CUSTOMS RECEIPTS.

The following were the Customs House receipts for the month of June, 1901.—
Importation \$ 505,286.71
Exportation 73,123.84
Departments, estimate 58,000.00
Total \$ 636,410.55

This compares with the same month in preceding years as follows:—1900—\$678,161; 1899—\$638,490; 1898—\$655,762; 1897—\$623,804; 1896—\$669,899; 1895—\$666,615; 1894—\$786,984.
The receipts are thus the lowest of those for any month of June except in 1897, when civil war was on foot; but at the same time the difference is not serious except as regards 1894. The month is always a poor one for the Customs House, and the receipts show no great variation, the average for the seven years above cited, including 1897, being about \$660,000.

The financial year of the Republic having ended on June 30, we give below a comparative statement of the Customs Revenue for the two periods 1899-1900 and 1900-1901. (We quote the figures from the *Razon*, but cannot say whether they are corrected or not, as they differ slightly from some we have previously published.)

In the financial year just expired, then, there has been a decrease in the Customs Revenue as compared with 1899-1900 of \$853,215, or say about 8.33 %, and a decrease of \$477,472 as compared with 1898-99, when the Customs Revenue was \$9,736,009.

At an early opportunity we will make some editorial comments on these figures.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Senators sat on Wednesday. A Message was received from the Executive, and referred to the Committee of Legislation, soliciting authority to adhere to the International Telegraphic Convention of St. Petersburg. After a short discussion on some pension questions, not of general interest, the Chamber adjourned.

There is still nothing new in the political situation. The impression gains ground that the recent trouble in the nationalist party will soon receive a favorable solution, and there is little doubt that the influential bulk of the party, despite the outcry of party organs which mainly represent extreme views, is favorable towards the «accord» or, at all events, not radically opposed to it. The violent opposition of certain sections of the «colorado» party also seems to be simmering down, or exhausting itself.

According to the *Razon* a new Committee of propaganda in favor of the «accord», selected from all shades of political opinion, is to be formed, under the auspices of the existing «Accord» Committee. Local meetings and manifestations in favor of the «accord» are being organized in Paysandú and other towns of the interior. The hopeful feeling prevalent continues to be reflected on the Stock Exchange, where values are remarkably firm and the Consolidated Debt quoted higher than it has been any time since last April.

Progress in minor details continues to be reported with the preparations for commencing the Port Works. The foundation stone will be laid, on the 18th, on the «polygon» or vacant ground behind the barracks of the 4th Chasseurs, where there will be ample room for a large gathering. The President of the Republic will officiate, and stands will be erected for official parties. This ground is adjacent to the British Hospital, from the roof of which an excellent view will be obtained.

From the *Nacion* we learn that a petition, signed by numerous estancieros of the Department of San José, is being presented to the President of the Republic, asking him to exercise his right of veto in case the objectionable Bill of compulsory cattle-brands is approved by the Chambers.

CHAMBERS OF COMMERCE.

A COMPLEMENTARY BANQUET TO THE LEADING MEMBERS OF THE NEW YORK CHAMBER.

Lord Brassey presided on June 5 at a complimentary banquet, which was given by the London Chamber of Commerce to the members of the New York Chamber, in the hall of the Grocers' Company. Among those present were the Marquess of Lansdowne, Lord Rothschild, Mr. Andrew Carnegie, Lord Alverstone, the Hon. Cornelius Bliss (ex-Secretary of the Interior of the United States), Mr. Pierpont Morgan, Mr. Morris K. Jesup (President of the New York Chamber), Mr. J. H. Choate (United States Ambassador), Lord Strathcona, Lord Avebury, Lord Hillingdon, Lord Sandhurst, Mr. W. Butler Duncan (New York Chamber), Sir Hiram Maxim, Hon. Charles A. Schierer (New York Chamber), Mr. James Bryce, M.P., Mr. Clement Agnew (New York Chamber), Mr. A. Barton Hepburn (New York Chamber), Mr. Henry White (United States Embassy), Mr. J. T. Terry (Vice-President of the New York Chamber), Mr. C. Lanier (New York Chamber), Mr. A. Foster Higgins (New York Chamber), Mr. Vernon H. Brown (New York Chamber), and many others.

After dinner the Chairman gave the toast of «The King», which was enthusiastically received.

