POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Saturday. Discussion being commenced of the Bill relative to embargoes on salaries, Dr. Rodriguez Larreta presented an alternative Bill of more general extent, and the matter was referred back to Committee. Approval in general and detail was given to the Bill for the electrification of the Union and Maroñas Tramway, the Bill for establishing tramways in San José, the Bill for building a branch railway from Fray Bentos to Algora, and some other minor Bills. The Chamber then adjourned.

Though the question of an Immigrants' Hotel has lain dormant for a while, the Government has not lost sight of it. The difficulty seems to be to find an appropriate building, the idea of taking the "Balmorais" having been dismissed. The Government is now said to have its eye on a disused tramway station in Calle Colombia (Aguada), though that is inconveniently far from the port for such a purpose. Meanwhile the Chambers show no hurry in considering the Bill presented several months ago for creating the Immigrants' Hotel and Service, and, like many other useful measures, it remains dormant in Committee and is not even honored with a report.

At the meeting of lawyers and doctors held in the Athenaeum on Sunday, the election took place, by a large majority, of Drs. D. Terra, F. Sosa and J. Freitas, as the term from which the Government will select the new Rector of the University, in place of Dr. E. Acevedo, who recently resigned. Although the post of Rector is shortly to be abolished, the election seemed to create unusual interest, and there was a large attendance, including three of the Ministers. It is expected that the definite election will fall on Dr. Duvinoso Terra. The Minister of Industries and Education will excuse himself from intervening on account of his relationship to this candidate.

Stoker Scott.

We are indebted to our weekly contemporary for the following information respecting the stoker Thomas Scott of the "Poitou".

From various sources we find that Thomas Scott was born at Newport, Monmouthshire, South Wales, on the 2nd Feb. 1877, and joined the "Poitou" at Buenos Aires on February 15, 1907, coming from the Sailors' Home there. He went in the "Poitou" to France and returned with her, a fact which shows he was a steady man. He knew little or no French, but proved himself a first rate comrade, and was very much liked by all the crew, being a genial, willing worker always contented and in good spirits. He was a strongly built muscular man. Engineer Guyenot, who speaks English fairly well, says that he always takes an English fireman if he can get one, for the purpose of keeping up his English. He describes Scott as a middle-sized man with light chestnut moustache and blue eyes, 30 years of age. According to a telegram from the Sailors' Home at Buenos Aires, Scott was born at Glasgow, not Newport, but nothing further is known of him.

We may add that the British Minister, Mr. R. J. Kennedy, has received a letter from Mr. H. W. Burnett, the British Vice-Consul at Maldonado, dated 16th, stating that amongst the bodies washed ashore was that of a fireman aboard called Thomas Scott. As the body was much decomposed, and could not be moved, I only saw a tattoo

mark on his back representing an eagle fighting two snakes. I am told there were several other marks, but do not know what they were. The body was taken to Rocha to be buried, and I made a rude cross with his name and date to know place of burial.

The subscription to the memory of Scott promises to give a satisfactory result. The Hon. Mrs. Kennedy has already collected \$50, apart from what may have been noted on the other lists in circulation.

School Terrors in Germany.

The Burden of Memory Work.

The late Eduard von Hartmann complained that the German system of education and examination is approaching nearer to that of the Chinese, and a considerable number of his countrymen now affirm that the idea of true education is being sacrificed to pedantry and the almost exclusive cultivation of memory, the lowest of the mental faculties. Some significant remarks are quoted in the *Nation* (New York) "Kindermord"—child-murdering—is the epithet applied to the German educational system by Prof. F. Huettenlocher, a sanitary expert of Prague. In the instruction in languages, which takes up many hours, there is an excess of grammar, a neglect of the contents of books. History and geography have been degraded to mere memory-work. In England there are only three or four hours of sedentary brainwork to every hour of bodily exercise; in Prussia, 17; in Bavaria, 25; and memory work is intruded even into gymnastics. Oculists are demanding that the first lessons in reading and writing be deferred from the sixth year to the ninth, because of the great damage done. In many of the schools the lighting arrangements are such as to cause myopia. There is too much of the spirit of militarism in German schools, write J. Towns in the *Tagblatt*. Pupils are not treated as individuals, but like pawns on a chess-board.

