King George Reported Much Better

Plenty of Money in Italy

KING GEORGE MUCH BETTER

Rio de Janeiro, April 8th

The Prince of Wales's private secretary has stated that no special arrangements have been made to keep the Prince advised in regard to the King's illness. He said that according to information received to-day the illness was not serious and that the King was much better.

According to present arrangements the Princes will leave Brazil on the 12th by the R. M. S. P. "Arlanza" calling at Recife, the last Brazilian port, on the 16th and disembarking at Lisbon on the 25th.

PLENTY OF MONEY IN ITALY

Rome, April 8th

It has been officially stated that the six and a half per cent loan of one hundred and fifty million lire for the city of Genoa has been over-subscribed fourteen times. This can be taken as proof of the abundance of capital in Italy seeking safe investment.

FRANCO-POLISH RAILWAY CONCESSION

Paris, April 8th

The Polish Government have signed a contract with the French Schneider Steel and Ammunition group, granting them a concession by which the French will build and operate a strategic and industrial railway from Silesia to the Baltic, the cost of which will be guaranteed by a Polish mortgage.

THE BERENGARIA REFLOATED

London, April 8th

Late reports state that the Berengaria which went aground on the mud to the east of Mab To-

wer. Isle of Wight, yesterday during a dense fog was refloated early to-day.

DICTATOR GANDHI

New Delhi, April 7th

Gandhi has decided to be the lone Nationalist representative at the London conference. He had previously intended that a delegation should go, and his decision has created a surprise and added to the complaints of the critics that he is assuming the role of a dictator.

Gandhi informed his collaborators that he had had so much success as sole representative in dealing with Lord Irwin in the recent truce, that he might repeat that success in London. Moreover, he argued, his hand would be strengthened in London if most of the Nationalist Cabinet remained in India to continue the Congress programme, thus convincing the British Government that the independence movement had come to stay and would increase in strength.

Despite the doctor's injunction forbidding visitors, in view of his poor health Gandhi continued his conferences with Lord Irwin over the weekend regarding the Moslem-Hindu problem.

GODLESS GERMANS ARRESTED

Berlin, April 7th

The police generally succeeded in preventing Communist and Godless propaganda during the Easter season. During the week-end 184 Communists were arrested in Berlin for disturbances of the peace, and 435 in Brunswick for attempting to form anti-church parades and hurling stink bombs.

A Nazi newspaper at Geldern has been suppressed for a month

as the result of having published an article offensive to the Reichstag.

LORD IRWIN'S

New Delhi, April 7th

Lord Irwin has promulgated an ordinance providing for punishment of two years' imprisonment, a fine or both, for the publication of statements likely to cause unfriendly relations between England and foreign States. Such publications are also liable to forfeiture or detention if transmitted by mail.

SAW THEIR OWN FUNERAL

Malaga, April 7th

An Italian named Ettore Vicenzio and a Yugoslav named Byestkoubandec, listed among the Florida dead, appeared at the respective consulates yesterday and said that they saw their funerals, after having roamed the streets for several days.

WEEKLY SALARY OF \$12,000

Chicago, April 7th

A \$ 1,040,000 suit for damages, charging the Sellsfloto Circus, the Ringling Brothers, Burnum and Bailey, and affiliated concerns, with conspiring to create a monopoly in the circus business, has been filed in court on behalf of the Western Show Company, Zack T. Miller, and Miller Brothers, of 101 Ranch.

The charges included enticing Tom Mix from the employ of the plaintiff to the Sellsfloto at a weekly salary of \$ 12,000.

THE KING'S HEALTH

London, April 7th

The King, who went to Windsor on Thursday, is suffering from a slight cold. It is not at all serious, but as a precautionary measure he is remaining indoors until the weather improves.

No bulletins are being issued, but was stated that his Majesty had passed a fairly comfortable night and was considerably better.

OUTH AFRICA'S AMAZING PERFORMANCE

Bloemfontein, April 7th

Sportsmen are amazed over the record-breaking 100-yard dash of J. Joubert, of the Stellenbosch University, on Saturday. They surveyed the track and discovered that it ran uphill for 30 yards and downhill for 70. Joubert covered the 100 yards in 9.25 seconds, beating the recognised record of 10 seconds made by Eddie Tolan, of the University of Michigan. Joubert's mark will probably not be recognised.

ST. LOUIS NEWS LETTER

J. J. Shubert, vice-president of the Shubert Theater Corporation and internationally famed as a producer of operetta and musical entertainments, has accepted the position of general productions manager for the St. Louis Municipal Opera's season of 1931.

