BANK OF THE REPUBLIC.
We condense below the balance sheet of the Bank of the Republic dated December 31, adding for the sake of comparison some of the figures from the balance sheet of the previous month.

Credit.—Unissued shares of 2nd Series \$5,000,000;—Unissued bonus shares \$1,776,881.51 (in Nov., \$1,810,653);—Various debtors, \$7,748,910.97 (in Nov., \$7,933,041);—Guarantee of Judicial Deposits, \$1,140,000 nom. in Bonds of Extraordinary Loan, 3rd Series, at 75 cto, \$855,000 (in Nov., \$798,000);—Values deposited, \$4,559,888.81 (in Nov., \$4,845,220);—Cash in hand, \$9,263,213.40 (in Nov., \$7,967,333);—Total, \$29,203,894.66.

Debit.—Capital, nominal, \$12,000,000.00;—Various creditors, \$4,665,776.46 (in Nov., \$4,609,460);—Judicial Deposits and Retentions, \$516,155.77;—Service of the Extraordinary Loan, Payments by the Direction General of Direct Taxes \$32,150.16;—Notes in circulation, \$7,020,305 (in Nov., \$5,780,878);—Reserve Fund, \$223,118.49 (in Nov., \$189,346);—Provision Fund, \$150,000 (in Nov., \$130,000);—Silver cheques conforming in circulation, \$36,500;—Total, \$29,203,894.66.

The above represents the balance-sheet of the Bank for the end of its financial year as well as of the month, and therefore requires some notice. The sum of \$33,772 has been written off the unissued bonus shares, and an equal amount added to the Reserve Fund, \$20,000 has been added to the Provision Fund, and the Bonds of the Extraordinary Loan 3rd Series held as Guarantee of the Judicial Deposits are now valued at 75 cto, instead of 70 cto, corresponding to their recent appreciation in the market.

From the above we deduce that the net profit of the Bank for the past year has been \$337,720. This compares with a profit of \$360,444 in 1903, \$346,099 in 1902, \$349,789 in 1901, \$255,705 in 1900 and \$206,093 in 1899. Therefore, the Bank has had a fairly satisfactory year, despite the depression in business caused by the war, which must have been specially felt by its branches in the interior.

The notes in circulation on Dec. 31 were \$7,020,305, as compared with \$7,020,105 on the same date in 1903, and the cash in hand was \$9,263,213 as compared with \$6,284,545.

The amount accruing to the Government as sole shareholder in the Bank will be about \$265,470.

POLITICAL NOTES.
Parliamentary business continues at a standstill. The Representatives taking their turn at a No-quorum on Tuesday. Only 15 thought it worth while to attend.

The second scrutiny of the elections proceeds, but there are no very special results to report to-day. In San José the majority of the nationalists is confirmed. From Rio Negro it is reported that, though the "colorados" have the majority in the Department and will return the senator, they will probably lose the deputyships through an error in the casting of the votes. Papers from various parts of the interior have some unedifying accounts of abuse and irregularities committed by the police or other government agents. Some of these may possibly be due to partisan jealousies, but some of them are undoubtedly true, and confirm that the elections were by no means the exemplary act at first thought and still pretended by the official party.

By way of giving our readers an idea of the official view of the elections we translate from yesterday's *Día* the following remarks:—"The electoral act of January 22 is a just stamp of honor for the entire country. In it there has been consecrated our republican capacity; by it our free institutions have received enormous prestige; and in it there has been demonstrated the fibre and the civic respect of our people. They have been the best elections in the country. Old men fail to remember others more free, legal and contested. Perhaps no better similar acts have been effected in all South America. [A poor compliment to S. A.] The Republic has gained unquestionably with this noble act of virtue, liberty and democratic conscience; it has triumphed over many prejudices, many misgivings and many officious foreign condolences; it has shown itself strong in the full exercise of its republican institutions, in the vigorous application of political rights; strong before itself by the confidence acquired in its own virtues; strong before others for the respect inspired by those peoples who know how to govern themselves, by the legitimate and luminous recourse of its law, and by the unique force of its principles of government. Under these conditions has arisen the triumph of the "Colorado" Party. [Our official contemporary always uses this phrase with a big, big "P."] From this most free and indisputably beautiful act, from this resplendent purity with which the popular sovereignty has manifested itself, from this immaculate victory which the country has obtained over itself, has arisen the consecration of the right of the "Colorado" Party to continue to rule the destinies of the country. Etcetera, etcetera, etcetera. We doubt if anything more magnificent was ever published even by the extinct Nation when singing the praises of the unapproachable Governments of Santos, Herrera and Borda. We must really thank the *Día* for thus opening our eyes—the Maldistribution Act must be merely a freak of the imagination, and all the adverse criticisms on the result of the elections (including our own) merely the strabismic grumblings of ignorant and prejudiced imbeciles, who do not know and cannot appreciate the glories of "officialism" and the absolutely unexceptional virtues of the present political situation.

