POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Saturday.
Discussion was commenced of the An-
nual Law of Licenses, but had not pro-
ceeded far when the Chamber was count-
ed out, a number of the Deputies quitting
the Chamber to attend a partisan meet-
ing, which, naturally, was of more impor-
tance than public business.

Publication has been made of the
Executive Bill and lengthy Message re-
lative to the suppression of discounts on
minor salaries. The proposal is more ex-
tensive than was at first thought, ex-
tending to the suppression of the dis-
counts of 5 and 10 cto on all civil and
military salaries, pensions or superan-
nuations included in the Budget up to
\$360 per annum. Those salaries, etc., the
net amount of which after deducting the
discounts is less than \$360 remain
fixed at that sum net, and the 5 cto discount is removed from salaries
of employees of the Municipality,
National Committee of Charity, National
Council of Hygiene and the University
which work out at less than \$360 per
annum. The measure thus affects salar-
ies up to \$421 nominal. According to
the calculation of the Message, no fewer
than 15,000 persons will be benefited.
It further shows that, with the discounts
mentioned above, that for the Montepío,
and other taxes, there is a total de-
duction of 18.69 cto from the nominal
amount of salaries and of 31.43 cto from
the nominal amount of pensions, etc.,
this weighing very heavily on those in
receipt of minor sums. The difference
which the change will cause in the
Budget is estimated at about \$380,000
annually. To meet this, says the Mes-
sage, the Executive counts on the sanc-
tion of the increase recently proposed in
the assessments for the Property Tax in
the interior, an increase which the Mes-
sage proceeds to defend as justifiable
and equitable.—This gives the Message a
double aspect. The first proposal, that is
to say the increase in minor civil salaries
(we are not so sure about the pensions)
is one that has met with practically un-
animous approval and is recognised
as both just and necessary, but it
was not then known that the Govern-
ment would make this the pre-
text for the increase in the property
tax in the interior, an increase falling
mainly on a class which has had much
to suffer and to complain of in the last two

years, and which, as representing the
productive energies of the country, it
should be the special aim of the Govern-
ment to conciliate and protect. As our
readers already know, this tax is
meeting with serious protest from the
representatives of the classes affected,
bodies of too great importance
to be treated slightly. At the same
time, it can hardly be pretended that
there are absolutely no other resources
available while the Government main-
tains war estimates capable of being cut
down by quite a million dollars. The
Chambers have thus a knotty problem
to decide, and we shall be curious to see
if they find a way out of the difficulty
that will be approved by public opin-
ion.

Decrees has been issued from the Min-
istry of Foment authorising a new call
for tenders for a new and improved light
apparatus for the Cerro lighthouse, and
for installation of luminous buoys and
guide-lights in the entrance channel to
the ante-port. Both of these are very
necessary.

Sunday's *Siglo* devotes considerable
space to an advance extract from a
manifesto which the nationalist Direc-
torate will shortly publish dealing with
the political events that immediately
preceded and led to the civil war of
last year. As might be expected, the ac-
count differs considerably from that
given by the official organs at a time
when the press was deprived of its
liberty, and it especially combats the
idea that the nationalists were the first
aggressors. The document, which is
couched in very moderate terms, is in-
teresting historically, and it is only just
that the nationalist point of view should
be presented as well as the official, but
we think that the matter had better have
been left dormant while Sr. Batlle re-
mains in the presidency. Under another
Government it may be possible to dis-
cuss the matter calmly, freely and dis-
passionately, but this can hardly be done
at present.

ENGLISH

JOURNALISM IN MONTEVIDEO.

A Retrospect and a Rectification.

Our weekly contemporary of Sunday
last indulges in a retrospect of English
journalism in this capital which is both
incorrect and incomplete. This, however,
might be expected from a journal which
boldly confesses that its policy is to present
a partial and one-sided—and therefore
unreliable and worthless—view of events.
We give our own version, which we
think will be found more accurate, as fol-
lows.

