THE FRENCH POLITICAL CRISIS

Paris, May 31st

Serious obstacles of a private nature arising from political dissension, are endangering the success of the negotiations preliminary to the formation of a new Cabinet by Mr. Bouisson, ex-President of the Chamber of Deputies. Mr. Bouisson, who is sixty years of age, was entrusted with the formation of a Cabinet after the resignation of that presided over by Mr. Flandin, caused by the adverse vote of the Chamber of Deputies to the proposed law giving ample faculties to the Prime Minister to adopt emergency measures of a financial nature. While Mr. Bouisson is attempting to form a Coalition Government, which will permit him to take measures to protect the franc, the gold supplies continue to be taken from the Bank of France, purchasers forming long queues before the opening hours. The difficulties of Mr. Bouisson began last night when in insisting upon the question of faculties and that Herriot cooperate in the new Ministerial combination, the Socialists upon the Government depend for support, opposed the inclusion of Tardieu. The Stock Exchange operated today, but all transactions were of a moderate and cautious nature due to the high discount rate and the political uncertainty of the moment. It is generally believed that the proposed combination will not be brought about and that other solutions of the present political conflict must be sought before a new Cabinet which will receive general support, can be constituted.

ITALY CONTINUES TO MOBILIZE

Rome, May 31st

It is announced officially that other army sections and two divisions of "Black Shirts" are being mobilized for service in East Africa in view of the military preparations of the Ethiopian Government. The official communique says: "the partial mobilization of the Ethiopian forces and the arrival in Abyssinia of new armaments forces us to also take new defensive measures destined to protect us from any possible attack and to maintain the security of our Colonies in East Africa". The communication also says that a strong naval contingent will be called into service, including officers and men, it being added that the naval class of 1913, which is finishing its two years training, will be maintained in service. The Admiral commanding the naval forces in the Red Sea declares: "All the operations of mobilization are being carried out with absolute order and not the slightest incident has occurred".

Rome, May 31st

It is announced here that the Ethiopians have imprisoned the persons carrying diplomatic mail destined to the Italian Consulate at Gondar on May 8th. They were later placed at liberty as a result of a protest made by the Consul, but it is added that although the mail bags were returned, the letters there in were opened and damaged. The communication says that the Ethiopian soldiers arrested the mails in the stretch between Gondar and Gadua and added: "This is not the first time the Ethiopians have tampered with the mails. During March the mails on the same route were also assaulted and the greater part of the correspondence destroyed. In February the postal train to Somaliland, carrying correspondence for the Italian agent in Magallo, was stopped and only allowed to proceed after insistent protests by the Legation in Adis Abbeba. These facts demonstrate the feeling of the Ethiopian authorities towards Italy and the disorder reigning beyond the frontiers of the Italian Colonies". It is declared in semi-official circles that this new incident will undoubtedly cause an increase in the present tension.

EUROPEAN AIR PACT

London, May 31st

Sir John Simon, in response to the proposals of Hitler concerning the negotiation of a Western European Air Pact, declared in the House of Commons that the time is arriving when it will be necessary to convoke the nations of Europe to a conference of a general character for the purpose of studying the problems which affect international aviation. In connection with the proposed air pact, Simon declared that it is not correct to say that this proposal is of French or British origin. He stated that the idea was born in numerous minds at the same time on both sides of the Channel and that it was as a result of happy circumstances that during an important and fruitful meeting of British and French Ministers the idea was frankly and honestly faced and then placed in a precise form. He added: "I wish to thank Mr. Laval for having approved this declaration. The air pact holds the attention of all the interested nations. These have made suggestions and I hope that we shall shortly be able to discuss them in a more appropriate manner. This is also the opinion of the French Government. There is no motive preventing us from continuing the negotiations related to an 'Air Pact' which will supplement that of Locarno. However there is a serious problem to be solved concerning whether it is possible to adjust the Locarno Pact to an agreement of a more general character." Speaking of the coming meeting in Rome, Simon declared that the fact that Great Britain will only be represented by an observer does not indicate any coldness on the part of the Government as regards this conference. He added: "The contrast between the participation of a ministerial delegation and the contributions which we may make through our Ambassador in Rome. We have no intention of remaining to one side but shall cooperate in the most complete form".

