POLITICAL NOTES.

THE DIVORCE BILL.—The Representatives sat on Tuesday. Temporary leave of absence was granted to the Deputies C. Albini, F. A. Olivera, M. Suarez and F. Canfield. Discussion in detail was then resumed of the Divorce Bill. Several Articles provoked lively discussion, but the Bill had been approved as far as Article 23 when the Chamber adjourned.

As the details of the Bill are little known, we give a summary of the principal provisions as so far sanctioned:—

MARRIAGE is dissolved by the death of either of the parties, or by divorce legally pronounced. Divorce may be applied for only on account of adultery on part of the wife in any case, or on adultery on the part of the husband when committed in the mutual home or under public scandal or when he has a concubine. Apart from divorce, there is no penalty for adultery. Previously it was a penal offence, though we never heard of a case of the penalty, which is imprisonment for 15 to 18 months, being applied. We may also note that sentence to imprisonment for life or for a prolonged term is admitted in some countries as a cause for divorce, but is not mentioned in the present Bill. Further causes are attempts of either party on the life of the other, or serious violence or constant ill-treatment on the part of the husband. Any reservation in the marriage contract respecting the faculty of divorce is void before the law. Divorced persons are free to contract another marriage, or may remarry but may not apply for a second divorce for the same reasons as the first. A divorced woman may not marry again until the lapse of 301 days from her divorce, unless she have given birth to a child meanwhile. Divorce can only be applied for by the innocent party, and if either party is a minor he or she can only be represented in the trial by a curator (trustee) specially appointed for the purpose. Action for divorce ceases immediately on the death of either party. All evidence is admissible in trials for divorce except that of children of the parties and of their household servants (the latter is excluded). The confession or oath of either party is not sufficient to procure divorce (in most countries a writ on or witnessed confession on the part of the wife is accepted as conclusive evidence). Action for divorce ceases upon reconciliation, or condonation on part of the husband, the latter being presumed if he resumes intercourse with his wife. Action for divorce must be taken within six months of knowledge of the causes, or, in case of ignorance, within three years after the fact. This restriction does not apply to facts occurred before the present Law, provided action be taken within six months from its promulgation.

An amendment presented by Dr. Areco establishing "mutual consent" as a cause for divorce was only rejected by a small majority.

THE SENATE.—The Senators whose term ceases on February 15 are Drs. M. Berindague, J. P. Ramirez, R. Vellozo, F. Brito del Pino and P. de Maria. The future Chamber will be constituted by Dr. B. M. Cuñarro, Dr. F. B. Roca, E. Iglesias, Dr. F. Viern, D. Pons, E. Avegno, Dr. R. J. Areco, Dr. M. E. Tiscornia, M. Magarinos Veira, J. Serrato, Dr. F. Socá, Dr. J. Campistegui, Dr. C. E. Lenzi, Dr. J. Espalter, J. Sanchez, Dr. C. A. Berro,

L. E. Segundo, F. J. Ros and C. Travieso.

With regard to these, a contemporary classifies the first eight as "officialists," the next three as "doubtful officialists," and the last eight as "independents." The distinction is interesting though it would be rash to regard it as absolutely correct. The one thing certain is that rarely has the Senate been so poorly constituted, for among the nineteen senators there are only five or six who can rank as men of any political prestige or legislative weight, and there are some among them whose presence in the upper Chamber augurs badly for public interests. With a Senate thus composed it will be rather difficult to find a President of the Chamber (who is also) Vice-President of the Republic) acceptable to public opinion, but for some little time past the country has had to reconcile itself to seeing the post occupied by inferior men, put in for partisan purposes, so that will be no novelty. The election of Sr. Serrato would be welcomed by public opinion, but is not regarded as likely, for he has dropped of late in official favor. Dr. Lenzi or Dr. Espalter would also be acceptable, but both would be opposed by the official faction. Among the rest there is practically no choice. Officialism itself is still in doubt, for no single candidate has been mentioned with any degree of certainty. We shall have to wait a little time yet before the problem becomes clear.

HIRED COACHES.—With regard to the question of the tariff of hired coaches, the Government has issued a Resolution maintaining its former attitude in all except two points of minor importance, thereby still denying the right of the Municipality to fix a tariff. A uniform tariff, says the Resolution, is neither legitimate nor convenient, and therefore the coach owners or drivers must each be left to fix his own tariff, the only restriction being that, once fixed, it may not be changed at caprice or without permission.—This idea may suit the convenience of the said owners or drivers, but it will certainly not suit that of the public, who wish to know what they will have to pay when they call a street coach, and cannot (as the Resolution absurdly suggests) go from one coach to another, examining the tariff to find which suit a best. The attitude of the Government throughout this whole question of the hired coaches, has been simply inexplicable. The attitude of the Municipality is not yet decided, but we understand that they are not inclined to give way on the point, knowing that they have public opinion on their side. Possibly it may be left in abeyance until the next Government, when different views may prevail in official quarters.

