POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives were convened for Saturday, and very diligently no-quaromed once more. The *Telegrafo* Moritimo of Saturday evening caustically asks if the Chambers are in recess or not. Almost the only circumstance to show that they are not in recess is the punctuality with which they present their monthly heavy claim on the public Treasury.

After a week's labor, the scrutiny or recount of the elections for Montevideo came to an end on Sunday. The Electoral Board has officially declared the result, which gives the triumph to the so-called official list, but by a much narrower majority than was at first stated. The Deputies elect for Montevideo are therefore as follows: — "Colorados," Dr. C. de Castro, Dr. A. Dufort y Alvarez, J. Serrato, J. A. Capurro, E. Iglesias, J. de Salazar, J. Saavedra, Dr. M. C. Martinez; *nationalists*, Dr. Rosalio Rodriguez, R. Vellozo, F. del Campo and A. Berro — Substitutes; "colo-ados," J. E. Rodó, L. B. Brito, A. Guillot, L. Varela, S. Martorell, F. Canfield, R. Ingoyen, J. G. Buela; *nationalists*, F. D. Segundo, J. G. Becerra y Garcia, A. Semeria and F. Buxareo y Oribe. (By the present electoral law, any vacancy occurring in the list of substitutes of the corresponding party color.) The Electoral Board, it will be remembered, refused to take into account a number of protests against votes cast for the "official" list because they were not formulated on the day of the election. When the new Chamber meets these protests will be presented afresh, and the entire election re-examined, so the above result is not yet final. We may add that Sr. E. Farias, police commissary of the 19th section has been reported by the Electoral Board to the judicial authorities, it transpiring that he signed discharges for a number of policemen (to enable them to vote) under a date when he was not in office. — In the rest of the Republic, we believe, the scrutiny has concluded without causing any changes, and without incident worth mentioning.

The Municipal elections took place on Sunday, with a minimum of interest, only some 4000 votes being cast, and these mainly from those under official influence, though at the last moment quite a variety of lists of candidates made their appearance. On the "colorado" side the abstention was general. The *Siglo* gives the following as the result, open to ulterior correction, Dr. J. Campisteguy, E. Canfield, Dr. J. L. Heguy, Dr. J. Cubiló, Dr. M. Lapeyre, H. Arco, F. Buxareo y Oribe, E. Monteverde and F. D. Segundo. Substitutes, A. G. Otero, A. Beiso, C. Spangenberg, S. Sosa, Dr. P. Diaz, J. Figari, J. M. Silva y Antuna, A. Raffo and Dr. M. Mattos. The result is not very brilliant, but nothing better was expected. The same tale of indifference and abstention on the part of the voters comes from most parts of the Republic. The emancipated elections which have been held this year will not stand in history as a shining example of the free exercise of the suffrage — in fact, though they cannot be called impure, it is difficult to say that they show much advance on those of five or ten years ago.

Rumors have been circulated, but have also been contradicted, that ex-president Gen. Tajes intends to apply for his entire discharge from the army, in order to enter actively into politics. Perhaps he dreams of

posing as candidate for the presidency in 1903, but we doubt if he would have much chance, for he has lost greatly in popularity and prestige of late, in fact is quite a "back number."

The Report of the Finance Committee of the Senate on the Budget for 1901-1902 has now been published. It is a short and feeble document, containing itself to proposing a few trivial alterations in civil salaries.

Payment of the local obligations for November will be commenced by the Office of Public Credit to-day.

The Argentine-Chilean Imbroglio.

The nearly chronic conflict between Argentina and Chile continues to attract attention, and gives the telegrams plenty to say, but without much possibility of extracting any definite information out of them, for the affair is always on the see-saw, that is to say up one day and down the next. For the moment the aspect seems fairly favorable, but that is no guarantee that it may not be reported the reverse tomorrow. The papers, of course, do their best to keep the matter alive, and there are not wanting the usual jingo newspapers on both sides urging to extremes, itching for a violent solution, and trying to arouse ill-feeling between the peoples. All this, however, has happened before more than once in recent years, so the hope is that the threatened storm may blow over this time, as it has done on previous occasions.

