POLITICAL NOTES.
The Senators no-quoromed again on Monday. Business makes but slow progress in this Chamber and in fact in both Chambers. It is now some six weeks since the sessions opened, but the amount of business of any public importance despatched so far is very small. Meanwhile there are many things for which the people are anxiously waiting, judicial reform being one of the foremost. It is said, however, that this is occupying the attention of Committee.

The French Chamber of Commerce has petitioned the Minister of Foment for the removal of the prohibition of the importation of live cattle from France, with the special object of the introduction into this country of French milk cows, which many farmers are anxious to obtain in order to renew their strain. The petitioners protest that the prohibition is unjust as regards France, that being one of the countries most advanced in prophylactic measures against the spread of contagious diseases, whether in man, animals or plants. They maintain that there would be no danger in the removal of the prohibition.

Yesterday *Dia* returns editorially to the question of the Port Obligations, which we mentioned in our last. It seems to take the view that, the Port Contractors having signed the contract willingly, they must be prepared to abide by it, whether the results are favorable to them or not. If the case had been the other way about, that is to say if the quotation of the Consolidated Debt had fallen as much as it has risen, so that the Government had to issue the Obligations at a serious loss to itself, the Contractors could not have been asked to change the terms of the contract on that account, nor could there have been any thought of appeal to the Chambers. Nevertheless, *Dia* admits that the question deserves serious consideration.—What the *Dia* overlooks is that in the present case there is danger of the Port works being suspended, if the contractors refuse to carry them on under conditions that prove excessively onerous; while in the contrary case which the *Dia* imagines there would be no such danger. Anyhow, the clause in the contract making the rate of issue of the Obligations dependent on an unstable contingency was an ill-considered one.

The Decree has been issued appointing Drs. F. Aragon y Echebarri, M. Pérez Maggiori, J. P. Secardi and J. Gandoglia as Fiscal Agents in the Departments of Paysandu, Colonia, Minas and Rio Negro respectively.

Albion Football Club.

The 14th Annual General Meeting of this Club was held on Monday evening, Mr. P. C. Towers in the chair, with a satisfactory attendance of members.
The Reports presented were of a satisfactory character, though the principal game had suffered in activity through the revolution last year. There were 151 members on the list against 149 in the previous year, 12 new members having joined. The financial position was very satisfactory, there being no debts outstanding, and a cash balance in hand of \$102, without counting \$80 to collect. The income for the year was \$735, and the payments, including balance of loan account, \$633. The Club stock was valued at \$479. During the season the Club played the record number of 65 matches, divided as follows:—1st XI, 12 played, 2 won, 10 lost; 2nd XI, 24 played, 12 won; 6 lost, 6 drawn; 3rd XI, 29 played, 16 won, 6 lost, 7 drawn; Total, 65 played, 30 won, 22 lost, 13 drawn.

The Club took part in the Cup-tie and Cusinner Competitions, but without gaining a first place. Great interest had been shown in Lawn Tennis, several animated competitions and tournaments having been held. The Club field at Paso Molino had been lent for various foreign events of interest. The Club was secure of the tenancy of the field from the Paso Molino Tramway Company for the current year, subject to the previous conditions.

The Report and Accounts having been unanimously approved, a new Committee was elected as follows:—P. C. Towers, president; T. W. Thomas, vice; H. C. Lichtenberger, secretary; Ivan C. Towers treasurer; A. Ayerbe jr., football captain; E. Benenati Roldos, vice ditto; L. A. Kent, cricket captain; E. Decurnex, lawn tennis captain; J. Vigneaux, A. J. Davie G. S. Swinden and W. H. Hore. Auditors, C. A. Decurnex and W. E. Morton. Mr. J. Andreu was elected an honorary member of the Club. The meeting then closed with the usual vote of thanks.

We understand that the Albion Club will have three teams, 1st, 2nd and 3rd, in the League this season.

Royal Betrothal.

Alliance with the Swedish Family.

London, Feb. 27.

An interesting item of news was announced in the following terms in the Court Circular which was issued from Buckingham Palace on Saturday evening:—

“Their Majesties the King and Queen to-day received the gratifying intelligence of the betrothal of her Royal Highness Princess Margaret Victoria Augusta Charlotte Norah of Connaught, eldest daughter of their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, to his Royal Highness Prince Oscar Frederick William Olaf Gustavus Adolphus, Duke of Schonen; eldest son of their Royal Highnesses the Crown Prince and Crown Princess of Sweden and Norway, and grandson of their Majesties the King and Queen of Sweden and Norway.—Their impending marriage has the King's entire sanction and approval.”

