POLITICAL NOTES.

Neither of the Chambers met on Monday. It was the turn of the Senators, but (etc., etc.).

The Government recently addressed a circular to all the Departmental Chiefs asking inquiries as to the existence of locusts in the Republic. No reply has yet been received from Canelones, Minas and Rocha, but the other Departments are reported as free from the plague, with the exception of Cerro Largo, where some small clouds made their appearance in a few districts and were quickly exterminated or driven away.

Awaiting the presentation of the new schemes which the Government has in hand, there is no topic of special interest. A number of representative tobacco manufacturers and dealers have conferred with the Minister of Finance regarding his recent Customs Bill. The exact result has not yet transpired, but we understand that they have more or less convinced the Minister of the objectionable nature of the tobacco stamp tax and may induce him to propose its repeal. The *Prensa*, we may remark, expresses the opinion that the reduction of the duty on tobacco ought to be far more radical, so as to do away with the temptation to contraband, and thus uproot the bands of professional smugglers and the smuggling habit. The argument is sound enough, but it should not be limited to tobacco alone. The remarkable part is, however, that this opinion should be expressed by the *Prensa*, which as a rule is an ardent defender of the high protective system. Is it possible that the official party is at last awakening to the fallacy and evil effects of this system? It will be a happy day for the country when it does.

Uiquiza Theatre.

The Wheeler-Erwin-Jolly Company.

This delightful Company scored another great success on Monday evening in *The Treaders*. We had seen this as given here by another Company some three years ago, and did not think much of it, but as presented on Monday we were able to recognize in it a most amusing and picturesque piece, with a more coherent argument than in the case with the majority of musical comedies, and an abundance of melodious and interesting music from the clever pen of Ivan Caryll. A better evening's entertainment could hardly be desired, and the audience—an unusually large one for a Monday evening—was not slow in testifying its approval; in fact the numerous encores (some of them double) prolonged the performance until well after midnight.

The piece was capably played all round, and if there was no one super-excellent, neither was there a single weak point, it being one of the notable features of this Company that the secondary and minor roles are just as well played as the principal one. Mr. Herbert Walton was highly diverting as *Sammy Gigg*, and once again he found a capital partner in charming Miss Gertrude Parker, (Susan) who was as part vivacious and graceful as ever. The scenes, duets and dances in which these two take part never fail to please and amuse, and they have promptly established themselves as favorites. Mrs. H. Lane Bayliff gave another of his clever and quickly Jr. H. impersonations as the languid *Archie Slackith*, scoring, throughout the piece, Mr. E. C. Carter made an imposing *Carajola* (there was a pleasing diversity of opinion as to the pronunciation of this name, but none ventured on the Spanish method) and sang his *Treaders* with capital effect. Mr. T. Leonard gave some good comedy and excellent dancing as *Pellifer*, and Mr. Manning, Mr. Needham, Mr. Clifton and Mr. Ryley all did well in less prominent parts. A word of praise is also due to Mr. Slater for his *Water*.

The ladies (we have already mentioned Miss Parker) all did so well that it is difficult to know which to mention first. *Teresa* found a very handsome and effective exponent in Miss Cissie Raymond, Miss Sylvia May was charmingly girlish as *Dora Selby*, Miss Noel Neville no less charmingly mannish as *Nancy Stanton* in male attire, and Miss G. Aylward was both amusing and pleasing as the widow *Mrs. Mallon Hoppings*. Miss W. Raymond gave an admirable Spanish dance in Act II; in fact the dancing all through was remarkably good, and some of the vaunted Spanish dances from the Casino might have learnt a lesson or two. The Flower Shop of Act I and the Plaza Villaya of Act II were two beautiful specimens of scenic art, and the costumes were again rich, varied and artistic. The orchestra had one or two momentary lapses, but for the most part did very well indeed. The overture, in particular, was capably rendered.

"L'Esper"

At the British Association.
York, August 6.

Bank Holiday found the British Association appropriately enough discussing the physiological value of rest. The little hall in Goodramgate, which the Physiological Section had hitherto found equal to all demands, proved utterly inadequate this morning. Many visitors had to go away and many more had to stand while Dr. T. D. Acland was opening the discussion.