From the *B. A. Herald* we call the following: — Generals Menotti and Riccio Garibaldi have offered their services and troops to Argentina in case of war with Chile. In Paraguay too there is great anti-Chilean agitation because of the Paraguayan delegate to the pan-American Congress having been insulted by the Chilean delegate, so there are at least four republics itching for a slap at the jingo of South America. The press of Paraguay, Bolivia and Peru, and even part of the Brazilian press, is making Argentina's quarrel its own.

The *B. A. Standard* says: — "In the meantime the leading members of the British community are not indifferent to the difficulties of the situation. On Saturday Mr. Inglis Robertson, Don Guillermo White, Mr. Robert A. Thurnham and others met with a view to discuss the advisability of sending a petition to King Edward, praying His Majesty to expedite the work of arbitration upon which the situation hinges. We understand that a meeting of Britishers will be called next week and the community will be asked to sign the petition. Our Argentine friends cannot but view with pleasure the solicitude of the British community to put an end to the great uncertainty which has been caused by Chilean bad faith."

The German Duelling Scandal.

ASTOUNDING DETAILS.

Berlin, Nov. 8.
I have already telegraphed shortly an account of the duelling scandal which cost Lieutenant Blaskowitz his life. The circumstances, however, now prove to be so incredible that I must return to the matter. It appears that the officers concerned themselves realized the folly of fighting, but that the precious Court of Honor compelled them to meet. Lieutenant Kart Blaskowitz, who was only 25, was generally regarded as a very capable officer. On Thursday, the 31st ult., he gave a farewell supper to his bachelor comrades at the officers' mess. His friends do not seem to have noticed that he had drunk more than was good for him, for they allowed him to leave for home unaccompanied. In the fresh air, however, the punchbowl seems to have taken effect, for when Lieutenants Hildebrand and Rasmussen met him afterwards in the street he was reeling to such an extent that they decided to go with him. Unfortunately, they took him only to the neighborhood of his dwelling, thinking that he would then find his way home alone. They had left him and gone a considerable distance when they thought it would be perhaps better to turn back and see what had become of him. They found him on the same spot. He had evidently leaned against the wall of a house, slipped down into a sitting posture, and fallen asleep. They therefore took hold of his arms and tried to place him on his feet, when the tip of his sword struck at them in his sleep without knowing what he had got hold of. And this was sufficient to bring about the duel.

The next morning Blaskowitz went off to Deutsch Eylau to celebrate his wedding at the home of his betrothed. One may believe he was speaking the truth when he said that he knew nothing whatever of the occurrence of the night before. At Deutsch Eylau everything was prepared for the party, and the guests had already arrived, when a telegram was handed in from Lusterburg summoning the young officer to return, adding that he had been challenged by two officers, and would perhaps have to fight at once. The senders of the telegram knew that he had gone away to be married, and that his wedding was to take place on the Saturday. It was, of course, postponed

ed, and Blaskowitz left at once for Lusterburg. There he heard that Hildebrand and Rasmussen had reported the affair, and had challenged him.

At this point the Court of Honor took the matter in hand. Blaskowitz wished to settle the affair, of which he knew nothing, by apologizing to the two officers, and they agreed. One of them is even said to have withdrawn his challenge, but the Court of Honor decided that the meeting must take place. The Brigade Commander and the General commanding the division were both informed of this decision. On the evening, Pastor Blaskowitz, the officer's father with his wife, the Lieutenant's fiancée, and a captain of infantry, who is married to a sister of the young lady, all arrived at Lusterburg, where they heard that the meeting was to take place next morning. What these people must have felt that night we do not know. Pastor Blaskowitz did his utmost to prevent the duel, but in vain. The next morning the duel took place, and his son was shot dead. So much for justice and civilization in Germany under the spirit of militarism in the first year of the 20th century.

THE WAR.

News comes from Darban that Col. Colin John Mackenzie, military governor of Johannesburg, has captured the commando Symons (or Lyons). No further details.

From Capetown it is stated that a force of some 1000 Boers is about 20 miles north of Kimberley. Three columns of cavalry have sallied to the attack, whilst other troops are coming up from the Orange side. The Boers are believed to be under command of Gen. Delarey and Com. Maurits Mayer, cousin of Gen. Lucas Meyer.

From Pretoria comes news of the capture, near Jagersfontein, of the Boer Capt. Thomson, and of 8 armed Boers — near Wepener, south-east Orange.

