NEWS OF THE DAY

Sunday after Ascension.—Saint Martin's.—131 days past, 234 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Senators sat on Friday. Approval was given to the appointment of Dr. A. M. Rodriguez as President of the Mortgage Bank. The Bill according certain exemptions to factories of textile goods was approved in second reading without discussion. There was no further business of general interest.

The Executive has signed and promulgated the Law sanctioning the temporary exemption of seed wheat from import duty. This exemption lasts until July 15 of the present year. The Law makes special provisions for the procedure to be adopted in the importation of wheat under its clauses.

President Cuestas has applied to the Chambers for the leave necessary for him to wear the decoration of Grand Officer of the Legion of Honor recently bestowed upon him by the French Government. Of course it will be granted.

When the defaulting Treasurer of the Post Office bolted last year, he left his accounts in confusion, and it has taken no little time and trouble to straighten them out and ascertain the balances due to various corresponding countries. This at length has been done, and all outstanding postal debts cleared off, the operation involving a sum of \$47,719, of which France takes over \$46,000.

On Friday the arrest was effected of Com. Carralón de la Rúa, an officer who was prominent in the times of Santos but who has not been heard of lately, and of Major Delfino Morelli. It is known that both of them are disaffected to the present political situation—nothing unusual among military officers—but the real reason of their arrest is said to be that they were the originators of the complaints insulting the President of the Republic recently sang at the Policeman Theatre.

MR. CECIL RHODES' POLITICAL WILL AND TESTAMENT.

The Review of Reviews for April is, as might be expected, largely devoted to Mr. Rhodes. Mr. Stead opens with an appreciation of one who, despite all political differences, remained his warm personal friend to the last. When, writes Mr. Stead, Cecil Rhodes expired at Maizebush on March 26th the most remarkable, and in some respects the most significant, personage of our time quitted the stage on which for the last fifteen years he has played so prominent a part. For good or for evil he ranked among the dozen foremost men of his day. He was one of the few men neither royal nor noble by birth who rose by sheer force of character and will to reach although not titular Imperial rank. After the Pope, the Kaiser, the Czar, there were few contemporaries of his who commanded as much attention, and others their hate, as the man who has passed from our midst while still in his prime. The few who knew him loved him. The majority, to whom he was unknown, paid him their homage, some their admiration, and others their hate. And it must be admitted that the dead he inspired among those who disliked him was more widespread than the affection he commanded from those who came within the magic of his presence.

THE KEY TO HIS IDEAS.

Under the head of "The Religious World" on page 5, an extract appears which deals with the religious-scientific basis of Mr. Rhodes' Imperialism. The object of the present article is to give what may be described as the political will and testament of Mr. Rhodes. It is the longest confession of his political faith which Mr. Rhodes ever wrote with his own hand. Although it dates from 1890, Mr. Rhodes' views remained unaltered down to the time of his death. Mr. Stead, in introducing it, says: "The communication takes the shape of a résumé of a long conversation which I had had with him just before he left London for the Cape. Despite a passage which suggests that I should sub edit it and dress up his ideas, I think the public will prefer to have these rough, hurried, and sometimes ungrammatical notes exactly as Mr. Rhodes scribbled them off rather than to have them supplied with literary clothing by anyone else."

Mr. Rhodes says: Please remember the key of my idea discussed with you is a Society, copied from the Jesuits as to organization, the practical solution a differential rate and a copy of the United States Constitution, for that is Home Rule or Federation, and an organization to work this out working in the House of Commons for decentralisation, remembering that an Assembly that is responsible for a fifth of the world has no time to discuss the questions raised by Dr. Tannor or the important matter of Mr. O'Brien's breeches, and that the labour question is an important matter, but that deeper than the labour question is the question of the market for the products of labour, and that, as the local consumption (production) of England can only support about six millions, the balance depends on the trade of the world.

COMMERCIAL WAR FOR FREE TRADE. That the world with America in the forefront is devising tariffs to boycott your manufactures, and that this is the supreme question, for I believe that England with fair play should manufacture for the world, and, being a Free Trader, I believe until the world comes to its senses you should declare war—I mean a commercial war with those who are trying to boycott your manufactures—that is my programme. You might fight the war by union with America and universal peace—I mean after one hundred years.

