MONTEVIDEO.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives no-quarantined more on Tuesday. We suppose they found rest necessary after the excitement of the holiday on Thursday.

No morning papers having appeared on Tuesday, our contemporaries yesterday were mainly occupied with chronicling the fates of Monday. Their opinion seems to be that the national anniversary was celebrated with a good deal of popular enthusiasm, quiet but genuine, though it received little or no stimulus from official quarters. This was not exactly our impression, but in such a matter we are quite willing to bow to the judgement of our native contemporaries. In these matters, it is difficult for the Government to escape the charge of being extravagant on the one hand or parsimonious on the other; its critics are never at a loss to find fault. After all, it is not the money that is spent, so much as the manner in which it is spent that makes the celebration a success. In the matter of public festivities the present Government has not distinguished itself, unless by an indifference to details.

Yesterday's *Siglo* makes the unpleasant announcement that the list of military promotions is by no means yet complete, as there is another list, to be issued shortly, comprising officers employed in the Staff Office, the Ministries, the Marine Commandancy, the Military Tribunals, the Urban Companies, and so forth, and even some on the reserve lists. We hope the *Siglo* may be mistaken.

With regard to the trouble that has arisen with the Port Constructors over the dredging material, a statement has appeared to the effect that the Government has telegraphed (or intends to do so) to the syndicate in Europe asking them to appoint a legal representative here with full power to act in all questions that may arise respecting interpretation or fulfillment of the contracts. According to a contemporary, however, Sr. Beasalt already has the fullest powers possible. Anyhow, there is more to be heard of the affair yet. The recent Resolution of the Government seems to have been received by the constructors in complete silence—at all events no hint of a reply has yet transpired.

New Bank.

Advantage was taken of the patriotic anniversary on Monday to inaugurate the recently founded 'Banco Popular del Uruguay,' which has installed its offices at Zabala 111. There were present the Directors Sres. C. A. Berro, O. Martinez, M. R. Diaz, P. Crovetto, A. Falco, A. Pereyra, F. Fiesell, J. Podasta and J. Rodella, the manager, Sr. Pedro Facio and his staff, and several leading shareholders. As President of the Board Dr. C. A. Berro declared the Bank open in an eloquent speech in which he dwelt on the utility and importance of banking institutions in modern life, and more especially of popular cooperative banks, such as the present institution was intended to be. Refreshments were served, success drunk to the new bank, photographs taken, and the proceedings terminated.

Lord Kitchener's Loot.

War Relics Landed at Tilbury.

London, July 29.

The P. and O. steamship *Orotava*, which, a little more than a fortnight ago, landed General Viscount Kitchener, Lieutenant-General Sir J. P. D. French, and Major-General Sir Ian Hamilton at Southampton, did not, on account of the quarantine regulations enforced in consequence of a case of smallpox occurring on the vessel, proceed to Tilbury until Thursday last. She commenced discharging her cargo on Friday morning, and on Saturday a lighter containing some of the relics of the South African War, brought home by Lord Kitchener, was taken across to Gravesend by a tug. She unloaded at Fletcher's Timber Wharf, which is near the mooring point of H. M. S. *Gleaner*, the Gravesend guard ship, and put ashore four colossal statues of famous Boer leaders—Ex-President Kruger, ex-President Steyn, General Botha, and General Cronje. The statues, which weighed about two tons each, were of bronze gilt, and, with the exception of that of Ex-President Kruger, each represented its subject in burgher's field outfit. The effigies of Kruger, Botha, and Cronje were brought by the victorious General from Pretoria, being erected there shortly after the defeat of Dr. Jameson at Kruger'sdorp. That of President Steyn was brought from Bloemfontein, and was erected about the same time. From Fletcher's Wharf the statues were conveyed in two trucks drawn by a traction engine to Chatham Barracks, where they were handed over to the Royal Engineers for preservation in the museum of the corps. Lord Kitchener having presented these relics to the corps in which he commenced his military career. A detachment of Royal Engineers were sent from Chatham to assist in the unshipping and transport of the bronzes.

