POLITICAL NOTES.

Neither of the Chambers sat on Saturday. The legislators continue to be occupied with almost anything except parliamentary business.

Regarding the political situation, we can only repeat that there is nothing new. If there is to be any fresh development, it is remarkably slow in making its appearance. Nevertheless, public confidence seems to be remarkably firm and in the last two or three days the Stock Exchange has been quite booming.—In Sunday's *Dia*, Sr. Batlle y Ordoñez makes the remarkable discovery that there is a conspiracy against the "colorado" party, and that the whole object of the "accords" was to secure the transfer of power to the nationalist party! Those who have followed the question know how entirely contrary to fact this accusation is, but it shows how excess of partisan feeling corrupts the perception. The articles in the *Dia*, invariably intransigent and aggressive in tone, not merely towards the nationalists but towards everybody and everything that is not "colorado," are doing much mischief, and the problem is to know how far they are inspired or approved by Sr. Ocasio, with whom Sr. Batlle is supposed to be hand and glove. It is by no means the first time, however, that the "colorados" have assumed a bellicose and intolerant attitude towards the entire rest of the Republic. They are possessed of the true jingo spirit, which considers no opinions and no rights as worthy of respect outside its own circle, and whose intense self-satisfaction admits of no doubts or discussion and grows in an inverse ratio to merits and performance. The "colorados" never stood lower in public esteem than they have of late years, yet they have never been more arrogant, more intolerant or more completely satisfied with themselves, as may be seen by the articles in the *Dia* and other party organs. If this is not jingoism, then the word has no meaning.

Of other political matters, there is nothing worth mentioning for the moment.

THE QUARANTINE—INFESTED PORT OF MONTEVIDEO.
ADVENTURES OF R.M.S. "THAMES." — A SLAP IN THE FACE FOR THE SANITARY AUTHORITIES.
The monstrous reimposition of quarantine which our reckless and irresponsible sanitary authorities decreed on Friday has not been slow in producing results which have proved a sharp and well-merited slap in the face for those authorities, and have covered them with ridicule. Among the vessels already on the way from Rio Janeiro when the Decree was issued were the R.M.S. "Thames," and the French packet steamer "Atlantique" and "Pernambuco." Recognizing that these vessels had not had an opportunity of taking a sanitary inspection on board, the Argentine sanitary authorities, who are not entirely bereft of common sense and of regard for important material interests, decided that they should be allowed free pratique after disinfection on arrival, which was no more than reasonable. Small as this concession was, however, it was too much for the sanitary authorities here to grant. Mr. Morton, the agent here of the Royal Mail, in view of this, informed the Postal and Port authorities that the R.M.S. "Thames" would go straight on to Buenos Aires and under no circumstances would go to Flores Island if not allowed to come into port, and asked that arrangements might be made for the landing of her mails. But not even to this would the sanitary authorities consent. They insisted that the vessel must go to Flores Island and receive her sanitary visit before being allowed to perform any operation whatever—they even wanted to prohibit the agent from going alongside to speak with the captain and Mr. Cazali, the superintendent of the Company, who was on board.

Ludicrous Manifestation.

The consequence of this was that when the "Thames" arrived on Sunday morning, she merely took her pilot on board, and then put on full steam from Buenos Aires, with the mails and passengers for this port. She arrived at Buenos Aires in the afternoon, was promptly disinfectanted and given free pratique in time for the Montevideo mails and passengers to catch the river steamer, which brought them back during the night, and they were all landed here at day-break yesterday morning without impediment.

If the "Thames," conforming to the absurd imposition of the sanitary authorities, had gone to Flores Island, she would have been detained for twenty-four hours or more, have had to pay a number of additional fees, and her passengers would have been kept in quarantine until Friday or Saturday next—which, we believe is what has happened with the "Pernambuco."

Such a fact as this speaks more than a volume of comments, and even our native contemporaries have not failed to recognize its absurdity and monstrosity. Other questions apart, that mails for this port should have to be carried on to Buenos Aires before they can be landed here, merely because black-head and arbitrary sanitary authorities cannot or will not make a reasonable arrangement, is not merely an inequity, it is a national disgrace. But the attitude of the sanitary authorities in the whole business clearly shows that they attach more importance to the assertion of their own petty, discredited and grossly abused "authority," than to any consideration of material interests or public convenience. Not satisfied with imposing quarantines that are indefensible, they will not take a single step to make those quarantines as little offensive and injurious as possible; but, on the contrary, seem to take a positive delight in making them as objectionable as possible.

We understand that while the quarantine plague lasts, the example of the "Thames" will be followed by all the steamers of the Royal Mail Company, and in no case will they submit to the abuse of being sent to Flores Island as port of call, instead of the port of Montevideo.

