NEWS OF THE DAY.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Senators sat on Friday and made some further progress with the second discussion of the Bill of Diplomatic and Consular Reform. Several fresh amendments were introduced, but nothing of general interest transpired (the discussion of this Bill, which has already occupied an extraordinary amount of parliamentary time, threatens to be interminable. When the Senators have finished with it, it will have to return to the other Chamber for discussion of numerous amendments).

There is a good deal of excitement in political circles over the Board Elections in Treinta y Tres, which should take place to-day, though there is an idea that they may again be postponed. The elections themselves are only of secondary importance, but the procedures of the Executive in the first place, and the protests and counter-protests of the contending parties in the second, have succeeded in creating high feeling and an unpleasant impression.—On Friday the Permanent Commission had a lengthy and agitated sitting to deal with two fresh protests presented by the local "colorados." As a result it was resolved again to warn the Executive that the local Electoral Board had violated the law in the selection of the polling place, (the imputation has been vigorously denied by the Board) and to refer the second question to the Judicial Power. Meanwhile a decidedly bad impression has been caused by the announcement of the determination of the Executive again to send military forces to the spot, after the Senate had declared the step to be a violation of the law. As first result of this, the local nationalists have declared that they will abstain from voting, by way of protest and as declaration that they do not consider themselves guaranteed. As to the pretended consultation of the Chambers on the point, nothing further has been heard. Incidentally it is amusing to hear the local "colorados" complaining of the "exclusive" proceedings of the nationalists—the complaint comes poorly from a party that makes intense exclusiveness part of its system and aims at a monopoly of political authority. A good deal of the trouble arises out of the unpopularity of the Prefect Sr. Basilio Saravia, whom the nationalists of the Department not unnaturally regard as their foe; the case illustrating once more the great necessity of limiting or abolishing the prerogative of the President in the appointment of these officers. The whole affair is provoking some sharp criticisms from our non-official contemporaries, and one of them piquantly points out that, while the idea of the nationalists establishing a feud in the Departments where they were in a majority led the "colorados" to declare civil war, the latter have no hesitation in trying to establish a feud throughout the whole republic. For the nationalists to have any authority, even when entitled to it by their numbers, was regarded as intolerable and "subversive," but it is quite right that "colorados" should be in authority, no matter where. They expect the nationalists to submit to their control without a murmur, but if a nationalist where put in authority over them, they would be up in arms instantly. This comes to the point we have often urged, namely that the dominant faction has not, and never has had, the slightest notion of fair-play and equality of conditions—they seek to establish conditions for others to which they themselves would not submit for a moment, and they condemn in others practices of which

they themselves are guilty in a far higher degree. Naturally, while this is the case, while there is no sense of political justice and equality, there never will be real peace nor political content.—Anyhow, the affair is not done with yet and is causing some apprehension.

The Decree has been issued from the Ministry of Finance appointing Dr. J. Zorrilla de San Martín as accountant general and chief of emission of the Bank of the Republic for a term of three years. This is in place of Sr. Bernabé Quiñones, whose term expires tomorrow. Dr. San Martín's high character and personal popularity has caused the appointment to be well received, though we are not aware that he has any knowledge or experience of banking affairs or was even a man of business. Special aptitude, however, has very little to do with appointments now-a-days.

Sr. Rufino Domínguez has left to assume his new post as Minister in Rio Janeiro, and in the course of the week Dr. L. Garibaldi will leave to resume his post as Minister in Germany.

The return here is announced for Thursday next of Sr. E. Acevedo Díaz, Minister to the United States. It is expected that this will be the forerunner of his appointment to the similar post in Argentina. The official organs say that his "friends" are preparing a hearty reception for him. This may be so, but a great many of the Republic are unable to forget how large a share he had in bringing about the civil war of last year.

Confectioners and the Sugar Convention.

London, Sept. 7.

