NO REPLY FROM ITALY

Geneva, September 10th
The Delegates of the various Nations attending the League's efforts to avoid a clash between Italy and Abyssinia are greatly perturbed at Italy's refusal to reply to the request of the Council of the Five, who sent a special message in which they expressed the hope that Italy would take no steps which would be likely to hinder their efforts in the cause of peace. Although a reply to the message was not requested by the Council, it was expected that a direct answer would have been received from Rome, or at least an acknowledgment made through the Italian Delegate. On the other hand the Emperor of Abyssinia has replied favourably to the note, and at the same time reports that the massing of Italian troops on the Frontier continues uninteruptedly.

GENEVA

Geneva, September 10th
The French Minister Mr. Pierre Laval, had an interview which lasted for more than one hour, with the British Ministers, Sir Samuel Hoare and Captain Antony Eden. It is understood that the Italo-Abyssinian dispute was thoroughly studied, expert advisers were present and every effort was made to find a peaceable solution, which would be acceptable to both parties. Immediately afterwards Mr. Laval received Baron Aloisi, when a long interview took place. On the departure of Baron Aloisi, Mr. Laval was again in conference with the British Minister for Foreign Affairs, Sir Samuel Hoare.

FREE ADVICE FROM OZZY

London, September 10th
Speaking at Southampton yesterday, Sir Oswald Mosley declared that Great Britain should mind her own business and keep out of the Italo-Ethiopian dispute. "The Black Shirts have conducted a campaign on the Ethiopian question throughout this country because they are determined that Great Britain should not be dragged into a war where no British interests are involved. They say: 'Enough of this folly!! Mind Great Britain's business, and place the Empire in a position to defend itself before you begin to play with the affairs of other peoples'."

He asserted that the whole trouble could be averted by giving Italy, as the nearest Power, a mandate under the League of Nations to restore civilisation and order in Ethiopia.

EMPRESS TO APPEAL

Geneva, September 9th
The Empress of Ethiopia will officially inaugurate a new broad-casting station at Addis Ababa at 23.45 (Central European time) tomorrow, when she will broadcast an appeal to the woman of the world. She will speak in Amharic and her appeal will be translated into English by Princess Tschai. The broadcast has been organised by the International League of Women for Peace and Liberty, and will be relayed to America.

SUGGESTED MANDATE FOR ABYSSINIA

London, September 10th
According to a message received by the "Times" correspondent in Geneva, the British Government has proposed a collective Mandate for Abyssinia. Although details of the proposed mandate are not known, it is believed that it would be controlled by the High Court of the League of Nations, or by Representatives of the Nations, which signed the 1906 treaty. England, however, insists that the mandate must be satisfactory to Ethiopians.

SENATOR LONG DEAD

Baton Rouge, Sept 10
Senator Huey Long died shortly after midnight. Although every effort was made to save him, he had lost an enormous amount of blood and after three transfusions had been made, the doctors declared that there was nothing further to be done.

FRENCH PRECAUTIONS

Paris September 9th
The Government today decided to increase the military forces in French Somaliland by one-third as a precautionary measure to ensure the policing of the tiny colony and respect for the frontiers in the event of war breaking out between Italy and Ethiopia. Six hundred volunteers from the élite of the French Colonial regiments are being assembled to be rushed to Djibouti as soon as possible to reinforce the 2,000 French and native troops already there. These volunteers are from regiments with long colonial experience, many of them being veterans of French's successful pacification of Morocco, which it is believed has served partly to inspire the Ethiopian campaign of Sgr. Mussolini and the Italian General Staff. The troops will be charged with the policing of the 70,000 natives — Somalis, Issas, and Danakils—among whom the white population of 4,000 is submerged, and will reinforce the garrisons in the stone forts which guard the frontier. They will also aid the gendarmes in protecting the docks and warehouses and ensuring the railway from Djibouti to Addis Ababa being kept open for international traffic in the event of war.

