THE MEMEL DISPUTE

London, April 26th

It is semi-officially announced that Great Britain, France and Italy propose to make an appeal to the Council of the League of Nations against the Government of Lithuania in case the latter does not accede to the recommendation made to her to the effect that the Germans are only to have the proper amount of participation in the administration of the Memel district.

MACDONALD'S ARTICLE

London, April 26th

The article published by MacDonald yesterday strongly accusing the Reich of disturbing the peace of Europe, has been commented upon in various manners. While the opposition, especially the Labourists and Liberals, criticise it, the official press praises the frankness used by the Prime Minister. The Liberal organ, "News Chronicle" says: "We all know that the Prime Minister has a tendency towards being vague and obscure in his declarations, but even so he has surprised us with his astounding article. It is singularly inopportune and gives an impression of being an official statement upon a very contentious question at the most critical and decisive moment in the vital negotiations of the cause of peace." declares that "at times the cause of peace is better served by speaking with absolute frankness" but admits, however, that the statements of MacDonald contain extraordinary words. In political circles it is believed that the article of MacDonald will cause heated debates during the discussion of the armaments question in the House of Commons on May 2nd.

Berlin, April 26th

The "Political and Diplomatic Correspondence", a publication which reflects the point of view of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, answers the assertion contained in MacDonald's publication to the effect that Germany does not sincerely desire peace by saying: "The Reich has never retired her offer to submit to any limitation of armaments which the other nations are also disposed to accept".

Paris, April 26th

The entire press has stressed the article published by the British Prime Minister in the "New Letter", declaring that it is of extreme importance. In commenting upon this article, the press congratulates MacDonald upon the attitude he has adopted and declare that it removes the impression that he possesses strong pro-German tendencies. They affirm that he has evidently realized the intentions of the Reich and congratulate him upon his courage his courage in publishing his convictions.

THE BATTLE OF BOYUIBE

Asunción, April 26th

The Ministry of Defence, up until the early hours of the morning, had published no official communication concerning the operations being carried out in the Chaco. However, Military observers express the opinion that the Bolivian attacks in the sectors of Ingavi and Villamontes were launched by General Peñaranda in the hope that, if these positions were as weakly defended as he believed, he would be able to oblige General Estigarribia to retire his troops from the sector of Boyuibé in order to defend the threatened positions. The Bolivian authorities hoped, by this blow, to paralyse the Paraguayan counter offensive at Boyuibé, the daily progression of which is increasingly threatening the lines of the Bolivians. The Bolivian plan failed however, as the different sectors contain sufficient forces for their individual defence and no reinforcements are needed from the other positions in case of an unexpected attack. The major operations continue in the Boyuibé sector where it is expected that decisive actions will occur which will fundamentally influence the development of the campaign.

THE FRANCO - RUSSIAN PACT

Moscow, April 26th

After a lengthy conference with the Council of Commissioners of the People, Litvinoff sent a telegram containing new instructions to the Russian Ambassador in Paris with the intention of reaching final agreement upon the Franco-Soviet Pact of mutual aid. The text of the telegram has not been revealed but it is believed in political circles that it indicates the convenience of bringing about a definite agreement within the next few days in order that Mr. Laval may come to Moscow at the beginning of May to solemnly sign the Treaty. The precise nature of the difficulties holding up the agreement are also still unknown, although in Paris it is declared that they were related with the question of immediate mutual military aid to the nation subjected to an aggression and that France desired that this clause should first be treated by the League of Nations. However, it is declared in Soviet circles that this was not the cause. A number of foreign observers believe that the question of guaranteeing the frontiers of the Baltic States may have been the obstacle.

Paris, April 26th

In official circles there is every hope that the Franco-Soviet Pact may be initiated tomorrow in view of the new instructions received by the Soviet Ambassador from Moscow. As regards the difficulties previously arising, it is declared, however, that automatic action against an aggressive nation will not be accepted by France.

POSSIBLE MONARCHY IN GREECE

Paris, April 26th

The Minister of Greece, in referring to the probable return of King George II to the throne, declared however that the supporters of the ex-Monarch have no intention of attempting a coup d'état to secure the restoration of the regime. The King has left for London accompanied by his secretary, being bidden farewell in the railway station by some thirty Greek monarchists. The French authorities do not believe that there will be any international complications as a result of a restoration of the monarchy in Greece as it is declared that the Greek Government has assured that the new regime will continue to maintain the present international policy of Greece, including the participation of that nation in the Balkan Entente. Before leaving for London the King assured the Greek officials that he will await the decision adopted by the Assembly at Athens before taking any steps.

