NEWS OF THE DAY.

Fifth Sunday after Trinity. — Saints John, Walter and Felix.—193 days past, 172 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.

Both the Chambers sat again on Friday.

The Senate was entirely occupied with pension and minor business, nothing of general interest transpiring.

In the Representatives summary approval was given to Dr. Rodriguez' Bill ordaining port surveys at Colonia. The Bill now passes to the other Chamber. Discussion was then resumed of the Bill creating new Military forces, etc. Sr. C. Rozlo made a brilliant speech in opposition. He recalled various historical incidents, including the mutiny of July 4, 1898, as proof that the army was by no means a factor of stability and peace; the law, not military force, was the base of sound government, and a large standing army was entirely anti-democratic. The salvation of the Republic from future conflicts and civil wars lay in freedom and purity of the suffrage, and in loyal acceptance of the result by both parties, whatever that result might be. In this lay the guarantee of peace, but without it neither 300,000 nor 1000 additional troops would save the country from convulsion if principles and rights were violated. To increase the army on the eve of an electoral period was not a sign of good faith. It was time to draw a veil over the past and enter into a period of frank concord, but by institutional methods, not by means of bayonets. In the name of public tranquility, of which so much was said, the Chamber should reply to the Executive:—**"Abide by the law and both parties will be at your side, without need of battalions or military commandancies."**—Sr. Fajardo began to speak in defence of the military mutiny of July 4, but was called to order and silenced by the President of the Chamber, Dr. A. M. Rodriguez, who ruled his remarks as irrelevant to the debate.—Dr. Juan Gil spoke in defence of the Bill. In his opinion, he said, times had changed since he had been one of the first to protest against an increase of the standing forces. The period was no longer one of assured peace; everyone knew that public tranquility was threatened by serious dangers (protests from several Deputies)—at all events that was his opinion, and for that reason he approved granting the Government all the elements necessary for prompt and energetic repression of disorder. He then cited at considerable length various precedents from previous administrations, and military opinions, in favor of an increased standing force and the division of the Republic into various military commandancies. He was still speaking when the Chamber adjourned.

The debate on the above unhappy question threatens to occupy the few remaining days of the session, to the sacrifice of far more important business. The bad impression created by the affair continues, though the debate has so far been kept within moderate lines, and the speeches of Sr. Rozlo and Sr. Gil have reached a height to which the Chambers have been a stranger of late. The impression is not improved by two injudicious editorials in the *Diario* of yesterday and Friday, raking up old issues and reviving old discussions, so as to fan the embers of partisan ill-feeling.—Yesterday's

Tiempo has another vigorous article in opposition to the scheme of the Government, and especially to the proposed appointment of Gen. Muiz as Southern Military Commandant. Not only is the appointment most injudicious and unhappy from a political point of view, it says, but Gen. Muiz is also entirely wanting in the military qualifications for the post, and his selection by the Government can only be attributed to blind partisan passion and a deliberate desire to create offence. The *Tiempo* concludes with the following remark:—"Public opinion, which rarely errs, and events will soon show who is right. We have been able to hit the mark in the great events which have occurred since we appeared in the press, and we hit the mark now when we say that by such bad policy as this the good qualities of the present government will be frustrated, and it is doing itself a great deal of harm and failing to do any good." Which is precisely our opinion also, though we may add that there is little room for disappointment, as Sr. Batlle is steadily justifying his antecedents, but not his election.

A petition has been presented to the Representatives by numerous importers of wine, asking that, if the tax on foreign wines be sanctioned in the form established by the Senate, exemption may be granted to the consignments already en route. This is usual in such cases and only fair.

WAR CLAIMS.

The Executive has signed and promulgated the Law just sanctioned relative to the presentation of war claims. We now see its text for the first time. The following is a substantial translation:—

Art. 1. Claims for supplies to forces mobilized by the Government may not be presented after conclusion of the call for six months which shall be issued by the Executive immediately after the causes originating the mobilization have ceased. Such claims shall be made before the Ministry of Finance, accompanied by the corresponding vouchers.

Art. 2.—The period established above having expired, no further claim may be made for the said causes, and all credits and rights that may be derived therefrom shall be regarded as extinguished.

