NEWS OF THE DAY.

Saints Isidro, Cecil and Isidro.—Daniel O'Connell died, 1847.—135 days past, 230 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Senators were convoked on Monday, but no quorum. Though no business was transacted, Sr. Tiscornia presented a complaint to the President to the effect that the Committee Report on the Divorce Bill had been issued without his having been afforded an opportunity of expressing his opinion or even of properly studying the Bill, though he was supposed to be a member of the reporting Committee. In view of this he declined to take any further part in the proceedings of the Committee.—Discussion was impossible at the moment, but no doubt the affair will be brought up again when the Senate is in quorum. The incident has caused considerable comment, the more especially as it is known that Sr. Tiscornia is one of the Senators opposed to the Bill.

The text of the Report referred to above has not yet been published, but we understand that there is a majority in favor of the Bill, with some amendments of detail, and a minority against it.

A Decree has been issued ordaining the erection in the Plaza Independencia of a monument to General Artigas, the founder of Uruguayan nationality. For this purpose a competition, open to all, will be opened for models for the statue, with prizes of \$2000 and \$1000, and, in addition, five sculptors of world-wide renown will be asked to make models, for a fee of \$1200 (\$255) each. Dr. Juan Zorrilla de San Martín is appointed to prepare a brief history of the personality of General Artigas, with the documentary and historical data likely to be of use to the artists. (The Decree uses the word *escultores*, but whether this means designs or models is not entirely clear.) The expected conference on electoral reform was not held on Monday, and for the moment there is no further novelty to report on this topic.

Remembering the courtesy shown by the Argentine Government on the recent occasion of the presidential election, the Uruguayan Government has very properly decided to reciprocate by sending an official delegation (having no war vessels available) to salute the Argentine Government and people on one of their patriotic anniversaries. At first it was intended to do this on May 25, but now it has been decided to leave it until July 9, anniversary of the declaration of Argentine independence.

Central Uruguay Railway Company.

\$250,000 in New Rolling Stock.

Some months ago certain of our native contemporaries attacked the Central Uruguay Railway Company, alleging that its rolling stock was seriously insufficient to meet the requirements of the country, and that, while declaring fat dividends, it took no pains to bring its elements into line with the rapid development of the country and the much larger quantities of produce which it was called upon to handle.

The injustice of this attack is best illustrated by stating that the Company is spending at the present season the large sum of over \$1,200,000 gold, or over quarter of a million pounds sterling, in new rolling-stock, part of which is already in use, and the rest under order or construction for an early date.

This new rolling stock includes 28 locomotives of different type, most of them heavy traffic engines; 24 passenger or saloon cars of different types; 28

breaks, and no fewer than 448 cargo and cattle wagons, making a total of 500 new wagons for passenger and cargo purposes.

Over fifty cargo and cattle wagons have been put in circulation recently, and the number is being added to steadily as they become ready, the workshops at Peñarol being extraordinarily busy building or putting together the pieces sent out from England.

The Central Railway is not much given to self-advertisement, but we think that if our native contemporaries were more generally made aware that it was just spending considerably over a million dollars in new rolling stock, they might for once be induced to do it justice, or at the least recognise that it was giving very practical proof of confidence in the continued prosperity of the country.

We may add that we have just received the Directors' Report for the half-year ended December 31st, and will make our usual extracts from the same in the course of a day or two.

The Literary Society.

The first meeting of the season of this Society was held in the Lafone Memorial Hall, and the attendance of close upon a hundred persons, the majority being ladies, augured well for the success of future meetings.

The choir was taken by the Rev. H. A. Allpas, and the first half-hour was devoted to business matters. A new Committee was elected as follows:—Messrs. R. J. Kennedy, President; Rev. H. A. Kennedy, in accepting his election as President, made a brief speech in which he expressed his opinion of the usefulness of such a Society and his desire to aid its work as far as he could. Business was a plentiful supply of tea and cakes was dispensed by a group of young ladies, and after that there was performed a short program of songs, the contributors being the Hon. Mrs. Kennedy, Mrs. Kobbey, Miss Ayre, Mr. H. Marshall, Mr. T. J. Ashe and Mr. H. Birbeck, the accompanists being Mrs. Ashe, Mrs. Hill and Mr. H. C. Ayre. A very pleasant evening was brought to a close by an amusing Irish dialogue, cleverly recited by the Misses Maud and Kathleen Kennedy.

THE PEACE CONGRESS.

New York, April 15.