Lord Lansdowne, in proposing «The President of the United States», said he took leave to imagine that he had been entrusted with the toast because he was the holder of the position of Secretary of State, and because it might be that that toast, coming from his lips, would seem to denote something more than a mere private expression of admiration and good will. And yet to him, as to all the subjects of His Majesty, it required an effort to think of their relations with the United States of America as foreign relations. (Hear, hear.) They thought of the many ties that bound the two great nations together, and those who, like himself, were the servants of the public felt that they held an unwritten commission that so far as they were concerned no pains should be spared to maintain the most friendly and intimate relations between those two great communities; and they felt that if it should happen at any moment that some passing breeze should ruffle the surface of the waters upon which they were sailing together, they had only to go deeper in order to find the strong and immutable tie of affection and respect which, as ever, stretched from shore to shore of those two great nations.

He hoped they would not take it amiss if he said he felt that the representative of the Foreign Office was not altogether out of place at such a gathering; for he did not think it was an exaggeration to say that with every year that passed the connection between the Foreign Office of the world and the various Chambers of Commerce became closer and closer. The time was left far behind when international policy was dependent upon the ambition of rulers or the antipathies of the people whom they governed. In those days their external policy was influenced by ambitious perhaps not less far-reaching, perhaps not less exacting—by the ambitions of great industrial organizations, which desired that their own Governments should obtain for them and retain for them the playgrounds and open spaces in which they might stretch their mighty limbs and be at ease. In conclusion, his Lordship expressed the deep regret of the company present at the anxiety caused to the President by the severe illness of his wife.

The Chairman next proposed «Our friends of the New York Chamber of Commerce» and Mr. Morris K. Jesup (President of the New York Chamber of Commerce), in reply, said they were proud of the fact that the commercial relations between their own country and Great Britain during the past year were represented by nearly \$1,000,000,000. He extended to the chairman and his associates a most cordial invitation to be with them a year hence and witness the opening of their new building (Lord Alverstone submitted the toast «Our kin beyond the sea» and Mr. Andrew Carnegie responded).

THE WAR.
We are still without any official news in the telegram; nor is there much of any other kind.
From Capetown it is stated that Latigann's commando has appeared some 27 miles north of Richmond.—Mr. Malin, editor of *Onstand*, who was condemned to two years' imprisonment for publishing an attack on Lord Kitchener, is seriously ill from the effects of ill-treatment in prison (thus says the message). He is not

allowed a bed, but has to sleep on a blanket on the floor, and his food consists of potatoes and sour bread. (All the journalists condemned under martial law in S. Africa are being treated as common criminals, and are not given the treatment of first-class misdemeanants which is customary in England.)

Royal Mail Steam Packet.
A special general meeting of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company was held on June 5, at the Cannon-street Hotel, under the presidency of Admiral A. J. Chatfield, C. B., to consider a further issue of debentures. In a circular issued to the proprietors in anticipation of the meeting, the directors stated that their report in April, 1892, showed clearly the circumstances which led to the proprietors being asked to sanction the first issue of £250,000 in debentures which are now running. For the information, however, of new proprietors, it is desirable to mention, in particular, that no call has been made upon the shares since 1842, when the company's mail service was commenced, and when £60 a share was called up, equal to £900,000 of the capital of £1,500,000, the fleet then consisting of 25,000 tons. The tonnage and cost of the mail steamers have grown from time to time, and cargo vessels have been added to the fleet, which now numbers 30 steamships of 90,000 tons, the first cost of which was £2,026,000. The provision of this large increase of property has, of course, absorbed on capital account all the reserves, and prevented cash funds being reaccumulated out of which to provide further tonnage. The proposal therefore, of the directors is to make a further issue of £250,000 debentures (ranking after the existing £250,000), so that, with the existing issue, the total amount of debentures shall not exceed at any one time the sum of £500,000, the fleet, together with the premises, plant, &c., being the security.

—The Chairman stated that the circular issued by the directors set forth the reason for the further issue of debentures, and he proposed a resolution authorising the directors to issue the debentures as suggested.—The Deputy-Chairman (Mr. Herbert Edlmann) formally seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously, and a vote of thanks to the chairman and directors closed the proceedings.

