POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives no quorumed on Thursday.

Affairs in Rivera continue to furnish material for our native contemporaries, but we cannot say that we find them of much general interest, and think that they would be better left now to the action of the judicial authorities. This elaborate "post-mortem" examination of excesses and outrages is not edifying, and it seems chiefly to serve as a weapon for partisan recrimination. Sr. A. Marquez, the fugitive ex-prefect of Rivera, has published a sort of manifesto in which he tries to represent himself as the innocent but highly injured victim of spite on the part of the Government and the Judicial authorities. All the rumors of fresh disturbances seem to have died out for the present.

Yesterday's *Tiempo* again attacks the proposed manifestation of the Club Vida Nueva, saying that the very general and steadily increasing disapprobation which it has provoked should cause the Club to desist from its unhappy idea, unless it desires to lose all public prestige. The *Tiempo* concludes its article with the following plain-spoken remarks:—"Partisan agitations will only complicate the affair of Rivera and obstruct the course of justice. The country cannot live in the midst of these anxieties and alarms without suffering great harm. From all sides we hear of the pessimistic impressions prevailing amongst men of work, exemplified in the paralysation of business and the selling off of estates. The fear of fresh perturbations is spreading, and we who are defenders of peace and who do not believe that the Republic is fatally bound to burn her ships in the general conflagration of civil war, are regarded as visionaries. It is necessary that we cry halt on this dangerous decline, and that we all contribute as far as we can to the pacification of spirits. Let us leave the Tribunal to carry out their task in an atmosphere which will make their decisions respected; and instead of lamentably wasting our time and injuring our moral and material interests by quarrels over secondary matters, let us devote our energies to the final extinction of the still smoldering fire which, by the force of stirring up, may yet revive from its ashes. At times we doubt of the self-governing destinies of our nationality, when we see still perpetuating themselves in the national temper those antique aberrations and errors which were excusable in the period of inexperience, but which now show incurable madness. Are we to think that the political parties exist in order to bring disaster on the country? According to the direction which they are now trying to give events, it would really seem that this were their providential mission, as if in the reversion to past times, they wished to fulfil the law of history, that of the law of the sword, which has already once delivered us, exhausted and depleted, into the hands of the conqueror."

The Directorate of the nationalist party has issued a circular letter to the Departmental Committees, to the effect that, whilst the party has been the object of unjust attacks and aspersions from a certain section of its adversaries, it has nothing to fear from an examination of its acts, and therefore it is to be hoped that its members will reply to the attacks made on them in a spirit of strict moderation and culture, avoiding any acts or manifestations that could contribute to foster ill-feeling and partisan passion.—This, which is only in harmony with the antecedents of the nationalists, has produced a most favorable impression. We wonder how many centuries it will be necessary to wait before the directing authorities of the "colorado" party prove themselves capable of issuing such a document!

People's eyes are being gradually opened to the objectionable character of the ultra-protective soap tariff Bill, which it was tried to "chastise" through the Chambers in such suspicious manner. The *Telegrafo Marítimo* of Thursday evening calls attention to it, saying, amongst other things, that it would place a prohibitive price on imported common soap, to the injury of commerce and the Customs Revenue, and especially of the poorer of class of consumers. It concludes by saying that we should "be canny," or go slow, in these matters, or we may fall and break our nose.

Monday afternoon next has been fixed for the reception of the Persian Ambassador General Isao Khan.

VICTORIA HALL.

LADIES' SUBSCRIPTION CINDERELLA DANCE.

The Subscription Dance given at the Victoria Hall on Thursday evening was both brilliant and successful in every respect, and not a few declared that it was the best dance of the kind given in Montevideo for the last four or five years, which is high praise. Unusual animation was lent by the presence of a large contingent, some twenty-five or thirty, of officers from the various British and United States war vessels in port, all in uniform.

These gentlemen greatly helped to make things "bustle," and saw to it that no lady sat out any dance for lack of a partner. The Hall was very prettily and profusely decorated with flags, baccara, garlands and flowers, the arrangement of which showed great pains and good taste. Amongst other happy ideas was that of placing small refreshment tables, decorated with flowers, around the gallery. The supply of refreshments was as liberal as it was well-chosen. The only questionable point was the orchestra—it seems strange that it should be so difficult to get a really good dance orchestra here—but this did not prevent proceedings being kept up with spirit until a fairly advanced hour. The attendance was large, very representative and essentially English speaking. There were some remarkably pretty young ladies present, and some very handsome and tasteful gowns, cream white and pale blue being apparently the favorite colors. The organization of the whole affair was nearly all the work of Miss Nuttall and Miss Murray Wilson, and they were much congratulated on the great success attained. We do not think we can pay them a better compliment than by saying that every one hopes for an early repetition.