According to a London message of Saturday, the Boers now in arms number some 20,000, not counting the rebel colonists. It is noted in military circles that the Boers change their tactics according to circumstances, and no longer follow the tactics of the time of Joubert at the beginning of the war. (Every second day a telegram appears giving a different estimate of the Boer strength. Probably, no one knows the truth.)

Further questions on various forms of intervention have been asked in the Dutch parliament, but in each case the Dutch Government has steadily maintained an attitude of non-interference.

Yesterday's *Standard* (London) commenting on the official refusal to intervene made in the Dutch parliament, asserts that recently the Dutch Government sounded the Powers to know if they would support Holland in a demand to remove to that country all the Boers in the reconcentrated camps, but they all answered in the negative.

According to a London message of Sunday, recent telegrams from Pretoria relate an enormous increase of mortality in the reconcentrated camps, attributed to the effect of recent heavy rains. This, the message adds, has caused a painful impression in Pretoria and greatly alarmed the military authorities; whilst in London the opinion is gaining ground that the system will have to be changed and the camps suppressed.

A London message of Sunday alleges that it is intended to remove the reconcentrated camps from Orange and Transvaal to pacific districts of Cape Colony.

The famous French dramatic poet Edmond Rostand has just published a Christmas ballad, describing in touching terms the sufferings of the Boer children in the reconcentrated camps.

On Sunday there was a big pro-Bour manifestation in Chicago. Before dissolving resolutions were passed calling on the U. S. Government to intervene in S. Africa.

SUNDRIES.

—SUMMER.—Summer, although according to the Almanac it is not due until the 22nd, has come upon us with a bound. On Sunday and again yesterday the temperature was up to full summer height, and at times reached over 90° Fahrenheit in the shade. This caused a tremendous rush to the bathing places, all of which were crowded. At Playa Ramirez the unusual expansion given to the religious ceremonial of "blessing the waters" provoked more ribald "chaffs" than respect. This has happened before, and it will be no loss if it leads to its suppression in future, for such a ceremony is really too absurd to exact respect even from the most fanatic, and is entirely out of date.

—WEDDING.—The marriage of Mr. Alexander I. Shaw and Miss Maria Concepcion Howard was celebrated on Sunday afternoon in the house of the bride's parents, only relations being present. Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Howard acted as sponsors and the witnesses were Mr. C. J. Shaw, Mr. T. Howard Jr., Mr. J. M. Murray and Don José Shaw. Later on there was a reception attended by a number of friends, the rooms being magnificently decorated for the occasion. The newly married couple received some exceed-

ingly handsome and costly presents. We believe that the honeymoon will be spent at Pocitos.

—TRAMWAY.—The Union and Maroñas Tramway Company is now running a direct service to the Playa Ramirez and the new Urban Park. The fare from the centre has been reduced from 8 to 6 cents.

—PASSENGERS.—Arrived by P. S. N. Co's "Iberia," from Liverpool, etc., Dec. 8.—Mrs. Montague and 4 children, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Alvarez and child, Mr. F. Brito; 14 third class. — For some unexplained reason, the "Iberia" failed to bring us the week-end dates, that is to say Friday and Saturday papers. This is about the first time we remember this occurring with a Pacific steamer, though it has been rather frequent of late with the Royal Mail line. So far as we can ascertain, the fault lies with the English Post Office, which takes little trouble to ensure connections and equally little interest in improving its very indifferent service to the River Plate.

—IMPERIALIST POLICY.—The Russian novelist Gorky, having written something that displeased the authorities, has been turned out of Moscow, and banished to the Caucasus in exile, while a popular manifestation in his favor was dissolved by force. This, of course, from the present point of view, is perfectly right. Under the sway of imperialism there is no room for liberty of the press or tolerance of opinion, as England is beginning to find out, and it is only those who fall under Mr. Chamberlain's definition of rebels, traitors, little Englanders, etc., who cling to old and ignoble ideas of toleration and freedom.

—ANNEXATION.—Under the caption "United States," our generally enlightened contemporary *La Razón* publishes telegrams from New York, Washington and Chicago, and three others from London dealing respectively with affairs in Sydney, Queensland and Bombay. We protest mildly against this wholesale annexation. The U. States have not yet conquered England, Australia and the East Indies.

