NEWS OF THE DAY

Saints Abdon and Senen.—Prince Bismarck died, 1898.—211 days past 153 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The two Chambers sat in General Assembly for a few minutes on Saturday, for the opening of the extraordinary sessions, but proceedings were purely formal. Parliamentary business will be resumed this week.

Whilst applauding the elevated tone of the letter of the nationalist Committee quoted in our last, the *Siglo* and some others of our contemporaries express regret at the decision of the Committee to defer the convocation of the party Convention for discussion of the "accord." The *Siglo* points out that no moment could be more favorable than the present, while the impression caused by the inauguration of the Port Works is still felt. On the other hand, if there is delay some unfortunate incident may arise to disturb the present calm; and, moreover, the nearer the time comes to the elections the more difficult it will be to arrange the accord. The Committee is therefore urged to issue the Convocation as soon as possible. Apart from this detail, the letter, says the *Siglo*, is conceived in terms which leave no room for the least doubt as to the intentions of peace and concord animating the nationalist Committee.

It is announced that the Minister of Finance is preparing a Bill dealing with the Insurance Companies doing business in this Republic. The double object of his Bill is said to be to protect insurers against irregularities or abuses on the part of the Companies, and to protect genuine and solid Insurance Companies against the competition of unscrupulous and doubtful rivals. The representatives of the existing Companies, it is said, will shortly be convoked to a conference with the Minister, so that ideas may be exchanged on the matter. Without further knowledge than the above, we expect this probably means the introduction of the oft threatened Bill requiring Insurance Companies to invest in the country, as a guarantee. We do not think there will be any resistance to this on the part of the better class Companies, provided the Bill goes no farther and does not interfere with the liberty of contract between insured and Company. Insurance business, whether life, fire or maritime, assumes such an important place in present commercial and daily life, that the Government should be cautious in interfering with it. After all, the antecedents and good name of a well-established Company doing business in all parts of the world, afford a guarantee to which no measures on the part of the Uruguayan Government can add, and the latter may only end, as it has done in other matters, in creating impediments and vexatious obstructions to the transaction of business. Despite the occasional silly outcry of some of our native contemporaries—such as the *Tribuna* a few days ago—against foreign Companies, we do not know that there is a single case on record of such a Company failing to meet, and promptly meet, any legitimate claim, though in self-protection they may dispute dishonest and fraudulent claims. The black sheep in this respect have been the native, not the foreign, Companies. In fact, knowing what frequently occurs here, especially as regards fires, we would be inclined to say that it is the Companies themselves, far more than the insured, that require protection. As to the favorite assertion of papers like

the *Tribuna* that the foreign Companies take money out of the country without giving any benefit in return, it is too absurd to be worth serious consideration. However, we wait to see what the Minister's Bill will be like.

For purely private reasons Sr. Lauro V. Rodriguez has resigned his post as Prefect of San José, which he has held for some two or three years. The resignation is much regretted, as he has proved an exemplary and popular functionary, which is rather the exception than the rule with Departmental Prefects.

The Minister of War has succeeded in provoking a general chorus of censure. Serious and explicit denunciations have been made of abuses and cruelties committed in the Arsenal, but the investigation ordered by the Minister, it is pointed out, is entirely farcical and unsatisfactory, being conducted by a subordinate officer, and with the examination of witnesses in the very presence of their superiors against whom their charges are made. This is the last way to reach the truth. The Minister's circular, mentioned in our last, is also condemned, it being recognised that the press affords the only refuge and protection for soldiers ill-treated by their superiors, and to deprive them of this resource is merely a confirmation of cruelty. All this, however, is the old story here, where the military tendency has always been to hush up scandals and abuses rather than to enquire into, reform and punish them. We did, however, look for something better under the government of Sr. Cuestas, and would be sorry to see things fall back into the old, bad groove.

Lime and Sulphur Dip Condemned.

