POLITICAL NOTES.

Neither of the Chambers sat on Monday.

The elections, and with them the "accord," continue to be the main topic in political circles, and an angry tone is by no means wanting in the discussion. The Government is being specially attacked on account of the official intervention in the elections in Montevideo, though we cannot help thinking that the importance of the affair is being much exaggerated, especially as there were only three names changed, and those decidedly for the better, from the non-official list. If the whole exercise of official intervention throughout the Republic has only been in favor of three men, and those three whose worthiness to sit in the Chambers is beyond challenge and whom no one can accuse of being instruments of officialism, we think that the people and the parties may be very well satisfied. Beyond this the charge does not go at present, and it certainly does not seem to us sufficient basis for the violent attacks that are being made. If the Government never used its power to worse purpose than this, the Republic would go on very well indeed. But, on the principle, we suppose, that any stone serves to throw at a dog, there are some who think that any excuse serves to attack the Government, and who seem to lose all sense of proportion in their charges, making mountains out of molehills. For our part, we think the Government fully entitled to the respect, confidence and gratitude of the country for the manner in which the elections were conducted, a manner which shows the strongest contrast to what was the case in the times of Santos, Tajes, Herrera and Borda. If the enemies of the Government have no more substantial charge than this isolated act of intervention to bring against it, they had better hold their peace.

Nevertheless, the *Siglo* speaks of the matter in the following portentous terms:—"Sr. Cuestas is now in open struggle with all his party, and what is immensely more important, the country finds itself in a situation of alarms and distrusts which will maintain the depression of business, and prevent the accord, the port works, and the splendid harvests of this year, from giving the saving impulse so earnestly desired by the capitalist, the workman, the merchant, the producer, the estanciero and the farmer, tired of losses or of inaction, because all the horizons withdraw and no one ventures to trust the future." These are absurdly exaggerated terms to apply to a question which resolves itself into a difference of three candidates. — The "colorado" Committee, it is also said, regards itself as a deeply injured and offended body, and intends to make its grave displeasure known in various ways, and perhaps to carry its protest before the Chambers. This is not especially alarming. That the bulk of the "colorados" never have really supported the government of Sr. Cuestas is already sufficiently well-known, and the fact is more discreditable to them than to him, for it shows them hostile to the best and certainly the most respectable Government which has yet emanated from their party. And if it comes to a question of public confidence between the Government and the party Committee, we think the former will carry the day very easily, for the actions of the Committee have not succeeded in impressing the country.

To the arrests of Gens. Tajes, Arribe and Martinez, mentioned in our last, must now be added that of Gen. Fortunato Flores, effected on Monday evening. Other arrests have been rumored or are said to be pending, but of this there is no certain information yet. The question this time is not one of conspiracy, but of military discipline, the officers in question, all on the active list, having taken part in political meetings in which the Government was attacked and threatened. As the arrest is merely disciplinary, it will only last a few days and there will be no trial. Apropos of the incident, the Ministry of War has issued a circular, by no means superfluous, reminding military men on the active list that they are forbidden by the Regulations from joining clubs or bodies and from attending meetings of a political character. The course of the Government thus stands fully justified, and it may be congratulated on showing that it does not intend to be trifled with in the matter, but is even prepared to make an example of the highest officers on the list—Gen. Tajes is President of the Superior Military Tribunal. — It is worth mentioning that Gen. Tajes is the second ex-president of the Republic who has been arrested under Sr. Cuestas' Government. The other was Dr. Julio Herrera, who was deported to Buenos Aires, where he remains and is not wanted back again. Time was when the arrest of an ex-president would have set the Republic in a blaze—now it hardly occupies a paragraph in the papers. Our contemporaries try to disapprove the act, from sheer spirit of opposition, but their arguments betray their own weakness.

AMALGAMATION OF INSURANCE COMPANIES.
London, Oct. 24.

An extraordinary general meeting of the Phoenix Assurance Company took place yesterday afternoon at their offices, 19, Lombard-street, Lord Avebury presiding, to consider resolutions (1) for approving two provisional agreements—between the Atlas Assurance Company and this Com-

pany, and between the Atlas Assurance Company, this Company, and the Pelican Life Insurance Company; and (2) for forthwith registering the Company under the Companies Acts, 1862 to 1900, as a Company limited by shares.