Marriage in Buenos Aires.
We quote from the *B. A. Standard*:—On Saturday last took place in Lomas the marriage of Mr. W. Wyatt Hayward to Miss Ethel Shawe. Long before the hour fixed for the religious ceremony Holy Trinity Church was completely full. At half past three, the bridegroom arrived, accompanied by his best man Mr. Fred Bradbury and his four groomsmen Messrs. Frank Shawe, Robert Kyle, Lionel Dadds and Andrew Gibson, all of whom are former pupils of Mr. Hayward. Shortly after, the bride, magnificently dressed and looking uncommonly handsome and distinguished, walked up the central aisle leaning on her father's arm and followed by her four bridesmaids; Misses Alice and Christine Benson, Mabel Cowes and Marie de Saint Joseph, all of whom, only a few weeks ago, were still her pupils. The Rev. Mr. Tichborne, who in such a short time has fully obtained the respect and affection of the whole district, united the happy couple in holy matrimony. From the Church, the guests went to the house of the bride's parents, where they were received by the newly married and their nearest relatives. Cakes and champagne were then served, during which time all had an opportunity of admiring the handsome and innumerable presents which had been given to Mr. and Mrs. Hayward. In the evening took place in the Barker Hall, the children's party. The Hall turned out to be small to contain all the children, for none were missing, and they all were in the highest glee, at finding themselves again with their cherished former Head-Master, which reminded them, as they said, of the good old times. During the course of the evening the children offered Mr. and Mrs. Hayward a beautiful standard lamp which bears the following inscription: «From the Children of the Barker Memorial School with affection and gratitude.» Mr. Hayward thanked them heartily in his and his wife's name for the more than handsome present, which, as he said, he values more for the moral significance implied by the inscription than for its intrinsic value. Endless and hearty cheers then began. The newly married couple left the hall at half past ten. We understand they intend to spend their honeymoon in Montevideo. Dancing and games of all sorts went on amidst indescribable enthusiasm till twelve o'clock when the most delightful and pleasant of fetes came to a close with «God Save the King».

THE QUEEN VICTORIA MEMORIAL FUND.
Letters to the Editor.

Dear Sir,
Your correspondent «Fairplay» in your issue of Wednesday, in common with others, incurs grave error if he supposes that an affair of the nature of this fund is subject to Commercial Law or Companies Act procedure. How can the Committee be involved in personal obligation when they have no *persona jurídica* as trustees, and have given no undertakings or even acknowledgements? The odd dissentient of «Fairplay» is all right in Joint Stock Law, but the present case can by no means be construed as anything of that nature. The fairest policy for the Committee to observe is to remain strictly neutral and act by the mandate of each subscriber. This they are morally bound to respect, as they have acted *ultra vires* in «deciding» what they were never authorized to deal with.

Dear Sir,
«Fairplay» is very much in error when he asserts that nothing short of absolute unanimity among the subscribers is necessary to decide on the employment of this Fund. It is a case in which neither majority nor minority can dictate to the rest, for no subscriber has control over the Fund beyond the amount of his own subscription. We must therefore be guided, as indicated in your article, by common sense and mutual good feeling. What will probably happen is as follows. If the movement in favor of giving the Fund to the Victoria Hall fails to obtain a majority, it will drop and matters remain as they are. But suppose it obtains approval of a majority, say 55% of the total number of subscribers. Of the remaining 45%, a large proportion will, doubtless, consent to defer to the wishes of the majority. This will leave a small residuum of subscribers—a very small one I should hope—perhaps 8 or 10%, who will still be radical objectors, and to these will be given the option of withdrawing their subscriptions. Thus every one will have been consulted and the responsibility of the Committee entirely cleared. The Committee can not insist on erecting a statue contrary to the wish of a large number of subscribers, nor can they do more than say to the subscribers, «the idea of a statue has been found unsatisfactory and another use of the Fund is now preferred; if you object to this, you may have your money back.» This would be justified by circumstances, and need not provoke any ill-feeling, though a few might be disappointed. Beyond this I do not see that any responsibility can be attached to the Committee, as authority to decide on the form of memorial rests solely with the subscribers.

Perhaps it would simplify matters if the Committee would make a frank statement as to how many of the subscribers have objected to a statue from the first and have expressed their preference for the memorial to take some other form.

—MAILS.—The P. S. N. Co's «Oropesa», bringing London dates to June 15, is expected tomorrow morning, and will sail the same day for the West Coast.

—HOSPITAL CONCERT.—The Concert which is being organised by Mr. G. E. Still for the benefit of the British Hospital has been fixed for Monday evening, the 22nd instant, and will be held in the fine concert saloon of the Lira Institute. We understand that Mr. Still has succeeded in arranging an exceptionally attractive programme, particulars of which will be published shortly. We are requested to state that those taking part in the Concert are requested to attend first rehearsal at the Lira Institute at 8.30 p. m. to-morrow (Saturday).

—DEATH.—The many friends of Captain Allibone of the United States Navy will be sorry to hear of his death in the beginning of May in Manila. It appears that Captain Allibone, who was suffering from nervous prostration, contracted Cerebral fever, which ended in his death.

—AMERICA CUP.—In a trial race, on Tuesday, between the «Columbia» and the new yacht «Constitution», the former, which is the present cup-holder, won with ease. The same thing happened, it will be remembered, in the trial race between «Shamrock I» and «Shamrock II», showing that the new vessels are inferior to the old. It looks, therefore, as if the cup will lie between the two old vessels and not the new.

