MRS. ELIZABETH PATE DIES AFTER LINGERING ILLNESS; 73 YEARS OLD

Mrs. Elizabeth Mary Pate of 606 North Beach died on Friday, January 5 at Kings Daughters Hospital after a lingering illness. She was in her 73rd year.

Mrs. Pate, who was a native of Montivideo, Uruguay, was the daughter of the late William Saunders and Mary Saunders of Montivideo. She had been a resident of Bay St. Louis for many years coming here from New Orleans.

An accomplished musician, Mrs. Pate was a concert pianist and had the honor of being the only woman impresario in her native land. At one time she taught Spanish in the Bay High School and until shortly before her death accepted pupils for private lessons in both piano and Spanish.

She was a past president of the Propeller Club in New Orleans and of the Gulf Coast Chapter of the National Council of Catholic Women. She was first department Chapeau of the original unit of the 40 and 8 in the American Legion in New Orleans and traveled about the state organizing salons for several years. When the local unit of the American Legion Auxiliary was reorganized here she took an active part in this and participated in Auxiliary events until her illness confined her to her home.

During her residence in Bay St. Louis, Mrs. Pate gave freely of her time and money to further the civic, cultural and charitable activities of the community and during the last war was an active member of the Red Cross. As late as Christmas, 1950, she assisted in obtaining gifts for the Christmas Gift Shop at the VA Hospital in Gulfport.

Mrs. Pate's remains were sent to New Orleans Saturday by Fahey Funeral Home and are at the Schoen Funeral Parlor. Religious services will be held at 9:30 Thursday from Holy Cross Catholic Church on Esplanade Ave., New Orleans, La., following which the body will be shipped to Montivideo, Uruguay for burial.

Mrs. Elizabeth Pate Dies January 5

Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Saunders Pate, 72, died at the Kings Daughters hospital Thursday, January 5, at 8:00 p.m.

Her body was shipped by Fahey Funeral Home to New Orleans to the Schoen Funeral Home; and from there it was sent by plane to Monte Video, Uruguay, for burial

Mrs. Pate, a talented musician, was the only woman to ever conduct a symphony orchestra. She was the organizer of the Womans Auxiliary of the American Legion Post 139, and served as president until it got underway. The deceased was presented a medal by the Italian government for outstanding services rendered in World War I.

Mrs. Pate was born October 18, 1878 in Monte Video; her parents were the late William and Mary Saunders.

Religious services were held at Our Lady of the Holy Rosary church Thursday, January 10, at 10:00 a.m.

She is survived by one brother who resides in Monte Video.

MRS. MARY PATE DIES

Religious services were held at the Holy Rosary Catholic Church for Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Saunders Pate, who died here following a short illness. After the services the body was taken by steamship to Montivideo, Uruguay, her native country.

Mrs. Pate had been a resident of Bay St. Louis for seven years and was active in church and civic work here. She was a talented pianist, and was on the Bay High faculty at one time as an instructor of Spanish.

She organized the American Legion Auxilliary in Bay St. Louis and served as president. She also organized the Propeller Club in New Orleans and held the office of president of that organization for several terms.

Mrs. Pate was the holder of a medal from the Italian government for services rendered in World War I. She was a descendant of a high ranking family of South America and her brother was at one time president of Uruguay. He is the only surviving member of her immediate family. She is being buried in Montevideo at her request.