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London's Welcome to 1905.
London, Jan. 2.
Solemnly the bells rang out. There were muffles on their hammers. They were ringing the Old Year out.

Then there was a pause. And down in the streets, and in other places where men were assembled, there was also a pause. People looked at their watches. The mystic silence grew. It was as if all were waiting for some momentous portent to appear. Indeed, such was the common feeling, and most eyes were turned to the skies, as in the old days our ancestors rapturously gazed when welcoming the return of the sun.

Suddenly the bells banged out, a swift, sharp, brilliant, merry peal. And the people shouted.

It was 1905. The New Year had come.

Everywhere that about went up and friendly hands were gripped. From outside St. Paul's Cathedral, where, as usual, there was the customary New Year's Eve crowd, noisy and wishful to maffick as ever, to away in the quiet suburbs where it rose from warm firesides, it was the same shout, the welcome to the baby year just born.

There is a coincidence which falls with New Year's Eve on Saturday which causes the central streets to be more thronged at midnight than when New Year's Eve falls on any other week-day night. On Saturday night, too, the clear, crisp weather brought many out for the purpose of listening to the bells.

Watch night services were held at many of the churches. At St. Mary-at-Hill, the Rev. W. Carlisle's church, the electric lights were turned out by one by one until only one was left at 12 o'clock, then, suddenly, 365 lamps flashed into light.

Rational Dress for Boys.
The crusade against the wearing by schoolboys of waistcoats, linen shirts, and stiff collars which has been started by Mr. E. N. Marshall, headmaster of Kingston Grammar School, has aroused very little enthusiasm among sartorial experts.

The editor of *The Tailor and Cutter* disagrees with almost every one of Mr. Marshall's proposals for a rational dress for schoolboys, both on hygienic and aesthetic grounds.

The headmaster suggests that the waistcoat should be discarded altogether, as at Loretto, where also stiff collars and shirts are prohibited, because they check the growth of the chest and afford no protection to the back, which is the most vulnerable part of the body. To this the editor of *The Tailor and Cutter* has a ready answer.

"Mr. Marshall seems to have forgotten," he said, "that a coat is worn over the waistcoat, which is simply an undergarment. So far from being a check to the growth of the chest, it acts as a support. As to the argument that the waistcoat gives no protection to the back, surely it is obvious that that part of the body is already sufficiently guarded by the coat or overcoat, which nine times out of ten, is kept unbuttoned and open at the front. I admit that it may be a little unwise to have the waistcoat buttoned in the middle, but that difficulty can easily be overcome by a double-breasted waistcoat. Navvies and oastlers sometimes wear the waistcoat as an outer

garment, with a uniform thickness back and front. On the whole, the waistcoat has many good points, in spite of the horrid things some doctors have said about it, and a reliable substitute has yet to be found for an undergarment that has been popular for 150 years.

"It would be impossible for a schoolboy to adopt the dress proposed by Mr. Marshall without incurring great risks to his health. True it is that a flannel shirt and collar would be more comfortable and more suited for outdoor exercises, and would have the advantage of preventing cold during the cooling down process in the class-room, but can the boy wear anything but a linen collar when he goes home to his parents or is asked out to a party or goes to the Christmas pantomime? And in the sudden change from flannel to linen he is bound to catch a chill. I am afraid that Mr. Marshall's suggestions, both as to the boy's health and his general appearance, are to be regretted. Imagine a schoolboy in a sweater (without waistcoat), flannel collar, and Eton jacket."

The editor of *The Tailor and Cutter* does not in the least imagine that Mr. Marshall's crusade will receive much support either from the headmasters of public schools or from parents.

"The rational dress is not picturesque," he says. "It is negligé and clumsy, and I do not think parents would tolerate it for a moment."

Additions to the Statute Book.
London, Jan. 1.
To-day the British taxpayer will find himself subject to certain of the Acts of Parliament that were passed last Session.

First and foremost will come the Licensing Act, under which the public-houses of the country will pass more and more out of public control, while the grip of "the trade" upon its own vested interest will be enormously increased. It is the price which the Tories have paid to the trade for support at the polls.

Then the Shop Hours Act will also come into force, though the extent to which it will operate remains to be seen. It practically sets up a sort of local option as to the closing of shops, and upon the general principle there may or may not be sufficient agreement to effect substantial reform.

The County Courts Act, extending the jurisdiction of County Court Judges, also comes into operation.

The Patents Act, of which we have already given a detailed account, likewise becomes law to-morrow.

The Weights and Measures Act, which may have far-reaching effects in business circles, is also to be added to the list of new laws, and so also must be the Bishopric of South York Act and the Bishopric of Birmingham Act.

