point of view, we think not. There is certainly a ludicrous side to the general dismay when it is remembered that we have all been insisting lately that the great need is to devote less time to games and more to education and “grind.” But there is a serious side also. It ought to be characteristic of any people meaning to go forward to be determined to be taught by the enemy. That was one of the greatest lessons of the Boer War; it was the lesson which the Austrian generals could not learn from Napoleon. He broke all the rules of warfare; but he shattered the Austrian generals’ armies. That national capability of learning new methods is evinced in small affairs such as football just as plainly as in great matters such as war. If the English football players were unable to learn anything from the New Zealand team, or if they obstinately adhered to methods proved obsolete by their opponents, that would be evidence of a national characteristic which would have to be noted for what it was worth as a sign of changing times. But the evidence is the other way, we think. If in due time the New Zealanders are beaten at the game which they have won the right to call their own, that will be evidence of a capacity for lesson-learning which, so far as it goes, should be a matter of encouragement.

Ignatieff’s proceeding Dr. Witte was fully acquainted with all that transpired, and, a special train having been got ready to convey Ignatieff to the Tsar’s palace, Dr. Witte availed himself of it and went to Tsarskoe itself. Arrived there, he obtained an audience of the Tsar and laid the whole matter before His Majesty, pointing out how these machinations of his enemies must affect the efforts of the Tsar and of himself to restore tranquility to the country. The Emperor listened attentively to Dr. Witte and promised his full support to the Prime Minister in his endeavours to implant the civil and political liberties claimed by the people. Notwithstanding this triumph, Dr. Witte’s position is regarded as perilous owing to the bitter and implacable opposition of the Ignatieff coterie, and further developments are looked for.

London, 14th.—It is learnt from St. Petersburg that nearly all the telegraphists of the Empire have again gone on strike. Very few lines are working.

London, 14th.—The reports received from St. Petersburg say that the situation in the Russian Empire continues to be very grave. At Riga the disorders continue. Mobs of roughs assault and set fire to the houses. Two battalions of citizens have been formed to protect the towns.

London, 14th.—Advices from Olesza say that the police have discovered a conspiracy in that city to assassinate the Governor and other high officials. Several soldiers are implicated in the plot, and will be tried by court martial.

Odessa, 14th.—The irritation against the Governor, General Kaulbars, is increasing daily. He is considered sanguinary and ferocious in his methods.

London, 15th.—The Daily Mail publishes a telegram from its correspondent in St. Petersburg, announcing that the last telegram received by the Russian Ministry of War from the Commander-in-Chief of the Russian army in Manchuria and the Maritime Province of Siberia, General Linvith, states that that officer finds it impossible to combat the revolutionary propaganda that is being carried on among the soldiers of the regiments in Manchuria. Half of the effective strength of the forces under this command are in a state of open mutiny and the remainder cannot be relied upon.

—DROWNED.—On Thursday night Carlos Harrison (Englishman) stoker of the Government tug “Lavalloja,” was drowned in the bay while trying to swim to his vessel, from which he had been absent without leave. When he found himself sinking he shouted for help, but sank before it could be given.

—THE MERE MAN.—We always knew that the mere man counted for very little at a wedding, but we did think that in an engagement he was at least of sufficient importance to be mentioned. A Buenos Aires contemporary apparently thinks otherwise, for it makes this announcement *tout sec*:—“The engagement of the Misses Bouvier, daughters of Mrs. Arthur Brown is announced. —FOOTBALL.—The annual inter-University football match (Rugby rules) took place at Richmond on Thursday. Cambridge winning by 15 points to 13.

—MURDERERS PUNISHED.—A Pekin telegram reports that the Chinese accused of murdering some American missionaries at Lien Chiao have been dealt with by the authorities. Three were decapitated, eight received sentences of imprisonment with hard labour for terms varying from 18 months to 5 years, and seven others received lighter sentences.

—MISS ROOSEVELT ENGAGED.—A Washington telegram states that Miss Alice Roosevelt’s engagement to Mr. Nicholas Longworth, member of the House of Representatives for Cincinnati, is publicly announced.

—DECIMAL SYSTEM.—According to a telegram the New York Herald has commenced an energetic campaign in favour of the adoption of the metric-decimal system. In a long editorial article, the present system is condemned as a relic of the Middle Ages which must be abandoned. The adoption of the decimal system will facilitate commercial relations between the United States and South America. The Herald is also circulating a pamphlet advocating the system. The metric system was adopted by the United States in 1866, but as it was not made compulsory, the law became a dead letter.

PASSING NOTES.

