NEWS OF THE DAY.

MONTEVIDEO.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Senators sat on Monday. Sanction was completed, without amendment or discussion, of the License Tax (*Patentes de Giro*) for the capital for 1904-5. Dr. Costa's Bill establishing a national competition for writing the History of the Defence of Montevideo was then brought forward. Sr. Moratorio said that, the civil war having terminated, the Bill had no useful object and merely tended to keep alive passions and hatreds all desired to see extinguished. Moreover, the public Treasury was not in a position to meet the useless expenditure of this description, and the Chamber had more important matters to discuss. He therefore proposed its indefinite postponement. After a brief debate, it was decided that discussion of the Bill should be deferred until the next ordinary session. On the motion of Sr. Lenzi, summary discussion was given to the Bill approving the Sanitary Convention between Argentina, Brazil, Uruguay and Paraguay (abolition of quarantine, etc.) This was fully approved, and now passes to the other Chamber. The Senate then adjourned.

The Senators deserve a word of applause for having practically shelved Dr. Costa's Bill—for we doubt if it will be heard of again. The measure was as absurd as at was objectionable, and mischievous in object, and nothing could have been less justifiable than the application of public money to such a purpose. The lower Chamber did itself no credit by having approved the Bill, but the Senators have treated it properly in declining even to discuss it.

Discussion continues of the Redistribution (or Maldistribution) Bill. Yesterday's *Siglo* publishes a second article from Dr. Martin C. Martin, in which he employs incontrovertible figures which prove that, while under the present arrangement, the minority can count on a representation of one-third in the lower Chamber, under the new arrangement its representation would be reduced to one-fourth, or 19 seats, to 58 out of 75. The lack of just proportion could not be more obvious, and reduces to bare-faced hypocrisy the pretence that the Bill is based on principles of justice and equity. As a matter of fact, the Bill does just the reverse of what it is pretended to do, and instead of remedying an evil only makes it worse. — The *Dia* continues its defence of the Bill without being able to say anything to remove the powerful arguments against it. Incidentally it reveals that, when peace was under negotiation, Sr. Batlle refused to make any promise not to meddle with the present distribution, reserving his liberty and that of the Chambers on the point. It is now seen that he is employing that liberty to promote a measure expressly framed to injure the nationalist and to give his own faction an entirely unjust parliamentary predominance. This is not the way to make peace, or to establish "equilibrium," but it is a very certain way indeed to breed justified political discontent and sow the seeds of future revolutions.

Despite the appellation of "mis-croscopic entities" daily levelled at them by the *Dia*, the dissident "colorados" continue to show great activity, especially for electoral purposes. Dr. Carlos Lenzi has withdrawn from the Committee, on the grounds that it did not fulfil his expectations, but on the other hand Gen. M. Tajes has written denying rumors that he was about to resign. The organ of the faction is announced to appear very shortly. Dr. J. B. Scharifoff acting as editor.

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Montevideo Telephone Company.

The directors, in their report for the year ended July 31 last, state that the accounts show a net profit for that period of £13,527, after providing for all working expenses in Montevideo and London. To this amount should be added the sum of £1,783 brought forward from last year, leaving an available balance of £15,310. After putting aside £2,000 to a reserve for renewal of plant and transferring the sum of £5,000 to reserve fund, the directors recommend payment of the full dividend at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum upon the preference share capital and of a dividend at the rate of 3 per cent. per annum upon the ordinary share capital, leaving a balance of £1,805 to be carried forward. During the recent civil war telephonic communication in the provincial districts of Uruguay was much interrupted. The number of subscribers and the revenue therefrom in Montevideo continued to improve.

Novel Inventions.