EARTHQUAKE IN BRITISH BELUCHISTAN

London, May 31st

Unconfirmed notices have been received from Karachi to the effect that about thirty thousand persons are dead as a result of the earthquake which destroyed Quetta. It is announced from Simla that thirty five aviators and mechanics were buried beneath the ruins of the military aerodrome in Quetta, and that practically all the positions in the district between Quetta and Kalat have been destroyed. It is affirmed that four fifths of the population of the zone of Kalat, which is one hundred sixty kilometers south of Quetta, have perished, and that the entire police forces have been killed. All communications with the affected regions have been cut off.

SEA DISASTER

Baku, Caucasus, May 31st

It has been revealed that on Monday night, the Soviet steamer "Sovietky Azerbaidjan", carrying a cargo of petroleum was destroyed in the Caspian Sea by an explosion. Twenty seven persons, including four women, were killed. The steamer, "Soviet", which was being towed by the lost vessel, brought the notice. As she was also loaded with petroleum, she hurried away from the scene of the disaster, after picking up two survivors, due to the fear of an explosion of her own cargo.

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MADAME DE POMPADOUR

Even to-day her name is invested with a certain dubious glamour, for Fate decreed that the Fame she coveted and achieved should persist long after her short wanton life was ended. So indomitable was her courage and determination, so caustic her wit, so perfect her beauty that Fame would have been hers in any age and any country; it was Fate that willed she should be born a Frenchwoman at a time when France was ruled by the whims and caprices of the king's favourite mistress.

That position, therefore, was her position from earliest adolescence. She attained it at the age of twenty-three, and for twenty years she relieved indolent Louis XV of all his royal responsibilities. Thus it was that, though she had no official rank, she reversed the historic policies of the State, appointed and disgraced ministers, engineered treaties on the spur of the moment, directed fleets and armies, profoundly influenced the art of the century, and crushed all who opposed her. And it must be recorded that she brought disaster to everything she touched.

History maintains a discreet vagueness on the subject of her parentage. True, she was baptized as the daughter of one Francois Poisson, officer in the household of the Duke of Orleans, but some said that she was really the child of a wealthy financier, Le Normant de Tournehem, and an unknown woman. At any rate, it was Tournehem who considered himself responsible for her, who was so enchanted with the pretty, witty child that he fondly called her "un morceau de roi" — a bit of royalty — and lavished large sums on her education. The

prediction of an old fortune-teller that she would become the king's mistress and dominate France coincided with his own dreams; he was determined to cultivate in her the greatest likely to attract a jaded and impressionable monarch.

Little wonder, then, that from the time she entered her teens she was surrounded by levers, the most assiduous of whom was young Normant d'Etoiles, a nephew of her guardian and benefactor. She married him at the age of twenty, and proceeded to dissipate his large fortune. She dressed magnificently, and in a short while was the acknowledged queen of fashion.

Yet she was by no means satisfied. The little world of financiers and their ladies over which she reigned was ignored by the proud, disdainful aristocracy, and it seemed that no one was willing to introduce her to the Court. Urged on by her supposed mother, the ambitious Mme. Poisson, she used to ride in the country when Louis XV. went hunting and try to attract his attention. But Louis was then enraptured with the watchful Mme. de Mailly, and not until her death, two years later, did young Mme. d'Etoiles get her anxiously-awaited chance.

A masked ball was given by the city magnates of Paris in honour of the Dauphin. Louis was present; so, too, was Mme. d'Etoiles, and she, contrary to all etiquette, raised her mask as he drew near. The royal connoisseur of feminine beauty was instantly enslaved. He caught only a glance of her classical features before she replaced the mask, but it was enough. The young woman had a handkerchief in