The annual meeting of the Confectioners' Association of the United Kingdom was held yesterday at the Royal Agricultural Hall. Among those present were some identified with the confectionery trade of Greenock, the only town in the United Kingdom whose sugar refineries have benefited—and that only in a small degree—from the operation of the Sugar Convention. All agreed in regarding the Convention, apart from the Sugar Tax, as one of the greatest errors a British Parliament ever committed.

The chair was occupied by Mr. Edwards (Leicester), who, in moving the adoption of the annual report, referred to the representations made to the Chancellor of the Exchequer last February in favour of the abolition of the Sugar Tax and the abandonment of the Brussels Convention. Those identified with the sugar-using industries, he said, had a strong case on both points, but not strong enough to convince a Chancellor of the Exchequer who was determined to get as much out of sugar as he possibly could. The Sugar Tax, he said, had been an injustice to sugar users, but the Convention—one of the most foolish arrangements ever entered into by so-called British statesmen—had added to their embarrassment.

The Tory Press frequently asserted that to-day sugar was cheaper than ever it was. He found by comparing notes that, whilst a few years ago beetroot sugar was quoted at 6s. 3d., to-day it was 8s. 10d. When it was the former price no duty was imposed, but now there was a duty to be met on the latter.

Last February they were told by the Chancellor of the Exchequer that the high price of sugar was the result of the short crop on the Continent. That representation had been largely falsified by events. If there had been a short crop of sugar in February, March, and April of this year there would have been a sugar famine in June, July, August, and September. Instead of this, they had experienced an increased quantity and a reduced price.

Those facts, he contended, proved that it was not a short crop but a restricted area of supply, that had affected prices, enabling speculators to corner supplies and hold them up for the higher prices. ("Hear, hear," and applause.) The Sugar Convention enabled those speculators to operate in a way they would not have been able to if consumers and users had been in a position to obtain supplies from all quarters of the globe.

No Government, the President thought, would be simple enough to renew the Convention when it terminated. When it came to an end, and when the Sugar Duty was abandoned, prosperity would return to the confectionery trade—a trade which employed ten times more labour and capital than did the sugar-refining industry in its most flourishing days. (Applause.)

Mr. Clarke Saunders, in supporting the report, remarked that the contention in some quarters was that the cause of the decrease in the national drink bill was mainly attributable to the increase in the consumption of confectionery. He should not be surprised if in the future chancellors of the Exchequer looked to sugar and confectionery as one of the main sources of the national income. (Laughter.)

Losses Due to Insects.

That the methods of controlling insect pests, resulting from the studies of the Bureau of Entomology and of the official entomologists of the various States, have resulted in greatly cutting down the annual loss from the depredations of insects, owing to the adoption of these methods by progressive farmers and fruit-growers, is asserted by the writer of a note on this subject in *The Scientific American*. He says:—

"Familiar illustrations of savings from insect losses will occur to any one familiar with the work in economic or applied entomology in this country. The cotton-worm, before it was studied and the method of controlling it by the use of arsenicals was made common knowledge, levied in bad years a tax of \$30,000,000 on the cotton crop. The prevention of loss from the Hessian fly, due to the knowledge of proper seasons for planting wheat, and other direct and cultural methods, results in the saving of wheat to the farm value of from \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000 annually. Careful statistics show that the damage from the codling moth to the apple is limited two-thirds by the adoption of the arsenical sprays, banding and other methods of control, representing a saving of from \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000 in the value of this fruit product alone. The existence and progress of the citrus industry of California were made possible by the introduction from Australia of a natural enemy of the white scale, an insect pest which was rapidly destroying the orange and lemon orchards, this introduction representing a saving to the people of that State of many million dollars every year. The rotation of corn with oats or other crops saves the corn crop from the attacks of the root-worm to the extent of perhaps \$100,000,000 annually in the chief corn-producing regions of the Mississippi valley. The cultural system of controlling the boll-weevil is already saving the farmers of Texas many millions of dollars, and, in fact, making the continuance of cotton-growing possible; and scores of similar illustrations could be cited."

About Barnum.

