### NEWS OF THE DAY.

### POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Saturday. Dr. Paulier resumed his speech in defence of the Divorce Bill. He declared that the Roman doctrines respecting religious liberty and liberty of conscience were completely contrary to the spirit of the Constitution, and the Catholic Church might be regarded as the determined enemy of the present state of modern society. He was still expatiating on these topics when the Chamber adjourned. (As was expected when the Divorce Bill was put on the programme, it is effectually blocking the way of other business of far more important and urgent interest. For some weeks now the Chamber has devoted two out of its three sittings a week exclusively to the Bill and has generally no-quorumed on the third sitting. The discussion, which is doctrinal far more than practical, has already become wearisome, and we think that even the adherents of divorce would not be sorry to see a little attention paid to other matters. We may take this opportunity of mentioning that another petition, bearing some 19,400 signatures, against the Bill, has just been presented to the Chamber. The total number of signatures to this petition is now said to exceed 100,000, which is over 50 per cent. of the female population of the country. We wonder how much effect this will have on the Chamber.)

The Society of Hawks has presented a petition to the Chambers for a reduction in the license and other taxes on the street sale of fruit and vegetables. We have not seen the terms of the petition, but the application is certainly well justified. There are far too many taxes and imposts, national and municipal, on the sale of food of all kinds, and the most ordinary wisdom on the part of the Government would suggest their gradual relief, the more especially as taxes of this description are not merely obnoxious but unjust, for they press far more heavily on the struggling and necessitous classes than they do on the well-to-do. It is a monstrous thing in this city, the capital of a land overflowing with food products, food should be so dear as it is, and there is not the least doubt that many of the present labor troubles may be largely traced to the steady rise in the price of food, which has, in effect, depreciated the purchasing value of money, and thus made salaries and wages that once were sufficient no longer so. Yet these taxes are always being increased under some pretext or another and never by any chance diminished. The Government which had the welfare of the people at heart would make it its first duty to appoint a special Commission to enquire into the whole system of taxation on food-stuffs and their sale, with a view to their reduction to a reasonable level. Such a step would be as popular as it would be beneficial.

Another meeting of the "colorado" legislators was to have been held yesterday afternoon which it was fully expected would result in the issue of a formal proclamation of the presidential candidature of Dr. Williams. In fact, it is understood that the document was already drafted by the special Committee, though its exact terms have not yet transpired. We are not yet in a position to state the result, but anyhow it is fairly certain that the present week will see the matter made clear.

With regard to the now practically arranged prolongation of the Central Uruguay Eastern Extension, it is announced that, by arrangement between

the Government and the Company, an important modification has been made in the original route. As now agreed upon, the prolongation will start from the present terminus of the Extension at Nico Perez, pass through Melo, and thence direct to the Brazilian frontier, where its terminus will be, not Artigas as originally proposed, but Paso del Centurion on the river Yaguarón. The railway will thus follow an almost straight line from the capital to its terminus. We also understand that the branch to Treinta y Tres is included in the scheme. The news that the prolongation is practically arranged has made a good impression in every quarter.

### Dover as a Naval base.

Mooring for 78 Battleships.

Dover, Oct. 1.

The announcement made in the Observer that the Admiralty intend to make Dover Harbour a first class naval base is generally believed in official circles here to be correct, more particularly from certain indications which have occurred lately. At a public function recently the Mayor of Dover intimated that he had it on high authority that this was what likely to happen.

Rapid progress has been made during the past six months with the final section of the Admiralty Harbour breakwater, and the great harbour will be completed so as to provide torpedo-proof shelter for a very large fleet in less than two years' time.

It is stated, too, that the contractors have been "officially encouraged" to hasten the work. The southern breakwater will be 4,200 feet long. In January last only 100ft of this work had reached the low water level. To-day this enormous masonry work has risen above the sea to the length of 1,300ft, as many as 350ft, having been brought up in about a month.

The work of laying the large mooring buoys is now in full swing, the operations in the bay creating great interest. In the part of the bay now being worked upon the rock is found to be so hard that large charges of dynamite are to be used this week for making the necessary excavations. The effect of the explosions as seen from the shore will, it is anticipated, prove very interesting. A number of these buoys have already been laid.

Altogether there are to be sets of moorings for 28 battleships and cruisers, besides about fifty for destroyers. The large mooring sets cost £1,000 to £2,000 each. The work is also well advanced on the eastern and western arms for the reception of the electric hauling machinery for sealing, when necessary, by means of steel hawsers the entrances to the harbour.