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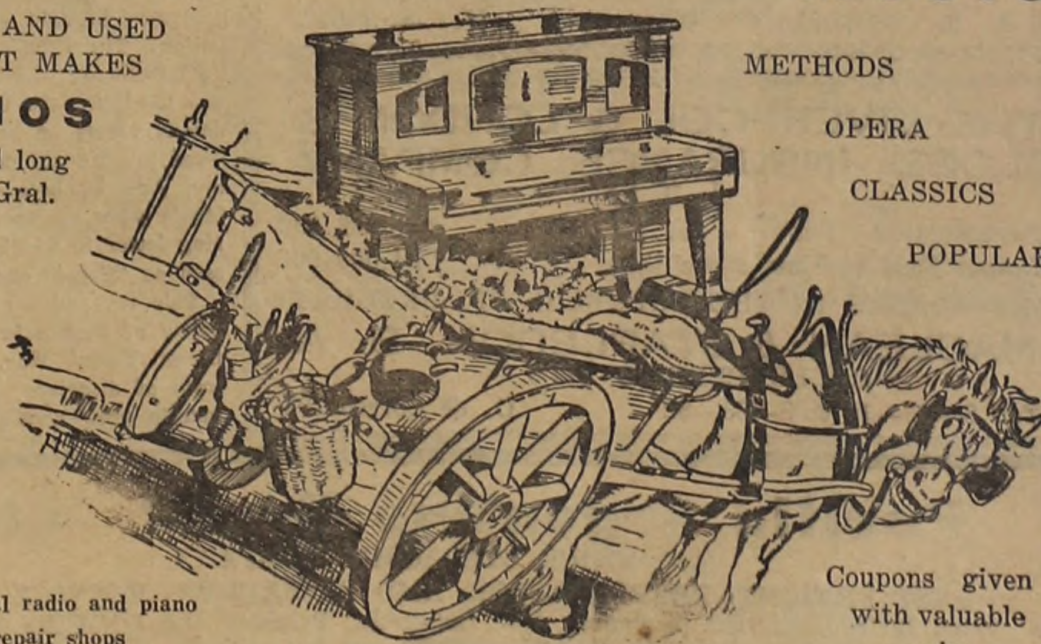

her hand, and, by accident or design dropped it as Louis passed by. He eagerly picked it up, and, being unable to return it by hand because of the swirling crowd, tossed it to her as politely as he could. The gesture was significant; the dancers murmured to each other that a new power had arisen in France.

Thereupon Madame coldly informed her husband that she no longer had need of him, and persuaded Louis to have a decree of divorce pronounced. She took up her residence at Versailles, and bought her the estates of Pompadour from which she took her title of marquise. But Madame la Marquise, as her friends had anticipated, was not content with her position as Maitresse en titre for long. Soon her ambition and tenacity of purpose became apparent. Courtiers hastened to pay obsequious tribute not only to Madame but to members of her family. "I cannot drop my handkerchief but immediately knights wearing the blue ribbon quarrel for the honour of picking it up", exclaimed her brother, a shy young man whom she pushed so surely into the royal favour that the king called him "Little Brother" and made him Marquise de Marigny.

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"Amidst this extraordinary instability, when everything was at the master, the mistress of the king alone held lasting sway; in a reign of all-pervading satiety and tedium she managed to remain indispensable and bewitching to the day of her death". Louis, sensual and lazy, was glad to be relieved of the necessity of deciding questions that had never interested him; clever Pompadour kept him busy decorating and furnishing the costly new buildings she was constantly having built. She spent vast sums at Trianon and Fontainebleau; palaces of an unparalleled splendour were built for her at Crecy and Bellevue.

Realizing that the literary giants of the time were playing an increasing part in shaping contemporary thought, she paid court to them and installed Voltaire as her poet-in-chief. Madame was, indeed, thoroughly in touch with the spirit of her extravagant, ornately-decorative age. She became the patron of Boucher and Greuze; with her own hands she engraved numerous portraits of her royal lover, and she encouraged the manufacture of the famous Sevres porcelain. But to modern minds her taste was execrable. Under her influence art degenerated to artificial elegance, dress became richer, more flamboyant and fantastic, the magnificence of the Court blazed up. Vast sums of money were squandered on foolish luxuries and passing whims.

Puppets of Pompadour were put into office; she regularly sent her instructions to the generals of armies in the field, and every morning all the letters sent through the post were brought to her for examination. The time-honoured alliance with Germany was broken off because Frederick the Great wrote scandalous verses on her; she even entered into an alliance with the enemy, Austria, because the Empress Maria Theresa wrote her a flattering letter in which she was addressed as "Cousin and dear Princess".

This reversal of the hereditary policy of France brought on the Seven Years' War, with its long train of disasters. The public began to grow uneasy at the crush-

ing burden of taxation. Mutterings of "Revolution" were heard, and Pompadour was unmercifully lampooned. The suspected authors, who never they could be caught, were thrown into the Bastille. Mme. de Pompadour — now raised to the dignity of duchesse — was herself providing tinder for the greatest of all revolutionary conflagrations.

