NEWS OF THE DAY.

POLITICAL NOTES.

Neither of the Chambers sat on Wednesday. It should have been the turn of the Senate.

The situation regarding the Tariff Amendment Bill is still indecisive. The President is said to have consulted the Minister of Finance and it is understood that the latter approves the form in which the Bill left the Assembly. Yesterday he was to have consulted the Director General of Customs, and, judging from antecedents, it is probable that that functionary's views will be opposed to the interests of commerce, which desires to see the vexatious formality of presenting consular invoices abolished.

The Legislative Committee of the Representatives is about to report favorably on the Bill creating the High Court of Justice, proposing certain amendments. The principal of these make more stringent the qualifications for Members of the Court, and remove the appointment of all Rincón, excepting the Court Fiscal, from the Executive to the General Assembly. Both these are improvements.

The same Committee will also report favorably on the Seal Poaching Penalties Bill, in the form it left the Senate. As this was only a few days ago, it would seem that the Committee have not given it any deep consideration, though it is a Bill of some importance, as involving the good relations of Uruguay with other countries. Apropos of this topic, we may mention that the alleged seal poachers recently arrested off Rocha have been released on bail. This, at all events, is an improvement on the former procedure when they were kept under arrest during a prolonged trial.

Col. P. Rovira has been Member of the Permanent Council of War, in place of the late Col. Monégall.

The return from Europe is noted of Sr. E. Iglesias, Senator for Paysandú.

The Government has hired from Sr. Cezarone the tug "Ituzingó," which will be placed at the service of the Port Technical Commission instead of the "Ingénieur," the latter taking the place of the lost "Flores" for coastguard service in the seal-fishing waters.

LAFONE MEMORIAL HALL.

SOURCE IN HONOR OF
HOLY TRINITY CHURCH WORKERS.

This, which took place on Wednesday evening, proved a very interesting and agreeable social gathering. The attendance, which comfortably filled the brightly decorated and furnished little Hall, included practically all the families attending Holy Trinity Church, and not a few of their friends among the English-speaking Community. They were received most amiably by the Chaplain, the Rev. H. A. Allpass, and by the Ladies' Committee consisting of the Hon. Mrs. Kennedy and Mesdames Allpass, Buckland Cooper, Lane, Nuttall and Ritchie.

After about an hour had been spent in conversation and the circulation of tea and cake, the musical program (which we published in a recent issue) was carried out amid every sign of general appreciation, all the performers coming in for cordial applause. In addition to two charming glee songs by the Choir, there were songs by the Hon. Mrs. Kennedy, Miss Nuttall, Miss Ayre, Mr. H. Marshall and Mr. Birbeck, and a piano solo by Mrs. Nuttall. Mr. Lawrie's recitation "How Bill Adams won Waterloo" was much appreciated, and a

notably effective number was the humorous Dialogue "The Crystal Gazer," in which the Misses Kathleen and Lucy Kennedy showed a little dramatic talent.

The principal feature of the evening, however, was undoubtedly the address given by the British Minister, Mr. R. J. Kennedy. After some highly complimentary references to the Rev. H. A. Allpass, whom he described as the best Chaplain he had met during 30 years' diplomatic experience, Mr. Kennedy dwelt upon how much the members of the congregation of Holy Trinity Church were indebted to the Church Workers for the successful running of the institution. Their work was done so smoothly and unobtrusively that it almost seemed a matter of course, yet it was always most efficient and of high value. He desired to give special preference to the Sunlay School Teachers, whom he regarded as entrusted with a noble and important mission in the foundation of the character of future citizens and the inculcation of sound religious sentiments to make good men and women. The influence exercised in this respect affected the future lives of their pupils and extended far beyond the limits of the Church walls. Mr. Kennedy then referred in terms of gratifying appreciation to the work done by the Choir, making special mention of the Conductor Mr. H. Marshall and the organist Mr. H. C. Ayre, the Church Decorators, the Lector Mr. P. C. Towers, and finally, in matters temporal, by the Committee, making special mention of the Treasurer Mr. James Towers. He also referred sympathetically to the approaching departure from Montevideo of Mr. C. J. Nuttall, Mrs. Nuttall and Miss Nuttall, stating how much their loss would be felt by the community generally and especially by the Church of which they had always been such warm sustainers. The Minister concluded his speech by a reference to the late Mr. Samuel Lafone, to whose generosity the Anglican community in Montevideo was indebted for a Church of which they could all feel proud, and which, he was pleased to be able to add, was ably sustained by numerous pillars. Mr. Kennedy's speech, delivered in an agreeably lucid style, was listened to with the closest attention and provoked frequent applause.