—VARIANT.—We are quite accustomed to seeing our native contemporaries print "John" for John and "Thimes" for Times — they rarely do otherwise. For the former name, the *Tribuna*, with unexpected ingenuity, has now conceived a quite new variant, namely "Jonh." Next please.

—SHEER BRUTALITY.—Says a Buenos Aires contemporary: — "General indignation was created on Friday by the outrage perpetrated by a raffish Jack-in-office at the Intendencia de Marina on some hundred serving women and girls who went to look for work in answer to an advertisement in the papers. The cowardly official in question not only refused the work, but ordered two sailors to ply the hose on the crowd of poor women, who ran away, terrified at such brutal treatment, and soaked to the skin. It is to be hoped that the Minister of Marine will at once dismiss from the Government service the dastard responsible for this most disgraceful outrage." The two sailors (we may add on our own account) will probably excuse their share in the outrage under the pretence of obeying "superior orders," though to our mind they are equally guilty with the instigator. If they had turned the hose on the brutal official and drenched him until he would have served him right, and they would have acted like men instead of conscienceless machines. And for this manly act, which would have conveyed a wholesome lesson, they would have been severely punished for "insubordination," and perhaps hardly less so if they had taken a milder course and simply refused to obey the order. The incident becomes worth noting as an example of the degradation to which men can be reduced by the false notions of "discipline" and "unquestioning obedience" which are the essence of militarism.

—THE NEW PRINCE OF WALES.—The new Prince of Wales is the eighteenth holder of the title, if Richard of York, created Prince by Parliament, and the Old Pretender are excluded. His Royal Highness now receives the dignity at the age of 36. He was born at Marlborough House on July 7th, 1865, and he married, in 1893, at the Chapel of St. James's Palace, the Princess Victoria Mary of Teck. There are four children of the marriage, the oldest being Prince Edward, who was born at White Lodge in June, 1894. His Royal Highness is the only surviving son of the King. In his earlier years he was known to the public as Prince George of Wales, but on the birthday of her late Majesty Queen Victoria in May, 1892, he was by Letters Patent created Duke of York, Earl of Inverness, and Baron Killarney. As everybody knows, his Royal Highness has been for some years in the Navy, and he has always been credited with a strong liking for the sea. He has travelled much. His trip with his lamented brother, the Duke of Clarence, in the *Bacchante* was the first great tour he made. That tour, however, has been brilliantly eclipsed by the visit which his Royal Highness and his gracious consort has just paid to the more important of his

Majesty's dominions, beyond the seas.

—WENT HOME.—In a certain school there was a little boy who would persist in saying "have went." The teacher kept him in one night and said: "Now, while I am out of the room you may write 'have gone' fifty times." When the teacher came back he looked at the boy's paper, and there found the words: "Have gone fifty times." On the other side was written: "I have went home."

—PENSION FOR MRS. MCKINLEY.—In the House of Representatives on Friday, Secretary Gage proposed a pension of \$5000 a year to Mrs. McKinley.

—LIVELY BUENOS AIRES.—The young thieves of the city behaved more outrageously than ever at the Flower Corso on Thursday night. Carriages were assaulted and flowers and jewels snatched from the hands and persons of the occupants in the most brazen way. The police arrested 81 of the young vagabonds, but most of them got away with their plunder.

LONDON NOTES.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 9.

The King has conferred the title of Prince of Wales and Earl of Chester upon H.R.H. the Duke of Cornwall and York.

Last night's *Gazette* contained the first list of Birthday Honours issued since the King's accession to the Throne.

Convened by the South Africa Conciliation Committee, a meeting took place last night in the Memorial Hall to protest against the treatment of the Boer women and children in the concentration camps and the imposition of martial law in Cape Colony. Amongst the chief speakers were Mr. Leonard Courtney, who presided, Sir Robert Reid, M.P., and Mr. E. Robertson, M.P. Sympathetic letters were received from the Marchioness of Ripon, Dr. Fairbairn, and the Deans of Durham and Hereford.

Lord Edmond Fitzmaurice, speaking at Manchester last night, said we had drifted into the present situation by the arrogance of the Government and the impatience of Generals on the spot. For the first time in history we were engaged in a war, not to defeat armies, but to suppress the liberties of a nation.