Dr. Julius von Negelein gives details which help us to understand why, to many Germans, the recalling of school-days, once so grateful, is to-day the terror of terrors. Excessive day work, supplemented by night work—in some cases up to midnight—leaves no time for exercise or sleep. "Whose heart would not turn with a pang if he could hear, as I did a few days ago, a poor child, an aemic, timid girl of twelve, exclaim: 'Oh, if it would only rain! This lovely weather makes one so eager to go out and play! Thus do we sacrifice to the phantom of an ideal education the joy of life, health, and happiness.' He speaks of a teacher who advised his pupils to drink strong coffee at night so that they might work longer. "Anæmia and nervousness are steadily on the increase among our school children." If a child sinks down exhausted, it is "whipped on like a horse." "I know children who pray to God every day to let them pass their examination, because otherwise their father would kill them." Prof. Eulenburg has collected figures relating to suicides of school-children. There were 950 cases in the period 1883 to 1900. Columns of such evidence might be cited. A favourite proverb among German teachers is: "Whom the gods hate they make a pedagogue." Behind these problems lie those of the teachers' insufficient pay, too large classes, too short vacations, school books not up to date, and so on. Dr. Leo Smolle, referring to the fact that Gladstone found recreation and delight in Homer's studies in his old age, writes as follows: "Name, if you can, a German official, wealthy business man, or rentier, who, of his own free will, devotes himself in old age to science and study and takes pleasure in them! The school, with its eternal teaching and examining, has cured them of all desire ever to have anything more to do with intellectual work or intercourse with the Muses."

Paraguay.

From the *B. A. Standard*.—A correspondent writes us from Asunción, Paraguay, that things there are by no means as happy as an optimist could wish, gold at 1250 and difficult to get at that, business very stagnant, with fears of commercial failures owing to tightness of money. It is reported that a financial bill will be laid before Congress by the Executive shortly, but no details as to its purport are given. The best thing in Paraguay, continues our correspondent, is cattle land in the Paraguayan Chaco, and it will interest many of your readers to know that the estate of the late Niño de Villegas, 60 leagues, lots 15, 19 and 113 in the second zone are valued by the "peritos" in the "testamentario" (probate) at \$650,000 gold. All the land in that neighbourhood, lots 20, 21, 22, 23 and 117 up to 122, each number embracing 10 leagues, can be recommended to capitalists, and can be reached in a day's journey from Asunción. There is considerable discontent in shipping quarters over the difficulties of discharging cargo. At present the port is cluttered with 11,000 tons of general merchandise awaiting discharge, and the off-loading of a vessel per diem is only 30 or 40 tons. The Finance Minister has applied to Congress for a larger appropriation for the port works. Mihanovich and Co. have issued a notice that until there are adequate facilities for discharging and storing, their steamers will discharge into lighters for account of consignees.

The "Black Idol."

Under the title "The Black Idol," M. Laurent Tailhade contributes to the *Mercure de France* a striking article on the alarming increase of the morphia habit in France and other Western countries. After disposing of some misconceptions, such as that morphia produces dreams or visions, whereas its chief primary effect is an extraordinary pleasurable stimulation of the wakeful imagination, the writer (as quoted in the *London Tribune*) speaks of some of the orgies to which the cult of the "elixir of death" has given rise in Paris. The son of a banker is named as having died in a hideous lodging-house off the Faubourg St. Honoré, after having squandered twenty fortunes, at the end of eight days of uninterrupted morphinisation. It is, however, far from the case that all the maniacs of this kind are members of aristocratic clubs or wealthy demi-mondaines like a certain "Queen of the Sahara," as to whom Dr. Bénilon has published his observations. Morphia has, M. Tailhade declares, fewer poets among its victims than alcohol, but more politicians. "Dr. Louveau saw General Boulanger make an injection in the Elysées Gardens in 1887 at the moment of the Schoebel incident. Prince Bismarck only spoke in the Reichstag after having injected a fairly large dose, and toward the end of his life he used his favourite drug largely. Guy de Maupassant, maniac at once of morphia, ether, and cocaine, joined symptoms of general paralysis with toxic delirium in the asylum where he ended his life so miserably. And well-informed persons state that Dr. Babinski submitted the illustrious Charcot to daily injections of several centigrammes of morphia during the last months of his life. Alphonse Daudet was another eminent victim. Most of the houses that pretend to cure the habit are either conducted on the lines of a casino, the patients having abundant liberty to obtain illicit supplies of the drug, or are something very like private prisons, where suicide is not unusual. There are, however, a few sanatoria where, in a month of severe restriction, the victim is weaned of his fatal predilection, and real cures are effected.

The "Rosetti" in Collision.

The Lamport and Holt liner "Rosetti" has been seriously damaged by the effects of a collision in the River Mersey with the Harrison liner "Collegian." It appears that the "Collegian," on ward bound, was proceeding down the river. At the time the "Rosetti" was steaming up stream, and off the Salisbury Dock Tower the vessels collided, the stern of the "Collegian" striking the "Rosetti" with great force on the port side in the fore part of the bridge. A hole was cut in the "Rosetti" extending below the water line, the water pouring in at such a rate that it was obvious she could not float for long. The "Rosetti" at once steamed full speed for the Cheshire side, and was successfully beached opposite the Guinea Cap. The "Collegian" also sustained serious damage, her stern and bow plates being crushed in. The "Rosetti" has since been floated and is now undergoing repairs. She was built in 1900, and is owned by the Liverpool, Brazil and River Plate Steam Navigation Co. (Messrs. Lamport and Holt, managers), and is well known at this port.