Although this will cause considerable inconvenience, we not only consider the course perfectly justified under the circumstances, but we very strongly recommend every other shipping company to do the same, and establish, as far as possible, a general boycott of the port until the abuse is removed. Since argument, reason and expostulation have failed, this is the only course left, and we hope it may be adopted. Moreover, the experience of the "Thames" has shown that it is possible for mails and passengers to reach Montevideo via Buenos Aires quite as soon as, and perhaps even sooner than, if they stopped here and submitted to the quarantine impositions, whilst there is no doubt saving of time and charges to the vessel, and of expense and annoyance to the passengers.

The moral of the whole business is, as we have pointed out before, that quarantines are much more effective than the plague itself in driving vessels away from a port and ruining its trade and traffic.

As the affair of the "Thames" has excited considerable comment among our native contemporaries and in all business and shipping circles, it is just possible the matter may not end here.

to issue political and partisan cries, in favor of the "colorados" and of Dr. Julio Herrera, and against the "accords" and the present Government. These were promptly silenced by the police, but the character of the manifestation being thus betrayed, the Italians and the more respectable portion took an early opportunity of breaking away, so that when the column reached its destination in the Plaza Artola, it was reduced to some 100 or 150 persons. One or two would-be orators tried to speak on political topics, but the police interfered, and the whole affair broke up amid general ridicule and censure.

On account of this wretched manifestation the abuse was again committed of detaining and derailing the trams and wheel traffic in the centre of the city, for the greater part of the afternoon. This is especially annoying on Sundays, when movement is most general. As there is now a new Prefect of Police who seems to take some interest in his post, some representation should be made to him on the subject.

The idea of borrowing the patriotic date and events of a foreign community as cover for a political partisan manifestation cannot be too strongly censured. So far from being a compliment to the residence of a community, the affair was an affront and an insult to them which they would be justified in resenting—but we think they will understand that it is condemned by every right-minded person.

Regulation of Dentists.

The National Council of Hygiene has issued an ordinance regulating the practice of Dentistry, as follows:—
Art. 1.—In order to exercise the profession of surgeon-dentist in this Republic it is necessary to hold a title conferred or revalidated by the competent authorities and registered in the books of the National Council of Hygiene.

Art. 2. Dentists may make use, in brass plates, advertisements, cards and other means of publicity, only of the titles accorded them by their respective diplomas.

Art. 3. Dentists may have more than one consulting studio provided they can attend to them personally.

Art. 4. The sale is prohibited in Dentist's Studios of specifics, powders, pastes or liquid dentifrices or other medicines excepting in the case of no pharmacy existing within a distance of at least 25 kilometers.

Art. 5. The following will be considered as exercising illegally the profession of Dentist:

a. He who, without possessing a diploma in accordance with Art. 1, advertises himself publicly as such, with that or any other analogous title, by word of mouth or by means of plates, signs, advertisements, posters, cards or any other means of propaganda.

b. He who alone or under the direction of a qualified dentist practices anesthesia, the extraction of teeth or other odontological operations.

Art. 6. Chemists are prohibited from making up the recipes of persons who illegally exercise the profession of surgeon-dentist.

Art. 7. Infractions of Articles 2, 3, 4 and 6 will be punished with a fine of \$10, without prejudice to the penalties imposed by the National Council of Hygiene as disciplinary Tribunal in case of the recurrence of same. Infractions of Art. 5 shall be submitted to the competent judge.

Art. 8. Articles 2, 3 and 4 and the 2nd part of clause B in Art. 5 will come into force two months after the promulgation of this present ordinance; those of Art. 5 clause A and first part of clause B and Art. 6, from its promulgation.

Art. 4, we may point out, is utterly absurd, arbitrary and unnecessary. Many dentists prepare their own special powders, pastes or liquids for the teeth, and not a single reason can be adduced why they should not be allowed to sell the same, making a perfectly legitimate profit thereby. The Article is simply an example of the Council's meddling spirit and indifference to legitimate material interests.

Prosperous New Zealand.

The Agent General for New Zealand, says a recent London paper, has received a telegram from Wellington, New Zealand, concerning the financial statement which was delivered on Saturday night. The revenue of last year was £5,903,000, and the expenditure £5,479,000, showing a credit balance of £424,000, to which the balance brought forward from the previous year of £105,000 must be added, thus making the credit balance at close of the year £532,000.

The Public Works Fund expenditure last year was £1,809,000, and the receipts, including balance brought forward, were £2,041,000, leaving a balance of £232,000.

The revenue showed an increase over the previous year of £272,000, of which the customs contributed £73,000, railways £99,000 and other heads of revenue were proportionately increased.

