EXPLANATION BY SOVIET PRESS

Moscow, Nov. 5th

The official mouthpiece "Izvestia" in an editorial accuses the Japanese military party of "fabricating the fable of the red menace in Western Manchuria" for the purpose of justifying the seizure of additional Manchurian territory. At the same time it charges the Western Governments, especially France, with having hurriedly accepted the fable in their anxiety to foment war against the Soviets. But "let the Western and Eastern gentlemen incendiaries of wars invent absurd rumours about the Soviet Union for the benefit of imperialists of all nations. If they still do not know, they will eventually know, that who sows the wind, reaps the whirlwind... the position is very clear. Instead of removing troops, the Japanese military party are preparing for an extension of their occupation to Northern Manchuria. Heretofore they have tried to justify their occupation by Chinese banditism, but that argument no longer convinces anybody. They need a new argument to serve the invaders at least until Nov. 16th when the League of Nations returns to the scene of the Sino-Japanese conflict." Wherefore "the slanderous invention" about the Soviet assistance to General Ma Chan-shan. It is impossible not to doubt that the Japanese Government believed these rumours for a single moment. It has organs able to ascertain their absurdity".

Citing the readiness of the newspapers in France, the United States and elsewhere, to believe serious stories against the Soviets, the article continues "The Japanese Militarists are preparing for the military occupation of Manchuria, hoping to weaken the resistance of other Imperialistic powers by raising the prospect of a war against the Soviets which certain imperialists circles desire.

London, Nov. 5th

The final results of the municipal elections in London complete the Labour rout. The Conservatives gained 189 seats and lost two. Labour gained no seats and lost 210. Party gains and losses in London and

ITALIAN INDUSTRY BROUGHT UNDER GOVT. CONTROL

Rome, November 5th

Mussolini, with a stroke of the pen, began fulfilling the promises of his Naples speech when he caused the transfer of the Banca Commerciale's industrial operation to the Bank of Italy or the National Bank, thus placing the financing of industry directly under Governmental control.

This stroke is assuredly one of Mussolini's methods for remedying the ills of capitalism by approximate nationalisation, though it still maintains the principle of private ownership.

This move generally considered as the first interpretation of Mussolini's declaration, "Fascism going to the people", and that it will avert the present failure of capitalism by finding improved methods in the distribution of wealth.

The Italian Government has long ceased to favour the controlling of the basic industries by the strong Italian banks, and have waited for the present occasion to answer the bank calls for Government help to meet the prolonged crisis.

London, Nov. 5th

The Admiralty has issued a statement that no ratings will be punished on account of the occurrences at Invergordon when the naval strike took place, but twenty-four have been dismissed on account of their continuance of subversive conduct after their return to home ports.

AIR MAIL

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CHILEAN RAILWAY ENTERPRISE

London, Nov. 5th

At the 50th annual meeting of the Taital Railway Co., of Chile the chairman, Mr. Frank Henderson regretted that the 50th anniversary should have coincided with the lowest net receipts since 1891, which was attributed to a decline in the consumption of nitrate, the result of the world depression in agriculture.

Mr Henderson said that administrative costs has been cut to a minimum, as the balance sheet disclosed.

N. W. URUGUAY RAILWAY

London, Nov. 5th

At the annual meeting of the North Western Uruguay Railway the chairman, Mr. Frank Henderson, declared that there was a decrease in traffic in every branch principally in goods and livestock. The net revenue was £ 4,712 leaving a debit balance of £ 5,906 after providing for the interest on the debentures, the bridge toll guarantee, exchange on remittances and sundry outgoings. The report and accounts were adopted.

CURRENT PROBLEMS OF WORLD ECONOMICS THE CASE AGAINST RATIONALISATION

By Prof. T. Gregory, D. Sc (Continued)

For these professions themselves offer great prizes to successful contestants, and, in any case, before the right selection can be made among the successful outside the industry concerned in the choice, these contestants themselves may have reached a time of life when elasticity of mind and readjustment to new conditions may no longer prove easy.

Mere size may prove a delusion in another direction. At any given moment, granted a certain grade and quality of leadership, an effective limit to the scale of organisation is given by the human factors involved. There are, however, technological factors as well. Beyond a certain point an increase in the scale of organisation results in technological inefficiency, to a rise and not to a fall in costs of production. It is a commonplace of economic science that 'division of labour is limited by the extent of the market'. This implies that a scale of organisation unsuitable to the extent of the market will work with greater overhead costs than would have been the case if the unit of production had been smaller; but a wider significance even than this attaches to the point under consideration. It is not possible, as Mr Jewelles, for instance, has shown in the case of textiles, absolutely accurately to dovetail all processes in an integrated enterprise: in a word, the optimum size for particular processes is not necessarily the same, and the net cost to an enterprise of attempting to co-ordinate processes with different optima of operation may well be greater than the cost of the marketing mechanism, which would otherwise have integrated them through a less organically associated type of structure. It is possible, no doubt, to dispose of issues such as these by the easy assumption that expert knowledge will indicate the point at which to stop. But expert knowledge can only determine the optimum point after that point has been settled by a process of trial and error. To sum up, there is no reason whatever to suppose that large-scale organisation is inherently more stable than small-scale organisation. And there is, at all events, the certain fact that the scale of losses involved when mistakes are made is definitely greater: a fact well illustrated by the events of the present world-wide depression of trade.