Some brief remarks in reply were made by the Chaplain, Mr. Ritchie and Mr. Nuttall. After these the platform was occupied by the Rev. G. E. Howard, Pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, whose presence at the gathering, together with that of Mrs. Howard and several members of his congregation, was a proof of the kindly feeling existing between the two churches. Mr. Howard expressed his high appreciation of the work being done and the sound influence being exercised by Holy Trinity Church, and especially by the Sunday School Teachers, whom he regarded as engaged in a common work with his own teachers. He also made very cordial references to the Rev. H. A. Allpass, by whose friendship he said he felt honored. Mr. Howard's remarks were received with very hearty applause.

It was closed upon 11.30 p. m. when the very pleasant gathering broke up, after singing "God Save the King," amid general congratulations to the Rev. Allpass and the organizers.

Return of the President.

Among the many friends who are returning on the "Clyde" to-day, are Mrs. Cornelio Van Donselaar, Karl Van Donselaar, and Miss Mary L. Morse, after an absence of seven months, having visited many of the large cities of the United States.

They attended the World's Convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union held in Boston on October 17.

As delegate from the Union in Uruguay, Mrs. Van Donselaar represented our work in an address given before an audience of five thousand people in Tremont Temple. The Boston papers have given full accounts of the daily proceedings of the Convention.

We notice that we were honored by having our delegate named on an important Committee in company with Baroness von Hanson of Germany.

It is of interest to note that Japan's delegate, Kyo Yajimaon, is a woman seventy-four years of age and has been president of the Japan W. C. T. U. for twenty-six years.

Lady Henry Somerset, though unable to be present, sent a letter of greeting, and a cable message expressing thanks for the beautiful silver bell presented to her by the various Unions of the World.

A cause for rejoicing among the older women was the fact that there were more young ladies in attendance than at any previous gathering, thus indicating decided effort on the part of the young generation for the cause of Temperance.

Lady Dorothy Howard, only twenty years of age, was present, representing her mother, Lady Carlisle, British president of the World's W. C. T. U.

Lady Dorothy conveyed the greetings of England to America, giving a most eloquent address, which was received with prolonged applause.

These old ladies from different parts of the world were received royally by the Mayor of Boston and the Governor of Massachusetts, each giving receptions in their honor.

President Roosevelt also invited his foreign delegates to a reception at the White House.

On the third Thursday in December will be held the regular monthly meeting of the W. C. T. U. at San José 257.

UNITED STATES CABINET CHANGES.

New York, Oct. 24.

President Roosevelt's Cabinet next year will be constituted as follows:—

Mr. Elhu Root . . . Secretary of State
Mr. George B. Cortelyou . . . Secretary of the Treasury
Mr. William H. Taft . . . Secretary of War
Mr. Charles Bonaparte . . . Attorney-General
Mr. George Von L. Meyer . . . Postmaster-General
Mr. Victor H. Metcalf . . . Secretary of the Navy
Mr. Ethan Allen Hitchcock . . . Secretary of the Interior
Mr. James Wilson . . . Secretary of Agriculture
Mr. Oscar S. Straus . . . Secretary of Commerce and Labor

The changes are the result of the approaching retirement of the Secretary of the Treasury, Mr. Shaw, and the Attorney-General, Mr. Moody. Mr. Metcalf is a new Secretary of Commerce, Mr. Bonaparte is Secretary of the Navy, and Mr. Cortelyou is Postmaster-General. Mr. Meyer is Ambassador to Russia, while Mr. Straus holds no public office except membership of the Court of Arbitration at The Hague. The appointment of Mr. Straus is the greatest surprise in the announcement of Cabinet changes made at the White House last night. He will be the first Jew who has ever held Cabinet office in this country. Mr. Straus was for many years a Democrat, but became a Republican when Mr. Bryan appeared on the scene. Mr. Cleveland appointed him Minister to Turkey in 1887, and in 1897 Mr. McKinley appointed him to the same office. In Constantinople he was successful in obtaining many concessions from the Porte. He is one of the most profound students of international law in this country. There are some persons who see in Mr. Straus's appointment a shrewd move on the part of Mr. Roosevelt with the object of obtaining the Jewish vote for Mr. Hughes in the coming New York election. But it may be doubted whether considerations of this character had any weight with the President, who has long been an admirer of Mr. Straus's ability, which is so conspicuous that when the late Mr. Hay contemplated resigning the office of Secretary of State it was rumored that Mr. McKinley would offer the post to Mr. Straus.

