THE ELECTORAL "ACCORD."

APPARENT RUPTURE OF NEGOTIATIONS.

The note of the day has been the sudden rupture, which many fear must be regarded as final, in the negotiations for bringing about the electoral accord, which has been the centre of political interest for so many months past. The bare facts of the case may be briefly related as follows. -

On Saturday evening the nationalist Committee held an extraordinary sitting, and after a protracted discussion the details of which remain reserved, issued an "official note" to the following effect: - "On account of the reply made by the 'colorado' national Committee to the Accord Committee, as published in the press, the Committee of the nationalist party has decided to make known, on its part, that it regards as absolutely unacceptable the manifestations of this document, equally in their base and their form, for, instead of corresponding to a patriotic initiative, and paving the way for the solution of peace and concord desired by the country, it issues a challenge to the adversary couched in humiliating and provocative terms (en términos deprimidos y vejatorios). Under these conditions, the nationalist Committee regards as concluded all negotiations respecting the 'accord,' and has resolved to address itself at once to its co-partisans, exhorting them afresh to the fulfilment of their civic duties, and urging on them the necessity of presenting an united front in the elections of November. - Montevideo, August 31, 1901."

In addition to the above, it is announced that the Committee will publish a manifesto explaining and defending its attitude. This is expected to appear to-day.

All our native contemporaries except the above note as practically decisive in breaking off the 'accord,' and express little or no hope of any renewal of negotiations, even saying that there was nothing left for the Accord Committee but to admit its failure and dissolve itself. The Accord Committee, however, though dismayed, is not yet daunted. On Sunday it held a long and anxious sitting, the result of which was a lengthy letter addressed to the 'colorado' national Committee. This letter analyses and expostulates with the terms of the resolution adopted by the latter, pointing out that they convey an uncalculated affront to the nationalist party, which was probably unintentional, and that every one foresaw that it would provoke an angry reply, thereby bringing about the rupture of the very negotiations which it was intended to promote. It also points out that, whilst the 'accord' has already been accepted in principle by the nationalist Committee, it is practically impossible to arrive at an understanding on details without mutual discussion. The letter concludes with the following appeal: -

"What, then, is to be done in a situation which, like the present, arises from party accord, in order to avoid an ardent and passionate struggle which will lead us, as is always the case, to protest to civil war and to national ruin? Let the 'colorado' party, the party which is in power and will not suffer in decorum by nobly extending the hand to its brother - let this party frankly declare that it had no intention of wounding the dignity of the nationalists, and that it is disposed to convoke the party Convention on the

same day that the nationalists do the same, so that the delegates of both parties may discuss and sanction an electoral accord."

In addition to this, the Accord Committee intends to circulate at once, throughout the Republic, 20,000 copies of the speech made by Dr. Aramburu at the Accord Congress, and to redouble its propaganda generally.

Thus far the bare facts of the situation. For the moment all is chaos, and comment is difficult until matters settle down a little. At the same time, we cannot say that any one is much surprised. Some such rupture was practically inevitable after the arrogant and dictatorial tone assumed in the manifesto issued by the caucus of 'colorado' legislators and afterwards practically repeated in the resolution of the national Committee. However much the rupture may be deplored, it is recognised (that the nationalist Committee could hardly have acted otherwise than it did without loss of self-respect and without forfeiting the confidence of the party. As it is, its attitude has been warmly approved by the two party organs, which were previously hostile to it. Once again, then, the 'colorados' have shown themselves unable to rise to the situation or to place national interests before party feeling, and by their partisan jingoism they have thrown the country into confusion, if not endangered its internal peace, thereby adding to the discredit they already enjoy. The peculiar part of it is that it is said the course taken by the 'colorados' has met with the warm approval of President Cuestas, if indeed it was not to a certain extent inspired by him - and yet it is pretended that he is strongly in favor of the 'accord' and determined to bring it about. This is simply incomprehensible, for the very last way to bring about a friendly 'accord' is in commerce by irritating and aggressing the opponent. Want of tact could hardly take a more unfortunate form.

How it will all work out, it is quite impossible to say. Little hope is to be placed in the letter of the 'accord' Committee, for the 'colorados' are notoriously obstinate and difficult to persuade, especially when it is a case of 'climbing down,' and the tone of the letter is not precisely conciliatory. Perhaps in a few days the situation may become clearer. All sorts of conferences and interviews are being announced, and which President Cuestas is taking his share - though in our opinion he would do much better to leave the matter to others. At all events, hope does not seem to be entirely lost. Meanwhile, the rupture has had a bad effect on the Stock Exchange and in business circles generally, and there has been a marked fall in values.

