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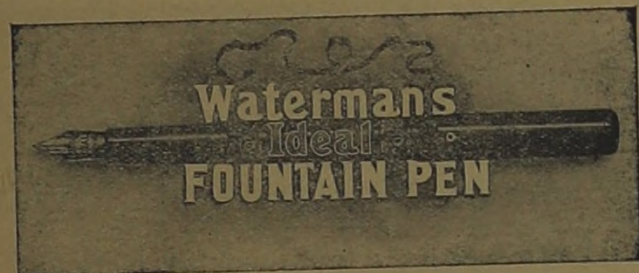

BANK OF THE REPUBLIC.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Tuesday. The Minister of Finance, Sr. Serrato, being present, discussion in detail commenced of the Bill creating the War Indemnity Loan. Dr. Arco formally presented his amendment increasing the amount of the loan by a million dollars, this sum to be devoted to building schools throughout the Republic.—Sr. Serrato said that the Government viewed the proposal with entire favor. The amount would be emitted gradually, and in view of the steady increase in the revenue, he did not anticipate any difficulty in meeting the additional interest.—Dr. Rodriguez Larreta asked why so high a rate of interest as 6 p. cent had been assigned to the Loan. He thought that 4 p. cent would be quite high enough.—Sr. Serrato explained that the object was to appreciate the quotation of the Loan. With this high rate of interest it would be quoted nearly at par, and the Government could pay the claims in bonds at their nominal value without committing an injustice. The service of the loan could be met out of ordinary revenue without misgiving.—Dr. Larreta maintained that so high a rate of interest would give rise to future difficulties. It was necessary to pay also the damages caused by the rebel troops, and this could be done, without sacrifice to the State, by increasing the amount of the Loan to ten or eleven millions and reducing the rate of interest to 4 p. cent. When the Chambers sanctioned the Interdiction Act, they recognised the right of those injured by the rebel troops to be indemnified, and this right was not cancelled by the withdrawal of the interdiction as a clause of peace. The service of the increased Debt at 4 p. cent was a less charge to the State than that now proposed.—Sr. Serrato raised several objections to this, among others that it would take over 50 years to redeem the Debt, instead of 33. It was the desire of the Government to liquidate the war without creating any new tax. The critical stage had passed, the Treasury having paid \$3,700,000 mobilisation expenses out of its ordinary resources, despite a drop of two millions in the revenue, and he did not think that the combination now proposed would be any burden to future administrations.—Dr.

B. Garcia thought the proposed increase in the amount of the Debt was inopportune. There were other branches of administration, especially the police service, that had more urgent needs, and the Budget was steadily increasing whilst it required reducing.—Dr. Paulier pointed out that the service of the extra million was less than half the sum paid annually for the rent of school buildings, so that the State would really gain on the transaction.—At this stage the Chamber adjourned.

With regard to the above it is worth pointing out that, while the Government party thus lightly views the addition of a million to the Loan and protests that the service can be met without difficulty; at the same time, under pretext of alleviating the difficulties of the Treasury, it is coolly proposed to deprive the claimants of six months' interest on their bonds, justly due to them. The inconsistency—or contradiction—is obvious, and for our part we cannot help thinking that the Government would do better to show itself honest before it is generous. The impropriety of mixing up a War Indemnity Loan with a grant for school buildings is another point that so far seems to have escaped notice. The two things should be kept distinct.

Appropos of the appearance of the *Diario Oficial*, now announced for today the *Tiempo* recalls that the Bill creating that journal, though approved by the lower Chamber, still lacks the sanction of the Senate, and is therefore not yet law. Moreover, the Constitution distinctly states that the creation of posts and assignment of salaries is the special prerogative of the Chambers. Nevertheless, the Government, by an Executive Decree, has done both, establishing the journal, creating an entire staff, and assigning their salaries, all without waiting for the sanction of the Chambers, and it has even gone further in ordaining on its own authority that the Chambers shall send the shorthand reports of their sittings to the *Diario Oficial* for publication. Thus there has been not merely a violation of constitutional prerogative, but also a deliberate slight to the Chambers, whose decision on the creation of the journal, the Executive thought it unnecessary to await. Suppose that the Senate disapproved the Bill, as is within its faculty—what would the Executive do then? For the matter of that, if we remember aright, the Bill is not even included in the topics of the Extraordinary Sessions. The irregularity could not be clearer, and we shall be curious to see what the official organs have to say to it, and how they reconcile government by autocratic Executive Decree with the alleged "institutionality" of the situation. The case is clearly one for the Permanent Commission, if that body fulfilled its constitutional duty and intent.