There is no ground for supposing that hard physical exercise is any sufficient compensation for hard brain work," said the doctor. "On the contrary, both bodily and mental activity each require its own period of rest; if bodily activity is added to hard brain work an amount of rest is necessary."

Rest and more especially sleep were necessary to make up for the waste resulting from physical and mental work. For the young, rest was essential to growth. Short hours of rest did not tend to promote efficiency and keenness of mind and body in the average boy. Loss of rest tended to check clearness and rapidity of brain function, and to diminish bodily and mental vigor. Insufficient sleep diminished the power of resistance of the individual, and rendered the young more liable to contract preventable ailments.

The discussion was continued by Dr. Bervan Lewis, who agreed that there was danger in the widespread opinion that a change of occupation implied a relief to fatigue. It was necessary to consider more fully the question of the proper amount of sleep. Most cyclists could recall their early experience—the great triumph of learning to ride and the ambitious efforts at too early a date to emulate the long distances of the accomplished cyclist. The result was "the cycling head," which was associated with jangling muscles, lassitude, and was fatal to sleep. School life, without proper sleep, was dangerous to growing boys.

Professor Golch instanced the result of some curious experiments undertaken to find out the depth or shallowness of sleep. It was found that there were two kinds of sleep. These he would describe as normal and neurotic. The normal sleep was the deep sleep that came soon after going to bed, and remained so until near the point of waking, when it gradually reduced itself to wakefulness. The neurotic sleep was the sleep to which, he was sorry to say, he was subject. It was common among men of intellectual pursuits. It consisted of deep sleep for the first hour or so, and then of two or three hours of shallow sleep, followed by another short spell of deep sleep before waking. The normal sleeper rarely dreamed. Dreams indicated the shallow sleep. Few people were like Lord Kitchener, able to sleep at will and never dream.

A more amusing result of experiments was related by Dr. Myers. He told how a German doctor tested his mental ability after half an hour's sleep, and then after one, two, three, four, five, and six hours' sleep. He tested himself by doing arithmetic. He found he could deal with the figures just as well after the half-hour's sleep as after the six hours. When, on other occasions, he gave himself a memory test, he found that he could remember things just in proportion to the length of sleep he had taken. This went to show how dangerous it would have been to build up a theory on his first experiments only. Indeed, the whole question of rest and sleep wanted investigation on scientific lines.

A little reproof was administered to the British mother in the Education Section. There was a discussion on the curriculum of secondary schools, in which the Head Master of Eton took part. Referring to schoolboy showlers, Mr. Lytton believed them to be "sent to us primarily for our amusement in hours of idleness, but also for our instruction, teaching as they do the utter uselessness of trying to hurry nature in her developing processes by anticipating a later stage before the earlier has been rightly employed."

It was Prof. Armstrong who censured mothers. "Teaching failures" in public schools were due to pampering at home. Until the British mother became more like the Spartan mother of old, or the German mother of to-day, very little improvement would be gained.

Potatoes for Horses.

Last year's unusually large acreage and yield of potatoes in the Nottingham district, exceeding the demand, left many farmers with considerable stock on hand, practically unsaleable since this year's product has been put on the market.

"Some of these farmers," says an American Consul's report, "have discovered that all kinds of stock, even horses, like potatoes when properly served, and they are consequently turning their

surplus tubers to good account. An extensive farmer in Lincolnshire, who declined an offer of 35s. a ton for his old potatoes, boils and mashes them, and serves them mixed with oat straw to his horses, which eat them with evident relish. After several weeks of such feeding the horses seem in prime condition. Milch cows were also fed on a similar diet, with apparent satisfactory results. Calves were also thus fed, and pigs, of course—the latter particularly thriving and fattening upon the potatoes. Sheep are also fed with them, but in more limited quantity. The cattle potato is declared to be far more nutritious for stock than turnips, carrots, or any other root vegetable."

Some Plagues of Progress.

