges anyone to prove that chemicals of any kind are used in the performance. (We quote the above from a London paper. The explanation is that the substance in the kettle is air liquefied by Prof. Dewar's process.)

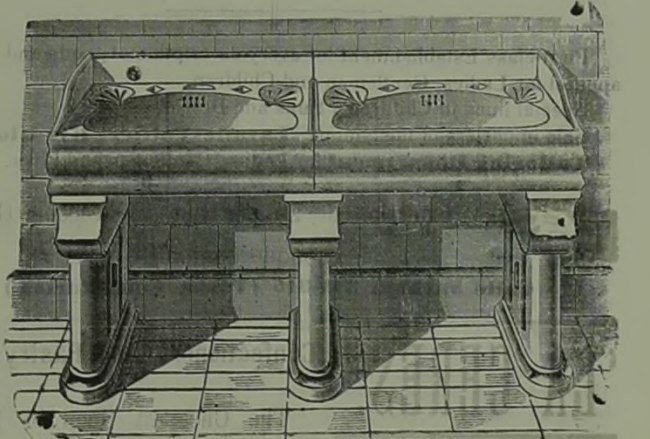
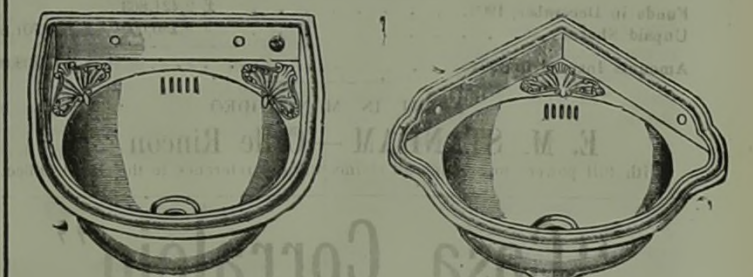
