POLITICAL NOTES.

The Senators sat on Monday. Drs. Campisteguy and Espalter presented a Bill modifying the electoral law to the effect that disputes concerning Board elections should be referred to the Courts (instead of the Chambers, as at present). Referred to the Legislative Committee.—Sr. C. Travieso presented declaring Constitutional Reform to be of general interest. This was approved and now passes to the other Chamber, previous to reference to the General Assembly.—The Bill for prolongation of the Central Uruguay Eastern Extension Rail way was approved in first reading, without remark.—Full approval was given to the Bill authorizing the Executive to employ \$50,000 in relief of agricultural distress. The Chamber then adjourned.

It is announced that early in April a Decree will be issued ordaining redemption in cash of a second batch of 6 cjo Bonds, in the form already practiced. According to a contemporary the amount already redeemed is close upon three million dollars.

On Monday afternoon there took place the election of the definite Executive Committee of the "colorado" party, the result being as follows:—

The Exhibition Committee is more or less non-plussed respecting a site for the Exhibition, and has decided to refer the question once more to the Government, with the object of ascertaining if it may dispose of funds for the purchase of a site. One of the difficulties is created by the clause in the Act which ordains that the Exhibition buildings must be of a permanent character, thus preventing their erection on private land.

Hands Across the Sea.
Baron D'Estournelles Explains his New Scheme.

London, Feb. 25.

On Saturday I was given an opportunity to converse with Baron d'Estournelles de Constant on one of the subjects he has most at heart. Our conversation referred to the various practical methods which might be adopted for the furtherance of the "Entente Cordiale" movement, not merely between the Parliaments and Municipalities, but above all, between the masses themselves, in both France and England.

"I have been thinking over the question for a long time," said the Baron, "until I came to the conclusion that it must be given a broader and more comprehensive character. I should like to see the Entente Cordiale not merely

ly between two countries, but between all the civilized countries of the world.

"A very ambitious scheme," I suggested.

"Ambitious, but not Utopian by any means," replied the eminent French Senator. "As a matter of fact, I have already approached a number of well-known men on the subject, and have met with such sympathy and been offered such zealous and disinterested co-operation that I have at once started developing the movement on purely practical lines."

Baron d'Estournelles then informed me that a managing committee had already been appointed, and the list of honorary presidents and members included M.M. Berthelot and Leon Bourgeois for France; Lord Avebury, Lord Brassey, Lord Currie, and Sir Thomas Barclay for Great Britain; Mr. Andrew Carnegie for the United States; Professors Haackel and Zora for Germany; and Count Nigra and Dr. Lombroso for Italy.

"The main object of the 'Conciliation Internationale,' to give it its proper appellation," continued the Baron, "is to give an impetus to the internal forces of a country through its good relations with other countries."

"We propose to pursue the method of educating public opinion in every country, with the assistance of teachers in public, secondary, and popular schools. Many of these teachers were among the first to offer co-operation. We shall facilitate relations between all foreigners, encourage international visits and the study of foreign languages. We also propose to organize a practical method for the regular exchange of school children, of all classes, between France, England, Germany, and other countries."

"I am, of course, well aware that there will be difficulties in the way; but these are far from being insuperable. In the case of the exchange of school-children, for instance, great care should be exercised in the selection. It will be necessary to see that the children are physically and morally sound, in order to avoid any possible contamination."

"The International Conciliation Association also intends establishing in Paris, at least, to begin with, an 'International House,' to be known as the 'Maison des Etrangers,' where lectures and congresses will be given, and library and reading-room placed at the disposal of the members. The 'Maison des Etrangers' is to be, indeed, a model international rendezvous."

An M.P. on the "Good Thing" of Parliament.

