MORE STATISTICS.

Still recurring to the Statistical Annual, we will now proceed to deal with the Exports of the Republic. As these, however, are subject to considerable fluctuations both in quantity, nature and value, far more so than is the case with the imports, it is necessary to take more than one year into view at a time in order to form a correct idea. The Annual here helps us by grouping the three years 1898-1900 together and we summarise its tables as follows:

Exportation.

1898 \$ 30,276,916
1899 \$ 30,574,164
1900 \$ 29,410,862

The figures for 1899 are by far the highest of any year on record, whilst those for 1898 and 1900 may be considered as a little below the average for the decade. The three years together, therefore, will afford a fair general view.

The exports are divided into six schedules, which stand as follows, taking the three years in their proper order:—

1. Live Stock.—\$936,926;—\$280,006;—\$534,215.
2. Slaughter-house and live-stock products.—\$26,243,597;—\$33,539,140;—\$26,606,528.
3. Agricultural products.—\$3,315,543;—\$2,354,978;—\$1,669,617.
4. Other products.—\$279,811;—\$316,699;—\$475,658.
5. Various articles.—\$4938;—\$3145;—\$6902.
6. Provisions for vessels.—\$96,101;—\$100,196;—\$119,941.

(The above figures, we may here mention, differ slightly from those we have previously published at intervals, as this is the first time they have been issued with official correction. In no case, however, are the differences of importance. A similar remark applies to some of the importation figures given in our last issue.)

From the above it will be seen at a glance that practically 90 per cent. of the exportation of the Republic consists of slaughter-house and live-stock products, thus showing where lies its chief source of wealth. Agricultural products make up another 8 to 9 per cent., and the remaining schedules are insignificant. We will now analyse the schedules.

Live-stock. This consists of animals exported to Brazil and Argentina for slaughter or breeding purposes. Cattle occupy first place, the numbers being 30,843, 24,672 and 60,572, and value \$224,958, \$209,682 and \$466,152. Sheep numbered 114,903, 71,848 and 60,004, the value being \$57,452, \$35,924 and \$35,157. Horses, mules, swine and goats make up the remainder for relatively small amounts.

Slaughter-house and live-stock products.—We here come to some important figures, so take the principal items separately. The figures correspond to the three years in their proper order.

Horns (from slaughter-house), number 186,137, 215,293 and 2,071,411; value \$97,091, \$118,919 and \$156,214. A small quantity of horns from camp (field) is also exported.

Horsehair, Kilogrammes, 804,739, 770,614 and 724,745; value, \$305,801, \$316,903 and \$349,956.

Asbes and bones, Kilos, 13,460,616, 15,487,382 and 16,935,054; value, \$147,685, \$124,333 and \$148,909.

Jerked beef (tanajo), Kilos, 51,965, 166, 58,919,429 and 57,546,810; value, \$6,474,860, \$7,039,355 and \$6,042,345.

Preserved meat, Kilos, 189,763, 193,845 and 200,937; value, \$37,953, \$38,769 and \$40,117.

Meat extract, Kilos, 482,395, 564,474 and 579,416; value, \$1,447,185, \$1,693,422 and \$1,319,157.

Salted ox hides, Number, 773,433, 881,622 and 821,787; value, \$3,458,831, \$3,929,831 and \$4,980,422.

Dried ox hides, Number, 469,363, 653,278 and 628,236; value, \$1,233,082, \$1,763,436 and \$2,012,738.

Dried kips and calf-skins, 1900; number 649,664; value \$162,395 (not exported in 1898 and 1899).

Salted kips and calf-skins, 1898; number 439,081, value \$109,770; 1899; 344,331, \$92,824 (not exported in 1900).

Salted horse hides, 1900; number 17,558; value \$85,106. (Small quantities in 1898-9.)

Sheepskins, Kilos, 7,645,870, 3,294,581 and 4,626,002; value, \$1,409,867, \$1,879,471 and \$982,675.

Lambskins, Kilos, 335,143, 230,355 and 200,045; value, \$65,548, \$77,087 and \$9,010.