Yesterday afternoon the *Orotava* discharged two *Craquet* 'Long Toms,' a pom-pom gun, and ex-President Kruger's ox wagon. The two big guns were conveyed by lighter to Fletcher's Wharf, where they were unloaded, one of them being forwarded to Shoreham Fort at Gravesend, where it will be mounted on the Shore battery; while the other was sent to Woolwich Arsenal, to find a place of honour in the Gunners Square. The gun sent to Woolwich is that which was captured by Lord Methuen; while the Gravesend gun was dug up at Luder's, after the third attack on the town, by General Sir Leslie Randle.

Lord Kitchener has presented the pom-pom gun and ex-President Kruger's ox wagon to the City Corporation, and these relics, which remain at present at Tilbury Dock, will shortly be forwarded to London.

THE IGNORANCE OF THE LEARNED.
How to MAKE LIFE INTERESTING.
London, July 25.
«We have all met persons who have taken a university degree, and yet do not understand why the moon appears to change its form, who think that corals are insects, whales fish, and bats birds—who do not realize that England has been over and over again below the sea, and still believe that the world is not more than six thousand years old.»

So said Lord Avebury—whom many people still know more familiarly under his old title of Sir John Lubbock—at a Conference held yesterday at the Royal Botanic Gardens, in connection with the Nature Study Exhibition. And he declared that we lived in a wonderful and beautiful world, full of interest, one of which it was most important to understand, and fatal to misunderstand. Yet only within the last few years had Nature studies been introduced into our elementary schools; grammar schools were mainly devoted to grammar; and the great public schools omitted Nature altogether, or gave it only an hour or two in the week, snatched from the insatiable demands of Latin and Greek.

When a portion, at any rate, of Lord Avebury's method of instruction prevails, there should be fewer tears in early life—always supposing that the teacher knows how to interest the child, for even science might be made dull in the hands of, say, a few instructors. Before a child is carried far in any one subject, said his lordship, it should be explained to him that our earth is one of several planets, revolving round the sun, that the sun is a star, that the solar system is one of many millions occupying the infinite depths of space; he should be taught the general distribution of land and sea, the continents and oceans, and the position of England, and of his own parish; the elements of physics, including the use and construction of the thermometer and barometer; the elements of geology and biology. But the last class is liable to be misunderstood by the average child. The words might cause alarm at first. It is, however, open to any father of a young boy to try the experiment of saying to him, «I think that it is time you learnt the elements of geology and biology,» and to note the effect upon the child's countenance. If he is delighted, well and good; there is more to be said. With those subjects

Lord Avebury would teach arithmetic, some knowledge of language, drawing (almost, if not quite, as important as writing), and perhaps music. All this seems to fill up what in schools is called a 'time table.' But his lordship would not have specialisation begin before the age of seventeen, or sixteen at the earliest.

Animals, Lord Avebury thought were perhaps more interesting objects of study than plants, but plants presented greater facilities for study. Almost all children were born with a love of natural history and of collecting. He would not underestimate the pleasure and interest of collecting, but he confessed that to him plants lost half their interest when they were gathered, and animals when they were killed. Many persons kept pets, but how few studied them! Descartes regarded all animals as unconscious automata; Huxley thought the matter doubtful; his lordship's own experiments and observations had led him to the conclusion that they had glimmerings of reason, but the subject was still obscure. He had often been told that dogs were as intelligent as human beings, but when he had asked whether any dogs yet realised that two and two made four, the answer was not confident. The whole question of the consciousness and intelligence of animals required careful study.—Then there was the life history of animals scarcely one was fully known to us; indeed, he might say not one, for some of the most interesting discoveries of recent years had been made in respect to ants and bees. Many problems were opened up by flowers, and leaves and seeds were almost equally interesting. There was a reason for everything in this world, and there must be some cause for the different forms of leaves. Some had been explained, but for the differences in the leaves of ferns, for instance, seaweeds, and many others, no satisfactory suggestion, so far as he knew, had yet been offered. The problems suggested by every field and wood, every common and hedgerow, every pond and stream, were endless, and most interesting.

