NEWS OF THE DAY.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Saturday. It was resolved to refer back to Committee the Bill establishing an experimental Agricultural Colony in Tacuarembó. Approval was given to the Bill authorizing the presentation during the Extraordinary Sessions of petitions and of alternative Bills relative to the topics before the Chambers. There was no further business of general interest.

With regard to the financial operation, the *Dia* repeats that it was expected that the *ad referendum* contract would be signed yesterday afternoon. At the time of writing we are not able to state if this was actually done, but it will be known this morning. There is still doubt as to the exact extent of the operation, the latest version being that the Loan will be for 32 million dollars, at 5 1/2 per cent, which will be applied to the conversion of the 6 1/2 per cent internal debt, payment of the war claims, and of the 3 million dollars of the Transit Works Loan, and redemption of the Obligations issued for the Port and Drainage Works, permitting the conclusion of the Port Works in two years! This version comes indirectly, that is to say through Buenos Aires, and can not yet be accepted as authoritative.

The Budget Committee of the Representatives, reporting on the proposal of the Executive to increase the salaries of military officers in command of troops, not only approves it, but extends it to the commanding officers of the gunboats, Military Academy, National Arsenal and Cerro Fortress. The only reason adduced by the Committee is that the increase is required for "the dignity of the post and the exigencies of active functions of military respectability." Nothing is said as to the cost—the Committee does not seem even to have taken the trouble to estimate it—but it assuredly means a serious addition to military estimates which are already enormously and indefinitely excessive. No Government has higher expenditure than that of Sr. Batlle in this respect, and it is to be hoped that one of the first acts of his successor will be to restore the Republic to a peace footing, cutting down the military estimates by at least a million dollars, applicable to productive and necessary purposes or to the reduction of oppressive taxes. Until this is done, the Government can hardly claim to be economical in the true sense of the word. Dr. Williams—who may be the next President—not long ago proclaimed the policy of cutting down every unnecessary expense. We shall be glad to see that policy initiated, and the military estimates, with the monstrousness of nineteen standing regiments, offers an ample field for retrenchment.

The *Telegrafo* of Saturday evening returns to the charge against the proposal to increase the minor note issue of the Bank of the Republic. There is no proof at all, it reiterates, that there is any scarcity of minor circulating medium, but the contrary is proved by the fact that minor notes and silver are still at a discount in relation to gold. This is the case while the minor issue of the Bank is only some of \$2,566,000. If this is increased, as proposed, to \$5,235,000, the certain result will be a perturbation of business in which commerce will suffer and the only gainers will be the

exchange shops. At present the minor circulation (silver and notes) is about \$6,500,000, which proves ample and even excessive for all the needs of the market. Under the proposal of the Executive this would be increased to \$7,665,000, after allowing for the withdrawal of the silver to be held as reserve.—The *Tempo* also combats the proposal on similar lines, showing that the present low discount on silver must not be regarded as permanent, and qualifying the scheme as mainly a device for securing a larger circulation for the notes of the Bank.—To the various arguments against the scheme, it may be added that at present silver and minor notes circulate at a low discount because of the toleration of many business houses, which accept them where they might legally exact gold, and if the market were flooded with a fresh emission this toleration might be withdrawn.

CENTRAL URUGUAY RAILWAY OF MONTEVIDEO.

The ordinary general meeting of the proprietors of this railway was held on Monday, October 23, at River Plate House, Finbury Circus, E.C., Mr. Henry Bell in the chair.

The Acting Secretary (Mr. H. O. Tubby) having read the notice convening the meeting and the auditors' report, The Chairman proceeded to refer to the resignation of Mr. Frank Parish and Mr. H. G. Anderson from the board of directors, remarking that he trusted both these gentlemen would be long spared to enjoy their greater and deserved leisure. Continuing, he said: Our report is pleasant reading than the last one; it is a tale of moderate progress in almost all directions. The revolution, which made our last report such a dismal one, ended about the last days of September, after lasting for about nine months, months which were full of anxiety to us, and caused pecuniary loss to the shareholders in all our companies. As soon as the strike ended, trade revived, especially the outgoing trade, for there was so much fencing to renew and building damages to repair, that it gave us considerable traffic. But war is a dreadful thing, and a great many of the estancieros lost their stocks of cattle and sheep, in which their wealth mainly consists, and, if they were not lost in the revolution, the owner themselves drove them into Brazil, or sold them at sacrificial prices. Their natural increase has, therefore, been lost to us, and it will take some time to make it up. Agriculture shows signs of extending, and some further colonies have been established on our Western Extension, but nowhere is there shown that desire to cultivate the ground for wheat and maize that is shown in the sister Republic of Argentina. This state of affairs is largely owing to the unhappy state of conditions caused by the revolution, and perpetuated by the state of the labour market. Although we have, unhappily, had two strikes, they were not of long duration, and I wish to acknowledge that no damage was done to our property. The condition of affairs has become so acute that the Government has promised to introduce some sort of Conciliation Bill to regulate the relations of capital and labour. Our present director, Mr. Frank Henderson, was of great service to the company in helping to settle our last strike.