The expenditure was increased by £339,000. Of this railways required £105,000, defence £64,000, miscellaneous £48,000, postal £27,000, and the permanent charges £50,000, which included £9,000 for old-age pensions. For close settlement, land acquired cost £186,000, the purchase of land being vigorously pushed forward, and this year heavy payments will be made. The public debt has been increased by £167,000, including £796,000 for loans imposing no burden upon the taxpayers, being immediately interest producing.

The Bank of New Zealand redeemed the £500,000 Preferred shares, the cash proceeds being paid over to the Public Trustee, who invested the amount in Government bonds. The loan for £500,000 issued in the Colony was very successful.

In 1891 the railways earned £2 18s 11d per cent. on the capital expenditure; in 1900, £3 9s 8d per cent. has been earned.

In 1891, the Post Office Savings Bank deposits amounted to £2,441,000; in 1900, these had increased to £5,809,000, showing an increase of £3,368,000.

The estimated expenditure for the current year is £5,764,000, and the estimated revenue is £5,899,000, the estimated surplus at the end of the year being £135,000; to this must be added £32,000 brought forward after transferring £500,000 to the Public Works Fund, leaving £167,000 for supplementary estimates.

It is proposed to raise £1,000,000 new loan, required for public works, which will provide for an estimated expenditure of £1,950,000, the surplus being £164,000.

No additional taxation is required.

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Why do we Drink?

We now and again come across patients who assure us that they never drink, a statement which it is our first and perhaps most natural impulse to regard as an exaggeration. So indeed it may be, for on cross-examination such patients will probably say "Oh yes, I take a little soup of course." Still the general statement remains true that there are people who never drink in the sense that they never use cup or glass, and there certainly are a large number of people who drink only very little, ridiculously little compared with those around. These are healthy people going about their business calmly, doing good work, and often doing it with far greater comfort than those who, with glass in one hand and handkerchief in the other, mope their faces and declaim against the sweltering weather. Thus we are led to ask: Why do we drink? and to answer that for the majority it is to a large extent a matter of habit and of self-indulgence. As the result of habit with many people, the slightest sense of thirst sets up longings which cannot be, or at least are not, resisted with the result that much more fluid is taken than is wanted. "Are you very thirsty?" inquired the doctor. "Well, no, sir, I take good care of that," replied the affable patient as he mopped his brow. Much of the constant drinking, not merely of alcohol but of fluids of all kinds, is quite unnecessary and only leads to flabbiness and discomfort. In considering the amount of fluid we ought to drink we must always bear in mind the quantity of water which is contained in our ordinary food. According to Parkes we may take it that we require for ordinary work about three times as much water as of food (calculated dry) namely, about 75 per cent. of the whole intake, and if we look at the table in which he gives the amount of water contained in the various kinds of food, we find how many articles carry with them more than the required proportion. For instance, beef steak contains 74, white fish 78, poultry 74, potatoes 74, cabbages 91, carrots 85, vegetable marrows 95, and even dry bread contains 90 per cent. of water. Gravies, sauces, etc., and all forms of milk puddings, also contain more than the full average supply of water required, so that it evidently would be an easy task to arrange a diet which, although solid enough for all demands, would not require to be supplemented by actual drinking. If, however, we will but partake of fluid in moderation, say 40 ozs. or 60 ozs. a day, we are the better for it, for certain foods require the production of a not inconsiderable amount of digestive juices for their proper assimilation, and if we persist in eating so much meat as so many of us do a fair amount of water must be taken to wash out the nitrogenous waste which such diet produces.—*Hospital.*

THE WAR.

A London message of Saturday evening gives some further details of the reverse at Utrecht. This occurred at Schepers-Nek, south of Utrecht, (Transvaal) and near the northern frontier of Natal. Gen. Gough was in command of the British troops. The Boers, numbering about 1000, advanced towards Schepers-Nek during the night, probably intending to penetrate to Natal and believing that the pass was not defended by British troops. They were near the point when they saw some small camp fires which the British advanced guard, not suspecting the approach of the enemy, had lit on the hill side. Gen. Botha, who was at the head of the Boer column, ordered an immediate attack. A desperate action ensued, concluding with a forced retreat of the British after losing their three guns, and over 200 killed, wounded or captured. The news of this reverse, adds the message, has caused a painful sensation, and the London papers recognize the failure of Lord Kitchener's proclamation, and are coming round to the opinion, that, since the war cannot be concluded by force of arms, it is time to think of peace by means of a just treaty. Other messages also quote opinions to this effect, but we have doubts of their reliability, especially when they represent the *Times* as calling for the resignation of the Chamberlain-Salisbury Cabinet.

Lord Kitchener reports having ordered the establishment of a new re-concentrated camp south of Kimberley. To this will be sent the families of all the Orange burghers remaining in arms after the 15th, and the property of the burghers will be sold by auction to pay for the keep of the families.