A Gruesome Postage Stamp.
According to a Belgrade correspondent, the publication of the story of Queen Nathalie's intrigue, to revenge herself on Serbia, followed by the sudden withdrawal by the postal authorities of all the new coronation stamps, is the sole topic of conversation throughout the Balkan States.

In order to celebrate King Peter's coronation, the Serbian Government decided to issue a series of large postal labels, bearing the new monarch's portrait, beside that of his ancestor, Kara-george.

The engraving was unfortunately entrusted to a Frenchman, named Mouchon, a person, it is alleged, very friendly towards Queen Nathalie, and he very skillfully introduced into the design for the new postage stamps the ghastly features of the Queen's murdered son, King Alexander.

A vast number of the coronation stamps were issued to the public before it became known to the authorities that the new issue was regarded by many of King Peter's superstitious subjects as a "heavenly sign" that the new monarch's reign was to be brief and bloody.

If one of the new stamps be held upside down, the unmistakable death mask of King Alexander may be seen, formed by a portion of King Peter's head with that of his ancestor, Kara-george. The nostrils of the two heads together form the eyes of the murdered monarch, the moustaches make the eyebrows, and the eyebrow and eye of Kara-george form King Alexander's nose and mouth.

The "death-mask" stamps—as the new issue has become known—have undoubtedly made a great impression in the army and among the uneducated classes.

"I learn on the best authority," concludes the correspondent, "that the Government is making desperate efforts to buy up as many of the dangerous labels as possible, and is even sending agents abroad to France, Germany, and England to secure them, at any cost, from speculators and foreign stamp dealers."

Russian Events.
We quote the following telegrams from our Buenos Aires contemporaries.—St. Petersburg, Jan. 30th.—The Russian Foreign Minister, Count Lamsdorff, has informed Sir Charles Hardinge, British Ambassador, that he has sent instructions to the authorities in Moscow to take down immediately the anti-British placards exhibited in that city. The Count added that the safety of British subjects residing in Russia is assured.

London, Jan. 30th.—The *Daily Mail* has received information that the British Consul, Mr. A. P. Murray, and Vice-Consul, Mr. St. Clair, in Warsaw, were

attacked in the streets by a picket of hussars. The incident occurred in a deserted street. A hussar rode over the Consul and knocked him down. The Consul managed to escape. The Vice-Consul received several sabre cuts in the face from another cavalry man, and had to be taken to a hospital. The officer in command of the picket was intoxicated. The British Embassy at St. Petersburg having been notified of the outrage, has demanded satisfaction.

A Moscow telegram states that in the district of Lefortova 30,000 workmen have struck. An attack by a group of strikers on the gun-cotton factory was repulsed by the Cosacks. A message from Odessa announces that hundreds of sailors have been placed under arrest at Sebastopol.

London, Jan. 30th.—The news of the attack by hussars upon the British representatives at Warsaw has excited universal indignation throughout the kingdom. The papers, of all shades of political opinions, are unanimous in calling upon the Government to protest energetically. A long conference has been held between the Russian Ambassador and the Foreign Minister, Lord Lansdowne. The Warsaw incident was discussed, and the Russian Ambassador gave ample explanations, promising that the offenders should receive condign punishment. The British military attaché at Libau has left for Warsaw to investigate the circumstances.

London, Jan. 30th.—News from Warsaw leads to the conclusion that the situation in that place is assuming a very serious aspect. Anarchy reigns throughout the city. Traffic is completely suspended. All the business houses are closed. Frequent collisions take place between the populace and the troops, who behave with the utmost brutality. The town is in total darkness. Railway communication is interrupted. Serious disturbances are also occurring in Lodz where a large number of people have been killed and wounded. A rising of the agriculturists is anticipated.

The War.
London, 29th.—The Japanese Legation reports that the troops of Marshal Oyama had detained the Russian advance and that a Japanese detachment afterwards occupied Liamaoku and Lichawpfeng, whilst another dislodged the enemy from Saerpo to the south of Heikoutai.

St. Petersburg, 30th.—The Staff of the army this evening received a report from General Gripenberg, commander of the second army in Manchuria, announcing that his troops on the 28th repelled the attacks of the Japanese between Heikoutai and Sandepu. In his report General Gripenberg states that Generals Mitschenko and Kondratovich were slightly wounded.

Tokyo, 30th.—Information is received from the seat of war that the losses of the Japanese at the battles of Chenchich-pao and Heikoutai on the 26th, 27th, 28th and 29th are estimated at 5000 killed and wounded and those of the Russians at 10,000.

However, thanks to the prompt and effective measures taken by Mr. Henderson, in conjunction with the Government, the movement is proving abortive and we understand that the worst is considered to be already past.