The new port works were considerably interfered with by the strikes, but we are informed that a portion is now open, and Government have ordered the entrance channel to be dredged. When these port works are finished, we anticipate a considerable improvement in traffic through Montevideo. The new freezing works at Montevideo have made a considerable difference in our sheep traffic to that city. You will see that live sheep traffic has more than doubled, but it is capable of doing considerably more, and when sheep stocks improve on the estancia I do not doubt but that it will be a source of good income for us. The principal events which have affected the branches—and through them the parent company—are, on the Northern, the establishment at Santa Anna of a new jerked beef factory. Santa Anna is right up to the north, on the Brazilian frontier, but it is so close to our Rivera Station that we have dealt with 11,000 tons of new traffic from that source alone, and when you look at the situation of that station, and see that traffic originating there has to be brought the entire length of our line, you can see how valuable it must be. Another encouraging feature connected with the Northern Company is the proposal to connect our line with the Southern Brazilian Railways. We have joined in the surveys necessary, and are waiting for the report. If this scheme is carried out, it should be the means of giving us a lot more long distance traffic. The North Eastern has done better than before, as it makes a less on working of only £13,000 in the past year. You may recollect that Mr. Anderson told us last year that the loss was £18,300, and that the lowest loss for 10 years was £14,000, so we are lower than that. Now, this is a hopeful augury for the Western also, which has done better this year. The traffic there shows an increase of 30 per cent. The Eastern Extension, also, has done considerably better, showing a net increase of £18,456, every source of revenue, excepting live stock, showing improvement.

Flies and their Ways.

THE HEN-PECKED MOSQUITO.

The Hon. Walter Rothschild took the chair at a lecture by Mr. Henry Hill at the London Institution, in aid of the Bank Clerks' Orphanage, and the subject was "Flies, and How They Disappear."

There are 40,000 kinds of flies, but Mr. Hill dealt with only three, typical of the three main species—namely, the house-fly, the "daddy long legs," and the mosquito. Of the whole species the house-fly is the highest form. His pedigree, therefore, entitles him to an honourable place in the household. His way of eating sugar does not strike one pleasantly, nevertheless, for he lowers his proboscis on to it, and then, from numerous hairs at the end, dribbles out drops of saliva, which turn the sugar into a syrup, which he then sucks up.

Mosquitos are quite interesting, and, according to Mr. Hill, the males are hen-pecked. It is only the female which stings, though the male has by far the more formidable appearance. He has two antennae, covered with beautiful hairs, with which he hears. Mosquito buzzes in the neighbourhood to call her husband's attention. He hears her faintly with one antenna, and is not particularly anxious to hear, either. Presently, Mrs. Mosquito calls more peremptorily, and Mr. M. slowly moves the other antenna till he can hear equally well with both; by the direction of his antennae, then, he discovers the direction of his wife, and obediently flies off to her.

Russian Affairs.

We quote the following telegrams from our Buenos Aires contemporaries:—Helsingfors, Nov. 24th.—The privy councillor of the Emperor Nicholas, Mr. Gerhard, is appointed Governor General of Finland. He is a Senator and President of civil and ecclesiastical affairs. He has liberal tendencies and is an authority on jurisprudence.

Moscow, Nov. 24th.—The *Russki Viedomosti* announces that the Government has decided to implant the system of universal suffrage and of secret voting. It is not yet settled, however, whether the members of the Duma are to be elected by the direct vote of the people or by the votes of those possessing certain qualifications.

The elections for the designation of the members of the National Assembly will take the place during February.

St. Petersburg, 24th.—The lock-out, or closing of the factories by the owners, who refuse to accept the impositions of the workmen, is extending. Nearly forty thousand workmen have been dismissed during the last three days.