The Decree has been issued creating the Administration Council of the Military Hospital, which the Government has recently taken under its direct charge. The scientific direction is assigned to Col. Dr. E. Martinez, Chief of Military Sanitation. The guard and internal service of the Hospital will be carried out by the Corps of Ambulance-bearers.

The ladies' petition against the Divorce Bill now reaches some 60,000 signatures. The necessary stamps having been placed, it will be presented again and presumably admitted, though we do not suppose that it will have much effect.

A Centenarian and the Simple Life.

There has been forwarded to us a cutting from the *Norfolk Standard* containing an interview with an old lady of 103, Mrs. Rix, of Sprowston. Mrs. Rix declared her opinion that the young people of to-day will be unable to live to very old age.

"In my young days we went along quietly, lived on plain food, and were contented with what we had; but nowadays—everybody must rush and tear about if they are to get a living; they eat all sorts of new-fangled foods and what they call luxuries, things with no nourishment in them, drink a lot of stimulants—and are always grumbling and never feel properly well. Young men have to keep shut up in offices for long hours and young women are kept hard at work in stuffy shops. They never can live to old age. Oh, things are all wrong. People were far happier and better off in my early days than they are now. I would not like to be a young woman to-day. And the pride, sir. The pride is a curse. There was none of this pride in my early days. The squire, in my time, would come and sit down and chat with the poorest person. Now he goes to London into what is called Society, and comes back out of health because of what he has eaten and the rushing about to balls and dinners and all that sort of thing. We didn't want any of those old patent medicines when I was a girl. A little cooling medicine at the beginning of summer, that was all we required. We ate good wholesome food—and plenty of it—and drank good home-brewed ale.

"The simple life is the thing, but it is impossible in these times. You may talk about it; you won't get much further. People are after money, and they will do anything to get it. A lot of them won't live to get it at all, and those who do won't live long to enjoy it. Children are not born as strong now as they used to be. When young women have to work hard all their young time in shops and factories, how can you suppose they are fit to become mothers? Children are not looked after nowadays as they used to

be looked after. In my early days the poorest mother was careful of her children; now the poor little mites are both clothed and fed in the wrong way."

Mrs. Rix seems to extend her dislike of modern improvements over a wide field, for, having ascertained from her interviewer that he did not arrive on a bicycle, she exclaimed: "Ah, that is right; don't you ride those beastly things. These bicycles are dreadful, and so are those horrid motor-cars and trams. They are all going against the Almighty. What did He send horses for? Nobody cares about horses nowadays, but years ago people took a pride in them. There is nothing like a horse which you know you can trust."

The Inventor of Visible Speech.

The death, on August 7th, at Washington, D. C., is announced of the distinguished philologist, Professor Alexander Melville Bell. He was born in Edinburgh in 1819, and in 1840 became lecturer on elocution in the university of his native city. He also filled a similar position in the New College, Edinburgh, and subsequently was appointed to University College, London. In 1870, on account of the health of his surviving son, Mr. A. Graham Bell, celebrated now as the inventor of the telephone, he removed to Canada, where later on he became Professor of Vocal Physiology and Linguistics in Queen's College, Kingston, Ontario.

Professor Bell and his brother, the late Professor David Charles Bell, of Dublin, were the authors of *Bell's Standard Elocutionist*, as well known and popular now as when first issued forty years ago. His system of phonetic shorthand gained a medal of the Society of Arts, and he wrote several works on Vocal Physiology. His name, however, will go down to posterity as the inventor of *Visible Speech*, a system of alphabets, consisting of entirely new symbols, derived from the shapes of the organs of speech. To the initiated, such symbols, with their combinations, give instruction so clear and definite that it is claimed to cover all possible variety of sounds capable of being produced by human utterance, and this made it possible as the foundation of that dream of philologists, a universal language. Its utility for teaching the blind to read and the deaf mute to speak is well known and appreciated.

Russo-Japanese Affairs.

