JAPAN'S SURPRISING ACTION

Tokio, August 9th

The Government approved today a measure which signifies the abandonment of the statute providing for Japanese extra-territorial rights in Manchukuo, precise orders to this effect being issued to the respective authorities.

Tokio, August 9th

Questioned by his colleague concerning the possible effects of the abandonment of extra-territorial rights in Manchuria upon the situation of the foreign residents there, Mr. Hirota, Minister of Foreign Affairs, declared that inasmuch as this retiral of Japanese control will be made in a gradual and progressive form, the change will not cause violent or fundamental differences. He also declared to the press that the Manchukuo State has made brilliant and constant progress, has reformed, its judicial system and fiscal policies, and that it is considered that the transfer of administrative rights in the zone of the South Manchu railway constitutes the first step towards the abandonment of extra-territorial rights by Japan, whose policy is based upon principles tending to permit Manchukuo to transform into an independent State. In taking these steps, Japan will conserve in her power the zone of the South Manchu railway but the administration rights will be progressively transferred to the Manchurian authorities. The newspaper, "Asahi", declares that the Japanese Government is also disposed to abandon its extra-territorial rights in China at any moment, always in case the present unfounded misunderstandings between China and Japan disappear.

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BUILDING STRIKE IN THE STATES

New York, August 9th

The Constructional Workers Union, the members of which are at present employed by the city on works being carried out with funds taken from the Federal relief organizations against unemployment, has approved a motion calling for a strike. This movement is taken as a sign of protest against the scale of salary of fifty five dollars per month for apprentices and ninety three dollars fifty cents for skilled workmen.

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BRITAIN'S MOTOR INDUSTRY

London, August 8th

Statistics issued by the Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders show a great expansion of the British motor industry. The industry gives work to nearly a million and a quarter people in the manufacture, sale repair and operation of motor vehicles and thus claims to rank second only to the distributive trades as the largest employer of labour. The output of new motor vehicles has shown a remarkable recovery from the depression period reaching a total of 342,499 last year as against 146,600 ten years earlier and 238,805 in 1929 the peak before the crisis. The total value of the exports of motor vehicles last year was more than 14 1/4 millions sterling. In connection with the reduction of 5s. per horse-power in the tax on private cars which came into effect in January, the interesting claim is made that the Exchequer has already been reimbursed for the sacrifice of a quarter of the former rate by the increase in the number of cars maintained in use during the winter months.

THE LABOUR CONFLICT IN FRANCE

Toulon, August 9th

The mobile forces arrived from Lyons and the soldiers of the regiment of artillery stationed here have definitely insured the maintenance of order in this city. All public buildings are under heavy guard. The Court Buildings, in which the labourers arrested yesterday are to appear for trial this afternoon, is under a special guard, as is also the Marine Prefecture. A large number of businesshouses did not open today and others closed shortly after noon as a precautionary measure in case new riots occur this afternoon when the workmen leave the Arsenal.

Brest, August 9th

In an interview given to the Havas Agency, the Marine authorities made the following declarations: "The city is now quiet and we hope that this calm will be definite. The necessary measures have already been taken to return the police reinforcements to their respective brigades. There is only one wounded person as a result of the disorder, this being a labourer who is in a serious condition as a result of a fractured skull. Administrative and judicial investigations are being made concerning the recent events. The labourers returned to work this morning at the usual hour, no difficulties of any kind being noted. The city has recovered its normal aspect."

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THE ITALIAN AIR DISASTER

Rome, August 9th

The entire nation is feeling the impression caused by the aviation disaster which occurred yesterday in the Sahara desert, in which six persons lost their lives. Among the dead are the Minister of Public Works, Mr. Luis Razza, and the Italian explorer, Baron Raymond Franchetti. One of the most modern and powerful airplanes possessed by Italy was completely destroyed as a result of the crash. An official investigation is being made as to the causes of the disaster, and in the meanwhile air officials refuse to make any comments upon the matters. However, in well informed circles it is affirmed that the crash was not due to any mechanical defects as the machine had amply proved its efficiency.

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RUMOURED ITALIAN DESERTIONS

Rome, August 9th

A foreign news agency has published during the last few days reports to the effect that, according to rumours received from Innsbruck, a large number of Italian desertors are daily fleeing across the frontier into the Tyrol, and that two of them have perished in the mountains while attempting to escape. The Italian Government declares that these rumours are completely false.