Art. 3.—When the claims are for supply of live stock (*ganados*) the said vouchers should include the schedule of Property Tax (*Contribucion Inmobiliaria*) or the lease (*contrato de arrendamiento*). In case the claimant is neither land-owner nor tenant, he shall accredit his property by all means of proof. In the case of consular or powers of attorney the claimant must state the number, kind, marks and brands of the live-stock supplied.

Art. 4.—Those who charge for supplies of horses must transfer the ownership of the same to the State by means of the corresponding certificates, stating the brand and color of each animal and such marks (*señales*) as it may have.

Art. 5.—The transfer referred to above shall be without prejudice to the right of re-sale in favor of the proprietor, at the same price.

Art. 6.—The Law of July 14, 1862, remains in force in so far as not opposed to the present.

Art. 7.—Those who have lent assistance to this description on account of the recent commotion (*sic*) must present their claims in the form above established and in the term of three months from the promulgation of this Law (July 10). The same term applies to all claims arising from assistance lent previous to the sanction of this Law. In both cases prescription is in favor of the State will have been reached at the end of the three months.

Art. 8. Let this be communicated, etc.

In accordance with the above notice has already been issued from the Ministry of Finance that all claims must be presented within the term of three months as specified.

As will be seen from the above, the purport of the Law—the phraseology of which could hardly be more clumsy—is general, as well as specific, with the object of applying to all future cases. The Law, however, solely treats of supplies given to troops mobilized by the Government, and makes no mention of claims for indemnity for damages caused by the troops, or for losses caused by revolutionary forces. It therefore only covers a part of the liabilities of the Government and the rest is left to the imagination. Why the Bill and its discussion should have been kept so secret has never been explained—perhaps because it was such a precious poor specimen of legislation.

It is characteristic of the dilatoriness shown by the present Government in nearly all its actions that fourteen weeks or more should have elapsed before it calls for the presentation of claims.

MONTEVIDEO GAS COMPANY.

(Concluded from our last.)

So much for the balance sheet; I will now take you to the revenue account, and that, on the whole, I venture to say is satisfactory, bearing

in mind what I have mentioned at previous meetings, and the very strong competition which we have with the electric light undertaking, which is a Government enterprise. It shows on the credit side an increase of about £1,130 on the previous year. The expenses at Montevideo are rather higher, as one would naturally expect from the increased receipts from the dock and dock workshops, but there is an increased balance of revenue of £635. I now come to the profit and loss account, and there you will see that we bring forward into this year's account £6,996, and that the revenue account for the year is £27,330. Interest, profit on exchange, and directors' fees waived, under circumstances which you will remember, make a total of £35,374; and on turning to the other side of the profit and loss account there is an item, "interest on debenture stock"—that, of course, is a new item—but interest on debentures shows a decrease of £632, which is owing partly to the existence of that debenture stock. The expenses of the issue of the debenture stock we have charged against the income of this year; that is to say, the whole of the expenses on this side have been so charged, but I think there will be a further small amount on the other side, of which we had not the particulars. Then we write off for bad and doubtful debts over £711, and we write £1,200 off the capital account. We have also, as you will see, made a reserve of £1,000, and we also take out of this year's profits the whole of the estimated loss which we are this year obliged to face on the settlement of the Government debt. I know I am addressing a body of business men, and I trust that, however distasteful this may be to treat your account in that way, still, at the same time, you will agree it is a proper thing to do. (Hear, hear.) That leaves a balance of £26,136, out of which, in addition to the dividend already paid, we propose to pay a further dividend at the rate of 4 per cent, and to carry forward to next year a balance of £7,168. I have been careful to go through these figures at some pains, and I hope it will be interesting in order that you may see that we endeavour to carry this business on in the most careful and economical way that we can, in carrying out the policy which I have mentioned to you since I have occupied this chair, viz, that of gradually strengthening our position as a gas company supplying the private consumer. I say this because, as you know, we have had to face the entire loss of what was originally the backbone of this Company's business, viz, the supply of the public lights in the streets. That revenue used to be as high as between £22,000 or £23,000; last year it amounted to £265. Now, that is a thing which we on this side of the table cannot help; all we can do is to do the best thing under the circumstances, and I have endeavored to explain the condition of the company, both bad and good, in order that you may appreciate the exact position. Now, gentlemen, I think I have told you everything, there is nothing further that occurs to me at the moment, but if anybody has any questions to ask I shall be glad to answer them. I conclude by moving the adoption of the report and accounts.