The "Liga Agraria," in Argentina, is stated, by the "Buenos Aires Standard," to have sent a note to the Minister of Agriculture informing him that in view of the attacks made on sulphur and lime as a cure for scab, it was determined to make a practical investigation into the merits of the question. Mr. Pratt's services as a manufacturing expert were requisitioned and different parcels of wool were given him to be made into cloth, some of them having been dipped in the lime and sulphur solution, while others had been treated with various different anti-scab preparations. The cloths were duly woven, and Mr. Pratt's report was that the lime and sulphur preparation diminished the resisting power of the wool 25 per cent, or even more, and caused the colours with which it was dyed to take a deeper hue. The note concludes by urging the Minister to prevent the use of sulphur and lime as far as possible on account of the injury it is likely to do to the wool trade of the country. The "Liga Agraria" at a meeting resolved to acquaint the provincial Governors of the results of the experiments, and passed a vote of thanks to Messrs. Luzzo and Sons and to Mr. Pratt for their valuable co-operation. The test made by Mr. Pratt would seem to have been a crucial one; as a matter of fact the result tallies with the statements of the Bradford manufacturers, and conclusively confirms the data put forward some time since by our able Bradford correspondent, Mr. S. B. Hollings.—*South American Journal.*

"The Conspicuous Service Cross."

A NEW ORDER OF DISTINCTION.
It is stated in the *Gazette* of June 23 that at a recent Council of His Majesty a memorial was presented from the Lords of the Admiralty in these terms:

"Whereas we are of opinion that there should exist some means of recognizing Distinguished Service before the Enemy on the part of Warrant Officers or Subordinate Officers of Your Majesty's Fleet, who by reason of not holding a Commission in the Royal Navy, are not eligible for appointment to any existing Order or Decoration.

"We beg leave to recommend that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to institute a Decoration, to be designated the Conspicuous Service Cross, and to consist of a Silver Cross, with the reverse side plain, but having on the obverse side in the centre Your Majesty's Imperial and Royal Cypher, E. R. L., surmounted by the Imperial Crown.

"We would beg leave to recommend to Your Majesty that this Decoration be awarded for meritorious or distinguished services before the Enemy performed by Warrant Officers or Acting Warrant Officers, or by subordinate Officers of Your Majesty's Fleet; and that no person shall be nominated thereto unless his services shall have been marked by the special mention of his name in dispatches by the Admiral or Senior Naval or Military Officer Commanding the Squadron or detached Force.

"The award of this Decoration to carry with it the right to have the letters C. S. C. appended to the Officer's name.

"We would submit further that the names of those upon whom Your Majesty may be pleased to confer this Decoration shall be published in the London Gazette, and a registry thereof kept in the Office of the

Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

His Majesty, having taken this memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed, and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions hereinafter accordingly."

MR. ANDREW LANG ON HERCULES.

LONGMAN'S MAGAZINE.
When your heroine is a married woman, her husband never really has a fair show. He is always a brute. This cannot be the case in actual life, if looked at without prejudice. Nobody will have the courage to marry a pretty lady if he is to become, *ex officio*, a brute: "Mrs. Rawdon Crawley's husband." He was not a brute when he came wooing, or why did the heroine marry him? He was good-looking, brave, clever, and just as religious as my Isabella likes. But when he has passed the altar, and entered on the run home, along, and dusty, and straight to the grave (said Mr. Stevenson cheerfully) then his character becomes too horrid. Then another appears, a sympathetic one. Now the charm of Celia (to whom I return fondly) is that the idea of philandering with a married man never even occurred to her mind, any more than the notion of shop lifting. Mrs. Sidgwick says a word or two about the elegant doctrine of Passion being an excuse for everything. How many passions? How often? Is the passion of hatred an excuse for dinking the object of your aversion? Is a passion for alcohol an excuse for stealing whisky? Is a passion for angling an excuse for getting over your neighbour's fence and catching your neighbour's trout? Why is it a felony for a monstache, or a grey eye or so, or even for a sympathetic person who likes the same poetry as you prefer, and is a saintly character, to be an excuse for the practices of our married heroines? Poaching is poaching, even when performed for the purest and most soulful motives, which unluckily, lead to those rather vulgar and distressing reports in the newspapers. Shakespeare's married heroines are not all immaculate. But Lady Macbeth was quite loyal to Mac; so was Desdemona to her Moor (a brute, if you like); and generally I do not remember that Shakespeare ever invites our sympathies for our modern kind of married heroines. In a novel Desdemona would have been fond of Iago; Lady Macbeth of Macduff or Banquo; Imogen of What's-his-name, and so forth. Eschylus did not approve of Clytemnestra; Homer had a low opinion of Agamemnon; and as for Helen of Troy, that was fate, and she could not help it, and was very sorry afterwards. We hear plenty about the delightfully free and easy ideas of the Greeks, from critics not familiar with their literature. But Penelope was Homer's idea of what one unceasing unwedded maid, was his idea of a heroine. She was just like Celia—excuse my intonation! All this is "simply not modern," as the Englishwoman who wrote the Love-letters says with an air of some superiority.