QUEST ARRIVES IN ABERDEEN

London, September 10th
Sir Ernest Shackleton's famous ship the Quest, which was chartered by the British East Greenland Expedition this summer to transport a party and store to carry out exploration in the Arctic, reached Aberdeen this afternoon. It is reported that at one time the vessel was in such great danger from the ice that preparations were made to abandon her. Among those who returned today was Mr. A. Courtauld, on whose account great anxiety arose a few years ago when he wintered alone at a northern post, being found by his companions with difficulty in the following spring. On the present voyage he was accompanied by his wife.

The leader of the expedition, Mr. E. R. Wager, and several of the members have remained behind in Greenland for the winter. It is expected that the meteorological and other observations taken will be of great value in connection with possible air transport routes across Greenland.

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SIR PERCIVAL PHILLIPS'S REPORT ON SITUATION

London, September 10th
Sir Percival Phillips, the special correspondent of the "Daily Telegraph", estimates that since Friday about 10,000 Italian troops have advanced due south to Addis Ababa and south-east to Barachit, occupying a line roughly 40 miles in length between those points, while other forces have been sent to the west.

The Italian Minister interviewed the French Minister yesterday (Monday), and is believed to have discussed the question of the French Legation taking over Italian interests if he receives orders from Rome to leave the country. It is understood on reliable authority that the Emperor rejects outright all the formulas so far proposed at Geneva, including a tripartite mandate, an international police force, and has also made it clear to the Ethiopian delegation at Geneva that the Government is firmly opposed to Italian political or economic domination in any form.

ITALIAN INTENTIONS UNKNOWN

Addis Ababa, September 9th
According to the officials, troops have begun moving towards the south within Italian territory along the roads from Asmara and Addis Ababa. It is admitted that the intentions are unknown, and that this may simply be a manoeuvre to get the troops out of Asmara and other congested areas in order to make room for new drafts. It is reported that there have been many transfers of Italian troops from east to west and vice-versa.

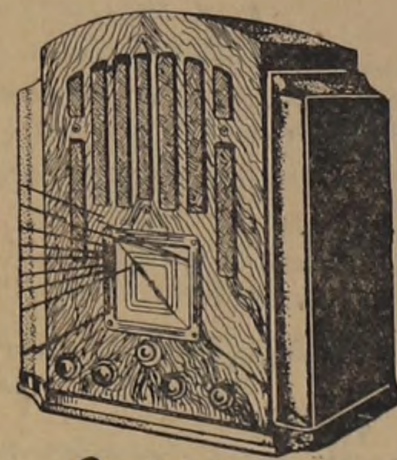
LEGATION'S STATEMENT

Addis Ababa, September 9th
The Italian Legation declares that the movements of troops in Eritrea are of a normal character and are devoid of any significance. Meanwhile the Negus remain firm, and it is reported that he will not agree to any tripartite mandate, an Italian Protectorate similar to that of Great Britain in Iraq, or an international police force.

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WHAT NOW?

News from Europe indicate that the skilled Diplomat has almost reached the end of his wonderful stock of mean-ingless phrases, and that the time has now arrived when cards must be laid on the table. The struggle is about to begin; the struggle which will be anxiously watched by the whole civilized world. The long, weary waiting for the League of Nations to come to a satisfactory arrangement for the settlement of the Italo-Abyssinian dispute is coming to an end. So far as can be ascertained, the prospects of a peace-solution to the problem is extremely remote. The outstanding individual during the whole controversy, has been Sr. Mussolini, the Italian Dictator, and while we may strongly disapprove of any form of Dictatorship, few will fail to admire this gentleman's complete frankness. For while few persons are able to fol-

low the tortuous turns of the mentality of the trained Foreign Diplomat, and his wonderful capacity of concealing his real object in a maze of meaningless phrases; Mussolini has informed the whole world what he wants that nothing short of a miracle can prevent it.