Lord Avebury quoted the late Lord Derby as having said that, considering the marvellous discoveries of the last hundred years, we could not expect so much in the future. From this view he differed, thinking that we might reasonably expect even more, because of the improvements in apparatus, the greater number of students, and the hints furnished by every fresh piece of knowledge. We seemed to be on the threshold of great discoveries. There was no single substance in Nature the properties of which were fully known to us. There was no animal or plant which would not well repay the devotion of a lifetime, and he often grieved to think how much happiness his fellow-countrymen lost from their ignorance of science. No one with any knowledge of science could ever be dull. No one would sit and drink in a public house if he knew how delightful it was to sit and think in a field; no one would seek excitement in gambling and betting if he knew how much more interesting science was. Science never raised anyone, but was a sort of fairy godmother, ready to shower on us all manner of good gifts if we would only let her. The study of Nature was not only most important from a practical and material point of view, and most interesting, but it would also do much to lift us above the petty troubles, and help us to bear the greater sorrows of life.

On Sunday last the first of the two matches against Buenos Aires was played at Punta Carretas before a large crowd of spectators, Buenos Aires winning by seven goals to one. During most of the first chucker, the play was rather wild, Scott-Moncrieff scoring once for Buenos Aires. The second chucker was a much better one, Hay and Balfour getting in some pretty combined runs, whilst Campbell and Hughes were playing much better. Balfour scored again for Buenos Aires, Montevideo having very bad luck in not scoring on one or two occasions. 3rd Chucker: Play opened very fast, the ball travelling up and down the ground at a rare pace, Campbell's hitting being very clean, Buenos Aires again scored through Mendl, giving them a lead of 3 goals to 0.

During the 4th and 5th chuckers Davie and Jefferies did a lot of hard work for Montevideo, their efforts being rewarded by a goal, hit by Campbell. Hay and Mendl scoring for Buenos Aires.

Two more goals were scored by Buenos Aires during the last chucker, thus leaving them winners of a hard fought game by 7 to 1. Undoubtedly the better side won on the day's play, their combination and sure hitting when in front of goal being very good.

For the winners Balfour played a splendid game, Scott-Moncrieff at back being very sure.

For the losers all played individually well, but there was a lack of combination without which they could not expect to win.

The return match was played on Monday the same teams taking part as the day before, Montevideo winning this time by seven goals to three.

1st chucker. Immediately on the start of the 2nd chucker Hay scored for Buenos Aires, and Hughes for Montevideo, after which the game became very fast, Jefferies playing much better than on Sunday, Davie also playing splendidly at back hitting the ball at any angle. Score, one all. Two more goals were scored for Montevideo during the 3rd chucker by Davie and Hughes, thus giving them a lead of 3 to 1.

4th chucker. This was one of the best in the match, everybody riding hard and doing their utmost to score. Davie after a splendid hit doing so for Montevideo. Score Montevideo 4, Buenos Aires 1. During the 5th and 6th chuckers, 3 more goals were hit for Montevideo by Davie, Campbell and Jefferies, and 2 for Buenos Aires by Hay and Mendl, thus leaving the home team winners by 7 to 3.

For the winners Davie played a splendid game at back, Jefferies also doing a lot of hard work by riding; there was much better combination in the team than on Sunday, their shooting at goal being also much better.

For the losers Balfour and Moncrieff played well, having hard luck in not scoring more than 3 goals.

SUNDRIES.

WEDDING.—Judicial announcement has already been issued for the approaching marriage of Mr. John E. Clark and Miss Mary Mackenzie, who arrived from England for the purpose a few days ago. We understand that the marriage will take place in the Methodist Episcopal Church on September 10 or 11.

BEAUTY CONTEST.—The beauty competition in the *Dia* was closed on Monday, but the result will not be officially declared until Monday next, so as to allow of a scrutiny.

FUNERAL.—The funeral of the late Mr. Wm. Morton took place at the British Cemetery yesterday morning in the presence of a large and sympathetic gathering, which included a great number of British residents, representatives of practically all the Shipping Companies and Agencies, and many other private or business friends. The masonic fraternity was also well represented. The burial service was impressively performed by the Rev. Basil Cobbett.

WISDOM.—The girl of the period, as aptly remarks a contemporary, is the mother of the «new woman.» Possibly, but for our part we would feel more certainty in describing her as the daughter of the old woman.

CASINO.—The debate will take place this evening of Johnson and May, sensational cyclists.

CONGRESS.—An International Congress of Commerce and Industries was opened at Ostend on Tuesday. All the European countries, the United States and Mexico, have sent delegates.