The Chairman stated that, after mature consideration, the Directors had come to the conclusion that it would be to the advantage of this Company and of the Atlas Company that they should amalgamate. The Atlas Company was founded in 1808, and it had a long and honorable history; and for solvency and reputation everyone would agree with him that it stood second to none in the City of London, although it might not be so large as some other concerns. The amalgamation of two such offices had certain obvious recommendations. Having given figures showing the progress of the Atlas Company in the past fifteen years and its present satisfactory condition, he stated that if the resolutions submitted were approved, they would have a Company which would stand in a very strong position, with a premium income of no less than £1,700,000, with funds in hand of over £2,000,000, and with an uncalculated capital of £3,200,000. The suggestion was that they should give the Atlas Company 18,000 Phoenix shares, which would be divided among the Shareholders in the Atlas Company, who would get a very trifling increase of dividend—2s. 3d. a share. It was also hoped that the result of the amalgamation might be to increase the profits which would come to the Phoenix Shareholders. The whole of the Board of the Atlas Company would become Directors of the joint Company, but as vacancies occurred they would not be filled up, except for any special circumstances. The Phoenix was a fire company, and they had always been very closely connected with the sister office, the Pelican Life Company. The Atlas Company did both fire and life business, and the Phoenix would take over the former branch, while the life branch would be handed over to the Pelican Company, from which, in consideration of that transfer, the Phoenix Company would receive a certain amount. He concluded by moving a resolution approving the agreements. Mr. Edwin Ponsbury seconded the motion, which was carried *nem. con.* and the second resolution was agreed to, on the motion of the Chairman, seconded by Mr. B. Bovill.

A vote of thanks to the Chairman and Directors terminated the proceedings.

An extraordinary general meeting of the Pelican Life Insurance Company was afterwards held at their offices, Lombard-street, Lord Avebury presiding. The Chairman stated that the Phoenix Company, with which the Pelican Company had been in pleasant relations from the outset, had made an arrangement with the Atlas Company, by which the latter and the Phoenix would be practically amalgamated as regarded their fire business; and the Phoenix Company has suggested to the Pelican Company that it might be an advantage to the latter to take over the life business of the Atlas Company. The Directors felt that it would certainly be advantageous to avail themselves of the proposal. The premiums of the Atlas Life department amounted to about \$150,000, and the assets of that department stood at over £1,600,000. The Atlas life fund would be taken over as a separate trust from the policy-holders of that Company. The name of the Company would have to be altered to the Pelican and Atlas Life Office. He concluded by moving a resolution approving a provisional agreement, dated Sept. 25, 1901, between the Atlas Assurance Company (Limited), the Phoenix Assurance Company, and this Company, and authorising the Directors to carry it into effect.

Sir M. E. Grant Duff seconded the resolution, which was carried unanimously, and on the motion of the Chairman, seconded by Mr. Edwin Ponsbury, a resolution was afterwards passed for registering the Company under the Companies Acts, 1862 to 1900, as a Company with unlimited liability.

A vote of thanks to the Chairman and Directors brought the meeting to a close.

Modern Ambulance Work.

Berlin, Oct. 23.

Professor Klittner, a well-known surgeon, who served with Volunteer Ambulances during the wars in Turkey, South Africa, and China, has just summed up the results of his observations as follows:—
"Modern warfare has undergone important changes, if compared with the wars of former times, owing to the introduction of smokeless powder. Formerly the powder smoke served, to a certain extent, as a protection to the opposed forces; but at present only a light haze rests over the battlefield, and even this is wanting in windy or rainy weather. In South Africa it has often happened that slightly wounded soldiers, at the first shock of their wounds, have sprang to their feet in order to run to the Field Hospital to be bandaged, but in the next moment fell down, struck by several bullets. For this reason, it has been found impossible in South Africa, in the most in-

structive of modern campaigns, to begin to attend to the wounded before the end of the battle. All attempts to begin during the fight were fruitless.

"For example, in the action at Paardeberg, the result was that three surgeons and a number of ambulance men were shot. The Ambulance Service would generally not begin until the close of the action, and then it was very difficult owing to the darkness. After the engagement at Jacobsdal, the Service had to work until four a.m., because the rain and the darkness made it exceedingly difficult to find the wounded, especially because the colour of the khaki uniforms resembled that of the earth; and also because many of the wounded crawled behind stones and bushes for fear of the Kafir rubbers."

Professor Klittner then shows how important it is that the Sanitary Staff should exercise the greatest care on the battlefield. The first bandage often decides the fate of the wounded. He had especially good opportunities in Turkey of observing the vast amount of suffering caused by the examination and handling of wounds on the battlefield. In South Africa, also, especially after the action at Magersfontein, he was convinced that the mortality among the wounded was terribly increased by irrational treatment.

