

GREAT BRITAIN AND THE APPLICATION OF SANCTIONS

London, September 12th

Political circles in London consider that it will be difficult to apply sanctions against Italy, owing to the absence of the United States, Germany and Japan from the League of Nations, nevertheless, it is considered that the application of Economic Sanctions alone, even if not sufficient to prevent war, would at least shorten its duration, whatever the sanctions authorized by the League of Nations to be applied against Italy. It is considered that British Military and Naval forces have been reduced to a dangerous level, and that immediate steps must be taken for a general increase. It is for this reason that the rumours of a new loan are so prevalent. It is considered that no difficulty will be experienced with the opposition, as they were the party to suggest the application of sanctions against Italy.

ITALIANS TO SHOOT ON SIGHT

Addis Ababa, September 12th

Information has been received from Belgian Diplomatic sources that fourteen Belgian Officers who arrived at this port have been warned by the Italian Consul that all foreigners serving with the Abyssinian forces, will be shot on sight.

ROME STILL DEFIANT

Rome, September 12th

Information has been received from persons closely connected with Government Circles, that Italy is determined to invade Abyssinia irrespective of the attitude France may adopt. The report further states that Italy will persist in her present course of action even if France at to-morrow's meeting decides to throw in her lot with Great Britain.

BRIGHT TIMES IN ALEXANDRIA

Alexandria, September 11th

In spite of a normal exterior of calmness in Alexandria, there are subtle indications of the tenseness of the international situation. The cabarets and cinemas have a gay aspect owing to the presence in the harbour of 26 warships, whose personnel swell the audiences, though strictly observing the order to be on board by midnight. The aircraft-carrier Glorious, her decks packed with gleaming planes, makes an almost daily patrol of Aboukir Bay, escorted by two destroyers, while four other destroyers, stand by in immediate readiness. Visitors are greatly impressed by the spick-and-span of the alert British war-ships, whose forest of masts and grey funnels provides them with a first view of Alexandria.

Other indications of the situation are the fact that large scale maps of Abyssinia are appearing in the local clubs and that the Italian Consuls are instructing all their nationals to be most careful in avoiding any provocative actions.

FRANCE AND BRITAIN

London, September 12th

According to the "London Times", the French Ambassador has been instructed to ask the British Government if Great Britain would adopt the same procedure in the event of an act of aggression on the part of a power in Europe. WHITE RACE IN DANGER

Honolulu, September 12th

Doctor Cyrus Adler, of Philadelphia, President of the Jewish Theological College of the United States expressed the opinion that another world war would probably result in the white races being over-powered by the coloured. He stated that Europe was not so secure as she believed herself to be. She had been over-run by the Asiatics before, and large numbers of that race remained. He further stated that it was dangerous to ignore the black races in Africa. They had been trained in modern war-fare by their European Masters, and he reminded his hearers that France had used Black Colonial Troops in Europe during the late war. They were no longer satisfied with the beating of the TOMS TOMS. They had tasted powder and knew how to use it.

THE POSSIBLE ATTITUDE OF FRANCE

Geneva, September 12th

Great stress is being placed in official circles in official circles in Geneva upon the fact that the reports published in the international press concerning the possible attitude of the Representative of France before the League, Mr. Laval, who is to define the position of his Government tomorrow, have been given no official confirmation or support. This fact explains the contradictions so obvious in these publications. However, the rumour published to the effect that Mr. Laval will not accept any initiative in Geneva which will imply an attack against Italy, has caused a certain amount of surprise in Geneva. It is officially declared that in his speech before the Assembly tomorrow, Mr. Laval will clearly define the position of France as regards the present situation, and that this attitude will be maintained during the coming sessions of the League. Mr. Laval gave a luncheon today in honour of Sir Samuel Hoare, and Captain Eden. Hoare is postponing his return to London in order to hear the declarations of his colleague tomorrow.