—GREAT HEAT WAVE.—Telegrams give terrible accounts of the great heat wave which is being felt in New York. For some days the temperature in the shade has been over 100° Fahrenheit in the daytime and very little below it at night, the atmosphere being that of a Turkish bath. Business and industry are practically suspended, and people who can afford it are flying in thousands to the watering places. On Wednesday most of the inhabitants spent the night in the open air, fanning the houses intolerable. Over 50,000 spent the night in the Central Park, which presented the aspect of an improvised camp. People and horses drop dead in the streets or at their places of work, and the Public Assistance is hardly able to must the constant demands upon it. Special Committees of prominent persons have been formed to give aid and encouragement to the people. On Wednesday the deaths from stroke numbered 63, and during the week 223 bodies of persons who dropped dead in the streets have been taken to the Morgue. The great heat is being felt in New York and New Jersey and the New England States as far south as Cape Hatteras and to the interior as far as Illinois. Numerous fatal cases of heat stroke are reported from Washington, Chicago and Philadelphia.—Telegrams also report great heat in Italy, Paris, and central and southern Europe generally, with many cases of heat-stroke in various parts. Rome is almost deserted.

—BUENOS AIRES.—Telegrams from Buenos Aires report serious agitation there over the unification scheme, which seems to be highly unpopular. There have been street riots, mainly promoted by the students, attacks on the offices of the official organs, and conflicts with the police in which several persons have been injured. In one of the riots, Dr. Pellegrini had his hat smashed in and narrowly escaped personal injury. A young man named Mulcahy has been wounded by a revolver shot from a policeman. Calle Florida is blockaded, and the President's house guarded by the military. A great popular manifestation against the scheme is being organized for Sunday, Dr. Mariano Domaria has resigned the presidency of the National Bank, to express his disapproval of the scheme.

A largely attended meeting was held at Exeter Hall yesterday to take farewell of Dr. J. G. Paton, who at the age of 78 is returning to resume his missionary work in the New Hebrides.

Speeches were delivered by Lord Lansdowne, Lord Brassey, Mr. Morris K. Jessup, and Mr. Carnegie, at the dinner at Grocers' Hall last night at which the London Chamber of Commerce entertained the representatives of the New York Chamber.

Maitre Labori was amongst the guests of the Hardwicke Society at their annual dinner last night. Amongst the speakers were the Lord Chancellor and the Attorney-General.

Mr. A. C. Bradley, of Balliol College, who recently succeeded Mr. W. J. Courthope as Professor of Poetry in the University of Oxford, delivered his inaugural lecture in the Sheldonian Theatre yesterday afternoon.

By an overwhelming majority the Northumberland miners have declared against the Eight Hours Bill. They have appointed a strong deputation to visit London and work against the third reading of the measure.

Manchester and Salford have just sent Mr. Balfour a monster petition in support of the Children's Bill. It contains over a hundred thousand signatures.

An extraordinary story of alleged fraud was told at the County of London Sessions, yesterday, in a case in which a prisoner, who had posed as "Lady Wilson," was charged with obtaining money by false pretences. Accused was put back for further inquiries.

Play in the Open Golf Championship commenced yesterday at Muirfield. Harry Vardon and Braid were in splendid form, and on the day's returns were leading with scores of 155 each. Taylor, with 162, was next, and Kinnell and White followed, with 164.

Volodyovski won the Derby yesterday in the record time of 2min. 40.4sec. William the Third was second and a German third.

All four cricket matches set down for yesterday were brought to a definite conclusion. Somerset could do little against the Surrey bowling, and were all dismissed for 114, the home side winning by 204 runs.

Warwickshire defeated Lancashire by an innings and 75 runs. Gloucestershire were beaten by Kent by 38 runs, while Leicestershire won their game with Worcestershire by 79 runs.

Light and Signal Stations in the Straits of Magellan.

The Maritime Governor has now received orders to establish a service for reporting vessels passing Dangerous Lighthouse and Cape Possession to Lloyd's Agent, by the officials of those lighthouses. At present the line is not in working condition, but orders have been given for repairs, and it is hoped that these will be finished soon.

Many of the vessels pass Dangerous, and even Cape Possession, during the night when signals could not be distinguished. It is, therefore, suggested that, for the present, vessels should only report themselves at Delgada Point, which they can only pass during the day, and where the telephone is nearly always in working order.

The machinery of the Delgada Point Light has broken down. A provisional light has been erected, but it will be advisable not to rely upon it. —The Secretary of Lloyd's, in reply to a suggestion made from Lloyd's, has now been notified by the Government of Chili that orders transmitted through Lloyd's can be communicated to vessels by Delgada Point as from Lloyd's Signal Stations. —B. A. Herald.
