THE STRIKE PLAGUE.

After being relatively quiescent for a
short time—though never entirely ab-
sent—the strike plague has broken out
afresh, the latest victim being the Mid-
land Uruguay Railway. We are not in-
formed of the origin of the quarrel,
but we know that it already means
the abandonment of trains in the
middle of their journey, the suspen-
sion of traffic on the line, and the
cutting off of railway communication,
equally for passengers, cargo and mail,
with the north-west of the Republic.

Furthermore, the men on the Central
Uruguay Railway have notified their re-
fusal to handle goods or passengers for
transfer to the Midland line, the alterna-
tive being, no doubt, that if any at-
tempt was made to compel them to per-
form their duty in this respect, they also
would go on strike, still further paralysing
railway traffic.

The prominent feature in this as in
nearly all the strikes, is the utter absence
of any sense of contract or obligation on
the part of the men, their bad faith to-
wards their employers, and their insubor-
dination to legitimate industrial authority.
They are constantly framing most
stringent conditions as regards their
employers; but as regards themselves
they accept none whatever, not even the
most primitive conditions of obeying or-
ders and not abandoning their work
without proper notice or sufficient cause.
As we have said before, the arrangement
is a completely one-sided one, and there-
fore unjust. The working-classes are con-
tinually complaining about the "injusti-
ces" of their employers, but they them-
selves have even less sense of justice.

The men on the Midland Railway
have shown the usual bad faith towards
their employers; they accept an engage-
ment and fail to keep it; they commence
to drive trains which they abandon be-
fore they reach their destination, thereby
injuring not merely the Railway Com-
pany, but the passengers and all those
sending cargo and mails by those trains.
Because these men have a grievance—
perhaps real, but quite as possibly in-
aginary—the general public, who have
nothing to do with the matter, have to
suffer, and the railway system of the
country has to be disturbed. This is clear
breach of contract. The men of the Central
Uruguay, by refusing to handle certain
cargo and passengers are guilty of breach
of faith to their employers—for they can-
not possibly be granted this right of dis-
cumbination—of disobedience and of in-
subordination, for which they ought to be
punished, and would be if the laws
and the authorities gave proper sup-
port to legitimate industrial discipline.
The matter is made worse by the fact
that they do not pretend to have any
grievance of their own, but are acting
out of what they call "solidaridad,"
which merely means that, because an-
other Railway Company has a dispute
with its men, they imagine themselves
obliged to join, and therefore refuse to
fulfil their duties.

It is obvious that no industrial enter-
prise, and least of all an enterprise per-
forming public services, can be carried
on with any security under such condi-
tions, or want of conditions, as these;
that is to say when the men show no
sense of contract or obligation on
their part, abandoning their work
without notice, or refusing to com-
ply with certain of their duties.
Whilst this is the case, not merely
is the legitimate authority of the employ-
er reduced to a myth, but it becomes im-
possible for any enterprise or Company
to fulfil its obligations towards the pub-
lic, there is neither stability nor cer-
tainty in the performance of public
services, and the whole fabric of
society becomes disorganised. This is
simply anarchy. If, as is said in the
article quoted in another column, "the
foundations of civilization are laid
in contract," this is even more the case
with industry of every description, and
most of all with the industries of public

services. Without the sense of contract
on both sides, the regular course of in-
dustry becomes inconceivable, and all is
reduced to chaos. The workman who im-
properly abandons his work is a sinner
just as much as the employer who fails to
pay his workmen; both are guilty of
breach of contract, both offend against
the basis of society.

To quote again from the article just
mentioned:—

"To-day the structure of the modern
social state rests upon the simple prin-
ciple that he who, of his own free
will, and for consideration, enters into
an agreement to do or to refrain from
doing some act, shall be compelled by
law to carry out his agreement; and
if he fails, the aggrieved person shall
have his remedy."—This puts the
whole case in a nutshell, and brings us
back to our former statement that all the
trouble on this side of the question at
least, arises from the peculiar deficien-
cies of the Uruguayan Codes, which, in
this respect, are hardly yet those of a
civilized country, for they fail to sup-
port industrial authority, to enforce in-
dustrial contract, or to supply the neces-
sary remedy for breach of that contract
by unjust dismissal on the one side,
or by improper abandonment of
work on the other side. The rela-
tions between employer and workman
are not regulated by law as they are in
nearly every other civilized country, and
the consequences is that they have
fallen into a condition somewhere be-
tween chaos and anarchy under
which the pursuit of industrial enter-
prise threatens to become impossible.
What the law has omitted to do, the
Trade Unions have of late been attempt-
ing to do,—in fact, as we have stated re-
cently they have attempted to arrogate
to themselves supreme authority on
the whole question—but that, as might
be expected, has only made matters
worse, introducing a new and intolerable
form of tyranny and undermining yet
further the legitimate basis of society.