THE SMALLER NATIONS SPEAK

Geneva, September 12th

The League of Nations continued today their efforts to solve the Italo-Abyssinian problem. The Delegates of the smaller nations spoke and were almost all strongly in favour of supporting the League in the application of sanctions against the aggressor state.

Mr. Degraeff, the Dutch Delegate spoke very strongly against any form of territorial expansion which necessitated coercive measures. Mr. Van Zeeland, the Belgian Delegate stated that Belgium was prepared to sacrifice everything to enable the League to carry out its obligations.

Mr. Sandler, the Swedish Delegate stated that the sanctions should be applied all nations, both large and small, who were guilty of an act of aggression against another state. He stated that the League of Nations, and its members should be prepared to assume in full their responsibilities in view of the present grave situation. All the Delegates received a tremendous ovation from the public which had completely filled the spacious galleries.

GENEVA'S READING OF SPEECH

Geneva, September 11th

Sir Samuel Hoare's deminution of the British attitude towards the Covenant is regarded as unmistakable warning to France and the League, and is interpreted here as meaning, "Get on or we get out!"

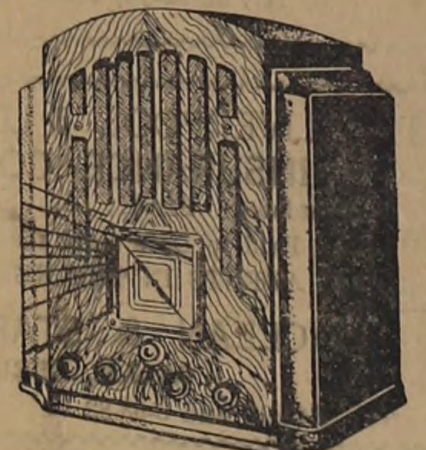
It is understood that the speech was shown to M. Laval before it was delivered, and the latter's decision to postpone his reply until Friday is taken as indicating his desire to consult the French Ministers before committing himself to any definite course. It is possible that M. Laval hopes that the reaction to the speech may bring Italy to a more reasonable frame of mind but experienced observers regard this as being very problematical! Sir Samuel Hoare, Mr. Eden, and M. Laval lengthily discussed the Abyssinian problem this evening and also reviewed the whole European situation in the light of the Angl-French Agreement.

The Committee of Five continued their examination of the Italian Memorandum and it is believed that their report will be based largely on the Paris proposals without any appreciable alterations.

IN LEAGUE CIRCLES

We have become so accustomed to the flavoured reports of the activities of the League of Nations, and it must be admitted that the wave of pessimism at present sweeping the world is in some measure justified by the results obtained by this entity in dealing with similar difficult situations to the present Italo-Abyssinia conflict on previous occasions. It is most pleasing to hear that since Sir Samuel Hoare's speech yesterday in the Assembly, a remarkable change has taken place in the atmosphere of League Circles. Gloom and despondency have given place to a general feeling of optimism, and Geneva is again seething with activity. Perhaps the League of Nations has been judged too harshly. Perhaps we have expected too much from it. Difficulties we know there have been, just how great these difficulties were, we do not know.

The Nations of the world should get together, that much we know, should all strive for universal peace and prosperity, but Nations are guided by men, and man is far from being the perfect creature we should like him to be, so that when the interests of any man or any nation tend to clash with the interests of others, trouble is likely to arise. The ideals which inspired the birth of the League of Nations were founded on this knowledge of human weakness. Whether these ideals are practical, still remains to be seen. There has been a long list of failures in the past, but we see no reason why this list of failures should be increased by the failure to arrive at a satisfactory solution to the present deadlock. Sir Samuel Hoare has shown the way, and although we are not inclined to be too optimistic, we can not imagine the rest of the Nations which go to make up the League, are anxious to see another war, which may well be the end of civilization.