Hoofs, Kilos, 722,566, 708,995 and 575,421; value, \$21,677, \$22,047 and \$23,019.

Ox-grease, Kilos, 1,486,223, 1,433,537 and 1,943,437; value, \$140,491, \$155,806 and \$223,495.

Genao Kips, 5,567,774, 6,238,351 and 4,660,708; value, \$111,355, \$121,277 and \$70,410.

Wool, Kilos, 41,011,562, 39,314,616 and 26,755,134; value, \$10,716,158, \$14,271,628 and \$8,024,959.

Preserved tongues, Kilos, 683,770, 1,006,589 and 889,674; value, \$132,754, \$201,318 and \$177,927.

Ostrich feathers, Kilos, 33,378, 28,342 and 22,371; value, \$40,554, \$42,359 and \$14,067.

Tallow, Kilos, 13,484,480, 14,039,355 and 14,450,422; value, \$1,255,493, \$1,494,718 and \$1,661,799.

Guts and sinews, Kilos, 393,463, 698,070 and 569,785; value, \$11,304, \$20,942 and \$15,092.

Amongst secondary articles under this schedule, the exportation of which only occasionally reaches any importance, may be mentioned the following:—concentrated meat broth, marrow, liquid meat, horn pits, and dried blood.

Agricultural Products.—Wheat, Kilos, 77,231,392, 62,673,190 and 39,871,606; value, \$2,405,716, \$1,367,750 and \$950,465. (This is a very variable product, depending largely on the season. In 1901 the exportation fell to a very small amount, owing to the failure of the harvest, but we cannot give the figures.)

Maize, Kilos, 12,575,855, 10,926,407 and 485,551; value, \$170,101, \$130,057 and \$7381. (This is even more variable than wheat.)

Wheat flour, Kilos, 11,296,103, 20,726,000 and 18,128,562; value, \$601,214, \$659,680 and \$595,420. (This is naturally subject to the same variations as wheat.)

Bras, Kilos, 2,361,518, 7,769,909 and 3,234,324; value, \$26,919, \$91,255 and \$38,813.

Linseed, Kilos, 1,113,506, 604,632 and 400,890; value, \$33,555, \$18,974 and \$15,983.

Amongst secondary products under this schedule, none of which yet reach importance, may be mentioned pollen (fine bran), onions and garlic, lucerne, barley, fresh fruit (\$28,818 in 1899 and \$6036 in 1900), forage, broom-straw and spurge seed.

Other products.—Sand; tons, 151,694, 170,278 and 224,461; value \$121,855, \$141,278 and \$24,461.

Paving stones, Value, \$24,171, \$37,458 and \$57,507.

Sealskins, Number, 14,891, 14,942 and 15,177; value, \$59,564, \$56,768 and \$45,351.

Common stone, Tons, 47,725, 55,568 and 148,069; value \$1 per ton. Minor articles are nutria skins, fox skins, leather cuttings and hides.

The "Various articles" consist of old metal and rags, and the sixth schedule explains itself.

A BRITISH ACADEMY.

Various rumours which have been current during the past half-year are corroborated by the announcement in last night's *Gazette* that a petition for incorporation has been presented to His Majesty on behalf of a new body, "the British Academy for the Promotion of Historical, Philosophical, and Philological Studies." The object of this national and Imperial institution is to do for the various departments of literary science what the Royal Society has achieved for natural science. The question of a British Academy has often engaged the attention of scholars, but the solution of the problem has hitherto been complicated by the recognized difficulty, if not impossibility, of dealing adequately with letters, poetry, and fiction. The new Academy leaves these out of its immediate view; it aims solely at the promotion of the study of moral and political sciences, including history, philosophy, law, politics and economics, archaeology, and philology.