—MISS G. ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION.—We learn from Buenos Aires that at least one news has been received of the gallant little "Uruguay," which started some months ago under Com. Galindez, in search of the Charcot expedition. The Argentine Minister of Marine has received a telegram announcing her arrival at Punta Arenas, on her return from the South Orkneys. The gallant commander and his men had a very hard time of it. They fell in with icebergs and had to cut their way through six miles of ice pack. The Uruguay reached 61 deg. 57 min. lat. No trace was found of the Charcot expedition in Deception and Wiencke Islands, where the Charcot was to winter. How the search is to be continued is not yet known—since we presume that the "La France" cannot be left to her fate.

LONDON NOTES.

TUESDAY, JAN. 3.
The King and Queen, with the Princess Victoria, left Sandringham yesterday for Chatsworth, where they will spend a few days with the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire.
The Mansion House scheme for aiding the unemployed was put into operation yesterday, when 100 men were set to work at Ewell "grubbing" out some 500 yards of hedgerow, where the County Council have buildings in course of erection.
With regard to what was believed to have been the projected naval base at Rosyth, Lord Selborne has written a remarkable letter to Mr. Macdonnell, M. P., explaining that the money has been spent in the cheapest manner possible to provide for the expansion of the fleet, but without any particular idea of what the base is to become.
The death is announced of Madame Michelis, pioneer of the Kindergarten system in this country.
The Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company have purchased the fleet of the Goole Steam Shipping Company, and intend to start a service to Continental ports.
During last year there were 3,280 outbreaks of fire in London.
In the first division of the English Football League, Newcastle United beat Notts County, 1-0, and Sunderland were victorious over Notts Forest, 1-0; while Blackburn Rovers and Sheffield Wednesday gained points at the expense of Derby County and Preston North End respectively.
Ten men have been chosen for inclusion in the Australian cricket team who will visit this country next summer. M. A. Noble will be captain.

WEDNESDAY, JAN. 4.
Lord Mount-Stephen has given to the King's Hospital Fund bonds which will produce £11,000 a year. His Majesty has written a letter acknowledging the noble lord's munificence.
A White Paper was issued yesterday giving the text of resolutions passed by Colonial Legislatures since 1890 on the fiscal question. It is difficult to trace any offer in them.
Writing on the subject of the Scottish Church crisis, a legal correspondent argues that under the Treaty of Union there is no right of appeal from a Scottish Court to an English one on a question affecting the Scottish Church.
Nearly 300 converts have been enrolled at Newport (Mon.) as the result of the revival services there. Throughout the revival area the publicans are said to be losing heavily by the spread of sobriety among the people.
The Rev. W. C. T. Parker, of Harwich, has been committed to Ipswich Gaol for three weeks as a Passive Resister.
A representative had an interview yesterday with a Muscovite general officer of high standing, who took the view that the fall of Port Arthur would not end the war, and that Russia would fight doggedly on. He held that lately Russia had gained substantially on land.

During last year no fewer than 95,137,437 coins were struck at Imperial and Colonial mints.
Sir Frederick Bridge spoke at the Musicians' Conference at Manchester, yesterday, of the deplorable lack of ability to read music at sight. He thought this the weak point in the nation's musical education.
Arising out of the Manchester Police scandal a writ for slander has been issued against Councillor Clynne, at the instance of the Chief Constable.
Yesterday's football included the last match of the Cornishmen's holiday tour, in which Newcastle United were defeated by two goals to one. In an important English League (Second Division) game Manchester United scored four goals to Bolton Wanderers' two.

To avoid a scene, they resolved to effect the arrest on the platform at Rugby, not among the passengers in the train. They suppose he suspected their presence and bolted in the confusion attendant on the accident, for he was not to be found either among the injured or with the rest of the passengers who were sent on, as soon as possible, by special train to Rugby. His arrest, however, is expected shortly, as his appearance is well known to the police. He is tall—fair—with—"

I suppose Aunt Honoria continued reading the rest of the description, but I heard nothing of it except a confused murmur, for I had grown sick and dizzy. Tall! Fair! Then a number of little details strung themselves together in my mind with lightning speed. There were people he wanted to avoid. He had suddenly changed his plans of going on to Rugby, and had admitted it with guilty hesitation. He wore a hat that

almost concealed his face, a great cloak—oh, was it possible I had been wrapped in a criminal's disguise, that I had liked, admired? Horror and shame overwhelmed me as I remembered how long I had lain awake thinking of pairs of bright brown eyes that had looked into mine the evening before, of a warm hand clasp, and of a frank, kind voice that said in farewell, "I hope this is only an revoir—not really good bye, you know!"
I rushed from the room with such precipitancy that Aunt Honoria would have been seriously annoyed had not she condoned my discourteous conduct on account of the upset my nervous system had received in the railway accident.