This system of harbour defence is considered to be a great improvement upon the boom defences hitherto in use, as the entrance can be immediately cleared by dropping the hawsers.

The Observer article suggested that Dover was to supersede Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth.

The Government have also acquired sites for two additional powerful forts on Dover Heights overlooking the Naval Harbour, to be armed with twelve-inch guns. At present the largest guns at Dover are the nine-inch in the three new forts.

### The Physician's Right to Kill.

Discussing an article by Dr. I. Regnault in *La Revue* (Paris) A. Agresti writes, in *Italia Moderna* (Rome), on "The Right of Homicide,"—in other words, the expediency of physicians practicing euthanasia, hurrying the demise of hopelessly afflicted patients. A summary of the argument is given in the *American Review of Reviews*. Dr. Regnault, Signor Agresti thinks, enlarges too much the scope of killing, as he would give society the right to dispose of deformed and defective individuals. The Italian writer thinks the world would become ridiculous if every one were reduced to normal, as Lombroso would have it, if there were not some deformed that would permit us to appreciate beauty; if there were not some assassin to teach us the value of life, and some genius to tell of its joys and its sorrows. That which counts in society, and tends ever to count more, is the individual. But when the human organism is hopelessly deranged, and death must ensue shortly, there comes the right and the duty to prevent too atrocious suffering. Each for one's self would choose the quicker end, but all administer the doses that prolong the life and the suffering. But when shall the decision for euthanasia be made, and by whom—the patient, the doctor, the family? Who knows when death is certain to come soon? Many difficult questions arise. This writer thinks the physician should be judge, with a consultation, perhaps furnished by the municipality, and not always the same persons. The family should be consulted, not as to when, but as to the willingness and advisability. The patient might be consulted as to the administration of the last sacrament, but often his true state is concealed from him, and his merciful ending might be also. As to the how, Signor Agresti would put it all in the hands of the physician. "He should put the patient into the eternal sleep without saying to any one: I come for this. His action should be sudden and mysterious, like death, and, like death, beneficial."

### Railway Concessions and Diplomacy.

The following remarks are from the *South American Journal*—

As our readers are well aware, up to the present time, with only one exception, railways in Argentina have been carried out by English enterprise and capital, and we do not know of any questions involving diplomatic intervention having arisen in connection with the English companies working those railways in that Republic, nor is there any probability of anything of the kind occurring in the future. We have had no instance of the English Government having had to interfere to protect English capital in Argentina or Chili, and much less have we heard of private English enterprises having thought it necessary to appeal to our Government to influence South American Governments to grant concessions to English companies. Such a proceeding is certainly not in harmony with English notions of business. It is, however, no secret that in Germany different ideas prevail in this respect, as concessions have been obtained with the direct intervention of the German Legations in the respective countries. Our correspondence from Chili now informs us that, in connection with the proposed railway which, in accordance with the Treaty of Peace with Bolivia, the Chilean Government is under obligation to construct at once, the German Minister at Santiago is trying an active part in seeking to induce the Government of Chili to give the concession to a German bank. It appears to us that there is some incongruity, and even risk, in the intervention of foreign Governments in this kind of negotiation, which, in our opinion, should be left entirely in the hands of private parties. We do not consider that such an exercise of quasi-diplomatic procedure is just towards the citizens of other countries, and it is not particularly complimentary to the Governments thus indirectly, not to say, insultingly, approached. We cannot too strongly advise South American Governments to avoid in every possible way any transactions with companies resorting to the support of their Governments even in an unofficial capacity.

### Liverpool and Cotton Spinning.

A Gigantic Scheme.

Liverpool, Sept. 29.

Mr. H. R. Meyer, of the Liverpool Warehousing Company, has issued a public appeal for support of his scheme to erect cotton mills at Liverpool.

Interviewed to-day, Mr. Meyer said more and more cotton was going to Manchester which used to come to Liverpool, and unless that tendency was stopped Liverpool would ultimately lose its cotton import trade altogether—the greatest of its commercial interests. The remedy was to spin the cotton on the spot instead of forwarding it to Manchester. He ridiculed a popular belief that Liverpool weather is too dry for cotton spinning, and said that even if it were the necessary humidity could be provided by steam.

