NEWS OF THE DAY.

MONTEVIDEO.
SATURDAY, APRIL 27, 1907.
Saints Toribius, Peter Armengol and Tertulianus. — R. W. Emerson died, 1882.—117 days past, 248 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.
The Representatives sat on Thursday. Dr. A. Vazquez Acevedo presented a Bill prohibiting the sale of betting tickets on foreign races, and another prohibiting newspapers from publishing notices of suicides. Discussion was then resumed of the Bill creating the High Court of Justice, but no progress had been made when the Chamber adjourned.

It was announced yesterday that one of the representatives of Uruguay at the Hague Peace Conference will be the ex-President Sr. José Batlle y Ordóñez. The post was offered to him telegraphically, and he accepted immediately. We regret that we cannot congratulate the Government on the appointment. Apart from the fact that he was unable to maintain peace in his own country, Sr. Batlle has little or no knowledge of international law, and has shown himself conspicuously deficient in tact, in conciliatory spirit, and in all the qualities required from a diplomat. He is one of the last men who should have been chosen to represent the country on its first appearance at the Conference, and will make but a sorry figure among the eminent diplomats and high statesmen who will assemble there as the representatives of other nations. We fear that the Government has been guided by personal considerations rather than fitness in selecting him for the post. Fortunately the other representative chosen, Dr. J. P. Castro, who is a jurisconsult of authority, and a man of higher culture and attainments than Sr. Batlle, will save the situation and do the country credit.

The two Bills presented by Dr. A. Vazquez Acevedo require some mention. The first withdraws from the Jockey Club the privilege conceded to it in 1900 of selling "Sports" or betting tickets on foreign races (namely, Buenos Aires). As the Club has a monopoly of the privilege, this is equivalent to entirely prohibiting the sale of such tickets. The public immorality of such a privilege was commented upon at the time. Betting upon foreign races is gambling in one of its most insidious and least defensible forms, and has not even the excuse of encouraging racing. It would certainly be to the benefit of public morality if the Bill were approved. The second Bill declares the publication of notices of suicides to be a "press offence against society," and penalises the persons (or papers) responsible with a fine of \$50 to \$100 for the first offence, and \$200 to \$300 for repetition, this to be enforced by the public prosecutor. The object of this, namely to prevent the spread of suicidal mania, is praiseworthy enough, but, with all respect to Dr. Vazquez Acevedo, we cannot express approval of the Bill. Not only is it a clear violation of the liberty of the press, but it would be difficult to enforce. Cases occur at times of the suicide of some well known person or public character, which newspapers are bound to report, and they would commit a serious breach of faith with their readers if they withheld the fact of its being a suicide or attributed the death to other causes. Sometimes the news is contained in the telegrams, and may even be of international importance, and in such cases it would be nothing short of an absurdity to compel the papers to suppress or falsify it—and the Bill leaves them no alternative. Cases also occur at times when it is doubtful whether the death is due to crime or suicide, or when a murderer completes his crime by killing himself, and in such cases it would be inconceivable to prevent the papers from publishing the circumstances. The mischief is done, not so much by reporting suicides, as by reporting them in sensational terms or elevating the act into one of heroism. This can only be reached by instilling a higher morality into the press, but any attempt to interfere with it by law would be a clear violation of the liberty of the press and a most dangerous precedent. Even in countries where the liberty of the press is less respected than in the case here, there is no attempt to interfere with the press in such a matter as this. We can hardly conceive that the Chambers will approve the Bill.

The Executive has applied to the lower Chamber withdrawing the Bill establishing a Naval School, with the object of introducing some amendments. According to some of our contemporaries, it is intended to withhold the scheme until there is some kind of a navy, the Government recognising the absurdity of training naval cadets without having vessels to put them in. The Bill was presented some little time back by the Baile Government, which, after its peculiar fashion, did not await legislative sanction or begin putting the scheme in action, establishing a "sort of" Naval School in connection with the Military Academy.

It was announced yesterday that Dr. E. Acevedo, Rector of the University, and Drs. Navarro and C. M. de Penn, Deacons of the faculties of Medicine and Law in the same, had presented their resignations as members of the University Council and also their professorships in that institution. This step, which was more or less expected, will probably bring the trouble in University affairs to an acute crisis.

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MONTEVIDEO WATERWORKS COMPANY, LIMITED.
The twenty-eighth ordinary general meeting of the shareholders of the Montevideo Waterworks Company, Limited, was held at the offices of the Company, 52, Moorgate-street, E.C., on Tuesday, March 26, Mr. James Anderson (chairman of the company) presiding.