The National Arbitration and Peace Congress was formally opened today. Mr. Andrew Carnegie, the president, in his address to the assembled delegates said that they were met that night to urge the speedy removal of the foulest stain that remained to disgrace humanity since slavery was abolished—the killing of man by man in battle as a mode of settling international disputes. The peace Society welcomed to membership advocates of all forms of opposition to war. They cared little for the mode, everything for the result. They favored the program of the Interparliamentary Union, and wished that powerful organization God-speed. They supported every proposal that made for peace. Having quoted the British Prime Minister with approval, Mr. Carnegie proceeded:—

"Personally, I am a convert to the league of peace idea—the formation of an international police, never for aggression, always for protection, if ever needed, to the peace of the civilized world. It requires only agreement of a sufficient number of nations to establish this idea. Recently five nations—Germany, France, Russia, Japan, and our own country—combined their forces in China under command of a German General for a specific purpose, which was successfully accomplished. We urge this plan as the easiest and speediest means of attaining international peace. Suppose those five nations, or others, propose at The Hague Conference that they and such other nations as concur agree to say to the world that no other nation shall be permitted to disturb the peace. The nations thus combined would constitute an overwhelming force; peace would be restored, for resistance would be folly. Nevertheless, the overwhelming force must be in reserve, each nation agreeing, when necessary, to exert force to keep peace, and to contribute its agreed-upon quota, just as the five Powers did in China. Before resorting to force it would be well to begin by proclaiming non-intercourse with the offending nation. No exchange of produce, no loans, no military or naval supplies, no mail—these restrictions would serve as a solemn warning and probably prove effective. Force should always be the last resort. Let us hope this plan will be submitted to The

Hague Conference by the delegates of our Republic. Then the world will know that America stands for peace through a league of Powers pledged to maintain it.

"It lies to-day in the power of one man to found this league of peace. Perhaps our President may yet have that part to play. He seems born for great roles in the world drama. He it was who breathed a breath of life into the Hague Conference by sending five leading Powers to it for the settlement of their disputes; who closed the war between Russia and Japan; who recently induced Mexico and several of our neighbors to join in remonstrances against war between two of the smaller Powers. This first step in the right direction is a presage of the day when such intervention will be made effective by agreement between the American Powers. Would that the great peacemaker of the future might be Theodore Roosevelt! Man of many triumphs, this last would lift him to the highest places in history.

"At this moment, however, it is not in his hands, but in those of the German Emperor, alone of all men, that the power to abolish war seems to rest. His invitation to form a union of nations for this specific purpose would result in more than five nations gladly responding to his call. And, as in the temporary league of nations in China, so in this grander league, a German General would rightly command the allied forces. Much has been written and said of the Emperor as a menace to the peace of Europe, but I think unjustly. So far let me remind you, he has been nearly twenty years on the throne and is guiltless of shedding blood. No war can be charged to him. His sin hereafter may be one of omission, that having been entrusted with power to abolish war, he failed to rise to this transcendent duty."

Letter from Mr. Roosevelt.

A letter from President Roosevelt, who was unable to be present, was read to the Congress. Mr. Roosevelt expressed sympathy both strong and real with the purposes of the Congress. He asked all good and earnest men who believed strongly in the cause but had not the responsibility of upholding the nation's honor not to insist upon the impossible, thereby putting off the day when the possible could be accomplished. "Harm and not good," the letter continued, "would result if the most advanced nations—those in which most freedom for the individual is combined with most efficiency in securing orderly justice as between individuals—should by agreement disarm and place themselves at the mercy of other peoples less advanced and still in a stage of military barbarism or military despotism. Anything in the nature of general disarmament would do harm and not good if it left the civilized peace-loving peoples—those with the highest standards of municipal and international obligation and duty—unable to check the other peoples who have no such standards and who acknowledge no such obligations."

The President referred to the history of the United States during the past half-dozen years as justifying the claim that she should be heard in the cause of international peace, for "without sacrificing our own rights we have yet scrupulously respected the rights of all other peoples." In conclusion, Mr. Roosevelt expressed the hope that a general arbitration treaty would be adopted by the nations, that the Hague Conference would be greatly increased in power and made a permanent, and that the Judges would be made permanent and given adequate salaries so as to render it increasingly probable that they would decide cases between nations exactly as a Judge within the United States borders decided between individuals.

Mr. Root, who followed, eloquently set forth that the greatest benefit of The Hague Conference of 1907 would be the fact of the Conference itself in its powerful influence in moulding the characters of men, and in the spectacle it would afford of all the Great Powers of the earth meeting in the name of peace and exalting as worthy of honor the desire for national self-control, considerate judgement, and the willingness to do justice.

Effect of Migration on the Race.

"The Effect of Migration on the British Race" was the subject of a lecture given by Mr. E. John Solano at the conversazione of the Ethnological Society in the Galleries of the Royal Society of British Artists.

Sir Henry Craik, M.P., who took the chair in the absence of Sir Gilbert Parker, M.P., said it was beginning to be recognized that in changing climate and environment man began a life which after a time changed his character, or, at least, the character of his descendants.

Mr. Solano, after explaining that excessive light as well as excessive heat were in the long run fatal to living organisms, and that fair people were more injuriously affected by them than dark people, said that in Great Britain itself an alteration was taking place in the physique and character of the inhabitants. The fair type was disappearing because, although the assertion might seem strange, the island was not far enough north for that type, and also because the fair race was not suited to life in cities. On the other hand, the darker people were not only of shorter stature, but were more liable to malignant disorders, nervous diseases, and insanity.