"A million and a half," Mr. Meyer said, "is required to make this scheme a success. And that is a mere bagatelle compared to the sums which Manchester has put into the Ship Canal that is now causing all the mischief to Liverpool." This sum (he continued) would be sufficient to erect cotton mills at Liverpool with 500,000 spindles. They would be the largest and most complete in the world. All the various operations of spinning, weaving, bleaching, dyeing, and printing would be concentrated at Liverpool.

With the utter indifference of Liverpool to her own interests, Mr. Meyer compared the eagerness shown by foreign countries to develop trade and commerce. He has just returned from the Continent, where he had an interview with the Minister of Commerce of one of the Great Powers. The Minister made the Liverpool syndicate which Mr. Meyer represented an important and generous offer. "Establish cotton spinning in this country," the Minister said, "and we will give you land free for the mills, remit all local rates and taxes for ten years, also the import and export duties on cotton and machinery, modify the State railway rates, and grant you a solid subvention."

The British Government, according to Mr. Meyer, does nothing for cotton, and the municipality of Liverpool will do nothing, not even reduce the price of water for manufacturing purposes.

The syndicate is tempted to try its luck on the Continent, and leave Liverpool to its self sought fate.

### Russian Affairs.

We quote the following telegrams from our Buenos Aires contemporaries:—St. Petersburg, 27th.—Last night a great revolutionary meeting was held in the University.

It is announced that the Governor of Kharkoff has been defeated and arrested. A provisional revolutionary Government was set up.

The troops are surrounding the University.

St. Petersburg, 27th.—The dockyard men, and employees of the Ministry of Railways and of the Zemstros of St. Petersburg have joined the strike. The socialist leaders are selling rifles and distributing cartridges to the strikers.

St. Petersburg, 27th.—The cabinet council has voted in favour of the creation of a cabinet, whose president would have the right to choose his own colleagues, except the Ministers of Foreign Affairs, War, Marine and Court.

St. Petersburg, 27th.—The Cossacks last night attacked 7000 workmen and added wounded a hundred. An officer and seven Cossacks were wounded. The strikers destroyed the bridge over the Obvodny Canal. The dockers have joined the strike.

Warsaw, 27th.—In a suburb of this city a great fire has broken out. It is believed to be the work of the agitators. Great efforts are being made to dominate it. The latest reports say that the whole district is on fire.

St. Petersburg, 27th.—The commander of the forces of the garrison, the notorious General Trepoff, has issued a proclamation warning the people that rigorous measures have been adopted for the maintenance of order. The soldiers have received orders not to use blank cartridges but only ball cartridge.

London, 27th.—The papers here say that the Tsar has decided to give to Russia a constitution similar to that of Germany.

London, Oct. 27th.—A telegram from Sebastopol reports that the crew of the battleship "Kniaz Potemkin" set fire to the vessel, with the result that she was completely destroyed.

London, Oct. 27th.—Despatches received from Russia all go to prove that the situation in the Empire, both political and economical, is becoming so complicated that it is impossible to foresee what will be the ultimate consequences. This morning the two important financial institutions of the Bank of Siberia and the Azoff and Don Bank closed their doors for prudential reasons.

The Typographers' Society of St. Petersburg has sent a circular note to the newspaper editors informing them that unless they consent to ignore entirely the caprices of the censorship, all the compositors would strike. The editors have, therefore, to choose between a strike of their workmen or suspension for an indefinite time by the authorities.

The men on strike are commencing to abandon their orderly attitude, and tumults are reported to have occurred in several parts of the Empire. The railway bridge across the Obvodny Car has been destroyed by the strikers.

Prince Louis Napoleon Buonaparte has resigned his appointment as Governor General of the Caucasus. There is an unconfirmed rumour that General Trepoff has resigned the post of Prefect of St. Petersburg.

The political situation continues undecided. The Tsar wavers between adopting the advice of the reactionary party, headed by General Trepoff and the Procurator General, Pobiedonostseff, and listening to the counsels of Count de Witte and the Liberal party. The contest between the two parties is a bitter one.