The Fraternising of the Great Nations Through Science.

The fraternity which exists among men of science the world over is a striking and gratifying fact. It is interesting to examine the causes of this phenomenon, whose spirit it would be most desirable to extend to other spheres of life. Sir Michael Foster, the English physiologist, contributes an illuminating and suggestive article on the various phases of the subject to the *Deutsche Revue*, of which we find an interesting summary in the *American Review of Reviews*. Scientists, Sir Michael Foster reminds us, are perhaps the most cosmopolitan of men. They have, in varying degrees, been so ever since science began to lift its head, during the Renaissance period. In the sixteenth century, and for some time before and after, men of science, in spite of the dangers and difficulties of travel, wandered from country to country, great teachers of science filled foreign professorships, and students from all climes flocked to hear the masters of their particular branch. At that period the present nationalities of Europe were in process of formation; in the succeeding centuries, with a stricter delimitation of nations, this active intercourse of the disciples of science diminished in a measure. In the last part of the nineteenth century there was, on the contrary, a revival of the scientific esprit de corps, and one of the most marked traits of the life of to-day is the hearty appreciation with which every nation greets the scientific achievements of every other. No scientific society or academy considers itself complete until it counts eminent men of science of foreign lands among its members, and such institutions are as a rule glad to confer medals and other distinctions upon investigators of other countries. In the last twenty years, 1885 to 1905, the Royal Society of London conferred the Copley medal—distributed yearly, and the highest honour in its gift—twelve times out of the twenty upon men of science who were not British subjects. This international community of scientists, fostered by academies and societies, is greatly furthered by the activity of the International Academic Associations, as well by the work of the various international congresses of the special sciences. At present every branch of science holds a triennial conference which meets in many different countries, and which affords the members a chance of personal contact, international conferences are, of course, not limited to science, but it was science that inaugurated the beneficial meetings of the representatives of various nations. It may well be asked: Why is science so evidently cosmopolitan? If we observe a man of science we find him as patriotic as any of his countrymen. He, too, thinks his own land, his people, his language the best

on earth. Neither is he averse to contest. His studies are particularly calculated to engage him in controversies, in which he shows himself as ready and stringent as another. How comes it then that this patriotic and combative individual is so excellent a member of the cosmopolitan union of science? Several influences concur to bring this about. Every scientific worker is obliged to know what others who labor in his field in different lands are accomplishing. The researches of greater import to him are carried on by men scattered over the whole civilized world. What these men do interests him far more than the multifarious activity of his own countrymen, and there is, thus, an intellectual bond between them. He gladly seizes an opportunity to correspond with or meet them, that they may freely discuss questions which lie so close to his heart. Such acquaintance often ripens into the warmest friendship, and the ties of a common interest link them into a scientific brotherhood.

Science, furthermore, demands that every thing uttered in her name shall be "the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth," as far as possible. It also, it is true, shares in the too great haste of the time. Scientific journals abound everywhere and every scientist is exposed to the temptation of publishing in hot haste what he deems a discovery. Fortunately the scientific Press has a safeguard which the daily Press lacks. If an editor of the latter publishes a sensational article calculated to arouse ill-feeling between two nations he is not specially blamed for not making sure of his data. It is part of an enterprising editor's duty to secure news of a stirring and exciting nature. It is different with the scientific Press. If one is tempted to make known a new theory which lacks adequate foundation, it will soon break down; if he himself has not sufficiently probed it, others are ready to do so; thus it does not live long enough to do harm. Likewise a false criticism of others' work is soon disclosed and refuted. Luckily for science the tribunal of observation and experiment, before which every statement can be tried, is always at hand. Thus while the inaccurate and false reports of the daily Press do so much toward disturbing the peace and harmony of nations, all such elements of discord are rendered harmless as quickly as they appear in the scientific papers, exerting little or no effect upon the fraternal bonds of the scientific world. The understanding between men of science is, fortunately, proof against such jealousy or discord from such a source as this. But the most potent influence that links men of science together is the consciousness that they all serve the same mistress; loyalty to her—to scientific truth—is for all the guiding principle of their intellectual life; and their common loyalty is the strongest of all the bonds which unite them. . . . The brotherly spirit of science is to-day an assured fact, and each succeeding year serves only to fortify and extend it. May we not regard this as a beneficent pledge of a more comprehensive brotherhood which is still to come?