It is a fearful thought to feel that you possess a patent, and to doubt whether your life will last you through the circulation of the forms of the Patent Office. I have that inner conviction that if I can live I have thought out something that is worthy of being registered at the Patent Office; the fear is, shall I have the time and the opportunity? And I believe with all the enthusiasm bred in the soul of an inventor it is not self-glification I desire, but the wish to live to register my patent for the benefit of those who, I think, are the greatest people the world has ever seen, but whose fault it is that they do not know their strength, their greatness, and their destiny, and who are wasting their time on their minor local matters, but, being asleep, do not know that through the invention of steam and electricity, and in view of their enormous increase, they must now be trained to view the world as a whole, and not only consider the social questions of the British Isles.

A GREAT AMBITION.

They are calling the new country Rhodesia, that is, from the Transvaal to the southern end of Tanganyika; the other name is Zambesia. I find I am human and should like to be living after my death; still, perhaps, if that name is coupled with the object of England everywhere, and united, the name may convey the discovery of an idea which ultimately led to the cessation of all wars and one language throughout the world, the patent being the gradual absorption of wealth and human minds of the higher order to the object.

IF WE HAD NOT LOST AMERICA.

What an awful thought it is that if we had not lost America, or if even now we could arrange with the present members of the United States Assembly and our House of Commons, the peace of the world is secured for all eternity. We could hold your Federal Parliament five years at Washington and five at London.

I note with satisfaction that the Committee appointed to inquire into the McKisley Tariff report that in certain articles our trade has fallen off 50 per cent., and yet the fools do not see that if they do not look out they will have England shut out and isolated, with ninety millions to feed and capable internally of supporting about six millions. If they had had statesmen they would at the present moment be commercially at war with the United States and they would have boycotted the raw products of the United States until she came to her senses. And I say this because I am a Free Trader, but why go on writing? Your people do not know their great need; they possess a fifth of the world and do not know that it is slipping from them, and they spend their time on discussing Parnell and Dr. Tannor, the character of Sir C. Dilke, the question of compensation for beer-houses, and other bog gods.

WHAT AMERICANS CAN TEACH US.

For the American has been taught the lesson of Home Rule and the success of leaving the management of the local pump to the parish head.

He does not burden his House of Commons with the responsibility of cleansing the parish drains. The present position in the English House is ridiculous. You might as well expect Napoleon to have found time to have personally counted his dirty linen before he sent it to the wash, and recounted it upon its return. It would have been better for Europe if he had carried out his idea of Universal Monarchy; he might have succeeded if he had hit on the idea of granting self-government to the component parts. Still, I will own tradition, race, and diverse languages acted against his dream; all these do not exist as to the present English-speaking world.

A VAST HORIZON OF WORK.

Apart from this union is the sacred duty of taking the responsibility of the still unorganized parts of the world. The trial of these countries who have been found wanting—such as Portugal, Persia, even Spain—and the judgment that they must depart, and, of course, the whole of the South American Republics. What a scope and what a horizon of work, at any rate, for the next two centuries, the best energies of the best people in the world; perfectly feasible, but needing an organization, for it is impossible for one human atom to complete anything, much less such an idea as this, requiring the devotion of the best souls of the next 200 years.

HOW TO CARRY IT OUT.

There are three essentials: (1) The plan duly weighed and agreed to; (2) the first organization; (3) the seizure of the wealth necessary.

The only thing feasible to carry this idea out is a secret one (society) gradually absorbing the wealth of the world to be devoted to such an object. There is Hirsch with twenty millions, very soon to cross the unknown border and struggling in the dark to know what to do with his money; and so one might go on ad infinitum.

A secret society organized like Loyola's, supported by the accumulated wealth of those whose aspiration is a desire to do something, and a hideous annoyance created by the difficult question daily placed before their minds as to which of their incompetent relations they should leave their wealth to. You would furnish them with the solution, greatly relieving their minds and turning their ill-gotten or inherited gains to some advantage.