And meanwhile Louis was beginning to tire of her. She had to exercise all her wiles to entertain him. Remembering her talent as an actress and singer, she started a series of comedies, operas, and ballets in which she was the leading lady and the great lords and ladies of the Court her follow-players. At last, to keep herself in power, she encouraged the king in his debaucheries. Louis used to wear over her kindness to his many mistresses.

No young girl was safe from her spies; with the aid of the Chief of Police handsome girls were kidnapped and shut up in the Palace of Versailles. It is said that over five million pounds were spent on these arrangements, and the Court became a vortex of vice. Pompadour's health gave way under the strain. "Ma vie est un combat", she said wistfully, but refused to renounce her pleasures and political duties. When told that death was at hand she dressed herself in full Court dress and waited smilingly for the end.

Her last words were to the curé, who had called to see her. "One moment", she said, as he was about to take his leave, "and we will go out together". She died a few minutes later, on April 15th, 1764, aged forty-two. "Hapless Butterfly", she had been twenty years in the winged condition", observes Carlyle; "dull Louis, they say, looked out of window as her hearse departed, froidement, without emotion of any visible kind". It was a cold, dreary day, and "Madame had had weather for her journey to-day" was all he could find to say of a woman who, whatever her faults, had served him faithfully.

Such was Jeanne Antoinette Poisson le Normant d'Etioles, Duchesse de Pompadour; her Fame and her Fate.

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LOCAL NEWS

A LARGE CROWD OF spectators were in the Port and along the route followed by the official procession, to welcome President Vargas on his arrival Thursday morning. The proceedings went off without incident. Enroute for his residence, President Vargas officially opened the new Avenida Agraciada for transit. The parade to have been held yesterday afternoon was suspended due to bad weather conditions, but will probably take place on Monday next at 14.30 o'clock, weather permitting.

AN INCIDENT WHICH occurred in the Port on Thursday night proved the excellent training and courage of the Brazilian sailors who are visiting us. It appears that a girl, who was standing in the front row of the large crowd along the dock admiring the "Sao Paulo", lost her footing and fell into the water between the mole and the side of the vessel. In response to the shouts

of terror from the spectators, the alarm signal was given on the cruiser and seven members of the crew immediately went into the water. The victim of the accident was rescued after a short search and taken aboard amid the cheers of the crowd.

THE NOTICE THAT the Hamburg South America Line is planning to carry out two tourist cruises to Brazil on the "Cap Arcona", the first on July 23 and the second on August 9, will undoubtedly arouse interest. The fact that such a cruise is possible — fifteen days, including visits to the most interesting parts of Brazil — at the very moderate price of slightly over two hundred pesos, and that they come in the winter months when such a voyage is most agreeable, gives room for thought. In view of the present exchange conditions, many persons who formerly made periodical visits to Europe find it materially impossible to do

so now, as even the costs of passages alone mean a lot of depreciated pesos. However, the holiday habit still exists, and we are inclined to believe that our Steamship Companies should carefully study the possibilities of developing tourist trips to beauty spots closer at hand. It is amazing how many of our Community residents for years in Uruguay, know little or nothing of the remainder of South America, and it is more than probable that if the steamship companies made economic trips possible the increase in trade would make such trips pay well.

IN SPITE OF THE predictions of the "Weather Prophets" for the past ten days that the temperature intended to descend immediately, we still have unseasonably warm weather. The heat has not been relieved to any extent by the rain yesterday. Mr. Martin Gil, weather seer extraordinary, says that he has foreseen this state of affairs for a long time and predicts that we shall still have a further period of abnormal conditions. Oh well, the weather is probably joining in the celebrations and making the visitors feel at home.

ALTHOUGH THE WOOL Market closed yesterday with only slight activity, this is believed to be due to the fact that the buyers still have large quantities contracted which have not been delivered, and that as soon as this surplus is cleared off they will renew their purchases. Prices have remained firm throughout the week and open optimism is expressed in all circles connected with the trade. It is estimated that some thirty three and a half million kilos of wool have been sold during the present season and that nearly five million kilos more has been bought and not yet delivered. It is believed that if the present steady prices continue and the spring shearing is normal, the situation in the Camp next season will be definitely improved, in spite of the prevailing low prices for cattle.