Moscow, 24th.—Several factory owners have granted the nine hours' working day demanded by their employees. Others have closed the doors of their establishments rather than accept the demands of the workmen. At other factories a strike has been declared. The strikers have destroyed one factory. The wharfers have also gone on strike.

Moscow, Nov. 25th.—The Congress of Zemstvos has adopted a resolution declaring in favour of universal and direct suffrage, and the convocation of a constituent assembly, as the means whereby to pacify the people and carry out the promises contained in the Tsar's ukase of October 30th.

The Congress decided to support the Government while it adhered to its promise to put into effect the concessions made in the ukase referred to.

The Agrarian Congress in Poland pronounced in favour of a constituent assembly elected by universal suffrage without distinction of nationality, religion or sex. It also demanded the sale of the lands now in the hands of the nobility and wealthy proprietors, and advocated a continuation of the strike movement until their demands were granted.

Bastopol, 25th.—The seamen of the Black Sea fleet and the Regiment of Brest have mutinied. The workmen employed at the port have joined them. The mutineers have held a demonstration to compel the railway employees to leave their work. These, fearing a reprisal, submitted to the demands of the rebels.

St. Petersburg, 26th.—The Committee of Direction of the workmen met to-day and passed a resolution suspending temporarily the demand for an eight hour day.

Warsaw, Nov. 25th.—The Governor General of Poland has issued a strictly confidential circular to the provincial governors, ordering that agitators are to be treated as rebels and shot down without mercy. Public meetings are to be dissolved with bullets, and the ringleaders hunted down and shot, thereby facilitating the reduction of the populace, deprived of their leaders, to subjection. The fines imposed upon Jewish parents whose sons have evaded the military service are to be exacted without delay.

SUNDRIES.

WEATHER.—On Sunday we were favored with a glorious day, but yesterday was sultry, windy and dusty, with premonitory symptoms of disturbance.

TEA AND TENNIS.—We are asked to announce that Mrs. Cooper will give tea at the Lawn Tennis Club at the Parque Central tomorrow afternoon.

POLITEAMA THEATRE.—On Saturday this theatre will reopen for a summer season of national or *criolla* dramas by the well-known Company of Gerónimo Polistá. This Company has a lengthy repertoire of dramas, comedies and zarzuelas by Uruguayan and Argentine authors the scenes and characters of which are mostly taken from River Plate life and history. Many of these pieces have distinct dramatic and even literary merit, and show a great advance on the crude gaucho melodramas of the "Juan Moreira" type, for the most part based on unlimited homicide, which were the sole representatives of native drama until a few years ago. In fact, the pieces no longer appear on the programme, and so much the better.

URQUIZA THEATRE.—"La Bohème," one of the chief successes of the Company, will be repeated this evening for the benefit of the musical director Sr. Panonani.

POST OFFICE.—A month's leave of absence has been granted to the Postmaster General, Sr. F. García y Santos, on account of bad health. During his absence, his duties will be undertaken by the subdirector Sr. C. A. Carve.

STRIKE.—A partial strike of the Municipal street-cleaners is on foot, over a question of wages. For a long time they have been promised an increase of wages, which is provided for in the new Municipality Budget, but as the sanction of this seems to be interminably delayed, they have tried to hasten matters by a strike. Anyhow, the cleaning of the streets has been so indifferently performed for some time past that it is to be doubted if the strike will make any perceptible difference.

CARNIVAL DECORATIONS.—In reply to the call of the Municipality for plans for decorating the streets during approaching Carnival, four schemes have been presented, which will be submitted to a special Committee. As prizes were offered for the best scheme, we would have thought that a larger number would have been forthcoming.

DEPARTURE.—Mr. Carl P. G. Nielsen, cashier of the Western Telegraph Company, and a gentleman well-known in English-speaking circles, has left in the "Cap Ortelga" for a five months' holiday in Europe.

MARRIAGE.—The marriage was celebrated on Saturday of Dr. Juan Aarón Ramirez, until recently editor of the *Stiplo*, and Miss María Adelaida García Morales.

ARRIVAL.—We note the arrival here from New York of Mr. W. L.

Watts, manager of the Alvan Clark Corporation of Cambridge, U. S. As we informed our readers recently, Mr. Watts comes to assist in the installation of an International Solar Observatory, a scheme to which great scientific importance is attached.

—DEATH.—A London telegram announces the death of the eminent physician and physiologist Sir John Scott Burden-Sanderson, in his 77th year. He was made a Baronet, in recognition of his services to science, in 1899.