MR. CLEVELAND ON THE NEGRO QUESTION.

New York, April 15.

Mr. Hill having taken issue with the President on tariffs, ex-President Cleveland now attacks his position on the negro question. If Mr. Hill represents the Democratic machine, Mr. Cleveland is the type of the independent Democrat who believe in recalling the party to its ancient beliefs—or some of them. It was always the ancient belief of this party that the white South should decide for itself how it would be governed and how it would govern the negro. That is still Mr. Cleveland's view. He is full of platonic kindness for his colored brother, but denies that emancipation or the possession of civil rights has altered his racial character. He approves of Mr. Booker Washington's ideas that in education and industry, not in politics, lies the salvation of the blacks, and declares that "our fellow-countrymen in the South, surrounded by eight millions of negroes, are entitled to our utmost consideration and sympathetic fellow-ship." The fate of the negro, says this eminent ex-President, "depends mainly upon the sentiment and conduct of the leading and responsible white men of the South."

Mr. Cleveland is short, disagreeing with President Roosevelt and agreeing with the Democratic Committee of Spunky Point, Illinois, in Mr. Hay's belief, is of opinion that "this is a White Man's country." As his friends

still think him a possible Democratic candidate for the Presidency next year, his present confession of faith concerning an issue far more momentous than that of tariffs must be read in the light of that possibility. His speech is an appeal for the Southern vote, whether for himself or for some other Democrat. It is his response, and not his only, to that system of putting negroes in office by which President Roosevelt has raised the negro question from a dormant to an active place in Presidential politics.

New York, April 16.

Approval of Mr. Cleveland's speech for a white man's country comes from most various quarters. The South naturally welcomes a manifesto which reinforces from the North the Southern opposition to President Roosevelt's policy of appointing negroes to certain offices over white men and so raising the race question generally. The North is beginning to understand the South and Southern conditions, say the leading journals of Virginia, Georgia, Alabama, and other States. Mr. Cleveland, remarks the *Mobile Register*, while avoiding all offence to Northern prejudices, has fully and fairly stated the Southern view and strikes the true note. Mr. Clark Howell, of the Atlanta *Constitution*, believes that this speech, if the North accepts it, will do more towards solving the negro problem than anything for a hundred years. The Tennessee Senate endorses the speech, and invites the North to settle the question on that basis.

All this might have been expected, since Mr. Cleveland is the visible and audible sign of a divided North, while the South is united. But the *Sun*, which dislikes him, personally and politically, describes the speech as going to the heart of the question, as marked by generosity of sentiment and accurate perception of facts, and as representing a public opinion in the North which is growing fast, and is bound to become prevalent, regardless of party lines. Still more notable is a leading article in the *Tribune*, the most powerful of the Republican organs, which describes the speech as admirable, and agrees with Mr. Cleveland that the solution of the negro problem rests mainly with the leading responsible white men of the South. Dissenting from this Democratic ex-President on some points, asserting also that there are limits to the sympathetic attitude which the North can maintain towards the South, and insisting that the negro must have civil and political rights, as he shall become worthy of them, the *Tribune* lends the weight of its high authority to Mr. Cleveland's main idea, which certainly is not Mr. Roosevelt's idea. It is by no means impossible that Mr. Cleveland's declaration, thus taken up and supported, may affect the whole Presidential contest. It certainly does effect the public opinion of the North on what is probably the gravest question this country has to settle.

"Character Books" for Servants.