Mr. M. T. Hood seconded the motion.

Mr. Horzheim asked if the revenue from the gas business and from the docks could be given separately. The accounts were lumped together. He would also like to know, approximately, what the item, "other property," £3,000 odd, referred to.

Mr. Ashley Stables asked if particulars could be given as to the investments of the company.

Mr. Barber remarked that after the manner in which the chairman had gone through the balance sheet shareholders ought to be satisfied. He certainly did object to any answer being given to the question of the shareholder as to the separate expenses of the dock and the gas business. They really ought not to give this information. If any shareholder desired information for his own satisfaction he might call at the office. He noticed from the report that there was a small decrease in the actual consumption of gas. The chairman might explain that point.

Replying on the discussion the chairman said it was a fact that the consumers had increased, but the amount of gas consumed was less than last year. That, of course, was owing to a decrease in public illuminations and to the development of the incandescent gas light. As to their investments, he did not think it would be desirable to publish the list. They were not like a trust company, but the shareholders could have all information they wanted privately. A question was asked as to the "other property." That consisted of real estate at Montevideo.

The resolution was then put to the meeting and unanimously adopted.

The Chairman then moved: "That a dividend be, and the same is hereby, declared on the shares of the company for the half year ended December 31, 1902, of 8s. per share, less income tax, payable on June 3 prox, and making, with the interim dividend previously paid, 3 1/2 per cent. for the year 1902."

Mr. Simpson Rostron seconded the motion, which was adopted.

The Chairman moved: "That Mr. Simpson Rostron and Mr. Martin Topper Hood, two of the directors who retire by rotation, be, and they are hereby, re-elected."

Mr. Robert Merton seconded the motion, which was unanimously agreed to.

On the motion of Mr. Barber, seconded by Mr. Hughes, Messrs. Price, Waterhouse and Co. and Mr. Thomas Spooner Soden were reappointed auditors.

The Chairman moved: "That the thanks of the meeting be given to the whole of the staff of the company for their services during the past year."

Mr. Merton seconded the motion, which was cordially agreed to.

On the motion of Mr. Barber, seconded by Mr. Soden, a vote of thanks to the chairman and directors was accorded, and the proceedings terminated.

—SUSPICIOUS FIRE.—In the small hours of yesterday morning a fire broke out in a grocer's shop in Calle Isla de Flores. The fire was extinguished promptly, the damages being trifling, but examination revealed the peculiar circumstance that the fire had broken out simultaneously in two distinct parts of the premises, some ten yards apart. Who shall say that Insurance Companies do not require protection?

—FRENCH FETE.—Great preparations are being made by the French Colony for their annual patriotic fete, which will be celebrated on Tuesday, the historic quatorze de Juillet. The principal feature will be the Ball in the French Salon, and we have to return thanks for the usual courteous invitation to be present.

—CASINO.—There will be a special afternoon performance to-day with a raft of 20 toys for the small folk. On Tuesday there will be a gala function in honor of the French Anniversary, and the Damm Brothers, celebrated eccentric acrobats (we hope no one will say of them that they are not worth a dam, which is a Turkish coin of the lowest value) will appear for three nights only.

—IRISH LAND BILL.—According to a London telegram published in Buenos Aires, the Irish Land Bill was passed by the House of Commons on Wednesday, after a rather stiff debate, with two important amendments, one giving Trinity College, Dublin, £5,000 a year, to make up the loss of rent it will suffer by the action of the Bill, and the other giving the landlords a bonus of 12 per cent. The Nationalist members vigorously opposed this latter amendment, but it was carried by a small majority. It remains to be seen what further alterations the Lords will make in the Bill.