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AMERICAN POLICY

Washington, August 8th

Mr. Hull stated to-day that the United States would continue to give a free hand for the shipment of arms and other commodities to Italy and Ethiopia, as the Government had neither formulated a policy nor taken steps to prevent such shipments, which were not prevented by any law. This statement followed a decision of the Export and Import Bank to refrain from any action on an application by U. S. exporters for a credit to finance cotton shipments to Italy, reported to amount to between 250,000 and 500,000 bales. It was indicated by high authorities that the Bank acted on its own authority as the exporters had asked for a credit of six months instead of the customary three months, which was unsatisfactory to the Bank in view of the unsettled conditions owing to the possibility of war.

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NORTH AMERICA AND THE AFRICAN DISPUTE

Paris, August 9th

The Paris edition of the "Daily Mail" has announced that Mr. G. W. Gerard, ex-Ambassador of the United States in Berlin during the war, and who is at present residing on the Cote Azul, has received orders from Washington to go to Rome in order to interview Mr. Mussolini for the purpose of seeking a solution of the conflict in Africa and with the offer to act as mediator in the dispute. It was added that Gerard, who left last night for Rome, is to meet Mussolini this afternoon. However, it is stated from Washington that the Department of State officially announces that they are ignorant of the purpose of the visit of Mr. Gerard to Rome and that the rumours of official offers of mediation are unfounded.

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"THE LUST OF THE EYE"

London, August 8th

The observance of Christmas is denounced as a Romanist practice, and dancing as a sin, in a statement issued by the Northern Presbytery of the Free Presbyterian Church of Scotland. This statement is the outcome of a private meeting of the Presbytery at Dingwall, Ross, last Friday, when it discussed the exclusion of Mr. John Murray, the Provost of Dornoch, from the rights and privileges of the Church because he permitted dancing at a children's party in his house last Christmas. The statement declared: "Promiscuous dancing is notoriously a means of fostering the lust of the eye and the pride of life. These things are not of the Father but of the world, and therefore we would prayerfully and lovingly warn the young against promiscuous dancing and giving countenance to such practices as observing Christmas."

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NEXT BRITISH GENERAL ELECTION

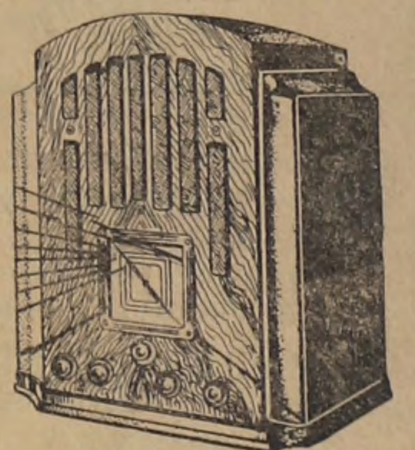
London, August 8th

The preparations for the forthcoming General Election are sufficiently advanced to enable 490 National Conservative candidates to take the field, of which number 413 are members of Parliament. Seven of the present Conservative members are changing their constituencies, while 47 are not seeking re-election. The present Conservative Parliamentary strength is 460. The prospective Labour candidates number 505, including 58 present members of Parliament.

MOONLIGHT

The other night, having some letters for London which must be collected by the van at seven the following morning, I took cap and stick, meaning to walk to the roadside, group of cottages a mile away. It was a few minutes before midnight. I was tired, and the thought of the walk seemed wearisome. Equally wearisome appeared the idea of unlocking the garage and taking out the car. As I hesitated, the moon's horn showed by the top of a fir tree on the hill side opposite. Well, it was the same sort of thing one had seen for years and years. An owl cried somewhere among the dark trees. So they always had cried. One had heard them so many times that they made no more impression on the mind than the noise of an exhaust made on the mind of a London bus driver.

Well, the letters must be posted and, after the hours of enforce-

ed sitting still at the desk, perhaps it would be best to walk. One didn't take enough exercise. Ah, if one could only feel about stars, moon, trees, grass, sea, as one felt about them years ago! Words - worth, it was recalled, had felt an identical regret, almost remorse, for the passing of similar enthusiasms.