Although a weekly English paper
(*The Britannia and Montevideo Re-
porter*) was published here as far back
as 1842, and other successive attempts
had been made at English journalism, for
many years the British colony here had
remained without a paper in their own
language until March, 1888, when two
appeared practically simultaneously.
These were the *River Plate Times* (an
old title revived) and the *Express*. The
Times, established by Mr. H. C. Ayre,
appeared on March 1st, 1888, first as a
weekly and shortly afterwards twice a
week. Owing to difficulties with the
machinery, the *Express* did not appear
until a week later, though it was also
announced for March 1st. The *Express*
was a daily, the first English daily ever
published here. It was established by
the engineer Mr. Melville Hore, with
the present writer (W. H. Denstone) as
assistant editor—though, in truth he did
practically the whole work of the
paper. Both the *Express* and the *Times*
received subsidies from the Govern-
ment of Gen. Tajes, but this was not long
continued. Mr. Denstone having severed
his connection with the *Express*, conceived
the idea of publishing a more thoroughly
English paper. For this Mr. Edward
Casey promised to find the initial capital,
and the result was the *Montevideo In-
dependent*, a daily paper which appeared
June 1st, 1899, with Mr. Denstone as
editor and Mr. H. B. Greenwood as man-
ager. Negotiations were shortly opened
for the purchase of the bi-weekly *R. P. Times*, and on July 12th 1899, the
amalgamated papers appeared as a
daily under the older title, Mr. H. C.
Ayre temporarily joining the staff as co-
editor. The *Express* ceased to appear
after March 31st, 1899, and the *Times*
then had the field to itself. On October
1st, 1899, Mr. Denstone, took over the
River Plate Times (Mr. Ayre's connection
with which had ceased) in payment of
arrears of salary due to him, and since
that date he has remained as sole
editor and proprietor. The independent
and outspoken course which he at once
assumed displeasing Mr. Casey (though
this gentleman had absolutely no further
rights over the paper) to avoid any
question, on Nov. 25, 1899, he moved
from Mr. Casey's printing office in Call
Uruguay, and changed the title of the
paper (which he had never considered
well chosen) to the more appropriate one
of *THE MONTVIDEO TIMES* which it
still retains. The *Uruguay News*, which
has undergone two or three minor chan-
ges of title, was started as a weekly by
Mr. H. C. Ayre and the late Mr. C.
Gurney (previously assistant editor of
the *Express*) about the end of 1890, and
still appears.

The difference between the daily *Times*
and the weekly *News* is and always has
been clearly marked. The *Times* has
maintained a course of independent judg-
ment and free, impartial criticism, ap-
plauding what it has found worthy, cen-
suring what it has found unworthy, pre-
serving the good and the bad side by

side, speaking boldly in defence of pub-
lic liberties and republican principles
when they have been assailed, grinding
no man's axe, and rejecting the theory
that, because it is printed in the English
instead of the Spanish language, it is
therefore inhibited from expressing an
opinion on local political questions, or
from citing, for the information of its
readers, the opinions of the leading
papers of the country, whether "oppo-
sition" or otherwise. The course of the
News has been one of unconditional sup-
port of the Government or faction in
power for the time being, whether de-
serving or not, and of systematic sup-
pression of all unpleasant truths or of
any opposition views. We have found
our reward in the confidence and re-
spect of our readers—it has found its re-
ward in the assistance of the Govern-
ments. We are content to leave our
readers to judge which has been of the
most value to them—the impartial paper
or the partial one.

It is worth mentioning that, turning
over our back files to verify the dates
given above, in the *Times* of July 13,
1899, we find an article from the pen of
the present writer strongly advocating the
building of a Hall for the use of the
English-speaking community, an idea
which he had previously advocated in
the *Express*, and which has since found
realisation in the Victoria Hall, where an
entertainment will be given this very
evening.

Montevideo Literary Society.

The final meeting of the season was
held in the Victoria Hall on Tuesday
evening last, the Rev. H. A. Allpass in
the chair, with an attendance (despite
unfavorable weather) of 103, the largest
yet recorded. The literary portion of the
programme consisted of impromptu
speaking, in which Messrs. Gibbs, Ashe,
Wood, Lynn, G. Cooper, Kestell-Corn-
ish and Halfpenny took part.

In the absence of the secretary (Mr.
W. Hore) his report was read by Dr.
Gallaugher, followed by that of the treas-
urer Mr. J. Morton. These showed that,
during its first season the Society had
had an average attendance of 70 at its
meetings; there were 78 numbers on the
list; the receipts from subscriptions had
been \$111 and the expenditure \$41,
leaving \$70 to its credit. Votes of thanks
were given unanimously to the Victoria
Hall Society for the free use of their
building and to the President (Rev. H. A.
Allpass) Secretary and Treasurer for their
services.

Proceedings terminated with an ex-
cellent tea served by Misses Bankier,
Christie, Drever, Robinson and Murray
Wilson, for whom, on the proposal of
Mr. P. C. Towers, three hearty cheers
were given.