Mrs. Frederic Harrison, in an article on "Mistress and Maid," in *The Nineteenth Century*, suggests that the German system of a "Character Book" shall be introduced into this country. But she does not clearly state the fundamental fact that in Germany the use of such a book is compulsory on both master and servant. This is the crux of the whole matter. The police regulation of personal conduct, the official supervision of private affairs, that the Germans submit to as a matter of course in many directions, is altogether alien to our habits. The root of the servant difficulty is not this or that detail of our household management, or one or another condition of service; it is the dislike of working girls to enter on domestic employment as their source of maintenance. Why they feel that aversion to the most natural and the oldest of female industries, is, therefore, the point to be studied. But certainly their objection (the English temper in all ranks being what it is) would not be diminished if they were compelled by law to own a character book, which had to be stamped and supervised by some State official, and in which each successive employer would enter his or her opinion of the girl's virtues and failings! Mrs. Harrison thinks that servants often suffer from the refusal of mistresses to give a good character to a deserving girl. Surely experience proves, on the contrary, that most ladies are, indeed, culpably lax on the point, but in the reverse direction. A good character, or one in which no mention is made of the insufferable defect of the maid, is given by one lady to another to save any risk of trouble—trouble that may range from the girl herself coming to renege on an abominable vein to an action at law for libel. If truthful characters were steadily given, good servants would reap more fully the reward of their excellence, and ladies would be spared many vexations.

Mrs. Harrison touches on one of the true causes for the servant difficulty when she observes that "the girl in London who announces her intention of entering service has to go through a regular hailstorm of chaff and banter; in truth, it requires no little

courage and determination to take so unpopular a course." She says that in a debate held at a working girls' club it was clear "that it was not a want of liberty that was complained of so much as the loss of social status, and a sort of feeling that domestic work was not of so high and honorable a kind as the other trades by which girls earn a starvation wage. Argument cannot abolish this unreasonable class feeling, which undoubtedly exists. The daughter of tradesmen, small farmers, and the like, feel that they lose caste by going into domestic employment. The only remedy for our consequent servile condition is to seek out and train for service girls of a poorer rank, to whom respectable service would be social promotion, or to whom comfort and good wages otherwise not to be dreamed of would compensate for the name of "slavery" from their friends and equals. Who will take up this urgent task?

Hüssner's Crime.

On the subject of Hüssner's crime related in our last, we find the following strong remarks in a recent London paper:—

The peculiar form of insanity which seems to be developed among German officers has taken an unusually violent form in the case of a certain Hüssner, who, according to the account we give in another column, has just murdered a private soldier in broad daylight in the street. The several atrocious duelling stories which have discoloured the German army in the last few years have contained nothing quite so revolting as the expressions with which this commissioned lunatic is said to have defended his action. The German army is often spoken of as a wonderful machine, but it is a deep injustice to machinery to attribute to it that degree of disregard for human life which is to be found among so many of the gentlemen wearing the Kaiser's sword.

Satire has in this case fallen behind the facts. "Caran d'Ache," the French soldier caricaturist, some years ago published a set of sketches dealing with the daily life of a German lieutenant. He was shown running through with his sword all sorts and conditions of people who had offended his dignity as an officer. The shoe-maker had suggested that his boots were a thought too tight. The cabdriver had remarked that it was a cold day—thus implying that an officer was sensible to changes of temperature. The mother of his fiancée had implored him to make her happy—thus suggesting that an officer was capable of anything else. These and many more bit the dust in one day, and the lieutenant hung up his sword at night with the proud thought that it was not dishonoured. An absurdity, of course; but falling short in absurdity, of the extraordinary ravings of the youthful criminal Hüssner, which may be read in our Berlin telegram.

The French satirist published these sketches some seven or eight years ago at least, in connection with a connection with a contemporary scandal of the kind. This sort of thing has been going on ever since, and it is absolutely fostered by the ruler who permits such outrages to be visited with merely nominal punishment.

SUNDRIES.

—WEATHER.—Fine, cold and unreliable.

—DEATH.—News has arrived from Paysandu of the death, on Wednesday last, of Mrs. Campbell, a well known member of the small English colony there.

—MR. GERMAN COLLADON.—We hear that this gentleman is on his way back to Montevideo, on business connected with the electrification of the Baring group of tramways. He may be expected early in June. We are unable to say if Mrs. Colladon, who has so many friends here, is coming with him.

—THAT ENGAGEMENT.—We are not yet able to say.

—SMALL-POX ON BOARD.—The French packet "Cordillere," which arrived from Dunkirk on Thursday, has been placed in strict quarantine, as there were three of the crew suffering from small-pox.

—UNSOLVED.—The police seem to be unable to get any further with the elucidation of the recent robbery of \$10,000 in a common lodging house.

—MAILS.—The R. M. S. "Magdalena" did not enter port until late yesterday evening. Her mail should be delivered this morning. —Owing to the dock strikes in Chile, the P. S. N. Co's "Oreana" has been further delayed, and consequently will not sail from this port homeward bound until Friday next, the 22nd instant.