I walked down the garden path, across the lane and into the park. The air was soft and still. I passed under the great lime trees, among whose leaves, in the past summer, hundreds of thousands of bees had murmured, in whose thickets around the trunks wood pigeons and jackdaws had nested. How many years since one had climbed to a bird's nest? In a few moments I was on the bridge, looking down at the water.

The moon was making the usual bright and broken lights on the three streams pouring from the three arches. Near the tail of the

pool, where the water thinned and quickened, sudden tremulous trips of silver showed where a trout had risen. That was pleasing. Shadows of alders looked blacker than the trees themselves. The thought of that fact was wearisome, until I told myself it was not necessary to remember it for the purposes of writing it.

Surely, I said to myself, this is a beautiful and restful scene. It is interesting, too, for see! That glimmer, just under the fall of the middle arch, was surely the big trout turning over to take something - a "mullhead", perhaps that had gone down with the stream.

A man does not change - Wordsworth was wrong - but a man needs change. For a change, try and do what you really want to do.

So I sat on the bridge, and shut my eyes, and thought of nothing, breathing deeply and slowly and as slowly respiring. The night was warm and after a while I thought I would lie on the grass. What mattered if it were dew - damp? Rheumatism, so-called, came from ill feeding and drinking. I would lie on the grass. It was fine to lie on the grass while the distant stable clock slowly tolled the hour of midnight.

It seemed, as I rested there, that the stars had not been seen for years. The first frost would sharpen and make them glitter; but now they shone softly, as though very peacefully.

Closing my eyes again, I let the sounds of the river flow through me until I began to feel again a serenity of earth which no conscious thought could give. How often did the activities of the brain force one away from one's true or inner or natural self! Damn the brain - a good servant, but a bad master.

I lay there until the clock tolled one, then I arose and walked happily, thoughtlessly, to the main road and the postbox. Clearly the moon revealed the hour of collection, and I had brought an electric torch to make sure! Years ago the sight of anyone taking a torch for a night walk would have filled me with scornful protest. No sight - no insight.

And why go home? I was actually enjoying the walk. The windows of the cottages were all black. The nose of the painted grotesque wooden stag's head on one of the snail had crawled. Everything walls gleamed where a hibernating was so still and quiet. My body was non-apparent. The moonlight was in me and through me. I marveled at the cottage folk who, with one exception, had shut out this lovely air from their bedrooms. I would walk up to the moor and sleep in the heather if I wanted to, or walk on if I wanted to.

Certainly I would. I went home to get my coat. Having got it, I hesitated. Tomorrow those book reviews must go off, and if one were tired - my breast seemed filled with the loveliness of the night, and this was the time to sleep. So I pulled my bed to the window and lay there happy, while the moon climbed far over the fir trees until serrated by the silver fringe of thatch, and I fell away from myself in sleep.

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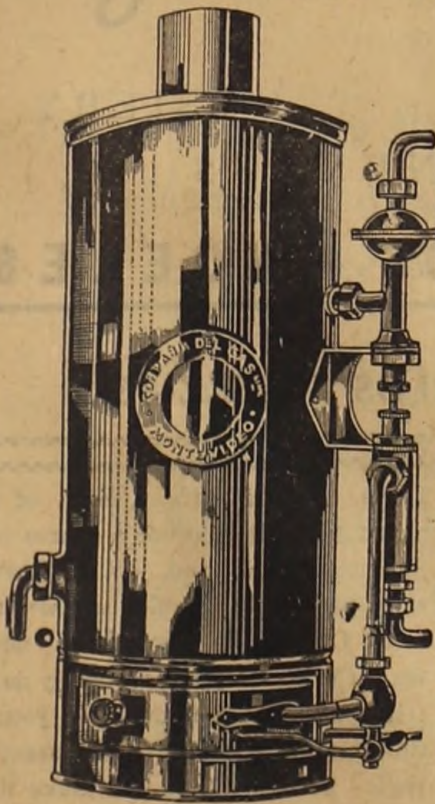

It you haven't got your "chapita" you'd better get it — and quickly. If you do not know what a "chapita" is the subject will not interest you, but if you do, and suddenly find sundry local "bobbies" drawing you up to the side of the street in order to tell you that you are a law-breaker, that your morals need a thorough house-cleaning, that the period for getting out the "chapita" has expired and that — if you are wise enough to know that an outstretch ed hand needs at least twenty cents — he "will forgive you this time, but go and do your duty to the Treasury", go thou and follow out his advice.