Negotiations for his services were conducted and the contract signed in New York through the instrumentality of Max Koenigsberg and Arthur Siegel, acting on behalf of the Executive Committee and the Board of Directors of the

Shubert will begin his task of personally laying the groundwork for the season's successes. He will in person direct the selection of the 1931 casts, which will be made by the casting department of the Shubert organization, which has unequalled facilities to that end."

Prior to his sailing, Mr. Shubert had already begun the work of selecting his technical production aids for the coming season. These will include dialogue directors, dance directors, musical directors, scenic designers, costu-

"Fortunately is the only word to aptly describe the Municipal Opera's success in obtaining Mr. Shubert for its 1931 productions manager", said Koenigsberg in announcing the signing of the contract. "The Executive Committee and the Board of Directors have been busily engaged since the close of the 1930 season in seeking a man who would embody both the idealism of the Municipal Theater's purpose and the artistic experience and executive ability to carry out its plans for a greater season than the Municipal Opera has ever known."

"Immediately after signing this contract, Mr. Shubert sailed for Europe advancing the time of this annual journey for the purpose of obtaining novelties and operas for musical production in America in order that he might personally supervise the St. Louis season."

"Many of the novelties he proposes to procure in the course of his European visit will likely be seen on the Forest Park stage in St. Louis in the course of the coming summer, making their American debut in Forest Park, long before Broadway sees them."

"As soon as he returns Mr.

me designers and all those many lieutenants upon whose success in the perfection of details the artistic unity of the whole is dependent. Several of these staff members will be in St. Louis during the coming weeks to begin their preliminary work."

The Municipal Opera's chorus for 1931 will be again dominantly a St. Louis chorus.

An exceedingly valuable and important collection of more than 200 prints ranging from sixteenth century woodcuts to contemporary etchings has been presented to Washington University in St. Louis by Dr. Malvern B. Clopton, a member of the Washington University Corporation. The donor would not discuss the gift or estimate its worth, but some of the prints are known to have cost as much as \$ 8,000 each.

Included among the artists represented in the collection are Albrecht Durer, German master of the sixteenth century; Rembrandt, Dutch artist of the seventeenth century; the American, James McNeill Whistler; Francisco Goya of Spain, and Anders L. Zorn of Sweden.

About 40 of the prints are now on view at the St. Louis Art Museum in Forest Park and probably will remain there until a proposed museum is erected by Washington University.

Possibly the most valuable of the prints at the museum is a brilliant impression of Rembrandt's etching, "The Three Crosses" depicting the crucifixion. Two other etchings by the same artist are shown, "The Good Samaritan", and "Jan Lutma", a portrait.

Four of Whistler's delicate etchings appear in the same group. In two of them he pictures commonplace scenes in intimate fashion, one a view of a kitchen, the other a garden. The others are canal scenes in Venice. Four prints by Muirhead Bone, the American artist, including his portrait of Joseph Conrad, are shown. The others are "Manhattan Excavation", "Piccadilly Circus" and "Spanish Good Friday".

Dear Sir
In view of the fact that this Society had the pleasure of issuing to you a ticket for the Reception to T. R. H. The Prince of Wales and Prince George on March 21st, we are taking the liberty of calling your attention to the British Society and the objects which it aims to achieve, in the hope that, by becoming a member, you will decide to give it your material support as an institution, as well as your patronage of the entertainments it organizes.

The following extracts from the statutes of the Society will, it is hoped, afford such information as is requisite regarding the aims and objects of the Society in general and the conditions of membership thereof:—

To represent the British residents in Uruguay and to act in their name on all necessary occasions, whether of a national or international character.

To promote by every possible means a spirit of unity, cooperation, mutual helpfulness and collective effort among British residents.

To foster British patriotism and ideals.

To arrange for the fitting celebration of anniversaries and events of British national interest.

To promote friendly relations between the British and the Uruguayans and the communities of others nations.

Generally to deal with affairs of interest to the British Community in Uruguay.

Subject to the approval of the Committee, all British subjects by parentage or birth are eligible for membership on payment of the annual sum of \$ 2.00

In particular the Society undertakes annually the organization of Empire Day celebrations, which include an afternoon entertainment and tea, free to all British children, and a dance in the evening for adults, to both of which all British subjects are welcomed, whether members of the British Society or not.

An equally comprehensive invitation was extended on the occasion of the reception recently held in honour of T. R. H. The Prince of Wales and Prince George.

Having regard for its nature as an institution, it is evident that the services which the Society can

render to the Community have direct relation to its numerical strength and the degree to which it is representative of the Community and, consequently, for the common weal, it behoves all British subjects resident in this republic to support it by enrolling themselves as members: especially is this so in the case of those who have benefited, or wish to benefit, from the entertainments and functions which are organized by the Society for the Community it serves.