We quote the following telegrams from our Buenos Aires contemporaries:—

St. Petersburg, 10th.—Marshal Oyama, yesterday wrote to General Linievitch congratulating him on peace having been signed and asking him to appoint delegates to arrange an armistice. Marshal Oyama has appointed General Fukushima as his delegate and proposes Chukheiza as the place of meeting of the commission.

St. Petersburg, 11th.—General Linievitch, according to the petition of Marshal Oyama, has appointed General Oranovsky to arrange the armistice between the Russian and Japanese armies.

Tokio, 10th.—In political circles it is the general belief that the cabinet presided over by Count Katsura will shortly present its collective resignation to the Mikado. In various parts of the country there have been demonstrations against the signature of peace, and slight disorders have occurred.

Tokio, 10th.—It is said that the number of arrests effected in connection with the riots amounts to one thousand six hundred and fifty, and that one hundred and sixty prisoners will be tried by the courts. All the restaurants and bars have reopened. The city now presents a normal aspect.

St. Petersburg, 10th.—The British Consul in Baku has telegraphed to the British Ambassador, Sir Charles Hardinge, saying that the British subjects residing in Baku are now out of danger.

St. Petersburg, 10th.—Advices from Tiflis say that the situation in the Zangezur district is most grave. Many Armenian towns have been wiped out of existence. The dead in all of them are counted by hundreds. All the Tartar population has risen. Four thousand armed Kurds from Persia have joined the insurgents.

London, Sept. 11th.—Accounts continue to arrive from Russia of the chaos and anarchy existing in the Trans-Caucasus, and of the fearful atrocities committed by the Tartars, who have massacred the Armenians wholesale, sparing neither man, woman or child. The Tartars, over thirty thousand in number, are well armed with rifles, bayonets, revolvers, etc., and in addition possess several field guns. They have also been reinforced by a small army of Kurds, 7000 in number, thus far out-numbering the regular troops who are unable to show front to them. Balakhan, Baku and Shusa are little more than ruins, with corpses lying in heaps about the streets. All the foreign residents have fled for safety. The crops are destroyed and thousands are starving. Orders have been given that all rebels captured are to be shot without mercy, an order that has only roused them to a greater pitch of fury. Although order has been partly restored in Baku, the rising is extending through other parts of the Caucasus. It is rumoured that several of the Powers are sending a joint note to the Russian Government demanding guarantees for the lives and interests of their respective subjects residing in the Empire.

SUNDRIES.

—WEATHER.—Still brilliantly fine, with less wind, and a fresh, invigorating temperature.

—MAILS.—The R. M. S. "Clyde," bringing London dates to August 24 or 25, is expected tomorrow morning, and will sail homeward bound on Saturday the 10th instant.

—ENTERTAINMENT.—We remind our readers that tickets are now on sale for the Amateur Dramatic Performance of the Entertainment Society at the Victoria Hall on Monday evening next. Tomorrow tickets will be available for the general public.

—THE "DIARIO OFICIAL".—This long-threatened journal made its appearance yesterday, its offices having been established at Calle Florida 115A. It consists of 16 pages, small size, and is printed clearly and in good type. The contents of the first number are mostly old, consisting of reports of back sittings of the Chambers, and of Decrees and other official documents already familiar. Still, it is useful to have the full and official text of these, for it does not always appear in our other contemporaries. The *Diario Oficial* is not allowed to enter into comments on political questions—which is a blessing.

—URQUIZA THEATRE.—This evening the French Company will give "Rip-Rip" (Rip Van Winkle) a most delightful operetta, with charming music by Planquette, an interesting story, picturesque effects and a ballet.

—POLITEAMA THEATRE.—There will be a double programme this evening, consisting of the two popular operas "Pagliacci" and "Cavalleria Rusticana."

—THE STRIKES.—The journeymen bakers' strike has already fizzled out. It was a foolish and motiveless affair, anyhow.

—DEATH PENALTY.—The Military Fiscal has applied to the Permanent Council of War for penalty of death on Esigun Lauretino Paz, sergeant V. Esidoro and the soldier A. Pacifico, and of ten years' imprisonment on Capt. Pedro Paz, for the cold-blooded murder of of Martín Fernandez, in the Dept. of Rivera, during the civil war last year. All formed part of the national guards (defenders of institutions) under command of the redoubtable Julius Cesar Barrios. The orders for the assassination were imparted by Capt. Paz (father of the Esigun) and carried out by the others, Fernandez being seized and dragged out of his own house for the purpose. His body was found with the throat cut and horribly mutilated, as if by savages.