Critics have not failed promptly to notice the peculiar discrepancy of the attitude of the Government in relation to the Municipal strike now on foot. As soon as this was declared the soldiers were ordered out to perform the duties of the strikers and to give military protection during their performance, and in the Chambers members of the official party denied the right of the men to strike and even suggested that they should be submitted to criminal punishment. The contrast with the official attitude in the previous strikes could not be greater. There was no hint of denying the right of the men to strike—it may even be said that they were encouraged—beyond the barest and not always effectual maintenance of order the Government refused to take any step that might assist the masters, thereby practically aiding the cause of the men; and the idea that soldiers should temporarily replace the strikers was indignantly rejected. Certainly it is true that the municipal employees now on strike are engaged in urgent public services, but the same may be said in hardly less degree of men engaged in running trains and in loading or unloading the cargo of vessels whose stay in this port is perforce limited to a few hours. If it is justifiable to employ the military in removing household refuse, as we saw done yesterday, it can hardly be unjustifiable to employ them in handling cargo and protecting railway traffic. The one and the other are equally tasks which could not be abandoned without causing serious and immediate public inconvenience, and injury falling on those in no way responsible for the causes of the strike. With industrial strikes the case is mostly different. The matter must therefore be set down as one of those glaring and incomprehensible inconsistencies in which the present Government has been so fertile. We are inclined to imagine that its different attitude in the present case is prompted by the idea that its own authority—for in a certain sense the Municipality is part of itself—is affected, and what was right or at least permissible when done towards others, at once becomes wrong when done towards itself. It would not be the first time that the Government has shown this special and peculiar criterion—but even this does not explain why it should have allowed the Trade Unions to assume an authority superior to its own and to the laws and become the autocratic arbiters of all the conditions of labor, undermining industrial authority and abolishing the liberty of work. In effect, the whole labor system has fallen into a state of anarchy and chaos which it will be no easy task to set right, and all for the want of timely legislation and of consistency of view in official circles. Now that it is the turn of “authority” to be the victim of strikes, its eyes may be opened. Anyhow, the matter deserves to be put on record.

Another matter which cannot escape notice is that nearly all of the recent financial schemes of the Government have provoked more or less serious protest and resistance from the parties affected and given rise to petitions to the Chambers or to the Government itself. Among these may be mentioned the proposed increase of minor note issue, the increased assessments for the property tax in the interior, the consular tariff, and, in the last few days, the conversion scheme, at all events as regards the summary cutting down of the interest on the War Indemnity Loan. We do not include the summary deprivation of six months’ interest on the last mentioned Loan, because that was the work of the Chambers, though that also provoked strong and justified protest. Some of these matters are in way of being remedied, but that does not make less noteworthy the fact that they all give rise to protest. In the present case, it would be unjust to accuse the Government of either want of financial ability or of deliberate improper intention, but the fact remains that its financial proposals have not been happy nor popular, and this can only be attributed to the fact that, like practically all “colorado” Governments, it is out of touch and harmony with the interests for which it is called upon to legislate, namely the productive, property-owning, commercial and business classes of the country. These classes, though in their entirety they represent nearly all that there is of value and progress in the country, remain now, as ever, with little or no representation in the Government, which stands from them as a thing apart and distinct. POLITICAL NOTES.

The Senators sat on Friday. Approval was completed in first reading of the Annual License Tax for the capital, without fresh amendment. Sanction was completed of the Bill authorizing the holding of a National Exhibition in 1906. Approval was given in second reading to the Bill amending the Wines Act, which now passes to the other Chamber. There was no further business.

The Committee Report on the Conversion Scheme is ready and is being printed, so we suppose it will become public in a few days. The Report, as we understand, is favorable to the Executive Bill, except on the point of the conversion of the War Indemnity Loan, to which a bonus not exceeding 2 per cent. will be allowed.

It is stated that the Finance Committee of the Representatives has regarded favorably the commercial protests against the new consular tariff, and will modify it accordingly. This is as it should be, but it would have been better still if commercial interests had been consulted from the first.

The Decree has been issued reappointing Dr. A. Vidal y Fuentes, as President and Drs. G. Honoré, J. Canabal, A. Crovetto and J. Martirén as Members of the National Council of Hygiene, their term having expired.

Old Games and New Methods.