As for the migration of the British race, it was an undeniable fact that human types were made for the conditions of their proper environment, removal from which was in the long run prejudicial. There was no sign at present of extinction over asking our colonists, but the question to be considered was whether there was any evidence of danger. Perhaps some might be found in the fact that no insurance company would, except at specially high rates, issue a policy to any white man within thirty degrees of the Equator. Something might be learnt from what was happening in the United States, where the strong light, acting on the insufficient pigment of fair people, caused early exhaustion and great loss of emotional stability.

All American authorities agreed that fair people deteriorated rapidly in the United States. Major Woodruff, a surgeon in that country's army, held that if Saxon immigration failed the population of the States would ultimately be descendants of Greeks, Slavs, Hungarians, Servians, and Bulgarians. He said nothing about Canada, which probably would become the stronghold of the fair white man in the Western world.

In Mr. Solano's opinion the British race would survive in all surroundings because man was a thinking animal capable of inventing protections against unfavorable conditions, but each portion of the Empire would ultimately be populated by the type most suitable to the locality. In most cases it would in all likelihood be a dark type, because dark men were not only better able to resist a long light and heat but they were less liable to the diseases of hot countries. He suggested the establishment of an Imperial Anthropological Survey and an Imperial Anthropometric Survey to advise Colonial Governments, and, as the growth of racial differences might prove a disintegrating force in the Empire, he advocated the use of educational agencies to preserve a community of ideas.

Fill King Dwd.

From street vendor of pills to millionaire. That in a phrase was the life history of Mr. Thomas Beecham, the founder of the famous pill firm, who has died at Southport at the age of eighty-six.

About fifty years ago Mr. Beecham, who sprang from an Oxford stock, began to sell his pills from a stall in the marketplace of St. Helens. It might be said that he made his fortune out of a phrase. One day he was standing at a street corner in the town with a trayful of pills, when a woman came up to him and said the pills had done her so much good that they were "worth a guinea a box." The phrase pleased Mr. Beecham and he adopted it. He was a great believer in the value of advertising, and so the phrase became familiar to the world.

Before very long his business began to grow. At the rear of his house in Westfield-street, St. Helens, a small factory was erected, but soon this became inadequate, for his advertising genius brought orders pouring in from all parts of the country. Larger premises were erected, and these in turn gave place to the magnificent buildings which now exist, equipped with the finest pill making machinery in the world. They cost over £30,000.

An instance of Mr. Beecham's readiness to take advantage of any method of booming his pills occurred a few years ago. A ship was wrecked at Blackpool, and in the early hours of the morning Mr. Beecham's agent had covered its hull with the familiar legend, "Take Beecham's Pills—worth a guinea a box." This led to some litigation, but the expense was gladly paid for the sake of the extra advertisement for the pills given by the reports of the proceedings.

Mr. Beecham himself superintended the advertising department. He was an indefatigable worker, and when the day opened at his factory at six in the morning he was always there to direct operations.

Twelve years ago, at a public gathering of journalists, Mr. Beecham stated that his firm spent £100,000 a year on advertising.

Twenty-five years ago Mr. Beecham took his son Joseph into partnership, and thirteen years ago retired altogether from the business.

LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, APRIL 15.

To-day the Prime Minister will open the Conference of Colonial Premiers at the Colonial Office. Sir Wilfrid Laurier arrived on Saturday from Canada, and General Botha from the Transvaal. The Premiers will be presented to-morrow with the freedom of the City of London.

Mr. L. Harcourt, M.P., speaking at Bacup, referred to the House of Lords as an historic ruin, and declared that its reform would be the foundation of a new Magna Charta.

Lord Wm. Nevill was sentenced to 12 months' imprisonment at Clerkenwell Sessions on Saturday, for stealing jewellery by a trick—the substitution of a sealed box containing coal for a similar box of diamonds.

Twopence a dozen was asked at Old-street on Saturday to be the price paid an out-worker for making purses.

Miss Irene Gillard, a Reigate barmaid, before she committed suicide, wrote a letter criticising "degraded and drink-sodden men," which was read at the inquest on Saturday.

Mac Fee Lung, a Chinese magician, performing in the music-halls, was summoned for desertion by his English wife at Willesden on Saturday.

Newcastle United are the First League champions, and Notts Forest and Chelsea will go up from the Second League, while Derby County will most probably go down with Stoke. Fulham will be champions of the Southern League.

In the final for the Rugby County Championship, Devon and Durham drew.

Oldham and Warrington are the finalists for the Northern Union Cup.

Dawson has made a break of 7,184, and Aiken of 7,172.

Mr. A. M. Chance, who wishes to create a second garden city near Birmingham, states that 500 people are needed to build and occupy the houses that could be erected on the land over which he possesses an option.

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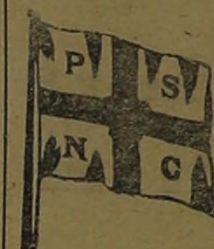