By her projected wedding with Prince Oscar the Princess Margaret of Connaught will become prospective Crown Princess and in ultimate succession, should she enjoy an ordinary span of life, Queen of Sweden and Norway. Her Royal Highness was born in 1882, and is therefore 23 years of age. Prince Oscar first saw light in the same year as his bride, but as his birthday occurred in November and hers in January he is ten months her junior.

The House of Ponte Corvo, who preside over the destinies of Sweden, had quite a romantic origin. Oscar II, the present King, is the fourth Sovereign of the line, and is grandson of Jean Bernadotte, one of Napoleon's Marshals, who was elected heir-apparent of the Crown of Sweden by the Parliament of the kingdom in 1810, and ascended the throne eight years later under the name of Carl XIV. He was succeeded at his death in 1844 by his only son, Oscar. The latter was in turn followed by his eldest son, Carl XV, at whose premature death, without male children, the Crown fell to the next surviving brother, the present King. It is a matter of history that the founder of the house, Jean Bernadotte, was born at Pan of humble origin. Rising like most of Bonaparte's marshals from obscurity to the rank of Duke, he afterwards became Prince of Ponte Corvo, and was sent to look after the Emperor's interests in Scandinavia. Then came a serious difference, as the result of which Bernadotte became King of Sweden, and, keeping apart from the Napoleonic wars, lived to a hale old age.

Prince Gustaf, the present Crown Prince, is still a comparatively young man. He was born in 1859, and it is a coincidence that he too was 23 when he was married to Princess Victoria, daughter of the Grand Duke of Baden.

Paul Jones.

Chances of a Splendid Pageant.

Paris, Feb. 23.

Paul Jones, that romantic “pirate” of the British boy, has been celebrated by the American Ambassador, General Porter, in the speech which his Excellency has delivered at the Washington dinner.

America, now developing her cult of the past, hopes to recover her hero's bones. But the search for them as so far been unsuccessful.

There is every hope, however, that they may be found. That Paul Jones was buried in the old cemetery of St. Paul is an established fact. Nor is there any reason to reject the statement that the coffin was of lead. Paul Jones's remains are still, very probably, in a state of good preservation.

The diggers, though they have gone fathoms deep into the old graveyard, have not found the object of their search. But it is there somewhere.

Paul Jones, the hero of the revolutionary war, the real founder of the American Navy, died in Paris in 1792.

Walter Scott remembered how, when he was a small boy and snug a-bed in his home in Edinburgh, he used to listen for the sound of Paul Jones's guns in the Firth of Forth.

For Uncle Sam's sake and Paul Jones's—and John Bull's sake, for that matter—everybody will piously wish that the remains may be found. It is the sort of historic incident that would be sure to touch the heart and the imagination of the French people, who have never forgotten their comrades and allies of the revolutionary epoch.

The ashes of Paul Jones, presented in Paris by the French Government to the American Ambassador, escorted across the Atlantic by the American Fleet, received in Washington by the President, Senate, and House of Representatives—there's a pageant for you, and exactly the kind of one the American citizen of the new order would delight in.

For analogous instances one would recall the transport of the bones of “Theseus” to Athens, of the ashes of Germanicus to Rome, of the ashes of Napoleon from St. Helena to the Invalides.

Admiral Kamimura on Jujitsu.

According to a Reuter despatch from Tokio, Admiral Wamimura recently said to an interviewer, who asked him what constituted a peculiar characteristic of Japan's naval service, that over and above all the necessary training for an efficient service, such as would be found in the navies of this world, what he might claim as peculiarly Japanese was the training in Jujitsu and fencing. “They have no direct relation,” said the Admiral, “with the naval training of the modern system, but the indirect result is really wonderful. However expert a man may be in all the technical points of a naval man's education, if he lacks presence of mind his service counts very little in times of war. The training in Jujitsu not only develops a man's physical power and agility, but it also tends to make him resourceful in meeting all kinds of emergencies and surprises. Both in Jujitsu and in fencing, the primary and fundamental principle is the harmonious adjustment of man's mental and physical activities. When I took the cadets abroad on a navigation cruise, I found those who were experts in either of the two old arts were the most efficient and capable. Their physical development, together with mental activity, makes them able to stand hardships much better than ordinary men. My impression has been further strengthened by the present war. I would recommend not only naval men, but all young men, to devote some hours of their time to learning either one of the arts, or, still better, both of them. Their indirect benefit will be very great indeed in all walks of life.”