Orators and writers who have been quoting as the words of Abraham Lincoln that well-known sentence, "You can fool all the people some of the time, and some of the people all the time, but not all the people all the time," will be surprised to hear that it was not uttered by President Lincoln at all. The assistant-librarian at the Library of Congress, having been questioned as to when Lincoln uttered the words has replied that the sentence does not occur in any of Lincoln's speeches or writings, and that Mr. Nicolay, the secretary to Lincoln, and his co-biographer with Mr. Hay, told him that the words were attributed wrongly to the President. The librarian went on to inform his correspondent that they were said by P. T. Barnum, the show man, and got attached wrongly to Abraham Lincoln.

Barnum was an extraordinary man, quite capable of uttering the epigram which has been attributed to Lincoln. He had an intimate knowledge of the Bible, and used it sometimes very artfully. For instance, when he first started the American Museum in New York he was afflicted with requests from ministers for free passes to his show. He printed hundreds of cards, denouncing the evil of "free passes," supporting his notion by liberal quotations from Scripture. For instance, he gave these texts: "Thou shalt not pass" (Numb. 20, 18); "Beware that thou pass not" (2 Kings 6, 9); "Though they roar, yet can they not pass" (Jeremiah 5, 23). He wound up his abbreviated texts with this polite hint to the clergy: "So he paid the fare thereof, and went." (Jonah 1, 3.)

Nothing pleased Barnum more than to have his show denounced from the pulpit. He saw in such an incident a fine chance for advertisement, and frequently issued a challenge to the clergyman to come and see the show for himself and withdraw his criticisms. "The American people like to be humbugged," was one of his remarks, and certainly he humbugged the public so cleverly that it proved the truth of what he said. For instance, once his circus was full of people, and outside there were crowds waiting to come inside. Barnum painted in big letters "This way to see the Circus." The crowd, thinking it was a new and still stranger beast than any they had seen, rushed down the corridor, only to find themselves in the street. Thus Barnum cleared his show, and enabled the newcomers to enter the circus!

—**WEATHER.**—There was the usual daily variation yesterday. During the night the wind veered to the south-east or pampero quarter, giving us a fine fresh day, but windy. The symptoms are still unsettled, leaving an uncertain outlook for to-day.

—**GOMEZ CELEBRATIONS.**—To-day the city will be made lively by the Gomez celebrations, which will commence with the arrival of his remains at the mole at 9.30 in the morning. The President of the Republic and all the leading functionaries are expected to attend the function at the Solis Theatre in the evening. As the affair is not of much interest to our readers we do not dwell on it at length.

—**FANCY DRESS DANCE.**—We remind our readers that tickets are on sale for the Calico Fancy Dress Dance of the Entertainment Society on Wednesday evening next. —**POLITEAMA THEATRE.**—The Opera Company will close its visit this evening with a performance of Ponchielli's "Gioconda" (without the ballet).—Fatima Miris will pay a return visit of six nights, commencing on Tuesday next.

—**THE ARGENTINE STRIKES.**—Yesterday's telegrams from Buenos Aires represent the situation as steadily growing more serious. The paralisation in the port and shipping movement is practically complete, as also in Rosario, and it is expected that a more or less general railway strike will be declared to-day. The Government will probably declare a state of siege, and the strikers threaten to reply to this by provoking a general strike of all trades and industries. At Rosario a man who was endeavouring to work has been murdered in most cowardly manner by the strikers, a crime that deserves the severest punishment.

—**THE "BLADON" SALVED.**—The good news was received yesterday of the successful salvage of the English str. "Bladon," which had been ashore near Cape Santa Maria since Tuesday. She was got off yesterday morning and towed into Maldonado harbour, where she will remain until calmer weather permits her to be brought down to Montevideo. She will have to be docked for repairs as her rudder and stern post are broken, besides possible injuries to the hull. All her cargo has been salvaged, except the coal which was jettisoned. This important salvage is another victory for the indefatigable Lussich and Co.