—LOCUSTS.—There is a serious outbreak of locusts in various parts of Argentina this year, and there are lively fears that they may yet find their way to this Republic, as large clouds have been reported from Entre Rios and Corrientes, close to the banks of the Rio Uruguay. The residents of Salto and Paysandú, as being the first threatened, are already concerning steps to combat the dread and voracious insect, should it make its appearance. It is now several years since there has been any serious outbreak of locusts in this Republic.

JAPANESE NAVAL CATASTROPHE.—Yesterday's telegrams report a terrible catastrophe to the battleship "Mikasa," one of the finest in the Japanese navy and flagship of the redoubtable Admiral Togo, in Sasebo bay. A violent fire broke out on board which promptly reached the powder magazine, causing a terrible explosion and the immediate sinking of the vessel. According to first accounts there were only five killed but there are 343 wounded and 251 missing. Eleven officers were wounded and five are missing. Admiral Togo was on board at the time, but we understand that he escaped. A late telegram attributes the catastrophe to the criminal act of the opponents of peace.

—LOUIE FULLER.—A Berlin telegram says that the celebrated serpentine dancer Loie Fuller, who is in Berlin just now, has met with an automobile accident. The machine ran into a ditch and upset, its occupants being much injured.

—THE "ENTENTE".—From a recent London paper.—I was a participant in a curious scene, which proves how cordial is the feeling towards France. In the great Popular Café in Piccadilly at lunch the orchestra played the Marseillaise. Immediately it concluded there was applause from everyone present. Then the orchestra followed with the National Anthem, and all rose to their feet and cheered. Imagine the scene: the customary restraint of strangers in a restaurant broken through by a common sentiment. Not even in a time of rejoicing such as marked the conclusion of Peace or the Coronation of the King have I known hundreds of people—probably as cosmopolitan as you could find, for folks from all parts of the world lunch in Piccadilly at this time of the year—applaud equally enthusiastically the national songs of France and Great Britain.

—LATEST.—Today's story: "No," said the lion-tamer to Patsy Flannigan, "you cannot have a job to look after the animals; but our pet lion died last week, and we've kept the skin, so I'll give you two pounds a week to dress up as a lion." "Two pounds!" cried Flannigan. "Good gracious, is there so much money to be had for the asking? Right, sir, I'll be your lion." So Patsy dressed up as the lion, and lay down in his cage. The menagerie doors opened, and the performance began. "Ladies and gentlemen," said the keeper, "to show the wonderful docility of these animals, we will now place the lion

in the cage with the tiger." Patsy gave a horrified whisper—"Man, are you mad? Think of me poor wife and children! Get in was the stolid keeper's reply, "or I'll run this pitchfork through you—you are keeping everybody waiting." Patsy thought he might as well do in one way as in another, so he crawled into the tiger's cage. When he saw the animal's big, ferocious eyes fixed on him, he uttered a doleful wail, and commenced praying in Irish. The tiger walked over to him. "What's the matter with ye?" asked the tiger. "Shure man, ye needn't be afraid. I'm Irish meself!"

LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, AUG. 14.

As a fitting conclusion to the fêtes associated with the visit of the French fleet, members of both Houses of Parliament on Saturday entertained Admiral Caillard and a large number of officers as well as many other French guests in Westminster Hall.

The gathering was a brilliant one, and the proceedings were of a most enthusiastic character. The Lord Chancellor proposed the toast of "The King," and the Speaker that of "President Loubet." Mr. Balfour submitted "The French Navy," to which the Commander-in-Chief of the visiting squadron replied. Mr. John Morley acknowledged the "Houses of Parliament" given by one of the junior Admirals of the French Navy.

At Portsmouth there was a long programme of festivities. An interesting feature for the French officers and men was the landing of the King and Queen at the dockyard and their departure for London. The French vessels sail to-day.

Mr. Chandler, lately American expert in Northern Nigeria for the British Cotton Growing Association, says that an African can live well on a penny a day, and luxuriate on two pence.

