### NEWS OF THE DAY

MONTEVIDEO.

### POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Saturday. After a long speech in defence from Dr. Herrera y Espinosa, the Arbitration Treaty with Spain was approved, completing its sanction. The Vines Bill, as amended by Committee, was approved in general without remark. There was no further business of general interest.

The threatened list of military promotions appeared on Sunday. Although it is said that President Cuestas reduced the list to half its original proportions, it still contains 224 names, of which 34 correspond to superior officers and 190 to subordinates. Some of these are confirmations of brevet promotions previously conferred, which means an immediate increase in the pay list, but the large number are new brevet promotions. Respecting the latter the *Nación* explains that they will not be made effective until Sr. Cuestas is about to quit the presidency, so they do not imply any additional burden to the Treasury. This is sheer nonsense, for though the burden will not be felt by Sr. Cuestas' administration, it will fall on that of his successor, a method of 'passing-on' expenditure which is not very praiseworthy. Why it should be necessary at all to issue military promotions wholesale every time the national anniversary comes round, we fail to understand. It is merely a bad custom dating from times of military supremacy and the President that has the courage to break with it will do a service to the public purse. It may be some little consolation to note that no new General is created, but there are several Colonels and Lieut. Colonels, ready to blossom into Generals before long. In addition to these promotions, the Government celebrated the occasion by issuing Decrees restoring Dr. A. J. Perez to his post as National Inspector of Public Instruction, and also restoring several subordinate employees who had been suspended for various causes, but without prejudice to the enquiries instituted. This may be mere, but it is not justice. If a man is unfit for his post, he is not rendered any the less unfit by the accidental recurrence of a national anniversary, and though his restoration may be favorable to the individual, it is the reverse to public interests.

Contrary to what was announced, Sr. Cuestas did not make any declarations of a political character on Monday. The attempt, mentioned in our last, of the Port Constructors to impede a second and definite trial of the dredging plant has given rise to some sharp comment. Special attention has been attracted by remarks in the *Bien* of Saturday, to the following effect: — 'Herr Kummer's demand was the more justified as it was known that the trials effected in Europe had given some doubtful results in details of construction. Nevertheless, the representative of the Constructors refused the trials in a very suspicious manner. At the time we did not wish to make public this news, nor other complementary data of very serious import which we also knew, and which seemed to confirm certain malicious comments that circulate' (the signing of the port contract and of the contract for the dredging plant.... Even today, we do not think we should speak more explicitly, and we only add that, according to the suspicious entertained, the dredging plant which is being delivered is not of the class that was contracted

and is being paid for, and that if there is a fraud, it is probable that neither the port constructors nor the builders of the plant are the only ones responsible. Anyhow, the President of the Republic may be fully trusted to support Herr Kummer in the determination to see the contracts properly fulfilled.

### The Festivities.

The celebration of the national anniversary on Monday calls for very little remark, in no wise varying from that of previous years, and the conventional programme being carried out without any incident of note. At the Te-Deum and the Gala Opera Performance the Government was represented by Gen. Callorda, Minister of War and of Government. There was a long list of callers, official and otherwise, on the President, but he refused to open his mouth on political questions. The splendidly brilliant weather helped to through the streets, but beyond looking at each other the people found nothing to divert them when they got there, and in fact there was more animation in the suburbs than in the centre. The illuminations in Calle 18 de Julio were poor, and the fireworks in the Plaza Independencia were barely mediocre — if these things cannot be done better they might as well be left alone. The crowds were very orderly, we might almost say tame, and the day and night passed without a single police case of importance. We cannot help thinking that the celebration will have to be ordained in a different manner, or under different circumstances, to evoke any genuine popular enthusiasm. As it was, it was barely lukewarm.

