POLITICAL NOTES.

Neither of the Chambers sat on Friday. It should have been the turn of the Senate.

The Executive has signed and promulgated the Law for reconstruction of the Electoral Boards. This enacts that any vacancy occurring on the Electoral Boards shall be filled by a substitute of the same political party as the departing member; and when the list of elected substitutes is exhausted, the substitute shall be elected by the Committee of the corresponding party. This is given retroactive effect with regard to the existing Boards. (The special object of this arises from the fact that the nationalists have accidentally obtained a majority on the Electoral Board of Montevideo, which the "colorados" thus destroy by reconstituting the Board in the middle of the electoral period. The Chambers can not be congratulated on forming so very condemnable a legislative precedent. The remaining dispositions are of secondary interest. The chief object of the Law may be described as to stereotyped the composition of the electoral boards in favor of the dominant party, and it is an example of party legislation of the most pronounced description.

The Executive has also signed and promulgated the Law creating a stamp tax of \$1 on all reports issued by the Nat. Council of Hygiene.

There is no progress to report in the political situation, but rather the reverse. The reply of the "colorados" Executive Committee to the "Accords" Committee has been to the effect that it could not accede to the conference solicited (to discuss the "accords") as it did not feel qualified to emit any opinion upon the electoral accord, for various reasons, amongst them the fact that the party charter which grants faculties to the Committee is not yet sanctioned, and also because in the opinion of the Committee the nationalist Committee is not at present qualified to treat the matter. This is an unmistakable rebuff, though fortunately not a conclusive one. It would thus seem that both the Committees, the "colorados" and the "blancos," equally shy of the question, and each is waiting for the other to take the first move. The "Accords" Committee, however, is untiring in its efforts to bring them to the point, and is already engaged in fresh endeavors. One idea, we believe, is to bring the members of the two party Committees together to discuss the matter informally over tea and muffins in the *Siglo* parlour this afternoon. We shall see what comes of this.

Meanwhile, the *Nacion* has banished all further doubt as to the official attitude on the subject, by an article in yesterday's issue, strongly advocating the "accords," and appealing to the patriotism of all good citizens to forward its celebration. "Let others," it says, "gather the easy but ephemeral laurels earned by fomenting popular passions and by irritating partisan feelings; but let the sound and intelligent elements work for the great interests of the country, even if by so doing they have to undergo some sacrifice, which should be amply repaid by the satisfaction of duty fulfilled for the welfare of the country. We confide in the triumph of the good cause; and we firmly believe that, in spite of all difficulties, the desires of the country will be satisfied, and the 'accords' will be carried out on bases of reciprocal convenience for the par-

ties, and as a proof that, above all other considerations, all are dominated by the noble purpose of laboring for the happiness of the Republic."

This is excellent in its way, but at the same time it would be well for the *Nacion* not to press the point too eagerly, for it has to be remembered that dearly bought experience in the recent past has created an intense jealousy of anything resembling official interference or pressure in partisan and above all in electoral questions. The very fact that the President and the official circle were working in favor of the accord, would be quite sufficient to create resistance in certain quarters. It must also be remembered that whilst his official journal is thus predicating the "accords," some of the recent acts of President Caesars and especially the unhappy appointment of Gen. Muniz, have only created difficulties in the way of its celebration.

Yesterday's *Siglo* clamors for the sanction of two important Bills, that creating the High Court of Justice, and that of Municipal Autonomy, both of which are delayed, in common with several other measures of public interest, before the Senate. The complaint is a familiar one.

Insurance Interests.

The following remarks, which are not without their application in this country, are quoted from an article on "Insurance Legislation" in the *Review of the River Plate*:

"The enormous benefits conferred upon the commerce of Argentina by foreign fire insurance companies is well exemplified by a recent fire which involves the indemnization of loss to the extent of some £200,000 stg. or over two millions of dollars currency. Had this loss been incurred by Companies formed of local capital, will anybody deny the fact that the total capital of the country would have been depleted to the above extent? whereas, due to the fact that the loss falls upon foreign insurance Companies, local capital recoups itself completely, and local commerce is damaged only to the extent to which the insured parties may have left themselves under-insured. It needs considerable ignorance, or self-interest, to blind our legislators to the fact that, for the above reason alone, it is clearly to the advantage of this country that the insurance of its commerce should be left to capital from abroad, which will always keep local capital intact, while local capital is not by any means too abundant to be applied to the development of the resources of the country in all its varied forms. In its blind hostility to foreigners and their capital, our legislative bodies deem that every effort should be made to discourage foreign insurance Companies, while the Argentine press diligently misrepresents them to the public as greedy despoilers of the country's wealth. So accustomed are we becoming to this sort of treatment, that we should not be surprised if the ease and promptitude with which the foreign insurance Companies will replace the two millions of dollars lost in the Drysdale fire were made a pretext for increasing the taxation imposed upon them, based upon the argument already used by more than one Argentine legislator that insurance taxation should be fixed in accordance with the 'contributive ability' of the Companies, an argument from which the conclusion would be drawn, that worthless companies should not be taxed at all."