The immediate causes which have brought into special prominence the want of such an institution in England are briefly the following. At a meeting of the representatives of the chief European and American academies held at Wiesbaden in October, 1899, a scheme was drawn up for the organization of an International Association of the principal Scientific and Literary Academies of the world. The scheme provided for the division of the association into two sections, a section of natural science and a section of historic-philosophical science. While the Royal Society represented at the association the United Kingdom in the section of natural science, no existing institution was at that date of sufficiently comprehensive character to represent British learning in the section dealing with historical, philosophical, and philological studies. The defect called forth expressions of profound regret and surprise on the part of the international representatives assembled in Paris in 1900, and the anomalous state of affairs became all the more conspicuous when the International Association decided to hold its second meeting in London in 1904, the direction of the association passing to the Royal Society at the beginning of the present year. Englishmen were thus at length forced to recognize the want of a society representative of the various branches of literary science in this country, and certain representative scholars met, for the first time, at the British Museum on June 28 last, and after long and careful deliberation resolved to promote the establishment of a British Academy of Historical, Philosophical, and Philological Studies on conditions which would satisfy the requirements of the International Association of Academies. It was further decided that the Academy should petition for incorporation by Royal Charter, and that the nomination of the first Fellows under the

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives held their second preparatory sitting on Thursday. Dr. Benito M. Canavari was definitely elected President of the Chamber, with Dr. José Romen and Dr. Francisco Socca as 1st and 2nd Vice-presidents respectively, the voting being nearly unanimous. The Powers Committee recommended a lengthy Report, recommending a complementary election for Maldonado, as the second on the list had not obtained a legal majority, but approving all the remaining elections in dispute. With regard to the election of Sosa, Navarrea, Martinez and Salera for Montevideo, the Report expressed the opinion that their election could not be impugned without equally impugning the election of the others on the list, which had not been done, and that the alleged irregularities or illegalities were not clearly proved nor were they sufficient to vitiate the election. It was therefore recommended to approve their powers and to ask them to withdraw their resignations. Discussion of the Report was deferred. All the Deputies present then proceeded to take the oath in the usual form. It was resolved that the Chamber should sit on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 3 to 6 p. m. The Permanent Committees were then named as follows:—

proposed charter should be forthwith taken in hand. Before the close of last year, on December 17, the British Academy held its first meeting at the British Museum, and petitioned His Majesty for incorporation by charter.

There can be no doubt that the grant of the charter will tend greatly to the furtherance of the objects which the society has in view, that it will exercise an influence towards maintaining a high standard of learning, and will be fruitful of national advantage by according to students of history, philosophy, philology, and kindred studies throughout the British Empire their due representation among the academies of the world. The promoters of the project have already received encouragement and congratulation from the highest quarters, and notably from the officers of the Royal Society, who have held out the right hand of fellowship to the new-born sister society and have conveyed their warmest wishes for its continued and increasing prosperity.

According to the draft Charter, the petitioners for the incorporation will be the first Fellows of the Academy, and the President and Council will be elected by the Fellows from amongst their own number. New Fellows will be elected at a general meeting of the Fellows, from among persons who have attained distinction in some one or more of the branches of scientific study which it is the object of the Academy to promote. The government of the Academy will be vested in the Council, and in the Fellows assembled in general meeting. The Academy may elect honorary and corresponding Fellows, but an honorary or corresponding Fellow shall have no voice in the management of the affairs of the Academy or in the election of new Fellows.

The announcement in the *London Gazette* states that His Majesty has referred the petition to a committee of the Lords of the Council. Notice is further given that all petitions for or against such grant should be sent to the Privy Council Office on or before February 14 next.—Times.

THE NEW AMERICAN BATTLESHIPS.