NAPOLEON'S SON

On March 20th, 1811, Napoleon stood at a window of the Tuilleries, his pale face for once betraying emotion, his cold grey eyes dim with tears of joy, as the guns of the Hotel des Invalides roared out the news of the birth of an heir. "Paris counts the cannon shots — nineteen, twenty, twenty-one — so far it may be only a girl. At the booming of the twenty-second gun the whole city is in a frenzy of delight". And not only in Paris, but from Danzing on the north to Cadiz and Torres Vedras on the south, from Cape Finisterre in the west to the eastern frontier of the Grand Duchy of Warsaw, the cannon thundered salutes. This was the day the little Corsican, at the zenith of his dazzling career, was sure he had founded a dynasty.

The child was at once proclaimed King of Rome, and was later christened with the names of Napoleon Francis Charles Joseph Bonaparte by Cardinal Fresh in Notre Dame. The ceremony was surrounded by the most magnificent pomp and followed by banquets, an immense public festival, and the lavish distribution of largesse among the poor. The city presented to the Empress a cradle of silver-gilt ornamented with a figure of Victory, laurel wreaths, and imperial eagles, afterwards preserved among the treasures of the imperial palace in Vienna.

"The man who could not be amused", as Talleyran with malicious

sarcasm once called him, laughed at his sturdy little son. He had him brought in as he breakfasted, romped boisterously with him, dipped the baby's finger in gravy and smeared his face. He perched his cocked-hat upon the child's little head and roared with glee as it slipped down over the tiny nose. He made faces at him in a mirror, and when he shrieked in terror comforted him with clumsy good-nature. "My son" he wrote to discarded Josephine in dignified retirement at Malmaison, "is sturdy and in splendid health. He has my lungs, my mouth and eyes".

One of the best-known portraits of the King of Rome was painted to send to his father at Moscow in that campaign which was the beginning of his downfall. The baby was cutting his last four teeth, and as Napoleon lingered too long beside the charred and blackened ruins of the city before ignominious retreat, he scrawled letters to the Empress brimming with affectionate concern and sending kisses to "le petit Roi".

Lower and lower sank Napoleon's star after the colossal failure of the Russian campaign. The great battle of Leipzig drove him back across the Rhine. The Allies invaded France. The Emperor entrusted his wife and child to the National Guard with the charge: "Never saw them again. During his absence in the field the government was in the hands of a Regency, with the Empress at the head and Joseph Bonaparte as lieutenant-general. Dumas the elder, in his 'Mémoires' recalled the scene in Paris he had witnessed as a child, when "at the flourish of brazen trumpets and the waving of welcoming flags, they lifted up above the heads of the fifty thousand of the National Guard the

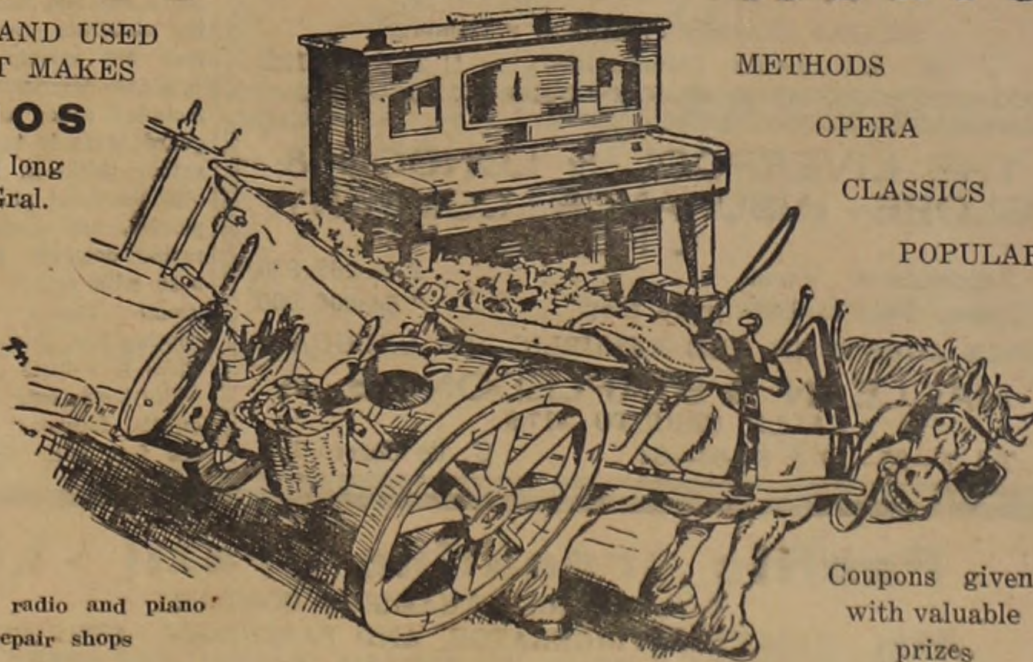

rosy-cheeked, fair curly-haired child of three, amid shouts of 'Long live the King of Rome! Long live the Regency!' In its name it was promised that he should never quit Paris, that he, Marie Louise his mother, and King Joseph his uncle should die among the French people. Yet the carriages that were to bear them away next day were standing ready with the horses harnessed in the courtyard of the Tuileries."

