NEWS OF THE DAY.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives no-quorum once again on Tuesday.

The Decree has been issued of convocation to electoral elections in the Departments of Canelones, Florida, Durazno, Soriano, Salto and Artigas, on Sunday, November 29. These elections are not direct, the first step being to elect an «Electoral College», which, in turn, a fortnight later, elect the Senators. In the present case the whole affair reduces itself to a formality, for there will be no contest, and it is known beforehand that the election will fall on the nominees of the official wire-pullers, nominees who, in the present case, have been selected with as little regard to public opinion as to their fitness for the elevated post. It is a pity that some other word than «election» cannot be employed to describe the process, for there is very little of election in it, and the people, the free and independent voters, have practically no share in the matter, which is carried out entirely by the wire-pullers and creatures of officialdom, more or less openly aided by the police.

The Decree has been issued from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs appointing Dr. Horacio Garcia Lagos junior and Sr. E. Boix as honorary officials (attachés) of the Uruguayan Legation in London and Madrid respectively.

Yesterday morning President Williams left by special train for his proposed trip to the Swiss Colony, but his absence from the capital will be shorter than was expected, as he will be back next Monday. The party consists of President Williams, his wife and family, two or three military attachés, and an escort drawn from the 1st Cavalry regiment. Military honors will be paid on his arrival by the 3rd Cavalry, from Colonia. This morning the Minister of Public Works Sr. Lamolle, and the Presidential Secretary Sr. Barbaroux will leave to join the party. They will put up at the Swiss Hotel. Various excursions will be made in the neighborhood. On Saturday, Dr. Williams will go to Sauce Port, where he will visit the large textile factory of Salvo, Campomar and Co. and the paper mill of Messrs. Pappo, Badi and Cavajani. On Sunday he will leave for the town of Colonia, where great local preparations have been made for his reception, and there he will embark on the gunboat «18 de Julio», which will bring him back to the capital, escorted by the «Montevideo». Three two vessels left for Colonia on Tuesday to be in readiness. In order that the President may keep in touch with the capital, the National Telegraph has opened a telephone line to Nueva Holecra. This, and a branch post office, will remain definitely installed as a souvenir of the President's visit and for the benefit of the inhabitants of the district.

MONTEVIDEO WATERWORKS COMPANY.

VISIT TO THE WORKS AT SANTA LUCIA.

On Tuesday, on the invitation of Mr. James Fraser, Manager of the Montevideo Waterworks Company, a visit of inspection was paid to the Company's Works at Santa Lucia by a party of legislators, Government and Municipal engineers, and other gentlemen, among whom were the following: Dr. A. M. Rodriguez, President of the Chamber of Deputies; Senator Dr. Blengio Rocca, Dr. M. B. Otero, Dr. Arturo Berro, Dr.

C. M. Pena, Dr. E. Acevedo, Sr. Castells, Penco, Daure, Costa and Foglia (engineers). Mr. T. F. Lane, manager of the Montevideo Gas Company, Sr. L. Brito, Sr. Platero, and some of the party, which left town by the 8:40 a. m. train, was joined by the resident engineers Messrs. Nancollas and Fair, and the constructing engineers Messrs. Macdonald, Gardner and Parker.

The object of the visit was to view the progress of the new works in which the Company has lately been engaged, and to witness the working of the modern steam excavating machine, a marvellous piece of mechanism which digs out the trench for the large new main pipes at the rate of 100 yards per day. This machine, which excited great admiration, was shown in full operation, and under the courteous guidance of Mr. Fraser and his engineers the party were shown all over the works and depots of the Company, being much impressed with the completeness, efficiency and magnitude of the installations. This, with an interval for a well-served lunch, filled in an agreeable and instructive day, the party arriving back in town soon after 4 p. m.