Uncle Sam is slowly but surely making up his mind as to what he really wants in the shape of a fleet. His two new battleships are to be the largest in the world. We do not notice in these battleships that kindly foresight which has been extended by our Admiralty on at least one occasion to the domestic comfort of an admiral in his flagship. There appears to be no arrangement for the transport of that officer's wife and family, as has been the case on the North American Station. This strange unconcern is deplorable—in times of peace. The new ships are to be of 17,604 tons displacement. Their horse power will be 16,500, with a speed of eighteen knots an hour. The triple screw has been abandoned on tactical grounds, wood sheathing has disappeared, and improvements have been effected in the situation of the magazines as well as in facilitating the supply of ammunition. The armament is enormous. The superposed turret has fallen into discredit. There will be four 12 in. guns in the turrets, and eight 8 in. in the angles of the superstructure. The battery will contain twelve 7 in. quick-firers, protected by 7 in. armour. It is said that the new 7 in. gun will pierce seven inches of armour at about a mile and three-quarters. Thus the American Board seems to have decided the relative advantage of armour piercing v. high explosive projectiles to some extent in favour of the former. There will also be twenty 3 in. quick-firers, twelve 3 pounders, eight 1-pounders, and two machine guns. Torpedo officers in this country will note with disapproval the absence of torpedo armament in the new ships. The decision of the Board of Construction in this matter must be based on the belief that the battles of the future will be decided in the main by long range firing. We suppose the idea is that when by displacement ships drift near enough to each other to bring the torpedo into play, the contents of the great fighting machines will by that time be nothing but scrap iron. The new cruisers are to have four 10 in. guns in the turret and sixteen 6 in. guns; their armour being from 7 to 20 per cent. as compared with the 22 to 28 per cent. allowed to the battleship. They are to have 25,000 horse-power, and a speed of twenty-two knots. As there can be but little doubt that in the naval Armageddon of the future we shall be fighting side by side with these ships, we cannot but take an interest in the latest designs of the American Board of Construction.

THE WAR.

The telegrams do not vouchsafe as any further information of the recent combats, nor is there any fresh news of military operations.

It is stated officially from Pretoria that, according to information furnished by Boer prisoners, the number of Boers still in arms is about 12,000. It is added that nearly all the commands are well mounted and munitioned, and that the leaders are determined to continue the struggle until they secure their independence.

On Thursday 1338 troops were embarked at Southampton, and 1015 horses at New Orleans, for the Cape. Attention has been again called to the violation in Capetown of letters sent from Germany to Delagoa Bay. It was pointed out that on the first occasion the British authorities made the excess that the military censors acted in ignorance, but that excuse can not be advanced a second time. The German Government has made a formal complaint on the subject, and is awaiting the reply of Gt. Britain. It is added that great dissatisfaction has been caused in Germany by the refusal of the British authorities to allow a German commission to go to the concentrated camps to distribute the funds and other supplies collected in Germany for the relief of the Boer prisoners.

Mr. Chamberlain has been presented with the freedom of the City of London at an enthusiastic meeting held in the Guildhall.

SUNDRIES.

—CARNIVAL.—Carnival follies will be resumed this evening, when we are promised a torchlight procession of comparas and maskers through the central streets. Tomorrow afternoon there will be a procession of comparas and bicycles, a competition of fancy-dressed children in the Club Uruguay, and in the evening the usual "corso." We may note that the *Rosón* has again discussed the advisability of reviving and reforming Carnival as one of the summer attractions of the city. Like ourselves, it insists that one of the first steps must be the relocation of the offensive street boy to the back ground, an event which, it points out, would follow as a natural consequence if the comparas were better organised and subjected to a reasonable amount of control.

—THOSE TELEGRAMS.—This is how the telegrams play with the health of President Roosevelt's son.—9th. Dangerously ill with pneumonia of a malignant character.—10th. Much worse, not much hope held out for his recovery.—12th. Much better.—13th. Quite out of danger. It is nothing new, however, for the telegrams to credit a person with being on the verge of death one day, and out of all danger a day or two after. Any attempt to reconcile their statements would only lead to insanity.

—CASINO.—It is now said that this place of amusement will not be reopened until March 1st—and perhaps not then.

—TRAMWAY.—The city tramway traffic during the three days of Carnival was as follows:—Sunday 85,088, Monday 80,194, Tuesday (bad weather) 61,150; total for the three days 226,432.—The Paso Molino line is trying the experiment of lighting its cars with electric light.

