POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives no-quorummed on Tuesday. We suppose they have not yet rested sufficiently after the fetes.

The Executive, it is announced, is sending a Message to the Chamber presenting a fresh list of measures for consideration during the current extraordinary sessions. Among these will be the reformed (and most extravagant) scheme for a new Legislative Palace, but we cannot yet say what the others are. The most urgent and generally felt necessity is for some initiative in the way of labor legislation, but, judging from the tone of the official organs, which seem perfectly satisfied with the situation created by the recent strikes (though no one else is) we fear that this is not likely to be included. Anyhow, remembering the very dilatory fashion in which the legislators proceed with parliamentary business, we think that they have already quite as much before them as they are likely to get through before February next.

With regard to the War Loan, publication has been made of the Bill as amended by the Finance Committee of the Representatives, though not of the accompanying Report. Why the latter should be omitted, it is impossible to say, for it is certainly a matter of public interest—though public opinion counts for very little in the control of public affairs just now. The only two substantial amendments are, increase of the amount allotted to the Executive to cover the deficit of 1904-5 from \$1,000,000 to \$1,200,000; and deferring the service of interests until December 15.

With regard to the latter point, which was already known, the Association of Stock Farmers has presented a strongly worded protest to the Chamber. We quote the following passages:—"The majority of the stock-farmers injured by the late war, as also those who supplied live stock to the legal forces, still remain unpaid, though from twelve to eighteen months have elapsed since they have been deprived of the profits which they would have reaped at the time from the property they were compelled to hand over. Many of their credits have been pitilessly and unjustly cut down by the Classifying Commission; the valuation of the losses suffered and the stock supplied has been fixed at much less than their real value; the payment, in addition to being tardy, is and will be effected in bonds of Public Debt at face value, which signifies an appreciable loss. And now, as sequel to so much loss and detriment, it is proposed by the Committee of Finance to defer the service of interests of the Debt to the distant month of December, although the Executive, inspired with sentiments of justice, proposed that the interest should run from the 1st of last July, seeing that the injured parties had already suffered so much loss. The most absolute reason, right and justice are on the side of the stock-farmers represented in this petition, who, far from being indemnified for their losses, will receive barely half—who have been the most severely injured of all in their industry—who constitute the riches and vitality of the country—who, while they see other national industries inactive but intact and safe, find their own castigated by a long and cruel civil struggle which places their valuable interests under the domain of the primitive law of the strongest—who, in short, engaged in progressive and beneficial labor, have always been overtaken by all the civil wars which compel them to supply the armies with meat and horses, and do not

now deserve, at the moment of payment of their last supplies, to be deprived of six months interest, which, added to their other loss of interests, constitutes a considerable sum for them, though relatively insignificant for the State." For these reasons it is asked that the original date of July 1st be maintained for the service of interests. A more absolutely just petition could not be imagined! but—how much impression will it make on Chambers constituted like the present?

The *Dia* announces that, when the War Loan is discussed in the Chamber, some "colorado" Deputies will present an amendment, adding another million dollars to the amount of the Loan (making it nine millions) this additional sum to be destined to the erection of school buildings throughout the Republic. The object is excellent and sympathetic, but we think that it should be kept apart from what is essentially and exclusively a War Indemnity.

The Supply of Cotton.

London, Aug. 1.

The International Federation of Master Cotton Spinners' and Manufacturers' Associations yesterday held a meeting at the Hotel Metropole, under the presidency of Mr. C. W. Macara, to consider the position in the cotton trade in so far as the supply of raw material is concerned. Delegates were present from Austria, Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, Portugal, Spain, and Switzerland. The proceedings were private.

At the close of the meeting the Press representatives were informed that it had been decided to issue the following circular to every cotton spinner in Europe and America:

"An emergency meeting of the International Committee, called by telegraph, was held in London on July 31, 1905, with the object of considering what common action should be taken to counteract the pernicious effect on the trade brought about by the late enormous enhancement of the price of the raw material, due to the action of speculating rings.

"The meeting was attended by representatives of Austria, Belgium, England, France, Germany, Italy, Portugal, Spain, and Switzerland.

