BIG SPLIT IN THE LIBERAL PARTY

London, March 19th
In political circles it is stated that Mr. Lloyd George has advised the Liberal Members of Parliament that unless he can rely upon more loyal support from his followers, he will resign the leadership of the party. This statement has followed the earlier report about the resignation of Sir Archibald Sinclair to be presented as a result of of Monday's division which resulted in the defeat of the Government.

AFFAIRS NOT SO HAPPY IN INDIA

Bombay, March 19th
Gandhi is not so satisfied in regard to affairs in general and has stated "I hope that in the next few days most of the unreleased will be free, but at present I am receiving too many complaints to be free, but at present I am rather entirely happy".
Gandhi has been conferring with various Muslim volunteers complaining of homelessness, whom he promised to help.

SOUTH WALES MINERS DECIDE TO STRIKE

Cardiff, March 19th
Five thousand miners of the Ferndale and Tylorstown collieries have decided to strike immediately as a protest against the wage cut award.

WRECK OF THE S. S. "CHANG KIANG"

London, March 19th
Lloyds Agent at Shanghai reports that the French steamer "Chang Kiang" ran on the rocks of the Heiman Islands last Monday and was completely wrecked.

The report also states that fourteen of the crew are missing and that only a few were rescued by the French gunboat "Marne".

FATAL ITALIAN AIRPLANE CRASH

Pisa, March 19th
During a test flight being carried out by the well known air-pilots Maddalena and Cecconi the plane suddenly crashed into the sea. Both pilots and an assistant were killed.

STRIKERS AMBUSH SHERIFFS AND OPEN FIRE

East St. Louis, Ill., March 19th
A hundred metal workers who are out on strike ambushed a squad of deputy sheriffs who were on their way to protect labourers brought in to break the strike. Using a semi-circle of motorcars as a barricade, the strikers opened fire with revolvers and shotguns, and injured four of the deputies. A group of workers armed with shotguns reinforced the officers and returned the fire. Upon this the strikers retreated, carrying with them their wounded, of whom the number has not yet been determined.

SHIPPING SLUMP

London, March 19th
The slump in shipping is reflected in the fact that there are 122 vessels, with tonnage of 215,582, laid up in the Tyne compared with 65, with tonnage of 113,842, a year ago.

Reuter's Constantinople correspondent says that Soviet wheat dumping is responsible for an increase in 40 o/o in the tonnage that passed through the Dardanelles in 1930 compared with 1929.

AMAZING INCIDENT IN TEST MATCH NO REGULATION BAILS

A curious incident, without precedent in first-class cricket, held up the start of the last Test match between England and South Africa at Durban.

Chapman had won the toss for England, and with the prospect of getting quick wickets on a drying pitch, he put South Africa in. All was ready for the start when it was discovered that there were no regulation bails available for the larger wickets being used.

No other solution of the problem presenting itself, the umpires retired to the pavilion and hastily started to make a pair to the required measurements.

Meanwhile time which might have been of great value to England passed, and at length Chapman led his team on to the field as a protest. The seriousness of the delay is increased in view of the fact that rain restricted play to seventy minutes, during which South Africa scored 32 runs for no wicket.

An inquiry into the incident by the South African Board of Cricket Control has been promised by the chairman, M. C. Webber.

AMERICAN MEETS DEPRESSION

Moreover, the United States is completely unequipped with any kind of social machinery adequate for coping with such a problem. In all the leading cities funds for the relief of the sufferings of the unemployed are being raised by voluntary subscription; New York, for instance, is trying to raise six million dollars, which will prove a drop in the bucket as for as meeting the demands which will be made upon it. The British system of unemployment insurance has doubtless many flaws, but it has at least ensured that in a time of acute economic depression no one in Britain within the last ten years has died of involuntary starvation, and it will be impossible by the end of the present winter to say the same of the United States. The winter conditions which prevail in the northern half of the United States are much harder than anything which the unemployed of Britain have to face, and grim stories are already being told of the hardships of the poor in cities like Chicago and Toledo. Writing in the New Republic of November 12th, Mr. Bruce Bliven gives the following picture of the situation in Chicago:

"There is now no doubt that the suffering this winter among the unemployed and their dependants, to say nothing of the partially employed who are not eligible for charity and whose plight is therefore sometimes even more desperate, will be the worst in at least a generation. Everyone now admits that this will be the case; but even some of those who admit it do not seem to realise what it will mean."

He goes on to describe how on the lower level of Wacker Drive, the double-decked motor speedway

which runs along the river bank and carries traffic out of the congested district of the Loop, there are hundreds of unemployed men to be seen, ragged and penniless, camping out every night around little fires made from odds and ends of broken wood picked up on vacant lots.

Naturally, the vast army of workless people had lost confidence in the thesis that Republican rule is the only safe guarantee of prosperity, and a goodly number of the business and professional classes as well as farmers, who had formerly voted Republican took the opportunity to register their dissatisfaction at the November polls. The opposition candidates did not fail to exploit the situation, and Mr. Heywood Brown, the well-known journalist, who was running as a Socialist in New York, made a popular hit when he told an audience of unemployed "Pretend you are Belgians, and Mr. Hoover will soon look after you."

Again, the Republican leaders had pinned their faith upon the Emoot - Hawley tariff which had carried protectionism to its most extravagant heights in the country's history, but it has signally failed them. Its passage has been followed by the business slump of recent years, it has aroused hostility abroad which has had disastrous repercussions upon foreign trade, and it has failed to avert widespread unemployment. It was from the start very unpalatable to influential banking and business interests, notably the motor manufacturers, who felt that it would jeopardise their foreign markets; many of its schedules are wholly indefensible, and it furnished the Democrats with a wealth of effective campaign ammunition.

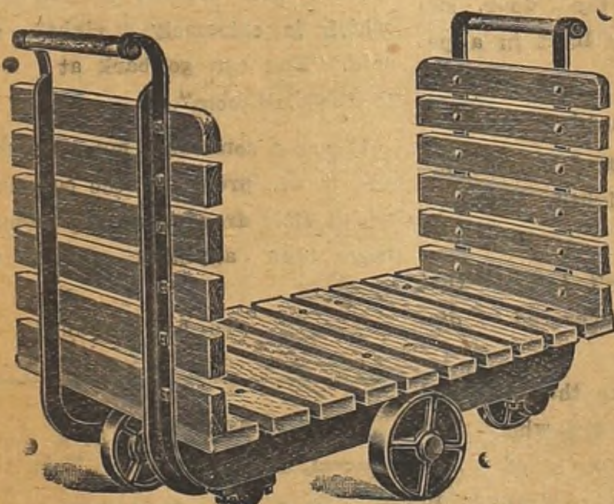
