POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives held a special sitting on Monday for discussion of the Rocha electoral question, pending since January last. Dr. V. Ponce de Leon attacked the Report of the Committee, asserting that it was merely a device to keep the nationalists out of seats which they had lawfully gained. This was followed by a heated discussion, in which some violent partisan recriminations were exchanged, the proceedings at times varying on the disorderly. Dr. M. C. Martinez, pointed out that, to suit partisan purposes, it was now sought to annul votes and inscriptions which had been admitted as legal at previous elections. In the course of the debate it was admitted that there was a large number of vicious inscriptions of both parties on the register. Eventually the Chamber adjourned, to resume the discussion on Thursday.—The tone of the debate and the whole affair reveals once more the fatal error of the Constitution in referring these electoral disputes, which ought to be decided judicially, to Chamber animated by partisan passion and with a majority that place partisan interests above every other consideration.

The presidential problem continues to furnish material for our contemporaries, though, as far as facts go, there is practically nothing to add to what we have already stated. Whatever manoeuvres or intrigues the official faction are engaged in, are being carried on very quietly, we might even say surreptitiously, as if the problem were one with which public opinion had no concern, and any expression of it was rather undesirable than otherwise. This is the way of the official factions from time immemorial, the men may change, but not the practices.

Yesterday's *Siglo* quotes the following passage written by Sr. Batlle when he was editor of the *Diario*, just before the coup d'état of 1898:—"The future is assured. No longer are there any pretorian hosts capable of attempts against the sovereignty of the people when the latter, in the exercise of their rights, demanded obedience to their decisions. There is now beginning to make itself felt in politics a new factor—new, because public opinion has been ignored for many years. And when the hour arrives for great decisions affecting the progress or the ruin, the grandeur or the desolation of the Republic, this factor will prove irresistible." These, as the *Siglo* admits, are noble words. When he uttered them, Sr. Batlle himself was on the side of "public opinion"—it would be rash to say that he is still on the same side. Supposing—what is quite possible—that public opinion should demand the elimination of the "official" candidate to the presidency in favor of a more worthy or popular candidate, it would be interesting to know how far Sr. Batlle would be prepared to recognize it as a new and irresistible factor in politics, or whether a fresh attempt against the mythical sovereignty of the people would not be perpetrated, by the members of the official faction, depending in the last resort on "pretorian hosts" for protection against any endeavor to resist their power? We fear that the question answers itself. The mere fact that, seventeen months before the constitutional date, the official faction are preparing to decide the presidential problem without pretence of consulting public opinion or any interests except their own, shows plainly enough that the "sovereignty of the people" is once more reduced to a complete myth, and this, under the government of the man who, seven years ago, so vigorously upheld it.

Centenary of the Battle of Trafalgar.

Great Enthusiasm in London.

We reproduce the following telegram from the B. A. Standard:—

London, Oct. 21st.—The first centenary of the naval battle of Trafalgar was celebrated with extraordinary enthusiasm, not only in this Capital to-day, but throughout all the British Empire and in all the vessels of the Navy. The historic vessel "Victory," on board of which Nelson died, and which is moored in Portsmouth roads, was adorned with thousands of crowns and to-night was brilliantly illuminated.

It had been resolved to illuminate also Nelson's Monument in Trafalgar Square, for which preparations had been made; but at the last hour the idea was abandoned, as it was feared that there would be such a crowd of people that some lamentable accident would take place.

The festivities were initiated in front of the said monument and when from the top of it there appeared the flags signifying the historic order that day given by Nelson: "England expects that every man" etc., the immense crowds broke forth into an almost interminable cheer, which echoed through the immense square.

At the time the weather was extremely cold, threatening rain; but this did not diminish the enthusiasm of the people.

Trafalgar square was brilliantly illuminated, and was the centre where the great mass of people congregated.

At the foot of Nelson's monument there have been placed thousands of crowns sent from the cities and provinces of the United Kingdom and also

from the Colonies. Amongst these crowns could be seen various bearing this inscription: "To the memory of the brave sons of France and Spain who fell in the great battle." Nelson's monument was also covered with innumerable wreaths of laurel.

This morning a detachment of cadets of the Naval Brigade arrived from Portsmouth. After marching past in front of the monument and presenting arms; the cadets placed a wreath sent by the Admiral commanding at that naval station.

About mid-day various military bands of music played in Trafalgar Square the National Anthem, which was sung by the people who filled the square from one end to the other.

During the day religious services were held in all the churches. These were very impressive and solemn, especially the service in St. Paul's Cathedral, where rest the remains of Nelson.

To-morrow there will also be religious services in all the churches, that in St. Paul's being of an official character, and will be attended by the chief officers of the Navy and also these of foreign navies.