Speaking at Bristol last night, Mr. Haldane, dealing with the war, said the paramount purpose of the British nation was to secure its position in South Africa and to make certain that never again should we find ourselves at the mercy of another dominant race which had armed itself against us while we were sleeping.

Miss Kate Greenaway, the well-known artist, has died at her home in Hampstead at the age of 55.

Judgment for the plaintiff was given by Mr. Justice Bigham in an action brought by Mrs. Philip, proprietress of a temperance hotel at Boxhill-on-Sea, against General H. O. Fletcher in respect of an agreement under which the General had resided in the hotel.

At the Barks Assizes, yesterday the three men accused of having robbed and thrown another man out of a train, after Ascot Races, were discharged—the jury stopping the case.

After a further hearing, at the Marylebone Police Court, the case against the self-styled "moral scientists" was yesterday adjourned until the 16th inst.

Thirteen persons, all giving foreign names, were brought up on remand yesterday at the Thames Police Court on various charges of stealing and receiving goods. The alleged operations of the prisoners were said to have been on a very extensive scale. The case was again adjourned.

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La Uruguay y La Cooperativa.

Dr. Taylor, Deputy Coroner, held an inquest yesterday into the circumstances of the death of Mr. Herbert Crawley, cashier at the Kensington branch of the London and South-Western Bank, who was shot by Joseph Porter last Monday, and also as to the death of Porter, who was shot during a struggle. The jury found that Porter had wilfully murdered Mr. Crawley and then committed felo de se.

In connection with applications for South London music and dancing licences, the L. C. C. Theatres Committee yesterday considered opposition based on alleged inadequate payments to stage employees, musicians, and waiters. In no case did this opposition affect the Committee's decision.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 11.

The King's birthday was enthusiastically celebrated in London and the country on Saturday, and congratulatory telegrams reached his Majesty from all quarters. There were the usual illuminations in the West-end in the evening.

There were several effective features in Saturday's Lord Mayor's procession, which, starting with unwonted punctuality, made its way without mishap through gaily-decorated streets that were even more densely thronged than is usual.

Lord Salisbury, speaking at the Guildhall banquet on Saturday night, declared that satisfactory progress was being made with the war, denied that any blame in connection with it was due to the Government, spoke of the friendly and correct attitude of foreign Powers, declared that the intentions of Ministers were unchanged, and announced it to be their desire that the territories affected by the war should enjoy at once after the making of peace "the freedom and civil rights and, at the earliest possible moment, the circumstances of the time will permit, those other blessings of self-government which so many of the King's self-governing colonies enjoy."

In a speech at Wolverhampton on Saturday Sir Henry Fowler dealt with the procedure of the House of Commons, and referred especially to the time that had been wasted in divisions and questions of minor importance.

Speaking at Scarborough on Saturday at a gathering of Liberal agents and secretaries, Mr. G. Compton Rickett, M. P., said they were all waiting most eagerly for Lord Rosebery's coming pronouncement in Derbyshire. It was impossible for them to forecast it. They would be delighted, of course, to find they had so powerful a leader, who had returned to his post in the ranks of Liberalism.

While the British warship Royal Sovereign was manoeuvring outside the harbour of Astake on Saturday a big gun burst and killed an officer and six men. The captain and 13 men were wounded.

Mr. Frederic Harrison spoke last night at Newton Hall upon the recent judgment of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in the case of Marais, and said that no more insolent defiance of law had occurred in England since the time of the Stuarts. He also denounced the deportation of Miss Hobhouse as a violation of the constitutional rights of British subjects.

Mr. Mark Mayhew appealed to the King's Bench Division to set aside a conviction by the justices of Buckinghamshire for driving a motor-car to the common danger. The appeal was dismissed. The Lord Chief Justice and Justices Darling and Channell held that the justices were entitled to convict on evidence of a high rate of speed though no particular passenger was shown to have been in danger.

Glasgow International Exhibition closed on Saturday night. The grand total of attendance was 11,496,220, or double that of the Exhibition of 1888.

There was interesting play in the football field on Saturday. Under Association rules the English League defeated the Irish League, Sunderland were beaten by Stoke by 3 goals to nil, and Sheffield United defeated Notts County. In the Second Division Stockport and Woolwich Arenal played a drawn game at Stockport. Results included the defeat of Cambridge by Cheshire, Northumberland beat Yorkshire, and Somerset defeated Cornwall.