—FATAL SOAP.—A departmental paper has a tale to the effect that a man has killed another by striking him on the head with a bar of soap. Either the soap must have been uncommonly hard, or the head uncommonly soft. Anyhow, it is the first time we have heard of soap being used as a lethal weapon. Perhaps we may next hear of some one having his throat cut by a pond of butter.

—ARRIVED.—The German Royal Yacht Hohenzollern, conveying Prince Henry of Prussia on his visit to the United States, entered New York harbor on Thursday afternoon.

—STREERABLE BALLOONING.—In the bay of Monaco Santos Dumont has made another entirely successful trip with his balloon No. 8, keeping an average distance of 100 metres above the level of the water, attaining a speed of 22 to 23 kilometres per hour, and steering the machine in any direction he wished. It is now considered as certain that he will have no difficulty in crossing the Mediterranean, but his first experiment will probably be a trip to Corsica.

—THE NEW ALLIANCE.—In the House of Commons, on Thursday, Viscount Cranborne explained that the principal object of the Anglo-Japanese Alliance was to defend the integrity of Chinese territory against the advances of the great Powers, for which purpose the armies and navies of Gt. Britain and Japan would act in concert whenever the rights of either in the Extreme East were threatened. There seems to be an idea that the United States may enter into the alliance.

—DEATH.—We much regret (says the *B. A. Standard*) to announce the death of Mrs. Edward Casey, which occurred at her late residence 640 Belgrano 1385 after Tuesday morning. The deceased lady had been in delicate health for the last few years, but about six months ago her illness became so pronounced that her case became hopeless and her husband and family became resigned to the inevitable fate which came to release her from so much suffering in the early hours of Tuesday morning. Mrs. Casey, who was the eldest daughter of the late Mr. John Gahan, Navarro, was taken to Ireland when quite young, where she was educated. She returned with her parents and sisters to this country in 1874 and two years afterwards on April 25th 1876 she was married in the Parish Church of Navarro to Mr. Edward Casey, by the late Rev. Father Curran. Her married life was very happy and indeed she

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always tried to diffuse happiness and cheerfulness wherever she went. She leaves a family of four children, besides her husband, three brothers and three sisters to mourn her loss.

NORTH VERSUS SOUTH.—We quote from the *B. A. Herald*.—The three days' cricket match at Palermo, between eleven from the North and from the South, resulted in overwhelming defeat to the gentlemen from the North. Sunday's play developed only 35 runs for the first innings of the North team, while their opponents were able to compile a score of 251 for only 6 wickets. The remarkably exceptional feature of the day was Dornig's bowling; he secured 8 wickets for 11 runs. J. O. Anderson's 107 with but a single chance, was also worthy of note. On Monday there occurred a repetition of the day, though moderated somewhat. As on the previous day, the bowling of H. Dornig was a prime factor; only 40 runs were made for the 6 wickets he took. When stumps were drawn, the scores for the day were 86 and 297, for North and South respectively. Play for Tuesday, the third and final day of the match, was prevented by rain.

LATEST.

In the Chamber of Senators yesterday afternoon, Dr. Juan Carlos Blanco was re-elected President of the Senate and therefore Vice-President of the Republic by ten votes out of eleven. Drs. J. R. Mendoza and A. Vasquez Acevedo were elected 1st and 2nd Vice-President of the Chamber respectively.

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LONDON NOTES.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 16.

Ministerial dinners were given last night at their private or official residences by Lord Salisbury, Mr. Balfour, and the Duke of Devonshire. Sir H. Campbell-Bannerman, the Leader of the Opposition, entertained some of his political supporters.

Upon the reassembling of the House of Commons to day it is expected that Mr. McCarty, the Nationalist member for South Down, will apply for the Children's Bill.

Shortly after noon yesterday the King inspected at Wellington Barracks a draft of 1,200 men from the Guards' Brigade, who are about to leave for South Africa. The ceremony attracted a large crowd of spectators. Amongst those present were the Prince of Wales, the Duke of Connaught, the Duke of Cambridge, and the Commander-in-Chief.