Joseph Bonaparte had brought to the Council a letter from Napoleon ordering that directly the Allies appeared in force his wife and child were to leave the city. "Remember that I would rather throw my son into the Seine than into the hands of the foes of France. The fate of Astynax, captured by the Greeks, has always appeared to me the saddest in history". So when Napoleon abdicated Marie Louise and her son were with Joseph and Jerome Bonaparte at Blois.

In that hour of black despair he wrote her a letter afterwards bitterly regretted, confessing he was utterly ruined, that his hour had struck, counselling her to avoid being involved in his misfortunes by hastening to Vienna and throwing herself into her father's arms. Joseph and Jerome Bonaparte attempted to restrain her, but she discovered that the object of her brothers-in-law was to hold her child and herself as hostages to extort favorable terms for themselves from Austria. Napoleon immediately realized the folly of his advice, but his letter urging her to join him at Elba, bringing their son, arrived after she had left for Austria, escorted.

ed by the Count von Neipperg. Had she received it earlier, it would not have diverted her from her determination to abandon him.

The Viennese gave the child a rapturous welcome. They thronged around the carriage to kiss his tiny pink fingers. His bonny looks and amiable behaviour were delightedly remarked. He and his mother were assigned as residence the palace of Schonbrunn, occupied five years before by Napoleon as conqueror dictating harsh terms to vanquished Austria. Napoleon continued to write to Marie Louise, first entreating her and then commanding her to proceed to Elba with the child. When he threatened forcible abduction the rupture was complete. As they had agreed, the Powers awarded to Marie Louise and her son the duchies of Parma, Piacenza, and Guastalla. The King of Rome became the Prince of Parma.

During the Hundred Days, that amazing brief revival of Napoleon's power, Bonapartist agents plotted to carry off the child to his father in Paris. For greater safety he was removed to the palace in Vienna and closely guarded. The little boy used to stand at a window for hours watching the soldiers. Among the elaborate precautions to frustrate any attempt at removal was a minute description sent to all preys of police and every frontier guard. "He is two feet in height, rather thick-set, has a very smooth, beautiful pink-and-white complexion, full cheeks, blue eyes eyes rather deep-set, a small turned-up nose with rather wide nostrils, a small mouth with somewhat pouting lips, in the middle of which there is a little cleft; large, very white teeth, long flaxen hair parted on the forehead and falling round the face and shoulders in thick

curls. The Prince usually speaks French, but also speaks some German. He talks in a lively manner and gesticulates with his hands. His behaviour is very vivacious". No one travelling with a child who could by any possibility be the one thus described was to be allowed to leave Austria.

After Waterloo Napoleon abdicated in favour of his son, an empty condition since the boy was a prisoner in Austria. The Powers insisted that even his inheritance of Parma be annulled, and when Marie Louise proceeded to her duchy with Neipperg, falling more and more under the fascination of that general of hussars, the boy remained at Vienna, a pawn in the intricate and unscrupulous game of European politics. Sometimes his name was used by Italians striving towards the unification of their land divided among many masters, sometimes by malcontents in France to discredit the Bourbons. Metternich himself held the claims of Napoleon's son in reserve as a weapon in his tortuous diplomacy, though never sincerely intending to support them. The child was strictly guarded, but a lock of his hair was smuggled to his father at St. Helena, causing consternation among the Austrian Ministers at an act denounced as "compromising to the State and dangerous to the peace of Europe".

Deprived of the title of Prince of Parma, the boy was presently created Duke of Reichstadt by his grandfather, the Emperor Francis. "I would rather", Napoleon had said, "see my son strangled than brought up as an Austrian Prince". Now that son was reduced to a rank inferior to the Archdukes and the most pertinacious efforts were made to transform him into an Austrian, erasing all connection with his past, with France and his father.

Count Dietrichstein was appointed as governor to superintend his education. "It is absolutely essential", were his instructions to the Austrian tutors, "that all impressions of his former existence should be obliterated". The French attendants were one by one dismissed, the green livery of Napoleon was discarded, the lesson-books with the imperial cipher in gold on their covers were put away.