### Mr. William Morton.

A fortnight has not yet elapsed since it was our sad duty to chronicle the death of Mr. Thomas B. Morton, and now we are called upon to perform the same melancholy task for his elder brother Mr. William Morton, who departed this life about 3 a. m. yesterday morning. Mr. Morton had been in failing health for at least two years, to which no doubt business worries had largely contributed, but the ultimate cause of death was the internal rupture which he suffered on Thursday last, and which reappeared on Monday. Mr. Morton was only in his 49th year — though he looked much older — and had lived in this country since his boyhood. For very many years he was associated with the firm of F. L. Humphreys and Co., and on the liquidation of that he took over the agency of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co. and other branches of the business on his own account. He was well-known and much esteemed in shipping and business circles throughout the Plate and his loss will be very generally lamented. It is worth mentioning that it was largely owing to his vigorous resistance last year — in which he received practically no support from other shipping agents — that some of the abuses of the quarantine system were ameliorated. He leaves a widow, one son and six daughters to lament his loss, with whom we express our deepest sympathy, which will be shared by all our readers, in their irreparable affliction.

The funeral will take place at the British Cemetery this morning, carriages leaving the Plaza Independencia at 9.15 a. m. and the *quinta*, 92 Calle 13 de Marzo, Arroyo Seco, at 10 a. m.

### SOME TRADE NOTES.

#### Substitutes for Wool.

Some figures quoted at Carliste last week by Mr. A. Mansell illustrate the enormous extent to which the use of wool in the manufacture of clothing has given way to that of substitutes. What is the precise quantity of shoddy used in England he was apparently unable to say, but the American figures are quoted. During 1900 shoddy to the extent of 74,000,000 lbs. was used in the States, displacing 222,000,000 lbs. of wool, or equal to 72 per cent of all the wool of the United States in that year. In other words, the shoddy brought into use displaced wool equal in quantity to that clipped from 42,990,000 out of the 61,415,000 sheep which are owned in the United States. If these figures be anything like accurate, the situation is a serious one, and Mr. Mansell has done good service in directing attention to it.

#### American Imports and Exports.

A decline of \$21,000,000 in exports and an increase of \$15,800,000 in imports are shown by the statistics for the fiscal year just published at Washington. In spite of the Steel Trust and its policy iron and steel exports fell 24,000,000 and imports rose \$2,000,000. Manufacturers' materials were imported to the value of \$84,000,000, being an increase of thirteen millions, but the value of exported cotton, though the preceding year's exports were exceeded by \$0,000,000, was lower by \$4,800,000.

#### Niagara and Ontario's Industries.

It is proposed to extend the transmission of electrical power from Niagara to Toronto, nearly 100 miles

from the Falls, making that place in its turn a centre for transmission of power by branch lines to other towns in the district. It is estimated that power so transmitted would cost only about £6 per horse power per annum, which is allowing an increase of £2 8s. per horse power over the cost at the Falls. The scheme is a great one for Canadian industry, and serves to remind us of the time that is coming when smoke and factory chimneys will no longer be associated with industry, and when the parts of the world which have the most water power will be the favoured ones of nature.

#### Water Power in California.

The 'Iron Age' gives some interesting particulars of what is being done with the water power of the Californian mountains. The Bay Counties Power Company has a line to Sacramento sixty-one miles long, and carries current at 40,000 volts. There is also a line to Nevada City, and current is carried to Oakland, a distance of 140 miles, at 40,000 volts. The Power Development Company of San Francisco transmits current fourteen miles at 11,500 volts. The Mount Whitney Power Company of Tulare County, California, transmits power sixty-five miles at 17,300 volts. The significance of this to ourselves is that England, favoured in coal supplies, is not favoured in water power, unless someone finds out how to utilise the enormous power of the tides. To modern science so much is possible that the next generation may hope to make acquaintance with coal only in museums.