SPEECHES ON THE WAR.

London, Oct. 24.

Mr. Winston Churchill, speaking last night at a great Unionist demonstration, at Leicester, over which Sir John Rolleston, M.P., presided, said for two years past the English people had been passing through an experience and exhibiting a feat of strength unexampled in history. They had borne the burden without, so far, materially altering the mode and style of life of any class of the population. That was a wonderful and awe-inspiring state of affairs, but it was not one that could be expected to last for ever. The strain was enormous, and he felt the gravest doubt that it could be applied much longer without producing effects of which they would all be sensible. All the rights, principles, and advantages for which they drew the sword still depended upon the arbitration of arms. The cost of the war in blood and treasure continued; but the means of meeting it were gradually and seriously reduced. The war had ceased to be a supreme cause. It had become an unmitigated nuisance (laughter). Apathy, helplessness, and a strange, unhealthy sense of detachment subdued the nation, and overpowered the Government. Whether it be a matter of ending or of reforming the Army, or even of paying Yeomanry what was properly owed to them, it was necessary to stand over the War Office with a stick to get anything done (laughter). That was why they would do well to keep a sharp supervision in regard to affairs which so vitally affected their interests. He did not believe that everything muddled and disorganised was done by the Ministers and the civilian officials, and that all that was well arranged was done by the Generals. That might be the popular view, but it was not a correct one. On the contrary, it was largely through the mistakes and miscalculations of important officers that we had suffered as we had. British Generals faced the greatest dangers with composure, but it did not prevent them from making mistakes. For those mistakes they sometimes had to pay very dearly. They knew what he had in his mind when he said that it was a subject very painful to him, as it was to everyone else who served with the Army in Natal under a commander deservedly popular with the men he led (cheers). Yet he thought they would agree with him that it was quite impossible for any responsible man to dissociate himself from the action taken by the Government and Commander-in-Chief. Mr. Brodrick had sought to prove that all that could be done was being done to end the war. Everything was perfect enough except the result. After two years of war the Boer forces still kept the field, and, in spite of all our great Armies and Generals, in spite of all Mr. Brodrick could say, in spite of all proclamations, five times within a fortnight the enemy had assumed the offensive and three times with complete success. The complaints of the Army as to the horses supplied were continuous. Mr. Brodrick did not hear them. He lived in an atmosphere where outside evidence, if it ever penetrated, was regarded as frivolous impertinence. Everyone seemed eager to avoid responsibility nowadays. The people kept a careless eye on Parliament; Parliament surrendered its authority to the Cabinet; the Cabinet shovelled the whole weight of the war on to the overburdened Secretary of State, and he, in turn, threw it all on Lord Kitchener. The Commander-in-Chief was overpressed, through his own nature and the circumstances of the case, with minor details of every conceivable description, and the public interest suffered. They saw 69 mobile Columns in the field, but on what plan were they working? The Army wandered and trekked month after month on the chance of running up against a Boer, with the probability that when they were pressing him hard they would be called away to

something else. With that dangerous mismanagement before their eyes, they ought not to go on crying "Peace," when there was no peace, and "Confidence," when there was room for doubt (applause). He urged that the Government, who could not direct themselves of responsibility, should intervene in South Africa, to localise, delimit, and assign the functions of the Commander-in-Chief, so that he might be relieved of a multiplicity of duties he was unable to adequately discharge. Let them now begin to prepare for a new campaign. Let them make certain that, whatever else happened, they should have a refreshed army and a definite plan of action to start with, when the cold season arrived, so that, if the end did not come before, it should come then (applause). There were powerful arguments for letting things slide and trusting to luck, but unless bold and original action changed and controlled the course of events, the war might easily be prolonged in its present character until lasting, and perhaps fatal, injury was inflicted on Britain and those other nations whose fortunes were interlaced with their own. He urged the British people to remember that on their vigilance depended what Lord Rosebery called the driving power of Governments and armies (cheers).

THE WAR.

Lord Kitchener reports that a Boer column attacked a prisoners' camp which was guarded by a strong detachment of our forces at Villeradorp. Our forces were taken by surprise and unable to offer resistance, so that 350 were captured by the Boers, but were set at liberty later on. In the combat 6 men were killed and 24 wounded. Major Fisher and Capt Langford were seriously wounded. (It is very possible that the message has been mangled in transmission, and that the 350 were Boer prisoners rescued by their compatriots.)