In its article of Sunday, which we imagine was written before the nationalist declaration was made known, the *Siglo* analyses very unfavorably the terms of the 'colorado' resolution, showing how they must lead to a deadlock, if not to a rupture. It concludes with the following words: - "The situation created by this resolution is very serious, and we are therefore certain that in presence of the responsibilities thus assumed, matters will be modified so that the negotiations for the 'accord' may follow their proper path. In fact, we should have to despair of our aptitude for government if, after the policy of the 'accord' having been accepted in principle by the authorities of both parties, the two parties came to loggerheads, because it is attempted so clumsily to drag from one of the parties that which should and could result from a pact arranged between the delegates of both."

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives were convoked for Saturday, but once more no quorumed. The legislators seem to be occupied with anything except legislative business just now.

We refer separately to the affair of the 'accord,' which is the principal topic of the day.

It is anticipated that the Customs Receipts for August will work out at about \$750,000, against \$674,052 in the same month last year.

An investigation has been ordered into the affairs of the Office of Cattle-Brands and Marks (*Oficina de Marcas y Señales*) where it is said some irregularities have come to light, in addition to the fact that the Chief Sr. Blasco y Sierra is absent in Paraguay without leave from the Government.

Dastardly Crime.

On Sunday morning there was committed what our native contemporaries call a 'drama of passion,' but which we prefer to call a cowardly crime. The principal actor was a young Uruguayan named Lorenzo Semenza, aged 28, living at Vasquez 81 and belonging to a respectable family. He had been engaged to a young lady named Esther Figares, aged 19, whose parents are away in Bahia Blanca, but who lived with an old lady, the Señora Rodriguez, at Calle Y 100. For some reason Miss Figares had recently broken off the engagement, and since then

she had been constantly persecuted by Semenza, who haunted the street where she lived, and even entered the house using threatening language and flourishing his revolver, so that he had to be removed by the police. So far was this carried that the unhappy girl was afraid to show herself at the door or to go out without a protector. On Sunday morning some friends called for her, and they went together to the Concepción Church. Semenza appears to have followed them, and on their return waited for their passing, hidden in the open doorway of the house of Sr. Guerra Stewart, Mercedes 187. As Miss Figares passed, he fired his revolver at her from close quarters, the bullet passing through her face from one side to the other. He then turned his weapon on himself, shooting himself in the head and falling in the passage of the house. He was taken to the Hospital, where he died in a few hours, without recovering consciousness. The wound of Miss Figares, though painful and likely to disfigure her for life, is not of a dangerous character. We may add that the young lady who was the victim of this most cowardly and despicable outrage, was in delicate health and preparing to undergo a trying operation.

Wireless Telegraphy and Atlantic Liners.

London, August 5.

The Cunard Royal Mail steamer *Lucania* arrived in the Mersey on Saturday morning from New York. On her outward voyage a large number of passengers availed themselves of the opportunity to dispatch messages by this system to their friends via the Holyhead, Rosslare, and Crookhaven Stations. The *Lucania* left Liverpool at 4.30 p. m. on Saturday, July 13th, and at 6.50 p. m. came into touch with the Holyhead Station at a distance of 45 miles. A few minutes later the transmission of messages was commenced. Communication was maintained with this station until 10.30 p. m. At midnight Rosslare Station was picked up, and messages exchanged. The *Lucania* got away from Queenstown at nine o'clock on Sunday morning, and shortly afterwards Crookhaven was signalled. From this station numerous telegrams were sent by the *Lucania's* passengers to their friends in Great Britain, the Continent, and the United States.

Communication with Crookhaven was lost at 1.30 p. m., when about 47 miles distant. The *Lucania* sailed from New York on the 27th ult., and was off the Irish coast on Friday morning, the 2nd of August. A very large number of messages were dispatched via Crookhaven Station between noon (when communication was established at a distance of 56 miles) and 5.30 p. m., when the signals were lost. Rosslare was picked up at 8.30 p. m. on Friday, and Holyhead at 1.20 a. m. Saturday, communication being maintained in both cases within range of about 47 miles. Messages were transmitted through each of these stations.

An interesting episode showing the advantage of this system is related. A saloon passenger was very anxious to know the contents of a cable from New York, which he expected had been addressed to him at Liverpool. He wired to the Cunard Company via Crookhaven to open the message and repeat it to him. This was done, and he received his answer through Rosslare. The *Lucania* came alongside the Liverpool landing stage at nine o'clock on Saturday morning.