The *Spectator* devotes an interesting article to the continued success of the New Zealand Rugby football fifteen which is touring the country this winter. The success of the team has sent the critics writing to the newspapers, of course; and the gloomier-minded among them have seen in it traces of a decline in British national physique, prowess of endurance, capacity to play games requiring nerve, and so on. The *Spectator* has very little sympathy with this kind of lamentation. “We do not see any signs that among the classes from whom the teams are picked who have played the New Zealanders there is any deterioration in physique; and as for the alleged incapacity, or comparative incapacity, of Englishmen to play games demanding stamina and assurance, you would expect, if the allegation were founded on fact, to find Englishmen being beaten in other outdoor sports besides Rugby football. Yet the very opposite is the case.” There is, the *Spectator* thinks, a very simple reason, surely, for the continued success of the New Zealanders. “All games are capable of development, can be played in this or that way, can be improved, or altered, or made more scientific or more difficult, even without greatly changing the rules.... Rules were made for the game, and not the game for the rules. The daring innovator does not so much break old rules as make fresh ones. And so with Rugby football, which since the days when Crew, the artful dodger, howled over Sand East in the first game that Tom Brown saw played at Rugby, has hardly been startled by the rule-breaker or revitalized by discoveries. Twelve thousand miles away from the school from which the game took its name the descendants of the football players of Tom Brown’s day have been playing the old game among themselves; but, because they have not played it with the older players as teachers, they have hit upon secrets which the orthodox have missed. They will be beaten in turn, very likely, when their opponents have set themselves to discover the secret of their success; but meanwhile the innovators hold the field. We are paying too grave an attention, it may be suggested, to what after all is merely a game. Looking at it from one

A Hint to Advertisers.

Pointed and impressive testimony as to the small value of poster and other outdoor advertising, in comparison with the more regular and less obtrusive methods of securing publicity, is furnished in the recent annual report of the American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society. During the past year this organization sent letters to fourteen of the largest advertising concerns in the United States, asking for a statement as to the amount spent by each in outdoor advertising and the estimate placed upon the value and effectiveness of such advertising. The answer received to these queries were illuminative. One firm which appropriates from \$350,000 or \$500,000 a year for advertising purposes now devotes only five per cent. of its appropriation to outdoor display, and expresses a doubt whether even this amount is profitably expended. Another firm which has been in the practice of appropriating about the same percentage for outdoor advertising in a half-million dollar advertising budget has been so disappointed in the results that it has given up the outdoor method entirely. Several companies which expend vast sums each for advertising express the belief that outdoor displays on rocks, trees, &c., are of value only in reaching the illiterate class and others who read but little and must be impressed by posters and pictures, if at all. For this reason one concern, whose advertising budget is nearly one million a year, spends nothing at all on outdoor displays in the United States and Canada, but resorts to this method in Cuba, where the population is so largely illiterate. This tells its own story.—*Leslie’s Weekly* (New York).

The Sultan of Turkey has declined the Macedonian financial reform scheme which has been drafted by the Powers. We understand that His Majesty at the same time informed the representatives of the Powers that, if a naval demonstration should become necessary, he would be happy to review the fleets, as there is nothing he enjoys so much.

It is again rumoured that the Admiralty intend shortly to introduce drastic changes in the costumes of our sailors, and the pretty little low-necked blouse is said to be doomed.

It is impossible to please everyone. Habitués of the Underground Railway are now beginning to complain that, since the electrification of the line, it has become impossible to identify the various stations by the respective density of their smells.

The owner of a motor-car which caught fire last week, causing him to be slightly singed, was seen shaking his fist at the thing and shouting, “Scorch!”

Three-half-penny dinners have been hailed as a great novelty. As a matter of fact they are no innovation, but have always been obtainable at certain restaurants, though a considerably higher price was charged for them.

General Ignatieff, after consultation with his clique, resolved to try the effect of a bold “coup” by presenting himself suddenly before the Tsar at Tsarskoe Selo and demanding, in the names of the adherents to the autocratic regime, the immediate dismissal of Count de Witte and his Government. The strike extends to the street cleaners, the refuse men (*basureros*) and the workers in the slaughter yards and other Municipal Departments. As soon as the intelligence was conveyed to the President, he gave orders for the soldiers of the garrison regiments to replace the strikers as far as possible and to give military protection to the work. Yesterday the *basura* carts went their rounds in the middle of the day, collecting the household refuse, with soldiers on the box and under a mounted military guard, giving rise to some amusing and not particularly edifying scenes. Her Majesty has decided that the fund initiated by her self be called “The Queen’s Unemployed Fund,” and that it shall be administered by the central bodies and distress committees set up under the Unemployed Workmen’s Act. 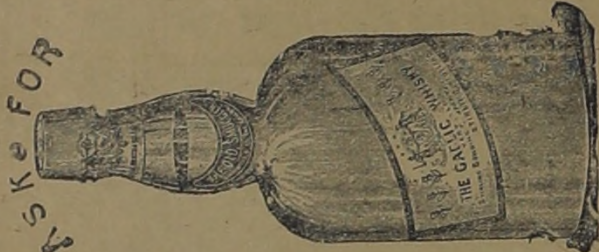
