POLITICAL NOTES.

Neither of the Chambers sat on Friday. It should have been the turn of the Senate.

Practically the only political novelty of the moment is the visit paid to the President of the Republic, on Friday, by General Justino Muñiz, the "candido" of Cerro Largo, and who is generally looked upon as inclined to the old regime. According to the account given by the *Nacion*, the interview was cordial, and General Muñiz expressed himself as opposed to any revolutionary ideas and ready to support the cause of law and order.—Drs. R. Larreta and A. Lamas, the nationalist emissaries who go to consult Aparicio Saravia respecting the "cárcel," started on their journey yesterday, and are expected back on Tuesday or Wednesday.—Preparations continue for the "colorado" Convention to be held on Tuesday, but nothing definite has transpired as to the intentions of the party wire-pullers.

It was stated yesterday that the representatives of the port contractors have found such difficulty in coming to terms with the proprietors of the stone quarries in the immediate neighbourhood of the bay, owing to the exaggerated prices asked by the latter, that they intend to apply to the Government for powers of expropriation. This was not in the original contract.

Yesterday's *Siglo* applauds the intention of the Government to push forward the scheme for the creation of the High Court of Justice. It considers the moment opportune for this advance in the organization of the Judicial Power, and regards the objections to the scheme, economical and otherwise, as not being of great weight.

With regard to a question that has been raised respecting fines for omissions to stamp receipts and other commercial documents, about which there has been some trouble of late, the *Siglo* gives the opinion, based on various legal grounds, that the term of limitation is four years; that is to say that fines cannot be exacted in relation to documents dated more than four years back. Whether the offence (omission to stamp a document) be placed under the Civil or the Penal Code, the limitation is the same. The *Siglo* admits, however, that the point is open to discussion and recommends that an Article be introduced in the annual Stamp Law, now about to be discussed, to make it clear.

Yesterday's *Nacion* returns to the defence of the police from the many charges made against them; and, by way of justification of the recent outrage, points out that since the beginning of the year, there have been in this city, 50 cases before the judges of resisting the police, 27 of them with the addition of violence. In the table it adds, however, only one of these cases appears as serious and, knowing how the police here judge such matters, the probability is that the majority of them were trivial. In any case, this does not in the least justify a violent attack of the police on persons who were issuing in an orderly manner from a public conference. The pretence that there was an organised attempt to carry out a forbidden manifestation is purely an invention of the police to excuse their violence. If the affair had rested solely with the reports of the press, there might have been room for doubt, but the prosecution initiated by the judicial authorities and the

Fiscal of Crime shows that it has substantial basis. The affair has been an unhappy business throughout, on account of the ill-feeling it has created towards the Government, and the latter would show more wisdom by letting the matter take its course before the Courts, instead of trying to defend the indefensible and run counter to well-formed public opinion. If the Judges find the serious charges made against the officials to be unproved or trivial, it will be time enough then for the *Nacion* to speak, but at present these are still under trial, and the official organ plays a very ugly rôle when it abuses the judicial authorities for doing their duty, and tries to influence the course of justice by throwing the onus of official approval over functionaries accused of a serious offence. We may add that the revelation made in the *Nacion* of the official attitude shows that we were quite right when we said that there was no confidence to be placed in the pretence of enquiry instigated by the Ministry of Government. It would, as has happened on previous occasions, have resulted in an official whitewash and perhaps direct approbation of the offenders, and have thus encouraged the police to further excesses and outrages—which, in effect, is what the Government seems to be doing in any case.

New Telegraphic Service.