In the course of the lunch speeches were made by Mr. Fraser, Dr. Blengio Rocca, Sr. L. Brito and Dr. C. M. de Pena, the three last named testifying to the pleasure and information they had derived from the visit. Mr. Fraser's speech, which conveyed much interesting information, were able to reproduce (in translation) as follows:—

«As some particulars of the progress of our new works will no doubt be interesting to you, I avail myself of this opportunity, when there are some representatives of the Montevideo Press with us, to give the following details:—

«It was in 1906 that the Company, recognising the need for a more abundant water supply, applied to the Government, in July of that year, for permission to duplicate their mains between the Pumping Station at Santa Lucia and the Reservoirs at Las Piedras, as also to lay a third main between the latter point and the City of Montevideo. The permission was only granted in September, 1907, and since that date great progress has been made with the new works. The necessary material was ordered from England by telegraph and three months after receiving the necessary permit, part of the material was on the ground and the work of laying the third derivation main actually commenced in the Calle Yaguaron. This main, 45 centimetres in diameter, from the Reservoirs to the Calle 18 de Julio, Montevideo, (19 1/2 kilometres) is now almost finished, only the part at Plaza Flores, where the new Legislative Palace is to be built, remains to be laid.

«The first of the large steel pipes for the pumping main arrived in this country in March last, and since then we have been receiving them at the rate of about 160 weekly. This will go on till February next year, when the last lot ought to arrive. These pipes are 30 inches diameter (76.20 centimetres) 6 yards (5.39 metres) long, and weigh almost exactly one ton each. The length of the main in all is 35,000 metres, of which about 2000 metres are already laid at the Las Piedras end. The trench is 1 1/2 feet (46 centimetres) deep, by 3 feet (91 centimetres) wide, and the excavator, which cost over \$5,000, is capable of digging 10 metres per hour or 100 metres a day. You see the work is a very large one, but we hope to have the main laid and working in about twelve months from now.

«A very fine new engine of the most modern type to pump through the steel main is now being erected, and will be the most powerful pumping engine in South America. It will be able to deliver into the Reservoirs at Las Piedras about 6,000,000 gallons (27,000,000 litres) in the 24 hours. The building where it is erected, owing to the deep excavations in rock and the expensive foundations, has alone cost nearly \$50,000.

«So as to ensure ourselves against any possible breakdown, we are now erecting another battery of two Babcock & Wilcox Boilers, and have just commenced the building of two more filters, each filter costing about £500.

«Altogether, the Company are now investing in this country in new work nearly \$1,500,000, (which shows the confidence the Directors have in the future and when everything is in working order the present supply will be practically triplicated. The present engines can deliver at the Reservoirs about 15,000,000 litres in 24 hours, add to this the 27,000,000 litres by the new engine and new main, and we have a total supply to the City of Montevideo of 42,000,000 litres per day.

«Competent hygienists have declared that 100 litres per inhabitant per day is an ample supply for all purposes to any city dependent entirely on pipe water. Taking the population of Montevideo at the maximum of 310,000 inhabitants, and supposing that they all took their entire supply from the Waterworks Company, the Company will be in a position next year to supply them with 31,000 litres per head daily, and supposing that only about half the population took pipe water, which is not a very unlikely supposition, considering that most houses have «cisterns» and derive at least part of supply from that source, for gardens, washing floors and patios, for animals, etc., then the supply per head to those making use of pipe water would be about double what is considered necessary in other parts of the world.

«There may be some want of pressure in the higher parts of the City this summer, but I wish to state that the Company is pushing on as fast as possible with their important new works, and next year will be in a position to give a perfect service and meet all demands. Then I hope to have the pleasure of inviting the Representatives of the Government to visit our establishment and inaugurate these very important extensions of our works.»

The Excursions of the Central Uruguay Railway Company.

Letter to the Editor.

