POLITICAL NOTES.

The Senators held their first preparatory sitting on Friday. Dr. Campi-teguy was elected provisional President of the Chamber by 7 votes, against 4 given to Sr. Pons and 1 to Dr. B. Rocca. There was no further business.

The Representatives held their second preparatory sitting on Friday. Dr. A. M. Rodríguez was definitely reelected President of the Chamber, and Drs. M. B. Otero and A. M. Rodríguez were elected 1st and 2nd Vice-Presidents. The Permanent Committees were then named as follows:—

The re-election of Dr. Campi-teguy as President of the Senate and Vice President of the Republic is now regarded as practically certain, though there were several absentees from the Senate on Friday. It will be noted that Dr. B. Rocca, who was reputed the official candidate for the post, only obtained one vote. Our contemporaries already hail this as a defeat of the absolutist plans of President Batlle. The election of the prominent nationalist Dr. A. Rodríguez Larreta as one of the Vice-Presidents of the lower Chamber and the nomination of several nationalists to the Permanent Commissions has also produced a favorable impression, as showing a healthy reaction from the exclusive theories of which the *Día* is the prophet, and according to which political office and authority should be a closed monopoly of the dominant faction.

The Decree relative to the Conversion of the 6 oja Debe has been signed, and is expected to be published in the *Diario Oficial* this morning. For some reasons best known to itself, the Government has refused to let other papers have a copy until it has appeared in the *Diario Oficial*.—According to the *Día*, the issuing price in Paris of the new 5 oja Loan

will be 97 1/2 oja. No doubt more will be known in the course of a few days.

Our contemporaries state that negotiations are well advanced with the Government for the building of a branch railway from Algora station on the Midland Uruguay Railway to Fray Bentos (marked on many maps as Independencia, though the name Fray Bentos is now officially recognized.) There is also some talk of extending the branch from Algora to station Piedra Sol on the Central Uruguay line, which would bring Fray Bentos into railway communication with the capital and with Salto, Rivera, San Eugenio and the Brazilian frontier. Fray Bentos, the seat of Liebig's great factory and the centre of the meat preserving industry, has already a river port (on the river Uruguay) accessible to ocean vessels of medium draught, and the new line, though not of great length, would traverse a fertile, important and fairly populous region. There is little doubt, therefore, of its utility, and it would probably help to feed the traffic on the Midland, which so far has not been a very prosperous line. It is hoped that the matter will soon be settled.

It will be remembered that, as soon as the Chambers had completed the sanction of the War Indemnity Loan in November last, the Executive vetoed the Bill, on the ground that, as the Loan was included in the Conversion Scheme by which the interest was reduced from 6 to 5 oja, the Bill was unnecessary. This created an awkward situation for the holders of Credit Certificates who were waiting to exchange them for definite Bonds, besides exposing them to delay in the securing of interest. The Chambers, by their customary indifference, let the matter slide, but were convoked yesterday to General Assembly to discuss the matter, we cannot yet say with what result. Credit Certificates to the value of over \$2,000,000 have already been issued. By the Indemnity Loan Bill, holders of these were entitled to exchange them for Bonds of the 6 oja Indemnity Loan, and by the Conversion Scheme these were again changeable for Bonds of the 5 oja Conversion Loan with a cash bonus up to 3 oja to compensate the difference between the nominal and the issuing value of the last named. This is a rather confused sort of arrangement, and we suppose that the Chambers will be asked to find some way of simplifying it. There is certainly no necessity to go to the expense and trouble of printing Bonds of the 6 oja Indemnity Loan, merely that they may be immediately exchanged for Bonds of the new 5 oja Loan, but at the same time until the veto of the Executive is removed, the former Loan is non-existent, and creditors for war indemnities have nothing on which to claim. A little more fore-thought might have avoided this obvious blunder.

As will be seen in another column, the Argentine Trade Returns for 1905 have already been published, and our Buenos Aires contemporaries are able to comment on them in detail. Here in Uruguay we are still without any commercial statistics whatever for 1905, not even those for the first quarter of the year having appeared, nor is there any hint as to when they may be expected. What has happened to the Statistical Office is more than we can explain, nor does anyone in authority seem to take any interest in the matter.

Buenos Aires Notes.