There is a widespread belief among constituents that in some way or other they do not quite know how—a Member "makes a good thing" out of being in the House. The member himself soon realizes that the "good thing" consists of giving his time and money without stint, and that, beyond the honour of being a Member of Parliament—one of the highest honours to which a citizen can aspire—and beyond having the lofty privilege of helping to mould laws for what he believes to be the welfare of the people, it is, for him, a case of all "gives and no receives." Of course, he is almost the only Parliamentarian in the world who receives no payment from the State. Opinions differ as to whether we or other nations are wiser in this respect, and there is much to be said on both sides. But there can be no difference of opinion upon another point: a Member has actually to pay for the pollings, in which the electors vote, for the clerks who superintend the voting, for the counters who enumerate the votes, and even for the very posters in which the returning officer publicly announces his election. This is a preposterous tax upon him. If there is one thing the State ought to pay, it is surely the cost of registering and counting the votes which send the people's representatives to Parliament. At present every penny of this has to be paid in advance by the candidates when they are nominated. The votes which elect a Member cost him about 3s. apiece. In other countries a Member gets a travelling allowance; in this country, nothing. In other countries he can post letters from the legislative building to his constituents, on political business, free of charge; in this country he has to buy stamps for every letter. A British M.P. gets absolutely nothing except from writing paper and envelopes at the House of Commons.—Mr. Henry Norman, M.P., in *The World's Work* for March.

St. Petersburg, March 25th.—The Council of the Empire has approved by 45 votes against 15, the project of granting to the rural proprietors who suffered damage during the recent disturbances, the loan of ten millions of roubles which they have to pay back within forty years. The proprietors are not to be asked to pay interest until the year 1910. The distribution of the money is to be effected by means of a special commission. According to telegraphic information from Prescott, agrarian disturbances continue in that district. The peasants have resolved not to pay any taxes during the ensuing winter. At a meeting held lately, they adopted a code of signals by means of which they could communicate to one another the arrival of the tax collector. When he commences his work they arranged to have him tied up and show every resistance to the representative of the Government. The elections of the members of the Duma are proceeding with the Empire, even in the Polish provinces, where it was feared there would be disturbances. It is reported from Karloff that a passenger train was derailed near Alexandrovich, resulting in twenty persons being injured. It is believed that the derailment was the work of an evil-disposed person. From Riga it is stated that eight armed individuals entered the municipal premises of Kallakala, disarmed the watchmen and burned the official documents and the portrait of the Governor. A telegram from Moscow announces that the Commercial Council has elected Mr. Timiassoff, ex-Minister of Commerce, to represent it in the Council of the Empire. The authorities of Vladivostok arrested yesterday morning two Japanese sailors caught whilst taking plans of the fortifications.

The Movement in London.

London, Feb. 26.

A resolution in favour of international arbitration, as submitted by the International Bureau at Berne, to all the peace and arbitration societies of Europe and America, was adopted at a meeting held last evening at the Friends' Meeting House, 52, St. Martin's-lane, W. C., under the auspices of the National Council of Peace Societies.

The gathering, which included nearly all the stalwarts of the movement in London, heartily endorsed the appeal to the peoples issued by the Bureau at Berne in favour of arbitration, and the federation of States. It also expressed the hope that the second Hague Conference will shortly be summoned, and that a serious effort will be made at that Conference to arrive at an agreement for an

arrest—with a view to an ultimate reduction—of armaments.

Mr. Alfred J. King, M.P., presided, and he was supported by the Rev. Canon H. Hensley Henson, Mr. W. P. Byles, M.P., Mr. C. P. Gooch, M.P., and others.

"We rejoice," said the Chairman, "in the manifestation of public opinion throughout Great Britain and in foreign countries, particularly Germany, in favour of establishing a friendly feeling between the peoples." He looked upon the fact that this year we had a new House of Commons pledged up to the hilt to retrenchment and domestic reform, and these objects could only be accomplished under conditions of peace.

Mr. W. P. Byles, M.P., said that practically the whole of the Labour representatives in Parliament might be included in the Peace movement. There would not be so much talk in the future about Imperialism and exploiting the ends of the earth.

Canon Hensley Henson, in the course of a striking speech, remarked that whilst it gave him great pleasure to support a cause which was so near the heart of every reflective Christian man, he could not associate himself with any criticism of individuals. No greater harm could be done to the peace movement in this country than that they should lead the public to think that it was the fad of impractical people. The rev. gentleman concluded his remarks by saying that if they could but persuade one single individual not to regard the clamours of the moment, or to read the bellicose newspapers, but to look at every international difficulty from the side of both nations, they would be taking a very important step in the direction of peace.