Dear Sir,

On your spare a small corner of your valuable space for the following lines, in reference to the excellent excursion trains of the C. U. R. Company; not certainly in any way as a complaint, but rather as a grateful appreciation of the much that has already been done, and the much yet to come. «Know thyself», said the old philosopher long ago, and I can conceive no higher service to the inhabitants of this country, both native and foreign, than to make them know, or at least give them facilities to know, this splendid country, its physical conditions, natural beauty and commercial possibilities, etc. On this point, we venture to assert without fear of contradiction, that Mr. Bayne during his short administration, has done more than any man, living or dead—for it is not long since when a journey to the far regions of San José and Durazno, was quite an event. Whereas now, by three different routes, the very extremes of the frontier can be reached, often, rapidly and cheaply. But as you know we are all near relatives of Oliver Twist, who audaciously asked for more; and now to the point. The excursionists «class B» from the interior to the Capital, are allowed 10 or 12 days optional return by ordinary trains. But excursionists of the same class, from the Capital to the interior, are only allowed 4 or 5 days. Now we would respectfully say that this is not as it ought to be, and those going out should have at least the same number of days' stay, if not more, than those coming in. Ten or 12 days is certainly long enough to see the sights of Montevideo, and even to transit a lot of business, but four days at the extreme frontiers, are certainly not enough. Take for instance the letter «B» for Salto or Paysandu; if allowed 10 or 12 days' optional return, excursionists can undertake a number of local trips, such as to San Eugenio, and the neighbouring Brazilian town of San José Baptista, or to the Cuareim and Santa Rosa, from either of which they cannot return to Salto under 3 days. A couple of days to visit Concordia, the historical «Mesa de Artigas», and the Battlefield of Quebracho, etc., etc., or from Paysandu to Concepcion del Uruguay, and Colon etc., etc., none of these trips are possible with only 4 days' stay. Excursionists to Colonia might visit Agraciada and the monument of the 33, also Carmelo, and even cross to Buenos Aires, and have good times for a day or two, but not with 4 days' optional return. And as for excursionists to Mercedes, they could go over to Fray Bentos and see the great Liebig, and as far as Gualeguachú across the River, one of the most interesting, but most difficult to reach on either side of the Uruguay. But Mercedes has quite another important feature, which possibly Mr. Bayne as a comparatively new comer may not know. Years ago Mercedes was one of the principal «balnearios» in the country, and thousands of people, from far and near, travelled thither to bathe in the waters of the Rio Negro; which were supposed to flow over a bed of aquatic plants, containing virtues to heal, if not all the ills that human nature is heir to, at least a great many of them. So a 15 days' trip to the Rio Negro bath, even if an extra charge, the same as in Europe, was imposed for a prolongation of the days to return, would be very interesting, and I think of good result. I have already objected my limits, but my only object is to call, through the medium of your valuable paper, the attention of the Railway management to these points.

The Tuberculosis Congress.

Washington, Sept. 28.

An announcement of the greatest interest to England was made at the inaugural meeting to-day of the sixth International Congress on Tuberculosis. In replying for Great Britain to the welcome which Mr. Corielyou, the president of the meeting, extended to the foreign delegates, Dr. Newsholme stated on behalf of Mr. Burns that the Local Government Board had decided to issue an order compelling all Poor Law medical officers to notify any sanitary authorities making application for such a notification, of all cases of phthisis occurring amongst pauper patients. This order, he said, would also render it obligatory on other Poor Law officials to notify changes of address of pauper patients suffering from phthisis.

Dr. Newsholme emphasized in the course of his speech the success which had attended recent sanitary work in Great Britain in suppressing tuberculosis, even when not primarily undertaken for that end. Improved social conditions, implying better and more food, better clothing, improved housing, and less over-crowding had helped their influence and had been helped greatly by the silent social revolution constituted by altered conditions in the treatment of the

disease which was now largely institutional instead of domestic. In the case of consumption, this prevented much infection. In this connexion Dr. Newsholme warmly praised the work of Lady Aberdeen in Ireland.

—POLITEAMA THEATRE.—«La Muerte Civil» will be repeated this evening, preceded by «Jacintha».

—THE «PAMPERO».—Considerable excitement was caused on Tuesday evening by the announcement that a carrier pigeon had been captured in the Plaza Constitución bringing a message from the missing balloonists of the «Pampero», dated the 13th, to the effect that they were drifting eastwards to the sea. The news was at once telegraphed to the Newberry family in Buenos Aires, and numerous messages were exchanged. There is strong reason, however, to doubt the authenticity of the affair. Apart from the extreme improbability of a carrier pigeon, let loose ten days ago from a balloon somewhere in the south of Argentina, finding its way to Montevideo and alighting in the central Plaza, the bird in question is not one of the Argentine military pigeons carried by the balloonists, the nose bars of which are all known. The box, if it is one, is a very crude and shameless one, and it is made worse by a strong suspicion that the incident has been devised by a not particularly scrupulous «yellow» journal of this city

which was the first to make capital out of it.