The procrastinating manner in which the League of Nations has dealt with the present situation has only been playing into his hands, because while they have been talking in Geneva, Mussolini has been transferring his fighting men and material to the frontiers of Abyssinia, in order to be able to strike when the weather conditions are suitable for warfare in that country. One cannot admire the manners of the Italian Dictator, nor can one entirely agree with the logic of his arguments which appear to be somewhat paradoxical; for while he is beseeching

Italian womanhood to produce more and more babies, and so help to make Italy a great nation, he is at the same time insisting on getting more territory, on the ground that Italy cannot feed or provide for her present population. Few people excepting his own countrymen are deceived by these claims, and we believe that few of these who have lived abroad for any length of time would be prepared to exchange their present condition, for the doubtful benefits obtainable under Fascist Rule. We must therefore assume that Mussolini's demand for a larger place under the sun, arises from the personal ambition of a Dictator, rather than the immediate need for expansion on the part of Italy. This frankness is of so belittling a nature as to inspire any & everyone who may have something to protect in the way of territories, from the spoilation of such an aggressor, to sit up and take notice. And if the League of Nations should fail in its efforts to dissuade Mussolini from embarking upon his avowed object that is, the annexation of Abyssinia, and should the world stand by and allow this plan to be carried out without lending a hand in defense of the assailed, then with the massed forces at the disposal of Italy, the logical outcome of such a campaign would be victory for Italy. And after that, WHAT? Whence is the line drawn to Military aggression?

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What is the limit to Mussolini's aspirations? These are the questions the people of free countries are asking. Our Mr. Eden has made desperate efforts to bring about a satisfactory solution to the present dead-lock in Geneva, but without success. It is true that he has received little cooperation from the Delegates of the other large powers, and it would appear that nothing short of a miracle can prevent war in Abyssinia. The time for Geneva to act has arrived. If one more is added to the sorry list of failures it will surely be time for the British Empire to realize that she must protect her own interests in her own way instead of counting on the cooperation and good will of the European nations which she never has had in the past, and has apparently little hope of securing in the future.

POLICE IMPROVEMENTS

The Executive Power has issued a decree to the effect that the principle Police Stations in the Interior must be visited monthly by Inspectors from the Ministry of the Interior, who will endeavor to correct any irregularities which they may notice, any serious infractions of discipline or conduct must be immediately reported to the Ministry. This applies to the more important police Stations.

The smaller and less important stations are to be visited not less than three times per year.

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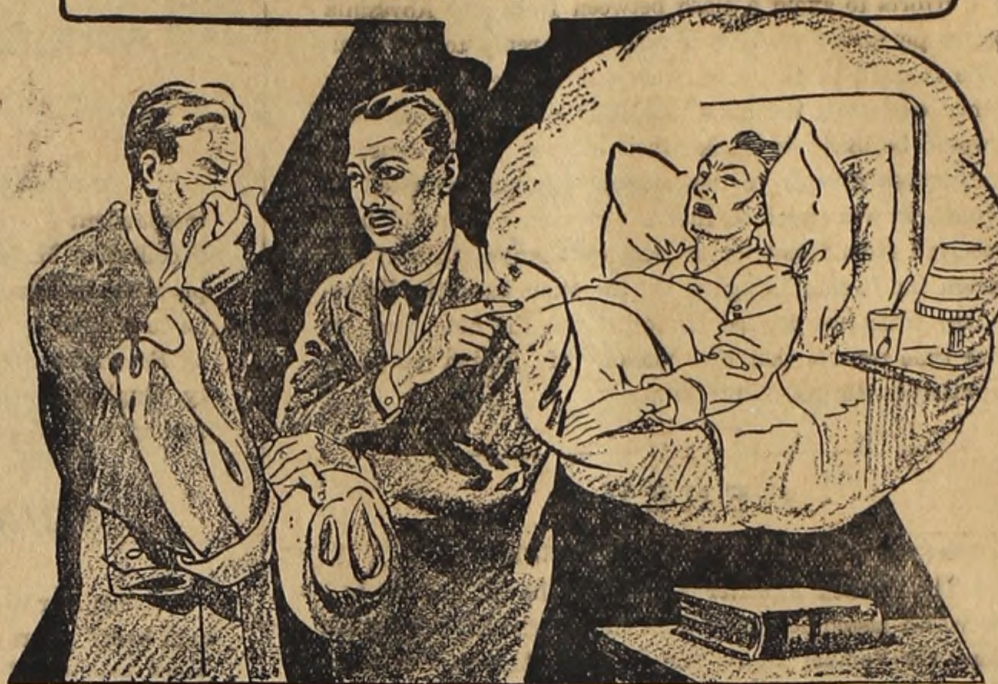