A new coalfield of rare value has been discovered at Hmley, in the Black Country.

Official figures issued at Whitehall show that there has been a considerable decrease of pauperism in that borough, as compared with the rest of the metropolis and England and Wales.

Difficulty has arisen in Worcester-shire in dealing with the large claims set up on the reduction of public-house licences. The Licensing Committee are proceeding on the basis of striking an average of the gross estimated rentals under the poor rate and income tax assessment.

Lancashire won their twelfth victory in the County Cricket Championship on Saturday at the expense of Kent, whom they defeated by eight wickets, while Warwickshire beat Northamptonshire by nine wickets. The game Essex v. Nottingham at Leyton resulted in a draw, the chief feature of the last day's play being the completion of a magnificent innings of 274 by A. O. Jones.

TUESDAY, AUG. 15.

The King left Charing Cross yesterday for Port Victoria, on route to Maricbad.

The departure of the French Fleet from Portsmouth, yesterday, was the occasion of another brilliant spectacle. The British men-of-war were dressed in rainbow fashion, and they fired salutes as the French vessels steamed out of harbour. The departing guests returned the salutes.

Before leaving, Admiral Caillard paid a farewell visit to the Mayor at the Town Hall to express his thanks for the magnificent reception and entertainment of his officers and men. To a Press correspondent Admiral Caillard also expressed gratification. He would report to his Government what he had seen and experienced, and was convinced that all France would be profoundly gratified.

A Llangollen correspondent sends a report of the opening yesterday of the first permanent revolt school in Merioneth. This carries out Mr. Lloyd-George's threat as to meeting the attacks of the Education Department.

The Royal Academy, in their reply to the report of the House of Lords Select Committee on the Chantry Trust propose the appointment of two sub-committees of not more than three members of the Academy, each committee consisting of painters or sculptors alone, to recommend works for purchase, the power of purchase, however, to remain with the council as at present.

With the object of promoting the spirit of kindness, our Dumb Friends' League are inaugurating a series of shows of donkeys and goats worked during the summer months at seaside resorts, the first being held at Littlehampton yesterday. They are also establishing a hospital for sick or injured animals in Belgrave-road, Chelsea.

There was a great rush of unemployed to be registered at West Ham yesterday, this being a preliminary to a demand that the new Act shall be put in operation in that borough.

The magistrate at Clerkenwell declined yesterday to grant a license permitting nine or ten children to appear in a stage play at Camden Theatre till he had a guarantee that they would be free at 10 p. m.

Two men, named Antonelli and Barberi, were charged on remand at Bow-street yesterday with inciting to murder by means of articles published in a paper called "L'insurrezione." One of the police witnesses, in reply to counsel for Antonelli, denied that the information was given by a female police spy. Both the accused were committed for trial, bail being refused.

England scored 381 for seven wickets in the course of the opening day's play in the final Test match against the Australians at the Oval yesterday, the total including a magnificent innings of 144 by C. B. Fry, F. S. Jackson and Hayward also gave a fine display of batting, scoring 76 and 59 respectively.

Four matches in the County Cricket Championship were commenced yesterday. The heaviest scoring took place at Derby, where Surrey enjoy a distinct advantage against the home county, having scored 237 for three wickets in response to a total of 207, the visitors' innings including a brilliantly played 139 not out by Hayes. At Bristol, Gloucestershire, with seven wickets to fall in their first innings, are ahead of Lancashire.

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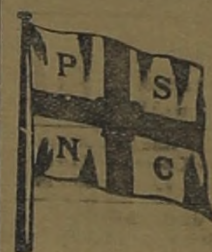

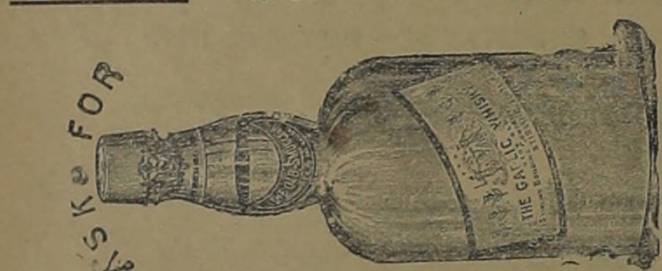