COLOSSAL CATASTROPHE.

THE TOWN OF ST. PIERRE DESTROYED BY A VOLCANIC ERUPTION.—LOSS OF OVER 20,000 LIVES.

Yesterday's telegrams brought news of one of these colossal natural catastrophes which occur from time to time—fortunately not very frequently—and which serve to remind us that the earth upon which we live is, after all, but a fragile shell subject to commotions and the play of gigantic forces before which all human devices, wit and energy sink into the most abject impotence and insignificance, and proud man has to humble himself before the inconceivable plans of the Creator and Ruler of an Universe in which this planet is but as a speck of dust floating in the air. The telegrams are a little confused and imperfect, probably owing to the interruption of communications, but the following are the principal facts as far as known.

The recent disastrous earthquake at Guatemala, which was also felt in other parts of Central America, was followed by a series of seismic disturbances in the West Indian Islands, there being tremblings of the earth, and several extinct or dormant volcanoes showing signs of activity. Among the latter was Mount Pelée, which overlooks the town of St. Pierre, capital of the island of Martinique, one of the French West Indies. After some minor eruptions, which sufficed to alarm the inhabitants, on Thursday this volcano burst forth into a terrible eruption or explosion, which in a few minutes buried the whole town beneath a mass of red-hot cinders and burning lava. This was followed by a series of earthquakes lasting over an hour and altering the face of the whole district, whilst the sea rushed in to fill the gaps in the coast. Since the catastrophe the district has remained covered with a dense cloud of smoke, steam and pestilential vapours which render all access impossible.

Of the loss of life it is impossible to speak accurately, but it has been enormous, the destruction of the city being as complete as that of Herculaneum and Pompeii. According to the telegrams the city had a population of about 23,000, mostly negroes, but other authorities give 25,000 or 26,000. Some of the whites had emigrated at the first symptoms, for the city has several times been desolated by earthquakes, especially by one which occurred in 1839. It is calculated that there may be 1000 survivors, all the rest having perished.

Capt. Freeman of the "Roddam" was in the port when the catastrophe occurred and narrowly escaped by cutting the cables and putting on full steam. As it was, eleven of his men were killed and the deck set on fire by the burning ashes that fell.

The messages report that eruptions and disturbances of the earth continue on a minor scale in several of the West Indian islands, and it is feared

that the atmosphere reaction will bring about a terrible hurricane. The French cruiser "Sachet," which was at Guadaloupe, has left for the scene of the disaster to see what assistance can be rendered, and public subscriptions are being opened in various parts.

THE WAR.

The news yesterday was again reduced to a minimum. Regarding the peace negotiations there was no reference.

From Pretoria it is stated that in the derauling of the armored train (mentioned in our last) there were eleven men seriously injured in addition to the officer and ten men killed.

A London message states that numerous coal miners of Cornwall are preparing to emigrate to the Transvaal, expecting to find work in the Johannesburg mines. They will take their wives and children with them, the number of emigrants reaching some thousands. The Government favors the movement.

A transport left Queenstown on Friday with 900 recruits for the Cape. On Monday 1200 troops who have been under drill at Aldershot will embark at the same port.

LONDON NOTES.

THURSDAY, APRIL 10.

Whilst steaming out of Portsmouth Harbour yesterday morning the torpedo boat destroyer "Kestrel" collided with the destroyer "Fawcett". Both vessels were damaged.

In the Southern Football League tourney yesterday, Southampton defeated Luton, Dorset beat Surrey.

From Portsmouth, yesterday, the King telegraphed a message of condolence with the relatives of the late Lord Kimberley. His Majesty will probably be represented at the funeral.

At golf yesterday, on the Lelant links, West Cornwall, James Braid, the champion, beat J. H. Taylor in a 36 holes match by 6 up and 5 to play. Braid tied the record for the green, doing 69 in the second round.

A serious accident occurred yesterday at the Don Foundry, Sheffield. A large casting was being made when the metal exploded, severely burning fourteen men. All were removed to hospital.

At the Easter Banquet, given by the Lord Mayor and the Lady Mayors in the Mansion House last night, the Japanese Minister spoke of the great advantage of the sympathy and friendship cementing Great Britain and Japan.

