POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives held another preparatory sitting on Saturday. Various substitutes convoked to fill vacancies in the Chamber took their oath and their seats. These were Sr. E. Arcey, Sr. L. Barbosa, for Florida; Sr. C. F. Bucker and Dr. J. Grauer, for Montevideo; Dr. S. Pappo, for Soriano, and Sr. J. E. Moratorio, for Canelones.—Dr. A. M. Rodríguez was unanimously re-elected President of the Chamber, with Dr. Aureliano Rodríguez Larreta as 1st Vice, and Sr. Santiago Rivas as 2nd Vice. The naming of the standing Committees was deferred until to-day.

The Senators held a «preparatory» sitting on Sunday afternoon. Dr. F. Viera was unanimously re-elected President of the Senate, with Dr. Blengio Rocca as 1st Vice and Sr. F. Ros as 2nd Vice.—The standing Committees were then named as follows:

Legislation. Drs. R. J. Areco, J. B. Rocca and A. H. Pérez Olave.

 The formal opening of the ordinary sessions of the Chambers was taking place yesterday afternoon at the time of writing. We presume that the Presidential Message will find general publicity this morning.

A good impression has been made by the election of Dr. A. Rodríguez Larreta as 1st Vice-President of the lower Chamber. As one of the ablest and most experienced parliamentarians in the Chamber, Dr. Larreta is fully entitled to the honor, but apart from that, his position as President of the national Directorate gives the act a special political significance. His election was not achieved without some opposition from the extreme intra-segents, but for once these proved in the minority, and this has given hopes that there is at last an inclination in the Chamber to abandon the intense partisan intolerance that has been such an unpleasant feature for the past six years. How far this will be continued, remains to be seen.—As to the election in the Senate, it is useless to make any comments. With the present constitution of that Chamber, very little to satisfy public opinion is to be expected from it. The composition of the standing Committees is another proof of this.

News respecting the jurisdictional question is expected from Buenos Aires this morning with some anxiety, but so far there is nothing necessary to add to the remarks made in our last issue.

Sr. S. Pappo, having entered the Chamber of Deputies, has resigned his post as Pro-Secretary of the Presidency. Sunday's *Siglo* comes round to the opinion that it is very necessary to endow the Government with legal authority for the expulsion of dangerous anti-social characters. This precisely agrees with what we said the day before, part of which is quoted by the *Siglo*. The only difference remaining between the *Siglo* and the *Tempo* on the point, is that the latter thinks that the Government

is justified in taking the step without waiting for express legislative authority, and the *Siglo* thinks not, but both papers agree as to the necessity of the step in social defence. We fear, however, that great difficulty will be found in extracting any law of the kind from the present Chambers.

The *Dia* announces the possibility of a solution by mutual arrangement of the various questions between the Government and the Port Works contractors, which were left pending by the rejection in the Chamber of the contract for the complementary works. On Saturday, Mr. Silard, local representative of the contractors, and Dr. J. S. Ramirez, their legal adviser, had a conference with President William, and presented proposals for an arrangement which the President has undertaken to consider. So far nothing has transpired as to the conditions proposed. Referring to the matter editorially, yesterday's *Dia* expresses itself rather dubiously, but insists that, in any case, there must be no further delays in the completion of the more immediately useful part of the Port Works. The Chamber, it explains, was opposed to the previous arrangement in particular but had no intention of closing the door to some other and more acceptable arrangement, should such be found possible. What the *Dia* evidently does not like is the idea that the affair should be submitted to foreign arbitration, as provided in one of the clauses of the original contract.

The Government is said to be about to present an important Bill providing for the preservation of roads. No details have transpired.

Huge Fire in Boston.

Motor Car Exhibition Burnt Down.

Boston (Mass.), Jan. 17.

The Coliseum, a large building used for shows, was burned early this morning, and several people are believed to have lost their lives. An exhibition of motors was being given, and five hundred high grade automobiles, both American and foreign, were destroyed. Two men who worked on the premises are missing; they were probably burned to death. A dozen firemen were disabled.

The fire is the largest that has occurred in Boston for many years, and the loss is estimated at \$600,000. The entire Fire Brigade was called out, but the intensely cold weather had frozen up some of the mains, making it almost impossible to fight the flames, and the immense Coliseum, with its contents, was wholly destroyed. The scene was a grand one: the flames shot high into the sky, aided by the petrol and large quantities of oil stored on the premises, the firemen from head to foot were clad in ice, which melted only when they got within touch of the fire.