Another meeting of the Court of Claims was held yesterday in the Privy Council Chamber. The Court held that a prima facie right to the office of Hereditary Knight Bearer for Scotland had been established by Mr. H. Serrymour Wedderburn.

Sir J. Gordon Sprigg, Premier of Cape Colony, having sent to Sir Wilfrid Laurier a New Year message expressing the hope that peace would soon be restored, the Premier of the Dominion has replied: "I hope the New Year will see the re-establishment of peace, harmony, and good feeling."

Yesterday the Conference on Old-Age Pensions was concluded at the Memorial Hall, when resolutions were passed affirming that the cost should be met by the State out of Imperial taxation, that every citizen, male or female, should be entitled to a pension from the State at the age of sixty, and that the pension should be at least five shillings per week. The Parliamentary Committee of the Trade Union and Co-operative Congresses were requested to promote an Old-Age Pensions Bill on these lines.

He was silent an instant, looking away from her. It was hard work to hold himself in so that he should not distress her again.

She put her hand into his. He held it an instant, then he suddenly bent his head and kissed it.

"You'll forgive me that, won't you?" he said with a rather unsteady laugh. "No need to send for the servants; I won't do it again. But it's good-bye, you see."

CHAPTER II

The rebellion in Rhoogapoor beyond the north-west frontier of India was at its height. Our memory nowadays is not long for the details of repressed risings against our rule by unappreciative natives; we are too much occupied with affairs of greater importance to follow them with keen interest for more than a moment longer than they last. But we have not had time yet to forget the main facts of the rising in Rhoogapoor, half religious half social, which at first impressed the Indian Government and the home authorities with the idea that it could be stamped out in about six weeks, and which afterwards dragged its annoyance on for more than six months. They come with abrupt unexpectedness, they sting and sting sharply, you slap at them with force enough to finish them twenty times over if only you could touch them, and, whizz!—they are away, these light-moving, irritating foes, beyond your reach, only to return again at your next unwary moment.

In lonely districts difficult of access by reason of hill country known to the agile enemy, and not at all known to the British, and by reason also of the entire absence of roads worthy of the name, the guerrilla warfare in Rhoogapoor bore its most serious aspects. For here the leaders of the rebellion could do pretty much what they liked owing to the before-stated reasons, and were able to be more constant and less spasmodic in their attentions to any unfortunate English garrison that was struggling to hold our outposts of civilisation.

In one of these inaccessible districts lies Kondol, the little village that for a short time possessed a fame out of all proportion to its size because of the gallantry and determination held within it, and for the same length of time was regarded by Murgah Singh, the rebel leader, and his followers, as inhabited by devils of a peculiarly dangerous description, but with the consoling self-off of capacity to feel the tortures which should presently be inflicted on them when Kondol fell into native hands. At home those "devils" were known by the smoother name of the "Surrey Greys," the "Southshire Fusiliers," and the "Duke's Own Lancers," but they had not seen the shores of "home" now for half a year.

A composite detachment of the three regiments sent to chase a rebel chief who was believed to be within reach with a small number of men with him had only learned how false native information can be by meeting a foe that outnumbered them in about the proportion of twelve to one, and finding that they had lost their colonel and one or two other officers, and were in imminent danger of being destroyed to a man, they had as an alternative fallen back on Kondol, and turned the open village into an impromptu fort, which they had held with desperate courage ever since.

On one morning, five weeks after they had been so trapped, Major Light, who had succeeded the Fusilier colonel in command of the garrison, sent for the senior of the few surviving officers under him. The responsibility and strain, ably seconded by the climate, had done their work on him, and he lay on his chagrin the mere shadow of

what he had been, with cheek bones standing out under the tightly-drawn skin, and eyes that had been brilliant in an earlier stage, but were now ghastly dull. He moved a little as the Captain entered, and looked up at him. "What are the beggars doing?" he asked feebly. "Any sign of the attack Ahmad talked about?" "Not a sign," replied Ryswick, looking down at him with rather anxious eyes, though his tone was cheery. "They're quieter than usual, not so much drum-banging. I've just been round the top of the works and watched them a bit."