The optimism at present prevailing in Geneva as the result of Sir Samuel's straight-forward statement of the British point of view, has given encouragement to the other Nations who are signatories to the League Pact. There is every indication that some definite steps will be taken to end the miserable dispute between Italy and Abyssinia. The League needs encouragement, not criticism. The hesitation of the smaller Nations can be easily understood. They have learned from bitter experience what it means to cross the path of their larger and more powerful neighbours. But if given a lead by the bigger powers, would only be too glad to fall in line. Now that England has put her cards on the table, and the European Nations know where she stands, we feel that the next move lies with France. If France will come along with a plain statement as to what she intends to do, we shall know whether the League can continue to exist as a potential body for the peaceful settlement of such disputes, or if it will become a beautiful ideal which has been allowed to slip into obscurity through the lack of proper support from the Nations who gave birth to it. The failure of the League in the past has been due entirely to the lack of support from its members, and it is without doubt, this which has caused Mussolini to treat with contempt every overture which has been made for a peaceable solution to the present conflict, and encouraged him to embark upon his present campaign for the conquest of Abyssinia. It is not yet too late for the League to act, but the action must come quickly. A united front by Great Britain, France, and the other Powers, will even now, at the eleventh hour convince the blustering Italian Dictator that the united economic and material strength opposed to him could only end in disaster to Italy. Thus, the League of Nations, with the support from its members which they have signed an undertaking to give, may still save us from what may be the greatest catastrophe the world has ever known.

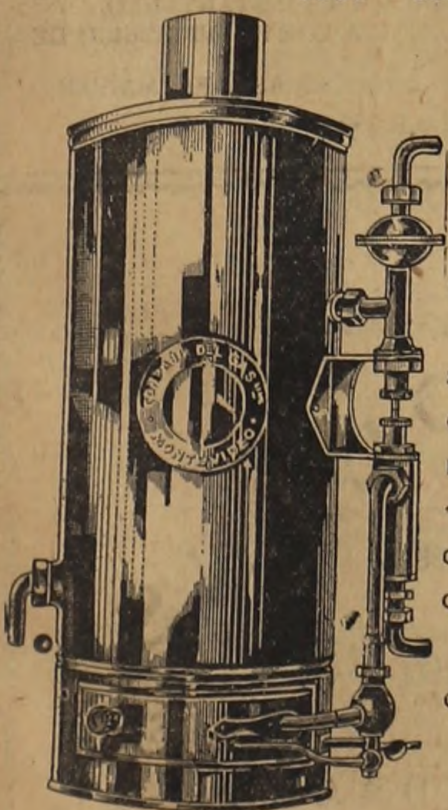

KILLED BY HIS OWN "THIEF TRAP"

When Monroe C. Grovers county storekeeper breathed his last the county authorities recorded one of the strangest cases of accidental death ever to come to their attention.

Mr. Grovers was shot as he entered his store. He was felled by a discharge from a shotgun. No murderer pulled the trigger. Mr. Grovers didn't commit suicide. Yet he was killed by his own gun and, in a way, was responsible for his tragic end.

It took the police a day or two to untangle the unusual situation but the explanation was forthcoming when it was learned that the 73-year-old storekeeper was the inventor of what he called a thief trap which he kept in working order for ten years.

The trap was as simple as it was efficient. It consisted of a shot gun and a cord. Every night when the storekeeper locked up his place of business he attached one end of the cord to the trigger of the gun. The muzzle was trained on the door so that any one opening the door would jerk the cord and be greeted with a charge of buck-shot.

Naturally, the keeper of the village store didn't talk much about his thief trap, so only a few of his customers knew about it.

Every night for ten years the old man set his trap when he locked the door of his emporium and every morning he went through certain mysterious maneuvers so that he, himself, wouldn't be shot when he swung the door open.

Perhaps his mind was filled with business worries, or private concerns, on that morning not long ago when he forgot the habit of a decade and entered his store without first disconnecting his trap. The instant the door swung wide there was a deafening report and the old man fell forward. Some of his neighbors found him, still breathing, but mortally wounded.

The news got about the countryside that gangsters had killed Monroe Grovers. Such stories lose nothing in the telling and some went so far as to describe, in detail, how the old man had come face to face with a burglar when he opened the door and had been shot down in cold blood.