We may take this opportunity of
heartily congratulating the Literary So-
ciety on the quite unexpected success it
has achieved, a success that we may say
is very largely due to the energy and
indefatigable efforts of its popular in-
itiator and President the Rev. H. A.
Allpass. He has proved—that many
doubted—not only that such a Society
is possible here, but that it meets a dis-
tinct and useful social purpose which
the English-speaking community is ready
to support. The start has been successful
beyond all anticipation, and this should
encourage the Society to extend its
scope—the establishment of a good
English circulating library is one of our
dreams for a long time past. Anyhow,
with such a start, there is great hope for
the future, and after the summer season
has passed, we hope next year to see the
Society renew and enlarge its labors
with an even greater measure of suc-
cess.

The Drift of our Company System.

(The Law Journal)

This is certainly the day of small com-
panies. Anyone who examines the list
of companies registered from day to day
cannot fail to be struck with the small-
ness of the capitals—£1,000, £2,000,
£1,500, £3,000, £5,000; these are the
amounts which are constantly recurring.
Even less than £1,000—£500 and
£600—are not uncommon. A capital of
£20,000 is something quite exceptional.
The shares are nearly all £1 shares, and
with almost monotonous regularity the
words appear "No initial public issue."
The companies, in fact, are either con-
versions of small existing businesses, or
are formed to take over such busi-
nesses. This, then, it would seem, is
what the machinery of the Companies
Acts is tending to—the incor-
poration of the single trader or the
trading partnership. The big com-
pany tends to find a more congenial
domicile in Guernsey or even in Rhode-
sia—anywhere, in fact, where it is free
from the oppressive taxation and vexatious
regulations which have character-
ised recent company legislation in the
United Kingdom. If there is to be fresh
legislation for companies as the outcome
of the Board of Trade Committee, this
change which has come, or is coming,
over our company system must be reck-
oned with, and a simple code devised for
statutory partnerships with limited li-
ability, a model set of articles, and a much
reduced scale of stamp duties. A propos
of these, some promoters have, it seems,
discovered a device for defeating Govern-
ment exactions which is as simple as it is
ingenious. The device is to register with
a small nominal capital, and then issue
the shares at a premium—say £1 share at
say, a premium of £5. The result, of
course, is that a company pays to the

Revenue only one-fifth of what it would
pay if registered in the normal manner.
There is nothing illegitimate in such eva-
sion, nor, on the face of it, impracticable
in the working of the scheme.

Charivaria from "Punch."

At a time when we are told every
other day that pluck is dying out in our
island it is good to read that during the
past season the members of the Writtle
(Essex) Sparrow Club killed 11,625 of
these ferocious birds.

The City Corporation has declined to
contribute to the Merton fund for the ce-
lebration of the Battle of Trafalgar, the
mover of the resolution expressing the
opinion that we ought not to rake up
these "brutal victories" after a hundred
years. A proposal will, no doubt, now be
made to celebrate some of our "graceful
concessions."

Leicester has made a "profit" of £30,-
785 out of its gas, and we see no reason
why, with careful management, the
House of Commons should not become a
paying concern.

Mr. Sandow has returned from
abroad with an international troupe con-
sisting of two Americans, a New Zean-
der, two South Africans, a Swiss, an
Irishman, an Italian, two Sikhs, a Jap-
anese and a Chinaman, and the Tar is
summoning a new Hague Tribunal.

The proprietor of the Scala Theatre, it
is announced, intends to build another
play-house on a scale of even greater
magnificence, a feature of which will be
improved methods of seating and employ-
ing a theatre. The method of bringing
about the latter consummation by means
of the play itself is certainly a clumsy
one.

We hear that the Millionaire and the
Millionairess who wedded the other
day are greatly enjoying their money-
moon.

Mr. Rockefeller has advised young
men to turn their thoughts to higher
things than money, which is not all there
is in the world. If the young men will
look after the higher things, Mr. Rocke-
feller will look after the money.

Russian Affairs.

We quote the following telegrams
from our Buenos Aires contemporaries:—

London, Nov. 10th.—According to
despatches from St. Petersburg, the
mental condition of the Tsar is such as
to inspire his family and the Court
circles with grave anxiety. His Majesty
sits for hours buried in thought and mut-
tering incoherently from time to time.
He sleeps little, and his rest is broken
by dreams. For a fortnight he has not
left his rooms. The Tsarina, who form-
ly was desirous of escaping to Denmark,
has now resolved to stay and endeavour
to revive the Tsar's courage and hope.
She remains by his side for fear he
should attempt to commit suicide. Those
who have seen the Tsar state that he is
becoming grey and looks fifteen years
older than he is.