The remedy for this part of the trouble
lies, as we are almost tired of repeat-
ing, in legislative action. There is really
no more urgent public question than
this, for the evil is constantly with us,
the strikes are of constant recurrence,
and there is not a single employer of
labor who feels his position secure from
one day to another. How much longer
are the Government and the Chambers going
to remain inert and inactive before this
grave problem? Echo answers, How
long?

POLITICAL NOTES.

Neither of the Chambers sat Wednes-
day. It was the turn of the Senators,
but they were not convoked.

The Minister of Finance has received a
telegram from the Banque de Paris et des
Pays Bas, reporting payment to Glynn,
Mills, Currie and Co., on account of
the Uruguayan Government, of the
second instalment of two million dollars
corresponding to the issue of the Con-
version Loan in Paris. It is expected that
the third and last instalment will be
paid within about a fortnight.
With regard to the cash replem-
entation of 6 1/2 p. Bonds, it is announ-
ced that another million of dollars
will be paid off on April 4th, and the re-
mainer between April 15 and 20. The
two million dollars in specie recently
paid to Glynn, Mills Currie and Co. will
arrive here about April 10.

The Government has ordered Sr. F.
Segarra, Fiscal of Police, to take
charge of the Priestship in Rivera,
while enquiry is being made into the
affair reported in our last.

The *Prensa* has joined the *Dia* in de-
claiming with all its force against the
suggestion of the *Siglo* in favor of a coal-
ition for the approaching elections. This
anger of the officialist press may be re-
garded as a proof that the idea is not
without value. Nevertheless, if there
be any truth in the constant claim
of the *Dia* that the course of the
Government has the support of the
"immense majority" of the country and
that the dissident factions are too
insignificant to be taken into account,
it is difficult to understand this hysteri-
cal outcry, which is a symptom of weak-
ness rather than of strength. To listen to
them, one might think that opposition or
dissent was a crime.

Contract Makes Civilisation.

IF CONTRACT BE JEOPARDISED,
SOCIETY WILL BE JEOPARDISED TOO.
(Financial News.)

The foundations of civilisation are
laid in contract. There was a time, more
than two thousand years ago, when they
were laid in status. But that time has
long gone by, and the change is evi-
denced, incidentally, by the presence of
a powerful group of Labor members in
the House of Commons. Large, however,
as is the element of contract which
enters into the modern social edifice, it
may be doubted if its importance is fully
realised. Civilisation has progressed
under stable conditions of contract, and
has moved in the reverse direction when
contract has become unenforceable. It is
probably not too much to say that if the
sanctity of contract should be assailed
by socialism, or any other weapon which

may be directed against it, the well-
being of the whole social fabric will
suffer, and, unless the full effects of the
experiment are checked in time, the re-
construction of society will have to be
begun over again as the result of it.

When contract first emerges from the
obscurity of the primeval period we find
it accompanied by an elaborate ritual,
without which it was of no effect. If one
gesture were misplaced, if one formula
were omitted, the whole procedure be-
came void. This was the state of things
in the early days of Roman law; but the
importance of the ritual was gradually
minimised, while on the other hand, a
greater weight was attached to the inten-
tion of the parties. By the time we reach
the Christian era we find intention and
substance to be the paramount considera-
tions. In other words, the Roman juris-
prudence had arrived at a period when it
could conceive the principle which was
subsequently destined to be enunciated
in the famous equity maxim that "Equity
looks at the substance and not at the
form."

Six hundred years later Roman juris-
prudence, without Roman power behind
it, had ceased to be an effective force in
the world, and the result was the advent
of that period of the world's history which
is generally known as the "Dark Ages."
In the case of our own country, however,
the landing of William the Conqueror,
in 1066, was the signal for the re-appli-
cation to society of the principles of
law. From the days of William I. down
to the present time the political recon-
struction of society has been proceeding
upon the basis of contract. Glanville and
Barton, Littleton and Coke, Bacon and
Selden, Hale and Eldon—all the great
lawyers of the past—have consciously or
unconsciously framed the great fabric
of British legal principles on the founda-
tion of contract. To-day the structure of
the modern social state rests upon the
simple principle that he who, of his own
free will, and for consideration, enters
into an agreement to do or to refrain
from doing some act, shall be compelled
by law to carry out his agreement; and if
he fails, the aggrieved person shall have
his remedy.

£30,000 Jewel.

Most Magnificent of Modern Times.