Rhodesia.

The Rhodesian balance-sheet for the year ending March, 1900, shows a deficit of only £363,543, as against £500,144 for the preceding year. Considering the losses to which the Chartered Company has been exposed by the war, this result is a good as could be expected, though we do not know that the holders of Chartered Stock will be greatly encouraged by it. A moment's examination of the balance-sheet shows that the reduction in the adverse balance is not due to any developments of Rhodesia itself. There is a saving of £87,000 in the votes for the Commandant-General, which may be due to the loss of troops to the Imperial authorities; and on the revenue side of the account the increases arise in the main from the new Customs duty, which is credited with £40,000, and from stamps and licenses. The natives appear to be the only direct taxpayers, in the territories of the Chartered Company. The Hut Tax is going up, and last year it brought in £73,938 - an increase of £3,000 - and the item 'Registration of Natives' accounts for another £4,000. Thus there is land revenue, which brings the company £10,000 a year; so that the native is by no means a despicable asset. But perhaps the most notable feature of the accounts is the heavy falling-off in the receipts from sale of stands and farms. In 1899 the revenue from this source was £37,970, and last year it was only £12,617. There are some arrears, however, which the company hope to collect. Mr. Rhodes is hopeful about the future. The estimates for the current year show a revenue of £426,800,

and those for next year £469,000. But, judging by the fact that Customs duties are expected to bring in £120,000 a year in 1902, Rhodesia must be getting rather a costly place to live in.

American Imports and Exports.

The American Treasury Bureau of Statistics has just completed a return of the imports and exports of the United States for the fiscal year which ended on June 30, 1901. It shows that the total imports for the year were \$822,756,533, the total exports being \$1,487,656,544, and the excess of exports over imports \$664,900,011. The imports are \$27,184,651 below, whilst the exports are \$93,178,462 above, those of last year. The excess of exports over imports exceeds that of last year by \$120,358,113, and is \$49,467,335 greater than the highest record ever before made, which was that of 1897. In former years the commerce of Hawaii and Puerto Rico was included in the regular statement of foreign commerce of the United States. Under the new relations with those islands this practice has been discontinued. But for this it is stated that the total exports of 1901 would have exceeded \$1,500,000,000, as the exports to those islands in the year have aggregated about \$25,000,000.

THE WAR.

Lord Kitchener reports that a train transporting reinforcements and cattle, was derailed between Watermaal and Hamanskraal stations by a Boer force of 250 men under command of a veldt-cornet whose name has not been ascertained. The Boers, who were in ambush in the vicinity, then attacked the train and took it by assault, after a desperate resistance from the survivors of the accident. Eventually they destroyed the train by fire. Among our losses (the number of which does not appear) has to be lamented the death of Lt. Col. C. P. Seymour Vandelaar, of the Irish Guard, one of the most promising officers, whose death is deplored by the whole army.

Lord Kitchener also reports that Piet Delarey, brother of the general of that name, has been taken prisoner by Col. Garrett.

From Capetown it is reported that a numerous Boer force has invaded the Ondistown district, in the south of Cape Colony. Gen. French has dispatched two columns in pursuit. (Was not this reported a week ago?)

An afternoon London telegram gives the following items, culled from the morning papers: - A Capetown message to the *Daily Mail* announces that Scheepers' commando is advancing to the south-west, and has invaded a part of the Colony hitherto free from the Boers. The British authorities, it adds, are trying to prevent communication between Capetown and the perturbed districts. - The same paper publishes an article from the well-known critic Mr. Edgar Wallace, in which he says that Lord Kitchener's recent proclamation will have no effect, not even producing the surrender of a single commando. Threats, he thinks, will have no effect, and the only policy is to adopt severe military measures. - The Pretoria correspondent of the *Morning Post* communicates the result of a long interview he had with Lord Kitchener early in August. According to his (the correspondent's) account, the blame for the present situation in South Africa lies more with the Government than with Lord Kitchener. The latter complains of the intervention of the Government in the smallest details, and of obliging him to establish a rigorous censorship over all despatches, although he personally would prefer to give the war correspondents a free hand, on their proper responsibility. He calls attention to the fact that Lord Kitchener abstained from announcing the end of the war as near at hand - *The Standard* and *Morning Post* publish extensive reports on the situation of the reconcentrated camps, and both papers recognize that the mortality there is certainly extreme. - Finally, the *Kölnische Zeitung* publishes a telegram from Capetown stating that the entire Colony is perturbed, and the Boers are receiving assistance from all parts.