The National Service Movement.

As President of the National Service League, Lord Roberts writes to remove any misconceptions as to the attitude of that body and to place before the public a definite outline of its policy. The objects of the National Service League are, generally:—(1) To ensure peace and security for the British Empire by organizing our land forces in such a manner that we may not only be able to defend successfully any portion of the Empire against attack, but also that the strength of our defensive arrangements may render any attack improbable. (2) To improve the moral and physical condition of the nation, and thereby to increase its industrial efficiency. With a view to attaining these two objects, the League recommends:—(1) That the spirit of patriotism and duty towards their country should be instilled in boys in all schools by their teachers; (2) universal physical training of a military character, and instruction in the use of the rifle, shot, and form part of the curriculum of all schools (3) in the case of boys who leave school before eighteen—the continuation of this training, up to that age, in cadet corps, boys' brigades, and similar institutions, under State supervision; and (4) the encouragement of rifle-clubs, and the endeavour to make rifle-shooting a national sport. With regard to Auxiliary forces, the League advocates the adoption of all measures which will improve the military efficiency of the existing Auxiliary forces, and at the same time pave the way for their inclusion in a system of universal military service for home defence. With that object it urges the organization of these forces in brigades, divisions, etc., with necessary staff and equipment, as an indispensable first step towards their being able to take the field as a mobile force in the absence of the whole or the greater part of the Regular Army.

SUNDRIES.

—WEATHER.—Fine, with a moderate temperature. Rain apparently as far off as ever.

—PATIENT.—The numerous friends of Mr. G. E. Still will regret to learn that he is temporarily laid up in the British Hospital with kidney complaint. We join in best wishes for his speedy recovery.

—M. V. GOLF CLUB.—The Annual General Meeting of this Club will be held at the Offices of the Waterworks Company, on Wednesday afternoon next, April 4.

—TENNIS AND TENNIS.—We are requested to state that Mrs. G. Maclean will give ten at the Lawn Tennis Club at the Parque Central this afternoon.

—PATTI IN MONTEVIDEO.—The great singer, who was heard here in 1888, is hardly likely to visit Montevideo, again but her voice has come. In other words Madame Patti has at last consented to make records for the gramophone—not many weeks ago—and a simple disc, heralding a further supply, have already been received by Favaro. Altogether Madame Patti has made some fourteen records, in English, French, Spanish and Italian. "Home, Sweet Home," is among the number, and is as sweet and pathetic as ever. Favaro's stock of disk records—some of them marvels of reproduction—is greater than ever, and he is just expecting a large consignment from Milan of the popular Pathé cylinder records, which should be on sale in a few days.

—BREAD.—There still seems to be some doubt whether the strike is over, and thought the bakeries are working they have not yet recommenced house delivery, which means that they are meanwhile making extra profit in the saving of expenses. The whole affair is unsatisfactory on both sides.

—URQUIZA THEATRE.—This evening will be performed the comedy "Nuestra Juventud," adopted from the celebrated French play "Notre Jeunesse" by Capus.

—ITALIAN SQUADRON.—The "Umbria," "Fieramosca" and "Dogli" have left this port for various parts of the South American coast, but are expected back early in July.

—NATIONALIST DIRECTORATE.—Drs. Arturo Semeria and Vicente Borro have joined the nationalist Directorate in place of Sres. G. Garcia and E. Legrand. Dr. Morelli has withdrawn his resignation and remains on the Directorate, which is now once more complete.

—CASINO.—Latest arrivals here are the Mayos, acrobats, and Lillyn, French singer.

—CARUSO CARICATURES.—Signor Caruso, the famous tenor, is well known to be an expert caricaturist. He is now about to put some of his sketches to a new purpose by publishing them in a little book, the proceeds of which he has promised to give to the fund being raised in New York for the Italian Hospital in that city. The Italian Government, in order to encourage liberality, has offered to grant the Italian Benevolent Institution about £10,000 towards the fund for the erection of a new hospital, on condition that the Italians in New York raise a similar amount. A special performance was given at the Opera House, and gained £1,200 for the fund. There is likely to be a large circulation for Signor Caruso's book of sketches, especially seeing that he caricatures, in good-humoured fashion, many of the "stars" of the operatic stage.