THE RECENT ENGLISH CENSUS.

London and the Great Towns.

London, May 2.

We have received from the Census Office a statement showing that the results of the recent Census have so far been received as to admit of the issue of figures which we now append. They deal with the population of London and the county boroughs of England. It is, however, explained that at present these figures are unrevised, being based on summary returns furnished by Registrars and their Superintendents, and are subject to modification as the detailed returns are examined.

The shipping population, returns for which in the case of the mercantile marine were obtained by the Customs officials, and in the case of the Royal Navy by the Admiralty, is included.

In all cases the figures given for 1891 for purposes of comparison are corrected so as to apply to the boundaries as they now exist, and not as they stood in that year.

The figures given for the Metropolitan Borough, which only came into existence in March last, show the population enumerated in 1891 within the present boundaries of these boroughs.

Aerial Machines: Two New Ventures.

The War Office has expressed its readiness to buy an aerial machine which has been invented by Dr. Francis Alexander Barton, of Beckenham, provided it fulfils certain conditions. These conditions Dr. Barton is confident he will be able to satisfy. He has informed a Press representative that the machinery and platform, suspended by a cigar-shaped aerostat, was capable of being steered in any direction. A horizontal aeroplane enables the machine to either ascend or descend, or travel straight at any altitude. A vertical aeroplane provides for steering to the right and left. Two half-filled water tanks are arranged at each end of the car, and when one end of the machine becomes heavier than the other the water is automatically pumped from one tank to the other. The aerostat is divided into gas-tight compartments, and if used for war purposes each compartment would contain a second bal-

loon. By the end of the summer Dr. Barton hopes to float an aerostat capable of carrying three men at the rate of twelve to thirteen miles an hour.

How many ingenious minds have been directed to the construction of flying machines on the principle of the bird or the bat, and their great hopes dashed by the bird failing to fly when put to practical test? Señor Vergara, a young Spaniard, has designed a machine in which he hopes to prove he has overcome all difficulties. It is now ready, states the *Express*, for experimental flight from the shipbuilding yard of Messrs. Denny Brothers, near Glasgow. It has no balloon; it is a flying machine pure and simple, and is to be propelled by manual power. If this invention succeeds it will indeed be a wonder!

Mr. Sutter, a Swiss engineer, tried his balloon, somewhat on the lines of that of Count Zeppelin, at Geneva on Wednesday last. The *Mail* states that on rising fifty yards it became unmanageable and fell, the inventor nearly losing his life.

THE WAR.

Lord Kitchener reports that on Wednesday Gen. Delarey, with numerous forces, attacked Gen. Dixon's column, in the neighbourhood of Vlafontein. The combat lasted for several hours, during which the enemy made several efforts to dislodge our troops from their positions, but without success, being repulsed, though at the cost of serious losses on our part, having to lament the death of Capt. Armstrong and Lieuts. Noko, Campion (or Champion) and Macdonald. Altogether Dixon's column lost 174 officers and men killed or wounded. The visible losses of the Boers were 35 killed, but they carried away with them a considerable number of wounded. Gen. Dixon reports that his troops behaved heroically, as the Boers outnumbered them three times. Another message gives the name of the place as Wafontein, adds the name of Gen. Arles to that of Dixon, and raises the British losses to 200, including some officers of high rank.

From Standerton it is stated that Gen. Botha is expected there shortly. The Dutch Consul in Pretoria has gone to meet him.

Lord Kitchener has sent an earnest call to the Australian contingents which were at Queenstown and about to embark for Australia, ordering them to move against Kruitzinger's forces.

The *Express* states that 900 Boers have embarked at Hamburg for Blumenau (German colony) in the Brazilian State of Santa Catalina.