From Brussels it is telegraphed that the Transvaal Legation (*sic*) has published a message from Smuts-burger confirming the news of a fresh Boer victory at Viakfontein, in which the Boers captured a company of mounted infantry and two guns, after a short combat, and without loss on their side. It is added that at present there are some 480 British officers and men held prisoners in various Boer camps. These will not be set at liberty, as was done formerly, but will be retained as hostages to answer for the treatment given by Lord Kitchener to Boer prisoners taken after the 15th. The company captured at Viakfontein was forwarded at once to Steio's camp in Orange. — According to an afternoon message, however, Lord Kitchener reports that the Boers have set at liberty the men of the *patrol* captured at Viakfontein, and those captured at Hersebell, having no means of conveying them with them in their constant marches, but have retained some officers as prisoners. (This is the first reference in an English message to a reverse at Viakfontein.)

From Darban it is stated that the Boer troops have entered the colony, reaching the banks of the Tagela, and showing great activity. One commando is only 20 miles from Ladysmith — The *Morning Post* points out that the movement of Botha towards Natal offers a tangible objective for the British troops.

Lord Kitchener reports the capture of 54 Boers and 48 supply wagons at Carolus, Transvaal. He adds that Kritzinger has failed to cross the Orange, in a fresh attempt to invade Cape Colony, but in the last combat he killed a Lieut Colonel and a captain and captured a gun, which was afterwards retaken.

From La Hagne it is stated that the Dutch Foreign Minister Van Hyndon, who is also President of the Permanent Council of the Tribunal of International Arbitration, has laid before the Tribunal the demand of the Boer delegates for arbitration.

Lord Milner has decided to fix his gubernatorial seat at Johannesburg.

—RAILWAY.—The Central Uruguay Railway Company advertises a special night train to Paysandu, on Thursday, for the Live-Stock Show which is to be held there.

—CIBLS THEATRE.—An interesting composite programme is offered this evening for the benefit of the chorus, who, we have reason to fear, have not been paid their salaries too regularly.

—A SUBMARINE FLOTILLA.—The Hazard, torpedo gunboat, was commissioned on August 20th at Davenport by Captain Bacon, D.S.O., as the first step towards the establishment of a submarine flotilla for the British Navy. The first of five submarine boats, which are being built by Vickers, Son and Maxam, at Barrow-in-Furness, is expected at Davenport early in October. The five boats will be of an improved Holland type, about 80 feet long, with a surface speed of 10 knots, and a submerged speed of seven or eight.

—THE KING AS A PIPE SMOKER.—The State tells the following story about our King. In one of the principal clubs of the West End, a crowd of the "gilded youth" were discussing the things "that a fellow can't do, don't you know." Among the subjects which were condemned, the question of smoking a pipe, when attired in a frock coat and tall hat came to the front. The King—then the Prince of Wales—listened to the arguments for some time, and then joined in the conversation. "What," he asked, "is the City clerk, whose business requires him to wear the orthodox garments of the business world, to do if he wants to smoke? He has, perhaps, a short time for lunch, and cannot smoke cigarettes, while cigars are too costly for him. The young aristocrats were silent. Next day the Prince was seen walking down one of the principal streets of the Metropolis, smoking one of the condemned pipes—a yellow briar, of the "ball-dog" pattern, the pipe of all others which His Royal Highness detests most. I did as she bid me. I felt unaccountably apprehensive, dreading some further revelation.
"I have divined your meaning," she commenced gently, "and I appreciate the nobility of your motives. You would burden yourself with a spectre bride—a wife, and yet no wife!"

"Yes, Lucia, I love you so fondly that I am prepared to take you for better or worse."
"In spite of the cruel fact that—that would debar me from—from—being—being—anything more than—a wife in name to you?"

"Yes, in spite of all!"
"What if I tell you I am poor; that I have nothing save this house and a few acres of coconut plantations?"

"I would take you—you are priceless yourself."

"She gazed searchingly at me. 'Bring me that Testament,' she said suddenly, pointing to a book-case."

I brought it.

"Now, by the Cross on this sacred Book that I give into your hands swear you will marry me."

"I swear!" I murmured, kissing the emblem.

"Enough! Now wheel me to that escritoire."

I obeyed her. She produced a bulky document of several sheets stitched together. Turning to the last page, she told me to read it.

I read—only a few lines. It was a codicil to her will, bequeathing all her worldly goods to me, and at the foot appeared the witnessing signatures of two European pensioners, brought over from Cochín by Jansen for the purpose, as she told me. She then turned back and pointed to the total of a long tabulated statement of figures. "What is the sum?"