—YELLOW FEVER.—In the *Medical Press* we find the following with reference to yellow fever:—Hitherto the Pacific Islands have been free from the scourge of yellow fever. This fact is curious when we consider that they possess, in com-

mon with the West Indies, the tropical temperature necessary for the incubation of the *steomyia fasciata*, which harbours and transmits the parasite of yellow fever. The only absent link is the specific micro-organism which, according to Mr. V. L. Kellogg, of the United States Fisheries Bureau, has not been able to survive the conditions of the voyage round Cape Horn, hitherto necessary to transit from the West Indies to the Pacific Islands. All that will probably be changed by the completion of the Panama Canal, and the yellow fever organism may be transmitted from West to East in a state of full activity. In that case the result would be like putting a light to dry heather. If trade be established by the new route, it is, moreover, difficult to imagine how the risk could be averted by any known sanitary precautions.

LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, FEB. 26.

In a White Paper on Indian Army administration, Mr. Morley suggests amendments of rules to Lord Minto, to make sure that all matters before they reach the Commander-in-Chief shall have passed through the hands of the Secretary.

Speaking at Plumstead on Saturday, Mr. Will Crooks claimed that the Labour Party had already shown a remarkable grip of the affairs of the nation. Stephen Walsh he ventured to call a pocket edition of John Bright.

Addressing members of the National Democratic League on Saturday, Mr. John Ward, M.P., said he had been trying to live in Parliament on 50 a week, but he found it could not be done.

Amongst the subjects to be dealt with by L.C.C. to-morrow are the submission of tenders for the construction of the Northern tramways. An experimental section is to be constructed on the side-slot conduit system.

Mr. James Henderson, the well-known newspaper proprietor, died on Saturday, in his eighty-third year.

Rev. the Earl of Bessborough died on Saturday night in his 85th year.

Two more volumes of the London Traffic Commission have been issued. They state that the passengers on London's tramways, railways, and buses in a year is equal to three-fourths of the population of the world.

London's first shallow tramway was opened on Saturday.

While undergoing sentence at Lincoln Prison Robert Curly confessed that he and another man murdered Frank Ernest Allwood, whose body was found in a roadside barn at Tackley, Oxfordshire.

Found insensible in a first-class carriage of a South Eastern train at Addiscombe-road, with two pieces of tape round her neck and a collarette in her mouth, Annie Louisa Allen, an recovering consciousness first told an extraordinary story of having been drugged, but afterwards stated that she had tried to commit suicide.

Sensational results marked the third round of the English Cup ties, Aston Villa, the holders, losing to a Second League team, Manchester United, by one goal to five, and Woolwich defeating Sunderland by five to none. Southampton beat Middlesbrough by six to one, and Tottenham and Birmingham played the only draw.

TUESDAY, FEB. 27.

His Majesty received addresses from Convocation at yesterday's levee. Viscount Milner made his debut in the House of Lords yesterday, delivering a bitterly-conceived speech on the situation in South Africa. Lord Elgin, who replied, further expounded the policy of the Government in the Transvaal and Orange River Colonies. The debate was adjourned until to-day.

In the House of Commons the Twelve o'Clock Rule was suspended as a preliminary to concluding the debate on the Address. Amongst the subjects discussed were the unrest in India (as to which Mr. John Morley made an important statement), the immigration of alien labourers, and sea encroachment on our coasts.

To a deputation, Mr. Asquith and Mr. John Burns stated that the Government were fully aware of the urgency of legislating on the subject of taxing laid values, but that preliminary steps were necessary.

It was stated at a Mansion House meeting yesterday that the testimonial to Dr. W. H. Perkin, the discoverer of the dye-stuff "mauve," would be of an international character.

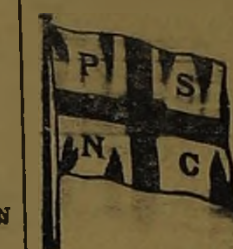