"The Committee were unanimously of opinion that the first object to be aimed at was to secure accurate statistics as to the amount of cotton at present under the control of spinners, and the extent of the engagements into which they have entered for delivery. Information of this character is necessary, as the speculations which are now paralyzing the industries are only possible on account of the circulation of grossly exaggerated and misleading figures in this respect, probably traceable to the speculating element itself. After carefully considering the reports given by the members of the Committee as to the conditions prevailing in the countries represented it appeared, though actual statistics were not available, that the European cotton spinning industry is at present engaged on the average for a period of three to four months ahead, and hold ample cotton supplies to more than cover these engagements.

"The Committee, therefore, are convinced that, with few exceptions, spinners do not need to enter the cotton market before the new crop arrives at the end of October, but that they are in a position to stand aside, leaving the speculators to deal as best they can with the conditions to which they have reduced the market.

"The Committee strongly urge every spinner in Europe and America to refrain from buying American cotton during the next three months, except for immediate wants and thus try to obviate the danger of the next cotton season commencing with the raw material at the extremely high price at present prevailing. There will be plenty of time when actual figures are available about the extent of the new crop to consider the situation that will then arise, and should the supply prove to be less than the demand to take such steps as are necessary to meet the conditions that will then prevail.

"At the same time the Committee feel sure that the surplus of last year's crop will guarantee a full supply even in the event of the next crop being small.

"The Committee also decided to organize at once a service of correct information as to the actual consumption of cotton throughout the world on the lines proposed at the last congress in Manchester, and hope to have an early opportunity of communicating the details of the scheme."

Sunday Rest.

We reproduce from the *B. A. Standard* the following translation of the Sunday Rest Bill recently presented to the Argentine Congress. A similar measure is much required here:—

Art 1.—In the capital of the Republic there is prohibited on Sundays, work of any material character for account of others, and that which is done for own account in a public manner, in factories, workshops, houses of business and other establishments or places of labour; without any further exceptions than those laid down in this Bill and in the regulations which may be passed for its enforcement.

Art 2o.—There shall be excepted from this prohibition, in conformity with the specifications and regulations which the Executive may pass:—

1.—Such work as may not be susceptible of interruption by reason of the nature of the necessities it supplies, for reasons of a technical character or for

those which may create grave prejudices to the public interest or to the industry itself, without the necessity of special authorization, in accordance with specifications which the regulations shall make for the different cases.

2.—The indispensable work of repair and cleanliness which become necessary so as not to interrupt the regular weekly labour in industrial establishments.

3.—Work which eventually may be preteritory on account of the imminence of danger, by reason of natural accidents or on account of other transitory circumstances which it is necessary to take advantage of.

In every case the regulations shall determine the weekly rest of those comprised in the exceptions.

Art 3.—No exception with respect to weekly rest shall apply to women under 16 years.

Art 4.—The clauses of this law shall not apply to domestic service.

Art 5.—The sale on Sunday of alcoholic beverages is prohibited, with the exception of beer.

Art 6.—Infractions of this law shall be considered as imputable to the employers of labour, except with proof to the contrary, and shall be punished, the first time with a fine of \$100, and in the case of re-occurrences with double fine and 15 days' imprisonment.

Art 7.—The present law shall come into force in 90 days from the date of its promulgation.

Russian Affairs.

We quote the following telegrams from our Buenos Aires contemporaries:—

Portsmouth, Aug. 28th.—The meeting on the plenipotentiaries that was to have taken place to-day has been put off until Tuesday. This is considered a favourable sign, as indicating that there is yet a possibility of matters being arranged. It appears from reports that the last proposal of the Japanese envoys was that Russia should purchase from Japan the northern part of Saghalien Island and pay a hundred million dollars gold for the expense of maintaining the prisoners of war. The total sum claimed by Japan amounts to 500 million dollars gold, which is more than the Russian envoys are authorised to consent to. The principle of pecuniary compensation which Japan insists upon, Russia rejects absolutely.

St. Petersburg, 27th.—Advices from Mittau, Courland, say that in view of the agitation prevailing the Governor has issued a proclamation ordering the troops to fire on any group of people without any warning whatever.

St. Petersburg, 27th.—The agrarian agitation continues, especially in the Caucasus. At Inchedadshara, in that territory, the peasants have rebelled, and have been fired upon by Cossacks, sent to restore order. An official report says that nineteen persons were killed, but private reports say that as many as seventy persons lost their lives.