—MARK TWAIN'S MAP.—Mark Twain's "illustrations in Art" in *The Sphere*, carry the student of his works back to one of his earliest triumphs—the "map of Paris," published in the United States at the time of the Franco-Prussian War. This is now reproduced in the pages of our contemporary, with some of those necessary explanations which originally made it famous, such as: "The reader will comprehend at a glance that that piece of river with the 'High Bridge' over it got left out to one side by reason of a slip of the graving tool, which rendered it necessary to change the entire course of the River Seine, or else spoil the map. After having spent two days in digging and gouging at the map I would have changed the course of the Atlantic Ocean before I would lose so much work." This famous piece of cartography is now introduced by Mark Twain, along with some other artistic triumphs of his, in the following words: "My first work was a map of Paris. I made it during the Franco-Prussian War. It won praise from the most reluctant; I have given them here—read them for yourself. Yet that map has defects in it which anyone can see now; now that art has progressed so far. For one thing, it lacks delicacy of touch; for another, it lacks spirituality; finally, it merely compels emotion, it furnishes none of its own. I could make twice as good a map now. In the Berlin beer halls (declares the author of the map) American students used to leave this map lying on a table, and step aside, hoping it would attract German soldiers—which it did. 'They examined it, right side up and upside down, and in other ways, with rising emotion, and discussed it, not in a spirit of calm inquiry as they should have done, but with lurid violence—which showed that they did not understand it. Upon the average soldier it had the effect of forty-two beers, and was an economy. I could make a very different kind of a map now if I wanted to.'"

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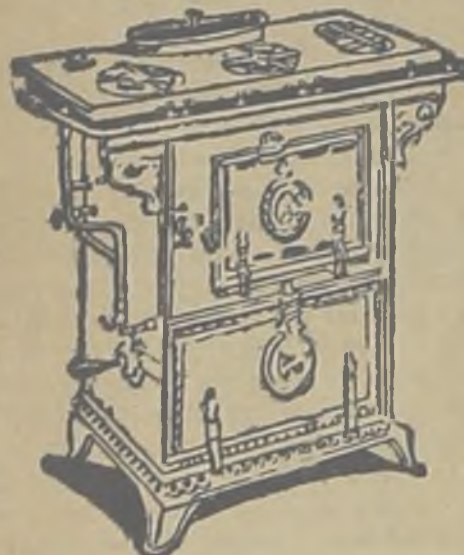

LONDON NOTES

SATURDAY, JUNE 13.

In the House of Lords yesterday Committees were appointed to join with the Committees of the Commons on the question of Municipal Trading and the Port of London Bill.

The sitting of the Commons was devoted to discussion of the Finance Bill, points relating to the Corn Tax, Income Tax, Coal Tax, fiscal policy, and huge expenditure being raised. The Chancellor of the Exchequer made a speech, in which he anticipated good results from the Committee of Inquiry into the Income Tax, offered pointed remarks on the urgency of reducing national expenditure, and expressed regret that the Colonies contributed so little to the defence of the Empire. The Bill was then read a second time.

Lord Rosebery was present at a dinner of the Liberal League in London last night, and made an important speech on the subject of Mr. Chamberlain's fiscal policy. Asking whether this derangement was expedient and practical, and whether it would have the effect of cementing the union of the Empire, he held that departure from Free Trade would be disastrous, and he viewed with alarm the effect upon the Empire of the new departure, condemning also the manner in which it had been proposed. Mr. Asquith also made a strong speech against Protection.

The Bishop of Hereford spoke strongly at the annual meeting of the British and Foreign Anti-Slavery Society, yesterday, against forced labour in South Africa. Such labour, he thought, was practically slavery.

Speaking at the annual meeting of the Imperial South African Association, at Grosvenor House, Park-lane, yesterday, Mr. Winston Churchill, M.P., said that, though peace had been established for more than twelve months, the prosperity of South Africa was by no means equal to what it was before the war, owing to the death of labour. Although much gold from South African mines might percolate into the pockets of those who lived in Park-lane, it was equally true that the mines were practically the only source of wealth in the country.

At the Primitive Methodist Conference, at Newcastle-on-Tyne, yesterday, the Rev. A. T. Guttery said he thought the country had been long enough under the reign of blood, beer, and Birmingham. They must speak out against the continuance of this.

Concluding its conference at Bath yesterday the Miners' Federation of Great Britain, by resolution, reaffirmed its confidence in the principles of Free Trade, and condemned the present vacillating policy of the Prime Minister and the new scheme of the Colonial Secretary, whose «way out» to the workers and trade unionists of the country» were resented.

Mr. A. P. Pilling, Town Clerk of Devonport, was yesterday appointed Clerk to the Metropolitan Water Board, at a salary of £1,500 a year.

Proceedings in the Court-martial on the officers accused of «ragging» at the Cape were yesterday brief. Dr. Vanderhulpe gave evidence as to bruises he had found on Mr. Stanford's body. Efforts to induce another witness to attend had proved unsuccessful, and the Court accordingly adjourned till this morning.