The system is quite simple. You drive out along Boulevard Artigas to what is supposed to be the Municipal scales and there join the parade. Normally there are only some three esquares of ranked cars ahead of you and, with a bit of luck, an hour finds you within eyesight of your objective. Followed by envious glances, you get to home base, deliver your car license, are turned into the hands of a serene personage who has a long string of wire trailing behind him and a pair of pliers — and then, with a "snip" and a "snap" the vehicle becomes legitimate again. However, that is not the end of the matter, for another personage immediately climbs in, tells you to drive fast and suddenly shouts into your ear to "put on the brakes". The resulting smell of burning rubber and strained tyres proves that you will be able to prevent bumping a traffic policeman in his posteriori in case of accidental accidents.

It's a very simple matter and, if you have a lot of time and a great deal of patience, very instructive. After studying your neighbours for an hour you become convinced that Uruguay is really and truly — and in spite of the opposition press — a very complete democracy. In the long line of cars awaiting their turn, the humble "Lizzie" rubs noses with the plutocratic vehicle, streamlined and supercilious, which bears the diplomatic "chapa". Toil worn and decrepit lorries receive the same attention as the shining chariots used by the "Aneap" to trundle their products around, and polish and parade rub elbows with the very plebian and utilitarian products necessary for the daily distribution of mean, milk, and cabbage. Bureaucratical employees even show that they are human — for there was a young lady in a very decrepit car who climbed in and out a couple of times — and how — and was finally called out of the line, escorted ahead, and given the personal attention of half of the staff on duty. And no one complained — except for the fact that it removed one manner of passing away the time. She really knew how to present her car to the best advantage.

Oh well, all this just tends to show that lots of interesting things happen in Montevideo besides the revaluation of gold, the reorganization of the "Colorado Party", the possibility of a bull-fighter being given the worst of it in Colonia next summer, and the fact that Mortgage Bonds have risen to ninety. You'd be surprised. YANK.

The Lesson-Sermon contains the following passage from page 93 of "Science and Health with Key to Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy. "The belief that Spirit is finite as well as infinite has darkened all history. In Christian Science, Spirit, as a proper noun, is the name of the Supreme Being. It means quantity and quality, and applies exclusively to God. The modifying derivatives of the word spirit refer only to quality, not to God. Man is spiritual. He is not God, Spirit. If man were Spirit, then men would be spirits, gods. Finite spirit would be mortal, and this is the error embodied in the belief that the infinite can be contained in the finite. This belief tends to becloud our apprehension of the kingdom of heaven and of the reign of harmony in the Science of being".

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RISE IN "HIPOTECARIO" VALUES

The sudden demand for the titles of the aBneo Hipotecario has caused the following editorial comment in "El Pueblo": The quotation of 90 on mortgage values shown on the Stock Exchange yesterday is worthy of note due to the great importance of its effects on the financial situation of the nation. This value has not been reached for many years. A few days ago when the Exchange — affected by the optimism felt by the producing classes of the nation upon learning the exact terms of the plan of Doctor Charlone upon revaluation of the gold reserves of the Bank of the Republic — began to show continued increases in the quotations upon al public bonds and titles, we declared that we should soon see these values at 90. Our prediction has been fulfilled, as it was a logical result of the increased confidence felt by the public. And this fact also shows an increasing confidence in the men who are governing the nation and who know how to efficiently direct our economic interests. The present Government, which found the Banco Hipotecario on the border of bankruptcy due to the incapacity or lack of foresight of its authorities, immediately and without loss of time attended to the needs of this institution, the bankruptcy of which would have signified the desroyalo f property values and a terrible blow to our public credit. The Decree-Law of April 1933 and the Law of August of the same year immediately stopped the perpendicular fall of our mortgage values...