To add to the difficulties, the strongest wind was blowing, and fanned the flames so that no power of man could cope with them. The fire spread to several places near by, many of which were used in conjunction with the Coliseum for purposes of the exhibition. The firemen, however, prevented the fire from spreading to any dwelling houses.

The same storm which rendered the firemen's work so difficult brought snow with it, and the railways are blocked in about Boston; telegraph lines are down in all directions, and shipping tied up. It was the most severe storm of the winter, and extended from Cape Hatteras to the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

Warship that will beat the «Invincibles.»

Plymouth, Jan. 16.

The new cruiser Indefatigable will be laid down at Devonport next month. Complete drawings have now been received at the dockyard. The Indefatigable's length between perpendiculars will be 555ft., compared with the three Invincibles' 530ft.; beam 80ft., an excess of 18in.; while the displacement will be about 19,000 tons, compared with the Invincibles' 17,250 tons; and the specified horse-power 45,000, against 41,000. She will have three funnels and a belt of armour the whole length.

Her main armament will correspond with that of the Invincible class, viz., eight 12in. guns, mounted in pairs in armoured barbettes, so disposed as to give a fire forward or aft of six guns and a broadside of eight. The anti-torpedo armament will consist of twelve 4in. guns in association with 27 smaller weapons and two submerged torpedo tubes. The additional displacement is to be translated for the most part into speed, and the new cruiser may be expected to set up a new record in the seaming capacities of large armoured ships embodying the all big gun principle.

Aerial Navy League.

London, Jan. 17.

To watch our national interests in aviation, an association, which will be known as the «Aerial League of the British Empire», has been formed. Mr. Stephen Marples, the hon. secretary, and Colonel H. S. Massey, who has been one of the prime movers in the institution of the League, were busily engaged at the temporary offices in Staple Inn-buildings on Saturday in arranging its early work.

To a press representative they said that from the first the League would have to encourage invention. France, Germany, and America were already far ahead of the United Kingdom in the conquest of the air, and there was grave need for organized effort to foster British experiment in aeronautics. «We want», said Col. Massey, «to arouse a keen public interest in the subject, and at the same time to satisfy it by means of lectures etc., supplying the latest and most accurate information as to what is being done both in this country and abroad.»

Col. Massey went so far as to hint at a possible chair of aeronautics at an English University, as a result of the activities of the League.

The mural brass tablet to be placed in the Church to the memory of the heroic stoker Scott is being made by a local firm and will be unveiled by the Hon. Kennedy on Sunday next.

—*WEATHER.*—This has been fine on the whole, but with some rapid variations. Temperature very moderate for the time of the year. Symptoms unsteady.

—*URQUIZA THEATRE.*—This is now being prepared for the carnival balls. Dramatic performances will be resumed on March 3 with a visit from the Company of Sr. F. Paravicini, specially organized for the performance of the works of Uruguayan and Argentine authors.

—*POLITEAMA THEATRE.*—The program for this evening consists of «La Alegria de la Huerta», «El Desencuadrado», «Las Bribonas», and «El Ultimo Chulo.» The last nights of the present Company are announced. After Carnival week the theatre will reopen for a visit from the Creole Company of Podesta Hermanos.

—*SCALA.*—This Variety Theatre is closed for repairs and redecoration, and will reopen on March 1st.

—*MARITIME CASE SETTLED.*—Although it is now rather an old affair, our readers may remember the serious collision which occurred just outside this port in June last between the British steamer «Craigearn» and the «Cordova» of the Italian Lloyd Line, the former sustaining serious damages estimated at between \$50,000 and \$70,000, the vessels having collided at full speed. The action against the owners of the «Cordova» for damages was tried in the Probate, Divorce and Admiralty Division in London, several weeks ago, and occupied three days in hearing. As a result, the President of the Court, the Rt. Hon. Sir Gorell Barnes, decided that the defendant's ship was alone to blame. This means the complete exoneration from all blame of Capt. Clare, master of the «Craigearn.» Capt. Clare has many friends in Montevideo who will be glad to hear of this.