The Naval League propose that Trafalgar Square should be enlarged and beautified, and that there should be placed in the square various statues and fountains symbolical of the naval power of Great Britain.

A grand festival in celebration of the centenary was held in the Albert Hall, attended by many distinguished persons and officers of the Army and Navy. Various speeches were delivered.

Weddings.

A very pretty wedding was that which took place on Saturday evening last between Mr. Albert C. Lichtenberger (of the staff of Barclay and Co.) and Miss Hilda Miller, third daughter of the late Mr. Samuel Miller of this city. Both civil and religious ceremonies took place in the house of the bride's sister Mrs. A. B. Powers, Calle Soriano 191, which was charmingly arranged for the occasion. The house was thronged with relatives and friends—including a notable number of youngsters of both sexes—when, soon after 9 p. m. a festive march was struck up on the piano, and a procession of charming children, most of them part of the family, preceded the approach of the bride who, conducted by her brother Mr. E. M. Miller, looked most handsome and sympathetic in a rich bridal robe, train and veil, and carrying a beautiful bouquet of white flowers, the gift of the best man Mr. Alfred Davis. She was attended by her sister Miss Carlota Miller, Miss Jessie Ayre and four other young ladies in very pretty costumes of pale pink, blue and maize. The civil rite was performed by the Justice of the Peace Sr. Brignoli, the witnesses being Messrs. A. B. Powers, H. C. Lichtenberger, H. M. Miller and J. S. McGarrell. After a short interval the procession was repeated, and the Consular Chaplain the Rev. H. A. Allpass took his place at an improvised altar and performed the Anglican marriage service, which was followed with respectful attention by all present. The joyous strains of Mendelssohn's Wedding March announced the conclusion and the newly-married pair were overwhelmed with congratulations and good wishes, the blushing bride being nearly smothered in the embraces of her numerous lady friends. The rest of the evening was devoted to gaiety and dancing, kept up with spirit until an advanced hour. In due time there was an adjournment to the dining room, where there was a most tastefully arranged buffet and when the champagne had been circulated the health of the bride and bridegroom was proposed by Mr. W. H. Denstone and duly honored, and a huge wedding-cake was cut by the bride. Soon after this the newly married pair, who will reside at Calle San José 336, made their escape. We may add that no little attention was attracted by the brilliant show of wedding presents, consisting of a great number of valuable, artistic and useful articles, the display of which completely filled one of the rooms, the givers including a long list of both British and Uruguayan friends of the two families, most of whom were also represented among the guests.

The wedding was also celebrated on Saturday evening, at the Lourdes Church and in the presence of a large gathering of friends, of Mr. J. P. Oliver, local manager of Wilson Sons and Co., Limited, and Mrs. Antonia de la Torre. Mr. and Mrs. Oliver have left for a two months' holiday.

Anglo-German Relations.

Appeal from the Peace Congress.

Mr. Perris, of the Cobden Club, has forwarded from Lucerne the following telegram addressed to the London papers:—

Lucerne, Sept. 23.

On the occasion of the 14th International Peace Congress at Lucerne a meeting of German and British citizens was held on the subject of the relations of the two nations, and it was decided to issue an address to the British and German peoples. The address, which was issued to-day, is as follows:—

"Feeling strongly the danger of conflict between the two nations, we desire to express our firm conviction that there is no ground, either in economic or political circumstances, for the illfeeling which unhappily exists. Beneath the apparent antagonism of industrial and commercial competition there lies in reality common interest, each nation providing the other with the good things it can best produce. Similarly the political interests of the two Empires are not antagonistic, in so far as they are governed by moderation and consideration for the popular welfare. Therefore, the efforts of all sensible men in both countries should be directed to the work which both peoples equally need.

"The perpetual increase of armaments on both sides is the result of the needless misunderstanding and selfish interests from which both nations equally suffer. It has led to burdens upon both peoples. To arrest this insane rivalry is within the power and to the interest of both. These misunderstandings have been aggravated by individuals of small influence in the respective nations, so that trivial nervousness or vexation has been fanned into acute bitterness, and the possibility of war has even been discussed. Thus, at any moment a serious conflict might be created out of differences which might normally be settled in the easiest manner. We emphatically protest against the mere thought of such a conflict as a folly and a crime.

"We know at present no possible ground of serious quarrel between the two countries. On the contrary, we find in their history, common faith and long friendship, their mutual indebtedness in literature, science and art, the strongest reasons for the establishment of more friendly relations, and so far from believing that the Anglo-French Entente is a ground for separation between our countries we believe it gives a new possibility for the three great nations to work together in friendship for their common interests and the peace of the world. We therefore appeal to the citizens of both countries to join us by word and action in the great work of making this better feeling effective in their life and public policy.

