NEWS OF THE DAY.

MONTEVIDEO.

POLITICAL NOTES.

Neither of the Chambers sat on Friday. It was the turn of the Senate.

With regard to the Maldistribution Bill, it is stated that the Senate Committee will propose some amendments of detail tending to make the situation of the minorities less desperate. So far, however, the point is not yet decided. In any case, there is little probability of amendments contracting the absolute tendencies of the Government passing the lower Chamber, whatever may be their fate in the Senate. As the *Tiempo* has pointed out, the Senate must either reject the Bill entirely or be content to see it approved on its original form by the overpowering vote of the Representatives.

The *Dia* has given an indignant denial to certain insinuations current to the effect that one of Sr. Batlle's objects in proposing Constitutional reform was to enable his own prolongation in or reelection to the Presidency of the Republic. Sr. Batlle, says his paper, entertains no such ambition, but, on the contrary, regards the Presidency as a stern duty, and longs to return to the tranquility of private life. The manner in which the *Dia* represents Sr. Batlle as a second Cincinnatus, anxious to return to the plough—though hitherto his pursuits have been far from pastoral—has created some amusement. Anyhow, if he is tired of the Presidency and finds that it entails too many sacrifices, it is always open to him resign. Probably others will be found willing to accept the stern duty and to undergo the sacrifices, and it is not entirely inconceivable that the Republic may reconcile itself to the change. Anyhow, Sr. Batlle will not lack a rural retreat when he retires, for it is announced that he has just bought, for \$16,000 gold, a large country house at Piedras Blancas, from the estate of the Duplessis family. May he pass many happy and tranquil years there, far removed from the turmoil and disenchantedness of political life. He may yet prove a very successful farmer.

With relation to the attempt against the President, a certain Sr. Rios Silva, whom reporter on the staff of the *Dia* and now (if we are not mistaken) attached to another paper, has made a voluntary deposition before the Judge of Instruction. Substantially it is to the effect that, one evening some two months before the attempt (that is to say about June last) he was enabled to overhear an evening conversation between two men seated on a parapet near the Central Station. The elder accused Sr. Batlle of being the cause of the war and the sole obstacle to peace, and said that it was necessary to “eliminate” or “kill” him. The second, apparently Italian by his accent, said that this might safely be left to him. Sr. Silva endeavored to “shadow” the two men into the city, but lost sight of them. He brought the matter to the knowledge of the President, whom he had known personally, but the latter made light of it. Since, he asserts, he has identified the elder man as Cervetti, but has no knowledge of the second, and has never seen Trápani, though he was offered an opportunity of doing so. It does not seem to us that much importance can be attached to this, especially when the evidence is offered so late in the day. Similar remarks as to the responsibility of Sr. Batlle might have been overheard in a thousand places during the course of the war, and the only question is

whether any direct criminal purpose could be attached to the manner in which they were phrased.

Yesterday's *Siglo* makes a statement to the effect that at Santa Lucia, the police commissary, one Martinez, summoned before him some sixty nationalists, residents of the district, and informed them that if they did not find work within three days they would be turned out of the Department (Canelones) or compelled to enlist in the line. Similar complaints have appeared at times from other districts of the interior. If there be any truth at all in them, a more serious abuse of authority or more objectionable form of political persecution—especially in view of the approaching elections—can hardly be imagined. We shall be curious to see if the Government takes any notice of the accusation.

The Finance Committee of the Representatives has already commenced study of the Mihanovich application and has sent a telegram (we suppose a letter would have been too slow) summoning Sr. Mihanovich from Buenos Aires to give certain explanations. We can only say again that the exceeding promptitude with which this affair is being treated, whilst matters of real general interest are interminably delayed, is most remarkable.

Rumors became current in the city on Friday night of another attempt on the life of Sr. Batlle. Yesterday's morning papers contradicted them completely, saying that they were quite without foundation. No importance is attached to the matter.

Lord Rosebery on International Disputes.

London, Nov. 1.