—WEATHER.—See our previous issue.

—TENNIS.—The Lawn Tennis Tournament at Paso Molino on Saturday last was a hollow victory for the Firefly Club, which won 26 sets to only 3 for the Albion Club. The totals in the different events were as follows:—Ladies' Doubles; Firefly, 3 sets, Albion 1; Mixed Doubles, Firefly, 15; Albion 1; Men's Doubles, Firefly 8, Albion 1. We recommend the Albions to take it out of the Fireflies at football. In the afternoon there was a very pleasant and well-attended social gathering round the tea tables.

—FOOTBALL.—The football season was opened by the Albion Club at Paso Molino on Sunday with a sharply contested match between Old and New Members, the veterans winning by 5 goals to 4. There was also a Club match on the Wanderers Field at Camino Millán. Other Clubs will commence shortly. There is every promise of an active and enthusiastic football season, and several recently formed Clubs will appear in the various competitions. No game has generalised itself here so rapidly and extensively as football has done, and of the rising generation there are now few who do not play it.

This has been mainly due to the Albion Club, which was the first to make it popular, for some 12 or 13 years ago it was practically unknown outside English-speaking circles, it remained unmentioned in the papers, and the matches did not attract the attention and crowds that they now do.

—THE LOTTERY.—From Buenos Aires comes the news that the Argentine and Uruguayan Governments are discussing the convenience of suppressing public lotteries in both Republics, pro-

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vide Brazil can be induced to do the same. The initiative comes from Argentina, where the lotteries have been disappearing in results as a support for public charities and are regarded as fomenting a vicious gambling spirit. (It might be added that there, there is little confidence in the way they are managed.) It was thought, however, of little use to suppress them, unless the Montevideo lottery was also suppressed, and, according to Buenos Aires papers, the Uruguayan Government will consent to this, provided Brazil falls into line.—As regards the Montevideo (or Caridad) Lottery, the *Telegrafo Marítimo* points out that there are two sides to the question, as it is in the main support of the Caridad Hospital and other important public charities, which otherwise would have to be sustained by fresh taxes. There is every confidence in the way the lottery is managed here, and, though lottery gambling is a vice, it cannot be said that it is worse or productive of worse evils than betting on races and other forms of gambling which it is practically impossible to eradicate, and some of which enjoy State recognition and protection. The question is evidently a debatable one, not to be decided too hastily.

—POLITEAMA THEATRE.—This evening there will be no performance. Tomorrow will be given the well-worn favorite “La Tempestad.”

—JUVENILE MURDERER.—The Prefect of Rivera has reported the murder of the policeman Juan Onofre Velasco by the lad Clemente Feliciano Castro, only 12 years of age. Velasco was taking a nap when Castro seized his carbine and shot him through the head. The juvenile murderer has been arrested.

—FATAL ACCIDENT.—At Florida station on Sunday, while some trains were being shunted, a married woman named Leopolda Curbelo de Martinez was caught between the buffers and crushed to death. It is said that the accident was due to her own imprudence.

—DEATH.—The death occurred yesterday, at an advanced age, of the much esteemed French resident Mr. Cesar Fournier. He was related by marriage to several prominent families, and leaves a large family of children and grandchildren to lament his loss. The funeral will take place in the Central Cemetery at 9.30 a. m. this morning.

—AMERICAN VOTES.—The total number of votes given in the recent Presidential election in the United States was 13,533,619, which was about 400,000 fewer than the votes cast in 1900. President Roosevelt received 7,640,560, against 5,093,891 given for Mr. Parker, a plurality of 2,546,669. The vote for other candidates was as follows:—Debs, Socialist, 392,857; Swallow, Prohibition, 248,411; Watson, People's Party, 124,381; and Corraigan, Socialist Labour, 33,519.