From the *Review of the River Plate*:—The Trade Returns for 1905 have been published and they show that the past year has been the most important in the history of the country. The imports were valued at forty one million pounds sterling and the exports at sixty four and a half million sterling, both of these being the largest ever registered in our trade returns. This makes a total of one hundred and five and a half million pounds sterling for a population of 5,106,378 inhabitants, which works out at £20.6 per inhabitant, as against £6.96 for the United States, £22 for the United Kingdom and £9 1/2 for Germany. Ten years ago our total trade stood at forty seven and a quarter million sterling, so that in that short period our trade has increased one hundred and twenty five per cent, whilst the population has only increased by 25 per cent. The two principal items in our exports are pastoral products, standing at £28,200,000, an increase of seven millions sterling on 1904, and agricultural products standing at £34,000,000, an increase of four millions sterling on 1904. The imports of bullion were six and a half million sterling. If we look at the returns as regards the countries from which we have drawn our supplies we find that the United Kingdom leads the list with 33 per cent. of the total, an increase of 6 per cent. Germany is second with 14.2 per cent, an increase of 16 1/2 per cent. United States third with 14.1 per cent, an increase of 18.1 per cent., and France fourth with 10.4 per cent., an increase of 24.1 per cent. As regards exports it is impossible to give correct returns, as 33.8 per cent. were shipped to orders, but from the data available we find that the United Kingdom took 13.9 per cent. of direct shipments, an increase of 22.9 per cent. France took 11.6 per cent., an increase of 22.8 per cent. Germany 11.5 per cent., an increase of 25.5 per cent., and the United States 4.9 per cent., an increase of 53.9 per cent.

The Government has at last taken measures to relieve the snag up that has been existing at the port of Buenos Aires for so long. The Finance Minister has decreed that in future all steamers

that arrive without passengers must await their turn in the outer roads, and during the time that they are there, no port charges will be levied. More use is also to be made of the port of La Plata, and in future hazardous goods will be unloaded at that port, or else in the South Dock. More men have been put on at the Custom House so as to facilitate discharge, and the Catelinas Company has been ordered to provide more rolling stock, as the bad management of that Company has had a great deal to do with the snag up in the unloading section.

During the past year the fire losses in the City of Buenos Aires amounted to about one and a half million dollars, a considerable increase on the previous year, and about the same as in 1903. The present year has commenced very badly for the insurance companies, as fires have been most numerous both in Buenos Aires and Rosario as well as in other parts of the country. Scarcely a day passes without an outbreak taking place in Buenos Aires. That all of these fires are casual we have very grave doubts, but the difficulty of proving them to have been the work of incendiaries is so difficult that the companies have nothing else to do than pay. It is not sufficient for the fire brigade to report that the fire showed every signs of having been intentional for the companies to be in a position to refuse to pay. It is now some time since the courts found any person guilty of incendiarism, so that the public have forgotten all about it and the fear of being found out is not sufficiently great to prevent tradesmen liquidating their business by the most rapid and profitable method, namely that of fire.

Fatal Automobile Accident.

Man Killed by the President's Automobile.

The automobile just bought by order of the President for the use of himself and his Ministers has had an unhappy debut, and has been responsible for the first fatal automobile accident reported here.

On Friday afternoon the Minister of Foreign Affairs Dr. Romen was returning from a visit to the President at Piedras Blancas, and about 7.30 p.m. had arrived at Calle 18 de Julio, corner of Yaro, when the automobile knocked down and ran over the man José Puga Rodríguez, as he was crossing the street. Dr. Romen (who is medico) rendered first aid to the victim, who was promptly conveyed in an ambulance to the Caridad Hospital, where he died early yesterday morning without having recovered consciousness. The victim was a Spaniard aged about 35, but very little seems to be known about him except that he had recently arrived from Paraguay to collect some money due to him. The police confined themselves to taking notes of the event—of course it would never do to arrest the chauffeur of the President—and it is presumed that no enquiry will be held.

Wedding in Buenos Aires.

From the *B. A. Herald*:—

The marriage of Mr. Walter Trillia Casals, eldest son of Mr. W. R. Casals, and Miss Clara E. Roberts, eldest daughter of Mr. W. C. Roberts, all of this city, was celebrated at St. Andrew's Scotch Church on Thursday evening, and was very largely attended, the sacred edifice being crowded. The decorations, arranged by Miss Mackinlay and other friends of the bride, were very effective, white flowers alone with green foliage, palms and white tulle bows being used. Shortly after nine o'clock the bride entered the church escorted by her father. She wore a handsome white satin gown with lace overdress, her veil was fastened with a spray of orange blossoms and she carried a bouquet of white flowers. The bridesmaids were the Misses Isabel and Maxima Roberts, sisters of the bride, who wore dresses in pink mousseline de sole, wore black picture hats and carried bouquets of pink roses. The groom, attended by Mr. Robert W. Casals as best man, and Mr. J. H. Casals, groomsmen, awaited his bride at the chancel. The ceremony, conducted by the Rev. J. W. Fleming, B. D. was fully choral, and the music was unusually fine. During the service the hymns were sung by the full choir, of which both the contracting parties have for a long time been members. After the wedding a reception, attended only by the near relatives and close friends of the newly wedded couple, was held at the residence of the bride's father, Calle Caseros, where a very large number of beautiful presents were displayed.