An afternoon telegram says that all the London papers publish items and articles showing that the war is by no means at the end pretended by Mr. Chamberlain. The *Times* devotes three columns to lists of losses in recent engagements, the news of most of which has been suppressed by Lord Kitchener. This policy of concealment, which keeps the public ignorant of the real situation, is daily provoking stronger resentment. In the *Daily News*, the well-known and influential positivist philosopher and preacher Mr. Frederick Harrison publishes a violent attack on Mr. Chamberlain, Lord Milner and Lord Kitchener, saying that Gt. Britain has shown her incapacity to reduce the Boer to submission, and that the undue prolongation of the war is ruining and humiliating England and bringing her into hatred and contempt before the world. The repeated declarations of Mr. Chamberlain, that the war is at an end, invented for partisan purposes, are false and ridiculous, and are transforming the English into a race of humbugs. The *St. James's Gazette* and the *Daily Mail* also attack the Government severely, the latter saying that the British generals in the campaign are showing absolute ineptitude. The *Morning Post* says that the recent battle (Vlafontein) proves that the Boers by no means show the incapacity attributed to them officially. Mr. Blowitz, the fam-

ous Paris correspondent of the *Times*, urges the Government to declare whether the Boer victories announced by continental pro-Boer papers are true or not.

—BOER.—A curious case has just been tried before the Correctional Court in Brussels. A man was summoned for having insulted a police official by calling him a Boer. The Court decided that, so far from the epithet Boer being an insult, it should be regarded as an honor.

—PLAQUE.—Alarm has been caused by the appearance of a suspected case of bubonic plague in the London N. W. suburb of Willesden. The case is not yet authenticated.

—U. S. WAR VESSEL.—The U. S. transport "Dixie," which brings a contingent for partial relief of the crew of the "Chicago," entered this port yesterday morning

KING EDWARD AS A SPORTSMAN.

SELECTION FROM THE «ROYAL MAGAZINE»

It was from Charles Davis, who for forty-four years filled the position of huntsman to Her late Majesty's buckhounds, that King Edward learned the art of horsemanship, and though never especially identified with the hunting field, he has been from earliest childhood a plucky and fearless rider. When an undergraduate at Christ Church he constantly hunted with various neighbouring packs: the South Oxfordshire, the Pychley, the Quorn, and the Vale of Aylesbury. On one occasion, at least, he had a notable run with the Royal Hounds, the deer taking the field from Harrow to Paddington, where it was finally killed, and whence the King rode in hunting costume to Marlborough House. The Duke of York is the best shot of the Royal Family, but the King, his father, runs him close. Precise, steady, and cool-headed, rather than rapid, brilliant, and alert, the King can handle a gun with the best. His tour in India gave him a magnificent opportunity to prove his prowess in this direction. At a tiger hunt in Nepal, given in his honour by Sir Jung Bahadur, he brought down no fewer than six tigers—a record bag. At the same time he threw himself into other Eastern sports—cheetah-hunting and pig-sticking—with zest and enthusiasm, and distinguished himself on every occasion by his skill and courage.

It has often been said of His Majesty, when still Prince of Wales, that he would become that *rara avis*, a democratic King—a King who stands little upon his dignity and treats all men with easy-going familiarity. Now I think that King Edward has proved by this time that he means to be nothing of the kind, that he means to be as exclusively regal as his august mother. But no one can deny that in the days when he was still Prince of Wales, his hearty and unaffected manners often led his friends to forget his rank and *prestige*. And it was particularly towards men of his own kind—thorough-paced sportsmen—that the Prince used to madden; they were fellow sportsmen, and sport is a great leveller.

I remember hearing of a little incident in connection with this trait in the King's character, which occurred when he was visiting Ceylon. After a day's sport in company with a party of officers, Government officials, and planters, the King and his fellow huntsmen sat down to dinner in the open. Sport had been excellent, every one was in the best of tempers, and soon the fun became fast and furious. Now among the company was a certain Mr. L., a planter known among his friends as «Bees» for some reason I have never been able to discover. This gentleman had one peculiar failing—he prided himself on the quality of his singing, while in reality he could scarcely put two notes together, and had the voice of a crow. It was a standing joke among his friends to make him sing on all possible occasions, and to feign great admiration of his vocal powers. So after dinner they urged him to give the Prince a song. Evidently «Bees» suspected that they were «getting» at him, for he turned rusty, and refused point blank to open his mouth. At last the Prince clapped him on the back. «Come, Mr. «Bees»,» he said, «why don't you sing?» «Oh!» retorted the planter, turning wrathfully on his future king, «you go to blazes!» A dead silence fell on the company;