### Sawdust as a Stock Food!

Having already made effective use of peat moss litter in the preparation of certain food stuffs the Germans are now turning their attention to the employment of sawdust for a somewhat similar purpose. It is announced from Berlin that a German chemist has taken out a patent for a new form of animal fodder which has sawdust as one of its principal ingredients. The chemist to whom the patent for this new food has been granted argues that farm stock always show a decided liking for young shoots, roots of shrubs, tree bark, and other food of the same nature, and taking advantage of this fact he had special experiments made with the object of ascertaining whether it might be possible to utilise the sawdust obtained from such wood as a food stuff. The results are said to have been so satisfactory that great things are expected of the new material, which, like the peat moss already referred to, is meant to be chiefly used as a 'drier' of the molasses now so largely employed as a stock food in various parts of the Continent. — *Farmer's Gazette.*

### Football.

*Albion F. C. versus Triunfo F. C.* — This match was played at Paso Molino on Monday, resulting in an easy victory for the Albion by 2 goals to nil, scored by Lichtenberger and Herrero. When the same Clubs met on the 10th instant the Albions, who then had a much superior team, were defeated by 4 to 1.

At the Parque Central on Sunday, H. M. S. 'Cambrian' beat the Deutsche Klub by 3 to 1, and the Club Nacional beat the Uruguay Athletic Club by 4 to 1. On Monday H. M. S. 'Nympha' beat the U. A. C. 2nd XI by 3 to 1.

The final of the Argentine Cup-tie Competition was played at Buenos Aires on Sunday between 'Alumni' and Rosario. After being prolonged for nearly three hours the game had to be suspended on account of failing light, with the score at one all. The question as to whether or when the game is to be replayed will be dealt with at a League Committee meeting.

### Golf.

On Sunday a most successful match (from the bachelors' point of view) was played, Married versus Single, the latter running away by 17 holes to 2. There were seven players on each side.

For the Choice Score Handicap for the prize presented by the St. Andrew's Society of Uruguay, fourteen players entered, the winner being Mr. H. A. R. Harvey, handicap 35, net score 91. The competition is open to members of all recognised Clubs in the River Plate, a continuous residence of six months being necessary to qualify or previous membership of a River Plate Club, in the latter case an absence of one year to invalidate entry. The competition will be decided by match play eighteen holes — final thirty six holes — under the bye-laws of the Flores Club. Competitors will require to send in their names, accompanied by an entrance fee of \$10 on or before 30th inst. to Mr. M. Leishman Ranciman, Hon. Secretary of the Championship Committee, 551 Avenida de Mayo.

A Bogey Competition, 27 holes under handicap, will be held on the second and third days while the championship is being decided, open to all members of recognised golf clubs. ### SUNDRIES.

*BATISER LEGATION.* — The British Minister Mr. W. Baring and Mrs. Baring left yesterday evening for a short trip to Tacarembó, returning on Tuesday next. On this account there will be no reception at the Legation on Friday next.

*SOCIAL EVENING.* — We are requested by the Rev. Basil Cobbett to announce that the next 'Social Evening' will take place at the Lafone Memorial Hall tomorrow (Thursday) evening at 8.30 p. m. On this occasion there will be a short miscellaneous programme and 'ping-pong'. Evening dress not necessary, nor even 'suggested'. All members of the congregation and their friends are cordially invited to these informal and social gatherings. Tickets not required for next Thursday.

*DEPUTY DEAD.* — The death occurred on Monday, after a brief illness, of Sr. Bernabé Mondoza, Deputy for Artigas. He was much esteemed personally, though not a salient political figure.

*WONDERFUL TELEGRAMS.* — The telegraphic service of the last two days has given us some really remarkable news. A Brussels message says that it is rumored there that the Legation in Europe of the Transvaal Republic will be abolished at the end of September, and Dr. Leyds will join the Dutch magistracy. Considering that the Transvaal Republic ceased to exist on the signing of peace three months ago, the 'rumor' is probably true. — Then a London telegram, repeating one from Pieternitzburg, relates the capture of Durban of a vessel containing arms and contraband of war for the Boers. Three months after the war is over this is quite incomprehensible, and we can only conjecture that it is a belated piece of news from last year. — An afternoon London telegram informs us that 'the sovereigns have landed at Ramsay Island.' This is probably telegraphese for Ramsay, Isle of Man. — The gem of all, however, is to be found in a Madrid telegram, which is so stupendous and sensational that it fairly baffles our powers of comment, and we leave it to our readers to make what they can of it. This wonderful production of telegraphic and journalistic enterprise is as follows: — 'It is communicated from Orizuela that there has been released a manifestation in which there took part 8000 orphans to protest against the mixture of oil with red pepper. The act took place in the greatest order.' Is there a lunatic asylum at Orizuela?