St. Petersburg, 10th.—The Minister
of Public Instruction has ordered the
closing until further notice of all the
Universities and Secondary Schools in
the Empire.

St. Petersburg, 10th.—Private ad-
vices contradict the Government state-
ment to the effect that the mutiny at
Cronstadt has been suppressed.

London, Nov. 10th.—Despatches
from St. Petersburg report that fight-
ing went on all last night between the
loyal troops and the mutineers at Cron-
stadt. The latter are in possession of a fort
and several warships, and keep up an
artillery fire upon the troops camped in
the suburbs. All the battleships and
forts are in full action and a furious
bombardment is going on. A large part
of the town is a heap of smoking ruins.
The chemists' shops are converted into
temporary hospitals and are crowded
with the wounded, many of whom are
women and children. The Red Cross
parties picked up 140 dead bodies, of
whom 60 were private individuals. It is
stated that the total number of mutineers
is only two companies of marines, 120
sailors, 50 artillerymen and 200 desert-
ers of various branches of the army ser-
vice. Their obstinate resistance is due to
the support given by the populace, who
have abundant supplies of ammunition
and provisions. According to refugees
from Cronstadt, over 600 persons have
been killed or wounded, and enormous
damage done to property. The report that
the mutineers have blown up a battleship
is not confirmed. Further reinforcements
are being sent against them.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 11th.—One of
the reforms that is to be introduced in
Russia is the adoption of the Gregorian
Calendar instead of the Julian Calendar
that has been in force hitherto. It is
proposed to make the alteration of thir-
teen days that this will involve in the
month of February next, so that the new
system of reckoning may commence on
May 1st.

London, Nov. 11th.—A St. Peters-
burg telegram to the "New York Her-
ald" reports that the crews of the battle-
ships "Slava" and "Alexander III," be-
longing to the Baltic fleet, have mutinied,
overpowered their officers and hoisted the
red flag.

London, Nov. 11th.—Details of the
Cronstadt mutiny are arriving, which go
to show that the telegrams did not ex-
aggerate the magnitude of the outbreak,
as the Russian official statements tried
to make out. Between Wednesday
and Friday inclusive the number
of killed and wounded amounted to
1,200.

tional Peace Conference at La Hague
have accepted the invitation. The Con-
ference will meet in May next.

—MATRIMONIAL.—From Buenos Ai-
res:—We have much pleasure in an-

Roberts, second daughter of Mr. W. C.
Roberts, of Calle Caseros, Buenos Aires,

—NEW YORK MUNICIPALITY.—The
telegrams have already informed us of
the reelection of Mr. George B. Mc-
Clellan as Mayor. Referring in anticipa-

LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, OCT. 16.

There will be a considerable ceremony in the City to-day at the laying of the foundation stone of the new General Post Office building in Newgate street by the King.

We deeply regret to say that Sir Henry Irving died suddenly at Bradford on Friday night, shortly after appearing in "Becket". His body was removed to London early on Saturday morning. Messages of sympathy have been received by the family from the King and Queen, President Roosevelt, and many people of distinction in all parts of the world.

Birkenhead election has resulted in a notable victory for Liberalism and Free Trade. The division, which had never before returned a Liberal, has now elected Mr. Andrews by a majority of 228. The figures declared on Saturday were: Mr. Andrews (L.) 4,376; Mr. Lane Fox (C.) 4,148.

Sir F. Dixon-Harland, Conservative M.P., for the Uxbridge Division, has made the extraordinary statement that "the Government" asked him to second Mr. Chaplin's "fiscal reform" motion at last year's Conservative Conference.

Led by Dr. Paul Brousse, the President of the Paris Municipal Council, about sixty members of that body will reach London this afternoon as the guests of the London County Council.

Dr. Watson (Jan MacLaren), who has been minister of Sefton Park Presbyterian Church, Liverpool, for 25 years, preached his farewell sermon yesterday. He has received a gift of £2,600 from his congregation.

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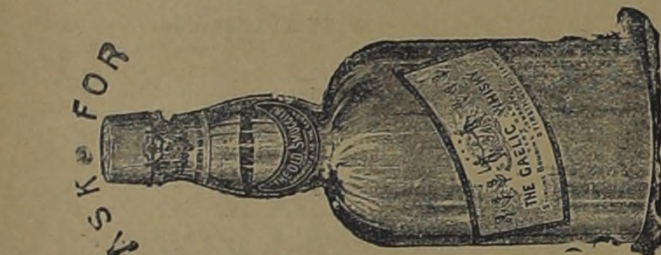