Lord Kitchener reports that Lieutenant Col. Steinhacker's cavalry forces, which occupied Bremersdorf, have been dislodged by a large commando. They had a difficult retreat over very broken ground, during which the men showed great discipline and courage. For over fifteen miles they were continually harassed by the enemy, until they reached Lemb. During the retreat they lost ten killed, a greater number wounded, and several missing.

No official confirmation has yet appeared of the alleged relief of Lord Kitchener, and the War Office remains silent on the point.

Telegrams received in London from Amsterdam and La Hague deny a rumor that Holland proposed to intervene officially in favor of peace.

From Johannesburg it is stated that the Boer Commandant Spruit (?) has been killed in an encounter near Heidelberg.

With regard to the charges of Boer cruelty at Vlakfontein, concerning which there have been such contradictory reports, Lord Kitchener reports that a lieutenant and six men testify to having seen one of the Boers shooting the wounded after the battle. The *Times* of yesterday publishes a message from Wolweindam giving the explanation that a Boer who went mad in the fury of the battle fired on the British wounded, but was immediately killed himself. The Boers protest against the general accusation which has been levelled against them on account of this isolated incident.

The Brussels correspondent of the *Morning Post* reports that, last week, a Council was held in Mr. Kruger's house, under presidency of Mr. Wessels, and attended by the majority of the Boers of importance at present in Europe, at which it was unanimously resolved to continue hostilities in S. Africa.

There is a rumor in London that the U.S. Ambassador Mr. Choate has left for Holland, having been summoned by Mr. Kruger with the object of obtaining the intervention of the United States Government in the war.

Dr. Hogen, of the Norwegian Red Cross, who has been visiting the reconcentrated camps in S. Africa, has published a letter in the *Times* saying that there is no foundation at all for the tales of ill treatment by the British of the Boers confined there.

The arrival of Gen. Baden Powell in London is fully confirmed. He has visited the War Office and Earl Roberts, but has resolutely refused to be banquetted by his admirers. He will spend his leave, which lasts until October, in quiet retirement as the guest of Prof. Girdlestone, at the College Charter House, Gualding. He praises the firmness of the Boer character, and thinks that racial hatred will soon be overcome. He is also of the opinion that the war is in its last stages and peace will be signed before very long.

Disturbances are reported among the Boer prisoners at St. Helena, owing to their having become divided into two bands, which the telegram describes as boerophile and anglophobe (much the same thing, we should think). Feeling runs so high that the two bands have had to be separated. The real Boers are mostly pacific, and it is the Europeans, French, Belgians and Dutch, who mostly cause the trouble. Gen. Conje keeps himself aloof from all contention, and leads a very quiet, retired life.

The latest tale started in London, said to be based on private letters from the Cape, is to the effect that the British authorities in the Cape have compelled the Boer prisoners in their power to be present at the executions which have taken place of colonists and others condemned to death for high treason, by way of warning and example. Questioned in Parliament, the Government has said that it has made enquiries which have not yet been answered.