—DEATH.—The death has occurred in Buenos Aires of Mrs. Mary Hors, widow of the late Mr. Melville Hors, who some twenty years ago was resident in this city, and who was instrumental in starting «The Express», the first daily English paper published in Uruguay. The deceased lady, who was in her 50th year, leaves a large family of children to lament her loss.

—WHAT DOES IT MEAN?—Our contemporaries publish a statement to the effect that the Uruguayan Consul in Bilbao (Spain) has reported to the Minister of Finance here that the British Consul in Bilbao is taking «emoluments» from the holders of bonds of the Uruguayan Consolidated Debt there. How many such bondholders there are is not stated—it is rather surprising to learn that there are any at all in such a place. The «emoluments» may refer to a commission for collecting the quarterly interest, but it remains to be shown that the Consul has done anything wrong. The whole affair is probably a fuss about nothing.

—EXTINCTION OF LOCUSTS.—This Bill has already been signed by the Executive, and is now law, the intention being to enforce it immediately. It now remains to be seen how it will work. Meanwhile the pernicious insect is reported as doing considerable damage in Salto, the whole of which Department is invaded in proportions exceeding those of last year and of 1906. The only northern Departments at present free from locusts are Paysandu and Rio Negro, and the insect has been seen south in Canelones and Colonia, but not yet in large quantities.

—A GOLF STORY.—Mr. Andrew Carnegie once consulted a prominent Edinburgh resident as to whether he should have a golf course at Skibo. «Yes by all means have one», was the reply, «and go in for the game yourself, it will add ten years to your life». «Indeed», said Mr. Carnegie; «well, look here, if you'll guarantee that it will really add ten years to my life, I'll make you a present of two millions». «There was silence for a few moments, then—«I can guarantee that», came the answer, «but I'll tell you what, I'll play you for the two millions.»

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LONDON NOTES.

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 29.

Yesterday morning the King, travelling from Balmoral by motor and special train, visited Dublin, and opened the new Queen Victoria Memorial School for the sons of Scottish sailors and soldiers. On the way his Majesty made a short stay at Blairgowrie, where he had a hearty welcome, and was presented with addresses by the town councils of Blairgowrie and Rattray. Dublin was gaily decorated, and large crowds cheered the King as the Royal procession passed through the streets on the way to the school. At the new building an address from the subscribers was presented to his Majesty by Lord Rosebery, president of the council, and in reply the King said they could not better have honored the memory of the dead who had lived worthily than by founding that institution. After declaring the school open, and conferring the honor of knighthood on Colonel P. D. Trotter, chairman of the executive committee, his Majesty inspected the building, and shortly afterwards left by train for Balmoral.

Lord Tweedmouth has resigned the office of Lord President of the Council for reasons of health, and the King has accepted his resignation.

At the Guildhall, yesterday, Mr. Alderman F. S. Hanson and Mr. J. J. Baddley, the Sheriff elect of the City, were admitted to office with the customary formalities.

The Moral Education Congress continued its sittings yesterday at the University of London. In the morning, the subject of discussion was «The Relation of Religious Education to Moral Education», and interesting addresses were delivered by the headmasters of Westminster and Eton, the Rev. M. Maher, S. J., of Bionghurst, M. Baisson, of the Sorbonne, Paris, Mr. Honda, of Tokio, the Bishop of Southwark, and others. A sectional meeting was held for the discussion of «Special Problems.» At

the afternoon sitting, the subject considered was "Systematic Moral Instruction," on various aspects of which a large number of papers were submitted.

Mr. C. B. Macfarlane, playing in a foursome on the Enfield course yesterday, went round in 67, which beats the amateur record for the course by three, and the professional record by six strokes.