In conclusion we are directed to express the hope of the Committee that you will lose no time in attaining membership by filling in the enclosed form which should be sent or handed, accompanied by the annual subscription of \$ 2.00 either to the Honorary Secretary or the Honorary Librarian at the Victoria Hall (between the hours of 5 p. m. to 7 p. m. on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, and 10 a. m. to 12 a. m. on Saturdays) or to any Committeeman.

SPAIN'S FATEFUL HOUR

At the same time there was widespread resentment that the King should have connived at the establishment of a Dictatorship at a time when a strong moment of opinion was on the point of effecting a reform of the constitution in a democratic sense, restricting further clerical privilege and the Commission investigating the Annual disaster in Morocco, (1912), in which King Alfonso was said to be implicated, was about to issue its report.

The sequel covering the last seven and a-half years is familiar to us. At the end of ninety days, which was the original limit for General Primo de Rivera's emergency Government, the "new" men on whom he — and presumably the King — had staked his throw, had shown no sign of coming forward to replace the discredited politicians, and the Presidents of the Senate and Chamber respectively paid a formal visit to the King to remind him of Article 32 of the Constitution which imposed on the Moderating Power (the King) the obligation to see that an interval of more than three months should never elapse without a Cortes. In continuing to support the Dictator, King Alfonso technically broke his part of the contract with Cortes, although indeed his action might be construed as merely a formal recognition that the 1876 Constitution as it stood was a broken reed. Later on he was persuaded by General Primo de Rivera that it was necessary to break entirely with the past, and, having really very little choice in the matter, he agreed to sign a decree convoking a National Consultative Assembly whose business it would be to forge another and better instrument of Government.

This episode in 1927 widened the breach between the King and the old politicians, most of whom had

every intention of resuming Parliamentary life, when the Dictatorship should come to an end, as if the Constitution had merely been temporarily suspended. The suspension of constitutional guarantees had been a favourite expedient of the politicians themselves — a fact which greatly contributed to their unpopularity. Señor Sanchez Guerra, the veteran leader of the Conservative Party, went off to France in high dudgeon exclaiming against the King's perfidy and threatening to throw in his lot with the Republican enemies of "the throne and altar". But the King's action found a certain amount of favour among those who still hoped that the Monarchy might, as in early Spanish history, lead the nation out of its political morass. This hope became tinged with suspicion when the Dictator's Assembly of Notables produced a Constitution that gave more power to the King and, nominally at least, less power to the Cortes. For several months General Primo de Rivera allowed free discussion of this Constitution with the result that it was torn to rags. King Alfonso, scenting danger, made no sort of attempt to support his henchman's plan any further, and the product of twenty months' hard labour in the Committees of the Assembly was put into cold storage.

Going where I list, my own master total and absolute.

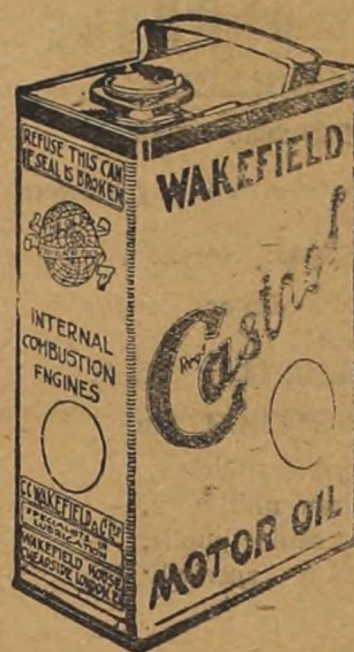
Listening to others, considering well what they say.

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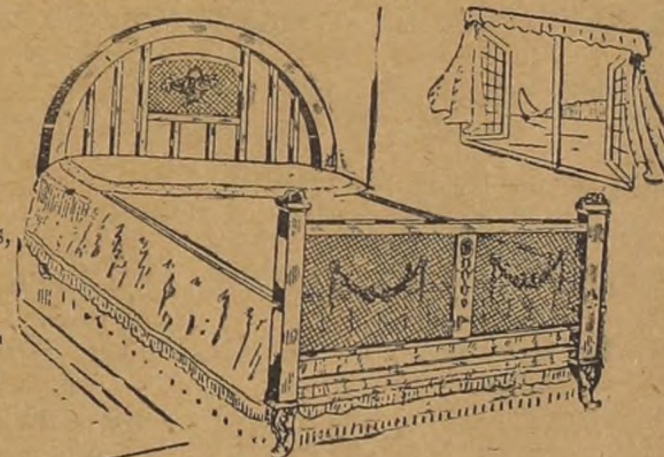

THE BRITISH TRADE EXHIBITION INVADED BY OUR COMMUNITY

We must commence this article by offering an explanation for our non-appearance on Tuesday and Wednesday.