Races.

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Boer and Turk.
The foreign military attachés who were for some months with the British field force in South Africa have, in reports, books, pamphlets, and newspaper articles, expressed various opinions concerning the war. We are now to have the benefit of the views of Field Marshal von der Goltz, who has made a close study of the campaign, and is placing his impressions on record. The pasha is a soldier of eminence. He is the man who reorganised the Turkish army. His essays are to be translated into English, and they will doubtless be given respectful attention in view of the reputation of the writer. The general emphatically disagrees with the foreign critics who think that the war has strengthened the arguments in support of the conversion of the standing armies of Europe into militia. The assumption is, he says, entirely erroneous, as there is no possible comparison between the conditions of warfare in South Africa and in Europe. He thinks, indeed, that the Caucasian armies have learnt but little from the war. It is natural that the pasha should find praise for the mobility of the Boers; for he claims that they have imitated the reforms which he has himself instituted in the Turkish Army in the past ten years. The soldiers of Turkey and of the Transvaal have several characteristics in common, notably simplicity, solidity, and thoroughness, combined with strong religious feeling.—*United Service Gazette.*

CORONATION.—It is not without good reason, says a London exchange, that the King has appointed his Coronation Commission a year before-hand. Considerable confusion has existed at past celebrations of the rite. At the «sacring» of George III, the King himself complained to Lord Effingham that few precedents seemed to have been kept for the proceedings. Lord Effingham replied that the Earl Marshal's office had been strangely neglected, but that he had taken such care for the future that the «next coronation» would be regulated in the most perfect order. The King was so much amused at this speech that he made the Earl repeat it several times.

SHIPPING RING.—The *Critic* says:—Much indignation is at present being expressed by manufacturers and merchants in Manchester at the latest development in the South American section of the Shipping Ring. It is the old grievance of the South African traders, with this difference that, in addition to the loss of rebates, a merchant or manufacturer who may ship by steamers outside the Ring will now be made to pay an additional charge of £1 per ton for any future shipments by Ring steamers. This is the way the British merchant and manufacturer are compelled to pay from 10 to 50 per cent. more for the ocean carriage of their goods than their Continental and American competitors, and it is a fruitful cause of our being beaten in many departments of foreign trade. But if the merchants will only wake up and «act», they can speedily put a stop to the extortions of the «Shipping Ring». If the traders were organised on the same lines as the shipowners, the latter would very soon drop their methods of intimidation, and we should not have to wait long for that free market in ocean freight, which is an absolute necessity, if we intend to maintain our hold upon the foreign markets.

LONDON NOTES.

SATURDAY, JUNE 29.

With the customary State ceremonial, the King's Coronation proclamation was publicly read yesterday at St. James's Palace, Temple Bar, and the Royal Exchange. Large crowds assembled to witness the quaint observance in the City.

Army Reform was again discussed in the House of Lords yesterday. The Duke of Bedford's motion condemning the Government scheme was not, however, pressed to a division.

In the House of Commons, Mr. Bal-four was pressed to make a statement as to the death of the Education Bill. The Single Clause Bill dealing with the Cockertonised Schools would, he said, be introduced by Sir John Gurney on Monday. Committee of Supply being resumed, the Irish Estimates were proceeded with.

A new order of distinction, the «Conspicuous Service Cross», has been instituted by the King. It is to be awarded to warrant officers and the subordinate officers of the Navy.

Sir Robert Sexton, the well-known leader of the Conservative party in Dublin, died on Thursday night.

The preliminary report of the census for Scotland and its islands was issued last evening at the House of Commons. This shows the population to be 4,472,000, an increase of 446,853.

At the Central Criminal Court yesterday, ten defendants were indicted for manslaughter, arising out of a boxing contest at the National Sporting Club. The jury returned a verdict of «Not guilty».