That Mr. Meyer was to have a Cabinet position has been known for some time. His appointment is the result of the ability with which he supported the President's efforts to end the Russo-Japanese war. The vacancy at St. Petersburg will be filled by the promotion to that post of Mr. Lloyd Griscom, now Ambassador to Brazil.

Mr. Cortelyou's promotion to the Treasury Department is regarded as a somewhat hazardous experiment. Ten years ago Mr. Cortelyou was assistant private secretary to Mr. McKinley, and in each office that he has held since he has displayed remarkable talent for organization and detail. He rises to the most important position in the Cabinet next to the Secretaryship of State through pure merit, but so far he has never been employed in any capacity in which he could show whether he is a financier or is capable of coping with the emergencies of the business world. The defects in the present currency law are of such a character that the business interests of the country are largely dependent on the wisdom of the Secretary of the Treasury in exercising his discretion to relieve monetary stringency.

Some regret is expressed for the frequent changes in the office of Secretary of the Navy, which, it is felt, are harmful to the service. But Mr. Metcalf will hardly enter the Department as a stranger. He has long taken the greatest interest in naval affairs and has always desired this position.

As Attorney-General Mr. Bonaparte will direct the Department of Justice during the trial of the long series of suits against corporations which have already been started or are contemplated by the Administration. The effort to dissolve Standard Oil Company is the most important of these actions. Mr. Bonaparte is an able lawyer and a most energetic and capable official.

In the constitution of the new Cabinet Mr. Roosevelt smashes another tradition. Hitherto geographical considerations have always had great weight, the offices being apportioned among the various parts of the Union; but next year one-third of the Cabinet will consist of citizens of one State—namely, New York. Mr. Roosevelt does not believe in the geographical distribution of offices and has, as usual, put his belief into practice.

British Trade in Argentina.

An address on this subject was given on Tuesday by Mr. A. Carnegie Ross (British Consul at Buenos Aires) at a special meeting of members of the London Chamber of Commerce interested in trade with the Argentine Republic, Mr.

R. S. Fraser occupied the chair. Mr. Ross said that, with the acquiescence of the Foreign Office, he had been visiting some of the manufacturing centers of Great Britain, with the object of placing at the disposal of British merchants what he had seen and heard in the Argentine Republic. Having given particulars of the industries of the country, he said that the main requirements of Argentina included coal for railways and factories, agricultural implements, railway, tramway, and building material. There was a small but steadily increasing demand for implements of sport, high-class carriages, and automobiles. The carrying trade over sea was largely in the hands of British ship-owners, about 60 per cent of the vessels visiting the country flying the Union Jack. To push trade in the Argentine there must be lavish advertisement of the style in vogue, and personal propaganda by well-informed men able to speak Spanish was most important. About 25 years ago the only importers of wares were British. Some of these firms still existed and prospered, and a few new ones had been established, but the new import trade had gone into the hands of other nationalities. The Argentine Republic was at present in a most prosperous condition. Money was plentiful and trade was brisk; and, so far as he could see, there was no reason why the British share of Argentine trade should not be largely increased.—(Times, Nov. 1.)

Mr. Birrell on Nonconformity.

Recreation and Religion.

London, Nov. 1.

Mr. Augustine Birrell, M.P., President of the Board of Education, paid a visit to the Claremont Central Mission, Pontonville, last night, and took part in the proceedings in connection with the opening of the new Institute in White Lion street.

Sir Albert Spicer, M.P., who occupied the chair at last night's meeting, was supported by Mr. H. W. Brown, Chairman of the Special Missions Committee of the L.C.U., and the Rev. C. Silvester Horne.