—INCONSISTENT.—The *Dia* calls attention to the fact that the authorities have refused to remit the customs duties on a lot of bibles introduced by the American Bible Society for distribution, but at the same time have permitted the entrance duty free of a number of images and ecclesiastical vestments for the Capuchin Church. This inconsistent treatment of religious objects calls for some explanation. If graven images can enter free, why not the Holy Bible?

—UNWELCOME VISITORS.—A contemporary announces that on Saturday there landed here some ten or eleven agitators and strike-promoters, expelled from Buenos Aires as turbulent and dangerous members of society. They were welcomed on shore by a number of their companions, and at once proceeded to the quarters of the various Trade Unions. We have already had unpleasant experience of the results arising from this class of visitors, which the Government went out of its way to make welcome here, and quite probably before long we may hear of obnoxious activity on the part of the new arrivals in the shape of more strike troubles. As to the strikes in Buenos Aires, we are still without a shred of information as to their progress.

—AN OFFENDER.—We call the attention of our censorious weekly contemporary to the conduct of the *B. A. Herald*, which is transgressing all the rules laid down by the former for the conduct of a foreign paper, by audaciously expressing open and severe disapproval of certain acts of the Argentine President and Government. We may charitably imagine, however, that when the *Herald* did this, it was unaware that it would thereby incur the dire wrath of our weekly contemporary, which upholds the noble principle that a foreign paper has no right to express adverse opinions on local affairs. The *Herald* has our sincere sympathy in its misfortune, but no doubt our weekly contemporary will soon illuminate it as to the painful error of its ways. It will then learn that, in this part of the world, Presidents are always immaculate (until they have quitted office) and Governments always in the right (until their term has expired). Even if this should not be exactly the case, it is not the duty of a foreign paper to say so, unless, if course it holds the absurd view that it is supposed to give its readers a truthful and impartial account of events. If the *Herald* wants to attain journalistic perfection—according to the lines laid down by our weekly contemporary—let it point everything in rosy tints, suppress all unfavorable items, support all the Governments in all their acts, today to every one in authority, and invariably refer to the President as popular, wise, patriotic, and the sublimation of all the talents and the virtues.

—BRITISH CABINET CRISIS.—A London telegram now explains that the trouble in the Cabinet is caused by the Prime Minister's refusal to include in the Protectionist tariff advocated by Mr. Joseph Chamberlain and his adherents certain articles which have hitherto been introduced into the United Kingdom free of duty. The Protectionist party refuses to give way on the point, and this has caused the crisis. At the Cabinet Council held on Friday, however, it was decided that circumstances did not call for the resignation of the Ministry, and resolved to appeal to the people by dissolving Parliament and calling for new elections. No date was fixed upon which they were to take place. (The above comes in doubtful form, and we regard it as requiring confirmation.)

The Hon. Sir Charles Hardinge, British Ambassador at St. Petersburg, has been appointed Under-Secretary of Foreign Affairs.

LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, OCT. 30.

The King arrived in London on Saturday afternoon on his return from his visit to Lord Londesborough at Londesborough Park, Yorkshire.

The Suffragan Bishops of Woolwich and Kingston-on-Thames, in the Diocese of Southwark, were consecrated on Saturday in St. Saviour's Cathedral, Southwark. The Archbishop of Canterbury officiated.

Lord Rosebery, presiding on Saturday afternoon at the annual meeting of the Scottish History Society in Edinburgh, commented on the fact recorded in one of the society's recent publications, the "Baron Court Records of St. Saviour's," that during the 160 years over which the records extended only cases of drunkenness were brought before the Baron Court. He confessed his inability to explain this extraordinary piece of statistics. Discussing the period which Scottish history should be considered as covering for the purposes of the society, he held that it should begin with the invention of printing, and end with the period covered by the publication of the Waverley novels.

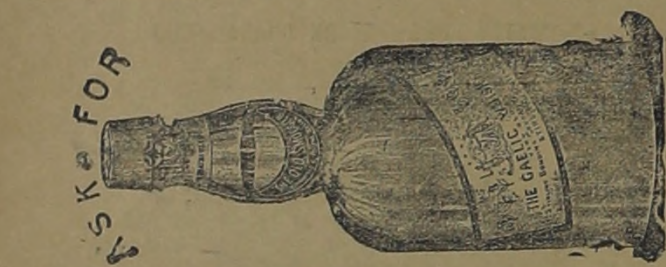