The Chairman said: The report and accounts which I have the pleasure to submit to you to-day will, I hope, be considered by you of a satisfactory and encouraging character. Our gross receipts show an increase of £11,397, whilst our expenses are only larger by £2,610, so that of the increased earnings 77 per cent. is net profit. Our ratio of working expenses has decreased from 31.5 per cent. in 1905 to 30.6 per cent. in 1906. This result must, I think, be regarded as satisfactory when we take into account the rise that has taken place both in wages and in the price of materials. Our gross receipts, you will observe, amounted to £108,498 and the working expenses to £33,205, leaving a balance of £75,291 as the net revenue for the year. To this must be added the balance from December 31, 1905, £33,927, interest on deposit in London £132, and transfer fees £35, making a grand total of £109,389. Out of this we have paid: Debenture interest, £17,500; income tax, £2,054; interim dividend of 3 per cent. on the share capital, £15,000—a total of £34,554; leaving a disposable balance of £74,834. This balance the directors propose should be appropriated as follows:—(a) In payment of final dividend of 4 per cent., making a total of 7 per cent. for the year, free of income-tax, £20,000; (b) to depreciation fund, £10,000; (c) to special reserve fund, £10,000; (d) balance to be carried forward, £34,834—£74,834. (Applause.) You will observe that we recommend this year an increase of 1 per cent. in the dividend on the share capital, making 7 per cent., free of income-tax, for the year. Possibly some of you may think that we could, with safety, have paid a still higher rate; but your direct or indirect in the best interests of the company to pay a dividend well within our earning power, and such a there can be little risk of having to go back upon it. We have, fortunately, in this company never had to reduce our rate of dividend, and I hope we never shall. The allocation of £10,000 to depreciation fund was necessary, in view of the fact that in the course of the year we have written off from that fund the sum of £7,912, being the amount expended in reconstruction of the reservoir, to which reference is made in the report. The expansion of our business during the last two or three years has been very rapid, and, as indicated in the report, the board have felt it necessary to authorise considerable additions to the plant. We have an additional large pumping engine on order; we have authorised a third gravitation distributing main to be constructed between our high-service reservoirs and the city, and, most important of all, we have applied to the Government for the necessary wayleaves for a large steel pumping station on the River Santa Lucia and the high-service reservoirs at Las Piedras. The existing main has been in service for over thirty years, and is still in excellent condition, and is of capacity sufficient to deliver more water than the city has ever as yet required. It is apparent to your board, however, that, in view of the rapid extension of the business, it is highly desirable that a further main be laid, so as to remove any feeling of anxiety about the supply in the case of any temporary interruption of the present main.

The existing main, as I have said, is sufficient for our present number of

consumers, and it has a certain margin of capacity beyond the present demand; but this margin will rapidly disappear if the business continues its present rate of progress; and there is no reason why it should not do so, as we estimate there are still some 10,000 houses in the city that do not take their supply from the company. We should, in fact, have taken up this matter of the duplicate main two years ago; but at that time the municipality had approached the company with the view of purchasing our works and the negotiations which followed delayed the matter for a whole year. In May last, however, we laid before the Government the desirability of the immediate laying of this new main, and asked then for the necessary wayleaves, &c. Unfortunately, however, the matter has not received such prompt dispatch as we had hoped for, and, in fact, is still undecided. We hope, however, that we shall soon receive the required authority, and we shall then bring before you a proposal for an increase of the company's capital for the purpose of providing funds for the works I have just referred to. These extensions will not, of course, be immediately remunerative, and it is partly for this reason that we are strengthening the position of the company by placing sums to special reserve and carrying a large balance forward, so that we need have little apprehension of maintaining our dividend, on such increased capital as may be necessary (Hear, hear).

Mental Hygiene in Childhood.
I am quite certain that the nurse, mother, and teacher have a great responsibility in regard to bringing up children to think of others, to have high aims and ideals not only for their family, but also for their country, and not the least is the question of reverence and respect for those things which others consider holy. Such a feeling must be the basis of morality and nobleness of mind. The mind must have mental occupation, for lack of interest or vacuity of mind leads to sensuous gratifications of all kinds, not the least of which are obtained through alcohol and tobacco. The truth about these temptations in this regard, for there is no more subtle nor deadly poison to the growing mind and body than a strong drink, which lowers the resistance to disease, and by diminishing self-control, leads directly to other vicious indulgences, fatal to health, prosperity, and progress. It is a sad but nevertheless a true fact that insanity during the last few years is a steadily increasing in young persons, owing to various forms of indulgence, and to sensual gratification which can and should be avoided.

In another hundred years or so our methods of settling disputes may be as laughable and melodramatic to our more reasonable great-grandchildren as our grandfathers' romantic methods seem to us. They may think that fees paid to eminent counsel, dressed in antique shapes, to exhibit their powers before packed galleries, according to the ancient and musty rules of a game that is wholly out of date, is an absurd way of endeavouring to reconcile human differences. The whole thing must before long, one would think, tumble into the dustbin of history and become folk-lore. But the legendary charm of the absurdity will always remain.

Sir Edward Clarke or Mr. Rufus Isaacs appearing for an injured ballet-girl in a breach of promise case against a faithless and wicked peer, is only a new setting of the story of Perseus and Andromeda, with the golden addition of a special fee. Perhaps there is even a parallel for the special fee in the old myth, for may it not be said that in a sense Perseus was moved to leave his usual circuit, and appear against the dragon by the tempting special fee of Andromeda herself? Could such a glorious figure be marked on the brief of to-day, what eloquence we should listen to.—From the *"Crabill Magazine"* for April.