NO NEWS.—Yesterday's telegrams contained no further news about the 8000 orphans in Spain who have protested against the mixing of oil and red pepper. This is really a very reprehensible omission, and we shall have to make a serious complaint about the deficiencies of the telegraphic service.

COMING DOWN.—The French Ministry of Public Works has given orders for the demolition of the historic prison of St. Lazare, in Paris.

ITALY.—The King of Italy accompanied by the Minister of Foreign Affairs and a civil and military suite, has left for Berlin to pay a visit to the Kaiser. The Queen of Italy is expected to be confined about November, and there are earnest hopes that this time she may give birth to a son and heir.

STORMY.—A new paper is about to appear in Buenos Aires with the name of «El Pampero.» Does this

mean that it threatens to raise a storm in journalistic circles?

BATTLES SQUADRON.—H. M. S. «Cambridge», «Basilisk» and «Nymph» sailed on Tuesday for their annual visit to Brazilian ports, and will remain away some ten or twelve weeks.

DEATH.—News comes from Asuncion of the death of General Egasquiza, ex-president of the Republic of Paraguay.

CATTLE SHOW.—An important Exhibition and fair of live-stock will be held at Melo on October 15. It is said that some 2000 animals have been entered.

SOCIAL EVENING.—We remind our readers of the «Social Evening» to take place in the Lafone Memorial Hall this evening.

TROOPS RETURNING.—The War Office announces that 80,000 troops have returned to England from South Africa since June 6, and 17,000 more are expected before September 17.

CERIAL ARRIVAL.—Says a Buenos Aires contemporary:—We had the pleasure of a visit yesterday from the Rev. Alexander Hill, Glasgow University, who has just arrived here in connection with Saint Andrew's Presbyterian Church to assist the Rev. J. W. Fleming in the Church ordinances in the outlying districts. As the Rev. Mr. Hill is an ordained minister of the Church of Scotland he will be a great help in the church work, being able to celebrate marriages and all church Sacraments. The Rev. gentleman is accompanied by his wife and son and they are at present staying at the Phoenix Hotel.

RISEING STAR.—We quote from the *B. A. Standard*:—The frequenters of the Casino were fairly taken by surprise last night when Miss Clark, the charming young English actress who arrived by the «Chames», made her debut. Miss Clark is very much superior to the generality of actresses who appear in this theatre, and in fact we might state that she has the finest soprano voice of any English actress yet heard in this country. Her voice is very flexible and sweet and she delivers her high compass with marvellous ease. Needless to say she received great applause. After the performance our reporter had the honour of an interview and gathered the following data concerning her career. She was born in London, and had no intention of going on the stage until about three years ago, when her father died and owing to certain difficulties she found herself obliged to make use of her voice, which had only been heard for the amusement of her friends and family. She applied at the Empire Theatre and immediately received an engagement and, after a few lessons from Mr. Coates, the well-known grand opera singer, she made her first appearance in public and from the beginning was a great success. When she finishes her contract here, she means visiting Montevideo and Rio, she goes to England where she has a contract for Christmas time at Newcastle.

WELL-MATCHED.—There are many stories told among an irreverent generation of awkward things which have happened to the clergy of all denominations. One of the best is told about the Rev. John Shaw Banks, the new president of the Wesleyan Conference, in *The Methodist Times*. Mr. Banks is short-sighted, it seems, and when on one occasion, during his sermon, a commotion arose in one part of the congregation, he did not observe that it was due to a gentleman having ignited a box of matches in his waistcoat pocket, and struggling to get out. In all innocence the minister quietly said: «There is a little disturbance, I hear. We will sing a verse of: 'Sometimes a light surprises' till it is over.» (It is doubtful whether the congregation brought a proper solemnity to the singing of that hymn.)