After opening a municipal museum and art gallery at Kingston-on-Thames, yesterday, the Earl of Rosebery was present at a mayoral luncheon. In responding to the toast of the “High Steward,” he said:—“This might be an occasion for a practised orator or a professional politician to say a few words on the general topics of the day, steering skilfully between the quicksands which beset a political speaker on an unpopular occasion. It may be a disappointment to you, sir, to know that I do not propose to follow that example, but I will, at any rate, before sitting down, congratulate my fellow countrymen on the peaceable issue of a dispute which had at one time promised to be threatening, although I myself did not think it so threatening as it was usually held to be. But I would say one word in regard to that dispute, and it is this, that we do not sufficiently put ourselves in the position of the other side. I cannot conceive any justification that is possible of the abominable outrage that was committed on our fleet. (Hear, hear.) But when our countrymen clamoured, on learning of the news on Monday, that something violent should be done, on Tuesday they were apt to forget that the movement of Governments are slow, and that any self-respecting Government must make inquiries of its own agent on the spot, and receive a report from its own agent on the spot, before it is able, however ready it may be, to render the most complete satisfaction to the offended party. I am not making that remark with reference to what is past, I am rather making it with reference to the future. Our mistake—and perhaps it is a mistake of all nations—is in dealing with foreign politics in this, that so far as I know, ninety-nine men in one hundred never put themselves in the position of the opposite party. If that were always the case in life, no dispute would ever be brought to a conclusion, and although the present conjuncture of the world's affairs does not seem to promise any immediate termination of warfare as the method of settling international disputes, yet I cannot but help thinking that with the progress of civilization and education there must come into effect more reasonable methods, even though they may sometimes eventuate in war. What we have to hope for from the growing common-sense of the people at large is the power of putting ourselves in the shoes for a moment, if only for a moment, of the men with whom we have the dispute; and, as I have already said, within the last forty-eight hours, being able to find yourself in the wrong, to take the same satisfaction that any gentleman takes when he finds himself in the wrong—of fully and honourably owing himself to be in the wrong, and making the simplest amends. Until the nations of the world are able, in some degree, however remotely, to imitate the ordinary procedure of gentlemen among each other, there is little hope for the permanent preservation of peace. (Applause.)

The War in the Far East.

We quote the following telegrams from our Buenos Aires contemporaries:—

Tokio, Dec. 1st.—A telegram from General Nodgi this afternoon announces the capture, after repeated attacks, of this position by the Japanese troops. The bill is stated to be literally piled with Russian corpses. Chinese passengers from Port Arthur who arrived last night at Chifu state that the capture of the hill places the most vulnerable part of Port Arthur

at the mercy of the besiegers. The Russian losses during the recent assaults are placed at over 1700 killed and wounded. Some of the guns of the forts of secondary importance have been transferred to Liao-ti-shen.

London, Dec. 1st.—According to advices from St. Petersburg, the Tsar, in view of the critical condition of Port Arthur, has telegraphed to Kurapatkin to take the offensive and go to the relief of Port Arthur, if the army is in a condition to do so. Kurapatkin is understood to have answered that he is prepared to do so, hence the advance of the troops covering the Sha River line. The Russian army is estimated to be 353,000 strong, with 950 guns, extending along a front of 32 kilometres. The troops under the immediate command of General Linievitch are to operate in the van. From information received from the Russian headquarters, it would appear that the effective forces at Marshal Oyama's disposal are weak, but that several divisions have been despatched from Port Arthur.

London, Dec. 1st.—General Kurapatkin reports to Headquarters as follows:—After the engagement at Teishueh on the 27th ult. we continued the pursuit of the enemy, who fell back to the south-east of the Sha River line, establishing themselves at Sun-yun, a point about 20 kilometres distant. We at once placed several batteries in position on the adjacent heights and opened a vigorous cannonade. After a two hours' bombardment, our infantry advanced and attacked the enemy, who are offering a feeble resistance. The engagement is still going on.

SUNDRIES.

WEATHER.—Yesterday was sultry and oppressive, with an overcast and threatening sky. The outlook for to-day is very uncertain.

RACES.—Weather permitting, there will be a meeting of six events at Maroñas this afternoon.

POLITEAMA THEATRE.—This afternoon there will be a matinee for families and children, at reduced prices. The programme consists of “Marcha de Cadiz,” “Ultimo Chulo” and “La Macarena.” In the evening will be given “El Bateo,” “El Abuelito,” “El Trebol” (this price has made a hit), and the revised “Eden Club.”

ELECTRIC TRACTION.—Our contemporaries give prominence to a London telegram of Friday as follows:—“It is asserted that negotiations are nearly concluded for the electrification of the Montevideo Tramways, the contract being about to be signed between Mr. White and the London and New York Company, which will take charge of the operation. It is stated that the transfer of the concession will be made for £350,000 sterling.—At present this is rather mysterious; the concessions for electrification of tramway systems are not one but several, and nothing being known here of the Company mentioned. Possibly it may refer to some joint contract for carrying out the electrification of the principal lines. We must await London advices for a full explanation.