The patent section of the *Scientific American* for September 17 contains descriptions of some remarkable inventions, of which we can only say we wonder why nobody has thought of them before. From Illinois comes a patent trousers creaser. In the innocence of our hearts we had hitherto supposed that the darling wish of the dandy was to get the creases out of those articles of attire. A pair of rollers are mounted on a pair of handles, which are then hinged in the form of a pair of tongs. With the aid of a gas jet the rollers are heated, and the crease is produced by passing the garment between the rollers. But the most interesting fact about the creaser is that the garment need not be detached from the person — you may take it standing. A very simple rheostat has been devised for the purpose of varying at will the intensity of the light of the incandescent lamp. The instrument is rather too technical to be described here, but the idea should be capable of development. It would certainly be a great advance if our light, which at present is either "on" or "out," could be regulated with precision. For the horse in slippery weather we see an ice-creaser, studded with spikes and adapted to fit a shoe of any size. As our streets could not be torn up much more than they are, this device might find a place in the Metropolitan, and the inventor would richly deserve the name of the "bus-horse's friend." To the bicyclist in difficulties the use of a wrench that can be readily adjusted will save much exasperation. The worm which operates on the rack to move the movable jaw is cut away on one side to clear the rack. The jaw is then adjusted to where it is wanted, and the worm is brought back into engagement with the rack, thus tightening the hold. Like the worm of the proverb, this worm will turn, but only when pressed by a spring. A new gun-sight is arranged so that the "chuntsman" can aim at two feet ahead of flying mallard or four feet ahead of a teal. A bath-tub for invalids has a water-tight door at one end through which the patient may be passed, and we are sure some nurses will bless the advent of this invention. For the Chicago policeman we have a mace and revolver in one. The revolver cylinder is inconspicuous, so that the rowdy will not know till after the event which part of the machine is used for his benefit.

"Bradshaw's Guide."

After to-morrow (says a recent London paper) the wits of the world will be the poorer by an old friend who was always at their hands ready to be the butt of a joke or a jest. But the general public will be better off, though some few will lose the honour of a hard-earned reputation for unusual cleverness.

"Bradshaw," the famous Railway Guide, is to be reformed by the addition of a Key which is to render the maze as simple as a.b.c. The notion of "Bradshaw" being simple to understand is so novel that it is expected that there will be a wild rush for the book to-morrow. The booksellers have already bought up the whole of the first edition.

It is tolerably safe to say that not one person in a thousand could find his way about in "Bradshaw." So voluminous had it become, that to a stranger its language might as well have been that of the ancient Punic choruses. Yet it is clear as day in midsummer to those who understood its plan. The hundred pages which are to be added will let in the light for thousands to whom the guide has hitherto been only a puzzle or a source of anger.

"Bradshaw" has grown with the railways. That is why it became as complicated as are their tracks upon a map. When it was established there were only seven railway companies, and so few were the trains and simple the system that the guard sat on the roof of the first carriage, whence he gave instructions to the driver, and the Royal Mail guard sat on the roof at the rear watching the box containing the letters. There are 160 companies now. The first "Bradshaw" was contained in 30 pages, and in a cloth binding weighed under two ounces. The new "Bradshaw" weighs nearly two pounds. The growth in the number of trains has been in even greater proportion.

The founder of this famous Guide was George Bradshaw, a Quaker, who was born at Windsor Bridge, near Salford, in 1801. He became an engraver, and was engaged as a cartographer. In 1825, when the first railway train ran, he was making maps of the canal systems of Lancashire and Yorkshire. Whether he or John Gadsby, a Manchester printer, was the first to conceive the need of a public railway time table is a matter of dispute. But, at any rate, Bradshaw got his out just a few weeks

ahead of Gadsby, in October, 1839, just 65 years ago. The first issue consisted of two separate tables; one for the North, Manchester and Liverpool, and the other for the South, London, and Birmingham. Previously the time tables were on powder medals, which travellers carried in their waistcoat pockets. Only two copies each of the original edition are known to be in existence, one pair in the Bodleian Library, the other pair in possession of the firm at Manchester. It was in 1841, the year when the "Continental Guide" was started, that the name "Guide" was adopted. The tables in those days contained many quaintly worded admonitions and explanations. For instance, "Babies in arms" in order to ride free had to be "suable to walk." One was also told that "A passenger may claim the seat corresponding to the number of his ticket, and when not numbered he may take any seat not previously occupied." In the latter case it is deliciously vague whether it is the ticket, the seat, or the passenger that is not numbered. Travellers were implored "not to lean upon the door," and assured that "no railway servant is allowed to take gratuities." The fare from London to Birmingham was 32s., but if six rode together they could claim a reduction of 2s. each. "Gentlemen who rode in their own carriages were charged 2nd class fares." "Glass coaches" could also be obtained as a luxury; they were carriages with windows!

Lord Rosebery once said, "I do not know a greater happiness when you are coupled up in London by business without any hope of extricating yourself than to take up 'Bradshaw' and make imaginary journeys." With the new Guide his lordship will find that this interesting pastime has been deprived of its difficulties. There are special section maps which form a.b.c. guides in themselves, and in the added pages tables of routes, with fares, distances, time occupied by journey, and the quickest trains are given.