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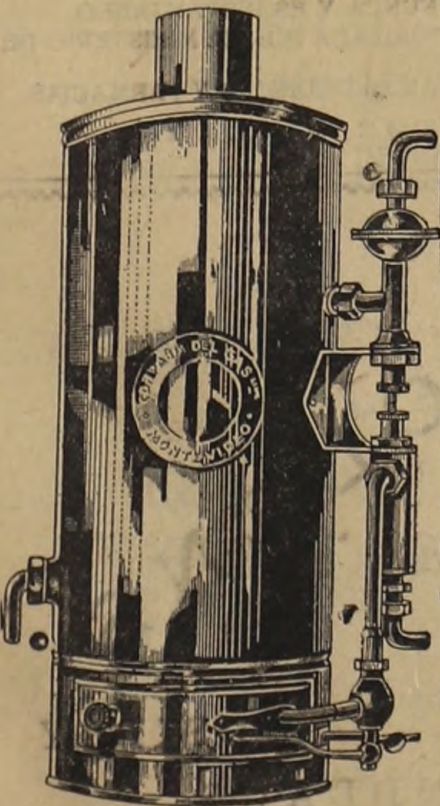

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WEIRD DEATH OF DIVER AS HE SIGNALLED SON

Theodore L. Herbert, was a veteran deep-sea diver, and he once said that he got a thrill every time he went below the surface. But he never let himself be disturbed over the risk involved, he felt that worry only increased the danger.

"If a fellow gets scared while he's under water", Herbert said, "he will never get out".

The other day Herbert was asked to go down from a dock, into thirty feet of water, to bring up some baffle-plates, which needed repairing. It was a simple job — in comparison to some of the things he had done. On reaching the bottom, he would have to trudge through the slime to a hole that opened into a submarine tunnel under a canal lock. Then after climbing through the hole, he would have to make his way along the tunnel for fifty feet or so, until he came to the baffle-plates, which were heavy iron gratings that had been set up to hold back sediment and rubbish.

Herbert's son, Theodore Junior — who is also a diver — helped his father get into the diving suit, which is made of two thicknesses of heavy canvas with a layer of sheet rubber cemented between them. Young Herbert strapped on his father's lead-soled shoes and laced up the leg flaps. Then he fastened on the belt harness, with its girdle of weights, and adjusted the metal breastplate over the thick rubber collar.

This brought him to the last and most important step in the preparations — that of putting

on the helmet. No matter how experienced a diver may be, there is always a tense moment when the helmet is placed over his head — for after he is in the water, his life depends upon the helmet being securely fastened to the breastplate.

So when young Herbert raised the ponderous spherical headpiece he and his father exchanged a swift, understanding glance — as usual. The father smiled.

"O.K." he said. "Let's get going".

He took a final drag on his cigarette and tossed it into the water. Young Herbert settled the helmet on the breastplate gasket, which circled the father's neck. With a deft motion the son engaged the threads and gave the helmet a quarter turn, making the rig water-tight. Then he clamped the helmet to the breastplate with a lock-nut in the back. The life line was fastened to the harness belt, and the father went over the side. The air pump was in operation, and for a moment the diver remained near the surface — the top of the helmet awash — while he tested the air valves and made sure there was no leak in the suit. Then he gave a tug on the life line as a signal that everything was all right, and was lowered into thirty feet of water.

The life line had marks on it at intervals, and from these young Herbert could keep track of how much line was being let out, and follow his father's progress along the bottom. Thus, when the

line slackened up, he knew that his father must be climbing through the hole into the tunnel, and when he felt a tug for more line, he knew his father must be ready to start down the tunnel.