In acknowledging the presentation of the freedom of the city of Aberdeen yesterday, Lord Strathcona spoke on "the Imperial idea" and the prospects of a closer federation of the English-speaking peoples.

Under Section 44 of the Police Act, a Mile-end Chameleon was summoned at the Thames Police-court yesterday for allowing gambling in his house by means of automatic machines. The magistrate described as most mischievous, and fined the defendant £2 and costs.

In the King's Bench Division yesterday the London and County Bank sought to recover £350 from a Mrs. Watson on a guarantee. Defendant alleged that her name on the guarantee was forged by her son now undergoing penal servitude for forgery, and judgment was given for her.

M. Yves Guyot was entertained by the Political Circle of the National Liberal Club last night, and confided his subsequent address to a condemnation of the bounty system, which, he said, was on all hands admitted to be a curse. He pointed out, however, that England would be in a difficult position were she, through her Free Trade principles, to admit bounty-fed sugar to compete with the unsubsidized product.

George Headley King, a naturalist, was summoned before Mr. Denman, the magistrate at the Marlborough-street Police-court, yesterday, for allowing unnecessary suffering to be caused to goldfish. The prosecution, one of a novel character, was by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. It was held that unnecessary suffering had been caused to the fish, and the defendant was fined.

Prince Steherbatoff, President of the Imperial Moscow Agricultural Society, has stated to an interviewer his proposals for promoting trade between this country and Russia. He holds that Russia, wanting a foreign market for agricultural produce, should find that market in Great Britain; while this country ought to send constantly increasing quantities of manufactured articles to Russia.

An action by an Imperial Yeoman, to recover a hundred pounds odd from his former employers for salary while serving at the front, was resumed yesterday in the King's Bench Division. Defendants claimed that their offer to continue salary to men at the front only applied to men who were Volunteers at the time, whereas plaintiff joined the Yeomanry after seeing the offer. The judge found for defendants.

For stealings goods from her employers, a French dressmaker, named Frances Veroy, was, at the Court of London Sessions yesterday, sentenced to three years' penal servitude. She had been employed by several well-known ladies at their houses in the West-end, and as a substantial sum was found upon her when arrested, she was ordered to pay the costs of the prosecution.

Mr. Justice Kekewich, in the Chancery Division yesterday, heard further evidence in the action brought by a Lancashire cotton spinner against Mr. Whitaker Wright for damages in respect of losses occasioned by taking shares in the Standard Exploration Company, Ltd., on the faith of the prospectus, the contents of which, he alleged, were misleading. This was denied by the defence. The case was again adjourned.

In the House of Commons yesterday, Mr. Chapman moved the second reading of the Rating of Machinery Bill—a measure which, he said, was of the character of a hardy annual. The principle had been repeatedly affirmed by considerable majorities but owing to the difficulties attending private members' Bills, the Bill had not reached the Statute Book. In this instance the second reading was carried by a majority of 35, but owing to the time limit the motion to refer it to Committee could not be put.

Earl Spencer, speaking at Lincoln last evening, alluded to the differences in the Liberal party, and said he was afraid they were marked to some extent by personal feeling. He believed the party in the country were sound at heart. In many of the districts Liberals had difficulty in understanding why those differences had occurred. Instead of looking for schisms and cleavages, let them hope the cities were only driving rivets into the fabric of Liberalism in order to make it stronger. Referring to the Education Bill, Lord Spencer denied that it would substantially advance sound education, and feared it would create great anxiety and animosity in the country.

Delivering an address to his constituents at Leeds last night, Mr. Gerald Balfour claimed for the Government that during the past year, although they had had some disappointments, they had made real progress. With regard to the war, he was not sanguine of the result of the so-called peace negotiations; he advised his audience not to be too sanguine. As far as regarded the future political status of the Transvaal and Orange River Colonies, he said the terms offered last March were open to day. Further than that the Government were not prepared to go now. Dealing with the Education Bill, Mr. Balfour said that if between now and the Committee stage there was a consensus of opinion against the adoptive clause it would be considered by the Government.