—**WEDDING.**—An interesting social event tomorrow (Monday) will be the marriage of Mr. E. Buckland Cooper and Miss Byrne, which will be celebrated in Holy Trinity Church at 4 p.m., to be followed by a reception in the house of the bride's parents. Both bride and bridegroom are members of old-established and popular English families, so there is sure to be a large attendance.

—**STRIKES.**—As we understand, the threatened fresh strike on the Este Tramway has been averted by the expedient of transferring the men who caused the trouble. This can hardly be called a solution of the difficulty, nor is it entirely certain yet that the men accept it.—It is now denied that the masons and bricklayers are preparing a new strike.—Contrary to the statement of a contemporary, the partial strike of painters still remains on foot.—It is hoped to arrange the difficulties with the electric light workmen without a strike.—There is no change in the situation as regards the printers' strike neither side showing any sign of yielding, nor any attempt being made at intervention.

—**STEAMER FOR LONDON.**—The first-class steamer «Buteshire», of 8000 tons and fitted with every modern convenience, is leaving tomorrow for London direct, and will take passengers. First-class passage £22. Agents, Messrs. Christopher Brothers.

—**MURDER.**—A quarrel between neighbours led to a shocking murder in the suburb of Carrizo de la Victoria on Friday, the victim being Pedro Pedranzi, a much respected dairyman. He had as neighbours Nicomedes García, father and son, and there was ill blood between them owing to mutual trespassing of their cattle. On Friday Pedranzi was driving in his cart, when he was stopped by the younger García, a youth of 19, and after some high words the latter took out a revolver and fired two shots, the second of which proved immediately fatal, the victim (who was unarmed) falling dead to the ground. The murderer was promptly arrested.

—**URQUIZA THEATRE.**—The program for this evening consists of «La Señora Capitan», «El Pulso de Rosas», «El Arte de ser Bonita» and «Los Descominados».

—**POLITEAMA THEATRE.**—The melodrama «Los Pobres de Madrid» will be repeated this evening.

—**CASINO.**—There will be the usual afternoon performances to-day. Some novelties are promised during the week.

—**SR. PEREIRA'S ESTATE.**—The will of the late Don Antonio Pereira has already been opened. It appears that his estate is now valued at four million dollars. The principal part of his fortune is divided between his niece Sr. Rosell Rius (already a wealthy lady) his nephew Sr. Julio Pereira, and the girls Maria Cristina and Virginia Mendez Pereira, adopted daughters of the late Dr. Gualberto Mendez. Fifteen squares of land near Tres Cruces are bequeathed to the Municipality on condition that they are converted into a public park within five years. His valuable collection of books, pictures, works of art, and historical relics and documents is to be divided between the National Museum, National Library and the University. Some hereditary lands he possessed at Coruña, Spain, are bequeathed to the local Municipality, on condition that remembrance is made of the name of his grandfather Don Antonio Pereira, who came from there. There are also various legacies to private friends and servants. His executors are Dr. P. de Meria, Sr. Rosell Rius and Sr. Antonio R. Pereira. The deceased millionaire has shown more public spirit than is usual here.

—**DEATH.**—From the *B. A. Standard*:—It is with extreme regret that we announce the death of Mr. Henry Marval, formerly of the London Stock Exchange, who came here about twenty years ago and, among other important posts, represented the great Paris firm of Sieut Frères. Mr. Marval was at one time a prominent member of the English Literary Society, his particular forte being lectures on modern Russia, the Trans-Siberian Railway, etc. His death took place at Tiflis, in the Russian Caucasus, where he had been residing

for the last three years. Mr. Marval, who was of French descent, was an Englishman by birth and had travelled considerably in Argentina and we shall always recollect his masterly description of the Falls of Iguzú. His brother, Mr. Septimus J. Marval, is the veteran general agent of La Previsora, the leading Argentine Life Insurance Company.

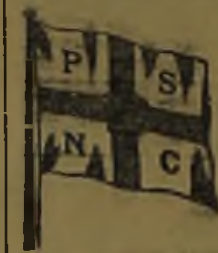