Marriage a Success and Divorce a Failure.

Dr. Woods Hutchinson writes in the *Contemporary Review* on "Evolutionary Ethics of Marriage and Divorce." Briefly, his contentions are:—(1) That marriage is essentially neither a religious nor a civil institution, but a purely biologic one.

(2) That marriage consists in the union of the sexes for such a term, and under such conditions, as will result in the production of the maximum number of offspring capable of surviving, in each particular species, climate, and grade of civilization.

(3) That marriage is therefore to be regarded neither from the point of view of the male, nor from that of the female, but solely from that of the race.

(4) The duration of marriage is usually determined by the length of time during which the offspring require the care and protection of both parents in order to properly equip them for the struggle of life.

(5) Monogamous marriage, lasting for life, is the highest type as yet evolved, and has survived all other forms, and become that adopted by every dominant race, on account of its resulting in the largest number of most efficient offspring. His conclusion is as follows:—

"So far, even in the most 'divorceful' communities like the neighbourhood of Chicago and the middle West generally, the proportion of divorces to marriages has never reached a higher point than that of about twelve per cent. If there is any other institution of society, of the Church, or of the State which can point to a record of eighty-eight per cent. of successes, I should like to hear it mentioned. So long as divorces are kept within the limit of from 20 to 25 per cent. of the marriages, there is no need to shudder for the future either of the race or of the home. To imagine that ease of divorce will cause a general loosening of the marriage tie is pure superstition, baseless to the verge of absurdity. To say that the legal or ceremonial tie is what holds couples together is about as logical as to declare the varnish which covers the weld to be the force that holds welded iron together. If by a single stroke all marriage ties now in existence were struck off or declared illegal, eight-tenths of all couples would be remarried within forty-eight hours, and seven-tenths could not be kept asunder with hyacinths. Eighty per cent. of all marriages are a success from a biologic point of view."

LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, SEPT. 25.

The Queen has sent a touching letter to Mrs. Barnardo expressing condolence and sympathy with her and her family on the irreparable loss which they and the country have sustained by the death of that great philanthropist.

The Duke of Connaught visited Guernsey on Saturday and unveiled a South African war memorial.

Dr. Henderson, Dean of Carlisle, to which position he was appointed by Mr. Gladstone in 1884, died last evening, at the age of 86.

Mr. Balfour has sent a letter to the Secretary of the West Ham Unemployed Committee explaining the manner in which he should communicate with the Royal Commission on the Poor Law when that body is appointed.

A conference on the housing question, largely attended by delegates from rural District Councils, took place at the Garden City, Letchworth, on Saturday, when the desirability of rural District Councils vigorously using the powers they already possess under Part III. of the Housing Act was emphasised.

A Leicester Correspondent reports that municipal trading in that town in gas, electric light, and water has resulted in very substantial profit.

Mr. T. A. Hanson, one of the sprightly octogenarians who at the Memorial Hall next month will initiate the incredulous into the art and mystery of longevity, was interviewed on Saturday, when he spoke of the advantage he had derived during the last 25 years from vegetarianism.

The maximum of rating appears to have been reached in Poplar. The Rating Committee feels unable to recommend a rate of more than 3s. for the quarter, though 3s. will not produce the amount required.

A terrible tragedy is reported from Salisbury, a retired sergeant-major of the Royal Garrison Artillery, living at Amesbury, having murdered his six children and committed suicide.

Owing to information given by a convict at present undergoing penal servitude, three men were charged at Westminster on Saturday with forgery and conspiracy. One of them had been previously tried on a charge of uttering a forged cheque for £319, but the jury could not agree. The accused were now remanded.

In the English Football League on Saturday Stoke continued their victorious career at the expense of Woolwich Arsenal. Losing to Liverpool, Birmingham, the conquerors of Aston Villa, sustained their first defeat, while Wolverhampton Wanderers and Middlesbrough secured their first victories. Derby County gained their fourth consecutive victory at Newcastle.

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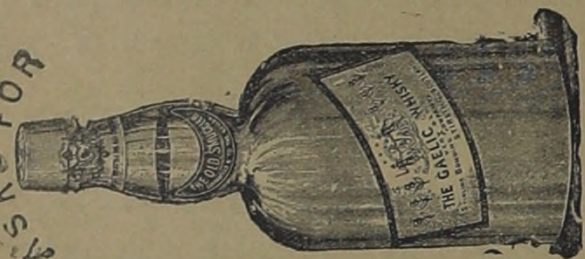
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SHORT STORY