London has the distinction of having
produced the most magnificent piece of
jewellery in modern times. A Turkish
potentate has commissioned Messrs. Dob-
son and Son, of Piccadilly to produce a
"plastron" of surpassing beauty, rivaling
the Arabian nights in its splendour.
From his own treasures he supplied a
number of beautiful pearls, the size
of small nuts, and a single diamond of
wonderful brilliance, leaving Messrs.
Dobson to furnish the rest of the jew-
els.

There are no less than eight thou-
sand and brilliant, besides emeralds and
rubies, said Mr. Arthur Dobson, in
showing it. They submitted several
sketches, and, after approval of one,
they commenced work two years ago,
and it is just completed. Drawing aside a
silk curtain, he revealed the jewel on a
velvet background.

Measuring 2 1/2 in. in length, it is
made to button round the neck by a
wonderful circle of diamonds, and spreads
out on the breast. Butterflies of jewels,
delicately poised on glittering flowers, sur-
round a centre-piece of the Turkish cres-
cent of pearls, in three rows. The cres-
cent itself is the size of a tea-plate; at the
top is the sign-manual of the Sultan of
Turkey in emeralds, whilst a verse of
the Koran in rubies fills the centre.

Hanging from the crescent ropes of
glittering gems is a square medallion,
the size of a cigarette-case, on which, stand-
ing on an emerald mound, is the Turkish
flag in rubies, the whole being backed by
diamonds. Below is suspended in a dia-
mond frame a miniature of the pur-
chaser, and, completing the whole sche-
me, at the bottom is a pearl as large as
an acorn.

His Majesty had the jewel taken to
Buckingham Palace, and, on picking it
up, the King laughingly said he was glad
that he was not forced to wear anything
so gorgeous or heavy. The value of the
jewel is £30,000.

Obituary.

From the *D. A. Standard*.—

It is with extreme regret that we have
to record the death of Captain R. W.
Treanman, so well known in River Plate
circles as the commander of the *Lampart*
and *Holt* liners. "Romney" He had
lately been appointed to the new steamer
"Velasquez," and on arrival in Antwerp
contracted a severe cold developing into
pneumonia, from which he died on the
25th of February last, at the early age
of 48 years. The many passengers who
had occasion to travel by the "Romney"
will view this announcement with sor-
rowful feelings, it being very hard to
realise that the genial Captain has passed
away from a sphere of action to which
he was so eminently suited. We offer our

family.

We see by the "Liverpool Courier"
that on the 7th February there took
place at Bevington Cemetery, the fune-
ral of Mr. Enrique Dauber, of Park-
road West, Heswall, who was formerly
the Consul-General of the Republic of
Uruguay in Paris, and prior to that for
several years was the Consul in Liver-
pool. The chief mourners were Mr.
Enrique Dauber, jun. (consul to Urugu-
way), Mr. Louis Dauber, Mr. Joseph
Dauber (sons), Master Richard Dauber
(grandson), and Mr. John Dauber
(brother), secretary of the Argentine

consulate, Liverpool.—At the annual
meeting of the Liverpool Consular As-
sociation, the President (Mr. Verepree-
wen, Belgian Consul) proposed a vote of
condolence with Mr. Enrique Dauber,
Consul of Uruguay in Liverpool, and his
family, on the death of his father, who
from 1885 to 1894 was Consul in Liver-
pool for Uruguay, and was subse-
quently promoted to be Consul-General
in Paris. It may not be generally known
that the deceased gentleman was at one
time a well-to-do merchant in Montevi-
deo and Buenos Aires, and was very
highly esteemed for his many engaging
and sterling qualities.

R. M. S. "Amazon."

The twin-screw steamer "Amazon"
was launched by Messrs. Harland and
Wolff, Belfast, on Saturday, February
4th, for the Royal Mail Steam Packet
Company, for the South American trade.
Her dimensions are: length
527 1/2 ft. Gm., beam 60 ft., with a gross
register of about 10,000 tons. The
"Amazon" is designed to carry a large
quantity of cargo, but passenger accom-
modation on the most sumptuous scale is
her speciality. A point deserving particu-
lar mention is that the state-rooms are on
deck. Many of the cabins are arranged
on the tandom principle, with side light
for each room. There are a number of
"suites de luxe" (a feature in the R. M.
S. P. steamers). The first saloon is most
handsome. The tables, seating 210 pas-
sengers, are arranged on the latest re-
staurant system. A nursery adjoins the
first saloon on the main deck. The
second saloon accommodation is of a
very superior type, and includes hand-
some dining saloon, also social hall and
smoke-room on deck, and ample prome-
nade accommodation. The third-class
accommodation provides for a large num-
ber of passengers, whose comfort in
sleeping-rooms, dining-rooms, lavato-
ries, and deck-space is catered for in a
style unsurpassed on any route. Every
provision has been made for the safe na-
vigation of the steamer, and, by the adop-
tion of Messrs. Harland and Wolff's
latest "balanced" quadruple type of en-
gines, vibration is reduced to a minimum.
The double set of engines for the twin-
screws constitutes, of course, an addi-
tional element of safety. She is fitted by
J. and E. Hall, Ltd., with one of their
large duplex type patent refrigerating
machines for the carriage of frozen or
chilled meat, dairy produce, or fruit; also
for preserving the passengers' provisions,
making ice etc. The "Amazon" will take
up her position in South American mail
service in June next.—*Shipping News.*

Cure of Consumption.