From Pretoria it is stated that we lost 1 man killed, 1 officer and 3 men wounded in the combat at billersdorp, on Oct. 20, when the Boer Com. Buys was captured. Referring to the same combat, it is stated from Capetown that it was more important than was shown in Lord Kitchener's brief dispatch. The Boers attacked a detachment of 100 engineers. Com. Grobelaar succeeded in surrounding and capturing the detachment, but later on Col. Remington's column came to the rescue and after a sharp combat drove off the Boers who had to abandon their prisoners.

L'Etoile Belge (Brussels) asserts that one of the new commands which invaded Cape Colony last week, is under the immediate orders of Steijn, who has passed from Orange to the Colony in order to be present at a conference about to be held between the Boer leaders and those of the Afrikaners in revolt. Steijn's command is said to be only 250 strong.

A transport left Southampton on Monday with 700 infantry and 350 horses for the Cape. 1800 cavalry are to embark in the course of the week. Mr. Lynch, whose election as M.P. for Galway has given rise to serious riots in that town, will be indicted for high treason as soon as he arrives in London, having served with the Boers as Colonel.

SUNDRIES.

—St. Andrew's Banquet.—We remind our readers that the sixth Annual Banquet of the St. Andrew's Society of Uruguay takes place on Saturday next. Judging from what we hear of the preparations it promises to be one of the most successful of the series. The British Minister Mr. Walter Baring has accepted an invitation to be present. The services have been secured of the redoubtable piper Mr. Macpherson, from H.M.S. "Basilisk," who will discourse the music so dear to the hearts of Scots and by no means unacceptable to many who are not Scottish. The traditional haggis will take its wonted place on the bill of fare, heather

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from Scottish hills and thistles from Uruguayan plains will decorate the table, and none of the familiar features, that give special color and character to these pleasant gatherings, will be missing. In our next we will publish the programme of toasts, songs, etc. Those who have not yet secured their tickets should lose no time in doing so, applying for the same to any of the Committee or to the Secretary Mr. G. H. Ferguson.

MAILS.—The P.S.N. Co's «Lake Megantic» after the usual irritating detention at Flores Island, entered port yesterday afternoon, but too late to obtain the passenger list for this issue. The mails were delivered late in the evening, which for business purposes is the same as this morning, thus making an interval of eleven days since the last English mail, which brought only half a week's delivery. Now we will have the mail of a week and a half delivered in a lump, and, as we suppose, another mail by R. M. steamer on Sunday. These occurrences are both annoying and prejudicial to the many whose business depends on a regular mail service. Is this the best English enterprise can do? The British Government is lavishing hundreds of millions on this ghastly war in S. Africa, but we do not suppose a thousand pounds could be extracted from it to improve the English mail service to the River Plate and place it on a level with its European rivals, and thus do a little to foster British interests and prestige in this part of the world. And yet the Government boasts of its «imperialism»!

ENTERTAINMENT.—A Theatrical Performance will be given on board the U.S.S. «Atlanta» this evening by the Ship's Company of that vessel. We have not seen the programme, but knowing the talent of our American friends we are sure the entertainment will prove a success. We return thanks for an invitation to be present.

SAN FELIPE THEATRE.—A Spanish Zarzuela Company directed by the popular actor Sr. E. Orellana and containing several well-known artists, is now performing at this theatre, giving varied programmes nightly in «selections» and at popular prices.

DEATH.—The death took place yesterday, after a prolonged illness, of the veteran General Ventura Rodriguez whose services date from the earlier half of the last century, and who figured in the principal wars and revolutionary struggles of the Republic. He will be buried this morning with full military honors.

SMALL-POX.—Nine fresh cases were denounced yesterday morning. Cases are also occurring of measles and diphtheria.

GREAT FIRE.—One of the principal wool-combing factories at Ronbaix, France, was destroyed by fire on Monday, with all its stock. The damages are estimated at 2,500,000 francs, and 500 people are thrown out of work.

BURGLAR BURGLING.—A London telegram states that «the well known boxer Burgle» has been arrested on charge of complicity in the recent robbery of £170,000 from the Liverpool and County Bank at Liverpool. The principal, an employee of the Bank, is not caught yet, but the police are said to have a good clue.

SPANISH WAR-VESSEL.—The Spanish corvette «Nautilus», which is on a voyage of instruction, is now in this port, which it has visited twice before. Among the «middle» on board is the Prince Genaro of Bourbon, cousin of the King of Spain. The «Nautilus» will leave for Buenos Aires in a few days.