The preceding discussion leads to two important conclusions. In the first place, there is no reason for supposing that what is true of some industries is necessarily true of all, and that the inevitable trend of industrial organisation is universally towards large-scale organisation. Putting the same point in another way, the minimum conditions for the emergence of large-scale organisation are, firstly, an elastic demand for the products of the industry necessary in order to justify large-scale production; and secondly, technological features which enable increasing returns, i. e., diminishing cost per unit as the output rises, to be realised. It does not follow that an industry which exists to supply a large aggregate demand is one which necessarily

SHIPPING NEWS STEAMER LOST OFF LAND'S END

The steamer Opel, of Glasgow, foundered during a severe storm near the Longship Light-house, Land's End. Captain Campbell and Chief Engineer Daly were drowned. They refused to leave the ship when the boats were launched.

The Opel was bound from Antwerp to Cardiff with a cargo of maize. One of the crew said: "The cargo shifted about three in the afternoon, and the ship took a heavy list and began to drift. She was in such a precarious state by half-past-four that we took to the lifeboats. The seas were high and waves broke over us. One of the boats was upset three times and was righted again each time by the crew. It was a terrible experience. Just as we were about giving

SHIPBUILDERS' DIVIDEND MAINTAINED

R. and W. Hawthorn, Leslie and Co., shipbuilders and engineers, of Newcastle-on-Tyne, are one of the few concerns connected with the ship-building industry which have increased or maintained their dividends during the last few years. For 1927-8 3 per cent was paid on the 716,550 ordinary shares of £ 1 each; for 1928-9 3 1/2 per cent, when the profit had increased by £ 10,185 to £ 36,802, the distribution was increased to 5 per cent. This dividend required £ 35,827, and it is to be repeated for the year ended June 30 last, although the profit fell slightly to £ 35,398. The carry-forward is accordingly reduced from £ 18,606 to £

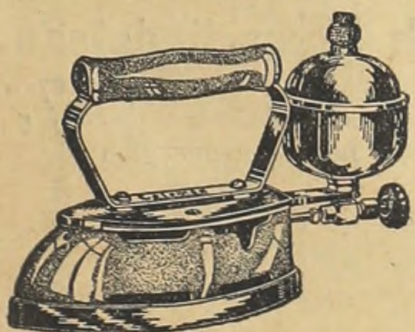

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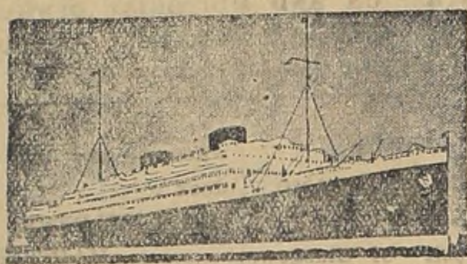

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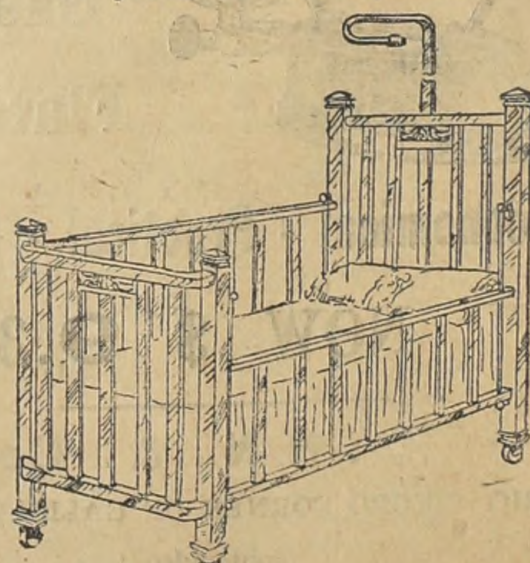

THE CAUSE OF COLDS

The inability of doctors to cure or even to explain the common cold has long sapped the layman's faith in the medical profession. A long step towards removing this reproach has been taken by Professor A. R. Dochez, of Columbia University, New York, and his collaborators. Their experiments, which are described in the current number of the "Lancet", show beyond doubt that the cold is caused by a virus small enough to pass through any filter and to elude the power of any microscope, and that the ordinary bacteria which have shared the blame for colds in the past are, in fact, present only as camp-followers of the true virus. Professor Dochez succeeded in cultivating the cold virus, and in producing typical colds both in chimpanzees and in human beings with it. To have discovered the culprit is not, of course, the same thing as to have outwitted him. But it is the indispensable first step. If the cold virus can be isolated and cultivated, its habits can be studied and methods evolved either of attacking the virus itself or of counteracting its evil effects. That does not mean that we can look forward to the discovery of some magical cure which we have only to swallow or sniff to be free of colds for ever. Our strongest weapon against colds will continue to be, as against most infectious diseases, to take reasonable precautions against distributing them. If infectious persons could isolate themselves for the first few days of their colds we should make good progress towards the control of colds, even without knowing just what the cause of colds may be. Now that Professor Dochez has explored the cause, it should be possible to devise more specific and effectual precautions. But it will still rest with us sniffers and sneezers to carry them out.