Wireless Apparatus on Board Passenger Vessels.

London, April 23.

The Colonial Merchant Shipping Conference held its seventh meeting yesterday at the Foreign Office, under the presidency of Mr. Lloyd-George.

On the subject of workmen's Compensation it was decided that the adoption of uniform legislation is desirable with a view to extending to seamen the benefits of the Acts. The British shipowners' representatives dissented, and recorded the view that some system of compulsory insurance for seamen should be adopted.

With regard to the decision of the Conference that the Commonwealth adopt the provisions of the New Zealand Act regarding the load line, the Imperial delegates abstained from voting.

It was decided that imprisonment for desertion be abolished in the country in which the seaman is engaged except in the case of a seaman who, after negotiating his advance note, fails wilfully to join his ship or deserts before the note is payable. In respect of desertion from ships other than those registered in the Commonwealth or whose final port of discharge is in Australia, it is provided that deserters shall be placed on board such vessels on request by competent authority. This resolution may have to be reconsidered, as Sir W. Lyne was not present when it was passed.

A rider moved by the British shipowners' representatives to the effect that in the event of the abolition of imprisonment for desertion the shipowner be relieved from responsibility for the repatriation of a deserter was not accepted by the Colonial delegates.

A resolution was passed urging the Board of Trade and the Australian and New Zealand Governments to consider the desirability of the provision on board ships carrying passengers of apparatus for transmitting messages by wireless telegraphy.

LIVE-STOCK SHOW.—A Departmental Live Stock Show and Fair will be held at Tacuarembó on October 20, after those at Salto and Paysandu.

THE "ORISSA."—This vessel of the P. S. N. Co., arrived yesterday afternoon, but at the time of writing the passenger list had not come on shore, nor were the mails delivered. Among the passengers leaving by the "Orissa" for Chile were Mr. F. N. Martinez, Mr. E. Oscar Leffeld, and Mrs. F. Z. de Toro and daughter.

EXCURSIONS.—On Saturday next the Central Uruguay Railway Company will run an excursion train at reduced rates to Minas, where there will be local festivities in connection with the laying of the foundation stone of the Catholic Club. The same day there will also be an excursion train to the border town of Rivera, which may be visited for the sum of \$10, first class return. This is an interesting opportunity, as the train traverses practically the whole length of the country.

YOUNG SPAIN.—The son and heir of the King of Spain was baptised on Sunday with great ceremony. All the Royal Families of Europe were represented, the Duke of Connaught standing for King Edward. A Cardinal and two Archbishops performed the ceremony. The babe, who is generally known as the Prince of Asturias, received the names of Alfonso, Pio, Cristiano, Eduardo, Francisco, Guillermo, Carlos, Enrique, Eugenio, Fernando, Antonio. Surely, a great number of names for so small a child. Some are content to go through life with nothing more imposing than Tom or Bob.

VISITOR.—Among the travellers to the River Plate by the R.M.S. "Danubio," on Saturday last, was Mr. James Knott, Director and General Manager of the imp. riant "Princes" Line of steamers. Mr. Knott has come out here with the object of studying personally the state and conditions of the principal ports at which his steamers call, with a view to advancing the interests of his Company. During his few hours stay here, Mr. Knott, accompanied by Mr. John Christophersen agent for the Company here, made a rapid inspection of the Port Works, and expressed himself as much pleased with all he saw and with the prospects of improved facilities for movement of shipping which the works promise at an early date. Mr. Knott left for Buenos Aires in the "Danubio" the same afternoon.

MURDERER CAPTURED.—After a long and troublesome hunt the police have succeeded in capturing the murderer of the cobbler Mantaraz, a week ago. This proves to be an Italian tramp named Carlos Salbeni, also known as Santini. He is described as a habitual drunkard and a thorough degenerate of a type so low as hardly to be responsible for his actions. Mantaraz had given him food and shelter for the evening, when Salbeni conceived the idea of murdering his host in order to rob him of his watch and the few dollars which constituted the poor man's savings. Having carried his purpose into execution with a heavy wooden mallet, he coolly went to sleep in the room adjoining that where lay the dead body of his victim until the next morning, then walked quietly away to another quarter of the town, and was under arrest the following night for being drunk and disorderly, the police having no suspicion that he was the murderer for the reason that the crime had not yet been discovered. On his release he wandered about aimlessly, and was eventually captured in the Camino del Cerro, having been tracked by the places at which he had called to purchase drink. Suspicion had fallen on him through his having sold a revolver identified as having belonged to the dead man. He has fully confessed his crime, with circumstantial details some of which are hardly reconcilable with the evidence known to the authorities, but this may be explained by his habitually b-fuddled mental condition. The crime had been committed for nearly two days before it was discovered, owing to the lonely situation of the victim's house.