Young Herbert played out fifty feet more of line, which meant that the father had traveled that distance down the tunnel. Then the line quit running out, and the son took in the slack. But a moment later he felt tug, which was a call for more line.

In a short while the pull on the line eased off, and the son took in slack again, and waited. Evidently the father had reached the baffle-plates and to work dislodging them.

Young Herbert had an eye on his watch, for a diver must not remain under water too long, on account of the pressure — and after some time he began to get uneasy. His father must be having trouble getting the baffle-plates loose. Ten minutes — without a signal. Maybe something had gone wrong.

But that was unlikely. This was a simple job, and not much chance for a mishap. The air pump was working perfectly. So young Herbert told himself he must not get alarmed. His father had been diving for thirty years, and had been down on at least a thousand jobs. The elder Herbert had helped to raise a number of sunken vessels and had recovered many bodies. He knew the bottom of this section of the River almost as well as the average man knew the streets of his home town.

Even so, as time passed without a signal from the man under the water, young Herbert became more uneasy. He gave three tugs on the life line, which mean: "Is everything all right?" To his surprise, he received a signal that his father was coming up. Now what did that mean? Was he through with the job, or in difficulty? The son started taking in line, and had just figured out that the father must have reached the hole in the tunnel, when he received a sharp jerk, which meant: "Stop taking in the line!"

Meetings are being held to this end, and it appears that the initial steps in the matter were taken after considerable pressure had been applied to the Municipalities by Dr. Guillermo Burmeister, a well known resident of Salto, and the Salteño Rotary Club.



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BRITISH FLYING NEWS

Air Ministry plans to implement the government's program of Royal Air Force expansion have reached a stage where the character of the new flying equipment which will be employed by the squadrons is becoming apparent. Important contracts are in course of negotiation, several of them for new types of warplane. The total number of aircraft needed before March, 1937, exceeds 2,000 and involves placing with the Air Ministry contractors the largest orders since the War. On its side, the aircraft industry, which as a whole has known lean times for the past fifteen years, is able and ready to meet the increased demands upon its resources.

Several of the older types of aeroplane now in service with the R.A.F. are doomed to disappear within the next few months. Their places will be taken by new machines, some of which are still secret, of markedly superior performance and general flying qualities. Thus, two new types of twin-engined heavy bomber are already coming into service — the Handley Page Heyford biplane and the Fairey Hendon, a big monoplane built to carry a large load at high speed over distances. Within the past few days, the Ministry has announced its intention to place an order for a twin-engined medium bomber which is especially interesting because it is developed from the design of a civil machine built to meet the needs of a wealthy private buyer. This craft, designed, built and flown by the Bristol company in less than twelve months, is an all-metal low-wing monoplane powered with two supercharged Mercury 645 h.p. engines. It has a retractable undercarriage, flaps to reduce landing speed, and controllable-pitch airscrews. In civil form it has reached a speed of nearly 270 miles an hour, or fifty miles an hour more than the speed yet attained for the fastest American twin-engined transport planes. Military requirements in armament and increased load may bring down slightly the speed attained by the bomber version, but it will remain a craft of outstanding performance and unsurpassed in speed by any comparable foreign machine.

A new medium bomber of exceptional interest is the Vickers monoplane with retractable undercarriage and Pegasus engine which was shown at the S.B.A. C. Display last month. This machine, for which a considerable order is likely, employs the "geodetic" construction worked out by Mr. B. N. Wallis, who designed the successful rigid airship R100. The result is a machine of notably low structural weight, implying ability to transport a very heavy load in fuel and armament. Much of the efficiency of the design is due to very high "aspect ratio" — the wings are of immense span in relation to their average "chord", or width from front to back.

EXPORT OF CATTLE TO VENEZUELA

A resolution has been passed by the Ministry of Agriculture, by which a grant of \$ 750.00 has been made towards the expenses of a trial shipment of breeding live stock to the afore-mentioned country. This sum of money has been conceded as the result of a request made by the Asociación Rural.