The Count found him "precocious, volatile, passionate, and fond of military affairs". He was often in trouble with his tutors, who described him as "obstinate, perverse, violent unruly". His nature, however, did not lack tenderness. He was much moved by ill-treatment of animals, and wept when he first saw a lark devour a worm. They never succeeded in making him forget the past nor his father, of whom he often talked and repeatedly asked what his fate had been, for he was not told. They scrupulously inculcated gratitude to his grandfather, whom he was taught to regard as his sole friend and protector. The Emperor, indeed, seems to have felt genuine affection for him.

When the news of his father's death was conveyed to the ten-year-old boy he wept bitterly, to his tutor's astonishment. Napoleon's will, dictated at St. Helena, left to his son at sixteen most of his personal possessions—"arms, field-beds, saddles, spurs, snuff-boxes... my sword, the one I wore at Austerlitz... my gold travelling-case which I made use of on the morning of Ulm, of Austerlitz, of Jena, of Eylau, of Friedland, of the Island of Lobau, of Borodino, and of Montmirail... my alarm clock which was that of Frederick II, and which I took at Potsdam... a blue cloak, the one I had at Marengo... a consular sword... a grand collar of the Legion of Honour." The boy never even knew of the bequest.

The sturdy baby grew up to frail young manhood, irked by constant surveillance and unrelaxing control, with a temperament that chafed continually against restraint, provoked to irritability and restlessness. He could not be prevented from realizing more and more what might have been, and his health was undermined. It was manifest, "by the continual struggle against his destiny, his false position at the imperial courts, and his restless yearning for action and renown".

He sought distraction in unwise and excessive physical exercise, careless of over-strain and exposure, aggravating the chest weakness which had developed. A chill suddenly accelerated the symptoms of pulmonary tuberculosis. Only when summoned by an urgent message, inspired by concern for public opinion, did his mother trouble to come from Parma. Towards the last he called for her "in a weary and broken voice", begging them "Call my mother, call my mother". She was asleep, and out of consideration for her comfort was not disturbed. When at last she came to his death-bed, he could recognize her only

with a nod. So died on July 22nd, 1832, the son of the great Napoleon, amid such enthusiasm and glory. Anthony Clyne.

Concerning our local "rugger" activities this year, we are advised that the season will start on May 4th when the first practice will be held at the Blanqueada.

The General Meeting of "ruggerites" which took place some days ago at the English Club was a step in right direction; it was an sound innovation to get all the players together before the actual opening of the season and discuss the general plans and prospects. There are a number of old rugger men (an encouraging number of whom were present at the meeting) only too glad to place their knowledge and experience at the disposal of the coming players, and there is no doubt that this would lead to a big improvement in the standard of play. kitting, drop and punt, was also proposed.

TOBACCO SMOKE

The events of the past few days in the Chaco certainly would seem to bear out the old adage of counting unhatched chickens. For weeks the Paraguayans have been steadily been driving back their enemies — becoming more confident of their power with every kilometre advanced and less and less desirous to give up arms for arbitration. In doing so, they have acted in a very logical and human manner, for they could naturally see no point in submitting for doubtful arbitration a matter which they were firmly convinced they could solve themselves by force. And, frankly speaking, their point of view is based upon solid facts, for the previous efforts at arbitration have been more than futile.

However and but — and what a great deal these two words mean — from being a conquering enemy, the Paraguayans have suddenly met with unexpected reverses. The Bolivians naturally feel very pleased with themselves and now see a possibility to recovering all that they have lost and turning what seemed to be certain defeat into a victory. It can be reasonably expected now that both nations will fight

with increased vigour — the Paraguayans in order to continue their advance and the Bolivians to recover their lost prestige (which they may possibly consider more important than their lost territory). So the war in the Chaco may be reasonably considered as entering into a new phase which makes the results of the struggle again problematical.

There is another interesting aspect to the matter. Bolivia, for many months (that is, since she began to realize that she was thoroughly getting the worst of the dispute) has publicly and vociferously announced her desire for peace, arbitration, a stoppage of the struggle, and the delivery to her of "rights" she has been unable to secure by force. She has called upon the heavens the League of Nations, and her neighbours to witness that she is merely on the defensive and that it is the nasty Paraguayans who are causing all the trouble and will not listen to reason. Observers, perhaps a bit over sceptical, have put all this down as a result of an increasing belief in Bolivia that the longer the war continued the worse the defeat

would be.