In a recent number of the *South American Journal* we find attention called to a new Agency established in Paris, with branches in London and other capitals, under the title "Agence Telegraphique Internationale des Cables Unis," for supplying press telegrams to and from South America. The *S. A. J.* quotes the following telegram as a specimen of the new service:—

"Montevideo, April 12.—The construction works of the port of this capital will be inaugurated on the 19th inst., the national fête day. The port of Montevideo will render great services to the navigation of the whole Platine region. Its natural conditions are admirable. The city of Montevideo, whose population has already advanced to the figure of 250,000 souls, is destined, when provided with the facilities of its future docks, to become a grand emporium of commerce for the Rio de la Plata and its affluents. The construction of the Western Railway is being actively prosecuted. It is believed that direct communication with the port of Colombia will divert, in favour of that line, the movement of passengers between Montevideo and Buenos Aires. The branch between San José and Mercedes will shortly be open to traffic."

We are afraid that, if this is to be taken as a specimen, the new service will be but little improvement on its predecessors, the unreliable and misleading character of which has become a by-word. With regard to the above:—

1. The port works were not inaugurated on April 19, and it was perfectly well known here on April 12, the date of the telegram that such would not be the case. In fact the date of their inauguration is not fixed even now (May 19).

2. We know of no port of "Colombia" within a thousand miles of Uruguay. There is, however, an Uruguayan port of the name of Colonia, so well-known that it is inconceivable any intelligent person here could make such a mistake.

We are afraid that a reliable and accurate press telegraphic service between these countries and Europe still remains to be established. Journalistic enterprise, great as it may be in other respects, has not yet proved equal to the effort.

Heartless Swindle.

200 Laborers Swindled by a Buenos Aires Employment Agency.

The topic of the day has been a heartless swindle perpetrated on laboring men by an Employment Agency in Buenos Aires, the name of which is given as Marval Sullier (or Lullier), Viamonte 1016. On Friday morning it was announced that over 200 laborers had arrived here from Buenos Aires by the river steamer "Colombia," contracted for the new port works. This occasioned considerable surprise, as it was known that the port works had not yet commenced, and that the contractors had already the names of 1500 or 1600 workmen of all kinds registered at the agency; they themselves had opened here, so there was no necessity to go to Buenos Aires for men. When the vessel arrived, the men waited on board, but no one came to meet them, nor did they know where to go. Enquiries then elicited that the agents here of the port contractors knew nothing whatever of the matter, and had never engaged or proposed to engage the men. The account given by the men was that they had been engaged by an agency in Buenos Aires for the port works here at \$1.40 gold the day, receiving a printed form to that effect, signed by one "Alf. Haner," and for which they had paid in advance a commission varying from \$5 to \$7 paper. The pretended agent came to see them off on board the "Colombia"—we understand their fares were paid—but disappeared before the vessel started. The author-

ities here took the matter in hand and, telegrams being exchanged with Buenos Aires, it was soon discovered that the affair was an impudent swindle, the agency being closed, and the pretended agents not to be found. The men remained on board the "Colombia," the owners of which—who may be included as victims of the swindle—generously took them back to Buenos Aires without further charge than 24 cents for food. It is said that there are several hundred more laborers in Buenos Aires who have been swindled out of a commission in the same manner.

As a climax to the affair, we may add that, on their arrival here, all the men had to submit to vaccination by the sanitary authorities!

Royal Mail Steam Packet.

The report of the directors of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company for 1900, submitted to the meeting on the 1st of May, states that the company's operations comprised additional voyages. This extra work increased the revenue, but, at the same time, the expenditure was also considerably augmented from that cause as well as from the higher cost of coals, and having to charter some cargo vessels. There was a continuous drawback to the revenue on the Brazil and River Plate line owing to quarantine in that region by one country against another to a greater or less degree throughout the year, and low rates prevailed for outward freight owing to exceptional competition on that route. The surplus on the revenue account amounts to £223,851. From this sum £80,000 is transferred to the repair and renewal account, the like sum is carried to capital account for depreciation of the fleet, while the usual transfer of £47,700 is made to insurance account. In addition to the above £80,000, a transfer of £6,000 is made from the insurance account to the repair and renewal account. The expenditure on repairs to ships and machinery has been heavier than usual. The company has entered into a contract with the Government of Trinidad to perform steam services round that island and Tobago, and, in consequence, have purchased Kennett and Arno. The charges against the insurance account amount to £3,743, and after debiting also the £9,000 referred to above for transfer to the repairs and renewal account and maintaining the reserve of £250,000, there is a surplus of £23,050. The directors recommend a dividend of 10s per share for the half-year ended 31st December last, which, with a similar payment in October last for the previous half-year, makes a dividend of 5 per cent. for the year.