But relatives who knew about the thief trap explained the situation to the police and the shotgun and the cord that ran from the trigger through a small opening in the door jamb were found. It was plain that the storekeeper had brought about his own end, though it couldn't be said that he committed suicide.

It would have been much wiser, perhaps, if the man had fashioned his thief trap along the lines of a device with which Robert Norbury, a London truck farmer, caught a fellow who had been robbing his poultry house.

The Englishman designed his thief trap not around a gun but a camera. He hid the camera inside his poultry house and focussed the lens on the door. Then he ran a small cord from the shutter of the camera to the door so that when the door was opened suffi-

ciently to admit a man the cord would be tightened and the shutter closed.

To make certain that this thief trap would catch a good picture of the marauder, another cord was strung from the door to a piece of metal in a tin tub. This cord was just the right length so that the metal would rattle against the side of the tub and cause the thief to turn his head quickly to see what the racket was. The whole ingenious mechanism was so made that the camera caught a good profile "shot" of the crook.

When the film was developed and turned over to the police, the thief was promptly arrested and brought to justice. The trap worked as well as a shotgun would have — and Mr. Norbury never had to jog his memory to avoid serious and, perhaps fatal, injury.

DOCTOR'S ORDERS

Dr. M. is telling this story. One of his male patients is convalescing in a hospital and, following a visit to him to other morning, he told the nurse that the man was to be allowed to get up and walk about a bit. "Put him on a short tether and let him walk around," the Doctor said. The nurse, a competent lady within her range, is a literalist; life has made her one. Thus it was that Dr. A., the interne in charge that day, read on this patient's chart that he was to be put on a short tether. Seeing the possibilities in the situation, he told the nurse to go to a drugstore and get a short tether. Either a Squibb or Parke-Devis short tether, he said.

The drug clerk had never had such a request before but he didn't want to admit ignorance, so he fussed around on the shelves for a while and then came back and told the nurse they were all out of short tethers. Big demand for 'em in this weather, he mumbled.

The patient had a wobbly walk about the corridors and at the end seemed fine, even without the tether. But his nurse didn't want to admit failure. Hence, when Dr. M. made his call upon the convalescent next morning, he read this entry upon the chart: "Patient walked around on short tether Condition satisfactory".

HOW DOYOU SAY IT ?

I was startled recently when my little granddaughter demanded insolently "Whose book is this?" The child is not an insolent baggage, and I stared at her in amazement. Then it came to me that what she really wanted to say was "Whose book is this?" or perhaps "Whose book is this?"

The style of asking a question with the accent entirely on the first word of a sentence seems to be growing. To an old-fashioned person like myself it is strangely offensive to have a question fired point-blank: "What is your name? Where do you live? What were you doing?" And one would shudder to think that Juliet, leaning on the balcony, might have murmured, "What's in a name?"

ANGLO URUGUAYAN COMMERCE.

The following statistics were presented by the British Chamber of Commerce in the local press yesterday, preceded by this article: "As is notorious, the quota of the United Kingdom as regards the current quarter, which amounted to ten million French francs, was exhausted in the early part of last August, as a result, previous import permits were only given for British merchandise at the rate of free exchange. The results have been disastrous for the importers of this merchandise, as, although the difference between free and "directed" exchange is only from four to five percent, the difference in the duties paid on the same basis is important and almost sufficient to eliminate these imports. It will be remembered that last May, the Uruguayan authorities declared that the percentage of duty to be paid at the gold rate would be calculated at the same exchange rate as the merchandise purchased. The system used now to calculate the amount of duty to be paid in gold shows no similarity, but a great difference. Therefore, it is in reality the customs duties which cause have caused the almost complete elimination of British imports, as if the importers are forced to pay such high duties, they cannot compete with the merchandise brought in from other nations which still possess quotas and the before receive preferential treatment. (The following statistics approximately represent the percentages of imports and exports for the first six months of 1935; the figures being imports from and exports to, respectively).