### SUNDRIES.

—WEATHER.—Wet and foul weather prevailed the greater part of Sunday, culminating in a violent storm of wind and torrential rain in the late afternoon. Yesterday was dry, with an improved aspect, though still unseasonable and somewhat unsettled.—Distressful accounts continue to arrive from the interior of the mischief done by the prolonged bad weather and heavy rains. The rivers and streams are swollen and overflowing nearly everywhere, and in some parts the inundations are serious, interrupting all traffic, causing much personal distress and material damage, and injuring or destroying the crops. Probably matters will have been made still worse by the fresh storm on Sunday, but accounts of this have not yet reached. At Paysandú a humble family of six persons were overtaken whilst seeking to escape from the flood, and all were drowned. One good thing, however, is that the storms will probably have swept away all the locusts, thus averting that threatened plague, for the present at all events.

—ENGLISH CLUB.—There was the usual tale of an insufficient quorum for the Annual General Meeting on Saturday evening, so it is convoked again for next Saturday, when business will be transacted with the number present.

—CRICKET.—The cricket season of the M.V.C.C. will commence, as already announced, tomorrow (holiday) with a match between Captain and Secretary, to commence at 10.30 a. m. Tea will be served during the afternoon, and it is hoped that there will be a good turn out of visitors, as well as players, so as to give the season an encouraging start. Four gentlemen members have kindly offered to provide the indispensable tea.—The attention of members is called to the announcement of an Extraordinary General Meeting on November 8 for a revision of the Rules.

—STRIKE AVERTED.—It is announced that the masons and bricklayers have at last decided to accept the proposition of the master builders, which consists of an eight hours' day during May, June and July, and nine hours in the remaining months of the year. If we understand aright, this averts the general

eral strike in the building trade which was threatened for next month.

—NO RIVER STEAMERS.—On account of the violent storm raging on Sunday evening no river steamers left either this port or Buenos Aires, which explains why there were no mails from Buenos Aires yesterday morning.

—URQUIZA THEATRE.—The ever-green Spanish poetic drama "Don Juan Tenorio," which invariably makes its appearance about All Souls Day, will be given this evening.

—SILK CULTURE.—The following particulars of the silk industry of Uruguay are taken from the *Moniteur Officiel du Commerce*.—The Uruguayan Minister of Foment has recently purchased a number of mulberry trees in Argentina with a view to initiating silkworm rearing in the Department of Canelones, Uruguay. There is already a certain amount of mulberry cultivation carried on near Montevideo, and it is hoped that a development of the silk industry will prove a permanent source of revenue to the country. Silk cultivation was commenced in Argentina some few years back, and so successful have been the results that it is confidently expected that in five years' time the production of cocoons in that country will equal the French and Italian production combined. The climate of the Department of Canelones, Uruguay, is very similar to that of Argentina, so it is hoped that a similar success will be attained there. An engineer who organised the sale of mulberry trees, silkworms and sericultural apparatus in Argentina is about to open an exhibition of native silk at Montevideo. This exhibition is to be under the patronage of the President of Uruguay. The peculiar part of the matter is that the *Moniteur* seems to know far more about it than is generally known here.

—INTERDICTED!—Under this title the *B. A. Herald* announces that the press has been forbidden to make any references to the affairs of the Faculty of Medicine! We believe this is in reference to some revolt on the part of the students. Why the Government should seek to impose silence on the press on such a topic is absolutely unintelligible. The Buenos Aires press is thus placed in the intensely absurd position of having to eliminate from its columns two of the most prominent topics of the day, and probably the two on which their readers are most desirous of information. Is the Argentine Government so puerile as to suppose that troubles can be cured by suppressing public intelligence and rational press comment? Apart from the question of the indisputable right of the people to know what is happening in their own country and their own city, the proceeding is simply childish. The Government which, while calling itself Republican, resorts to such Russian methods, only makes itself obnoxious and contemptible. It is very evident that in Argentina, just as much as in Uruguay, laws are required protecting the liberty of the press from unwarrantable aggressions on the part of autocratically inclined Governments.

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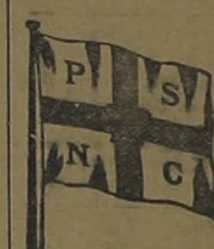

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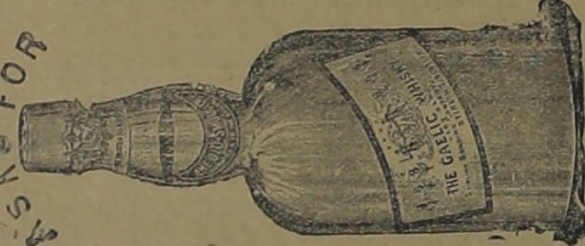