L'Echo of Paris announces that the efforts of Dr. Leyds to bring about an interview between the Czar and Mr. Kruger have entirely failed, because the French Foreign Minister Mr. Delcassé has opposed it on the ground that it would provoke pro-Berlin manifestations out of harmony with the fêtes over the Czar's visit. - From Hilsenraut it is stated that Mr. Kruger and his entourage are making active preparations for a journey, the direction of which is kept very secret, though it is conjectured to be the United States.

Lord Milner is reported to be busy making radical changes in the administrative staff of the Transvaal and at Johannesburg.

SUNDRIES.

- **WEATHER.** - Though the winter has still three weeks to run, the temperature on Sunday and yesterday reached almost summer level, and last season's summer jackets were hastily brought out from their reclusion. On Sunday after-

noon, the thermometer marked over 90° Fahrenheit in the sun. Yesterday, although the sky was dull, the thermometer ranged from 75° to 80° in the shade. Both days there was a ghastly, depressing north wind, which made it hotter out of doors than in, and the atmosphere was heavily charged with moisture, everything in fact reeking with damp. This means a heavy storm working up, after which we may hope for a return of fresh, cool weather.

- **PASSENGERS.** - Arrived by the P. S. N. Co's *Iberia*, from Liverpool, etc., Sept. 1. Mr. A. J. Otter, Mrs. M. J. de Zabala, 4 third class, For Buenos Aires, 8 first class, 12 second and 54 third. - The New Zealand Co's, *Rimutaka*, is expected to-day, sailing tomorrow. - The P. S. N. Co's *Orellana* has been delayed by bad weather on the West Coast, and will not arrive until Monday next, sailing Tuesday 10th.

- **TUBERCULOSIS.** - According to a New York telegram, conceived in somewhat sensational strain, Dr. William Fraleigh, head physician of the New York State Hospital and a noted bacteriologist, has announced the discovery of a radical cure for consumption and other diseases hitherto regarded as incurable, including cancer. This consists of an elixir or serum, containing the constituents of healthy blood, the injection of which at blood-heat produces an evolution of oxygen and destroys almost immediately the morbid disease germs. With this he undertakes to cure any person who has any lung lesion. In some experiments with diseased patients he succeeded in producing an almost instantaneous effect - whether it is permanent remains to be proved. The affair has made a sensation in the States, and further particulars are awaited with anxiety. (How many of these remedies have been announced already, and have proved of little or no lasting worth?)

- **MARRIAGE.** - The wedding of Mr. Charles B. Cumber and Miss J. M. Buchanan will take place in Buenos Aires on the 16th inst.

- **THE AMERICA COR.** - In New York there is heavy betting at 5 to 3 against the *Shamrock II*, whichever American yacht may defend the cup. - **LYNCHER IN TROUBLE.** - One Howard, leader of a mob of ruffians who lynched a negro in Alabama, has been condemned to penal servitude for life.

- **MORTALITY.** - Professor Saellison has, says *The American Journal of Health*, made out the following statistics with respect to the mortality of the world. Of 1,000,000 persons, only 900 die from old age, 12,000 from gout, 18,400 from measles, 2,700 from apoplexy, 7,000 from erysipelas, 7,500 from consumption, 48,000 from scarlet fever, 25,000 from whooping-cough, 30,000 from typhoid and typhus fever, and 7,000 from rheumatism.

- **PRINCE DEAD.** - A Stuttgart telegram of Saturday announces the death of the Prince of Saxe-Weimar-Eisenach. - Prince William A. E. of Saxe-Weimar, K. P., P. C., of Ireland, G. C. B., was born in 1823. He entered the British army in 1841 and in 1851 married Lady Augusta Catherine Gordon-Lennox, daughter of the 5th Duke of Richmond and Gordon. He served in the Crimea and was at Balaklava, Inkerman, Alma and Sebastopol; commanded the Home military district, 1878 to 1883; and the forces in Ireland, 1885 to 1890. He was created G. C. B. in 1887 and promoted to Field-Marshal in 1897. He was Colonel of the First Life Guards and has no heir. The telegram, however, may be mis-translated into Spanish and it is possible that it refers to the Grand Duke of Saxe-Weimar, another person altogether.