Cradle Cannon Craze.
London, March 28.

At Thurston's Hall yesterday T. Reece in his billiard match of 7,000 up level against F. Weiss succeeded in establishing a new official record, beating W. A. Lovejoy 2,257 at Hull last week. Securing the position for the anchor stroke on Tuesday, Reece had overnight scored 1,938 (unfinished), and yesterday he retained possession of the table at both sittings, scoring 700 more cannons. At night he was still in position with 3,338 (unfinished), his score reading 4,200, as against Weiss's 1,433.

Charles Dawson, who is conceding W. A. Lovejoy 2,500 in 8,000 up at Southport, had obtained position for the "cradles" cannon overnight when his score was 1,781. At the close of play his unfinished break was 1,446, and he had made 710 consecutive "cradles" cannons. Yesterday Dawson made 412 additional cannons, and at the close of play the scores were: Dawson (in play), 4,025; Lovejoy (receives 2,500), 3,152.

Last evening Dawson added 388 more anchor cannons, and thus scoring 1,600 more points, raised his break to 3,046

(unfinished). The scores now are: Dawson, 4,801; Lovejoy, 3,512.

The Committee of the Billiard Association will, it is announced, at a meeting to be held shortly, submit the following resolution, as an addition to the existing rules: "That in the event of both object balls touching a cushion or cushions, the balls shall be spotted, as in the case when they are found to be touching." This, if carried, will put an end to the anchor cannon.

Folly of Betting.
Practical Test of the Duke of Portland.

"Let me," Canon Horsley said, "read you a table giving the names of the papers, the winners, and the results:—
"The Sportsman nominated 197 winners; 170 were wrong.
"The Sporting Life nominated 155 winners; 139 were wrong.
"The Field nominated 165 winners; 140 were wrong.
"The Licensed Victualler nominated 110 winners; 93 were wrong.
"The Sporting Times nominated 122 winners; 104 were wrong.
"Land and Water nominated 149 winners; 131 were wrong.
"Total nominations, 898; 777 wrong.
"When I first drew attention to this subject the Duke of Portland determined to put the matter to a practical test, so he sent £7 14s. to thirteen of the sporting prophets. The result was they sent him nineteen winners and ninety-five losers. Bad as this record was for the reputation of prophets, their lack of knowledge was proved by the fact that four out of the thirteen were only able to guess one winner to thirty-five losers. The Duke saw the utter folly of the thing, and remarked that if he had yielded to the temptation of backing their tips he would by this time have been in the workhouse.

"On another occasion I selected nineteen papers, and found that there were thirteen right guesses against 114 wrong ones."—Rudolph de Cordoba, in *The Quiver*.

Mr. Lloyd-George's Patent Law.
A great deal of nonsense has been taken by Protectionists during the last few years about imaginary advantages which Free Trade gives to foreign enterprise. It is curious that all the time there existed one hardship for British trade which was anything but imaginary, and that it was not until a Liberal Government came in that that hardship was removed. Mr. Lloyd-George's Bill removes a genuine grievance. Under the present patent law a foreigner can take out a patent in England for the simple and obstructive purpose of preventing its being worked in this country. This power has been used without scruple or mercy by great syndicates to crush British inventors and British industries. Mr. Lloyd-George has no intention of discouraging foreigners from taking out patents. He is only going to insist that they shall work them in this country. His Bill has been called a Protective measure. It is really a great Free Trade measure, emancipating inventive genius from a system which encourages syndicates to take out patents simply to prevent other people from applying their brains to a particular problem in a particular country while they are developing their patent somewhere else.

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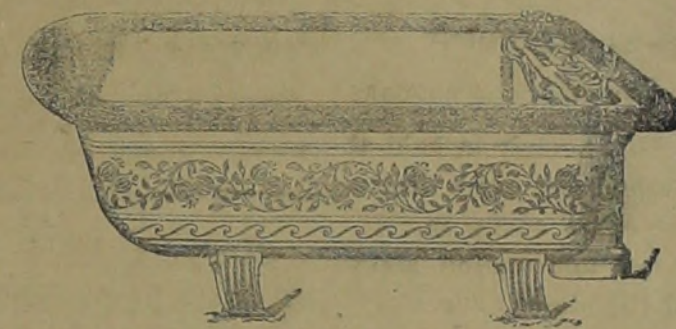
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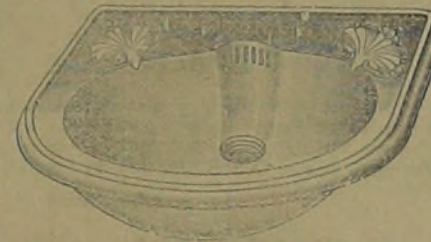


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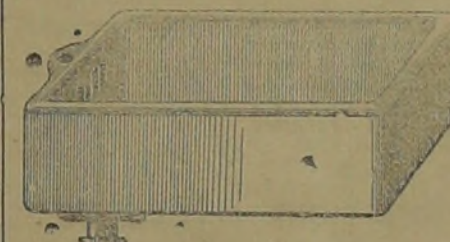
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Análisis bacteriológicos