GAMBLING.—An article on «Gambling» which Sir Hiram Maxim published recently in *The Echo* contains a remarkable statement of the point of view of an American, knowing the conditions of labouring life in the States, confronted with the betting craze among the workers in this country. He writes:—«When I came to England, although England was at war, very few of her working men seemed to take the least interest in what was going on. However, one day we had been anticipating some very important news. A great battle was expected to take place in Egypt. I was extremely anxious to obtain the latest news, and as I was leaving the works during the men's dinner hour I saw a group of about 20 men eagerly reading a newspaper which had just been handed to them. I never saw men so eager in my life. It beat anything I had ever seen in America even in time of war. As I drew near to them I saw some of them were greatly excited. Many of them had turned pale and one fellow suddenly dropped his hands and appeared to be in a fainting condition. I perceived to be in a fainting condition had imagined some great calamity had befallen the British arms, but as I approached closer I found that it was not the war at all that was interesting them, but the result of a horse race I learnt that they had had a «straight tip.» Many of them had staked heavily, and all had lost. As near as I could make out about three-quarters of our workmen gambled on horse racing, and a very large por-

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centage of their money was wasted in this way.

LONDON NOTES.

Tuesday, July 29.

In the House of Lords yesterday Lord Newton moved the adjournment of the debate as a protest against the inability of the Government to give certain explanations with regard to the Local Government Provisional Order Bill, in consequence of the absence of the noble lord in charge of the measure, expressing the opinion that this was a slowly way of conducting business. The motion was not pressed on a promise being given that the explanation would be forthcoming. The report of amendments to the Licensing Bill was subsequently agreed to.

In the House of Commons Mr. Balfour made an important statement as to the intentions of the Government with regard to public business. The line of policy foreshadowed by the right hon. gentleman with regard to Clause 7 of the Education Bill evoked considerable hostile criticism from members of the Opposition. The Bill itself was afterwards discussed in Committee, much stress being laid on the subject of the powers and method of appointment of school managers. The eligibility of women to positions on Management Committees under the Bill was admitted by the Prime Minister.

General Sir John French was yesterday presented with the freedom and livery of the Cutlers' Company, by whom he was entertained at dinner. He paid a tribute to the conduct of the troops in the war. The war had, he said, taught the necessity for a high order of peace training.

The Colonial Premier visited Glasgow yesterday. Speaking at a luncheon, Sir Edmund Barton said Australia and New Zealand offered abundant room for those who went out, not as paupers, but with a little money and plenty of energy and independence. Mr. Seddon said British workmen and manufacturers were unequalled in the world, and if Britain and her Colonies combined the result would add stability to the greatest Empire the world had ever known.

A meeting of great interest took place in the Mansion House yesterday in support of a proposal to purchase a ship for the Norfolk Islands, descendants of the mutineers of the Bounty, to enable them to send cargoes of fruit to the mainland. Lord Carrington presided, and three of the islanders who have served with distinction in the South African war were present in uniform.

Mr. Yerkes gave evidence yesterday before Mr. Mulver's Parliamentary Committee with regard to the Brompton and Piccadilly Circus Railway Bill. He expressed the opinion that a twopenny fare ought to be the universal fare on underground railways in London.

A distinguished company gathered yesterday at Marlborough College on the occasion of the annual prize day. The Headmaster mentioned that forty-three old Marlborians fell in the war, and to their memory a window had been placed in the chapel and a scholarship founded.

Walter William Linscott, 55, described as an estate agent, was charged at the Guildhall, yesterday, with obtaining money from different persons by means of false pretences. The prisoner advertised for a partner in the lucrative business of a broker, auctioneer, estate agent, etc. The «business» it was alleged, was a mere bogus concern, the one purpose being to defraud intending partners. The Alderman committed him for trial.

Thirty-two arrests were effected by the police as the result of a raid on a gaming house in Keaton-street, St. Pancras. At the Clerkenwell Police-court yesterday the principals were remanded on bail, the other two being allowed out on their own recognisances.

Against the Australians, at Leyton yesterday, Essex made a score of 311 for five wickets. At Southampton, in Barton's benefit match, Hampshire put Surrey in, dismissed them for 91, and scored 163 for seven wickets. Rain interfered with play at Maidstone, where Kent scored 209 for seven wickets against Somerset. At Eastbourne, Middlesex were all out for 207, and Sussex scored 65 for three wickets. At Sheffield, Warwickshire dismissed Yorkshire for 135, and then replied with 114 for two wickets. At Leicester the home club made 222, and Worcestershire totalled 260 for eight wickets. At Manchester, Gloucester completed an innings of 332 against Lancashire.