The Olympic Games.

The Government has placed \$4000 at the disposal of the Committee for the Olympic Games to be held in March next.

The complete program has now been issued, and is being profusely circulated, together with entrance forms.

The nautical sports (swimming and rowing) will be held on Sunday, March 10; the bicycle, horse and trotting races and polo match on Sunday, March 17; the fencing, wrestling and boxing competitions on the evenings of March 17, 18 and following if necessary; and the athletic sports and games on Sunday and Monday (holiday) March 24 and 25. The competitions are reserved for amateurs resident in South America, but this will not debar their travelling and hotel expenses from being paid by the Club they represent.

Entries must be made before February 25, and should be addressed to the Committee at Calle 25 de Mayo 414. The entrance fee is \$1 for each event or \$5 for a general entrance, the money being returned to those who present themselves to compete.

SUNDRIES.

—WEATHER.—Variable. The temperature is remarkably low for the time of the year.

—MAILS.—The R.M.S. "Danube," bringing London dates to December 27 or 28, is expected tomorrow morning, sailing homeward bound on Friday the 25th instant.

—URQUIZA THEATRE.—The performance this evening is for the benefit of Tina di Lorenzo, whose popularity is greater than ever on her present visit. The program consists of Goldoni's comedy "La Locandiera" and the comedy-dietta "Fuoco al Convento," in both of which she will perform.

—POLITEAMA THEATRE.—The program for this evening consists of "El Señor Joaquín," "La Noche del Pilar," "Los Vividores," and "Don Dinero."

—ANOTHER GREAT EARTHQUAKE.—Yesterday's telegrams report a terrible earthquake which has resulted in the more or less complete destruction of the port and city of Kingston capital of Jamaica, West Indian Islands. The shock occurred about 3.30 on Monday afternoon, but was of circumscribed effect, being only slightly felt in adjacent parts and the other islands. Telegraphic communication was interrupted and the accounts, so far, are imperfect and contradictory. According to one message there are 500 killed and 1700 injured, and the material losses are \$19,000,000. Another message—whether anterior or ulterior is not specified—states that there has been much exaggeration in the reports, the dead do not exceed 100, and the action of the fires was circumscribed. A message to the Colonial Office in London states that the Military Hospital has been destroyed, 40 soldiers and many residents being killed. Among the victims is the Rt. Hon. Sir James Fergusson (a highly distinguished military man, official and politician, who was Postmaster General 1891-2, and has held several important Colonial Governorships). The news of the disaster has caused great consternation in London, where fears are entertained for the safety of several prominent people who arrived at Kingston last Friday to attend an Agricultural Congress that was to have been opened on Monday. Among these were the Earl and Countess of Dudley, several M. P's., and some prominent officials of the Colonial and Board of Trade Offices. This morning's telegrams should bring fuller details.

—DISGRACEFUL OUTRAGE.—On Tuesday morning, in Calle Mercedes, as one of the carts of the bakery "Panadería del Globo" was going its rounds, four individuals approached and threw a large quantity of kerosene over the bread and then tried to set fire to the cart. On appearance of the police they took to their heels, but one of them, named Martinez, was fortunately caught. A similar outrage was attempted later on a cart of the "Panadería Ecole de France," but was frustrated by the watchfulness of the driver. The

reason for this outrage was that these two bakeries had distributed bread on Monday—as they had the most absolute right to do—in defiance of the tyranny of the Trade Union. Such outrages as these, which are an insolent defiance of the rights of others and of the necessities of the people—cannot be too strongly condemned. Unfortunately the authorities, police and judicial, do very little to repress them, and though similar outrages have been frequent in recent years, no one hears of any one being properly punished. If there were a proper Magistrates Court where the miscreants could be promptly hauled up and publicly condemned to hard labor for a few months, it would soon have a deterrent effect. As the law is administered at present—when it is administered at all—it is completely inefficient. All our contemporaries condemn the outrage in "strong terms" and comment on the inaction of the authorities—except the *Dia*, which dismisses it with the briefest mention possible.