St. Petersburg, 28th.—Advices from Kovno state that a partial state of siege has been proclaimed there, the formation of groups being prohibited, as well as all meetings. Certain persons are placed under the vigilance of the police.

St. Petersburg, 28th.—An Ukase orders the mobilisation of reserves in many districts to reinforce the army in Manchuria and orders the disbanding of the guards at the end of the month.

PEACE!

Yesterday's telegrams brought the news, hardly expected after those of the previous day, that peace was practically arranged between the Japanese and the Russian Commissioners at Portsmouth, in the meeting held on Tuesday afternoon. The following are the principal telegrams referring to the event:—

Portsmouth, 29th. (official).—It is confirmed that the Russian-Japanese delegates have arrived at a complete agreement. The treaty of peace will be drawn up forthwith, and probably an armistice will be arranged at once.

Portsmouth, 29th.—The Japanese plenipotentiaries have accepted the ultimatum of the Russian delegates, which rejects any indemnity and arranges for the division of Saghalien (or Sakhalin) island to be effected without any payment for redemption. Japan also gives way on the points of the Russian war-vessels interned in neutral ports and the limitation of Russian naval power in the Far East. Neither country is permitted to fortify Saghalien island or to use it for strategic purposes.

Afternoon telegrams, while confirming the arrangement of peace, say that the news has been received with great surprise and even incredulity in Russia, though nevertheless the terms are already claimed as a triumph for Russian diplomacy. On the other hand the terms have caused great dissatisfaction in Japan, it being thought that the Japanese delegates have allowed themselves to be "bluffed," and have made an unnecessary climb down, leaving Japan saddled with nearly all the heavy expenses of a war in which she was victorious, and with relatively few advantages gained.

There is thus an important saving both in bulk and in cost. to questions respecting the Colonial Conference. Mr. Balfour hinted at drastic action should a foreign syndicate acquire rights in certain Welsh coal areas. The Speaker declined to allow Mr. Keir Hardie to move the adjournment to call attention to the unemployed disturbance at Manchester, on the ground that no Government Department was impugned.

In Committee of Supply the Education Vote was discussed. Sir W. Anson sought to show that the Act of 1902 was working successfully and smoothly. A lively scene arose on Mr. Lloyd George contending that this was not so, and that false statements had been made.

Mr. Balfour informed a deputation yesterday that the Redistribution Bill which it was proposed to introduce next Session was already drafted, and that the Boundary Commission would be set up in the course of the autumn.

To-day is published an outline of the report of the Select Committee on the Telephone Agreement. Recommendations are made as to the terms of purchase, to ensure that the basis shall be the "then value" of plant, etc., without regard to such things as goodwill, but on the whole the agreement is approved. Finally proposals are made to secure the position of the telephone employees.

Earl Roberts addressed a large meeting at the Mansion House yesterday on the subject of Imperial defence. He alluded to the present state of the military forces of the country, and said in his opinion there was no option but to introduce universal training and service for home defence.

Several summonses arising from the unemployed riots at Manchester were yesterday adjourned for a week. At a demonstration held after the Police Court proceedings a telegram of congratulation from Mr. Keir Hardie was read amid much enthusiasm.

Lord Alverstone and Justice Lawrence and Ridley, in the King's Bench Division yesterday, had before them an application against Mr. Albert Osborn, solicitor, arising out of the Pollard divorce case. The matter was brought forward at the instance of the Law Society. In the result the Judges ordered Mr. Osborn to pay the costs.

Surrey yesterday defeated Middlesex in a County Cricket Championship match at the Oval by ten wickets. The other six first-class matches which were in progress were not completed, and will be continued to-day.

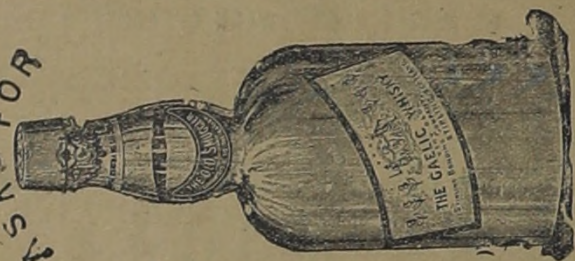

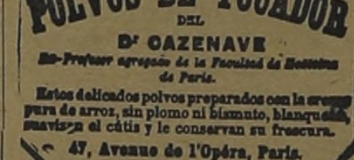