COAL WHARVES.—For some time past the Municipality has been endeavoring to compel the various coal wharves on the south west corner of the bay to roof themselves in or to build high protecting walls, on the pretext that the coal dust constituted a nuisance to the neighbourhood, even threatening to close them if they refused to comply. On appeal the Tribunal has set aside the order of the Municipality, on the grounds that there is no legal authority for such order, that in any case other provision will shortly be made for the coal depots, and that there was no general complaint from the neighbourhood; many of whom derived advantages from the proximity of the wharves. This seems reasonable, and in any case it is pleasing to find an occasional check to the arbitrary tendencies of the Municipality. We believe, however, that the latter intends to make another appeal to a higher court.

—OBSCURE THEATRE.—There will be afternoon and evening performances to-day with varied programme.

—ANNIVERSARY.—We extend our congratulations to our contemporary *The Review of the River Plate* on having entered its 14th year, which it does with the current number. Long may its career of usefulness continue.

—CONCERT.—Although the season is somewhat advanced and warm for concerts, the Victoria Hall was crowded to overflowing on Friday evening for the first Concert of the Montevideo Musical Conservatory of the Prof. Scarabelli and Fabin. The whole programme was executed most satisfactorily and few finer concerts of classical music have been given here. The two professors, and Sr. Fabin in especial, greatly distinguished themselves in their violin playing, as also did Mme. Scarabelli on the piano. Excellent work was likewise done by the orchestra, principally composed of pupils of the Conservatory, among whom were several young lady violinists.

—CASINO.—A bit has been made by the German dactyls the Genes, whose eccentric dancing, though the audience was a little slow in appreciating it, was both original and clever. The Spanish dancers Guerra y Chivo also deserve commendation. There will be the usual afternoon performance to-day.

—CONSUL.—Sr. Angel E. Castelló has been appointed Uruguayan Consul in Marseilles.

MURDERER CAPTURED.—News comes from Paysandú of the capture of the man Juan Salvatella, who murdered the Police Commissary Sergi. Quintana, as mentioned a few days ago. He has fully confessed the crime, and has revealed where he hid the money he stole, which has been recovered. It appears that he had been in the service of Sergi. Quintana for several years, and enjoyed his complete confidence, which makes his crime all the more cowardly.

—TRAMWAY CONFLICT.—It is stated that the Union and Maroñas Tramway Company has appealed to the Superior Tribunal of Justice in its conflict with the Pocitos Company respecting right of way in the Plaza Independencia, already resolved in favor of the latter by the Municipality and the Government.

—WEDDING.—From the B. A. Standard:—A very quiet wedding took place in St. John's on Monday. The contracting parties were Mr. S. McColl Rough, 4th son of the late Mr. George Rough of Glasgow, and Rhoda, 3rd daughter of the Rev. Charles Mason, B. A. of Bisleigh and Farles Thorpe, Alford, Lincolnshire, the bridesmaids being the Misses McClymont Reid, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. J. McClymont Reid of Estancia Negrette and the groomsmen being Messrs. D. Gann and N. Hirst. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. J. H. Gallely, assisted by Dr. Fenn.

—STRIKE FAILED.—The two days' general strike of the working classes in Buenos Aires has proved a failure. The *Standard* describes the situation as follows:—“The term ‘general’ can no longer be applied to the strike, which only partially existed on Thursday, and the weakness of the cause has only been more plainly exhibited by the strong efforts that were made to impress its power upon all. The lack of unity of purpose and the exaggerated demands of the more dissatisfied have united to defeat the measures which had been taken to enforce many, possibly, just claims. While the business of the city was in certain sections and classes of work momentarily paralyzed, order was generally well preserved and ample facilities existed for transit and for obtaining all articles of general necessity, except bread. The uncertainty which reigned during the early morning hours as to the day's possible doings very quickly gave way to confidence, and the streets became more frequented as the hours wore away. Police and the forces of the line were to be seen passing to and fro, and those actually desirous of working found all the protection they required at hand. In some of the suburban districts where large numbers of the unemployed reside there was to be noted a feverish undercurrent of suppressed excitement, but very few outbreaks were reported, and a large number of persons attended the Belgrano races to enjoy the holiday—as they called it.

SCHOOL HUMOUR.