—CAMELS IN ARGENTINA.—According to the *Prensa*, of Buenos Aires, the question of introducing camels into the Argentine Republic is attracting some attention at Buenos Aires. Colonel Richiardi, who has had opportunities for ascertaining the remarkable services rendered by these animals in North Africa, is, it seems, taking an active interest in this movement, and has supplied our contemporary with some useful particulars. He especially emphasises the cheapness of purchase. Were they introduced in certain numbers they would, he says, cost at most 150 to 200 francs per head. They are serviceable, moreover, for a period varying from 20 to 30 years. Whilst with horses or mules, the average burden is from 80 to 100 kilos per animal, the camel easily carries a load of 300 kilos without fatigue, with the added advantage that it does not require to be unloaded at each stage of the journey, its instinct leading it to lie so as to rest the major portion of its load on the ground. It is besides a docile animal, two men being more than enough to lead as many as 40 camels on journeys extending from 30 to 40 days. It is easily fed, almost any herbage or bush being sufficient at a pinch. It is not so much quality as quantity the great beast requires, and its capacity for going without water, as everyone knows, is phenomenal, it being able to abstain from drinking eight or ten days. Its young, too, are hardy and require but little care and solicitude.

—ANECDOTE OF THE KING.—An adventure which befell the King while motoring is related by "The Lady of Fashion." The car broke down, and his Majesty got out and strolled up and down with Mr. Stonor while it was being put right. The car had come to a standstill just outside a tiny cottage, from which a neat old gentleman emerged and begged that the motorists would come inside and sit down. "We are just about to take tea," she assured them. The King, realising that she was quite unconscious of his identity, accepted the invitation. On entering the tiny parlour, he found a young lady there who was obviously startled by his appearance. After an animated conversation his Majesty thanked the ladies for their hospitality and retired. That his identity was no secret to the girl he realised as she dropped the merest curtsy and whispered, "Good-bye, sir." Not long after, his Majesty saw the lady of the cottage in the stalls, and sent to inquire who she was. "A Miss—on a weekly paper," was reply. A day or two later the lady journalist received a charming little golden motor-car studded with diamonds, "With thanks for a welcome cup of tea."

—TAKING NO CHANCES.—An epileptic dropped in a fit on the streets of Boston not long ago and was taken to a hospital. Upon removing his coat there was found pinned to his waistcoat a slip of paper on which was written: "This is to inform the house-surgeon that this is just a case of plain fit, not appendicitis. My appendix has already been removed twice."

LONDON NOTES.

TUESDAY, DEC. 18.

Mr. E. Robertson yesterday, in the House of Commons, read the terms of an Admiralty minute having reference to the "on the knee" disturbances at the Royal Barracks at Portsmouth. The causes of the outbreak are stated to be (1) resentment on the part of the stokers, (2) the retention of the stokers on parade during rain, and (3) the want of supervision and control in the canteen. Commodore Stopford and Commander F. H. Mitchell have been relieved in their appointment, Commander Sidney R. Drury-Lowe has been superseded, and the sentences passed by the Court-martial have been reduced in two instances. of Crewe intimated what concessions the Government was prepared to make, and the debate was adjourned until today.

In the House of Commons the Attorney-General's amendments to the motion to issue a new writ for Worcester was carried, after some protest from the Opposition front bench. It was stated that the Government would consider whether they would introduce an Act to suspend the issue of the writ for a definite period. Mr. Churchill moved a resolution approving the grant of Constitutions to the Transvaal and Orange River Colony, and he outlined the scheme of responsible government for the latter.

Sir Montagu F. Ommamney, the Permanent Under-Secretary of State for the Colonies, will shortly retire, and will be succeeded by Sir Francis J. S. Hopwood, the Permanent Secretary to the Board of Trade.

By the death of Mr. T. D. Bolton, a Liberal M.P., a vacancy has been caused in the representation of North East Derbyshire, for which he sat for 20 years.

Dr. Clifford, Mr. Perks, M.P., and others do not view with favor the concessions on the Education Bill outlined by the Earl of Crewe in the House of Lords.

At yesterday's meeting of the General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund it was stated that the amount to be distributed was £110,000, as against £100,000 last year.

Over £200,000 is the amount of the tender accepted for the work of widening Blackfriars Bridge, which will be carried out by Sir William Arrol and Co., Glasgow.

Several suffragettes gained access to the House of Commons central lobby last night, and endeavored to deliver speeches. They were conducted outside, and some arrests were made.

All-night trams are to be run on the Embankment.

Eight seamen are missing as the result of the capsizing of a naval cutter at the mouth of Portsmouth Harbour early yesterday morning. The men were returning from shore to H. M. S. Hindustan.

Twelve lives were lost in a collision between the steamer Arlington and a Belgian vessel 15 miles to the west of Dungeness.