The Dangers of Fungi.

That leading authority on fungi, Mr. G. Massee, has an interesting paper on the subject in *Knowledge*. He tells us that the dangers attendant on eating fungi have been much exaggerated. The percentage of edible fungi, compared with the whole number, excluding the microscopic forms, is much greater than in the flowering plants. A very considerable number of the cases of fungus-poisoning recorded annually are, according to Mr. Massee, due to making a hearty meal of it and accompanying or following it by drinking alcoholic liquor, more especially spirits. This causes the fungi eaten to coagulate and form an indigestible mass. Strong tea acts in a similar manner to alcohol. Moral—Eat fungi in moderation and take care what you drink.

Above 90 per cent. of the cases of poisoning by fungi, both in Europe and North America, is, it seems, due to partaking of one particular kind of fungus called the death cap (*Agaricus phalloides*). The popular name is derived from the presence of a loose cap-like sheath surrounding the base of the stem. The presence of a cap at the base of the stem is not, however, the hall-mark of all poisonous fungi; in fact, some among the best-known of edible fungi have a similar cap, and it is the sum total of characters presented by the "death-caps" that enables it to be recognised with certainty. The "death caps" are very abundant in woods in England, but does not grow in open pastures like the common mushroom.

The Making of a Welsbach Mantle Briefly Told.

The incandescent gas mantle was invented by Adolf von Welsbach in 1885, and patented all over the world. The manufacture and use of mantles was first taken up in Austria, and has since found its way into all civilised countries where gas is introduced. At the present time it is estimated that no less than one hundred and fifty millions of mantles are manufactured annually. In the United States, although there are about forty millions manufactured annually, the industry is only partly developed. The public is gradually learning to use the mantle.

The mantle is made as follows: A "cone" or spool of No. 40 white cotton thread is knitted into a "stocking" or hose, about two inches in diameter. This stocking is thoroughly washed and dried. Then it is saturated with a solution of nitrate of thorium and one per cent. of nitrate of cerium. The thorium is manufactured from a sand called monazite, which is found in Brazil and in the State of Carolina, and is rather expensive, being sold at 6 dollars 50 cents per pound.

One pound of nitrate of thorium yields from 300 to 350 mantles, depending on the quantity distilled. After the cone has been washed and dried it is either cut to proper size and impregnated with the thorium solution, or is first impregnated, and then cut to the required length. The impregnated stockings, after being cut, are sewed at one end with asbestos thread, so as to form a head provided with a loop, which serves to

hold the mantle in process of manufacturing and when in use on the burner. Then the impregnated stocking is hung on a wire by an asbestos loop, and heated in a gas flame of the Bunsen type. This is done in order to burn out the thread. The next process is called the shaping. The mantle now consists only of ashes of thorium (oxide of thorium), and is carefully held over a Bunsen flame, and gradually given the right shape, at the same time being hardened. As soon as the mantle is shaped and hardened it is practically completed; but in order to protect it from breakage it is "dipped" in a stiffening solution. There are many forms of "dip," but the one most used it made of soluble cotton (guncotton) dissolved in good alcohol and acetone. To this mixture castor oil and shellac are added. Before the mantle can be used on a burner this "dip" or coating must be burned off. — *"Scientific American."*

— **WEATHER.** — Fine and warm. The wind has returned to the northern quarter.

— **MARITANA.** — The long anticipated amateur performance of this opera will take place at the San Felipe Theatre this evening. — **H. M. S. "FLORA."** — This British cruiser, which was flagship on this station a few years ago, arrived in port yesterday on her way home from the West Coast. She will remain two or three days before resuming her voyage.

— **PLEASURE YACHT.** — Yesterday there arrived in this port the fine pleasure yacht "Voronique," which is on a pleasure trip round the world. For the present she is bound for the West Coast, sailing on Friday. She is under command of Capt. E. W. Morrison, officer of the Royal Mail S. P. Co. There is a distinguished party on board, including Earl Fitzwilliam, Rear-Admiral Henry St. Leger Palliser, Captain North, Captain Smith, Captain Bulkeley, Professor Dunsford, Professor Yarborough, Dr. Anger, and Mr. Hamilton. We understand that the whole party intend to witness the performance of "Maritana" this evening, as also many officers from H. M. S. "Flora."