—RAISING THE DEAD.—Says the *B. A. Standard*:—"The man who asserts that he can restore the dead to life should be treated as a blasphemous lunatic. Dr. Kempe of New York says he can do it, and finds a few idiots to believe him." Quite so! We can comprehend the lunacy, but where does the blasphemy come in? We pause for an explanation.

—IN DANGER.—A Paris telegram says that the eminent operatic prima donna Madame Calvé is in a highly critical condition, having taken a dose of acetic by mistake.

—GHOST.—A Rome telegram arrests that that very material and matter of fact man of science Professor

Lombroso has encountered a real ghost and obtained some interesting revelations which will be duly published. This will be interesting.

—KING EDWARD.—On Thursday his Majesty laid the foundation stone of the new Technical College which is about to be built in Glasgow.

—LOOKED IN WITH THE DEAD.—On Thursday afternoon a rather unpleasant adventure happened to three men who were among the attendants at a funeral in the Central Cemetery. After the ceremony they lingered in the Cemetery, looking at the graves, and when they turned to go home and came to the gates they found themselves locked in, the warning bell having escaped their notice. Dark was already falling, and some passers-by to whom they shouted only took fright at hearing voices from among the graves and ran away. It was some little time before they could find anyone to understand their position, and then they had to wait another hour or so before the caretaker could be found with the keys to release them.

—LIVE STOCK TRADE.—The alarm that has been raised about the reappearance of foot-and-mouth disease in Argentina seems to have had a very slender basis, and in fact it seems difficult definitely to spot the disease. The suspected animals at the Cape have been cleared. From Buenos Aires we learn that the Argentine Secretary of Agriculture has sent to the British Government, through the Secretary of Foreign Affairs, a reply to the British enquiries as to the sick cattle in the lazaretto of dock No. 1, stating that the animals supposed to have the foot-and-mouth came from England, but that when they were thoroughly examined, it turned out that they had no disease. And finally, no disease has yet been detected in the shipments of animals arriving at England. On Wednesday the steamers Corn Exchange and Saxony arrived at Liverpool from Buenos Aires, with 405 steers and 2,200 wethers, all these animals were subjected to a most rigorous examination on landing but were found to be in excellent health and condition.

—NO ENGLISH COMPANY.—Says the *B. A. Herald*:—"The scheme to bring here an English comic opera company has fallen through, but there will be no amount of mourning for the season promises to be very lively without this; indeed, unless a good company should come it would be much nicer to have none, and our amateurs are quite up to the mark of entertaining the public. Last year every play presented which had been attempted by amateurs was less satisfactorily given by the professional."

—PROTECTIVE PRINCES.—From a recent London paper:—"The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Royal Personages, of which Mr. Bernard Shaw ought to be president, if he is not, should take note of the photograph which appears in a weekly paper, showing Prince Edward of Wales, the heir-presumptive of the Britains beyond the Seas, nervously holding in his unhappy arms his youthful brother, Prince George, who looks peacefully unconscious of his strange surroundings. 'Eddie' seems to be bearing the ordeal with creditable stoicism, and doubtless he was carefully instructed in the proper method of holding a Prince. But if the elder brother is built in any way like other small boys, we do not think he can have enjoyed holding that baby."

—BIG ORGAN.—The great screen organ in York Minster, which has been rebuilt at a cost of nearly £5,000, has just been dedicated by the Archbishop of York, and responded by Sir Walter Parratt, Master of the King's Music, and Organist of St. George's Chapel, Windsor. The work of rebuilding has occupied twelve months, and the organ is now considered to be one of the finest in the country.

THURSDAY, APRIL 16.

Many people, he said, supported the war under the idea that they would be complete masters and make such laws for the natives as they liked, but they now had it from the Colonial Secretary that the new Colonies must be allowed to pursue the dictates of their own minds without interruption from without. He also dealt with the connection between Labour, Liberalism, and Peace.