Mr. Birrell, who was most enthusiastically received by a crowded audience, said that one of the few pleasures—and every day they seemed to become fewer in number—(laughter)—left him in this somewhat painful existence—was to visit a place like that with which the Board of Education had nothing whatever to do. (Renewed laughter.) Wherever else he went, and whatever debates he listened to, the same doleful tale was always dinned into his ears—by consent of the Board of Education. Sometimes he awoke from a fevered dream in which he had seen inscribed—not only over all the institutions of the country—its swimming baths, its gymnasiums, even its shooting schools—(laughter)—these words, "By consent of the Board of Education." (Laughter.) It was a terrible awakening, and nothing but the prudence of his consent had prevented him ending in an instantaneous resignation of the office which he held.

"I approach Nonconformity," continued Mr. Birrell, "as one who is intolerably well read in its history, and profoundly impressed with the glory, value, and splendour of its traditions. (Cheers.) I do not think there are any annals in ecclesiastical history so free from bloodstained pages, from melancholy associations, and from deflection from duty, as are the annals of the Protestant Nonconformists." (Cheers.)

The literature produced by Nonconformists ranked high in the literature of our country; their preachers were second to none; their theologians over held their own with those of every other community; and therefore they ought to be proud, not only of themselves, but of their fathers who went before them. (Cheers.) Fifty and sixty years ago, on that very site, workers, men and women, led the religious life. There they taught Eternal Truth. Circumstances altered; the well-to-do people who once lived there had sought for homes elsewhere, the neighbourhood had changed considerably, and it was a sorrowful thing to reflect upon the religious life of the community. But people had become alive to the duties they owed to the still crowded portions of our great city; they realized that the fact that they had gone to live elsewhere did not relieve them of their obligation, and now they saw that old chapel once again full of activity, full of hope, full of zeal, and with many new features that would have startled our grandfathers. (Laughter and cheers.)

He found nothing but good in all these new activities. There was a time when billiards was associated with much that was evil. He himself had found it nothing else but an exceedingly hard game—(loud laughter)—which he had long since abandoned. They rejoiced to see a recreative side to Christian life. They must have it; but it was only a means to a particular end, and that was the promotion of Christian life in this country.

In conclusion, Mr. Birrell advocated a closer study of the science of theology in all Christian Churches. The Christian faith was being challenged on every side, and there were those who had ceased to believe in it. Theology had to be taught afresh to each generation, and he hoped that in addition to their many classes they would have one for the study of the Christian religion in its widest and most glorious significance.

LONDON NOTES.

THURSDAY, NOV. 1.

In the House of Lords further amendments of a wrecking character were made to the Education Bill, and Clause I. and II. are now mutilated out of all likeness to their original shape. On Clause III. Lord Balfour of Burleigh made an astounding proposal in favor of denominationalism.

In the Commons the Plural Voting Bill passed through Committee. The suspension of the eleven o'clock rule had been agreed to early in the evening in case Tory obstruction should continue; but the Opposition apparently tired of such tactics, and the measure, as amended, was reported to the House at 9.30.

Mr. Lloyd-George, speaking at Spalding, said it was an inoleable anomaly that the House of Lords should have power to mutilate the Education Bill. Mr. Birrell, speaking last night at the Clarendon Central Mission, referred to the glory of Nonconformist tradition, and said he rejoiced to see a retrospective to Christian life.

Owing to the "grave situation" caused by the attitude of the Lords to the Education Bill, a specially-convened meeting of the National Council of the Evangelical Free Churches will be held next Monday.

In reply to questions in the House of Commons, Mr. Gladstone yesterday stated that the imprisoned suffragettes will be treated as first division offenders. He had no power to make the order, but he had brought the matter to the notice of the appropriate magistrates, who had sent an order to the prison authorities.

In a circular issued by the Soap Trust firms the position is referred to as "a working arrangement," and "not a Trust." Prices have been reduced, but the opposition of the trade and of the public continues, and the boycott is being organized.

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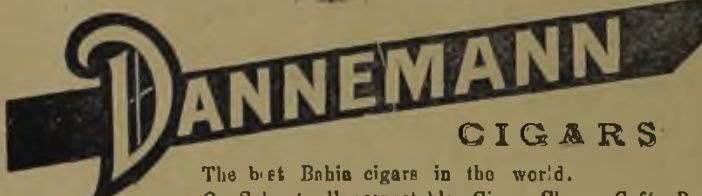
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SHORT STORY**The Brierly Treasure.**