No modern mechanical device, according to a writer in *The Lancet* (London), is wholly free from objectionable features. Most of them offend especially against the tastes of those persons who desire to lead the simple life. This, the writer thinks, is "because no invention is at first perfect and we have to suffer from its transitory imperfections." He goes on to say:

"We must admit that the accessories of modern life in general are placing greater and greater strain on the faculties of the individual. His eyes are strained by the intense artificial lights, his ears are worried by the unnecessary din of the streets, and his nose is offended by the vaporization of offensive fumes of oil or by the fetid air of the 'tubs'. This simpler life appeals to him more than ever which removes him from the meddling sphere of the inventor's activities. Still, after all, the human machine is wonderful in its power of adapting itself to a new environment, and just as few now look upon the railway, as was formerly the case, as a really offensive invention, so in time to come the present distresses inflicted upon us by modern ingenuity will, it is to be hoped, gradually disappear, partly by the process of adaptation and partly by improvements resulting in mitigation of the kind of evils referred to. One thing at least may be said, and that is, on no account should a modern invention be tolerated, however convenient it may be in one direction, unless it satisfies hygienic requirements."

Liquid Air and Champagne.

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"Waiter, a whiskey and soda with liquid air" (or lemonade and liquid air, as the case may be). There is no reason why this should not be a popular demand at the Savoy or Carlton during the present heat-wave.

General Baden-Powell tried some when he inaugurated the new Kudu-sen plant at the Battersea Works of the Liquid Air Power and Automobile Company, and pronounced it excellent.

It is charming to watch the behaviour of the chilly liquid in the soft, effervescing amber of a whiskey and soda. Only a few drops are necessary, and these assume a pear-like shape, and dance like animated diamonds. A white mist rushes out of the glass, like the form of the imprisoned genie of the fairy story.

After a couple of minutes the pretty spectacle is over, a little white lump of ice melts, and the drink is ready, deliciously cold. Liquid air has not the disadvantage of a lump of ice; it does not perceptibly dilute the beverage with water.

By the Knudsen process this company can manufacture liquid air at 5s. a gallon. The company recommends it as power for automobiles and for blasting coal. In the latter case a lead-like combination of metals is used as a cartridge. As the liquid air expands it will exert a pressure of 15,000lb. to the square inch. Long before that pressure is reached, however, the bomb explodes, and discharges two or three tons of coal.

Its substitution for petrol, dynamite, and ice are only a few of the commercial possibilities of liquid air.—*Daily Mail*.

—**ANOTHER ABUSE.**—The majority of the Chemists in this city have recently posted a notice in their shops to the effect that they will make no sales for less than 5 cents. This may suit their own special purposes, but it is very hard on the poorer classes who have been in the habit of buying four or even two cents' worth of the common drugs for household use, a quantity which is often quite sufficient for the momentary purpose. It is neither just nor reasonable that they should be thus compelled to purchase more than they actually require or can afford, and Chemists have no more right to impose this upon them than grocers or bakers or any other tradesmen. The public would do well to resist it by refusing to pay five cents when they only require four cents' worth of an article.

—**TRAMWAY.**—At a meeting held on Saturday last the formalities for the purchase of the Union and Moravia Tramway Company by the Commercial Society were completed, the nominal price of transfer being \$800,000, and the winding-up of the first-named was authorized. We have reason to believe that before long another of the Tramway Companies of the city. LONDON NOTES.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 7.

Everything indicates that yesterday was one of the most enjoyable Bank Holidays known for many years. The excursion traffic was enormous, and doubtless in many cases constituted a record. The seaside resorts were the goal of vast crowds; the parks in London and the rural resorts just outside it were overflowing with visitors. Motor-bus rides were a favourite means of recreation; and the Thames steamboats had to cope with what passengers had in excess of their capacity.

Mr. Winston Churchill, at Wimborne yesterday, deprecated the splitting of the Progressive vote at Cokerham, and rebuked Mr. Balfour's speech on the Transvaal Constitution in the House of Commons.

Lord Carrington yesterday referred to the Crown Lands Act, under which, he said, the Government would provide object lessons for landlords.