—**ANOTHER MARITIME CASUALTY.**—The German ship "Parasosos," which left this port for Europe on Friday afternoon, grounded on the dangerous "English Bank" during the night, and is reported as in a critical situation. Lussich's tug, on their way down from the salvage of the "Bladon," have gone to her rescue, but with the stiff gale blowing yesterday and consequent rough sea they will have a troublesome task.

—**CASINO.**—There will be the usual afternoon performance to-day, at which the clever duettists Asenari-Cavalli and the rest of the Company will appear.—An interesting debut here next Tuesday will be that of "Rosa," an enlightened mare who spells, does sums, answers questions, and performs many other strange feats.

—**CONTRABAND WHOLESALE.**—From the *B. A. Standard*:—A rather startling discovery has been made in the Custom House of the existence of a corporation, society or company that undertook a systematic contraband trade, under the very nostrils of inspectors, officials, etc., some of whom are suspected of being accomplices. The articles contrabanded, needless to say, are fine silken goods, lace goods and expensive stuffs of all descriptions. An idea of the magnitude of this fraudulent business cannot be formed at present, but that the National Treasury loses several millions of gold dollars annually, there cannot be the shadow of a doubt. The Custom House, in times of protection and high duties, is proverbially the "bête noire" of Governments, all the world over.

—**BURGLES, V.C.**—From a London paper of recent date:—Samuel Grice, formerly a soldier in the British Army, has just been convicted at Salt Lake, U.S.A., of burglary, and has been sentenced to twelve years' imprisonment. Grice served in the Afghan War of 1877, and during the campaign saved the life of Lord Roberts, under whom he was serving. The present head of the Army was then in command of a small force of soldiers which had become surrounded

by a horde of tribesmen. General Roberts had his horse shot under him, and was lying pinned to the ground, when Grice rushed to his aid, freed him from the animal, and, mounting him upon his own horse, galloped back to the British lines. In the retreat which followed it was decided to abandon the British artillery, and Grice, after the guns had been once left, returned to them and spiked the whole nine cannon. For his bravery he received the Victoria Cross from the hands of Queen Victoria herself. Since going to America the ex-soldier has been repeatedly in trouble, and has served a couple of terms for burglary.

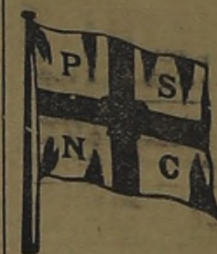

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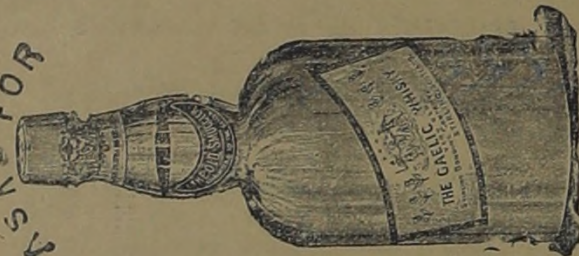

SHORT STORY

HIS FATHER'S CRIME.

The voyage was dreary enough. There were no fast liners then; the accommodation was bad and water scarce; but such inconveniences were made light of when they were sure that wealth was awaiting them at the end of their journey.

It had been agreed that, after completing the business, Delaine should return to their lodgings. They were rather surprised not to find him there when they got back from their perambulations, and surprise changed to alarm when hour after hour passed and still he did not come. Foley and Gregson armed themselves and set out to meet their comrade; but, although they spent nearly the whole night in the search, they failed to find him. In the morning they went down to the bank to see if they could get any clue to his whereabouts.

Before they reached the building Foley felt that something was wrong, but, even when the proofs were before him, it took him some time to realize that their comrade had betrayed his trust and absconded with all their hard-earned wealth. Pursuit was out of the question, as submarine cables did not exist in those days.

The next few months were the most miserable Foley had ever spent. Fortune seemed to have deserted him and his comrade, and ill luck dogged their footsteps. Gregson was shot one evening in a brawl, and a week afterwards Fenton was down with fever and died. Utterly disgusted with the place, Foley worked his way to the United States.