Now, what will Bolivia do? If she is again asked whether she is willing to submit the matter to arbitration, cease hostilities immediately, and await a pacific solution of the problem, will she, in view of the apparent turn in the tide of battle, still be so strongly in favour of immediate peace?

Nations being, in many ways very like small and rather naughty boys, it will not be a bit surprising to see peculiar developments in the Chaco situation — the peaceable part of it — during the next few days. And it is also very probable that the truth of the negro saying to the effect that "the kicked dog hollers" will be borne out.

Famous theorists dispute over whether the belief that might makes right — and its practical application — will ever be eliminated from the peoples of the world, and there are many who believe that, in spite of conferences and agreements, it never possibly can be completely eradicated. Looking back over history, there are many arguments in favour of the use of strength and these have evidently been well assimilated by a number of modern leaders.

Oh well, we shall see what we shall see.

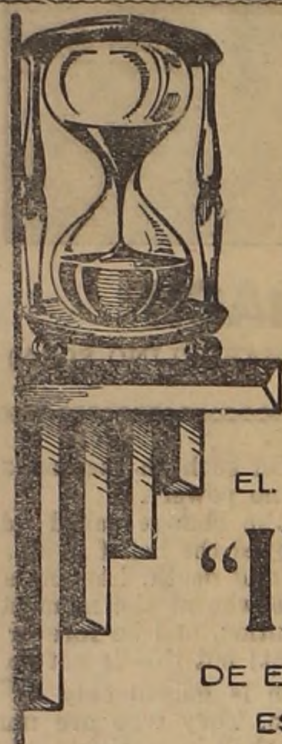

THE EARTHQUAKES IN PERSIA

Teheran, April 26th

According to the latest reports received, the number of deaths caused by the earthquake which has swept the Province of Mazanderan amount to over five hundred. The number of injured is still unknown although it is believed to be large. The quake destroyed twenty eight villages and a number of official buildings were thrown down or injured. In the district of Ludestai, in the Province of Silakhkor, two villages are in ruins and there are a number of dead and wounded. The authorities are taking measures to relieve the condition of the survivors.

DR. F. MELVILLE HARVEY

LONDON SECRETARY OF
THE DOCTORS' GUILD

(Editor's Note: The following, which was published in a London newspaper on March 15th will be of interest to the many friends of Doctor Harvey, who was a former resident of Montevideo).

Dr. Frank Melville Harvey, M.C., of Brondesbury, died last week in St. Mary's Hospital, London, where he had qualified in 1909 after a brilliant student career.

He was born in 1885 received his general education at Stonyhurst. When he left St. Mary's Hospital, he rounded off his studies by resident appointments in the cosmopolitan British Hospital of Buenos Aires and in the French Hospital in London.

In the war he served with distinction with the rank of Captain in the Royal Army Medical Corps in France and Italy for four years.

In 1918 he married Dorothy Elizabeth Cripps of Amersham. Until his sudden death he worked unceasingly and devotedly at a busy private practice.

In addition to heavy professional duties, he was very much attached to the work of the Guild of St. Luke, St. Cosmas and St. Damian. Soon after the war he became its London secretary and arranged year after year a programme of lectures delivered at the Hospital of St. John and St. Elizabeth whose effect upon medical thought can hardly be overestimated. The resistance among the Catholic laity to pagan morality in medical practice can be traced largely to his years of quiet administrative work.

His body was taken to the Church of Our Lady of Compassion, Willesden Green, and Requiem Mass was offered by Fr. Fitzgerald. He was buried in Amersham, the service at the graveside being carried out by the parish priest.

He will never be forgotten among the present generation of London Catholic doctors, at whose request Mass will be offered for the repose of his soul by Canon Fletcher, M.R.C.S., chaplain of the doctors' guild.

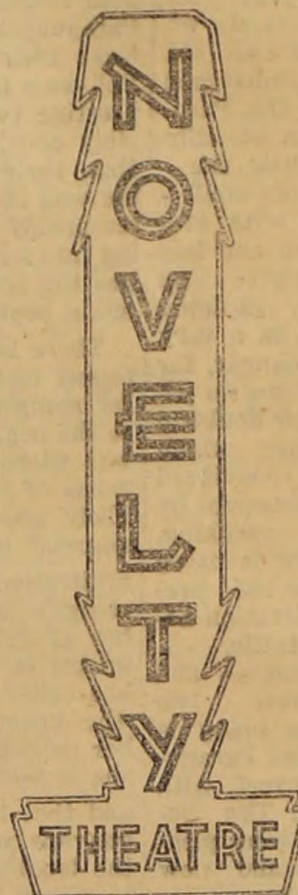