Fifteen years ago Mr. H. J. Barker delighted the English and American public with his “Comic Side of School Life.” Now, through Messrs. Jarrold and Sons, he is about to give the world a further treat. Concerning his stories and his forthcoming volume “(Comic School Tales)” a London paper gives the following result of an interview:—

“What,” he cried, “tell me my best story? How am I to know which is the best? When a man is saturated with stories—for they roll in upon me from all quarters now—it is difficult for him to say which is the best. Let me tell you the latest—or one of the latest—instead. The other day, on the steps of the offices of the late School Board, I met a head master whom I hadn't seen for years, and

he said, ‘Hallo! Mr. Barker, I've got a good story for you.’ This is what he told me. In an infants' school the mistress was giving some questions on mental arithmetic, and she asked ‘What do 5 and 4 make?’ A little girl replied, ‘Ten,’ whereupon the mistress uttered a gentle reproof, concluding by sending the child out of the room to quietly think out a sounder solution of the problem. A little seven-year-old found the tot in the hall, and inquired the occasion of her isolation. ‘I'm sent out here to try and fink what 5 and 4 is,’ was the explanation. ‘Well, you go back,’ advised the seven-year-old, and say, ‘Nine.’ ‘Oh, no,’ replied the troubled tot, ‘I don't fink 9 would do. I tried 10, and that wasn't enough.’ This story,’ Mr. Barker explained, ‘illustrates a curious working of the child mind.’

“Some more stories, if you please, Mr. Barker.”

“Well, during a grammar examination in a Board school the inspector took the line, ‘Hark! how the lark sings!’ and asked a little boy to give the gender of ‘lark.’ ‘Masculine,’ was his reply. ‘No,’ said the inspector, ‘it's a common gender.’ ‘Big pardon, sir,’ corrected the youngster, ‘it's only the cock bird what sings.’ Pretty sharp, wasn't it? But perhaps the largest crop of good things comes of children misinterpreting the sound of words. A little East-ender, asked to say the Lord's Prayer, astonished the mistress by saying, ‘Lead us not into Thames Station.’ Another little East-ender, taken for a treat to the seaside, said, ‘There's the sea, but where are all the Timythemies?’ ‘All the what?’ asked the teacher, who gradually learnt that this was a confusion arising in the child's mind from ‘the sea and all that in them is.’

“Your forthcoming book will be full of new stories?”

“Yes, stories new and true. It is in three parts. The first part consists of stories based on my experience as a lecturer—the humour yielded by a lecture on ‘Humour in School.’ The second part is full of comic tales about school. In the third part I present, as fiction, a number of stories about teachers that are based on actual occurrences. I have put a tremendous lot of time and effort into the new book, which I hope will be found more interesting than the former one.”

“And now will you please tell me some quaint things that children have said?”

“Well, a class was asked to write grammatical sentences illustrating the meaning of ‘terminus,’ and this was a small scholar's contribution: ‘The mother flogged the boy on the terminus.’ A similar lesson in reference to ‘contents’ brought this effort: ‘The contents of a cow is milk.’ A boy, asked to give a definition of ‘memory,’ said: ‘That which you forget with.’ A little girl, writing about the weather, explained that the reason we had so much wind in this country was because there were so many windmills here. Once a boy came in late to school and was confronted by the Government inspector, who asked the reason of his unpunctuality. ‘Please, sir,’ explained the lad, ‘I had to go to the station with father to help carry some fish to the shop.’ ‘Oh,’ said the inspector, ‘so your father is a fishmonger, is he? Then, as you help him, you will be able to do this little sum for me. If you bought 19lbs. of salmon at 3d. a pound, how much would the whole fish be worth?’ ‘It wouldn't be worth much at that price, sir,’ replied the youth, quick as an eel; and he added, ‘Oh, my, salmon at 3d. a pound! I fancy that inspector regretted his frivolity.’

“The London boy transplanted to the country has provided some material for your books, has he not?”

“Yes. Let me see, I think I tell of a little Londoner who went to live amid rural surroundings, and at the village school was catechised as to his impressions of the country. ‘I like it pretty well,’ said the little chap, ‘but there's some things I don't like as well as in London. There's the way you get your milk, for one thing. In London they get it from a nice clean shop; down here you get it from a dirty, old cow standing in the mud.’

“The sayings of school children are often unconscious revelations of their home life?”

“Yes. There was a curious case at a Southwark Board school some time ago. Written excuses for absence are, you know, the rule; and as it had been transgressed the lad concerned was admonished that, if he could not attend school he must afterwards bring an excuse from his father. ‘But,’ solemnly protested the youth, ‘father ain't no good at making excuses, sir. Mother catches him every time.’ ‘Catches him!’ replied the teacher. ‘What do you mean?’ ‘Why,’ added the ingenious child, ‘mother finds him out, sir, as soon as he opens his mouth.’