- **EQUINE HEAD-GEAR.** - Speaking of *The Inwardness of the Horse Sun-bonnet*, *The Medical Press and Circular* says: "Science has shown that sunstroke is not due to heat, but rather to micro-organisms. The part played by hot weather consists in providing the conditions necessary for the development of the 'sunstroke' organisms. All the same, it is advisable to protect the skull from the rays of the hot sun, whether tropical or otherwise, and on that ground the use of the sun-bonnet for horses may be consistently upheld. One word of caution may perhaps be added. The openings in the head-gear should be so made that there is not the least friction or pressure upon the ears. Those most sensitive organs are in constant motion, and anything that restricts their free movement must prove a source of never-ending irritation to a horse, to say nothing of the actual galling that may ensue. LONDON NOTES.

SATURDAY, AUGUST 3.

In the House of Lords yesterday the Education Bill was read a second time.

Questions were asked in the House of Commons on the subject of troops being sent to Bethesda, and a motion for the adjournment of the House was defeated by a Government majority of 27. On the House going into Committee of Supply, an animated discussion took place upon the vote for the Colonial Office, when debate ensued upon the policy and conduct of the war in its different aspects.

Mr. W. W. B. Beach, M.P., Father of the House of Commons, met with a serious accident whilst driving in a cab down Parliament-street last evening. He was thrown from the vehicle, and taken to Westminster Hospital in an unconscious condition.

At Cheltenham, yesterday, the British Medical Association brought its proceedings to a conclusion. The most interesting feature of the day was a discussion on the Diseases of Occupations, opened by Dr. T. M. Legge, Inspector of Factories.

Ralph Dyer and Caroline Agnes Dyer, brother and sister, were yesterday committed for trial on the coroner's warrant for the wilful murder of Frances No. 10 at Stoke Newington. During the inquest a letter from Miss Dyer was read, in which she made remarkable allegations of having been drugged and otherwise injured.

John Thurgood, alias Knott, known as an ex-convict, was yesterday sentenced by Mr. Sheil, at Westminster Police Court, to twelve months' imprisonment. He was attempting a burglary in Grosvenor-square and was armed with a loaded revolver.

Middlesex played at Leyton yesterday under great disadvantage, two members of the team being absent, hurt; whilst W. P. Robertson was unable to keep wicket. Essex, in their second innings, scored 219 for three wickets, and at the drawing of stumps were 288 runs on.

Against the 327 scored by Surrey, at Southampton, Hampshire scored 294 for nine wickets; and at Worcester the county team closed their first innings for 204, or 43 to the lead, to which Sussex responded in their second venture with 262 for four.

MONDAY, AUGUST 5.

The King and Queen, accompanied by the Princess Victoria, inspected the new Royal yacht Victoria and Albert at Cowes on Saturday.

The Right Hon. W. W. B. Beach, "Father of the House of Commons," died in Westminster Hospital on Saturday night, as a consequence of injuries received by him in a cab accident the previous evening.

It is officially reported that H. M. torpedo-boat destroyer Viper grounded on a rock near Alderney during a fog on Saturday evening, and has, it is feared, become a total wreck. No lives were lost.

Cavalry and infantry arrived at Bethesda from Bangor yesterday, but their services were not required, everything being quiet in the district. The strikers held a mass meeting during the day, and Mr. Keir Hardie, M.P., was among the speakers.

Several persons were injured by the explosion, on the fair ground of the Alexandra Palace, on Saturday, of the engine of a round-about.

Mr. H. Heaver, a building contractor, was shot yesterday morning at Westcott, near Dorking, by his brother-in-law. The latter afterwards committed suicide.

For using bad language and assaulting two ticket-inspectors at the Kenilworth station of the Midland Railway, a working man named Nash was sentenced by Mr. Curtis Bennett, at the Margate Police Court, on Saturday, to a fine of 40s., and consecutive terms of one month and fourteen days' hard labour.

I looked at my watch; surely we ought to have been off ere this. No, it was just five and twenty minutes past six, so I had another five minutes. I flattered myself, as I pulled my shawl round me, that no one would share my solitude; the porter would remember the tip and the locked door. I was very glad, as I was a shy woman, and did not care to be shut up with a solitary fellow passenger.

The usual "Take your seats" sounded, the slamming of doors came nearer—nearer—when, to my great disgust, my carriage door was unlocked, there was a hasty "Here you are, sir," a rug bundled in, a stick and a parcel, and then followed a tall gaunt-looking man, who sat down opposite me; the door was again slammed, after the manner of porters, locked, and I had hardly had time to recover myself, when the final screech and the rattling of the ponderous wheels as the train slowly left the station were heard, and we were off.

I thought "Well, perhaps for twenty minutes or half-an hour it will not make much difference, as I can change at Reading," where the express generally stayed fifteen minutes; so I pulled up my rug and shawl once more and bethought myself of Aunt Jane's present to "relieve the tedium of the journey."