*THE QUEEN.* — London telegrams state that Queen Alexandra is suffering from fatigue and nervousness brought on by her close attendance on the King during his recent illness. Her Majesty's condition is not regarded as any way serious, but she will probably hasten her visit to Denmark in order to obtain the rest she needs.

*CHAMBER CONCERT.* — A concert of unusual interest will be given at the Verdi Saloon this evening by the Buenos Aires Quartet, consisting of Profs. Cattelan, Galetti, Bonfiglioli and Marengo, who are now playing in the opera orchestra at the Solis Theatre, assisted by some other musicians from the same orchestra. The programme consists of, 2nd Quartet, Op. 75, A. Bazzini; Quiliet, Op. 87, Mendelssohn; Andante and Allegro from Beethoven, Aria from Bach, and Oletto, Op. 3, Svendsen.

Lovers of classical chamber music should not lose the opportunity.

*WEDDING.* — From Buenos Aires. — The marriage of Miss Annie M. Douglas to Mr. Walter Russell took place on Saturday evening at St. Saviour's Anglican Church, Belgrano. The church was well filled with the friends of the bride and groom, many of the staff of the Central Argentine Railway being among them. The bride was given away by her elder brother and had as a bridesmaid, little Miss Ruth Douglas, her niece, who certainly looked very sweet. The best man was Mr. Cave. The Rev. Mr. Udney officiated and after the ceremony the newly married couple received many congratulations.

*FAVORABLE CARGO.* — On Sunday the British str. 'Haversham Grange' left Buenos Aires for South Africa. She is not only the largest vessel which ever entered an Argentine port but also carries the most valuable cargo which ever left an Argentine port. Her cargo includes nearly every sort of food from butter to live animals. She has 5000 sheep and 1500 horses and mules. Besides a crew of 64 men she has 88 cattle tenders. Captain Howe is breaking a record.

*SUICIDE AT SEA.* — William H. Grant, a third passenger from England by the Thames is reported to have jumped overboard at sea on the 12th inst. and was drowned.

*ARGENTINE FINANCE.* — A London telegram reports that Mr. A. Mildmay, Managing Director of Baring Bros. Ltd. and Mr. Essex E. Roade one of the directors of the London and River Plate Bank, are leaving for Buenos Aires by the 'Jaubeu'. There is a report in the city that the object of these gentlemen's visit to Buenos Aires is to establish a branch house of Baring Bros. Ltd. at the head of which Mr. Roade will remain for the present. It is also reported that another object of their visit is to make definite arrangements with the Argentine Government for the renewal of the £2,000,000 loan. It is further stated that Mr. Nevel, who came to open a business in Argentine wines, is arranging for establishing a new bank for doing business in the Argentine Republic and in Uruguay. One of the principal objects of the proposed bank is to assist agriculturists.

*CONFEIT ANTHEMISTES.* — The following curious note appears in a London paper: — The Jean and Chapter of St. Saviour's Collegiate Church, Southwark, owing to the rage in the neighbourhood of the Borough for the use of confetti at weddings, especially amongst the aristocracy, had the following notice put up at the church yesterday: — 'It is earnestly requested that no rice or confetti be thrown in the church or churchyard, and a special abomination, as it clings to everything and is difficult to remove. Never use it; it is cheap and nasty. Use the good old fashioned rice instead, but not in the church or churchyard.'

### LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, JULY 28.

Addressing a Conservative and Unionist demonstration in the Ikeston Division of Derbyshire on Saturday, Mr. Gerald Balfour, M.P., paid a high tribute to the Marquis of Salisbury on his retirement from the post of leader of their party.

Mr. William Redmond, M.P., and Mr. Davlin, M.P., were on Saturday evening entertained at dinner in the Holborn Restaurant by the Irish Parliamentary party in recognition of their labours in establishing branches of the United Irish League in America. In replying to the toast of his health, Mr. W. Redmond dwelt upon the enthusiasm felt for the Irish cause in the Republic. A letter written by Colonel Lynch from Holloway Prison was read to the gathering.