Two Winter Pastimes.

With lengthening days we shall doubtless see the waning of a game which during the past winter has served to do something more than while away the idle hours. Ping-pong has been a god-send to many a stifling joint and torpid liver, and to people approaching middle age the amount of exercise to be got out of so simple a game has been a revelation. The ping-pong player is at the mercy of his antagonist. However skillfully he may place his ball his opponent may send it into some strange corner to extricate it from which may involve many an unaccustomed genuflection. And herein lies the virtue of the game. We are perhaps too prone to think that exercise is to be measured by effort. Effort may be laborious but yet confined to certain actions, whole groups of muscles being left idle—never contracted to the full, never stretched to the utmost—and there can be but little doubt that it is in the bending and the stooping and the unaccustomed posturing involved in the hunt for errant balls, quite as much as in the game itself, that the virtue of ping-pong lies as an indoor exercise for those approaching middle age. Another good winter pastime by which the young, especially, maintain suppleness of joint and elasticity of ligament, is properly ordered gymnastic exercise. It is more difficult, however, than some would think so to arrange gymnastics as to distribute the work in due proportion among the different muscles. As the virtue of ping-pong lies in the unexpected, so the vice of gymnastics, unless under proper supervision by qualified teachers, lies in its too orderly repetition. The importance of insisting on this is brought to mind by the remarks about skipping made by Lord Alverstone on the occasion of a recent gymnastic display at the Northampton Institute. He spoke in high praise of this form of exercise. But skipping is not altogether a good exercise for girls. By practising what may be described as "rising on the toes," so as to develop the calf and plantar muscles, much may be done to correct any tendency to flat foot, but by skipping the rebound is too great, and if carried on too long much injury may result. Skipping should only be undertaken as part of a system of exercises, never as an exercise by itself, and although it is good for little girls, there is a point in a young woman's growth when prolonged and competitive skipping may do serious harm. What we would insist on is that in all exercise monotonous repetition of the same movement is to be avoided. Of this all teachers of gymnastics are well aware. Unfortunately skipping

is apt to be looked upon as "quite a simple thing, not requiring supervision, and when girls try to 'keep it up' they hurt themselves.—Hospital.

THE WAR.

From Capetown it is reported that there was a sharp combat south of Mafeking, last Monday, with a group of invading Boers, in which the British lost 6 killed and 11 wounded. (This is probably a repetition of the affair reported yesterday.)

From Port Elisabeth comes news of an encounter at Zwagers Hoek. After some resistance the Boers retreated, leaving 10 dead. British losses were an officer and 7 men wounded.

From Pretoria is reported the surrender of 90 Boers, mostly ex-officers in the republican army.

In the Natal Parliament, one of the members has asserted that armed Zulus have been employed, under the orders of British officers, to sack the Wryheid district.

Italian papers are claiming De Wet as an Italian, saying his real name is Cristiani. This is pushed by the London papers.

Another transport has left New Orleans with 850 remounts for S. Africa.

Afternoon London telegrams are responsible for the following items:—

His Majesty has intimated to Mr. Chamberlain his desire to see Sir Alfred Milner immediately on his arrival in London, which will be next Friday, so that he may have direct information from him of the state of the war and of the feeling between British and Dutch in S. Africa, and thus arrive at some opinion of what may be done to produce peace.—Rumors are appearing of dissidences in the Cabinet, due to Mr. Chamberlain's resistance to making any concessions to the Boers to terminate the war. Sir M. Hicks Beach and the Duke of Devonshire are said to defend the necessity of making peace promptly by means of offering the Boers more favorable conditions.—Mr. Chamberlain has been questioned in the Commons respecting the destruction of Boer farms by the British troops. He denied that the Government had the intention of rebuilding the farms destroyed.