—POWER OF SEA WAVES.—At the International Engineering Congress some unusual figures were given on the subject of the power of ocean waves. It was stated that the depth to which wave action extends is now known to be much greater than was once commonly supposed. Proof of this is shown by the fact that lobster-pots, placed in from one hundred and twenty to one hundred and eighty feet of water, have been found to be filled with sand and shingle after a heavy gale. Moreover sand has been found deposited after a heavy gale in the gallery of the Bishop Rock Lighthouse, the latter being one hundred and twenty feet above the water, and the depth of the water at that point one hundred and fifty feet. That the water, even at considerable depths, must be moving during a gale with great momentum is shown by the fact that at the Peterhead breakwater blocks weighing forty-one tons and located over thirty-six feet below spring tide low-water were displaced during a storm, while a section of the breakwater weighing three thousand three hundred tons was moved bodily for a few inches without the brickwork being dislocated.

—MRS. KENDAL ON KISSING.—To a Leeds audience Mrs. Kendal has been giving a disquisition on kissing. It was natural, said Mrs. Kendal, to steal a kiss; to buy one was stupid. Proper is it to kiss one's sister, an obligation to kiss one's wife; an act of gallantry to kiss an ugly people. Devotedness was shown in kissing a faded widow—to kiss a young blushing widow was quite a different thing! To kiss three girls the same day was extravagance, whilst to kiss one's mother-in-law is a sacrifice.

—BIG ORDER.—New York has a new sensation. The *Telegraph* correspondent there tells us that a giant Dinosaur now adorns the American Museum of Natural History. The animal belongs to an old family that roamed the plains some three million years ago. Dear old Jumbo is next door, but the new-old Dinosaur takes up fifty times as much cubic space. A tea-party has actually been held under the lofty osseous framework (this is the description duly telegraphed at so much a word), and

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between the Dinosaurian legs twenty could dine. Cannot some English scientist fix us up with something equally novel and entertaining?

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LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, FEB. 27.

Their Majesties the King and Queen have received the gratifying intelligence of the betrothal of Princess Margaret, eldest daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Connaught to Prince Oscar, eldest son of the Crown Prince and Princess of Sweden and Norway.

His Majesty and the Prince of Wales were present on Saturday afternoon on the ground of the Queen's Club at West Kensington, and witnessed a football match between teams representative of the Army and Navy.

Arrangements for the visit of the Prince and Princess of Wales to India have been approved by the King.

Mr. Lloyd-George, M.P., addressed a crowded meeting in Whitefield's Tabernacle, Tottenham Court-road, yesterday on the unjust manner in which the Government were seeking to enforce the Education Act in Wales. He thought that matters would be precipitated within the next fortnight in Merionethshire.

As a result of the Beck case, the Lord Chancellor has introduced the Criminal Cases (Reservation of Points of Law) Bill, into the House of Lords.

After a speech, by Dr. Clifford, the Paddington Free Church Council, at their last meeting, passed a resolution protesting against the proposed rating of Nonconformist places of worship.

During the very severe weather of the week-end a number of wrecks have occurred around the coast. At Holyhead five men who put off in a sailing boat to the succour of two schooners were drowned. A French ketch went ashore at Poldhu, and the captain and another member of the crew lost their lives. Four bodies of British sailors have been washed ashore at Brest, and it is feared that some large vessel has gone down.

To-day's obituary includes the names of the Earl of Morley, until recently Chairman of Committees and Deputy-Speaker in the House of Lords, and of Sir Wemyss Reid, the distinguished author and journalist.

Saturday's football programme included two international matches. Ireland gained a victory over Scotland at Inverleith under Rugby rules, and drew with England in the Association game at Middlebrough. In the League competition, Everton, by beating Blackburn Rovers, were able to retain their place at the head of the table while Woolwich Arsenal further improved their position at the expense of Sheffield Wednesday.

A remarkable billiard display was witnessed in the Stevenson and Dawson match on Saturday. Stevenson won by 1,690 points, going out with an unfinished break of 592.

The text of the International Commission's report on the North Sea outages was issued on Saturday. It is in direct contradiction of the reports earlier published, and shows that the Commission makes no attempt to justify Admiral Rohdetsky's action. The opinion is also expressed that the Admiral ought in passing Dover to have signalled that the fishing fleet needed assistance. The report is regarded in this country as a triumph for arbitration.