Paris, Feb. 28.

Professor Bahring, in an interview at
Marburg with a representative of the
"Matin," said that in theory he was cer-
tain of the innocuousness of his new vac-
cine, called "tuberculeux," but in practice
it was a question of the quantity injected.
He was equally sure that the "tubercu-
lous" possessed not only preventive vir-
tues, but also, in certain cases and in a
certain measure, curative virtues. Thus,
this vaccine had cured cows infected
with local tuberculosis—for instance, in
the udder. He hoped, therefore, that it
would be possible to use "tuberculeux"
effectively to combat human tubercu-
losis, at any rate in its earliest stage. He
believed also that it would render great
services in the treatment of scrofulous
children.

The Professor added, however, that
he would keep the secret of his prepara-
tion until by experiments he had been
able to frame exact directions for its use.
Experiments on men would be made by
experienced clinical doctors.

For Coaling Ships.

Successful Trial of a New Lighter.

The Thames Iron Works have just
built a new "Express" Coal Baggie
Lighter, the patent of Messrs. Mackrow
and Cameron, for coaling ships in har-
bour, and a most successful trial was
held recently.

The craft is provided with means for
rapidly filling bags with coal, without
having resort to shovelling, and for
rapidly transporting them to vessels
alongside. The hull is divided into four
watertight compartments, the two middle
ones containing the coal, and at the bot-
tom of these is a filling room, to which
the coal descends on to a bench, from
which men rake it into bags ready to re-
ceive it.

By mechanical arrangements the bags
are lifted and transferred to overhead
rills, which run along the centre of each
filling room, and are drawn to the bot-
tom of the elevators at the ends of the
holds, each elevator being fitted with
express transporters capable of deliver-
ing about 100 tons of bagged coal per
hour, which rate was reached in the
course of the trial. When small improve-
ments have been made it is expected that
quite 120 tons per hour will be delivered
from each transporter.

Mr. Frank Hudson, after many years
spent in valuable service to this Railway,
has voluntarily retired, resigning his
latest position as President of the Local
Board. His long service will be justly
rewarded by a retiring pension. He and
Mrs. Hudson will shortly be leaving
for England, to the general regret of
their large circle of friends in this
country. The vacancy on the Local
Board is not yet filled.—Mr. C. W.
Bayne, the General Manager of the Rail-
way, will shortly be making a business
trip home.—Mr. H. A. Macintosh, Chief
Engineer of the C.U.R., has just return-
ed from his trip home, and a warm wel-
come has been given to him and to Mrs.
Macintosh by their many friends.

—**MIND YOUR MEASURES.**—The Mu-
nicipality has applied fines of \$35 each
to some thirteen auctioneers, including sev-
eral of the most prominent and one
of them an ex-Vice President of the
Republic, for having infringed the me-
tric-decimal law by referring to
"varas" (yards) instead of metres in
their announcements of land sales. We
do not know if the fines have yet been
collected.

—**URQUIZA THEATRE.**—This evening
will be given Dr. Demarechi's drama "El
Enemigo," performed here in Spanish
for the first time.

—**POLITEAMA THEATRE.**—The Ital-
ian Dramatic Company of Sr. A. Bolog-
nesi, with Mrs. Pirovano as "star" ac-

Ironmaster." The Company is already
very favorably known here, having had a
long and successful season at the Solis

LONDON NOTES.

THURSDAY, MARCH 1.

Political leaders are having a bad time
of it just at present. Mr. Chamberlain

You see my argument? It is not the fault of our wives that they are thriftless—it is the fault of the age in which we live.’

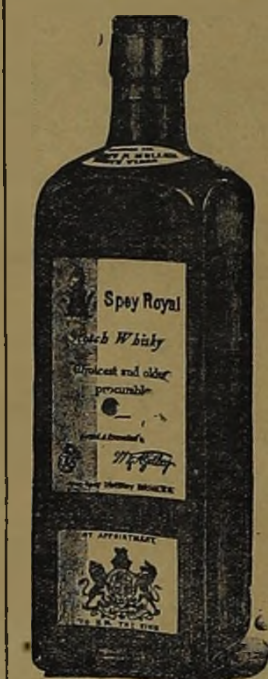