Austrian papers, says a Paris message, repeat the declarations made by the ex-Postmaster General of the Transvaal, at present in Vienna. He claims that the situation of the Boers is by no means desperate, as is proved by their recent rejection of the British terms of peace. The refusal of the European Powers to intervene has, he confesses, made a bad effect in the Transvaal, but still the predominant feeling there is to continue the war at all costs. The British censorship, exercised both in post and telegraph office, prevents any news transpiring from Boer sources.

—MRS. MACKINLEY.—Telegrams from Washington report a turn for the better in the health of this lady.

—ARMY REFORM.—Most of the London papers, says a telegram thence, regard very coldly Mr. Brodrick's scheme of army reform which has just been approved by

the Commons, and some of them say that many who voted in favor of it, did so against their private convictions. (This confirms what we said yesterday, that the Government had made it a party question.)

—3000 DANKS.—Various eminent physicians of America recently recorded their observations and experiences at the New York Academy of Medicine in connexion with alcohol and its effects. Dr. Charles L. Dana based his observations on the careful study of 350 cases of alcoholism at the Bellevue Hospital. The most frequent form of alcoholism was periodical dipsomania, and the next was pseudo-dipsomania. Over two-thirds of the total number of patients had begun to "drink" before the age of twenty years, and all of them before thirty years. "As a rule," said Dr. Dana, "the drunkard did not live more than fifteen years, and it was seldom that the human organism could outlive more than 3,000 intoxications." That seems a large number.

—FUNERAL JOKES.—The Barquet Board of Guardians have been in correspondence with the grateful relative of a deceased pauper in the workhouse, who wrote expressing thanks for their kindness to Maria and the nice comfortable coffin and funeral, and, he added, "it was a very great consolation to see poor Maria so comfortably buried." It was a Newcastle-on-Tyne undertaker who advertised, "Why live and be miserable, when you can be buried in comfort for £3 10s.?" And another current story, down in the Midlands, is the complaint of a like tradesman that "there's nothing doing in the town; it's only funerals that keep this place alive."

QUEER USES OF COMMON THINGS.

Any way you choose to look at him the human animal is interesting; but he is never more so than when he is trying to accomplish something. Not being possessed of the magic word which would enable him to get what he wants merely by wishing for it, he can never go straight ahead towards his desires, but makes headway like a sailboat in a contrary wind, tacking first to one side and then to the other. He cannot warm himself when he is cold unless he first burns up something, coal and wood or else the tissues of his own body by slapping his chest or hopping up and down. It is this having to go at everything on the bias, so to speak, that makes us say that human nature is "queer," for "queer" means "on the slant." Naturally, then, every one that man makes of the rest of nature is queer. Getting accustomed to a thing prevents us from noticing that it is ridiculous. Take the United States Senate for example. The members are so used to hearing and talking nonsense that it never occurs to them what a comical figure they cut before a sane world. But when we see some process for the first time we get the full benefit of its essential queerness. Anybody that had been around painters would never have thought twice about it, but I remember the first time I saw a man graining a door with beer—it was a chard door, too, by the way—I thought it was queer. I couldn't understand then, and I can't understand now, how people whose scruples will not allow them to eat mince pie that has brandy in it could ever reconcile it with their consciences to have grained woodwork about their houses, to say nothing of going into a church whose door had been treated to beer.

"Die," and in a world which had as little sympathy then as now for a young man trying to make his way in life. If that internal restlessness and those two pronged limbs could not be turned to account it was obviously all up with the newcomers.