—*DIPLOMATIC NOTES.*—Com. V. Cobiainchi, the Italian Minister here, embarks on March 5 for a six months' trip to Europe.—The new Brazilian Minister, Sr. E. Lisboa, is expected to arrive about the middle of March.
 —*MR. J. STORM.*—This well-known engineer has resigned the post of Technical Director of the Port Works, and now holds that of Director Engineer for the construction of the Midland Railway branch from Algorta to Ray Bentes.

—*ACTOR SUICIDE.*—A New York telegram gives a sensational account of the suicide of the well-known English actor Mr. Charles Warner, who hung himself in his room in a hotel there. According to one version he was suffering from monomania and depression, but another version says that he committed the act in an attack of alcoholic madness. We have our doubts as to the identity of the suicide, for the telegrams give his age as only 38. The English actor Charles Warner could not be much less than 60 years of age. He was a famous actor of romantic and heroic parts, and was the original Coupeau in Charles Read's «Drink» (adapted from Zola's novel «L'Assommoir») produced at the Princess Theatre, London, in 1878 or 1879, and also made a great hit in the same author's drama «Never Too Late to Mend» about the same time. The writer of these lines has occasion to remember the fact, for he acted with Mr. Warner in both pieces in 1881, and Mr. Warner at that time was over 30 years of age.

—*MATRIMONIAL.*—We learn from Buenos Aires that the engagement is announced of Miss Ethel N. Mulhall, late of Rosario, and Mr. F. E. Bernard, engineer of the firm of Messrs. Tomás Drysdale and Company and second son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Bernard, of Gainsborough, England.

—*DORANDO WINS AGAIN.*—A telegram from Philadelphia communicates that another Marathon race took place in that city between Dorando Pietri and the United States long distance champion Smallwood. Dorando won easily.

—*THE ONLY ROAD.*—Bishop Wilberforce was once accosted by a stranger anxious to «score off» him. «Excuse me», he asked, «could you tell me the way to Heaven?» «With pleasure», was the Bishop's instant reply. «Turn to the right and keep straight on.»

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LONDON NOTES.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 16.

The second report, dealing with the subject of afforestation, of the Royal Commission on Coast Erosion, the Reclamation of Tidal Lands, and Afforestation has been issued as a Bluebook. The Commissioners, after considering at length the present condition of British forestry, arrive at the conclusion that a national scheme of afforestation would contribute to the solution of the unemployment problem and that the immediate taking in hand of such a scheme would be in the highest degree in the public interest.

The work of constructing an embankment on the south side of the Thames, adjoining Westminster-bridge, for the site of the new County Hall for London has now begun. It is expected that the embankment will be completed in about 18 months, at a cost of some £25,000, and the site will then be handed over to the builders. The amount to be expended on the Hall has been fixed at £802,000, and it will provide accommodation for the London County staff of 2,800 persons who are now accommodated in 24 separate buildings.

Dr. J. Evan Spicer, of London, has lost his life on the mountains near Lenzersheid, Switzerland, his young brother having a very narrow escape.

MONDAY, JANUARY 18.

Mr. F. A. Newdegate—Newdegate (Unionist) was returned unopposed on Saturday for the Tamworth Division. The Mansion House Earthquake Fund on Saturday reached a total of £104,000.—The Archbishop of Canterbury preached yesterday morning in Canterbury Cathedral on the earthquake, and the collections throughout the day were in aid of the relief fund.—The principal Mass in every church in the Roman Catholic diocese of Westminster yesterday was one of solemn requiem for the souls of the victims of the earthquake.

Speaking at the annual dinner of the Northumberland and Durham Farmers' Association on Saturday, Lord Durham urged farmers not to rely too much on any Government. He did not believe that any Government could make agriculture prosperous in that district by substituting incompetent labor for highly trained men who had been engaged in agriculture all their lives. He did not care for Parliamentary interference with agriculture, and did not know any Government that could deal satisfactorily with agricultural interests unless it were a Government of common sense.

The centenary of the death of Sir John Moore at Corunna was celebrated on Saturday by a special service

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connected with the First Division of the League, thirteen with Second Division, and thirteen with the Southern League. The remaining three are Croydon Common, Worthington, and Wrexham.

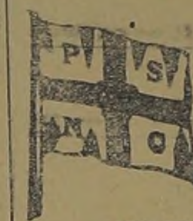