An unusual incident occurred in the King's Bench Division, when Mr. Robson, K.C., took exception, in Mr. Justice Grantham's court, to remarks that Judge had made as to the conduct by the learned counsel of a case at the Central Criminal Court. The Judge had declared in his summing up, that «during the four hours Mr. Robson was speaking he was raising false issues, and misrepresenting absolutely the effect of the evidence given in the Divorce Court.» Explanations were given, Mr. Justice Grantham defining what he meant by «false issues.»

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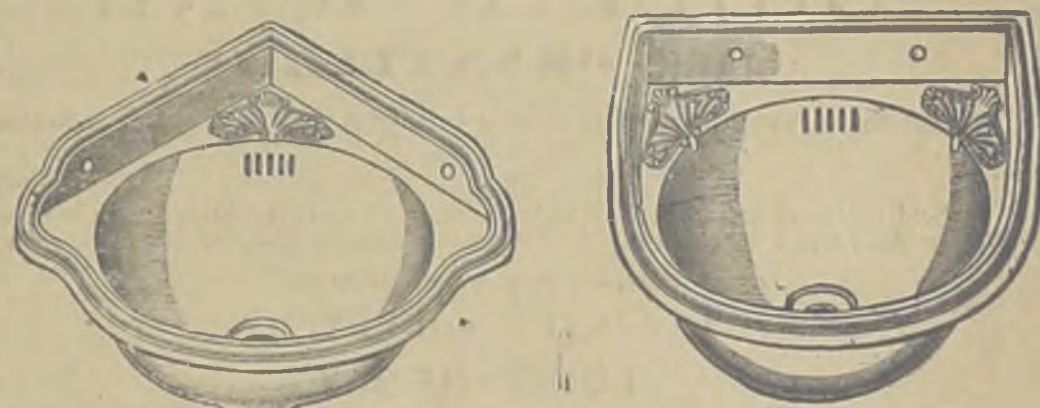

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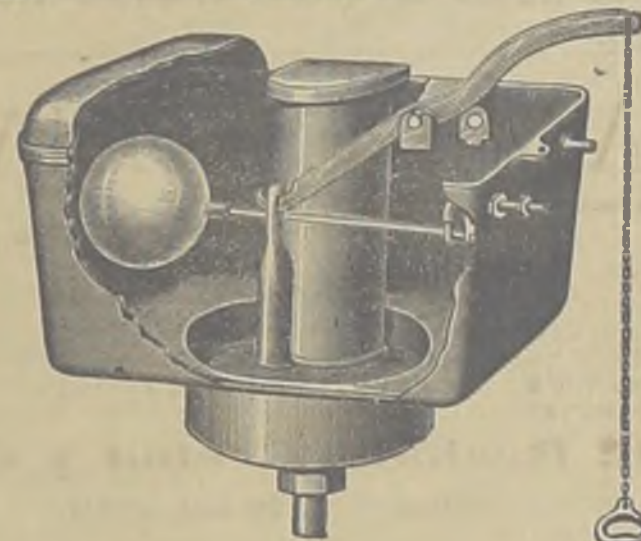
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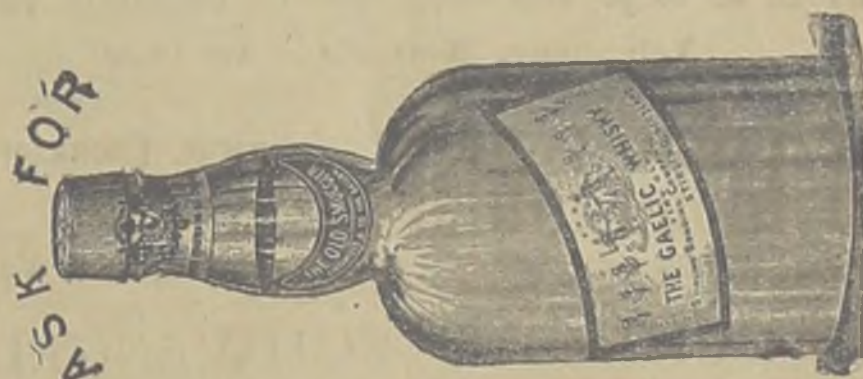


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SHORT STORY