At a Conference held on Saturday at Essex Hall to discuss the peace settlement, resolutions were passed calling upon the Government to take immediate and adequate measures for the protection of the coloured races in South Africa, condemning the suspension of the Constitution in South Africa, and endorsing the special tax on the gold mines.

The Conference of the Garden Cities Association held its final sitting at Port Sunlight on Saturday, when nearly a thousand delegates were present. Speeches were made by Mr. W. H. Laver, Mr. George Cadbury, Mr. T. P. Ritzema, and others, and a resolution was carried unanimously expressing satisfaction at the success which has attended experiments in establishing industrial villages, urging manufacturers, local authorities, and other bodies to co-operate with such movements, and recognising the desirability and practicability of a combined movement of manufacturers

and Cooperators to fresh areas, so that new towns may be established on land to be purchased by the community.

During a discussion at the Wesleyan Conference at Manchester on Saturday on the work in the Army and Navy, it was stated that there were 36,639 declared Wesleyan soldiers and sailors. The Government, in recognition of the work done by the Wesleyan Church, had offered five commissions, so that their chaplains might be put on a par with those of other Churches. The Sunday schools report showed an increase of 6,166 scholars, as against a decrease of 1,800 in the previous year. The total number of scholars in the Sunday schools was 965,000. Amongst the subjects discussed were betting and gambling, and the connection of Church officials with the drink traffic.

In unveiling a memorial yesterday in Holy Trinity Church, Guildford, to the men of the town and neighborhood who had fallen in the South African war, Mr. St. John Brodric spoke in high terms of the sacrifices which the people of this country had shown themselves willing to make in the cause of the Empire.

Legal proceedings have been commenced by the Irish Nationalist party against the promoters of the new landlords' organization, as a reply to the action Lord De Freyne is taking against them; and several writs have been issued against prominent members of the movement. Amongst the grounds of action set forth is that of "maintenance."

Gales were experienced in many parts of the country yesterday and on Saturday. In the Strand a remarkable accident occurred, a Coronation stand near Clement's Inn toppling over into the street, and causing injuries to several persons.

After a long magisterial inquiry, William James Rolfe, a police-constable of the "d" Division, Metropolitan Police, was, at North London Police-court, on Saturday, committed for a trial at the Central Criminal Court on a charge of perjury, alleged to have been committed during the hearing of a case of assault.

Edmund George Duprez, a young gentleman gazetted to a cavalry regiment, was on Saturday charged at Maidenhead Borough Police Court, with having entered the house of Miss Eve Greene, the actress, and stolen jewellery worth £130. He was remanded.

A Correspondent at Bisle reports that Lieutenant E. D. Johnson, of the London Rifle Brigade, won the King's Prize with a total of 807 points, Private A. C. Samways (1st Dorset), Private J. McCallum (4th A. and S. Highlanders), and Sergeant Proctor (1st Elgin) following in the order of merit. Lieutenant Johnson served in South Africa in the Imperial Yeomanry. Lord Roberts asked him on Saturday whether his marksmanship had proved of service to him during the campaign. He replied that while fighting was in progress he never once saw a Boer. During the shooting for the King's Prize, the wind occasionally attained a velocity of forty miles an hour.

The fourth test match between England and Australia ended at Manchester on Saturday in the sensational victory of the Australians by three runs. England therefore has lost the rubber. Middlesex, by defeating Kent at Beckenham by five runs, won their first county match this season. Essex defeated Derbyshire at Derby by 120 runs. Nottingham beat Gloucestershire at Nottingham by 268 runs, and Yorkshire and Worcester drew their match at Worcester.

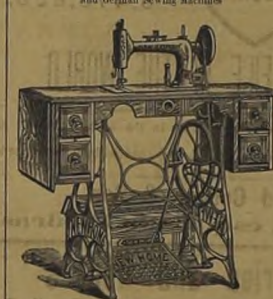