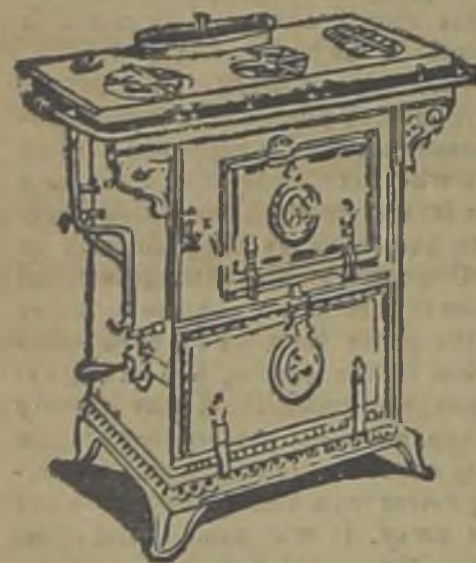
An Irish Industrial Conference assembled yesterday in the Royal University Buildings, Dublin, Mr. W. J. Pirrie presiding. The conference met

to promote the establishment of an Institute of Industry and Commerce for Ireland, and initiate a movement for holding an international exhibition in Dublin at an early date.

A Conference of Ulster farmers was held in Belfast yesterday to consider the Irish Land Bill, when resolutions were passed to the effect, that, whilst recognising the efforts of the Government to deal with a difficult problem, a scheme of compulsory purchase and sale would per se effect a permanent settlement.

A representative, making inquiries as to the rumor that the Cancer Commission is likely to report in favour of what is known as the electric 'high frequency' treatment, learns that the statement is at least premature, as the Commission has hardly begun work yet.

Presiding at the annual dinner on behalf of the German Hospital last night, the Duke of Teck referred to the support it had received from his uncle, the Duke of Cambridge. The institution gives assistance to a very large extent to Englishmen.

There were slight hail and snow storms in London yesterday, and the weather in town and country was bitterly and exceptionally cold for the season. Heavy snowfalls were experienced in the provinces, and in consequence work on the Tyne and Tees has been stopped. In some parts of Scotland snow lies on the ground to the depth of eight inches.

Six persons were found dead yesterday at a house in Duns, in Scotland. They were a groom, his wife, and their four children, and in each case the throat had been cut, apparently with a razor. The husband and wife had lived happily together, and it is believed that the occurrence is the result of a sudden fit of homicidal mania.

Good Templars' Grand Lodge held their session in Sheffield yesterday. The question of compensation to publicans for licences abolished was discussed. Mr. H. J. Wilson, M.P., spoke on this question, and also addressed a public meeting on the same subject. He said most strenuous opposition would be offered to Mr. Butler's Compensation Bill. He characterised Mr. Butler's conduct in refusing to see a temperance deputation on the subject as most unfair, unjust, and improper.

An enthusiastic meeting was held in Exeter Hall last night to celebrate the 74th birthday of General Booth. In the course of an address the aged leader said it would be for the third and fourth generation to appreciate to the full the mighty movement represented by the Salvation Army.

Whether curses may wheel along the pavements basins containing babies was discussed at the Westminster Police court yesterday. Summons had been taken out by a doctor, who also is a barrister, against a nursemaid, the alleged offence having occurred in Buckingham Palace road. On the point of 'wilful obstruction' the magistrate was in favour of the complainant, and the nurse was ordered to pay the costs of two of the summonses.

It was alleged at the South-Western Police court that John Brown, a man of colour, who played the part of an 'African savage' in a show at Battersea, and had been exhibited chained inside a cage, had escaped from his confinement and assaulted one of the audience. The assault was denied. The case was adjourned at the suggestion of the magistrate, the defendant to compensate the complainant.

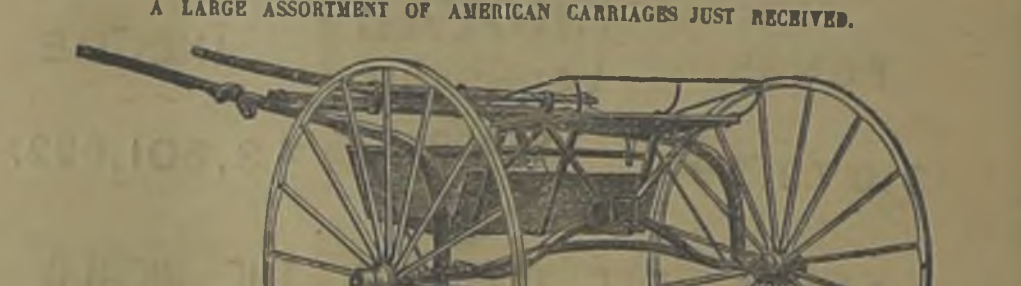