“By the way, Mr. Barker, you say one part of ‘Comic School Tales’ will tell of humorous things that occurred while you were lecturing on humour. What sort of things?”

“All sorts. For instance, certain chairmen have yielded me good material. One of them, who was full of geniality and good temper, privately consulted me after the lecture as to what was the point in one of my stories. How he came to be so conscience-stricken!”

«Have members of your audiences ever suffered ill effects from excessive laughter?»

«Oh, I hope not. I certainly do remember one case of a youngster giving way to such an extent that his friends became anxious. He was a handsome boy, in an Eton suit, and he was seated beside his mother, who greatly enjoyed his enjoyment of the lecture. Well, I chanced to tell an experience of an inspector who, testing a class on the values of coins, threw a half-crown from one palm to another and asked a pupil, 'What is that?' Whereupon the youngster, taken off his guard, enthusiastically replied, 'Heads, sir! That proved too much for the Eton boy. He went off into a fit of laughter that proved uncontrollable. His mother shook him, his back was patted by the people behind, and his collar was removed—but all in vain; the convulsions continued, and the poor lad had to be helped out of the hall. Feeling very anxious, I sent a gentleman from the platform to inquire how the patient fared, and presently the reassuring news was brought back that the boy was all right again, though his mother would not run the risk of letting him hear any more of the lecture.»

SHORT STORY

In the Days of Louis Quatorze.

«Forgive me, sire; your Majesty's approbation is enough. You take from me my friend, and I cannot accept this priceless jewel. That you have granted what I ask I will acknowledge with my prayers for your Majesty.»

With a graceful reverence Louise withdrew, leaving her alone with the half-reviving Louise.

At first Clemence endeavored to persuade her friend to detach herself from the gay Court and its Royal master; but she soon desisted, seeing it was useless.

«The quiet recesses of this convent would suit your inclinations for solitude and privacy far better than the splendour of the Court. At St. Germain you may fancy yourself happy, but here, with me, you would be so in reality.»

«Alas—it is now too late,» said the weeping La Valliere. «Had I earlier sought and received your support all might have been well. Now it is too late. Only yesterday I fled from danger, and it has pursued me hither; and now my strength is gone—my will is no longer my own. I must return to meet the fate that awaits me. My struggles, my sufferings have been great; if they have been in vain do not condemn me too harshly. Nay, do not weep, my Clemence; we may yet meet again. I have a strong presentiment that I am destined to end my days within these peaceful walls.»

They parted. La Valliere returned to the splendour and misery of a Court; and Clemence ere long rejoined her husband.

It was many years before the friends met again, when Clemence, a widow and childless, again sought the shelter of the Carmelite Monastery, determined to share with her friend the seclusion and austerities of the life she had chosen.

The remote district in which Monsieur and Madame Blansac resided prevented anything but a very rare correspondence between Clemence and Louise, now Duchesse de la Valliere, the avowed mistress of the King's affections and the mother of his children. But Clemence rejoiced to hear of the deep tenderness of the monarch for her friend. Her hope was for its continuance; but the hope was blended with fears, unhappily too well grounded.

«Can Louis be constant, think you?» said Theodore, to whom the mere sound of the beautiful Duchess's name brought anger and impatience. «It may be months, it may be years ere he wearies.»

And it was years. The passion of the King, though it remained long unchanged, at length, like all passions rooted only in selfishness, veered to a new object. The charms, the talent, and, still more, the unscrupulous artifice of Madame de Montespan destroyed the influence of the more estimable and modest minded La Valliere, whose tender heart sank beneath the blow.

It was long before she could persuade herself of the truth. It seemed impossible that her fidelity, her devotion and sacrifices could be thus rewarded by Louis. The favourites of Royalty have in general found compensation under similar circumstances in the facilities afforded them for gratifying their avarice, their ambition, or their vanity. But La Valliere was devoid of all these resources. She had given herself to love alone, and when love failed her she found life empty and barren. Even her

children failed to bring her consolation.

It was then that her naturally pure instincts began to ripen into principles. She left the world, which had no longer any charms for her—a world that could not fail to admire the character and courage of a woman who, at thirty years of age and possessed of splendid religion and the seclusions of a convent to a Court and the allurements of pleasure.

She entered the Monastery of St. Mary at Chaillot, and after the usual year of novitiate received the veil before a concourse of the noble and the proud, who thronged through curiosity, with others whom better motives inspired, to witness the adieu to the world of one of the most beautiful women who had ever graced the Court of France.