WE HAVE BEEN ADVISED from private sources that a bomb exploded in front of a combined business and residential building situated on Calle San José on Friday morning about 1.00 a. m. According to these reports the damage to the property was extensive, the force of the explosion completely destroying the front of the lower storey. No injuries to persons resulted. However, we have not confirmed the notice and no report of the matter was published in the police bulletins yesterday.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE SOCIETY

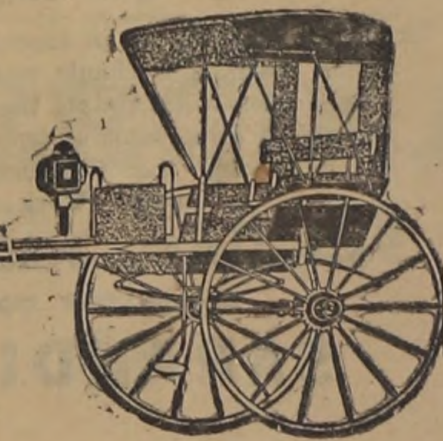

LONDON LETTER

"All the King's Horses and All the King's Men"

London was the scene of greatest and most impressive pageant in history, when the King drove from Buckingham Palace to St. Paul's for the Thanksgiving Service on Monday, May 6th the 25th anniversary of his reign.

The glorious sunshine, the gaily beflagged and decorated streets, the myriads of men, women and children and the shattering roars of applause will live in the memory of those who were there to do homage to the King-Emperor and his Queen.

The King wore the scarlet and gold uniform of a Field Marshal with white cocked hat and the Queen regal and lovely in a silver lace dress and fur trimmed cloak with the blue order of the garter across her breast.

The procession was headed by the Speaker of the House of Commons, Then the Lord Chancellor, which in turn was followed by the procession of

Prime Ministers, headed by Mr. Ramsay MacDonald, after whom drove the Premiers of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Southern Rhodesia and Northern Ireland, Representatives of India were also part of the procession.

In the Royal Procession the Duke of York drove with the Duchess of York and the two little Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret Rose. Next the Duke and Duchess of Kent followed by the Prince of Wales, who rode with the Queen of Norway, the Duke of Gloucester Lord Harewood and Princess Victoria.

There was a tremendous outburst of cheering as the King and Queen drove of the Palace escorted by those famous Regiments, the Dragoons the Lancers, the Hussars, and the King's own escort, the Life Guards.

The Royal procession passed slowly through the cheering crowds along Constitution Hill to Hyde Park Corner along Piccadilly and Saint James Street, through the Pall Mall and Trafalgar Square into the Strand at Temple Bar, where the Lord Mayor of London presented the King with the Pearl Sword. The King, after taking the Sword by the hilt, returned it to the Lord Mayor and the procession proceeded to Saint Paul's where, at the

West door, the King was met by the Bishop of London and the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral.

Under the misty depths of the great dome facing the high Altar, were the two gold fringed rose pink velvet chairs of the King and Queen.

After a service of simplicity and dignity the King and Queen returned to the Palace and shortly after appeared on the balcony to wave and smile to the cheering crowds.

The Saint John's Ambulance men had an exceptionally busy time during the day dealing with fainting cases among the dense crowds.

In the early hours of the Jubilee morning, London presented an unusual appearance, thousands of men, women and children were asleep on the pavements and in the parks — one distinguished looking, well dressed man was asleep on a dust bin with a monocle in his eye!

At night dense crowds thronged the decorated area to admire the flood lighting. A man in Piccadilly Circus decided to make Eros look patriotic and fastened a Union Jack in the Archer's bow. Another man climbed up a tall lamp, post where he stood swathed in a Union Jack while the crowd sang "Rule Britannia".

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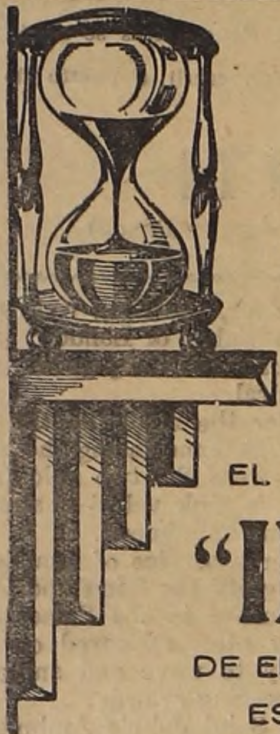

And so passed the great and glorious Silver Jubilee.

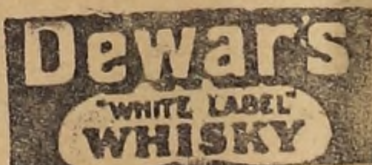