— **FIRE.** — About 11.30 p. m. on Monday a fire broke out in the Bazaar and Fancy Shop of A. Pittamaglio, Calle 18 de Julio 52, between Medanos and Vasquez. Owing to the strong wind blowing the flames spread rapidly, and the Brigade had hard work for over an hour before the fire was dominated, the damages being considerable, though not a complete loss. The business was insured in the "Prasatlantica" Company for \$10,000. The origin of the fire is unknown.

— **GAMBLING DEN SURPRISED.** — Acting on information received, on Monday evening the police made a raid on a gambling den established in Calle Yurbal, in front of the Central Market. Eleven gamblers were caught in the act, sufficient evidence of their being engaged in illicit games being forthcoming, and the whole party were marched off under arrest. — The present Chief of Police Col. Jerez has expressed his determination to do his utmost to repress these gambling dens, and his resolution is worthy of all applause.

— **PATIENT.** — We regret to say that Mr. James Oldham, manager of the Western Telegraph Company, is suffering from a sharp attack of influenza.

— **CONTRABAND.** — On Monday night the coast-guard tug "Vigilante" was making its rounds when, on the south coast it came across a suspicious boat making for the shore and not carrying the regulation lights. Chase was given, but in the darkness of the night the boat, which had four men on board, managed to escape after having thrown overboard its cargo. This was all picked up, and was found to consist of eleven bales containing Tascan (Italian) cigars to the number of 90,000. This is a fairly good haul, and it gives an idea of the extent to

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, OCT. 17.

Lord Londonderry, in a speech at Ashton-under-Lyne on Saturday, claimed that in administering the Education Act he had dealt absolutely impartially and without favour by all classes.

Speaking at a conference on agricultural education held at Gloucester on Saturday, Lord Ouseley said that so long as Lord Londonderry and himself represented the Departments of Education and Agriculture they were certain to work hand in hand.

Mr. Chamberlain has sent a letter to an Irish correspondent denying that there is "the shadow of a shade of foundation" for a suggestion that he is behind the scenes supporting Lord Doneraile's devolution scheme.

Quorndon Hall, near Derby, was destroyed by fire on Saturday morning.

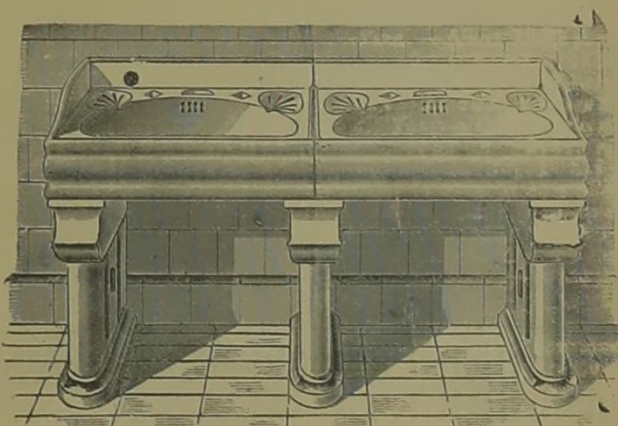
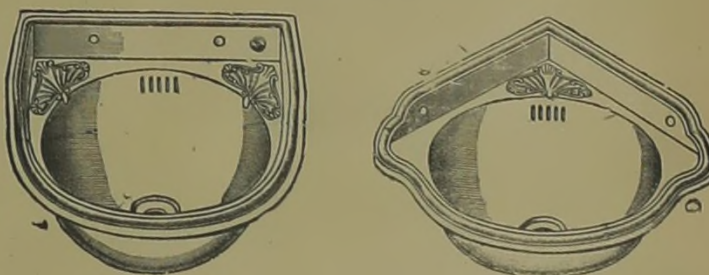

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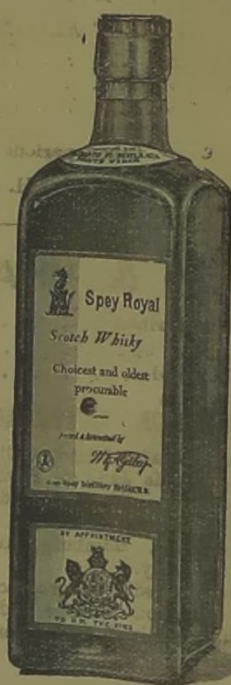