As stated in our last issue the Printer's Devils were set to overhaul the type during the holidays and it was found that the type was in a sorry state and needed replacing.

To procure new-type a journey to the Argentine was necessary. Here Dame Fortune smiled upon us and the Royal Mail Company kindly took us under their wing and we become their guests to Buenos Aires and back.

We made the journey by the "Arlanza" (which by the way is honoured to convey T. R. H., the Prince of Wales and Prince George to Europe), and received the comfort and attention which is characteristic of the R. M. S. P. towards its guests and passengers.

A few words in regard to the specially prepared staterooms, which will be occupied by the Prince of Wales and Prince George.

The Prince of Wales will occupy the same suite that the King of Spain and Princess Marie Louise used during their voyages a few months ago, and very little has been found necessary to be altered. It is on the starboard side of "C" deck and comprises a private sitting room, bathroom, and bedroom.

The bedroom and sitting room are decorated with rich tapestries, and furnished in dark walnut. The bedroom, with nine artificial light points, has golden mother-of-pearl candle shade fittings to tone with the rich tapestries on the walls, and the whole appearance given by the suite is that of impressive and tasteful luxury.

Special attention has been paid to preparing the Prince's bathroom, which has been done in what is thought to be his favourite colour—pale Nile green. The walls are this colour, and the bath itself mauve. Even to the details of the soap has this effect been carried through, green and mauve tablets being already placed in readiness for the Royal passenger.

For Prince George, a similar suite has been prepared on the other side of the boat. This is decorated in cream and French grey, with beige and gold coverings. The furniture is of inlaid walnut.

Below on "B" deck, near the entrance from the main gangway, a large cabin has been converted into an official reception room for the use of the Royal passenger to receive guests at the various ports of call. Again deference has been given to the Prince of Wales's liking for green, the room being decorated with mosaiced green panels, and green silken curtains. These portions of the ship are being reserved throughout the trip for the Princes and are securely locked and guarded.

Once in Buenos Aires we lost no time hunting up what we were after, and incidentally discovered that our poor old eyes were also somewhat played out? Hence our delayed appearance.

We of course visited the British Empire Trade Exhibition, and had not been there long before we discovered that it had been invaded by Montevideo residents. Among those we saw visiting the Exhibition were: — Mr. and Mrs. Gallishaw; Mr. and Mrs. E. Stanham; Mr. Parkin; Mr. A. Coates; Mr. G. Ritchie; Professor Anderson; Mr. and Mrs. and Miss Moore; Mr. and Mrs. P. Towers; Miss Soper; Miss Andrews; Mr. West, of Frigidaire fame; Mrs. Maybrook; Mr. Warburton; Mr. Joint; Mr. C. P. Abbott; Dr. and Mrs. Truscott and Mr. Cris Coates. Besides these we heard of many others but did not see them.

Before entering into a description of the Exhibition we must mention that travelling by the "Arlanza" to Buenos Aires there were twelve Pipers from The 79th Cameron Highlanders who royally piped us into port much to the delight of the many passengers and the wild enthusiasm of the large crowd that soon gathered at the quay side. We learned that the Highlanders had done the same at Rio and Santos but had not done so at Montevideo, but we were

informed later that the whole Band (Which musters forty) intends visiting Montevideo in the near future and will stay a few days. At the Exhibition they give two concerts a day, the large enclosure being packed every time and we have seen such crowds as fifteen thousand people gathered to listen and see them parade. They certainly offer a grand show and are accorded a wild enthusiastic reception every day by the thousands of Argentine spectators. (To be continued)

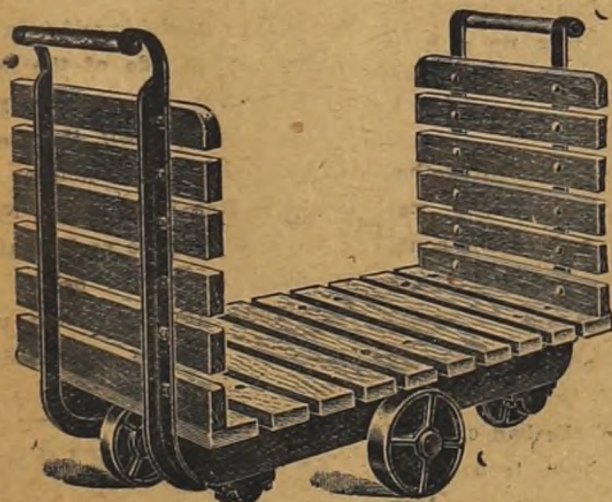