THE THREE NEW COAST GUARD CUTTERS

According to "El Plata": "The Government of Uruguay has purchased three coast guard vessels of 150 tonse each, which were built in Italy. It had been resolved that these ships, the construction of which was controlled by a group of Uruguayan naval experts, should be brought to Montevideo by a crew of Uruguayans. There is no thing more reasonable than that these sailors, who must gain experience in the ship they are to use, over waters which at times are more dangerous than anything found in crossing the Atlantic, should be the ones selected to bring the vessels across from Italy. 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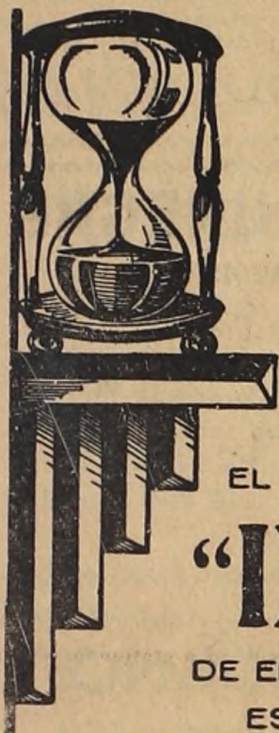
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ST. HELEN'S CLUB

The approaching feast of the patroness of the Club, St. Helen, which Holy Church celebrates on the 18th of August, was taken into consideration at the last meeting.

This year the feast happens to fall on a Sunday. BETTER BREAKFASTS

KIDNEYS AND TOMATO SAUCE

Required:

Six or more sheep kidneys.
A little chopped parsley.
A little melted butter.
Seasoning.
Egg and breadcrumbs.
About two ounces of dripping.
FOR THE TOMATO SAUCE:
Half an ounce of butter or dripping.
Half an ounce of raw ham or bacon.
Half an ounce of corn-flour.
Half a pound of tomatoes.
Half a pint of stock.
Two teaspoonfuls of chopped onion.
A bunch of parsley, thyme, marjoram, and a bayleaf.
Four papercorras.

Melt the butter in a saucepan. When it is hot, put in the onion, herbs tied together, peppercorns, and the bacon cut in small pieces. Fry all together for about five minutes, then add the sliced tomatoes and stock. Let all simmer gently for about a quarter of an hour, stirring frequently. Next, take out the pepper-corns and rub all the rest through a sieve; rinse out the pan, put back the sauce, and let it re-boil. Meanwhile, mix the corn-flour smoothly and thinly with a little cold stock or water, add it to sauce, and stir until it boils and thickens. Season it carefully to taste.

Cut each kidney in half with a sharp knife, take off the skin and remove the white centre. Dust each piece with salt, pepper, and chopped parsley. Beat up an egg on a plate, add to it a tablespoonful of warmed butter, brush the kidneys with this; then coat them in crumbs. Melt the dripping in a frying-pan, and when a faint smoke is rising from it, lay in the kidneys and fry them a nice brown on both sides. Have ready some neatly-trimmed pieces of buttered toast, arrange the kidneys on these, and pour the tomato sauce round.

N. B. — Make the tomato sauce the day before, and egg-and-crumbs the kidneys and fry them for three minutes; then, in the morning they will only require another two minutes' cooking, and the sauce will just want re-heating.

RICE OUTLETS

Required:

Quarter of a pound of rice.
Half a pound of any cold meat, or
or sausage-meat,
One small onion.
A little parsley.
Seasoning.
A little stock or milk.
Egg and breadcrumbs.
Nutmeg.

Wash the rice and boil it till soft in plenty of fast-boiling salted water. If using cold meat, chop it finely — also the onion and parsley. Drain the rice, mix with it the meat or sausage-meat, parsley, and onion, and a table-spoonful of stock or milk.

Spread the mixture on a plate to cool, then shape it into neat outlets. Egg-and-crumbs these, and fry them a crisp brown in smoking fat. Drain well on paper. Before serving, put a small piece of parsley stalk in the end of each to represent the bone. Serve very hot.

THE DROUGHT

The general drought has so severely affected the Argentine, and to a lesser extent, Uruguay, was broken yesterday and the day before by rains which greatly improved conditions. Although Uruguay has been fortunate enough to have had a number of showers during the past six weeks which alleviated the situation of the agriculturists, the Argentine has been hard hit by the drought, it being estimated by experts that, unless rain fell (which occurred on Wednesday) shortly, there would be no wheat harvest of any importance and that the yield of linseed would be so greatly reduced that it would drastically affect the economic situation in the interior. The general public have perhaps not realized how serious a drought of this kind is, the general impression being that "it only affects the farmers". However, if it is taken into consideration that the reduction in the Argentine wheat exports by about two hundred million pesos has been caused by the scarcity of rain recently and that but for the fortunate weather during the past few days this loss would have been much greater, it is easily seen that weather conditions affect the entire nation instead of only one section of national industry.
